Cisco schools will get out early Friday for the annual Homecoming Parade. Kindergarten through third grades will dismiss at 12:50 p.m.; fourth through sixth at 1 p.m.; and junior high and high school at 1:05 p.m. The parade will begin at 3 p.m.

With the cold, damp weather this week, people have been getting their heating units fired up. And this week has been declared "Fire Prevention Week" by Governor Bill Clements.

Following are Fire Prevention Guidelines as presented by the State Fire Marshal's Office:

Make sure that heating and cooking appliances are properly installed and used according to instruction.

Keep basements, closets, attics and garages cleared of combustibles, such as papers, cartons, old furniture, clothes or oil-soaked rags.

Furnaces, stoves and stove pipes should be kept well away from combustible walls and ceilings. Be sure that these appliances are installed and maintained by qualified service people.

Do not use gasoline or flammable liquids for cleaning in the home. Do not use them to start or freshen a fire for heating or cooking.

Store gasoline and other flammable liquids in closed containers away from heat, sparks and children, preferably away from the house. Never store flammable liquids in glass jars, old bleach bottles or other makeshift containers.

Keep paint stored in closed metal containers. Discard paint-laden brushes.

Provide proper ventilation for portable gas and oil heater and fireplaces.

Have your heating equipment checked yearly by a qualified service person.

Do not smoke in bed. Before going to bed each evening, check upholstered furniture to ensure that smoking materials are not lodged in the furniture.

Dispose of smoking materials safely. Store them outdoors in a metal container and immerse them with water to make sure that they are completely out.

Keep matches and lighters away from small children. Never leave your children at home alone — at night or during the day.

Always monitor your children's activities. Be aware of their activities to reduce the risk of an accidental or malicious fire.

Make sure that all electrical cords are safe. Electrical cords should not be placed under rugs, over hooks, or door opening or in other traffic paths. Do not puncture electrical cords with tacks, nails or other sharp objects.

Do not use cords that appear to be cracked, pinched, punctured, or otherwise damaged. Immediately disconnect and dispose of electrical cords that are worn or damaged.

Purchase a smoke detector. Install one or more at least outside the sleeping areas of your home. Check the detectors every week to make sure that they work properly.

Determine at least two ways of escape from each bedroom. Draw a floor plan to indicate the location of doors, windows, stairs and roof tops that can be used for escape. Plan to use the normal exit from the house or apartment as the primary escape route and a window or a second door between bedrooms as your alternate route. Consider installing escape ladders from windows.

Designate someone to call the fire department from a nearby public telephone or neighbor's house.

Senior Citizens Night At Mt. Top Church

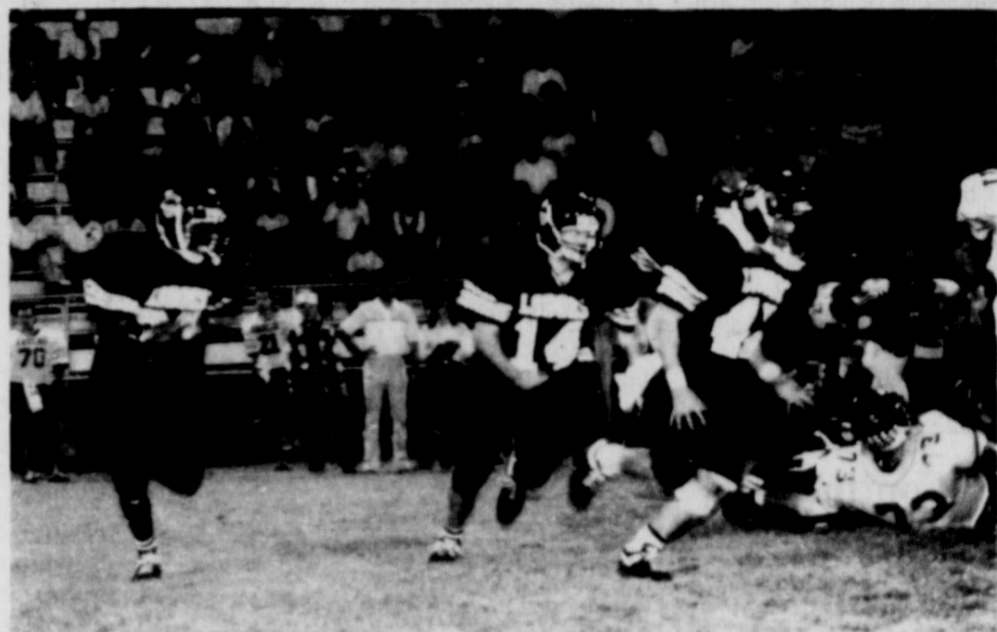

Cisco Lobos Will Meet Eastland Mavericks In Annual Homecoming Game Friday Night

The Cisco High School Lobos will meet the Eastland Mavericks in the annual homecoming football game at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Chesley Field.

The Lobos are coming off a 24-to-12 loss to the Goldthwaite Eagles. This was the first loss of the season for the Lobos and they are anxious to get back on the winning track against the Mavs.

Coach Clyde Evatt said the Lobos are ready for this "friendly rivalry" with the Mavs. The last time the Lo-

boes defeated the Mavericks was in 1983, and "We think it's time for Cisco to win again," Evatt said.

Eddie Garza, who suffered a knee injury in the Ranger game and missed the Goldthwaite game, has been told by his doctor that he will be ready to play Friday. Evatt said the Lobos will beat full strength for the Mavs.

During halftime activities, the Homecoming Queen will be crowned. Nominees are: Lela Beckett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Beckett;

Homecoming activities will begin at 8 p.m. Thursday with the bonfire on the parking lot of Chesley Field. Cisco High School students have

been building the bonfire for several days and they expect this to be one of the largest fires in several years.

