## Former Ciscoan Named Professor Of The Year

Dr. Joseph D. Stamey, professor of philosophy at McMurry University, has been named Texas Professor of the Year by an education support group.

Born in Cisco, he is a graduate of Cisco Junior College and holds two bachelor's degrees and a master of arts degree from Southern Methodist University. He earned a doctor of philosophy degree from Boston University in 1968.

Stamey, a McMurry faculty member since 1967, was honored by the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) of Washington, D.C.

He is the first Abilene university professor to be honored by CASE in the six years it has chosen a top Texas professor. CASE picks one top professor for each of 45 states, plus a National Professor of the Year.

Stamey said letters from colleagues and former students assessing him as a scholar and a teacher were crucial in the judging. Balance among teaching, scholarship and service were stressed in the competition.

Asked his secret with students, Stamey said he wishes he knew.

"Part of it is the subject," he said. "It's such an interesting subject, I don't see how anyone could fail to be stimulated."

He and Dr. Jack Weir, professor of philosophy at Hardin-Simmons University, teach on each other's campuses, as well as their own, to complement each other's specialties and to expose students who take several philosophy courses to more than one viewpoint, Stamey said.

The author of many scholarly articles, Stamey has co-authored two textbooks with McMurry colleagues: *Exploring Religious Meaning and Exploring Christianity*. Dr. Robert C. Monk, McMurry professor of religion, is co-author of both, and

four former McMurry faculty members are co-authors of the former book.

Both books have been printed in subsequent editions.

"The selection of a McMurry University professor reflects on the entire instructional program of the institution," said Dr. Paul E. Jungmeyer, vice president for academic affairs.

An ordained minister of the United Methodist Church, Stamey served pastorates in three Texas conferences of the Church.

He is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. O.L. Stamey, longtime Cisco educators.

## 'Support The Loboes' Hospital Board Vote Tax Rate Hike; Opposition Signs Rollback Petition

E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital board of directors voted Monday night to increase taxes 255 percent and residents opposed to the tax increase immediately signed petitions calling for a rollback.

Board President Bob Conner said a 50-cent tax rate is needed to reopen the hospital which closed Aug. 25 because of last year's rollback vote, too few patients and a stop on Medicare payments.

Some 20 opponents began signing and passing out rollback petitions after a 3-0

hospital board vote to raise the district's tax rate from 14.1 cents per \$100 valuation to 50 cents.

The board adjourned its special meeting after approving the tax hike and began its regular meeting.

Opponents to the tax hike have 90 days to collect about 300 signatures needed to call a rollback election, said Emmett Rich, a former board member who was distributing some of the petitions Monday. Rich was defeated in a re-election bid last May.

Opponents hope to have the

required signatures within 30 days, Rich said.

Last October, the hospital was presented with a rollback petition when the tax rate was increased from 12.7 cents per \$100 valuation to 28 cents. The rollback election dropping the rate to 14.1 cents was approved by a narrow 23-vote margin in January.

Board President Conner said the board probably will be presented with a rollback petition. The board's next meeting is 7 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 25.

If the 30-bed hospital re-

mains closed, the district may have to pay back a \$313,000 federal grant used almost 20 years ago to build the hospital. One condition of the grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, according to Conner, was that the hospital remain open for 20 years or the grant would have to be paid back with interest. The 20-year deadline was missed by three months with the Aug. 25 closing. The hospital opened in November, 1970.

Paying back the grant would push the hospital's debt to more than \$1 million with \$435,000 owed on bonds also used to build the hospital and another \$300,000 owed in operating expenses.

The board transferred E.L. Graham Memorial's Hospital deed from the hospital authority to the hospital district to satisfy the bond holder, Conner said.

About three weeks ago the hospital district signed a contract with Preferred Management Corp. of Shawnee, Ok. The board will pay the management corporation a \$100,000 annual fee if E.L. Graham Memorial reopens, Conner said. The fee would include the administrator's salary and management services. The contract with E.L. Graham Memorial included making Administrator Don Henry one of the company's employees.

Three hospital employees remain working in the business office, medical records and maintenance.

Thus far this season, the Loboes have scored 128 points and have allowed their opponents only 33 points.

