HAPPY NEW YEAR

With the cold weather we've been having, and will continue to have probably through February, Texans will try to stay warm by using various types of heating equipment in their homes. Unfortunately, many will discover that improperly used heaters can cause damage, injuries and even death.

The State Fire Marshal recommends these safety precautions when operating heating equipment:

1. Keep all heaters at least **THREE FEET** away from any combustible objects, such as walls, curtains, drapes and furniture, especially beds. Use a yardstick or meter stick to measure the distance.

2. Use only heating equipment that is in good operating condition. Watch for worn electrical cords, leaks or faulty switches. Keep your heating equipment (including ducting) clean.

3. Have your heating equipment, both central systems and portable equipment, serviced by a qualified expert at least once a year.

4. Be sure all heaters, stoves, fireplaces and chimneys are installed and insulated properly. Check for heating of adjacent floors and walls, which can be very hazardous.

5. Have your fireplace, wood-burning stove and chimney inspected and cleaned at least once a year.

6. Use only approved heaters and fuels. Check for UL or Factory Mutual labels. Because portable heaters are illegal in some jurisdictions, check with local fire authorities to be sure that portable heaters are allowed in your area.

7. Follow all operating instructions for your heating equipment **EXACTLY**. Re-read the instructions before operating your heater.

8. Wear close-fitting pajamas or night clothes, and avoid loose, billowy gowns or robes, to reduce the risk of igniting your clothes by contacting heaters or cook stoves. Warn senior citizens and children to stay away from heaters.

9. Be sure there is adequate ventilation in any area where there is an open flame. Keep the central gas heating system ventilation ducts open.

Provide ventilation for solid- or liquid-fueled heaters, such as gas, LP, kerosene or wood.

10. Practice emergency procedures so you and your family know what to do in case of a fire:

- Know to "stop, drop and roll" to put out the fire if your clothes catch on fire.

- Have an emergency exit plan with two exit routes from each room, and explain your plan to overnight guests. Keep your exit routes clear; don't place portable heaters near doorways or halls.

- Hold a practice exit drill each month so everyone will know how to get out safely.

- Emphasize the importance of getting out quickly in case of fire.

11. If your heating equipment is not safe, **ASK FOR HELP**. Contact local authorities for help in improving your heating equipment or for locations of shelters in extremely cold weather.

12. If you know someone, especially a senior citizen, who does not have safe, adequate heating equipment, offer help or ask a local social service agency to help.

Eastland County Commissioners Accept Resignation Of JP Honea

Eastland County Commissioners Wednesday accepted the resignation of Jamie Honea, Justice of the Peace in Pct. 1, effective Dec. 31, 1990.

They called a special meeting for Monday, Dec. 31 at 10 a.m. At that time applications will be considered and someone appointed to fill the vacancy.

A number of items were on Wednesday's agenda, including consideration of bonds and oaths of elected and re-elected county and precinct officials.

There will be a number of changes in county personnel Jan. 1, including Calvin Ainsworth as Commissioner of Pct. 2, and Reggie Pittman as Commissioner of Pct. 4.

The Commissioners decided to leave special supervisory duties of the Court with the Precincts which have handled them in the past: Pct. 1 (Richard Robinson) Surplus Food Distribution, Pct. 2 (Calvin Ainsworth) Courthouse Maintenance, Pct. 3 (L. T. Owen) County Poor Farm, and Pct. 4 (Reggie Pittman) County Jail.

Two agenda items dealt with a request from Bobby Newport and Fred Tankersley to re-open County Rd. 397 in Pct. 3 A position with 16 names was presented to the Court, requesting that the road be re-opened.

In August three people signed a petition to close the road where a bridge crossing Greer Creek had washed out. It was submitted to the Court by Brawner Files and the road was ordered closed Aug. 27.

Attorney Mike Siebert represented Newport at Wednesday's meeting. He told the Commissioners that Newport needed the closed portion of Rd. 397 to get to his property. Newport agreed, saying that the only other way for him to get in was to drive between the Files' house and barn.

Siebert also told the Court that Newport probably misunderstood when he signed

the first petition to close the road.

A majority of the Commissioners (3-1) voted to void the order passed on Aug. 27 to close the road. L. T. Owen of Pct. 3 voted against re-opening the road, saying that it was extremely dangerous and he was afraid someone would be killed trying to travel it.

"If someone goes off into the creek, the County will be liable," he said. Owen also stated that the road would be difficult and expensive to repair, and that "the tin horns will never carry all the water off that creek."

