## Petition For Rollback Election Presented To Cisco Hospital District Board Of Directors

A petition calling for the rollback of a property tax rate of 50 cents per \$100 was presented to the board of directors of the Cisco Hospital District Thursday night at the regular board meeting.

A total of 815 signatures of registered voters in the hospi-

tal district are contained on the 56-page petition, which was presented to the board by Emmett Rich, one of the petition sponsors. He is a former board member who was defeated in last spring's election.

Bob Conner, president of

the board, accepted the petition and said the signatures will be checked for verification within 20 days.

If enough signatures are valid the board will call an election within 90 days after verification, as required by the Texas Election Code.

Ten percent of the registered voters is required in order to call a rollback election.

On Oct. 18, 1989, a rollback petition with more than 700 names was presented to the hospital board. This followed the board raising the tax rate from 12.7 cents to 28 cents. In January, the election to roll back the tax rate to 14.1 cents was successful by 23 votes.

Bill Philpott, board vice president, said the board thinks residents are more receptive to paying a tax rate sufficient enough to keep E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital open. The hospital closed in August.

In an attempt to reopen the hospital, the board set a property tax rate of 50 cents per \$100 valuation on Oct. 1 following a public hearing in September. The rate is 255 percent higher than the 1990 tax rate of 14.1 cents per \$100 valuation.

In other action at the meeting Thursday, H.K. Neeley, Cisco oil producer, was elected by the board to replace Kitty McCracken, who resigned for health reasons.

Board member Dan Dixon was elected board secretary, a position vacated by Mrs. McCracken.

brate this special day in the life of our church."

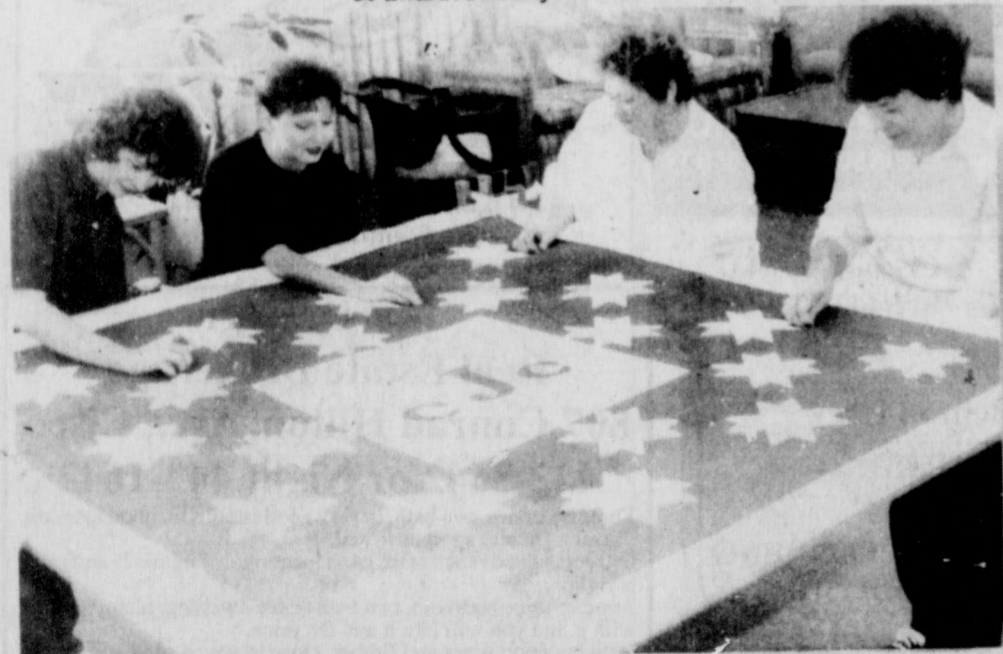

## ORDINANCE NO. 0-90-9

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF ARTICLES I, II, III AND IV OF CHAPTER 6, "BUILDING AND BUILDING REGULATIONS" OF THE CITY'S CODE OF ORDINANCES; DECLARING SAME NULL AND VOID; ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City of Cisco has no employee able or qualified to function as a building inspector capable of adequately enforcing current building codes, and existing budget constraints preclude hiring such an individual in the near future; and

WHEREAS, current economic conditions in and around Cisco have substantially stagnated new construction; and

WHEREAS, while the City will be adopting a new and revised Plumbing and Gas

Code immediately, if said economic conditions improve sufficiently so as to promote development and new construction in the future, new building regulations may be enacted; now, therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS THAT:

Section 1: That Article I. "In General", Article II. "Electricity", Article III. "Plumbing", and Article IV. "Gas" of Chapter 6 "Buildings and Building Regulations" of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Cisco are hereby repealed and declared null and void and of no effect.