In the Ranger game, the Loboes used only 18 seconds to score their first touchdown on a Darryl Morrison 74-yard run on the first play from scrimmage. The Lobo offense was able to move the ball at will. The defense held the Bulldogs scoreless until 5 seconds remained in the game

when the Bulldogs booted a 35-yard field goal.

Cisco Junior Varsity will host the Goldthwaite JV at 6 p.m. Thursday at Chesley Field.

The junior high seventh and eighth grade teams travel to Goldthwaite Thursday. Action is scheduled to begin at 5 p.m. with the seventh grade game.

Cisco Junior College Wranglers travel to Athens Saturday where they will play Trinity Valley Community College at 7:30 p.m.

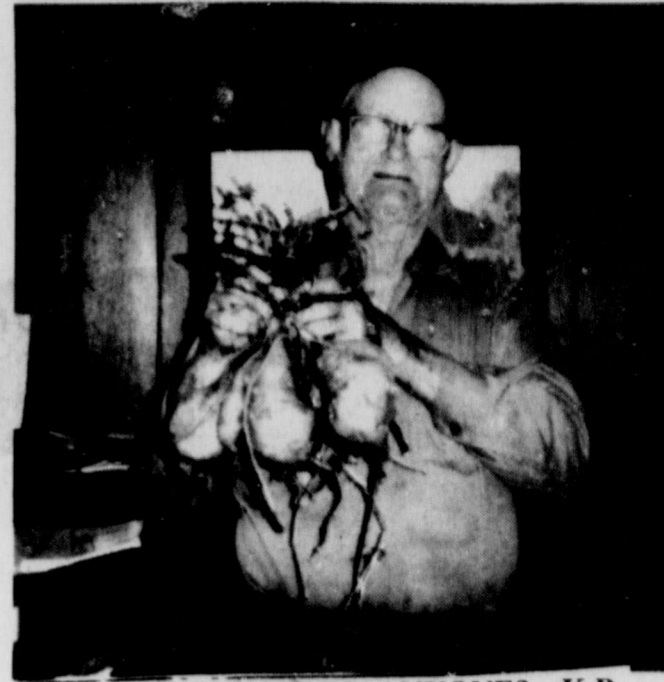

### Protective Cap Useful

Q. What is a pulp cap, and why is it necessary?  
A. When the pulp chamber (nerve) of a tooth is in danger of becoming infected, it needs a pulp cap for protection. The pulp cap is a non-irritating, soothing medication (usually calcium hydroxide), which is placed directly over the portion of the nerve affected. The nerve of a tooth can be affected by decay or trauma, or even be nicked by routine operative procedures. To avoid a more lengthy and costly root canal procedure, the dentist may try a pulp cap. The therapy offers a 50% chance of allowing a tooth to continue to develop, as with a baby tooth, or remain healthy and infection-free, as with an adult tooth.

## The Voting Process: Voting Equipment And Absentee Ballots

Once you've registered to vote, some questions may remain about the process of actually casting your ballot. It can be a bit confusing, if you have never voted before. I hope the following clears up any confusion new voters might have.

### Methods of Voting:

In addition to the traditional paper ballot, there are three types of voting systems currently used to conduct elections in Texas. These voting systems are: (1) punch card; (2) optical scan; and (3), mechanical voting machines.

The majority of the counties in this state conduct their elections using paper ballots. With a punch card voting system, you insert a computer card into a device provided in voting booth and use a "punch" (stylus) to poke a hole next to the candidates and propositions you support. You then remove the card and place your voted ballot in the ballot box.

With optical scan ballot, you fill in a "grid" with a lead-based marker next to the candidate you choose to vote for on the ballot. Once you have voted, you deposit the ballot in the ballot box.

With voting machine, you flip levers on the face of the machine next to the names and measures you want to vote for. When you've voted for all your choices, you pull a lever that casts all your votes at once. The machines keep running tallies of the votes, although these totals are behind locked doors in the back of the machine. The totals are read after the polls close.

If you have questions about how to cast your ballot, any election official can explain the procedure and demonstrate for you. If you need

help in reading or marking the ballot, you may request assistance or bring someone with you to help you vote.

