Word has been received here that SSG. Roy Dan Hoover, son of Rev. and Mrs. Dan Hoover of Coleman, has arrived with the 44th Chemical Company in Saudi Arabia. His wife, Yvonne Hoover, and son, Brandon, reside at Fort Hood. The Hoovers have many relatives in the Cisco area.

The Fort Worth Star Telegram prints in its Wednesday editions statistics for Fort Worth area high school football teams. And the Cisco Lobos were listed in several categories last Wednesday. In total offense, Cisco was fifth in the area with 1,523 yards, for an average of 380.9 yards per game. In rushing offense, the Lobos were third with 1,416 yards, averaging 354.0 yards a game. Cisco was fourth in scoring offense with 127 points for an average of 31.8 points a game. Cisco rated second in total defense, allowing only 414 yards in four games, average of 103.5 yards each outing. Rushing defense lists Cisco first, allowing 264 yards, for an average of 66 yards a game. In passing de-

fense, the Lobos were listed eighth, allowing 150 yards for an average of 37.5 yards. The Lobos were seventh in scoring defense, allowing only 23 points to be scored in four games for an average of 5.8 points.

Individual stats showed Lobo Darryl Morrison listed 17th in rushing. He has had 51 carries for 435 yards for an average of 8.5 yards per carry and 108.8 yards a game. Darryl had scored five touchdowns. Lobo Terrence Fletcher had carried 55 times for 417 yards. An average of 7.6 yards each time he touched the ball. He averaged 104.5 yards a game.

In scoring, Lobo Jay Nixon was seventh and Darryl Morrison was 23rd in the area. Jay had made 44 points on seven touchdowns and a 2-point conversion. Darryl has scored five touchdowns and one 2-point conversion for a total of 32 points.

The stats were for the first four games played.

## Thrift Mart Stores Have New Wholesale Supplier

Thrift Mart's Eastland and Cisco stores have a new wholesale supplier. Thrift Mart will now be featuring foods from Fleming Co., Inc. of Oklahoma City, OK.

Fleming is the largest food distributor in the country, and it has both a division office and a distribution center in Fort Worth.

"We look at this as a very positive move for our company," General Manager Bill Williams said. "We look forward to a long-term relationship with Fleming."

Williams said that Thrift Mart will now be supplied by Fleming because of Affiliated Food Stores' uncertain financial situation. Affiliated, Thrift Mart's former supplier, filed for reorganization under Chapter 11 of the Federal Bankruptcy Act on Aug. 31.

"Our primary objective is to keep groceries on our shelves with as little disruption in customer service as possible," Williams said. "We felt it to be in the best interest of our customers to seek out other wholesalers who can fill our needs."

Thrift Mart has not been affected by Affiliated's financial situation, Williams said. Thrift Mart is an independent entity, and Affiliated did not own any of Thrift Mart's assets or stocks.

Fleming was established in Topeka, Kan., by O.A. Fleming and two associates in 1915. Ned Fleming, O.A.'s son, took over the company in 1921 and served as president until 1964, when he became chairman of the board.

By the end of the 1980's, Fleming was serving 5,000 grocery stores in 36 states,

Q. What is the educational background of the average dentist?  
A. The graduating dentist of today usually has had four years of pre-dental education, including basic anatomy, biology and chemistry, leading to a bachelor's degree. Prior to entering dental school, the aspiring dentist must pass a qualifying entrance exam to test mental abilities and physical dexterity. The first two years of dental school are spent learning the appropriate techniques for restoring the health of the teeth and gums, as well as basic human anatomy, physiology, and related subjects. The latter two years consist of work in the clinic with actual patients under the direct supervision of qualified instructors. Finally, the candidate is required to pass an examination to show his or her competence to practice in a particular state.

## NEWSSTAND PER-ISSUE PRICE TO GO TO 50¢ ON THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 1

FOR ONLY the second time in 30 years, the per-issue price of this newspaper will go up on Nov. 1st, in an effort to keep revenue in line with ever-increasing production costs.

THE per-issue price was raised from 15¢ to 25¢ in the mid-1960s, and will go to 50¢ per issue on Thursday, Nov. 1.

THE ANNUAL (and semi-annual) subscription by mail rate will remain unchanged, pending postal rate increases developments.

