
Child's First Visit

Q. How can I prepare my child for his first dental visit? his first dental visit?

A. Actually, the less "preparing" you do, the better. For instance, if you try to describe some of the equipment used, and choose words like "drill" or "shot", you may find that your dentist doesn't use those words at all. He may say something like "tooth cleaner" for drill, or "put the tooth to sleep" for injection. It's best not to even mention hun or discomfort unless you want to condition the child even mention hurt or discomfort unless you want to condition the child to the idea of pain before he even has a chance to sit in the dental chair. Besides, the first visit usually doesn't involve any procedure that would be uncomfortable anyway. And most portant, try not to communicat y fears you may have yoursel

"Parents need to discuss the crisis with their childer," said Dr. Florence Eddins, a child psychiatrist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Children hear rumors and if not reassured, they may think the situation is too terrible to

It is important to consider the child's age and development level when explaining the crisis. One way to determine this level, is to have the child ask questions. Parents will be better informed about the child's fears and can alleviate them without creating new ones.

Eddins says that ignoring children's fears may cause them to surface in other ways.

#### **Notice May Require** Contact With Social Security

Starting on October, some people in the Big Country area may receive a notice from their financial institution indicating that the Social Security number and /or the name in the institution's records are different than the ones in the records of the Internal Revenue Service, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene said recently.

In some cases, Hammons said, it may be necessary for the person to contact Social Security to change his or her name in Social Security records or to verify the information already in those records.

If the person needs to change the information in Social Security records, he or she should have documentary evidence showing both his or her old and new names, as well as evidence of identity, Hammons said.

It is a good idea to call Social Security first to make sure what action is needed. That way, an unnecessary visit to the office may be avoided. It is easy to call Social Security's toll free telephone number, 1-800-234-

Toll-free telephone service is available from 7a.m. to 7p.m. on weekdays. The best times to call are early in the morning and late afternoon. And if you can, it is best to call later in the week and later in the month.

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

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#### **Post Office** Gives Middle **East Mail Tips**

Mail has been described as the biggest morale booster for our service people stationed overseas and as an essential link with home. And despite some problems the Postal Service and the military have experienced in delivering mail to personnel in Operation Desert Shield, they insist that they can get the mail through. It may take 5 to 10 days and even longer if it is forwarded from an individual's pre-deployment

Local postal workers have been asked for instructions in sending mail to personnel in Operation Desert Shield, and they have shared some tips with us.

Mail sent to Navy personnel with a Fleet Post Office address can usually be delivered more quickly and does not have to go through foreign customs.

However, mail going to one of the 39 Army/Air Force Post Offices in Saudi Arabia and the Persian Gulf area are subject to customs inspections. Such mail can be rejected for delivery if it includes pictures of people who are not fully dressed, such as pictures of girls or women which reveal their legs or shoulders, pork or pork products, alcohol, firearms, or religious materials.

When writing someone in the Middle East, it is best if you include the full name, rank, Social Security or service number, military organization or unit number, and APO or FPA if known.

Mail may be forwarded from the last address if the current APO or FPO is not

Restrictions on the size of mail have been lifted so that packages may now be sent to the Middle East along with letters, we are told.

Do not send stamps to the service people in Saudi Arabia, but send stamped envelopes instead. The dry climate and heat in the country cause stamps to fail to remain on envelopes, while the stamps are printed on stamped envelopes.



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



#### **Several Texas Counties** Added To Nontoxic **Shot List**

Twenty-seven Texas counties have been added to the nontoxic shot zone list for hunting waterfowl in 1990. The entire state will require steel shot as of Sept. 1, 1991.

Counties added to the nontoxic shot zone this year include: Austin, Bosque, Burleson, Cameron, Castro, Collin, Deaf Smith, Denton, Eastland, Erath, Henderson, Hood, Hunt, Kleberg, Moore, Red River, Refugio, Robertson, Rockwell, San Patricio, Shelby, Smith, Titus, Walker, Washington, Wise and Wood.

added from 1987-89 are: Colorado, Harris, Jefferson, Nueces, Waller, Liberty, Baylor, Brazos, Comanche, Grayson, Hopkins, Marion, Trinity and Willacy.

Bob Jessen, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department waterfowl program leader, said the main reason for going to steel shot is that millions of birds are dying annually across the U.S. because of lead shot.

