50 Years Of Education At CJC

By: WESLEY VALEK This year, as Cisco Junior College celebrates its 50th Anniversary as an institution of higher education, we glance back at the road we have traveled.

Cisco's low population did not qualify the city for a junior college under the Texas Junior College law. Special legislation, Bill 955, was introduced in 1939 and was passed unanimously by both houses of the Texas State Legislature. Cisco Junior College was created not as an independent entity but as an adjunct of Cisco Independent School District.

Property from the defunct Randolph College was purchased, renovated and the new College opened its doors on September 10, 1940. Mr. R.N. Cluck served as both Superintendent of the Cisco Independent School District and President of Cisco Junior College. The original governing board members of Cisco Junior College were W.J.

Armstrong, L.A. Warren, F.E. Shephard, Ms. P.R. Warwick, Ms. Fannie Kimmell, Mrs. N.A. Brown and J.C. McAfee. The course offerings of the old College were surprisingly similar to today's junior college core curriculum. Enrollment in 1940 was

Faced with critical manpower shortages in the early years, the War Department introduced a novel training program: women mechanics. President Cluck was instrumental in bringing one of the training programs to Cisco Junior College. The program, named Women's Ordinance Workers (W.O.W.), began operations in January, 1943. Cisco PD Narcotics Dog Poisoned

(The following is a statement made by Douglas Fairbanks, Chief, Cisco Police Department.)

On Saturday, October 13, 1990, a request was made to the Cisco Police Department for the use of our narcotics detection dog. The request was made by the Brown County Sheriff's office and the West Central Texas Interlocal Crime Task Force.

Around noon, one of our officers and "Snake," the drug dog, were sent, and after the search was finished, the dog was placed back into the police vehicle. It was during this time that some unknown subject poisoned the dog with strychnine. Later, once the type of poison was deter-

Thus far, the only determination that can be made is that while the dog was in the police vehicle someone administered the poison to the dog while police officers were inside the building. We still have an on-going investigation to determine who poisoned the dog.

The City of Cisco had had the dog for one year. During this time the dog had detected narcotics 24 times. The Police Department has assisted other agencies 23 times.

In 1974, the Board of Regents selected Dr. Norman Wallace as president. The Clyde Extension of Cisco Junior College was reorganized on a more permanent basis and the variety of technical-vocational programs were increased, especially in Abilene. Girl's basketball was re-introduced in 1979 and the gymnasium was remodeled in 1980. After the last of the Britton Training School buildings burned, a new Faculty Office Building was erected in the same year.

Dr. Henry McCullough assumed the presidency in 1984. During his tenure, improvements were made to the existing facilities and a new Language Arts Complex was added. In 1988, the B.B. Owens Estate gave the College 360 acres of land. One half of the land has been cleared and a College Agriculture Demonstration farm is being developed. A new facility at Clyde was leased to take care of that rapidly growing expansion. Upon Dr. McCullough's retirement, the reins of Cisco Junior College Classes were taught at Clyde were passed to Dr. Roger C. Schustereit in 1988.

Please allow us to pose two questions to Cisco people: 1) Are you a caregiver for an elderly parent or relative? 2) Or are you one of the

many elderly residents of Cisco who has no one here to care for you and no means of transportation? In either case you live daily

with the nagging fear of a life-threatening situation when time and availability of care means the difference between life and death - And there IS NO EMERGENCY ROOM - NO HOSPITAL IN CISCO.

A number of Cisco resident have faced just such a crisis during the month of October. Cisco Emergency Medical Service has been called upon to transport 24 patients to or from out-oftown hospitals.

Not only do such crises multiply the stress and anxiety of patient and caregiver, but the financial aspect compounds the problem. The \$2.00 per mile over the base charge for an ambulance mounts up, and in most cases exceeds your hospital tax. Add to that the cost of lodging and meals of the caregiver while attending a relative in an out-of-town facility plus the transportation costs, and one faces a significant expense. Moreover, the hospital costs and other outgo are lost to Cisco. And all that hurts patient, caregiver, YOU!

