

Record Sixth Appearance In Macy's Parade

CJC Band And Belles Leave For New York City Tuesday

The Cisco Junior College Wrangler Band and Belles will perform in Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City Thursday for their sixth appearance, the most any band has appeared in the annual parade. They are scheduled to appear in the final hour of the parade, according to word received here.

A large group will accompany the college delegation to New York City for the four days and three nights trip.

"It is no small honor to be invited to New York's famous Macy's Parade. In fact only about 15 bands and one or two drill teams from the entire USA receive invitations to the prestigious parade each year. The CJC Band and Belles have already made a quite extraordinary five appearances beginning back in 1971," said Eris Ritchie of Southwest Enterprises, who planned the trip and will conduct the tour personally. "We feel extremely honored in being selected yet once more to represent the state of Texas in the nationally televised parade production Thursday.'

The itinerary calls for the group to meet at CJC at 4 a.m. Tuesday and depart Cisco at 4:30 for D/FW Airport. American Airlines Flight 82 will depart for New York City at 8:17 a.m. and arrive at New York LaGuardia Airport at 12:30 p.m.

After arriving at Southgate Tower Hotel, the tour group will have free time until 5 p.m. when they will go on a walking tour to Times Square and the theatre district.

At 7:30 p.m. Thursday the group may attend the broad show "Gypsy" or enjoy other activities "on their own." All Band and Belle members may attend the Broadway Show, go ice skating at Rockefeller Center, go to a movie in the Rockefeller Center area, or remain in the skating rink area at Rockefeller Center.

At 10 p.m. all groups will return to the hotel, walking unless the weather is inclement. If it is, they will take the subway.

On Wednesday, the group will leave the hotel at 9 a.m. for a Gray Line Sight-Seeing Tour which will include Chinatown, Lower Manhattan, the Bowery, ferry ride to the Statue of Liberty and an hour's tour of the Statue, the financial district and Ellis Island. 

Baby Blues

Q.Is it true a mother experiences more cavities, or even loses a tooth, with each new baby? A. No. It is also not tue that the baby obsorbs calcium from the mother's



For men with a non-cancerous enlarged prostate, a new procedure uses a surgical balloon to relieve urinary obstruction. Doctors reporting the method in the Lancet, the British medical journal, have not yet determined how long the improvement will last.

Heart patients who take beta blockers should not go off medication -- even for a while -- without a doctor's approval. Stopping the drug abruptly temporarily quadruples heart attack risk, the Journal of the American Medical Association reported.

All pregnant women should be screened for gestational diabetes between the 24th and 28th week, according to a report in Obstetrics and Gynecology. Currently, only older women with specific risk factors are tested.

Obesity is strongly tied to heredity, a study of identical twins found. Studies reported in the New England Journal of Medicine noted that twins ended up the same weight, whether they grew up together or apart, and that some people do get fat even when they eat less.



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

definitely. The amendments allow for the deduction of impairmentrelated work expenses in figuring continuing eligibility and payment amount, e.g., the cost of a wheelchair or special typewriter. In addition,

The amendments provided for SSI recipients are permitted to set aside income and resources for up to 48 months in a plan to achieve self-support (PASS). The PASS may be used for attending school, starting a business, or getting a permanent job.

The Disability Advisory Council recommended in its 1988 report that the work incentives be promoted as an integral part of the program rather than as technical provisions. The Council felt that the disability program should emphasize ability, rather than disability.

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

Frances Bishop Gives Review From 'Tchaikovsky in America'

Bishop from the book "Tchaikovsky In America" and piano music from Music Club President Virginia W. Russell were highlights of the Eastland Music Study Club meeting Nov. 7.

> The mood of this piece drew the audience into Frances Bishop's book review. "I recommend that you read

this book for yourself," Mrs. Bishop said. "The author is a genius - he has assembled Tchaikovsky's Diary, newspaper clippings and letters to give a complete picture of the Russian composer's trip to the opening of Carnegie Hall."

Her narrative began with Tchaikovsky's arrival in New York City in April, 1891, just in time to rehearse for the grand opening of Carnegie Hall on May 5

"I am ten times better known in America than Europe, and more of a big shot here than in Russia," the

composer wrote home But this welcome didn't keep Tchaikovsky happy - he was sad and homesick. After

a morning rehersal he wrote: "Too much confusion. The musicians are tired."

On May 5, 1891 around 5,000 people arrived at Carnegie Hall opening, Tchaikovsky was inwardly worried, but showed none of this to the public. His conducting was flawless, and the pianist and orchestra performed beautifully.

Later Tchaikovsky was shocked when newspapers said he looked much older than his 50 years. But after his last appearance at the Music Hall he said: "I'm greatly loved by the American people."

He returned to Russia in late May, and died before he could ever come back to



Fund Started For Eastland County Man Injured In **Wyoming Oilfield Mishap**

An Eastland County man was critically injured on September 21, 1990, when the casing-pulling equipment on which he was working collapsed while attempting to retrieve casing from an abandoned Wyoming well.

Joe Stephenson, 51, was employed by RHS Operating of Eastland when the accident occurred. A 34 year old Graham man, Mike Taylor was killed instantly when debris from the collapse struck him a fatal blow. Stephenson was also struck by flying debris and sustained major injuries to his head, face and arm.

A medical rescue team arrived at the remote well site more than an hour after the accident. Paramedics worked feverishly to save the injured mans life. Stephenson was sent to a Wyoming Medical Center in Casper where he underwent 13 hours of Emergency Surgery.

