

The annual Christmas parade, treasure hunt, community Christmas Tree lighting and caroling will be held in Cisco Saturday evening, Dec. 15. Santa Claus will be in town for the parade.

The first-time ever night parade will begin at 5:30 p.m., and the treasure hunt will begin immediately following the lighting of the Community Christmas Tree at the Hilton Center after the parade.

Both events are sponsored by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. Don Wallace is parade chairman, and Bill Austin is chairman for the treasure hunt.

Theme of this year's parade is "The Night Before Christmas." All entries must be decorated with lights. If generators are not owned or borrowed, they may be rented. Battery operated light may also be used, however, parade organizers are asking that

no headlights be used during

the parade. The parade will line up at 4:30 p.m. except automobile entries which will line up at 4 p.m. (See map on back page.) All entries will line up fac-





Dear Editor,







# **Should Eastland County** Add A Sheriff's Deputy?

by Richard Kurklin What does Eastland County want in law enforcement? Most residents will tell you that they want the best possible, unless they are in a lawbreaking business like selling illegal drugs or stealing. But what Eastland County is willing to pay for seems to be much less.

Former Sheriffs have asked for more deputies in order to always be able to respond to calls for help at any hour of the day or night. But these requests have seemingly fallen on deaf ears. Commissioners have been budget concerned, as they should be, but spending increases always seem to go in other directions. And some spending increases are state mandated.

Once again a request for an additional deputy is being made. And Sheriff Dee Hogan has some good points to back his request. Eastland County presently has four deputies, one deputy, that leaves only three to answer calls 7 days a investigate crimes. The legal dangerous job which requires

deputy is paying his way, collecting more than \$24,000. in fees for the county last year and already having collected more than \$23,000. this year. Deputies are supposed to have two days off each week, and they are limited in the number of hours for which they can be paid each week. But since there are more hours in the week than the hours the deputies can be paid, and since two or three officers are often required at one time, most of the deputies have been working extra twenty hours a week without pay, reports Sheriff Hogan. They want to respond when needed to protect lives and property, and to solve

crimes, Hogan continues, but after working such long hours regularly, they are becoming mentally and physically exhausted. Eastland Counties' deputies are trained officers who con-

tinually update their skills as technology advances and state but since serving legal papers and federal laws become more has become a full time job for complex. And they are faced with much higher paying job offers and possibilities in other week night and day, and to counties. They also have a

The Sheriff's Association recommendation that each county have a deputy for each one thousand people in the county outside of cities with police forces has become the standard in Texas, Hogan reminds us. The Manpower Survey shows that several of the adjoining counties have, or nearly have, one deputy for each thousand. With about six thousand of Eastand Counties estimated 18,500 residents outside of policed cities, the county has one deputy for each thousand and five hundred. Hogan points out that it would take two additional deputies to bring the county up to standards, but that the requested once deputy would give the county one deputy