### When and Where:

You must be registered at least 30 days before an election in order to vote.

Polls are open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Election Day and most are accessible to handicapped voters.

Call your county clerk, voter registrar, or elections administrator if you cannot find the location of your polling place. The telephone numbers are listed in the government pages of most phone books. Many Texas newspapers also publish a list of polling places.

### Absentee Voting:

One of the most convenient methods of voting is by the absentee ballot. Among the states, Texas has led the way in pioneering a simplified system of absentee voting by personal appearance. Any qualified voter is eligible to vote absentee by personal appearance without having to give a reason for doing so. The procedure is now as easy as that used on Election Day.

The period for absentee voting by personal appearance for the Nov. 6 general election is from Oct. 17 to Nov. 2. I encourage you to take advantage of the generous period of time allowed for in-person absentee voting.

A qualified voter may vote absentee by mail, but must give a reason to do so. Those reasons are absence from county of residence on Election Day and during the absentee voting by personal appearance period; a disability; 65-years of age or older on Election Day; religious beliefs; or confinement in jail.

For further information, call our toll free election hotline at 1-800-252-VOTE(8683). An application for an absentee ballot by mail must be submitted to the absentee voting clerk before you can receive an absentee ballot. The application must include your name, signature, permanent address, the address where you want the absentee ballot sent, and your reason for voting absentee. An official application form is not required, but probably help you make a more complete application. Forms are available from your county clerk.

Once you receive the absentee ballot by mail, you can follow the instructions enclosed with your ballot, then

mail it back to the absentee voting clerk in an envelope provided. You must sign this outer envelope for your ballot to be qualified and counted, but it is not in any way used to identify your ballot and how you voted - the ballot and envelope are separated as soon as your signature is verified as belonging to you by comparing it to your application to vote absentee by mail. You must return the absentee ballot to the absentee voting clerk by mail, or by common or contract carrier, before 7 p.m. on Election Day.

## Oil Production Report From RR Commission

Eastland County produced 74,595 barrels of oil in July. With oil prices around \$40 per barrel, sales of this oil could go to \$2,983,800 or up to \$36 million per year. Oil production for this county has probably increased since this last report, since marginal wells are being cleaned out and put back in production.

Texas crude oil production averaged 1,699,325 barrels daily in July, according to preliminary figures released by Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance. July 1989 preliminary production was 1,756,249 barrels daily.

This figure compares with preliminary June production of 1,702,633 barrels daily. Final production reports for June indicated average production at 1,721,285 barrels daily.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for July is 52,679,086 barrels, up from 51,638,538 barrels in June. July 1989 preliminary Texas oil production figure was 55,057,782 barrels.

Hance said the state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary July production were: Gaines, 3,589,446 barrels; Andrews, 3,171,934 barrels; Ector, 2,997,446 barrels; Yoakum, 2,740,310 barrels; Hockley, 2,616,149 barrels; Gregg, 2,355,177 barrels; Pecos, 2,152,020 barrels; Crane, 1,472,309 barrels; Scurry, 1,169,119 barrels; and Kent, 951,447 barrels.

Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 447,945,688 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in July, compared to the June gas production total of 443,712,186 Mcf. July production was down 3.08 percent compared to July 1989 production of 462,213,400 Mcf.

The state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary July production were: Pecos, 26,790,251 Mcf; Webb, 21,929,202 Mcf; Zapata, 20,980,324 Mcf; Panola, 15,953,440 Mcf; Hidalgo, 14,273,999 Mcf; Crane, 12,429,896 Mcf; Crockett, 9,708,555 Mcf; Hemphill, 9,305,230 Mcf; Ector, 9,266,622 Mcf; and Yoakum, 8,361,307 Mcf.

Texas gas production in July came from 180,244 oil wells and 45,875 gas wells. Gas production in July for Eastland County was 937,968 Mcf.

## Handicap Awareness Month

### MENTAL RETARDATION

Mental Retardation - People with mental retardation are those who develop at a below average rate and experience difficulty in learning and social adjustment. In terms of I.Q. persons with mental retardation usually score 70 or below. Mental retardation is not a disease, nor should it be confused with mental illness. Children with mental retardation grow into adults with mental retardation, they do not remain "eternal children." They do learn, but slowly, and with difficulty.

