

Pastor Clark To Teach Letter To **Book Of Revelation**

Beginning Sunday evening, Oct. 7, at 7 p.m., Pastor M.H. Clark of Faith Baptist Church, 700 W. 18th in Cisco, will be teaching through the last book of the Bible, the Book of Revelation, for the next several months. Dr. Clark emphasizes that the Book of Revelation is really one revelation of Jesus Christ, as the first verse declares. It shows the relationship of Christ to His churches, to the coming Great Tribulation, the anti-Christ, the devil and the Battle of Armageddon, ect.

After chapter one, the introductory chapter, Revelation gives a prophetic history of the church in chapters 2 and 3. This was not understood in the early centuries, but can now be seen very clearly by those who know church history. It is generally believed by students of Revelation that we are in one of the last two of the seven periods of church history. Chapter 4 through 10 depict the "Great Tribulation," a seven-year period that will come upon the earth after the "rapture" (snatching out) of all true believers in Christ. This will be a time of horrible catastrophes upon the earth, many of which man himself is now able to unleash, and the rule of the one-world government and one-world religion headed by the anti-Christ, who will be Satan-dominated.

Pastor Clark asserts his conviction that the present "New Age Movement" will be a vital part of that one-world religion.

The Great Tribulation will close with the coming of Christ to the earth to destroy the anti-Christ at the Battle of Armageddon, followed in chapters 20-22 with the thousand-year reign of Christ on this present earth, and the coming of the new, eternal, heaven and earth.

Pastor Clark has taught Revelation many times, including eight years of teaching it in Baptist Bible College East in Boston. He points out that it is the only book in the Bible that begins with a promise of a special blessing to those who teach it and those who study it (Rev. 1:3).

Protective Cap Useful

Q. What is a pulp cap, and why is it necessary?

A. When the pulp chamber (nerve) infected, it needs a pulp cap for pro-tection. The pulp cap is a non-irritat-ing, soothing medicament (usually calcium hydroxide), which is placed directly over the portion of the nerve affected. The nerve of a tooth can be affected by decay or trauma or even affected by decay or trauma, or even be nicked by routine operative pro-cedures. To avoid a more lengthy and costly root canal procedure, the dentist may try a pulp cap. The ther-apy offers a 50% chance of allowing a tooth to continue to develop, as with a boaby tooth, or remain healthy and infection-free, as with an adult


Presbyopia

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



Homemaking Hints By Janet Thomas

SAVE NOW FOR COL-LEGE EDUCATION

Next to buying a house, a college education is the most expensive big-ticket item facing the average family.

Nancy Granovsky, a family economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, suggests that if you have a 10-year-old child, plan on saving roughly \$29,000 by 1998 to cover such costs as tuition, books and room and board.

The estimate assumes that you'll be paying half the costs, and that your child will go to a state university in Texas. But you'll need to save much more if your child doesn't receive any scholarships, doesn't pay part of the college bill, or goes to a private school where tuitions usually run higher.

That amounts to an annual savings goal of about \$2,200 per year, assuming you can get 6 percent on your money after taxes.

If your child is 1 year old, you have 17 years to save, but college costs are expected to be even higher-roughly totaling \$54,000 for parents planning to pay half the expenses.

These figures, based on an estimated inflation rate of 7 percent for college costs, illustrates how important it is to start saving now. College costs of \$7,400 per year in 1990 will be \$16,700 per year by the year 2000.

Today, people use a combination of loans, savings and work-study to pay for college. Many parents pay educational costs out of their current income -some taking additional jobs.

Government bonds are one type of investment that guarantee complete safety. The United States Series EE Savings Bonds for College are good choices for financing education. They can be taxfree and purchased at market-

based rates. Interest rates for the bonds vary with the market rate, but go no lower than the market rate set at the time of purchase.

Stipulations for these bonds include:

* When you use EE bonds to pay for higher education and your taxable income is below \$60,000, bond income is tax free, but the federal tax break phases out at a joint income of \$90,000.

* They must be redeemed in a year the owner pays qualified educational expenses (tuition and fees, but not room and board).

* Interest is fully exempted only if the qualifying tuition and fees paid during the year are equal to, or more than, the redemption proceeds. Otherwise, exemption is proportional to the percentage value used for tuition and fees.

* Certain records must be kept for income tax purposes.