The Lobo Junior Varsity and both junior high teams will travel to Eastland Thursday. The seventh grade game will begin at 5 p.m., followed by the eighth grade game. The JV is scheduled to play at 7:30 p.m.

Classes will be dismissed early Friday. Kindergarten through third grade will get out at 12:50 p.m.; fourth through sixth grades at 1 p.m.; and junior high and high school at 1:05 p.m. The annual Homecoming Parade will begin at 3 p.m. Theme for this year's parade is "Support The Lobos." Entries in the parade should be at their assigned locations (see map) at 2:15 p.m. for judging.

The parade has a new route this year. It will begin at 9th Street and Conrad Hilton Avenue, proceed north on Conrad Hilton to Third Street and then west to Chesley Field for the Homecoming Pep Rally.

The Student Council has asked all parade participant to please note: For safety reasons, rather than candy being thrown during the parade, we request that all candy be distributed at the pep rally.

Tickets for the All You Can Eat dinner are: 13 years and older, \$4 in advance and \$4.50 at the door; 12 years and younger, \$3 in advance, and \$3.50 at the door. All Lions Club members are selling tickets.

Parents of the CHS Junior Class will sponsor a Homecoming Dance at The Rollin Pen immediately following the football game. The dance, which will have music by Jason Phillips, disc jockey, will last until 1 a.m. Saturday. Admission will be \$3. Everyone is invited to attend the dance but the sponsors have asked that children under junior high age be accompanied by an adult. No alcoholic beverages will be allowed.

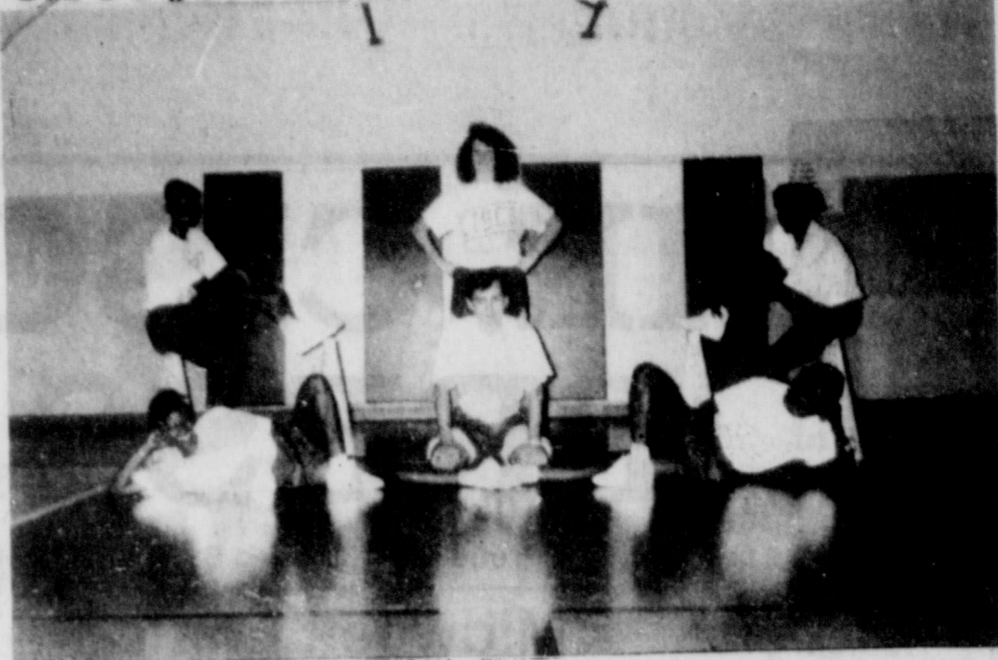


"The Star Spangled Banner," when it was first published, bore the title "The Defense of Fort McHenry."

Q. What is the educational background of the average dentist?
A. The graduating dentist of today usually has had four years of pre-dental education, including basic anatomy, biology and chemistry, leading to a bachelor's degree. Prior to entering dental school, the aspiring dentist must pass a qualifying entrance exam to test mental abilities and physical dexterity. The first two years of dental school are spent learning the appropriate techniques for restoring the health of the teeth and gums, as well as basic human anatomy, physiology, and related subjects. The latter two years consists of work in the clinic with actual patients under the direct supervision of qualified instructors. Finally, the candidate is required to pass an examination to show his or her competence to practice in a particular state.

How About a "Rip" Off?

If commercial hype can convince thousands of people they must have a Pet Rock, what could advertising do for Old Rip?

THE Old Rip is safely enshrined in his glass case in the Eastland County Court House, but there are more old Rips, young Rips, and fair-to-middlin' Rips ambling around the countryside.

A horned toad by any other name (Iguanidae, for instance) is still a horned toad and nothing you'd care to meet if it were the size of the Ninja Turtles.

You might not care to meet toads or turtles, but if you yearn for a pet that is different, your personal version of Old Rip certainly costs less than a pit bull and is considerably less likely to land you in Judge Wapner's court.

Young, or old, the species, Rip, is quiet. My past includes Rips from about an inch to possibly six inches in length, and never a sound out of any

Before I could get too cozy with Phrynosoma, the southwestern branch of the Iguanidae family, I had to convince myself that they do not spurt blood at you if they bother you. This was held to be fact by my peers and many grown-ups, and I wanted nothing to do with blood, for pitiesakes!