Section 2. That this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its approval and passage.

Section 3. That because of the need to repeal existing building and plumbing codes to allow for the adoption of a new and revised plumbing code, the City Council declares an emergency and that

the provision of the Charter of the City of Cisco calling for two readings of an ordinance be dispensed with, and that this ordinance take effect as an emergency measure.

## ORDINANCE NO. 0-90-10

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS AMENDING CHAPTER 6 "BUILDINGS AND BUILDING REGULATIONS" OF THE CITY'S CODE OF ORDINANCES BY ADOPTING A REVISED PLUMBING AND GAS CODE; ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

Section 1. That Chapter 6 "Building and Building Regulations" of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Cisco be amended by the adoption of a new revised Plumbing and Gas Code, as provided by the Texas State Board of Plumbing Examiners, with the following omissions, additions, amendments, and revisions:

(a) Chapter 5: Licensing Requirements shall be revised to read as follows: Plumbing License Required for Natural Gas Plumbing and Sewer Tap Installation Only: All persons who engage in or work at the actual installation, alternation, repair and renovation of natural gas plumbing and installation of sewer main taps shall possess either a master or journeyman plumber's license or an apprentice registration card in accordance with the provisions of the Plumbing License Law of 1947 and all appropriate revisions or updates.

(b) Section 6.1.1 Home Owner shall be revised as follows: Natural gas plumbing work only done by a property owner in a building owned and occupied by the property owner as his home.

(c) Chapter 8: Plumbing Appeals and Advisory Board shall be omitted in its entirety.

(d) Section 9.1.5 Persons Who May Obtain a Permit shall be advised to read as follows: Permits shall be issued only to the following:

(1) Any Master Plumber licensed by the State Board of Plumbing Examiners for natural gas plumbing work, and installation of sewer main taps.

(2) Any property owner for plumbing work to be done by him, or his representative, in a building owned or occupied by the property owner; except for natural gas plumbing work in non-owner occupied buildings and all sewer main taps, which work must be done by a licensed Master Plumber.

(3) Any appliance dealer or employee of an appliance dealer who is acting as an appliance installation man or appliance service man in connected appliances to existing piping installations.

(e) Section 9.2.2 Table of Fees shall be revised as follows:

Plumbing Inspections For issuing each permit—\$15.00

In addition: For each plumbing fixture, trap, drain, or set of fixtures (including water and draining piping)—\$3.00

For house outside sewer line (if not included with inside fixtures)—\$10.00

For house outside water line (if not included with inside fixtures)—\$10.00

For sewer tap (to main)—\$25.00

For each water heater and/or vent—\$5.00

For installation of water piping for water treating equipment—\$25.00

Lawn sprinkler system inspection with 19 or less sprinkler heads—\$15.00

Lawn sprinkler system inspection with 20 or more sprinkler heads—\$25.00

For water or sewer mains—\$25.00

## Gas Inspections

When all materials, including the mercury gauge, and labor necessary for tests are furnished by plumber or property owner, the first two (2) inspections—\$15.00

For each additional reinspection—\$10.00

When City supplies all materials and labor, for first two (2) inspections—\$35.00

For each additional reinspection—\$20.00

(f) Chapter 10 Bonding Provisions shall be amended to read as follows: Bond Required: Before any person, firm or corporation shall engage in the business of natural gas plumbing in the City, he, it or they shall first obtain the proper license, and deposit with the City a good and sufficient bond in the

some of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars, conditioned that the person, firm or corporation engaged in the plumbing business will faithfully observe all the laws pertaining to plumbing; further, that the City shall be indemnified and saved harmless from all claims arising from accidents and damage of any character whatsoever caused by the negligence of such person, firm or corporation engaged in the plumbing business, or by any other unfaithful inadequate work done either by themselves or their agents or employees.

(g) Section 11.3 Prohibited Fittings and Connections shall be revised by the addition of 11.3.4 Underground: Inaccessible water distribution piping under slabs shall be only copper water tube minimum type L, brass or polybutylene (PB) plastic pipe or tubing, all to be installed with approved bends, but no fittings shall be allowed. Any material subject to corrosion shall be protected when used in corrosive soils.