Lead embedded in the bird's body from being shot is not the problem. If the bird survives wounds from being shot, the lead is sealed off in the muscles and causes no further problems, he said. The problem occurs when a bird ingests lead shot while feeding. Its digestive juices dissolve the highly toxic lead into a soluble form that is absorbed into the blood-

With the addition of counties this year, the number of waterfowl taken with steel shot will be more than 80 percent, Jessen said. "It should subside dramatically with time. We're on the right track. We're going to save two to three million birds a year, nationally."

Steel shot zones began with heavily hunted areas - counties with harvests of more than 20 birds per square mile - in 1987. Those at more than 15 per square mile were added in 1988, 10 or more in 1989 and The counties that were five or more this year. In 1990,

waterfowl hunters in the entire state will be required to use steel shot. Hunters and firearms and ammunition dealers should make plans for steel shot now, he said.



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

## Pharmacy **Topics**

By Bob Mueller

Aerobic exercise programs can actually dissolve clots in blood vessels, say researchers at the University of Washington in Scattle. Exercise raises levels of naturallyoccuring tissue plasminogen activator, the genetically engineered drug given to dissolve clots.

Marijuana interferes with memory, even making conversation difficult, researchers found in a study of teenagers at the Georgetown University School of Medicine in Washington, D.C.

Preliminary study at the National Cancer Institute found that low oral doses of isotretinoin, a synthetic vitamin A derivative, helped prevent the return of skin cancer. Test subjects had no new tumors during research, or fewer than previously.

Successful treatment for the depression and irritability associated with premenstrual syndrome was reported in the American Journal of Psychiatry. Women are exposed to bright fluorescent light for two hours a day during the week before menstruation.



## YOUR GARDEN

Proper Lawn And Garden Care

By Jim Albanese These hints from experts can help keep the wrongs out of the annual rites of lawn and

garden care for the four out of every five households-more than 70 million Americanswho spend time participating in them

As anyone who has ever worked in the yard knows, there frequently are problems. Insects and weeds ac count for the biggest headaches in lawn and garden care; troublesome pests such as grubs, wasps, Japanese beetles and broadleaf weeds can all wreak havoc.

How do you know when you have a problem? Brown spots in your lawn can be one giveaway, indicating the likely presence of insects such as grubs. Mounds, perhaps caused by fire ants, can be another. Vegetation nibbled and destroyed by any number of insects can be another sign, as can be the presence of un-

Weed Control

There are herbicides that can be applied at the same time that you plant your lawn, because they will not harm either new grass seed or grass. For example, Spectracide Lawn Weed Killer can be used when a lawn is planted, killing more than 30 varieties of weeds in the process.

There are two optimum times of the year to exercise weed control: When weeds start to grow actively in the spring, and at the end of the growing season, when they try to get a foothold while lying dormant during the winter. Broadleaf weeds-the



dandelion, plaintain, chickweed, clover, wild onion and ison ivy-can best be controlled when they are growing vigorously, because they are most vulnerable at that time

Insect Control

Insects are another common irritant for amateur landscapers. Just as with weeds, the homeowner is not likely to know exactly what actual bug is present; some times even the experts have trouble identifying the insect responsible for a specific prob-

That's really not necessary, though, because there are some insecticides on the market which control nearly all bugs that can pester a homeowner. Look for a lawn and garden product, such as Spectracide's Lawn and Gar den Insect Control, that can kill more than a hundred common varieties of insects.

Partnerships in Parenting), the training sessions will contain a lot of practical instruction on parenting skills.

"The main idea of these classes is to make sure foster (or adoptive) parents are prepared and can handle different situations. Some children have special needs - they feel abandoned, or have come from abusive situations," Rodriquez says.

> He states that Eastland County needs more Foster Parents - right now. Only a few homes in the County are certified to keep foster chil-

He also points out that new laws have changed various aspects of foster parenting. Foster parents can now become eligible to adopt children, including those they keep. Single people can now be Foster Parents, and couples where both the husband and wife work away from the home can become Foster Parents.

So a number of things about Foster Parenting have changed - but some things neverchange. That's the need for kind, loving, patient people who will make a commitment to helping chil-

Rodriquez hopes a number of such people will show up at the MAPP classes at Breck-