After the other Commissioners voted to re-open the road, however, Owen said he would try to make some kind of low water crossing on the creek.

In other matters, the Court made budget adjustment to the office of James T. Wright,

Veteran's Service Officer. Wright has completed training leading to certification, and will become the County's only Veteran's Service Officer Jan. 1. A new state law makes certification mandatory for this office.

Wright will be paid \$495 per month, with a yearly in-county travel expense allowance of \$450.

The Commissioners approved an ambulance contract between the county, the city of Cisco, and the Cisco Hospital District. Under his one-year contract the County will pay a budgeted \$30,000 during the fiscal year.

Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, reported to the Court that the county jail was very clean. He said there were 15 prisoners in the facility - 11 county prisoners, 2 on "blue" warrants, 1 for TDC, and 1 city prisoner.

Artic Blast Hardest On Elderly

When record-setting cold temperatures plunged into Texas last year, even the hardest individuals needed shelter.

According to weather records, on Dec. 21, already cold thermometer readings began to fall through the 20s, the teens and single digits—even

below zero in northern parts of the state. By Dec. 23, all of Texas shivered under a dense layer of arctic air.

Businesses and homes throughout the state suffered flooding from ice-shattered plumbing. Some towns endured power outages as heating systems worked overtime. Employers in some areas ordered workers to stay home to keep warm and protect their property. Crops in the Valley froze in fields and orchards, while freak snowfalls on the Gulf coast created traffic nightmares.

But the event was worse than just an expensive inconvenience at Christmas time. For nearly a week, the statewide weather emergency endangered anyone unable to find warmth, especially the elderly.

At least 14 people died as a direct result of hypothermia—excessive loss of body heat. And all but two of the victims were 55 or older. Officials at

the Texas Department of Health (TDH) warn that even if the weather this winter is milder, a similar death toll from the cold still can occur.

Dr. Diane M. Simpson, TDH Associate Commissioner for Disease Prevention, said that extreme cold is dangerous to anyone, but some are more susceptible to hypothermia than are others. Small children are at risk because their bodies radiate heat faster than those of adults. The sick, and people who have taken certain prescription drugs or alcohol may lack resistance to low temperatures. The increasing number of homeless people are at further risk where temporary shelter is unavailable.

There are several reasons that the elderly may be more susceptible to hypothermia. Often their own basal metabolism has decreased and they are also not very physi-

cally active. Also, they may not perceive cold as well as younger persons and may set their thermostats low. Older persons also may lose some natural reflexes such as shivering. In addition, some elderly are poor and are afraid of incurring high heating bills.

Dr. Simpson explained that hypothermia begins when the deep body temperature falls to 95 degrees Fahrenheit, just less than four degrees below normal. Because the drop can be gradual, such a temperature change can cause mental confusion. The victim may or may not be aware that anything is wrong. "Many victims die in their own homes, quietly oblivious to danger," Dr. Simpson said.

"Unless the hypothermia victim receives immediate care, droopiness, slurred speech, falling blood pressure, shallow breathing and a bloated or pinkish tint to the skin develop. These symptoms are closely followed by unconsciousness and death."

Dr. Simpson stressed the importance of checking on older relatives and friends, especially those living alone, to be sure that they are staying warm during cold weather.

"We are concerned about the elderly and others known to be at risk of hypothermia, but even average people who are used to being out in the cold should never underestimate weather changes," she said. Such people should dress warmly in loose-fitting, layered clothing, gloves and face covering to block wind-chill.

Wind-chill is the term for the cooling effect wind can have on the surface of the

skin. A brisk wind, combined with even moderately cool temperatures, can produce wind-chill far below freezing.

YOUR BIBLE QUESTION ANSWERED BY: DR. M.H. CLARK

Question: Where in the Bible does it say that "in the last days man shall become wiser but weaker"?

Answer: **Nowhere.** This is just another one of those statements that somebody's dear great-grandfather thought he had read in the Bible forty years before, and no one dared to doubt dear old great-grandfather's wisdom! So it was passed on and on, no one taking the trouble to get a good Bible concordance to see if it was really in the Bible or not. I heard it when just a boy. My own dear mother would have staked her life on the fact that it was in the Bible "somewhere."

In World War II days, when many sincere Christians, including a certain teen-age boy preacher named Clark, were grasping at every line of Scripture that could possibly mean that Jesus; second coming was "day after tomorrow." Not only were many scripture passages taken out of context, but a lot of things which someone had "heard was in the Bible" were quoted as sure signs that we would not be on this earth beyond World War

II. It was even said that rationing had been prophesied in Isaiah 3:18, where "their round tires like the moon" were doomed to be taken from them along with some twenty other items of women's fancy clothes and decorations. Look up "tire" in your dictionary! But when a man told my dad that was what it really meant, my dear Mother called him an "old reprobate."

