Everyone in Cisco and the area is invited to attend the event.

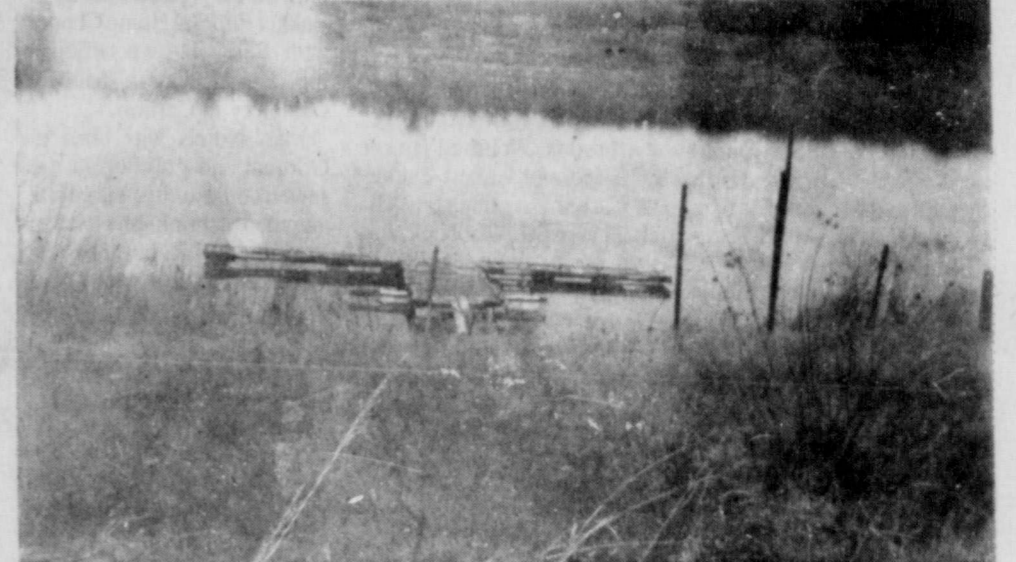

Two Cisco Teenagers Drown In Lake Cisco Christmas Day

Two Cisco teenagers drowned in the icy waters of Lake Cisco around noon Christmas Day.

Joey Hokett and Jackie Carl Hendricks, both 15, had been skating in the Schlaepfer's Draw area of the ice-covered lake when Hokett fell through the ice. Hendricks attempted to rescue his friend and also fell into the icy water.

Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace J.V. Heyser pronounced Hokett dead at 1:10 p.m. and Hendricks at 1:25 p.m.

Heyser said the ice was about four inches thick at the shoreline. Apparently Hokett went too far into the lake where the ice was too thin to support his weight. The water was 8 to 10 feet deep.

Rescue boats could not be launched because they were frozen and had to be broken free from the ice.

Both were students at Cisco High School where Hokett was a freshman and Hendricks was a sophomore.

Funeral services were pending at Kimbrough Funeral Home.

Eastland Countian Watson Announces For House Seat

Watson

Richard Watson, 45 year old pharmacist from Gorman, and Eastland County native, has announced his candidacy for State Representative of the 65th District.

The seat is expected to be vacated by Rep. Jim Parker who has accepted a position in the Ann Richards administration.

A special election is expected to be called by the Governor for late January or early February.

Watson, a Republican and a 1969 graduate of the University of Texas College of Pharmacy is a lifelong resident of the District.

He and his wife Connie have been married 22 years and have three children, Rachel, 20, Leah 16 and Stephen 9.

A formal statement concerning his candidacy will be issued later.

Jefferies

H.R. Jefferies of Comanche announced as a candidate for State Representative for the 65th District.

Jefferies, 60, has lived in Comanche for the past 19 years and was superintendent of schools for 17 years prior to his retirement, and serves part time with the Comanche school system. He is married to the former Rosemary Spencer of Cross Plains. They have three children.

Jefferies has taught Political Science part time for the

past several years for Ranger Junior College.

Mr. Jefferies said he hoped to visit the various communities prior to election day and to speak to as many voters as possible as well as any political forums that communities may sponsor.

Sudderth

Ben Doyle Sudderth, 58, announced today that if Representative Parker resigns from the Legislature, he will become a candidate in the Special Election to fill the vacancy.