I believe horned toads are on the protected list but not on the endangered. If we had a business in Eastland to grow horned toads for sale, we ought to be by the animal rights people on either protected or endangered. I can't imagine making boots from horned toad hides. They might make good scrapers. They'd be hard

WCT State Planning Region Designated As Economic Development District

On October 19, 1990 L. Joyce Hampers, Assistant Secretary for Economic Development, U. S. Department of Commerce, formally designated the West Central Texas State Planning Region as a Economic Development District. This planning region comprises a 19-county area of West Central Texas and includes the following counties: Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox,

Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor, and Throckmorton.

This designation was made possible by the Economic Development Administration's approval of a regional Overall Economic Development Program. This program, prepared by the

West Central Texas Council of Governments and submitted behalf of the West Central Texas Economic Development District Corporation, culminated a lengthy process of study, county-wide meetings, and information gathering.

"We started this process over two year's ago" stated Council of Governments Executive Director Brad Helbert, "and several times I potential services that an Economic Development District could provide to our area

during rough economic times encourage us to keep working."

Bob Prock, President of the West Central Texas Economic Development District Corporation, praised the efforts of area elected officials and members of the District's Board of Directors in continue the process. "If it hadn't been for the encouragement and support from such diverse groups, we wouldn't be making this announcement today."

The newly created District

will provide technical assistance to economic development groups in it's 19-county service area as well as continue its regional economic development planning functions. In addition, the District has held several workshops throughout the region on such subjects as the 1/2 cent sales tax for economic development and the economic impact of new solid waste disposal legislation.

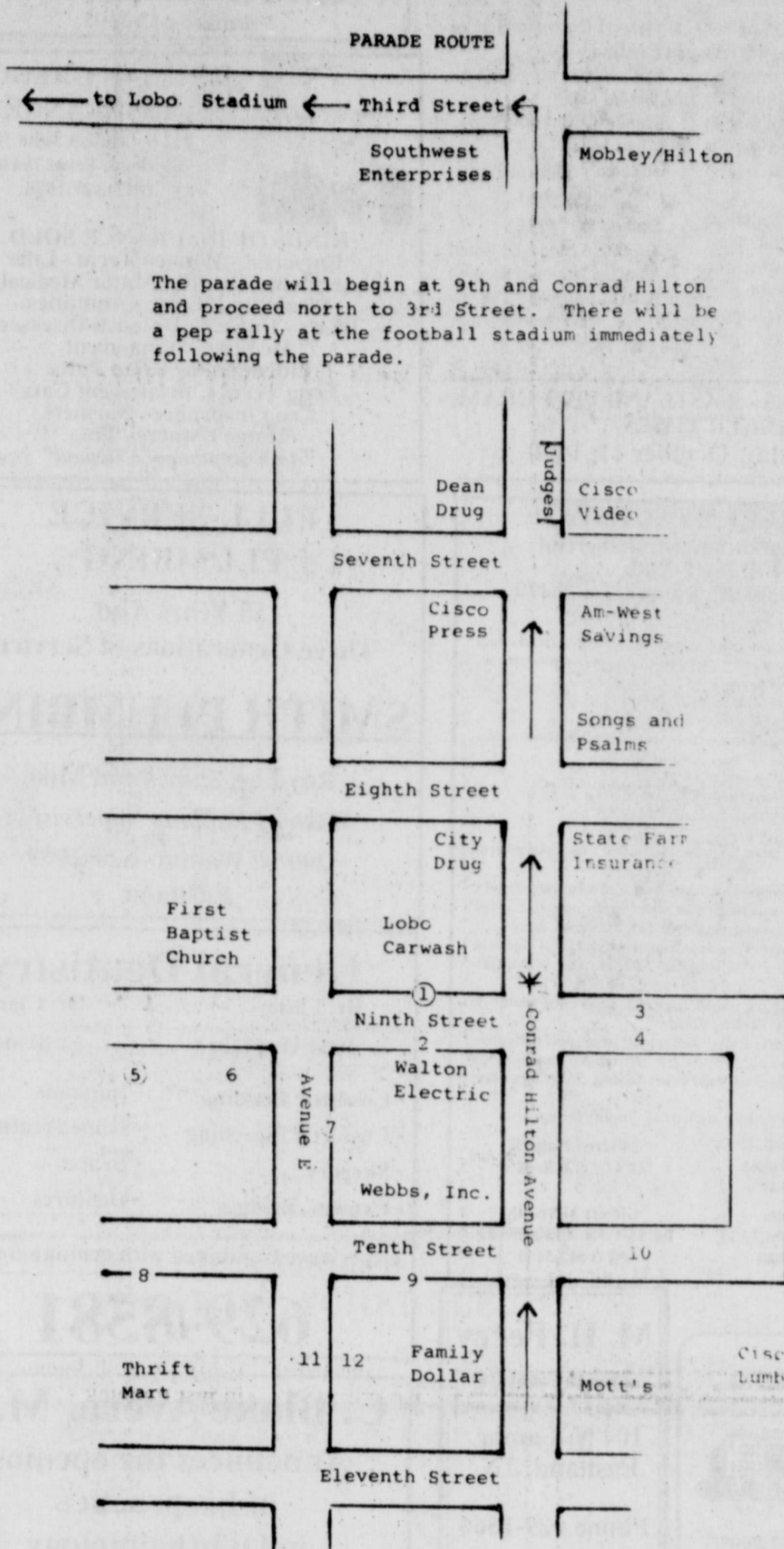

Texas Parents Slow To Use Loan Program

Texas parents have been slow to take advantage of a federal loan program designed to help them pay their child's postsecondary educational expenses, according to Joe McCormick, President of the Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Corporation.

The Parent Loans for Undergraduate Students (PLUS) loan program is one of three federal loan programs offered by the U. S. government to assist students and parents in paying for college or vocational school expenses. Unlike other federal financial aid, parents applying for these loans do not have to be certified as being financially needy.

