proposed tax rate hike for the Cisco Hospital District will be held Monday, Sept. 24, at 6 p.m. in the Hilton Community Center, according to Bob Connor, hospital board president. The public is urged to attend this important hearing. The Cisco Hospital District

is attempting to increase its tax rate to a point which promises to support the operation of E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital, which has been closed since August 25.

The new tax rate, 50 cents per hundred dollar valuation, will establish a firm base for the hospital when it is reopened, Mr. Connor said. That amount would generate some \$500,000 per year.

Plans call for the Graham Memorial Hospital to reopen in October. A hospital management firm, Preferred Management Corporation of Shawnee, Oklahoma, will manage the hospital. The corporation is currently managing 11 hospitals, all in rural situations similar to Cisco's and each engaged under similar circumstances. Each of these hospitals, in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas, has

The hospital board, in consultation with the management firm, has deemed the 50 cent rate necessary to operate the hospital on a sound basis. The board president said, "By keeping the hospital, Cisco stands to gain, in addition to convenient and adequate health services, opportunity to recruit new physicians for the town, and retain local ambulance service from the hospital base rather than out-of-town service, which result in emergency service delays."

The approximately \$1,500,000 annually generated by the hospital will be retained in Cisco, and medicare and medicaid payments will be used in Cisco treatment rather than other locations. The aged and poor of the town can be served much better in a local health facility, Mr. Connor added.

CJC Has Record Enrollment

A record enrollment of 2,068 was reported to the Board of Regents at its regular meeting on September 17. The Board learned that the Cisco campus enrollment of 746 is the biggest it has been since 1972.

On campus enrollment is up 5.2% and off campus is up 11.7% over the Fall 1989. On campus academic semester has increase by 20.6% over last fall, but vocational decreased 6.6%. Off campus academic increased by 41.6% and vocational decreased by 17%.

The Board approved a full math position in Abilene and authorized the hiring beginning with the spring semester, 1991.

Foreign Farm Owners Reminded Of 90 Day Rule

Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminds foreign investors who acquire or transfer any interest other than a security interest in agricultural land to report the transaction within 90 days.

"The Foregin Disclosure Report is still required by

law," said Harris, "and those who are late in reporting or who fail to report face possible penalties." The report must be filed if all or part of the agricultural land is sold, or the title is transferred to another person, he explained. ASCS is responsible for

keeping track of how much

agricultural land is owned or

controlled by foreign individuals or interests. Foreign investors have reported owning about 12.9 million acres of agricultural land in the United States.

According to Harris, a foreign disclosure report must be filed when a single foreign individual, organization, or government holds a direct or indirect interest of 10 percent or more; when a group of foreign individuals, organi-

zations, or governments, acting in concert, hold a aggregate interest of 10 percent or more; when a group of foreign individuals, organizations and governments each with less than 10 percent and not acting in concert hold an aggregate of 50 percent interest in more in agricultural land.

"Agricultural land is any tract of more than 10 acres season approaches, the probnow in agricultural, forestry, or timber production. This includes land in agricultural use when purchased, as well as land later converted to agricultural use," Harris said. Foreigners who own or have an interest in 10 acres or less do not need to report unless annual proceeds from the sale of agricultural products grown on these acres exceed \$1,000.

The ASCS official explained that interest means any right, title, or legal share of ownership in agricultural land, such as partnerships, trusts, estates, or shares in a corporation that owns agricultural land.

Under this proposal taxes on the average home would increase by \$6.27 or 4.43 percent compared with last year's taxes.

Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would increase by \$00.0443 per \$100 of taxable value or .0444 percent compared to last year's tax rate. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.

Post Office Announces Operaton Desert Tips

The Postal Service has some helpful hints for Americans mailing parcels or packages to military personnel deployed to Operation Desert Shield. Following these guidelines, your packages will get there promptly and efficiently.

Use a sturdy carton, large enough to accommodate the contents.

Use some form of cushioning to protect the articles inside. Seal the parcel securely. Use pressure-sensitive tape. Avoid using brown wrapping paper, cord or string on the outside.

Print the service member's name and address on the address portion of the package on one side only. It should include the service member's name, rank and service number, military organization or unit, and the APO/FPO address. It's important to have the current APO/FPO address, which should be available from that service member's base in the United

Put your return address in the upper left hand corner of the package. Also, include your return address on a piece of paper on the inside of the package.