Increased costs including oil-related supplies, insurance, utilities and other increases has prompted this action. The newspapers have already been advised by suppliers that the price of ink (oil-based) will increase immediately, and delivery costs for newsprint will rise with each new delivery.

Preliminary indications are that postal rates will increase either

in January or February of next year. Therefore the local \$18.00 per year subscription cost is a decided advantage over the per-issue, newsstand costs. All subscribers receive their newspapers by mail. Subscription is \$34, cheaper annually than newsstand purchases. Local subscribers are valuable to the local newspaper and its advertisers, so that subscription figure will remain as low as possible for as long as possible.

The local newspaper may be mailed to service personnel overseas with APO number at the out-of-state subscription rate. Subscriptions make excellent gifts for those away in college, in the service and living away temporarily. Details may be secured at the local office.

## Texas Size Fruitcakes On Way To Troops

"They told her it couldn't be done. But come next week, one of Gladys Farek's Texas-size fruitcakes will be on its way to the troops in Saudi Arabia.

"Ms. Farek said seeing the 150-pound fruitcake loaded onto a transport plane Friday was the highlight of her 18-year baking career — even better than being on the Tonight Show last year with Johnny Carson.

"I just wanted to do it, from the bottom of my heart," she said. "And just let them know all of us are behind you."

"The 4- by 6-foot Texas shaped fruitcakes normally sell for \$998.

"When Ms. Farek, owner of Gladys' Cookies in the South Texas town of Cistern, decided to donate one of her creations, she didn't realize it would be so difficult to get it to the troops.

"After contacting congressmen, the post office, United Parcel Service, Bergstrom Air Force Base in Austin and a secretary in Ross Perot's office, she got nowhere. But that just made her more determined.

"Don't tell me I can't do something," she said. "I don't give up that easy."

"Next, she contacted newspapers. After reading of her plight in a local column, Steve

Harmon and Scott Evans of the KPLX-FM morning show took the cause to the airwaves, appealing to the public for ideas.

"Command Master Chief Mike Chalut of the Dallas Naval Air Station heard of the situation, and the air station came to the rescue.

"Master Chief Chalut said a 'Lone Star Express' transport squadron 'goes in that direction' fairly often, and the air station personnel found room for the cake on one of the flights.

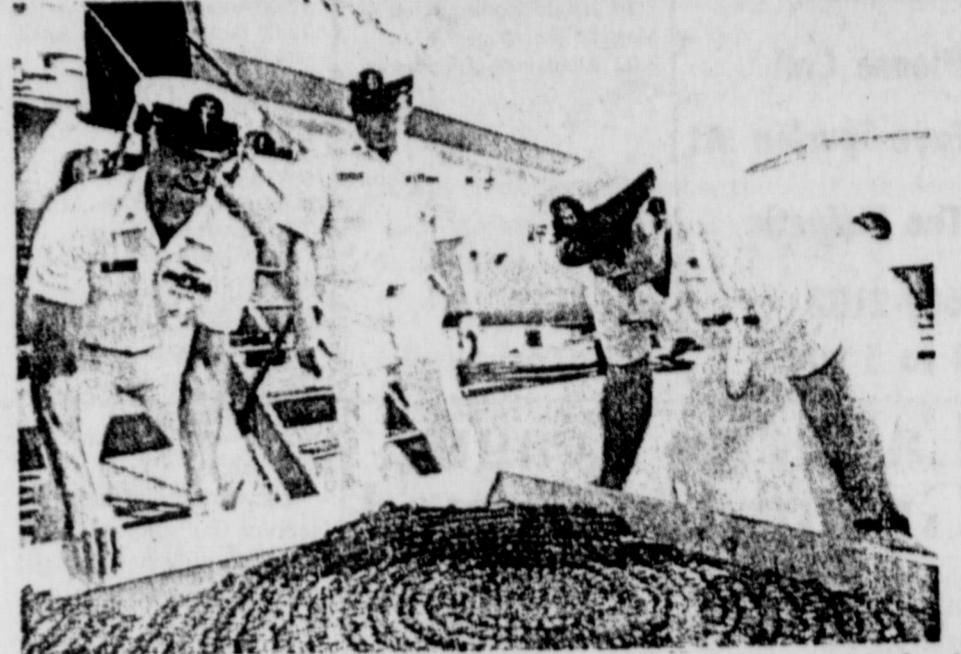
"It will definitely get to the troops at one of the bases in Saudi Arabia," he said.