"This program is available to all Texas parents, regardless of income," McCormick said. "Loan proceeds can be used to help pay your child's tuition, room and board, books and supplies and other related school expenses."

The current interest rate for the PLUS loan is 11.49%, set by the Department of Education. Other attractive features of the PLUS loans are a repayment period of up to ten

years and the ability to postpone payments during the time the child is in school. Also, a PLUS loan does not require collateral.

Parents may borrow up to \$4,000 per year for five years for each dependent child enrollment at least half-time.

Roughly 5% of the guaranteed student loans guaranteed by TGSGLC this year were in the PLUS program, McCormick said.

"We believe that there are more Texas parents that could benefit from this program," McCormick said. He added that parents can apply for PLUS loans at any time during the student enrollment — it does not have to be before school starts.

The Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Corporation (TGSGLC) is a nonprofit public corporation created by the Texas Legislature in 1979 to administer the federal guaranteed student loan program for the State of Texas. The loans are funded by participating private lenders and guaranteed by TGSGLC.

TGSGLC has guaranteed more than \$3 billion in loans

to Texas students and parents helping members of more than half a million families attain postsecondary education.

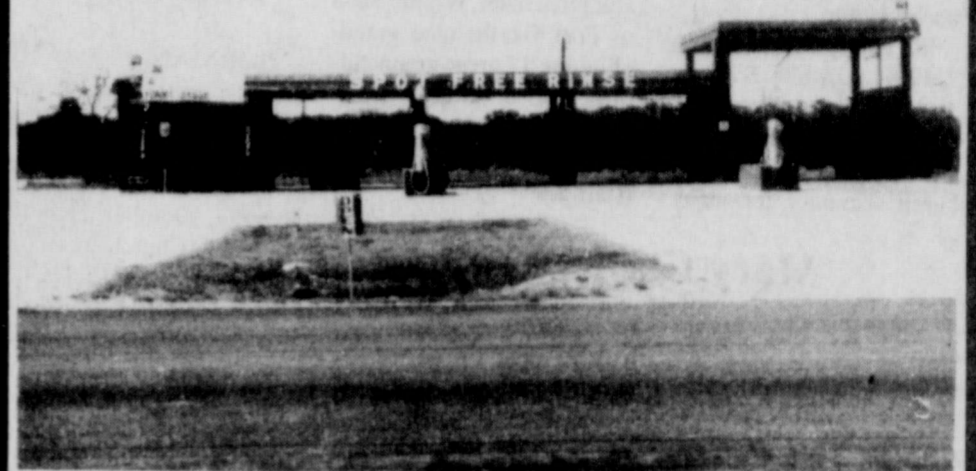

Who's 11¢ is it anyway?

The following is a transcript of a letter I received on Oct. 5th and my reply.

October 4, 1990

Dear Mr. Lacy:

Your letter in the Cisco paper prompts me to make a reply in regard to your attack on the board members of the Cisco Hospital District.

The people involved just taxed themselves a whole lot more than the 11¢ a day the tax records show your tax increase to be for the hospital. We serve without pay to try to provide the people of Cisco with local health services and each has contributed private donations to aid this in addition to the taxes.

With the tax increase, a viable working hospital can be attained. Without it we will still have many years of debt to pay off while supporting a hospital in another community, and in the meantime we have no hospital or doctor to serve the older folks here.

The cost to the taxpayers is the same, and the service and money all go to another town---we just harm Cisco and help the other towns. I think the public needs to know what is involved in your attack, that you wish to save yourself 11¢ a day and do not care what it costs the community. Please give me permission to put in the paper the tax amount of 11¢ a day.

Now, an open letter to the taxpayers.

I am a self-employed contractor. My schedule C profit last years was \$5176. That income is mine. That 11¢ a day comes out of my income, therefore it is my money also. It does not belong to Bill Philpott to do as he wants. Your money belongs to you, it does not belong to Bill Philpott either. We have the right to say we do not want them taking our money anytime they feel like it. The tax increase is not going to make the hospital viable. It will not make the hospital turn a profit, it will only make up the losses year after year. As the cost of medical care goes up each, so will our taxes to make up for bigger and bigger losses. The federal government will not bail us out as the deficit will cause them to cut medicare drastically, so there will be less money from the few "senior" patients who do use the hospital. The tax increase will not make any more people use the hospital. Having a hospital in Cisco is not going to get business to come to Cisco, if it would then why aren't we booming with new businesses now? We've had the hospital for almost 20 years. Am I against the hospital? Since I come here in 1979, I have gone to E.L. Graham hospital for medical treatment, and I have used Dr. Cermin as my doctor. Have the board members done as well when they were sick, or did they go out of town on occasions. I have been in a place where the people didn't have any medicine within 100 kilometers, much less a doctor or even the luxury of a hospital. Now, do any of your anywhere think that I am so conceited as to think I have to have a hospital four miles from my house rather than one fourteen miles away? People the world over die by the thousands everyday for lack of any medical care, and these people will have you think that I am condemning you to death because I say we can live with one good centrally located hospital in Eastland. Well, I do not think the people are that stupid as to believe that kind of politics. I do not think they will believe the fact either that the board could keep the hospital open month after month, and then close it down just 3 months before 20 years was up so they could tell us how great a sum of money we have to pay back immediately. Don't tell me they couldn't have kept it open the last three months to satisfy the terms of the grant. It sure looks like politics to me, but you make up your own minds about it. We also will not be saddled with years of debt. The second set of bonds are for 20 years, but they can be paid off at any time. They are for about \$480,000. If we use half of each year's taxes to pay on the bonds, we can pay them off in four or five years. I say we make the hospital reopen for long enough to satisfy the terms of the grant, then shut it down until the bonds are paid off. Then we can consider in what form it might reopen, if at all. Will closing the hospital force us to pay Eastlands hospital taxes. No, we will still be a hospital district and they can't force us into their taxing district. I personally feel that it is to our advantage to save our tax money to use to take care of our families, not to let it be taken from us to pour down an ever deeper hole. Bill Philpott wants to let you know that for only 11¢ a day I could care less what happens to you. That is a tired old political pile of trash. I care enough to stick my neck out to fight for your taxes, which is to say, your money. That money represents time your spent to earn it. So I am fighting for a little of your life. Is that the way a person doesn't care about his friends? Its time to let them know that they can't have their own way anymore. Tell them loud and clear, "That is our 11¢ a day, keep your hands off. No more taxes!"