Other options for financing college education include zero-coupon securities, mutual funds, children's custodial accounts and insurance policies. However, there are risks and limitations involved, and a prudent investor should check with a professional who specializes in financial planning for college.

Becoming better informed is part of the financial planning process for college education. Parents and students, especially those who think they can't afford college, need to know what financial aid is available and how to qualify for such options as loans, work-study programs and

High school guidance counselors have a wealth of reference material on college programs and costs. Most public libraries keep current references on U.S. colleges and universities.

The saying that "education pays" is still true. Figures from the U.S. Census Bureau show that what people earn is a direct reflection of their level of education.

In 1987, census figures indicated that high school graduates earned an average income of \$12,000, while college graduates earned \$22,400, and those with master's degrees earned \$30,600.

2 C. sugar 3 eggs, well beaten 1 1/2 cups salad oil 3 C. all-purpose flour

1 t. soda 1 t. salt 1 t. vanilla extract

2 t. ground cinnamon 3 C. thinly sliced, peeled

Powdered Sugar Glaze

Combine sugar, eggs, and oil; beat well. Combine flour, soda, and salt; add to sugar mixture, 1 cup at a time, mixing well after each addition. Stir in vanilla, cinnamon, and pears.

Spoon batter into a wellgreased 10-inch Bundt pan or tube pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Remove from pan, and allow to cool; top with Powdered Sugar Glaze. Yield: on 10-inch cake.

I realize now that yes, some of that grief was a normal process that I had to go through but most of that grief was because of misinformation. I really believed that I was leaving that hospital with a baby that would do absolutely nothing all of her short life. Because of misinformation, me and my family and friends did not get to enjoy a very special time in our lives - the same enjoyment we all have when we have a child.

But Amber showed us very early on that all I thought was true was just a lot of misinformation and I had better get the real facts and information so she could develop to her full potential. And now she is always amazing me. Putting limitations on anyone, especially a child is the wrong thing to do. I believe that instead of Down Syndrome, it should be called Up Syndrome - afterall isn't that the way to go.

I hope I can run some articles in the paper this month on different handicap conditions, so if anyone has any Combine ingredients, that they would like to put in, let me know. I hope I can get a workshop with a speaker to discuss different disabilities. Also would like to have a presentation at the schools. So if you have any ideas or would like to help, let me know. 



Notices Sent Concerning Social Security Number

Starting in October, some people in the Big Country area may receive a notice from their financial institution indicating that the Social Security number and/or the name in the institution's records are different than the ones in the records of the Internal Revenue Service, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

In some cases, Hammons said, it may be necessary for the person to contact Social Security to change his or her name in Social Security records or to verify the information already in those records.

If the person needs to change the information in Social Security records, he or she should have documentary evidence showing both his or her old and new names, as well as evidence of identity, Hammons said.

It is a good idea to call Social Security first to make sure what action is needed. That way, an unnecessary visit to the office may be avoided. It is easy to call Social Security's toll-free telephone number, 1-800-234-5772.

Toll-free telephone service is available from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on weekdays. The best times to call are early in the morning and late afternoon. And if you can, it is best to call later in the week and later in the month.





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

Influenza Season May Mark Debut Of New Type

This year's influenza season may mark the U.S. debut of B-Yamagata, the strain that appeared last year

But, according to Dr. W. Paul Glezen of the National Influenza Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, that prediction is tentative. Information from the southern hemisphere, which has already undergone its flu season, has not painted a clear picture of what kind of flu to expect.

"The southern hemisphere was hit by a mixture of flu viruses this year," Glezen said. "But, we think influenza B is most likely to be the main player in this year's flu

ease Control in Atlanta and the Food and Drug Administration in Washington, D.C., decide on the composition of each season's influenza vaccine based on viruses circulating worldwide.

Influenza usually strikes suddenly. Symptoms include fever, generalized muscle pain, weakness and a dry, hacking cough.

Victims of the flu should get plenty of rest and drink lots of liquids.

Adults may take aspirin or an aspirin substitute to reduce fever and pain, but people younger than 21 should use only aspirin-free pain relievers. Aspirin has been associated with Reye's syndrome, a complication of flu and chicken pox that can cause vomiting, convulsions, brain damage and death in children.

Influenza is caused by variants of types A and B influenza viruses.

Variants are classified according to where they were first identified.
