'That's correct," Clayton said. "I could have put them in an envelope or he (Kelley) could have put them in.'

Investigators have alleged Clayton accepted a \$10,000 bribe from Moore in exchange for a promise to help Prudential dollar insurance program on state work-

"This looks like just another place where they messed up on their case," Fitzgerald said when the envelope revealed only \$5,000.

Fitzgerald said U.S. Attorney J.A. Canales suggested Clayton's attorneys make pictures of the bills and bring the cash to the federal grand jury in Houston Wednesday, where the speaker is subpoenaed to testify.

Clayton's aides said the speaker is 'torn up" about his lawyers' insistence that he invoke his constitutional privilege to refuse to answer incriminating ques-

Fitzgerald said. "That's a decision we're laboring over. The speaker has been insisting constantly that he wants to testi-

# India Pushes For Russian Withdrawal

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - Prime Minister Indira Gandhi today told visiting Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko the Kremlin should help reduce tension in the region by such measures as withdrawing Russian troops from Afghanistan, an Indian government spokesman indicated.

Gromyko, who earlier today arrived on a two-day official visit to India, the Soviet's biggest Asian ally, was given In-

dia's views on defusing the Afghan crisis during a three-hour meeting with Mrs. Gandhi, including nearly 25 minutes with no aides present

In Washington, President Carter's national security adviser said the United States will view anything less than a complete withdrawal of Soviet forces from Afghanistan as "insufficient."

Zbigniew Brzezinski said Monday night that although a "cosmetic" withdrawal of Soviet troops is anticipated, it would not be "a solution to what is a serious problem.

Both Mrs. Gandhi and her foreign minister, P.V.N. Rao conveyed to Gromyko "India's views regarding the need for defusing tension in the area," said Indian External Affairs Ministry spokesman J.N. Dixit.

Answering reporters' questions, Dixit said the official Indian view includes two major points - a hope that Soviet forces will withdraw from Afghanistan, and strong opposition to American plans for a military buildup of Pakistan.

Gromyko and Gandhi agreed to consult further in continuing talks Wednesday about "measures by which the tension in the region can be defused," Dixit told reporters.

India is the third foreign country visited by Gromyko in an apparent effort to reduce foreign opposition to the Soviet military action in Central Asia. Previousy he visited Syria, where President Hafez Assad backed the Soviet action fully, and Romania, where President Nicolae Ceaucescu didn't.

Gromyko, in a statement on his arrival, did not mention Afghanistan. But he said India and the Soviet Union "have labored strenuously" to develop their ties, and their relations have "never been guided by momentary considerations or mere emotions.

Foreign Minister Rao welcomed the visitor as "Comrade Gromyko" and said he shared his optimism about continued good relations between their two coun-

About 25 slogan-shouting Afghan youths held a demonstration at a distant part of the airport protesting the Soviet role in their country and shouting: "Russians quit Afghanistan" and "Down with the KGB (the Soviet secret police)."

Mrs. Gandhi told U.S. presidential enoy Clark Clifford two weeks ago and other visitors that she would try to influence the Russians to withdraw their troops from Afghanistan, but she said she was not optimistic that her words would have any effect.

She and other Indian leaders take the line that no amount of pressure, such as the U.S. arming of Pakistan or a boycott of the Moscow Olympics, is going to budge the Kremlin's resolve to keep troops in Afghanistan as long as the communist Afghan government is unable to contain the Moslem rebellion against it.

## Lottery Set If Draft Resumes

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Carter told Congress today that if it becomes necessary to reinstate the draft, the inductees will be chosen by lottery among 20-year-olds.

Carter sent Congress his proposal to register all 19-and 20-year-olds - men and women alike - as part of a 62-page report on Selective Service reform. Congress directed him last year to prepare such a report.

"If it ever becomes necessary to draft anyone, Selective Service will operate under the concept of random selection (lottery) based upon year and date of birth," the report said.

'The first year-of-birth group from which inductees will be drawn is the one that contains those who reach 20 in a giv-

en calendar year. Before a draft could actually take place, however, the president would have to declare a national emergency and ask Congress for authority to induct.

"He has no intention of doing so under present circumstances," the report

The report said the first inductee could report within 13 days after the president declared a national emergency.