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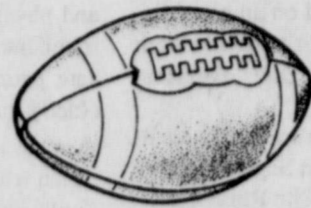

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"Death Of Rural Hospitals"

(Editor's Note: The following article is reprinted from the October, 1990, edition of THE AMERICAN LEGION, a publication for members of that organization. It was entitled "Death of Rural Hospitals" and was written by Ruth Winter.)

(Part One of Two Parts)
It was a cool, crisp morning in Shattuck, Okla. The sun was bright and the farmers already were on their tractors preparing the land for seeding. Misty Pratt, 27, heavy with her third pregnancy, woke up and noticed a small amount of blood on her clothing. She dressed and went to visit her mother nearby. At her mother's house, Misty began hemorrhaging and her husband was summoned. He put her in his pickup truck and rushed her to the local hospital. Misty had suffered abruptio placentae. The plate-shaped organ that was nourishing her baby had torn away from her uterus — a dire emergency. The baby's heartbeat had grown faint by the time Misty arrived at the 50-bed Newman Memorial. The physician on duty immediately delivered the baby, a 5-pound, 4-ounce boy.

"If Misty had had to go to the next hospital 40 miles away, both she and the baby would have died," Dr. Ken Evans said. A family physician, Evans has practiced in Shattuck, a community of 1,500 people, for the past 10 years.
Just a week after Misty Pratt's medical emergency, a 45-year-old Shattuck resident was in Newman's emergency room describing some mild chest pains when he suddenly collapsed and went into cardiac arrest.
"If the patient had to be driven anywhere else, he would have been dead, too," Evans said.
But Newman Memorial, like hundreds of other rural hospitals, is in trouble. It has

been losing money for the past five years and has reduced the number of beds from 115 to 50. Since 1980 more than 160 rural hospitals have closed, and as many as 600 face the prospect of closing in the next few years.

"We need our rural hospitals," Evans emphasized. "The health of people who grow our food and nourish the nation should not be put in jeopardy because they live in rural areas. They don't ask for handouts. They just want to be treated on an equal basis. If we don't provide them with health care, everyone will pay."

Why are rural hospitals in trouble? Tim Size, executive director of The Rural Coalition of Hospitals in Wisconsin, explained:

"There is a belief that all people without medical insurance are in the inner city. The actual number is at least as great or greater in rural areas because rural residents often work in low-wage jobs that do not offer medical insurance coverage."

According to The National Rural Health Association, 24 percent of those without any kind of health insurance live in rural areas. Indeed, Misty Pratt, whose life was saved by being near Newman Memorial, has no insurance. She said she is paying off her bill at \$10 per month.

"Hospitals that are just breaking even may take a big loss if just one patient doesn't pay," Size said. "The hospitals don't have very good collections because they have a special relationship with their patients."

Another major factor in the financial difficulties of rural hospitals is the difference between what Medicare pays for services in rural hospitals compared to urban hospitals.

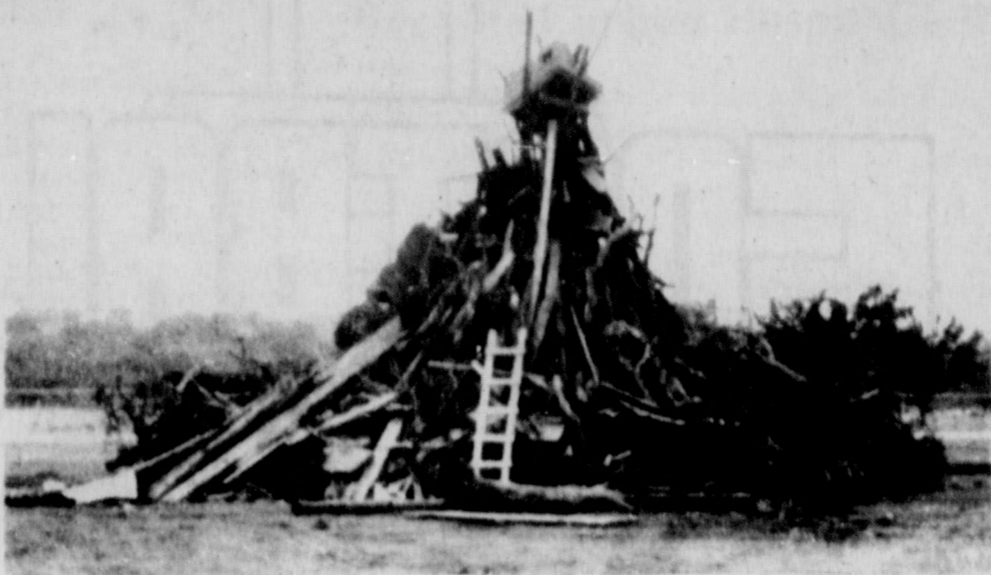
Statistics gathered by the Senate's Special Committee on Aging and The National Rural Health Association

reveal why rural hospitals are being killed. The elderly comprise 12 percent of the total population in the United States, but they account of 25.4 percent of the population in rural communities. Yet, Medicare pays from 35 percent to 40 percent less for a service in a rural hospital than it does for the same service in an urban hospital. The cost of living may be lower in rural areas, but the cost of medical supplies is exactly the same. Thus, rural hospital and physicians are not fully reimbursed for treating Medicare patients, and the more elderly they treat, the greater the debt increases. One physician who grew up in a rural South Dakota town and returned to establish a practice explained in *The American Medical Association News* why he finally gave up his rural practice and moved to a city. His overhead per Medicare patient was \$27 for a routine office visit, but Medicare reimbursed him only \$9.98.