(h) Chapter 25: Individual Water Supplies shall be omitted in its entirety.

Section 2. That this Plumbing Code, as revised, shall become effective immediately upon its approval and passage.

Section 3. That because a plumbing and gas code is essential to the safety and health well-being of the City's residents and water customers, the City Council declares an emergency and that the provision of the Charter of the City of Cisco calling for two readings of an ordinance be dispensed with, and that this ordinance take effect as an emergency measure.

### After Extraction Tips

Q. What should I do after an extraction?  
A. The main point to remember following an extraction is to allow time for the blood clot to form in the empty socket. This process must happen in order for the area to heal. There are certain precautions you can take to avoid disturbing the clot once it's formed. Don't do anything to create a suction in your mouth, such as smoking, rinsing, or drinking through a straw. Also, cut down on your activity for about 24 hours, and avoid hot liquids and alcoholic beverages. Stick with soft foods for the first day or so. Continue to brush and floss your teeth, but remember not to rinse your mouth vigorously. Most extraction sites heal quickly and with no complications. CERS 104

## Book Review On Tchaikovsky Enjoyed

How do musicians sometimes feel when they are traveling to foreign countries to perform? Some insight was provided on this Oct. 17, when Donna DeLuca gave a review to the Eastland Music Club of the opening chapters of the book "Tchaikovsky In America." Frances Bishop was program leader.

account, the great Russian composer and conductor was on his way to America where he was scheduled to conduct some of his music at the opening of Carnegie Hall in New York City on May 5, 1891. He recorded his thoughts and feelings in a diary each day, and this journal has only recently been translated from the Russian language.

In his diary - interposed

with newspaper accounts of Tsachikovsky's public appearances - the composer tells of his journey across Europe to catch a ship for America. He is homesick for Russia, lonely - and finding it hard to communicate in foreign languages.

He is also saddened by the end of a strange romance in which he and a Russian woman named Madam Von Meck corresponded for 14 years. During this time they never met, due to the insistence of Madame Von Meck. Now she has refused to communicate with him further, shutting off the exchange of thoughts and feelings.

As if that isn't enough to drive a sensitive musician out of his mind - Tchaikovsky is now past 50 years old, and considers himself ancient. Add to that a hurricane in the North Atlantic, and it's plain that the gifted man was not at his best when he reached New York City!

Donna DeLuca broke off here with the story, but the review will be continued by Frances Bishop on Nov. 7. So there'll be more information about what happened to the Russian visitor to America.

Mrs. DeLuca also told of the varied compositions of Tchaikovsky, which include works for ballet, piano concertos, operas, choral music and violin solos. Tchaikovsky's music was widely acclaimed in America in the 1880's-90's, and remained popular until the 1950's. With the improving

of Russian-American relations a new interest in this type of international music has surfaced.

Mrs. DeLuca demonstrated one of Tchaikovsky's songs, the popular "Tonight We Love," found in the First Movement of a Piano Concerto. She was accompanied by Carolyn Bolt on the piano. The number was melodic, with Donna DeLuca's interpretation appealing.

At the conclusion of the program Club President Virginia Russell brought items of interest to the group. She noted the death last week of Leonard Bernstein, American composer and conductor.

Bayoud, the state's chief elections officer, said the hotline 1-800-252-VOTE (8683) is available from 7:30 a.m. until 7 p.m. through Friday, Oct. 26; 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 27; noon until 6 p.m. on Sunday, Oct. 28; and from 7:30 a.m. until 8 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 29 through Friday, Nov. 2.

"Voter participation is among the highest priorities of my administration," Bayoud said. "To encourage full participation, integrity of the electoral process of the electoral process must be absolute. That can only occur when voters have total confidence in the fairness and openness of our voting system."

To that end, Bayoud encouraged Texas voters to use the election hotline if they

have any questions or concerns about the election or the voting process.

During the "extended" absentee voting period, which runs through Friday, Nov. 2, registered voters can appear at county courthouses and other absentee polling places

Using a pastry blender or two knives, cut in margarine until mixture resembles cornmeal. Stir in pecans. Sprinkle mixture over pie. Bake at 425 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes.

were no guards, no gate houses, and no signs. We simply drove past a wide place in the road where all the buildings had stood.