The report spelled out restrictions on

the mobilization of women. It said the Defense Department will continue the current policy of not assigning women to jobs involving "close com-

Waldheim has attempted to arrange freedom for the 50 Americans since they were seized at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran 101 days ago. He has also proposed an international commission be set up to investigate Iranian charges against the deposed shah.

The radio said Ghotbzadeh declined to give a timetable for the Americans' release. But in what could be a related development, the radio quoted Ghotbzadeh as telling ABC News that an international commission being set up to investigate deposed Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi will "probably" meet in Tehran within a week.

Ghotbzadeh said he was leaving for Athens tonight to begin a five-day European tour, the radio said. A broadcast monitored in London said Ghotbzadeh will also visit Italy and France. It was not known if his trip was connected to the arrival in Tehran of an international commission.

The radio reported that President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr, meanwhile, repeated his offer to free the hostages within a few days if America would admit its 'crimes' in Iran since it helped the deposed monarch regain his throne in 1953. When his offer was first made public in an interview published Monday in the French newspaper Le Monde, the State Department said there will be no profession of guilt from the U.S. government.

\$3,625 drug and alcohol abuse prevention for middle and high school students received favorable comment from the

In past years the program, which has

been self-funded, has established Al-A-Non and Al-A-Teen organizations. With the new funding, program administrators plan a driving-while-intoxicated preven-

tion program.

A like project in Hale County which received favorable comment from the board will use \$27,844 to provide a referral service for the 64th and 242nd District Courts and the Hale County Juvenile Probation Department, through work with the Central Plains Mental Health-

Mental Retardation Center The project, which director Jack Driscoll said would be "like closing the gate before the cows get out," will provide drug abuse education to 85 school teachers, plus allow law enforcement and probation professionals to counsel 47 families. Emergency medical care also will be provided for five juvenile offenders, and

65 juvenile offenders will receive outpatient counseling

The board also passed favorable comment on a "lame duck" application submitted by the City of Lubbock for \$53,000 to employ 25 high school-aged individuals to build a black history mural in one of the Canyon Lakes projects.

Program director Oscar Jones told the board the project already has been refused funding by the state Criminal Justice Division because it is not directly related to law enforcement

At least eight of the individuals employed by the project would be high school drop-outs, said Jones. He will go to Austin to appeal the decision, he said.

### Jack Brown Candidate For Council

Citing a need for increased efficiency and productivity in city government here, Lubbock businessman E. Jack Brown today became the second candidate to enter the race for the Place 2 slot on the City Council.

At a morning news conference, Brown told reporters that Lubbock has had responsible city management in the past, but he believes there is room for improvement. According to Brown, the city will continue to face a fight with inflation, and "a hard-nosed effort is needed" to increase efficiency and productivity in local government

One of the areas Brown said he is most concerned about is the development of a third water supply for Lubbock. "We may have waited too long already," he said. Brown was selected last spring to

serve on the city's Water Development Board, but he said to his knowledge, that board has not met since July. "I don't really know what the city administration is doing about it," he said.

However, Brown said he believes that Lubbock citizens must be told more about the city's water situation and what it will take to develop another water supply. Financing such a project will be "the biggest dollar item" Lubbock has ever had to face, Brown said. He stressed that local residents must be fully informed about the necessity of securing another water source so that they will be willing to foot the bill for it.

The Lubbock figure was in sharp contrast to that of Anderson, Ind., which had the highest unemployment rate in the nation, 15.2 percent, and experienced the sharpest oints from a 6.5 percent rate in December 1978.

Lubbock was one of 33 metropolitan areas that experienced a drop in the jobless rate of at least one percentage point over the year, declining 1.5 percentage points from 3.9 percent in December

Texas Employment Commission manager Bert Darden said, "For the last two or three years, this area of the state has had an unemployment rate considerably lower than the national rate and consistently lower than the state rate."

Darden said other pars of the country are experiencing high unemployment because of extensive layoffs in the automobile industry and related industries. "In November, Lubbock had only about

13,000 people in the county in manufacturing. There have been very few layoffs," he said

John Logan, executive director of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, said he thinks Lubbock's low unemployment rate reflects a strong economy which has prevailed in Lubbock the last few years. "Growth has been good and steady, with a lot

of jobs available," Logan said.