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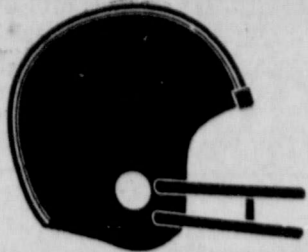

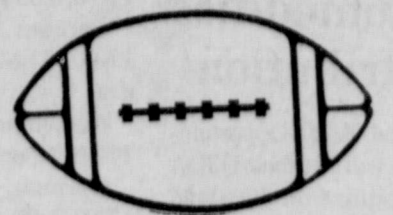

Mavericks Beat Surprising Bangs

After losing to Goldthwaite the week before, the Eastland High Mavericks were rather flat as they started an 8AA district game with an 0-5 Bangs Dragon football team Friday in Bangs. But some previously injured Dragons had returned to the Bangs team, which was fired up for their Homecoming by a standing room only crowd on the home side.

Bangs showed the speed that had the Dragons highly rated at the first of the season, but they were also plagued by turnovers and mistakes similar to what Eastland had suffered the week before against Goldthwaite. And though sometimes not as intense, the Mavs made several big plays which they had to have for the 15 to 12 win.

With Rojelio Bonilla and Franklin Skinner running the ball, the Mavericks picked up two first downs before having to punt. Bangs picked up a first running, a first on a penalty, and a first on a long pass before Tim Montgomery made an interception for Eastland. The first quarter score was 0-0.

Eastland ran but had to punt. Bangs ran for two firsts before running 19 yards to score. The kick missed.

Brent Sanderson ran for two firsts and passed to Kyle Sargent for a third. Danny Nelson ran for two firsts, then Sanderson passed to Bill Hughes for 6 yards and a touchdown. Jeff Morren kicked the point to give Eastland a 1 point lead.

A strong Maverick defensive effort held Bangs deep in their end of the field, and Skinner tackled the Bang's ballcarrier for a safety.

After taking the kick, Eastland tried passing. A pass to Hughes gained a first, then Eastland punted. Bangs ran, then passed long for two firsts as the half ran out. Eastland had a 9 to 6 lead.

Bangs drove down the field making four firsts running. But Mav Kris Brown recovered a fumble to stop Bang's drive.

Bonilla made a long run for a first, then Eastland punted. Bangs ran and passed for three firsts, then after the quarter change they ran 4 yards to score their last touchdown. A pass for extra points failed.

The kick was returned to midfield by Bonilla, then he and Skinner and Sanderson took turns running for four firsts. A one yard plunge by Sanderson put Eastland back ahead on the scoreboard. A pass for extra points failed.

Bangs ran and passed, for three firsts, threatening to score again. But Eastland's defense poured through with Sargent sacking the quarterback. Nelson then intercepted for Eastland and the Mavs ran out the clock.

Eastland will play at Cisco 7:30 p.m. Friday. It is both a game between neighboring rivals, both with 1 loss and 1 win in district, and Cisco's Homecoming game. A large crowd can be expected.

Loboes Come Up Short Against Goldthwaite

Cisco's hopes for an upset against the Goldthwaite Eagles fell one turnover, one penalty and one fumble recovery short last Friday night. Despite being outdone in almost every statistical category, the Loboes proved that a tangle with them is no dance. Cisco fought and scratched throughout the entire contest hoping to retain their hold on the District 8-2A lead, but a fumble in the third quarter was probably the key factor in the Loboes first loss of the 1990 season.

The Loboes won the opening toss and received the kick-off. On the first play from scrimmage, the exchange from center Daniell Summers to QB Brad Goosen was mishandled and Goldthwaite recovered at the Lobo 17. After gaining a first down at the Cisco 6, the Eagles were shut down by the Lobo defense and turned the ball over on downs at the Cisco 15-yard line.

On the next play from scrimmage, Darryl Morrison found good blocking on the right side and sprinted 85 yards for the first score with 9:18 left in the first quarter. A pass for the two point conversion failed and the score was 6-0-0.

The Loboes covered an on-side kick but couldn't manage a first down and had to punt to the Eagles. After a strong defense stand by Cisco, Goldthwaite punted to the Loboes who took the ball at their own 41. Three plays by the Loboes failed to pick up a first down and once again Cisco was forced to punt. Goldthwaite then drove 60 yards in five plays and scored on a one yard plunge to tie the score. The PAT was no good and the score was 6-6 with 11:58 remaining in the first half.

The only offensive drive either team could manage came late in the second quar-

ter when Goldthwaite drove to the Cisco 9 where Terrence Fletcher picked off a pass at the 4-yard line to kill the Eagle drive. Cisco then ran the clock and took a 6-to-6 tie into the locker room.

After coming out and marching 47 yards for their second touchdown and a 12-to-6 lead, the Eagle defense strung a Lobo option play out and forced a fumble that proved to be one of three thorns in the Loboes side. The Eagles recovered at the Lobo 15 and proceeded to score to take an 18-to-6 lead over Cisco.