Now that Jesus in going to return to this earth is so clear in the Word of God that one can scarcely doubt it. Moreover, I believe that throughout this whole 20th century we have been seeing things shaping up for His return. The turning of world history back to the Middle East, "the cradle of civilization," as the historians say, is, I firmly believe, leading to the rise of the Anti-Christ (following the "rapture" of all true believers on Christ), the Great Tribulation period, and the Battle of Armageddon at Jerusalem. I say I firmly believe this, but I have learned that things do not always develop as fast as we might think they will, so I think it is very unwise, and unscriptural, to try to set dates by manipulating certain passages on "this generation," and "the times of the Gentiles," which certain ignorant preachers have done—to the embarrassment of all legitimate students of prophecy.

So don't ever take it for granted that "the Bible says" something until you see it

Q. My mouth seems so dry all the time! Can my dentist help?

Fishing Outdoors

By Terry L. Wilson

BASSIN BASICS AT HOME

Recent severe cold weather has probably pushed thoughts of fishing far away from your daily routine. But now is perhaps one of the most important times of year for the tournament minded anglers.

Preparations for tournaments begins long before each event, and during these cold shut in days go to work on the basics. Sharpen and inspect hooks still yet unopened from Santa Claus.

Baits which you carried all year but never really found an instance where they were needed should be either removed and stored or shuffled to the bottom and replaced with another. Preferably one similar or like a good producer from the previous year. Worm bags and boxes

always seem to wind up with old worms of little or no use. Remove these taking care to utilize any possible section which might be moved over into your spinner bait box to be used as trailers.

And speaking of spinner baits one of the most overlooked portions of this bait each year are the swivels. Check each to assure that when fishing they don't pull into or that they are frozen up and not swivel. Check your skirts to insure that each strand is separate to give the most action possible.

When anglers are loading up their equipment most do inspect their rods. 'Yep I have my rods,' and that's about it. Your rods should be exam-

ined closely for cracks, loose feet on guides or guide wrapping frizzing. The one item few anglers ever check are the ceramic line eye guides. A simple test of these for burrs can save a broken heart from losing a hawg. Take a cotton swab and pass it around the inside of each eye. If the swab grabs, change it out, cause your line will become frayed passing through it.

Our reels probably receive more service than is really needed. A light oiling occasionally with a once or twice a year tear down and cleaning will normally give you lots of trouble free fishing. Caution if you are not familiar with todays reels I suggest your send them to someone who

is. The old days of simplicity are gone from the high tech reels of the 90's.

Winter days has probably produced more accurate casting, pitching and flipping anglers than ever being on the water. There are techniques which with your wife's permission can be sharpened to perfection in the house or garage if you can't get outside. Set you up a target and work on placing the lure not only accurately but softly. Many anglers use only a can to chunk at, I prefer attempting to utilize items which depict such things as laydown logs, boat docks, cracks in rocks, etc.

Mental preparation begins during these shut in days also.

Drag out your topo maps of the lakes you plan to fish. Study what areas you normally catch fish from then look for other areas that duplicate this. Mark these as areas to look at your next visit.

Preparation now can and will make for a happier and more successful year so 'Why put off until it's time to go, what you can prepare now.'

Next time out I will look at

a few ways to prepare your boat, trailer and towing vehicle for a trouble free year of 'Fishing Outdoors.'

A number of area bass tournament anglers will be heading for Lake Granbury January 19, 1991. We want to wish these boys good luck on this power plant lake in the tournament.

Q. Many teenagers are experimenters. Which phase most accurately describes this group?

A. Moratorium are the universal idea of what teenagers are like. The Moratorium girls are considered daughters of crisis. In this group are women who have left their churches, marched in anti-war protests, criticized their parents, and experimented with morality issues - and felt guilty.

Moratoriums are attuned to options, knowing that they could design their own lives, but often wanted to choose both sides of contradiction.

The Moratorium Phase is one of testing and searching for new identities. These women are usually very interesting lively and engaging. But Female Moratoriums do not show the positive adaptive personalities as their male counterparts. Female Moratoriums behave like Diffusers. They show lower self esteem and greater anxiety than do Identity Achievers and Foreclosers.

Moratorium women value exploration above commitment.