"It will be good for the morale — a two-way thing. Good for them to hear from us and make us feel good here, like we're going something."

"Ms. Farek baked the cake, laden with pecans and studded with candied fruit, on Wednesday, her 56th birthday. She and four friends left Cistern at 2 a.m. Friday to drive it to Dallas.

"Her masterpiece can be cut into 5,000 slices.

"My wish is that I could get just one letter from one soldier boy saying he liked it," Ms. Farek said. "It would make it all worthwhile... like icing on the cake."

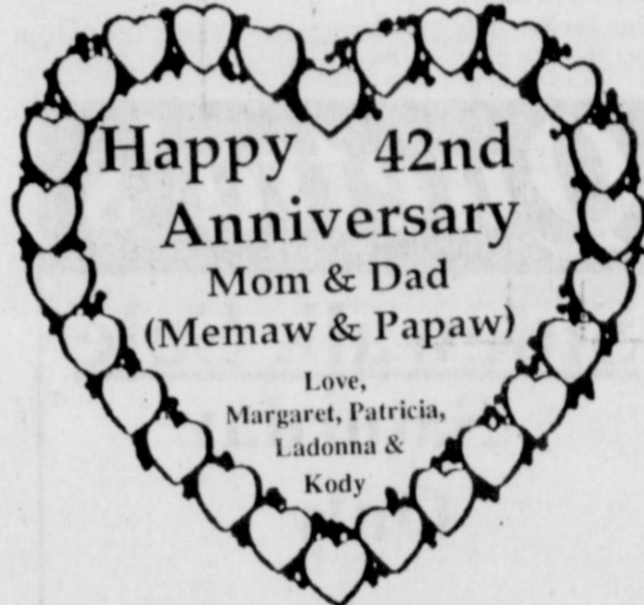

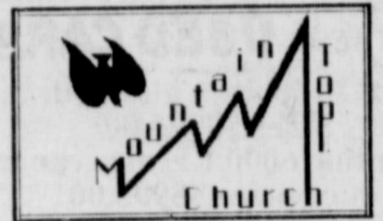

## Pharmacy Topics

By Bob Mueller

Even borderline elevations in blood pressure can permanently damage the heart and blood vessels and raise the risk of heart attack, a new study at the University of Michigan found. Researchers suggest more aggressive treatment for high blood pressure than is customary now.

Hormone replacement therapy begun at or near menopause can sharply reduce the risk of a broken hip in the next decade. Study at the University Hospital in Uppsala, Sweden, covered 23,000 women.