Mental retardation is four times more common than rheumatic heart disease and nine times more prevalent than cerebral palsy. It affects 10 times as many children and adults as polio did before the Salk vaccine. Mental retardation cuts across the lines of race, educational, social and economic background. It can occur in anyone. As a matter of fact, hereditary components are known to account for only a fraction of the cases of retardation.

Mental retardation can be caused by any condition which impairs development of the brain before birth, during birth or in the early childhood years. Probably the greatest number of children with mental retardation have chromosome abnormalities. Other biological factors include (but not limited to) asphyxia (lack of oxygen), blood incompatibilities between the mother and fetus and maternal infections, such as rubella or herpes. Certain drugs have also been linked to problems in fetal development.

Many authorities agree that people with mental retardation develop in the same way as people without mental retardation, but at a slower rate. Others suggest that persons with mental retardation have difficulties in particular areas of basic thinking, and learning such as attention, percep-

tion, or memory. Depending on the extent of the impairment - mild, moderate, severe or profound - individuals will develop differently, in academic, social, and vocational skills.

Persons with mental retardation have the capacity to learn, to develop and to grow. The great majority of these citizens can become productive and full participants in society. Appropriate educational services that begin in infancy and continue throughout the developmental period and beyond will enable children with mental retardation to develop to their fullest potential. Children and adults need the same basic services that all people need for normal development. These include education, vocational preparation, health services, recreational opportunities and many more. In addition, they need specialized services for special needs.

If you would like more information, the organizations listed below can help, and if you need to find services I will try to help and there is our parent support group for parents that children (any age) that are handicap (any handicap) that will help, it's called "Special Needs."

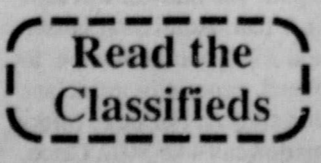

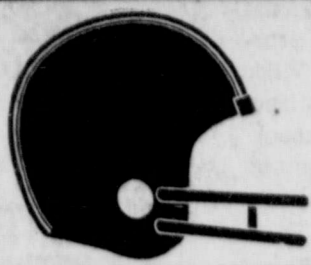

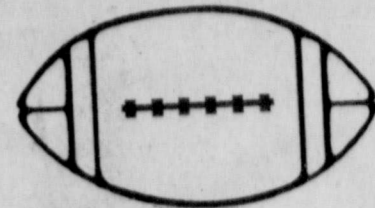

## Cisco Lobos Defeat Ranger Bulldogs

Cisco took the opening kickoff and never looked back against Ranger last Friday in beating the Bulldogs 52-to-3 in Ranger. After receiving the opening kickoff, Darryl Morrison took the ball on the first play from scrimmage and went 74 yards for the touchdown. The PAT by Kelly Cozart was blocked, but it didn't matter as Cisco had the only score it would need to beat the Bulldogs with 11:42 left in the first quarter.

The Lobos struck quickly again after the Lobo defense held Ranger on three plays forcing a punt. Terrence Fletcher received the punt at the Ranger 44 and 40 yards later Cisco had the ball with a first and goal at the 4-yard line. Two plays later Morrison took the ball around right end and scored his second TD with 9:12 left in the first quarter. The two-point conversion failed and the score was 12-to-0.

Cisco added two more touchdowns in the opening stanza on runs of 18 yards by Kelly Cozart and 3 yards by Ryan Duncan. A two-point conversion was added on a 2 yard pass from Hoot Beckett to Terrence Fletcher to make the score 26-to-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Cisco added two field goals of 26 and 23 yards by Brent Shepard and touchdown runs of 19 yards by Morrison and 71 yards by Cozart to give the Lobos a 45-to-0 lead at the half. The last Lobo score came with 4:02 left in the third quarter when Jay Nixon plunged over from 5 yards out. Shepard's PAT was good and Cisco had a 52-to-0 lead.

Ranger's only score came with 5 second left in the game on a 35-yard field goal making the final score 52-to-3.