The Loboes were not through though, as they were determined to try to pull out the upset. Hoot Beckett intercepted a third Eagle pass at the Lobo 46 and gave the Loboes another chance to score. The Loboes took the ball and after two big runs from Terrence Fletcher and a key fourth down fake punt run by Brad Goosen, the Loboes had a first down at the Goldthwaite 13-yard line. Darryl Morrison took the hand-off from Goosen and twisted and spun his way for his, and the Loboes, second TD of the game with 7:22 left in the game. The PAT try by Shepard was blocked to make the score 18-10-12.

Goldthwaite took the ensuing kickoff and faced a third and five near mid-field when Hoot Beckett hit the Eagle receiver causing a fumble at the Cisco 45 where Ryan Duncan had apparently recovered the fumble. But the ball bounced off Duncan's arm and went out-of-bounds, thus the second thorn. Cisco had one last chance to stop the Eagles on a fourth and three at the Lobo 37, but an off-sides call against the Loboes gave Goldthwaite a first down at the Lobo 32 and thorn number three pierced the Loboes bubble. The Eagles final touchdown came just 4

plays later on a 12 yard half-back pass to make the final score 24-10-12.

Cisco is now 4-1 and 1-1 in District 8-2A and tied for second with Eastland. DeLeon, Goldthwaite and San Saba are all tied for first at 2-0, and Bangs, Coleman and Ranger are in the 8-2A cellar at 0-2. The week Cisco will square off with the Eastland Mavericks in the annual Eastland County grudge match. The series between Cisco and Eastland dates back to 1920 and Cisco has a 40-23-3 record against the Mavs and three years there were no games played. The Mavericks, however, have won 10 of the last 15 games with Cisco's last win coming in 1983 to the tune of 28-to-7. Add to the rivalry the fact that it is the Loboes homecoming and you have the makings for a great game. Eastland will no doubt be shooting to kill Cisco's playoff hopes and run the Loboes' homecoming.

At this time I would like to applaud all the fans who showed their undying devotion to the Loboes during their games against Goldthwaite and present them with the 12th MAN AWARD.

Erikson depicts the life cycle with the search for identity in the adolescent years. As adolescents they make their own personal choices, not being so dependent upon parents for all decisions made concerning them. Separation and individuation starts to occur in the adolescent years.
Identity must be resolved before the next phase of intimacy versus isolation is addressed.

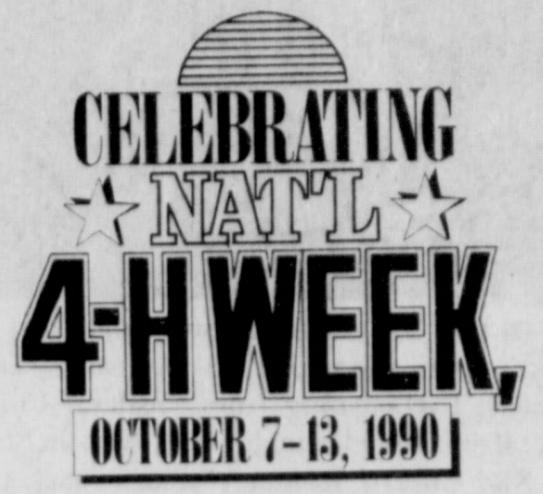

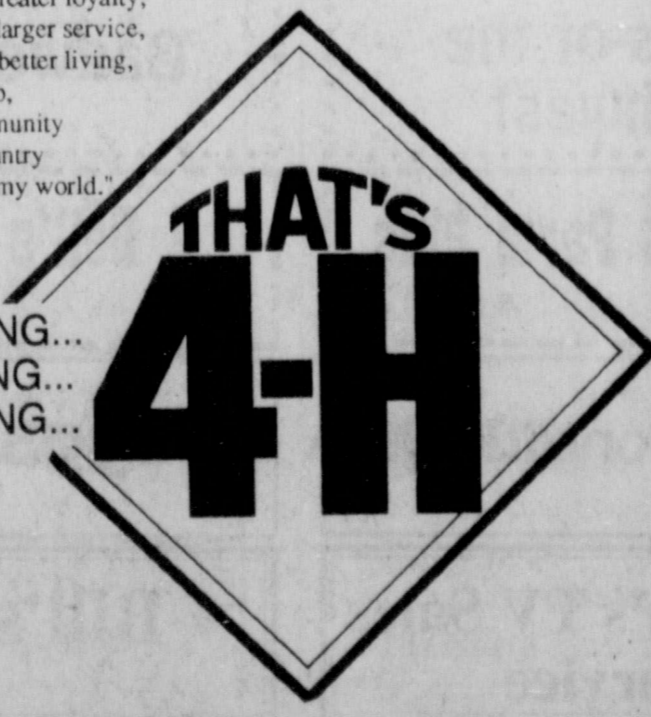

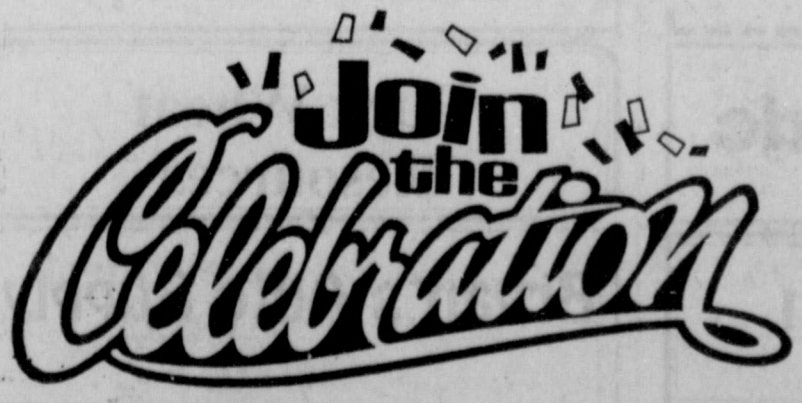

- * Learn to practice leadership skills, and fulfill leadership roles.