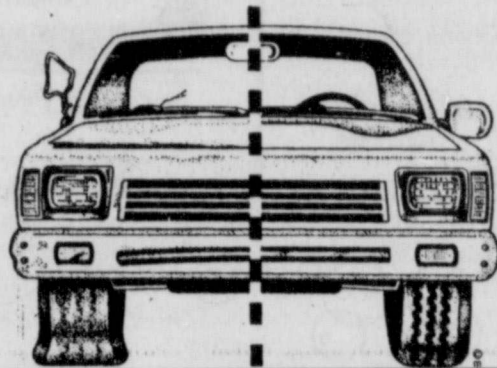

Cold Weather**

Now that it appears winter has finally arrived, special care should be given to pets. Shelter and adequate nutrition should be given extra

attention for pets to protect them from wintertime hazards during the cold months ahead. Winter temperatures in Texas are not at such extremes that animals accustomed to staying outdoors will be hurt.

If the pet can seek shelter that keeps out chilling winds and covers cold ground, it will be adequately protected.

Animals that are never outside or are very old or young should not be kept outdoors.

Healthy animals can tolerate cold weather. More food may be needed because the pets need more calories to produce body heat.

The daily water supply also should be checked to make sure the water has not frozen or the pet may suffer.

Each pet also should have a check-up before cold weather sets in. Animals should be

checked for internal parasites and blood parasites such as heartworms, and they should have all needed vaccinations.

Don't Store

Firewood In House

Cold weather has made a fire in the fireplace or wood burning stove a very common sight throughout the county. Nobody wants to make a lot of trips outside in the cold for wood but if you don't want uninvited insects in the house, outside is the best place to store wood.

Firewood stacks provide good hiding places for insects. While the wood is outside in

the cold most insects will be inactive. If you bring the wood inside and it has time to warm up, any hibernating insects in the wood may become active and escape to other areas of the house.

Store firewood as far from the house as possible and take only the amount needed for immediate use into the house. Don't apply insecticides to firewood.

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Cold, Icy Weather Could Pose Threat To Home LP-Gas Users

With the arrival of the winter heating season, Texas homeowners who fuel furnaces and appliances with

liquefied petroleum gas should double-check to make sure the regulator on their LP-gas tank is properly installed

and protected from snow and ice, say safety officials of the Railroad Commission's Liquefied Petroleum Gas Division.

If the regulator vent ices over, high-pressure gas can be released directly to home

appliances. A normal 3/4 inch blue flame on an appliance could suddenly surge, becoming a dangerous torch. Over the past few winters, several home and business fires have been caused by such regulator freeze-ups, officials say. Regulators on many home

tanks are located under a protective metal dome on the top of the tank, shielding them for weather and insects. Homeowners with tanks where the circular regulator has been installed outside the dome cover should check to make sure that the regulator

is pointing down toward the ground, away from the elements.

For economic reasons, many consumers are buying propane early or for the first time as a supplemental heat source. A dangerous and potentially deadly situation can develop when homeowners unwittingly bring LP-gas portable cylinders indoors.

Commission safety regulations prohibit portable LP-gas containers indoors because of the danger of explosion or fire

if stored too close to a heat source.

LP-gas cylinders and containers must be installed outside in accordance with the Commission's LP-gas safety rules. The gas regulator must also have appropriate safety protection.

Over the past month, the LP-gas Division has been notified of five reported fires in which LP-gas cylinders were either used indoors or in which improperly installed or unprotected gas regulators

were identified as the cause.

If homeowners are concerned about whether or not their regulator is properly installed, they should contact the local LP-gas dealer that fills or services the tank.

LP-gas, more commonly known as propane or butane, is used as a residential and commercial fuel in areas where natural gas utility service is not available.

Pharmacy Topics

The farther one lives from the equator, the more likely the experience of Seasonal Affective Disorder, variations in mood attributed to lack of exposure to light. The Journal Postgraduate Medicine reports that exposure to extra-bright fluorescent light helps.

Birth control pills are more effective if taken at about the same time every day, according to a three-year study at the University of Michigan School of Nursing. Women who miss a pill should use another form of contraception until the start of the next period.

Low-fat diet with plenty of vitamin A seems to protect against breast cancer, even after cellular changes have begun, a study by the Cancer Control Agency of British Columbia found. Canadian research focussed on women with benign breast disease, a pre-cancerous condition.

The Food and Drug Administration has approved a European drug -- deprenyl -- said to slow the onset of Parkinson's disease. It depresses most common symptoms for up to a year.