Sudderth served two terms in the Legislature from this area in the late 1950's and did not run for re-election. Sudderth stated that this is the most important session for this area of the State in many years — "With redistricting, school finance, legislative ethics, and a need for relief from the continuous spiraling of property taxes at the top of the agenda, this district must have strong effective representation. We will not have the luxury of a period for training a replacement. For about the first month of the session, we will have no Representative. Whoever is elected will have their hands full from the very day of election. There are other areas which need immediate attention - for example - curbing the influence of the lobbyist. In this regard, I will not accept any so-called 'campaign contributions' from lobbyist or lobby groups. Also, we need to prohibit the State

agencies from spending taxpayer's money employing lobbyist. If we are going to have true representative government, we must elect representatives who are not obligated to special interest groups!"

Sudderth and his wife, Anne, live near Blanket. Sudderth has maintained a law office in Comanche for almost 35 years. They are the parents of six grown children, namely, Bonnie, Chief Justice of the Fort Worth Municipal Courts; Sandi, a Houston banker; Bo, a student at Howard Payne University; Sky, a law student at the University of Texas-Austin; Keith, who attends Cisco Junior College; and Ta'ah, who attends Austin Community College.

Operation Child Safe

The Texas Trial Lawyers Association has launched "Operation Child Safe", a Texas-based, grass-roots campaign to spotlight hazardous toys and reduce toy-related injuries and deaths.

"It's show-and-tell time for the safety of our kids," Tommy Jacks, TTLA President said.

Jacks said an unsafe toy in the hands of a child can be just as lethal as a loaded gun with results just as heartbreaking.

The TTLA effort to stem the rising tide of toy-related injuries is part of national "Play It Safe" program coordinated by the Association of Trial Lawyers of America and the Johns Hopkins Injury Prevention Center.

TTLA members will be making appearances in Texas schools and at child care centers to promote toy safety awareness.

The statewide organization plans to use safety cylinders to show children and adults how to check whether toy parts can choke small children.

The safety cylinder is one

and a quarter inches in diameter and about two inches long. Toys or toy parts that fit entirely within the cylinder present a clear danger to choking and possible brain damage, Jack said.

In 1989, an estimated 152,000 children were treated for toy-related injuries in hospitals across the nation, according to a report from the U.S. Consumer Products Commission.

Jack said injuries not reported to hospitals may be even higher and that childhood injuries caused by unsafe toys have been growing nationally at an annual rate of about eight percent.

Jack said the TTLA members will also warn about the dangers of toys with sharp edges and pointed objects as well as balloons, riding toys, electrical toys water hazards.

"We hope this on going effort will make our communities just a little bit safer, especially for our kids," he said.

A "Play It Safe" tips for toy brochure will also be distributed to teachers, parents and community leaders.

Regional Security Force May Keep Middle East Peace In Future

While Middle East peace hangs in the balance of rhetoric and action, a Texas Christian University political scientist believes a NATO-like force may help secure long-term regional peace.

"I see a regional security arrangement, no matter how this conflict ends, as a possible scenario," explained Dr. Manocher Dorraj, a native of Iran.

"Saddam Hussein needs to be checked by regional security forces, and I already see an embryonic formation of that in the coalition force that exists against him," he said.

Dorraj believes Egypt, Syria, Saudi Arabia and Morocco will eventually join with Turkey and Iran to sign a pact against Iraqi military aggression.

"If Iraq attacks one of these countries, it would invite a strike from all of them," Dorraj said.

Pointing to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, Dorraj said history provides a clear picture of how useful such a force can be.

"We did not resort to military confrontation to take out the Soviets. We put some of our might and military investment behind NATO," he explained. "I see a similar thing happening in the Middle East."

Dorraj suggested the global alliance against Saddam Hussein may prove to be the strongest deterrent to war as well as another precedent for resolution of human conflict through dialogue.

"If the United States could solve its differences with the Soviet Union through peaceful negotiations, then why not Iraq?" questioned Dorraj.

"Iraq is a small tomato compared to the Soviet Union," he said.


During his tenure as district representative, Parker was twice named by Texas Monthly as one of the top legislators and was recently named legislator by the Texas Municipal League.

Q. Many teenagers are experimenters. Which phase most accurately describes this group?
A. Moratorium is the universal idea of what teenagers are like. The Moratorium girls are considered daughters of crisis. In this group are women who have left their churches, marched in anti-war protests, criticized their parents, and experimented with morality issues - and felt guilty.
Moratoriums gave responsiveness to social problems and a closeness to great philosophical questions.
Moratoriums are attuned to options, knowing that they could design their own lives, but often wanted to choose both sides of contradiction.
The Moratorium Phase is one of testing and searching for new identities. These women are usually very interesting lively and engaging. But Female Moratoriums do not show the positive adaptive personalities as their male counterparts. Female Moratoriums behave like Fiffusions. They show lower self esteem and greater anxiety than do Identity Achievers and Foreclosers.
Moratorium women value exploration above commitment.