* Establish positive attitudes toward productive use of leisure time.

* Develop an active plan for attaining personal goals.

Any youth can become a member of 4-H when he or she reaches nine years of age or has entered the third grade. A youth's last year in 4-H shall be the calendar year in which his or her 19th birthday occurs.

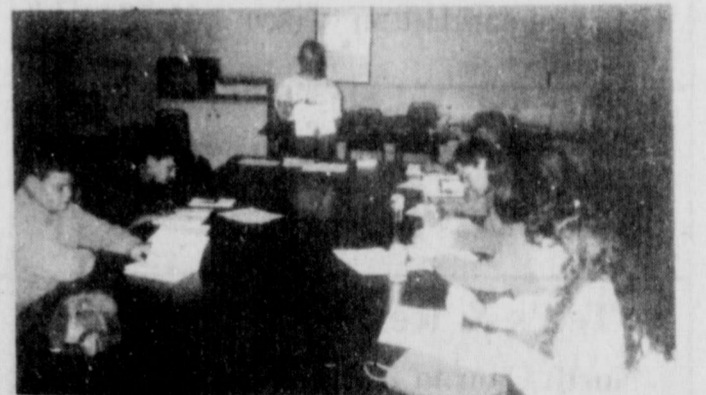

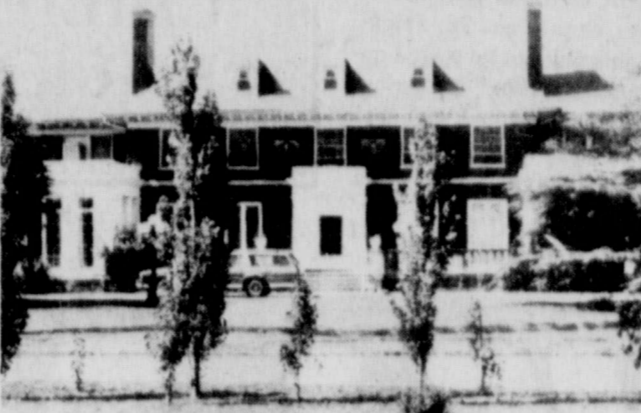
The Texas Opry, 319 York Ave., Weathford, is presenting a very special show Saturday, October 13, at 7:30 p.m.

The house has seven fireplaces, a built-in ice box that held 100 pounds of ice which was delivered daily, and one of the first intercom systems which was used to summon the servants. Originally the house had two coal furnaces. The slate roof and the bathroom fixtures are original. The house is one room deep for cooling purposes with north and south exposures in each room and was the site of lavish entertainment for Strawn residents as Lelah Watson was known for her hospitality and culinary talents.

Gov. Clements Proclaims Fire Prevention Week

Fire Prevention Week was first declared in 1922 by President Warren Harding in memory of the so-called "Great Chicago Fire" of October 9, 1971. That conflagration killed 250 people and destroyed 17,530 buildings valued at the time at \$168 million. Recognizing the limitations of even the best fire suppression capabilities, the public and the fire service began thinking in terms of fire prevention as a result of the Chicago fire.

Citing the loss of 300 lives and more than \$1 billion in property to fires during 1989, Gov. Williams P. Clements Jr. has proclaimed the week of Oct. 7-13 as Fire Prevention Week.

"Fire continues to be a major threat to all Texans, particularly the very young and the very old," said James E. Saxton Jr., chairman of the State Board of Insurance.

During 1989, fires in Texas killed 292 people, injured more than 2,200 and destroyed and estimated \$1.125 billion in property, according to reports submitted by Texas fire department to the State Fire Marshal's Office, State Board of Insurance. The largest

incident included in these statistics was the Phillips 66 Houston chemical manufacturing fire, which caused 23 deaths and property damage estimated at \$750 million. Thirty-two injuries were reported; however, total injuries were estimated at more than 100.

Saxton noted the 20,000 residential fires that caused almost 200 deaths and 1,800 injuries merit the attention of all citizens.

"Much of this tragic loss could have been prevented," Saxton said. "We have the knowledge and technology today to prevent much of the needless loss of lives and property in this state. We urge every Texan to practice fire prevention every day to help conserve our valuable Texas resources."

State Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson added that fire

prevention efforts in the home can be increased by three simple actions. "First, we know that making sure each home has an adequate number of working smoke detectors and that practicing escape procedures in the home can greatly improve your chances of surviving or avoiding a fire," he said.

"Second," Emerson added, "always watching the stove or range while cooking could help avoid cooking fires, the leading type of residential fire. And third, exercising great care while smoking and using heating equipment could reduce the number of fatal fires, especially those in which more than one person dies."

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Pharmacy Topics

Breast-cancer detection: When a mammogram shows a suspicious lump, X-ray-guided fine needle aspiration can often produce a testable sample without the need for a surgical biopsy. Researchers at the University of Chicago are studying the procedure.

Weight loss alone may "cure" some patients with liver malfunction, doctors found at Mount Sinai Medical Center in New York.

Dermatologists at University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine have pinpointed the natural substance, triggered by stress, that causes skin flare-ups of acne and other conditions. Relaxation techniques are advised by the dermatologists.

Kidney researchers at the University of Illinois have found that misoprostol, an ulcer drug, enhances the performance of drugs used to keep transplant patients from rejecting their new kidneys.

Bonding a filling into the tooth seems to leave the tooth stronger and less likely to crack under hard chewing, say professors at the University of California/San Francisco School of Dentistry.