After stabilizing, Stephenson was transferred to the University of Utah Medical Center in Salt Lake City where two additional surgeries were performed and where he remains in guarded condition in the hospital's nuero-critical care unit.

Because the accident occurred on the job, Stephensons personal medical insurance has denied coverage. Thus far, the company for whom Stephenson worked has been unable to provide evidence of insurance which will cover the medical or personal expenses which are currently estimated at near a half million dollars.

Because of the lack of insurance coverage and the critical nature of his injuries, Stephenson and his wife Lynn will be unable to transfer to a medical facility nearer to

At this point, Doctors attending Stephenson are cautious with their prognosis. Stephenson has lost one cye and has serious damage to the other. His brain has also been damaged, but the full extent of his disability may not be known for many months to come, its reported.

A group of concerned friends and neighbors have established a fund-raising effort to help cover some of the financial burdens placed on the family of Joe Stephen-

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



Keep Thanksgiving Safe From Uninvited Guests

By Sandra Avant COLLEGE STATION-A favorite Thanksgiving food also is an ideal breeding ground for bacteria that cause

food-borne illness. Stuffing cooked with turkey or chicken is a traditional dish for many families during the holidays. It's also a food more likely to cause food sickness if not prepared, cooked or stored properly, according to Dr. Al Wagner, food technologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Food-borne illness may seem a mere annoyance to some, but it can cause serious problems. The Food and Drug Administration reports that food contamination can lead to arthritis, kidney damage, heart problems and in rare cases, death.

'This illness can cause the strongest athlete to double over in pain from stomach cramps, diarrhea, vomiting and dehydration,' Wagner said. 'An estimated 24 to 81 million cases of food illness occur each year in the United States, costing \$5 billion to \$17 billion in medical care and lost productivity.'

Whether you plan to make stuffing from scratch or out of a box, cook it immediately after mixing it - separately from the meat, advises Dr. Bethann Witcher, Extension nutritionist.

'If you cook the turkey in advance, remove the meat from the bones right after cooking and refrigerate or freeze it,' she said. 'If food is contaminated and held at room temperature too long, bacteria may produce a harmful toxin, Staphylococcus aureus, that cannot be destroyed by ordinary cooking.'

Other holiday trimmings such as broth and gravy spoil easily and should be refrigerated quickly after cooking,

she said. Always serve these food hot and do not store them more than two days.

'Cream pies and cream puffs are often involved in food illness,' Witcher said. 'Since cream pies and creamfilled pastries get soggy if refrigerated too long, wait to fill them as close to serving time as possible, but do not allow them to sit at room temperature too long.'

Foods that require hand preparation such as ham sandwiches, potato salads and chicken salads also need special care, she said. Serve the type of sandwiches that can be frozen and thawed as needed. Try freezing cubes of chicken to use in salads. Cubes will thaw as the salad stands, keeping it as cold as possible.

'Don't let huge quantities of leftovers fill your refrigerator for days,' Witcher said. 'Plan in advance how to use remaining foods and freeze the rest.' A few simple precautions

in food handling can prevent happy holidays from becoming miserable ones. Following these tips, known as the 'Four Cs,' to prevent food

·Clean your hands, utensils, equipment, working surfaces and also foods that require washing.

·Cook foods until their temperatures reach at least 140 degrees Fahrenheit and maintain foods above that temperature when serving.

·Chill foods immediately after purchasing and after serving. Maintain at a temperature of less than 40 degrees F; keep refrigerators set between 32 and 40 degrees, freezers at 0 degrees.

·Keep raw foods and any equipment used to prepare raw foods away from cooked and ready-to-eat foods to avoid cross-contamination from bacteria.



As consumers, we may not give much thought to where our food comes from, other than the supermarket. Here in a rural county we are more

aware of agriculture, but do we really think about the impact of agriculture in the

November 16-22 is being observed as National Farm-City Week.

This is an appropriate time to recognize achievements of the risk-takers of the nation's food and fiber crops.

Farmers, rural townspeople and city residents who work in some phase of agribusiness all help to make the nation's agricultural production system a big success.

This annual activity marks the seven days leading up to and including Thanksgiving Day and is an observance to

honor the country's Thanksgiving Day and is an observance to honor the country's greatest resource - its people.

The income of about 23 million Americans - roughly, about one job in every five depends on efficient production on farms and ranches. In Eastland County there are approximately 1,085 farm op-

This makes agriculture and agribusiness the nation's number one employer. Together, these people comprise the agribusiness complex, which reaches far beyond the farm gate to impact all consumers.

U.S. Department of Agriculture figures show that American consumers spend more than \$375 billion annually on foods produced by our nation's farms and ranches.

This money buys more than 400 million tons of fruits and vegetables, meat, poultry and dairy products a year. But only about one-fourth of this amount actually pays for the raw food product and represent the farmer's share of the food dollar.

About \$280 billion, or three-fourths of each food dollar, pays for having the food assembled, inspected, graded, stored, processed. packaged, transported, wholesaled and retailed. This is often termed the marketing share of the food dollar.

In Texas, farmers and ranchers in 1989 rounded up \$11.2 billion in agricultural receipts, up 2 percent from

1988. In Eastland County agricultural receipts in 1990 will be approximatley \$40.5 million.

This has kept Texas in second place nationally in cach receipts, behind California, which had farm receipts of about \$17.7 billion.

Farmers and ranchers often are at risk, however, and droughts or late freezes reduce yields.

Texas continues to rank first among all states in sales of cattle and calves, sheep and wool, goats and mohair, cotton, farm acreage and values and number of farms and ranches.

Farm-City Week has been observed nationally for the past 36 years.