Wichita Falls Santa Claus Caper Proved Fatal To Six

(Reprinted from Sunday, Dec. 23, 1990, Dallas Morning News, TEXAS SKETCHES) By A.C. Greene
Each year, I get requests to reprint this "Texas-Sketch," which first ran in 1983. I've updated it somewhat this year. On Dec. 23, 1927, Santa Claus and three helpers tried to rob a bank. It happened in

Cisco, Texas, and became the most bizarre bank robbery in U.S. history. The men, who lived in Wichita Falls, drove to Cisco and held up the First National Bank, the leader wearing a Santa suit because Cisco had been his home. He mistakenly believed a Santa Claus outfit would be a perfect disguise at Christmas-time.

From the beginning the episode was a comedy of errors - and tragedy. A little girl saw 'Santa Claus' enter the bank and dragged her mother along so she could tell Santa one last wish. When they entered the front door of the bank and saw men with drawn guns, the girl started screaming, 'They're going to kill Santa Claus!' And because the holdup men weren't hardhearted enough to harm them, the mother and the girl fled to the nearby police station, crying out the alarm.

Within minutes the bank was surrounded by armed citizens, many of whom had gone into hardware stores and grabbed up guns from stock. (One incentive was a \$5,000 'Dead Bank Robber' reward 'and not one cent for a live one' offered by the Texas Banking Association.)

Later, 250 bullet holes were counted in the bank's exterior. Taking two little girls hostage (they were found unharmed), the robbers shot their way through the ambush to their stolen getaway car and roared off, followed by a caravan of pursuers.

However, they soon realized they had forgotten to get gasoline, and the gauge was on empty. When they stopped another car and attempted to take it, the 14 year old drive pocketed the ignition keys and slipped away. The armed posse was near, firing madly, so the robbers returned to the first car and ran again - leaving behind a mortally wounded companion as well as the money they had taken.

By then, not only was one of their number dying, two Cisco policemen, including the chief, were dead. The manhunt that ensued included Texas Rangers in airplanes and was the biggest in Texas history, but it was a week before the three remaining holdup men were caught. Through a series of misadventures and accidents, eight law officers were wounded.

Ultimately, one of the robbers was electrocuted, and on Nov. 19, 1929, after 'Santa Claus' had severely wounded a popular jailer, a mob broke into the Eastland County jail, pulled out 'Santa Claus' and lynched him. The next day the jailer expired, the sixth man to die from the deadly Christmas caper.