Who will be the next Cisco resident to face such a dilemma? If you support the hospital,

then there can be no test fair to

what if?" What if students did not have the stress of passing the TASP test? Or making a decision about four years of college? What if students could choose a profession, learn it by experience, and still get an adequate education?

But peer pressure, parental pressure and society in general expect every kid to get a college education and be a "professional" such as a doctor, lawyer, or computer whiz. It is a presumed fact that students pursuing higher education should achieve that goal easier in America better than anywhere else in the world,

however this isn't being real-

ized. Not every student has the aptitude or desire to spend four years in college. America will always need farmers, ranchers, butchers, cooks, barbers, roughnecks, etc. We have young people who would love to excel at these trades. Apprenticeship is a viable alternative to standard higher education.

Let's explore a successful system already in existence. West Germany is a perfect example of young people getting an education and simultaneously learning a trade

They've had the apprentice system since before World War II. It is truly an intelli-

gent and workable plan, similar to our vocational programs, carried several steps further. West German high school students may choose a trade or study for higher academics. If learning a trade is their choice, they must go to that business or profession and secure a position as an apprentice.

Apprenticeship is the first of three levels with Journeyman and Master following. The apprentice system is government supported. Students work at their chosen trade a given number of hours and also spend mandatory hours in school getting a basic education. This includes at least one foreign language.

Students graduating from high school also have professional credentials which qualify them to acquire employment immediately. So the student who chooses to be a nurse or machinist has a trade when he graduates. He also has the option to seek higher education, but his learned trade by apprenticeship will provide a means of livelihood while he pursues higher education.

The country and local communities in particular benefit from this program. For instance, every profession has qualified employees who love their work. Unemployment is at a minimum. German workers are skilled to enough to be employed world wide with the trade learned through apprenticeship combined with quality education.

The United States has the

profession and who have the opportunity to pursue it are happy, productive, and well balanced. They do not worry about placement tests.

Sixth, would you really want to be treated by a doctor who was guaranteed a salary no matter what? Would you really want to try out his bedside manners, his compassion, his professionalism?

Lastly, most of us who oppose these taxes could not care less about this antagonims between Cisco and Eastland. Whether a business opens in one town or the other only matters to ya'll who hope to collect taxes off it. We are Americans first, we fought and sacrificed for her, we farm her lands, we raise her livestock, we work in her businesses or we build new ones.

We have expected, and now we demand, that our money be put to intelligent use. If it's not, then we demand you leave it alone.

If it's important to you that you keep one almighty dollar from going to Eastland, then let it be your dollar. Keep your hands off mine. If you want this area to grow, you had better learn how to work together as Americans.

Hearing To Determine 16-Year-Old Adult

by Richard Kurklin Efforts are being made to hold a 16-year-old Olden area boy in connection with the robbery and death of Howard Gerald Poe, according to Sheriff Dee Hogan. A detention hearing was to have been held in the 91st District Court Tuesday.

An abandoned vehicle report last Thursday and a missing person turned up a murder case for the Eastland County Sheriff's Department.

Bullet holes and blood in the abandoned Jeep Cherokee alerted Chief Deputy David Franklin. Sheriff Dee Hogan requested that Texas Ranger Gene Kea assist with the investigation and that the D.P.S. Crime Scene Team be sent from Austin to gather evidence.

With four D.P.S. specialists carefully collecting evidence from the Jeep Friday, it was established that a human had been killed in it.

Leads developed, implicating a 16-year-old boy. The boy, attending school in Eastland, was arrested by Sheriff Hogan and Ranger Kea. The boy and his relatives cooperation with officers.

His court appointed attorney reportedly advised him to not make any statements. But he was allowed to lead officers to a secluded spot in the brush just south of Hwy 570 about four miles cast of Eastland. There officers found the body of the missing person, 58-year-old Howard Gerald Poe, lying on the ground by a well used but secluded parking spot.

Since the boy is a juvenile, he was accompanied by Probation Officer Randy Logan, and officers were not allowed to question him. He was later taken to juvenile detention facilities in Abilene.