We chose to go by this route into the former East Germany because of our having been there before and because the route would take us through an area of small villages and rural settings. Our travels in West Germany have been in similar settings and we wanted to be able to make objective comparisons to the life as we saw it.

After leaving Tann in what was West Germany, the village of Metzlar was the first village we came to on our route. It was here that we could see there would be quite a contrast in the two areas. As we drove around the streets of Metzlar, several obvious differences became apparent. We had become accustomed to seeing German villages as busy places with shops and traffic. Here there was practically no traffic and only one shop and it was closed.

The neatness and cleanliness we had come to expect in German villages was missing. The flower boxes in the windows of well maintained houses were not to be seen. The streets were rough and in need of repair. A generally dismal front was displayed by the whole town.

As we continued east toward the interior of the area we could see the result of neglect on the roads. The roads were rough, still of cobble stones in many areas, narrow with no shoulders, and poorly marked.

The roadsides were grown up in weeds and lacked guardrails in hazardous spots. Descending a rather high hill by a series of switch backs on

a cobble stone road became an adventure.

Dermbach was the next village of significant size on our route. Here we saw the same general front as in Metzlar. The lack of pride in maintenance of both the private housing and the barracks-like public housing was evident. Again we did not see the profusion of flowers in gardens and window boxes we associate with Germany.

It was in Dermbach that we saw the first budding of capitalism. An obviously new appliance store, a used car lot offering western cars, and a clothing store just opening were examples. Still, the lack of traffic and the absence of people on the street surprised us. The traditional German gathaus was nowhere to be seen.

From Dermbach we traveled across the rural, mainly dairy, country toward Meiningen which is a fairly large city. It appeared that the dairy country we were crossing was a little more prosperous than some of the areas we had left. The small villages were neater, cleaner, and lighter than those in the other farming areas we had crossed. Still, evidence of neglect was visible, such as one rather large field of hay which had been cut then left to rot.

We approached Meiningen from a road above the city where we could get a good view of some of the problems the former West Germans are so concerned about. Meiningen is a manufacturing city with serious environment and pollution problems.

Low grade coal is the principal fuel used in the city and the resulting smog and haze over the city was thick with the odor of burning coal and strong enough to burn the eyes.

As we drove around we were struck with the dull,

grimy state of the buildings as a result of the pollution.

In Meiningen we were surprised by the lack of shops and of stores offering consumer goods. We had assumed that since this is a major city, it would be different from the small villages. We did not see a restaurant or gasthaus in any of the parts of the city where we drove. Used car lots were the thing I found most surprising. We saw several, most offering older western models.

A city the size of Meiningen in the west is a nightmare to drive in, especially if you are used to small towns in West Texas. In Meiningen we found the traffic, both vehicular and pedestrian, extremely light. Michael could drive us around without my getting white knuckled which was a change from riding with him in Frankfurt.

We left Meiningen and traveled on of the major roads back to the west. At the former border we saw evidence of the seriousness of the attempt to prevent crossing of the border at a major cross-

ing. First, there was a check point with a guard house, electrified fence, and barriers; then about a mile of no-mans land; then the main fence. All of these facilities are now abandoned and traffic is unrestricted along the road.

It is almost inconceivable to me that in the span of less than one year we have seen the changes that have come about. Last November East and West Germany were two separate nations with widely divergent philosophies - one communist and one democratic - with travel between the two countries strictly controlled. On November 19, 1989, the barriers came down and travel became possible. Then on October 3, 1990, the two nations were reunified into one - Germany - for the first time in 45 years.

The problems facing the reunified Germany are staggering. The economic impact will be tremendous. I do not pretend to understand all the implications but I can see there will have to be tremendous effort exerted just to bring the

roads, public facilities, and environmental concerns in the east up to the standards of the west.

I wish them well.

## Newtons Visit Daughter In Germany

My wife Maxine and I have been fortunate to have had the opportunity to visit our daughter and family in Germany again during one of the most historic time in this half century.

We left Eastland on Oct. 3 and arrived in Bad Vilbel on the morning of Oct. 4 at the home of our daughter and family, Michael and Mary Haley and Leah.

This trip began on the day of the re-unification of the two Germanys, so we were there on the second full day of

the new nation. This trip follows a similar trip last winter when we visited in Germany just three weeks after the fall of the Berlin Wall and the opening of the boundaries between East and West.