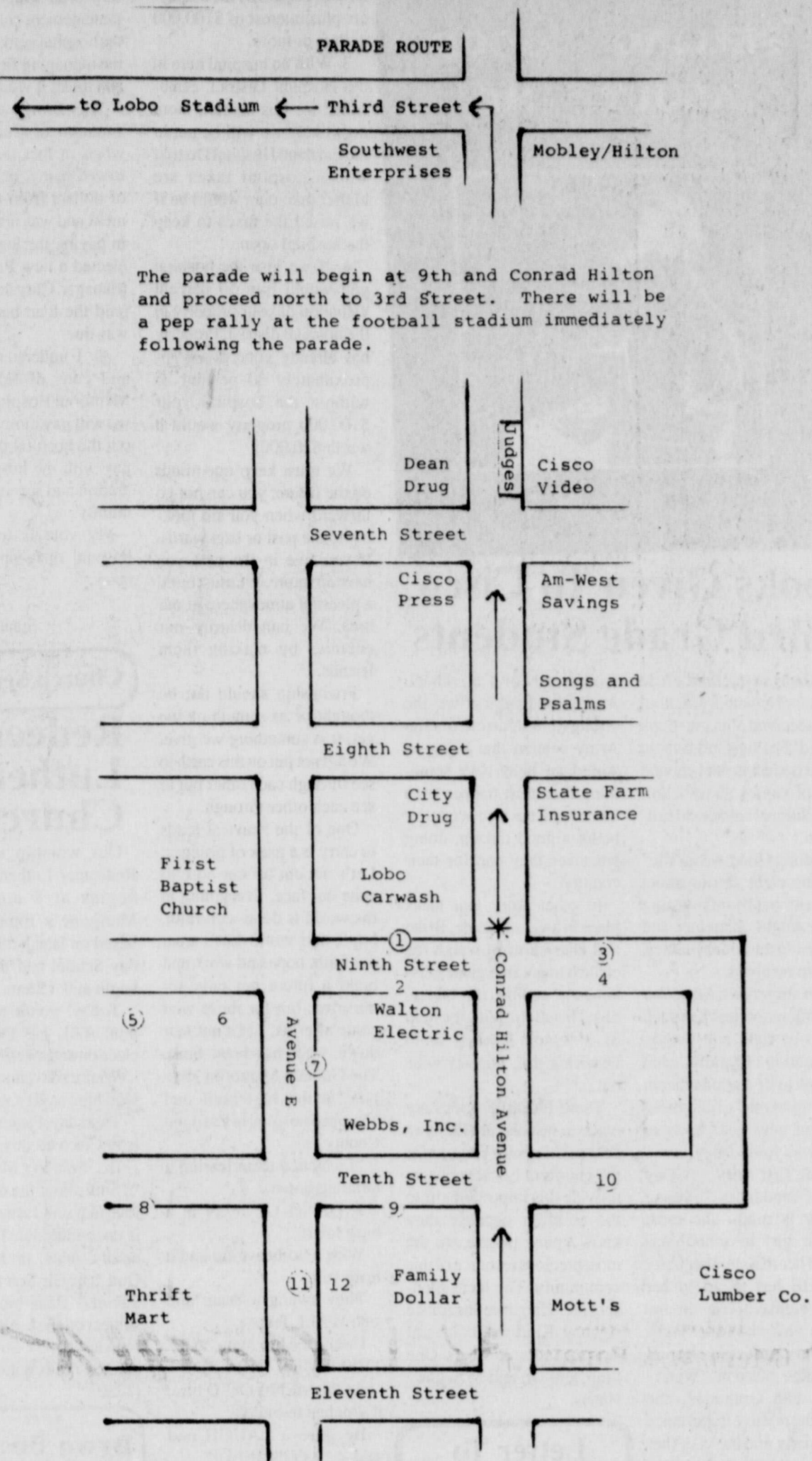
Researcher at the University of Texas in San Antonio is working on contact lenses containing melanin, the pigment that colors the skin and acts as a natural sunscreen. The treated lens would filter light and protect the cornea.

Retinoids, synthetic forms of vitamin A, are being tested as a treatment for skin cancer in studies sponsored by the National Cancer Institute. One advantage over surgery: the retinoids seem to heal without scars.

## Election 1990: New Era, New Politics

Even a glance at the November 6 General Election ballot shows that it is different, right down to some of the Eastland County offices.

All those boxes in the right-hand column for certified write-in candidates show that more choices than usual will be available.

Although the names of the write-in candidates are not printed on the ballot, they will be posted at each polling place.

Another unusual thing about this ballot is that it has only one proposed (State) Constitutional Amendment. This one seeks to clarify the authority of the Senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices.

On the national level Senator Phil Gramm (R incumbent) is expected to win by a wide margin over his Democratic and Libertarian opponents. But Gramm hasn't been taking his election for granted - he has campaigned extensively all year long.

In the U.S. House of Representatives Charles Stenholm (D incumbent) is unopposed, and expected to draw most of the votes in the 17th District. Bi-partisan support is apparent here.

Bi-partisan support is actually needed in many parts of Texas, for this domain is fast becoming a two-party state. The presence of twice-elected Governor Clements and the strong race of Republican candidate Clayton Williams show that the state can never be taken for granted by one party again.

The outcome of the race between Ann Richards (D) and Clayton Williams is attracting national attention, and some of it is unfavorable. In the latest issue of "Texas Monthly" the character and personality of each candidate is explored at length. This type of scrutiny is part of the price of being a public figure.

Another special feature of the Governor's race: this is the first time a woman has been a party nominee for Governor since the last term of Miriam A. Ferguson in 1933.