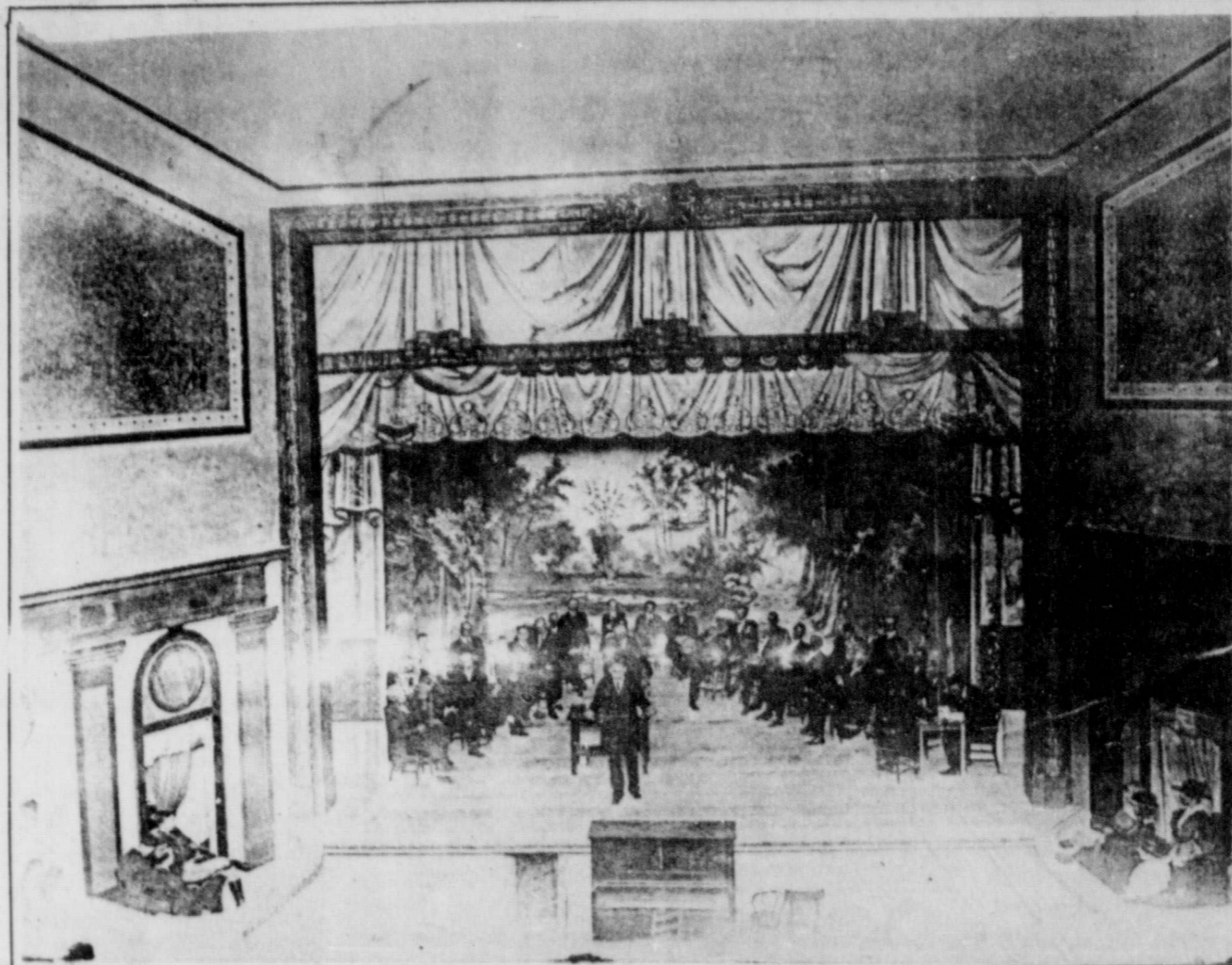

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College Faculty Salaries Increase This Year

Faculty salaries at Texas public universities for the first four academic ranks increased this year by an average of 3.7 percent over last year, according to a survey by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Professors, associate professors, assistant professors, and instructors in the state's higher education system are now earning an average annual salary of \$43,299. In the 1989-90 academic year, they earned an average of \$41,756.

"Despite these gains, faculty salaries in Texas continue to lose ground when compared to faculty salaries in the 10 states nearest Texas in population," said Kenneth H. Ashworth, Texas' commissioner of higher education.

"We expect the comparative data we get next spring to show Texas faculty salaries averaging almost 13 percent behind the average for those states," he said.

The Coordinating Board study revealed other information on faculty salaries:

At Texas public universities, average salaries for 1990-91 are \$55,114 for professors, up 3.4 percent from 1989-90; \$40,526 for associate professors, up 3.1 percent; \$34,244 for assistant professors, up 3.1 percent; and \$25,654 for instructors, up 4.6 percent.

Average salaries paid lecturers increased 8.2 percent, from \$21,004 to \$22,734. Teaching assistants earned an average of 1.1 percent more, or \$14,314, compared to the 1989-90 average of \$14,160.

The highest average faculty salaries in Texas, based on the first four faculty ranks, were reported by the University of Texas at Austin, \$53,367; the University of Texas at Dallas, \$49,165; Texas A & M University, \$49,092; University of Houston, \$48,733; University of Texas at Arlington, \$43,176; University of North Texas, \$42,739; and Texas Tech University, \$42,486.

The state's public community colleges are paying their full-time general academic and vocational-technical faculty an average of \$33,038 in the 1990-91 academic year. That represents an increase of \$823, or 2.6 percent, over the 1989-90 average.

Seventeen of the State's 49 community college districts pay above the statewide average, with the highest salaries offered at Dallas County Community College District, Tarrant County Junior College District, Lee College, Alvin Community College, Alamo Community College District, Odessa College, and McLennan Community College.

Faculty at the Texas State Technical Institute's four campuses are averaging \$25,526 this year. TSTI faculty salary data was collected for the first time this year.