I have been able to view at first hand the differences between the two sections of the new nation that existed for 45 years side by side; one section dominated by the Communist Philosophy and the other under the democratic capitalistic system. There could be no greater testimonial to the advantages of our way of life than those differences.

On Monday, October 8, five days after Germany again became a single entity in the world of nations, we drove into what was East Germany. We left Frankfurt early in the morning and drove north to Fulda. We turned east and crossed the old border at the same place where we stood last December watching traffic at the border check point going both ways past the border guards of three nations who were checking papers of those crossing. This time there

We could have an RV park (Ringling Lake? Eastland Lake?) to lure "snowbirds" for regular stops and vacationers for visits.

We could...we could...we

could...do so many things if we adopt Old Rip-ping as a community effort with individuals to concentrate on developing the fall-out ideas. I believe I have a "commercially feasible" project in mind for pecans and peanuts. Enough...for now.

(ED. NOTE: These are the kind of free-wheeling ideas that help make things happen. We'd welcome yours. Julia's mention of singers makes one wonder about a hit Old Rip song, maybe from our songwriters and done by a Nashville star. And what about cashing in on Old Rip being a miniature, real live dinosaur, which are so popular worldwide nowadays?)

**Texas Oil Production Rate At 100 Percent For November**

The Railroad Commission has continued the Texas oil production rate for November 1990 at 100 percent of market demand.

Chairman Kent Hance and Commissioners John Sharp and James E. (Jim) Nugent continued the top production allowable after reviewing oil companies' nominations to buy a total of 1,846,439 barrels of Texas oil per day. The November nomination total, an increase of 39,140 barrels daily when compared to October purchaser nominations, estimates Texas oil production in the coming month. November 1989 nominations totaled 1,879,427 barrels daily.

The Commission first went to the ceiling level for oil production in April 1972. It applies to all fields in the state except those that are assigned lower legal rates of production so that reservoir pressures will not be depleted before the maximum amount of oil has been recovered.

Chairman Hance also reported that November nominations for the purchase of Texas gas totaled 20,957,643

Mcf/d (thousand cubic feet per day). October nominations totaled 20,288,903 Mcf/d. November 1989 nominations amounted to 21,089,638 Mcf/d.

The statewide oil and gas production allowable hearing will begin at 10:00 a.m., on Tuesday, November 20, 1990, at the Railroad Commission in the William B. Travis Building, 1701 N. Congress Ave. in Austin.

Major purchasers filed these November nominations from the floor at the hearing: Amoco Production Company, 147,000 barrels, down 1,000; Conoco Inc., 62,000 barrels, up 1,000; Exxon Co., U.S.A., 143,500 barrels, unchanged; Mobil Oil Corp., 118,200 barrels, unchanged; and Texaco Trading and Transp. Inc., 122,950 barrels, up 1,800.

Chairman Hance reported that crude oil and petroleum products imported into the U.S. averaged 8,878,000 barrels per day for the month of August 1990. This was an increase of 350,000 barrels per day from the same period a year ago.

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# Gilbreath Gives Views

Not too many candidates for State Office have visited Eastland County this fall. One who did come by was Wes Gilbreath, who said that he was attempting to contact voters in all parts of the State.

Wes Gilbreath is listed on the Republican ticket for the Office of State Land Com-

missioner. He will face incumbent Gary Mauro, the Democratic nominee, in the Nov. 6 General Election. At the Eastland Telegram office he remarked that people sometimes act like they think the office of Land Commissioner is not important. He said he had two main

things that he wanted to get across to the public - that the Office of Land Commissioner is one of the most important in state government, and that absolute honesty is necessary to hold this office.

"Being Land Commissioner is really a big responsibility," he said. "You administer 22 million acres of state-owned land, with a value of approx. 10 billion dollars. This provides the state with

its second-largest source of revenue." He went on to discuss that the Land Commissioner manages that State mineral interests for the Permanent School Fund, and that the Commissioner serves on a number of important State Boards.

These include Chairman of the School Land Board, Chairman of the Texas Veteran's Land Board, and a seat on the five-member Redistricting Board.

Gilbreath says he has a special interest in trying to secure good land for veterans since he grew up on a ranch near Gatesville and understands the land.

Born in Coryell County in 1929, he attended local schools and Clifton Lutheran College.

After serving in the Korean War, Gilbreath moved to Houston and went into construction. He set up his first business by borrowing \$1500 from his wife, Pat.

Later Gilbreath invested in real estate, gas and oil - and now heads an investment firm.