Some predict there may be only two GOP candidates left by the time the Texas primary is held.

'It's an uneasy situation among us handling the campaigns," said one statewide figure who did not want to be named. "Here we are trying to raise money and organize in Texas and our candidates are running around the other

have not yet scheduled a presidential straw vote for May 3. The decision for caagainst a "beauty contest," which will not directly affect selection of national convention delegates, will be made March 10 by the state committee.

Gov. Bill Clements, Texas' first GOP governor of the 20th Century, believes the Texas primary will be important to both parties, no matter the outcome of early primaries in other states.

"I do not think either race (Republican or Democratic) will be decided before it gets to Texas." Clements said. "The Texas primary will be terribly important to both parties."

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## **Doctor Cites Alcoholism Epidemic In America**

SAN DIEGO (AP) - Alcoholism is a have enough money to get drunk every tragic epidemic raging across America and growing progressively worse while becoming the third leading killer of Americans, a California physician says.

Dr. George D. Lundberg, co-chairman of the California Society for the Treatment of Alcoholism's education committee, said the epidemic is reflected "in the violence we find ourselves with in this country - be it homicides, suicides, battered wives or battered babies."

He said during the California Medical Association's annual meeting that 10 to 20 million Americans are alcoholics and "alcoholism, in all its ramifications ... is the third leading cause of death in the United States" after heart disease and

Lundberg of the University of California-Davis Medical School said the ramifications include such grisly statistics as alcohol's involvement in one of every three suicides and one out of every two traffic

He said half of all homicide victims have high blood-alcohol levels, noting that "a lot of people who get drunk get pretty obnoxious and they're in places where violence occurs.

"From a disease standpoint, the average alcoholic dies 12 years earlier than the non-alcoholic." he said. Liquor ravages the liver and pancreas and poisons skeletal muscles and probably heart muscles as well. Alcoholics are prone to lethal bouts with pneumonia and tubercu-

The problem has become "dramatically worse in the last 15 years," Lundberg said, although it's not yet as severe as that described by Benjamin Franklin in 1790 America or in reports from 16th century Sweden, "where it was extraordinarily rampant

Lundberg had no solutions to the modern epidemic, since "drug abuse and alcohol abuse are as old as history and nobody's ever been able to figure out how to solve any of them. The Swedes have been trying to deal with it since the

In America today, he said, almost everybody drinks, including an alarming number of high school and junior high school children, because "it's fun - it makes you feel good."

Alcohol is universally available, surprisingly inexpensive and Americans are more affluent than ever, he said. "It used to be that people could afford to get drunk just once a week. Now most folks

### TODAY'S EDITORIAL: Big Oil Gets Bum Rap

ARE THE high prices we are paying for imported oil real-l-ly responsible for the 13plus percent rate of inflation that is suffocat-

ing the American economy? One would certainly think so from listening to the politicians from both parties on the stump. But Heritage Foundation energy ana-

lyst Milton Copulos says "no. In fact, after a careful examination of oil prices over the past five years, he says it is eminently clear that oil prices have lagged behind, rather than led inflation.

The price for Saudi crude oil at the beginning of 1974, for example, was \$11.65 per barrel. That same barrel cost \$14.34 at the end of the first quarter of 1979.

When the 1979 price is adjusted for inflation and expressed in 1974 dollars, however, it comes to only \$10.13 per barrel-meaning the price actually declined 13 percent.

THERE CAN be little doubt that inflation is much on the minds of the American people these days. It has eroded the take-home pay of everyone—at a scandalous rate.

There can be little doubt that the oil companies, and by proxy the oil-producing nations, make attractive scapegoats.

The oil industry never has been the darling of the American public, and recent events in Iran and Afghanistan have given bears its maker's name stamped on its botrise to more than a little xenophobia.

Hard as it is to believe, until the most recent round of increases, the price of oil, says Copulos, had gone up at a rate considerably lower than the general inflation rate.

"Moreover," he writes, "domestically produced oil has been ... sold at a price roughly half that prevailing on the world market.

The November national average of 98.9 cents a gallon, when adjusted for inflation, only amounts to a 22.4 percent increase during the past five years.