The Eastland County, Cisco Junior College is listed as paying \$33,904 for its highest salary, with lowest salaries \$22,591 and the average \$26,044. Ranger Junior College is reported to pay \$34,219 for the highest salary, \$18,639 for the lowest, and \$25,020 for the average.

COURSES OFFERED IN FARM RANCH ACCOUNTING

Farmers and ranchers interested in doing a better job of managing for profitability and being attuned to the financial health of the business in 1991 should plan to enroll in a computer course in farm and ranch accounting.

The computerized accounting course, using state-of-art software and computers is planned for January 7-9, on the campus of Tarleton State University at Stephenville. It is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the Tarleton State University division of Continuing Education and the Department of CIS and Management.

The course is designed to teach farmers and ranchers with beginning to moderate accounting knowledge and skills (prior computer experience is not required) the basics of financial and enterprise accounting, points out Dr. Ashley Lovell of Stephenville, an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Course topics include: cash and accrual accounting methods, single and double entry accounting systems, basics of accounting theory, setting up and managing a computerized accounting system, considerations, such as check

writing, payroll, accounts payable, accounts receivable and fixed assets and depreciation management. During the Stephenville course the participants will set up and handle typical transactions using a computerized accounting program for a typical dairy and forage farm. Although participants may own or purchase different software than is used in the course, the material in this course will be applicable.

The objective of the course is to instill knowledge and confidence in participants through lecture and computer hands-on experience, so that participants will be able to return to their business and implement their management and financial information system, says Lovell.

Regarding farm and ranch recordkeeping, producers can use a manual record system, use a computerized accounting software package, or pay for bookkeeping service. Each producer must evaluate his own situation to determine which option is most appropriate. No one system will fit all situations, Lovell emphasizes.

He notes that whatever bookkeeping option is selected, it should aid a business in three ways:

- *Provide timely management information.
- *Provide information required for filing timely income tax returns.

*Generate reports required by lenders.

All of these functions are becoming more important due to changes in tax laws, increased requirements from lenders for documentation to support loan requests, and the current economic conditions.

Computerized bookkeeping can generate timely management information for decision making, and the number and complexity of production and marketing decisions is increasing and requiring greater sophistication, notes the economist.

To obtain further information regarding the Farm and Ranch Accounting Course, call Dr. Lovell at 817-968-4144 or 817-968-4288. Since the January 7-9 shortcourse occurs soon after the Christmas holidays, pre-registration by January 4 is essential. Registration is limited to ensure hands-on participation.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

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

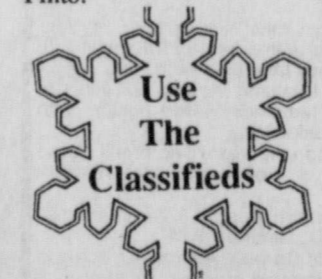

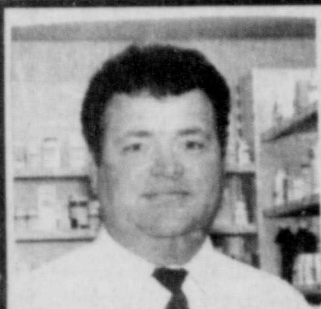

Pharmacy Topics

The farther one lives from the equator, the more likely the experience of Seasonal Affective Disorder, variations in mood attributed to lack of exposure to light. The journal Postgraduate Medicine reports that exposure to extra-bright fluorescent light helps.

Birth control pills are more effective if taken at about the same time every day, according to a three-year study at the University of Michigan School of Nursing. Women who miss a pill should use another form of contraception until the start of the next period.

Low-fat diet with plenty of vitamin A seems to protect against breast cancer, even after cellular changes have begun, a study by the Cancer Control Agency of British Columbia found. Canadian research focussed on women with benign breast disease, a pre-cancerous condition.

The Food and Drug Administration has approved a European drug -- deprenyl -- said to slow the onset of Parkinson's disease. It depresses most common symptoms for up to a year.

A Question Of Candy
Q. I try to take good care of my son's teeth, but I'm worried that he eats too much candy. Do you have any suggestions?
A. Actually, research has shown that chocolate candy may even slow down the development of decay-causing plaque. It appears that the cocoa in chocolate can inhibit the enzyme which breaks down sucrose (a type of sugar that contributes to plaque and decay). Also, cocoa butter is easily cleared from the mouth, and leaves little residue behind.
Of course, your son needs to eat a well-balanced diet. And he still needs to develop good dental hygiene through regular brushing, flossing and visits to the dentist. But the "candy menace" may not be as great as you think!