The Lobos showed that their class was no "act" as they tried to avert running the score up on Ranger by kicking field goals on first down and punting on fourth and short. The Lobo reserves played much of the game as the first team unit came off

the field after the first quarter. This allowed the reserves to acquire valuable playing-time experience as well as preserve the health of the first-teamers who needed to avoid injuries.

## Turnovers, Breakdowns Stop Eastland Mavericks

The Eastland High Mavericks practically dominated the highly state ranked Goldthwaite Eagles a football game played Friday in Eastland. The Mavs had more rushing yards and passing yards, and twice as many first downs, but Goldthwaite won the game 32 to 6.

The best of Southern hospitality was displayed by the Mavs as they sent their visitors home with almost everything they desired while the Mavs shot themselves in the foot with turnovers and defensive breakdowns.

A very good Goldthwaite team hung in the game and took advantage of the Eastland mistakes to score their touchdowns while being thrown for losses and held for little or no gain so often during the game.

With Rojelio Bonilla picking up much of the yardage, the Mavericks gained 3 first downs before giving up the ball on their first series. Goldthwaite managed just 3 yards before having to punt. Eastland recovered a Goldthwaite fumble, then Sanderson passed to Kyle Sargent for 10 yards and Eastland's only touchdown. The extra point run was short.

Goldthwaite went to passing and passed 30 yards for their second score. Again they kicked the point.

Runs by Bonilla and Tim Montgomery resulted in 2 first for Eastland before the ball went over.

A long run by Goldthwaite set up a 20 yard touchdown pass, but the kick missed.

Eastland passed for two firsts and Bonilla ran for a third, but a field goal attempt from the 30 yard line missed, leaving Goldthwaite with a 20 to 6 halftime lead.

Attempting to run, Goldthwaite was forced to punt. A pass to Sargent gained a first and a pass went to Lance Curry before Eastland fumbled a pitchback.

Another excellent Maverick defensive effort forced yet another Goldthwaite punt, then Bonilla and Franklin

Skinner picked up yardage before Eastland had to punt.

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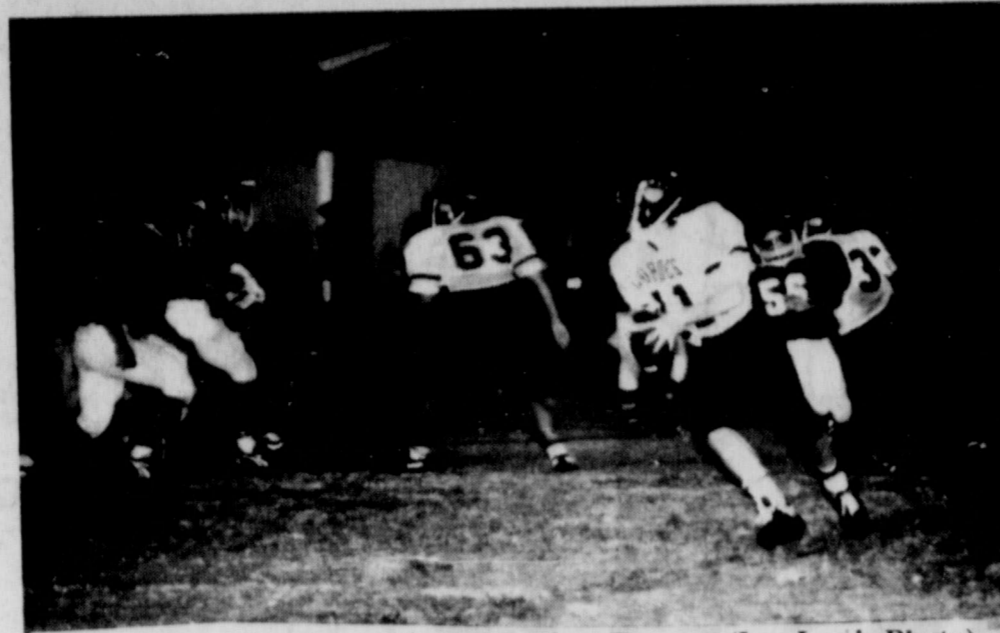