On another state race, the Rick Perry (R), Jim Hightower (D, incumbent) battle for Commissioner of Agriculture is attracting a lot of interest, in Eastland County and elsewhere. With the Farm Bureau officially behind Perry, the situation is up for grabs.

In Eastland County the Democratic Party has always furnished local candidates with few exceptions. This is the year of exceptions - among the long list of Democrats for County offices there is a Republican: Marie Rabel for District Clerk.

Mrs. Rabel, the wife of building contractor Gary Rabel, lives in the Nimrod community. She works in a Doctor's office in Eastland and also in her husband's office.

She says she is running for District Clerk because of her interest in good government, and because of her previous experience in County Government. Before moving to Eastland County nine years ago she worked in a County courthouse in Nevada, first in a hired and then an elective position. She also helped put in a computer system there.

In Election Precinct 8 (Cisco and surrounding area) voters will find a square and a blank space near the bottom of the right-hand corner. This is the place where voters may write in the name of Billy Bacon (incumbent), candidate for County Commissioner, Pct. 4.

Bacon has followed the procedure required by law,

## Cyclists Will Eat Lunch In Cisco Thursday During Trek

The American Lung Association's first Butterfield 500 bicycle trek will be Oct. 7-13.

Sponsored by Dallas Digital Corporation and Fujitsu, the 500-mile round-trip journey will begin in Denton and venture west on what was known as the Butterfield Line, the famous Overland Mail route that traveled from St. Louis through Texas to San Francisco during the mid 1800s. Overnight stops are scheduled for Jacksboro and Fort Griffin State Park near Albany before cruising

through Abilene to the halt way stop in historic Buffalo Gap. Following a day of rest and relaxation, cyclists will journey through Cisco to Breckenridge and Lake Mineral Wells before returning to Denton on Saturday, Oct. 13.

The cyclists will have lunch in Cisco on Thursday, Oct. 11. Their itinerary calls for the riders to take Highway 2945 (Old Abilene Highway) from Putnam into Cisco, eat lunch, and take Highway 6 toward Breckenridge. They are expected to arrive here at noon.

Bicyclists from as far away as Maine are expected to raise \$25,000 for the ALA-Dallas Area's Jeffrey Green Asthma Camp and the ALA of Texas' new asthma camp in Fort Worth.

Daily cycling distances will range from a high of 108 miles to a low of 65 miles, and most cyclists will spend an average of eight hours a day on the road. "It's possible for anybody to do this because the ride will be broken up throughout the day with rest stops every 10-15 miles," said trek coordinator Milton Fette. "There will also be a full-service mobile bike shop and a team of massage therapists traveling with us. We'll have sag wagons if they are fatigued. Plus, all their gear will be transported for them."

Dallas architect Jeffrey Green, an avid cyclist for whom Camp Sunshine was renamed, was struck and killed by a hit-and-run driver near Valparaiso, Ind., during the TransAmerica Trek last summer. The trek, which stretched 3,400 miles from Seattle to Atlantic City, consisted of 300 cyclists pedaling to raise \$2 million for the American Lung Association.

and is certified as a write-in candidate.

Billy Bacon says one of his reasons for running as a write-in candidate is because a lot of people have asked him to. Another consideration is that turnout in the party primaries in his Precinct was very low, with only about one-third of the approximately 2600 registered voters casting ballots. He would like to see a larger majority make the decision for Commissioner.

Bacon also says that he considers the office very important - one that requires special qualifications. An-

other thing - he says he has a number of road projects he wants to complete.

This write-in candidacy and others make a person wonder whether voters will break with tradition this year.

In Eastland County moving toward a system where independent candidates can step in and be elected without being party nominees? Or, judging by the race for District Clerk - is there a chance that Eastland County will become a two-party County?

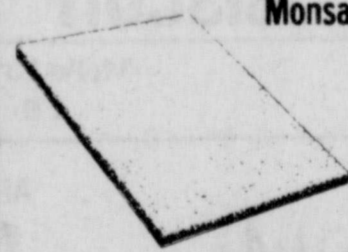

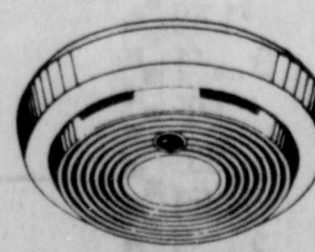