A few years ago Gilbreath did a lot of restoration work on historic buildings in Gatesville. He also worked on improving a tract of ranch land, building water retention dams and the like.

He lists protecting the environment and improving education as major concerns, and these fall within the scope of the Land Commissioner's duties.

As he finished his visit in Eastland, Gilbreath said, "I'll see to it that our State Land Commissioner's Office is operated honestly and efficiently, without political conflicts of interest. I will also work hard to generate revenue for school children."



## HOMESTEAD TAX INSTALLMENT PAYMENTS ARE PERMISSIBLE FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

An Eastland County citizen has requested that we print the following excerpt from State Law, in advising persons that installment payments are permissible for taxes on homesteads, if certain guidelines are followed.

(Text of Section 31.031 effective September 1, 1990.)

**Sec. 31.031. Installment Payments of Certain Homestead Taxes.** (a) If before the delinquency date an individual who is at least 65 years of age owns at least one-fourth of a taxing unit's taxes imposed on property that the person owns and occupies as a residence homestead, the person may pay the remaining taxes without penalty or interest in three equal installments. The first installment must be paid before April 1, the second installment before June 1, and the third installment before August 1.

(b) If the individual fails to make a payment before the applicable date provided by Subsection (a), the unpaid amount is delinquent and incurs a penalty of 12 percent and interest as provided by Section 33.01(c).

(c) An individual may pay more than the amount due for each installment and the amount in excess of the amount due shall be credited to the next installment. An individual may not pay less than the total amount due for each installment unless the collector provides for the acceptance of partial payments under this section. If the collector accepts a partial payment, penalties and interest are incurred only by the amount of each installment that remains unpaid on the applicable date provided by Subsection (a).

(d) If the delinquency date for taxes to which this section applies is postponed to May 1 or a later date, the collector shall extend each installment deadline provided by Subsection (a) by the number of months that the delinquency date was postponed.

The Social Security Trust Funds, which support monthly Social Security benefit payments, continue to experience financial good health, according to the most recent report of the Board of Trustees, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said today.

The Old-Age and Survivors Insurance and Disability Insurance Trust Funds are expected to continue growing for many years into the future. The trust fund balance will peak in about 2014 and then begin to decline gradually as "baby boomers" reach retirement age, Hammons said.

In its report on the Medicare Trust Funds, the Board expressed concern about the rapid rise in medical expenditures. Program costs for medical insurance have nearly doubled in the past 5 years, it said.

The Board urged Congress to work to bring future costs and expenses of the Medicare program into balance.

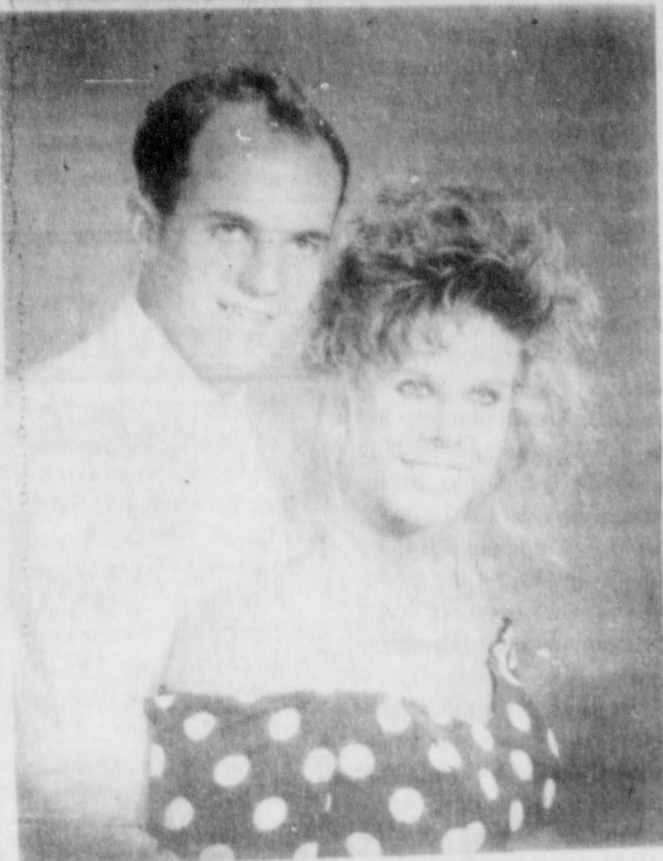