THE INFLAMED rhetoric currently in vogue on the campaign trail might be excused were it based in fact, but this is not the case. It does a real disservice, therefore, to the public by adding further impetus to the pervasive belief that the increased cost of energy is solely to blame for inflation.

It is not big oil or big business, the traditional hobgoblins of politicians, who are responsible for the rampant inflation we are experiencing, but the politicians themselves.

It is they who have allowed The Fed to print more paper instead of encouraging productive activity. It is they who have placed barriers in the way of innovation. And it is they who have encouraged runaway federal spending on countless boondoggles.

Federal planners, though, have been more interested in what they call a Crisis Relocation Plan. It calls for evacuating more than 75 percent of urban populations to the countryside.

In Lubbock's case, people would go to counties west, north and east of the city, there to live as best they could off the land, in farm houses, campers or dugouts. "It's a loco plan." Payne himself characterizes

But, he says, there really hasn't been much in

the way of funds or plans either one coming down the federal pipeline in recent years.

"WE ARE BACK about where we were in the 1940s." he says. "Practically at zero."

There is, however, on paper a plan to keep government functioning in a crisis.

Actually, it's a pretty good plan. It calls for people in government and in govern-ment-related fields such as the Red Cross to take leadership roles and "interact" with people in the private sector.

For example, if there were massive piles of rubble to be dealt with in Lubbock, the public works and building inspection officials at City Hall who deal with contractors every day would call 'em up and get 'em going.

A contractor would get his crews together. Much better plan than trying to round up volun-

THERE ARE THOSE, like Tom Donaldson of 1510 83rd St., who have called Payne in recent days wanting to volunteer for a civil defense


Payne suggests to them that they contact the Red Cross or some other agency that might be pressed into service during an emergency.

But local government, he says, will have the responsibility for functioning and coordinating as best it can whatever resources might be available through federal and state agencies.

A moment later, the outlaw lay floundering in the ditch, and the car speeding past him. Within a mile or so we met an approaching car with several men returning to Clarksburg, W.Va., from the country club. My mother waved them down and

Within less than an hour, a well-armed citizens' posse had grabbed the would-be robber. He was easily identifiable and probably drunk.

But the reason he didn't get away with the crime was because a nervy young woman stepped on the accelerator and went on the attack. And the reason a criminal career met this interruption was because law-abiding citizens leapt into action.

IT IS NOT an experience which a boy forgets, and I never did. In the 1950s, the father of three, I lived in Baltimore, corner of Lanvale Street and Jenkins Alley.

It was a respectable neighborhood, one block from Memorial Episcopal Church where I was a vestryman at the time I moved to Washington. For all the respectability, we began to have holdups and purse-snatching, but not for long-

WASHINGTON-To give you a clearer concept of what the unemployment rate does and does not

mean, test yourself with the following short quiz. Write down whether each of the persons described below is "employed," "unemployed" or 'not in the labor force." Don't look at my answers before answering on your own.

(1) Peter Brown is 16 years old. He has no paying job but he works at least 20 hours a week helping on his father's chicken farm.

Answer: "Employed." Peter is counted as employed because he works at least 15 hours per week. If he worked less, he would be tagged: 'Not in the labor force." He is known as an "unpaid family worker."

(2) Juliana Smith was told she has a job as a cosmetic counter clerk at her local department store. She'll report to work in two weeks and so she no longer is looking for a job.

ANSWER: "UNEMPLOYED." Workers waiting to be recalled from a layoff as well as those waiting to start a new job within 30 days are

counted as unemployed.

(3) Bill Jones, 22, wants a regular job as a carpenter. He hasn't looked for work during the past month, though, because he thinks he lacks the necessary experience.

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
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

**Prepare To Unveil New Band** the ill-fated Lynyrd Skynyrd rock band say their music is still Southern and still raunchy, but they have a new act to unveil at the Superdome the night before

The act, part of an evening-long whoopla featuring the likes of Willie Nelson and Crystal Gayle, will be a comeback performance for the group, now named Rossington & Collins after Gary Rossington and Allen Collins, two members of the original cast.

The Lynyrd Skynyrd band, which specialized in high-energy rock, was put out of commission in October 1977 when the group's chartered plane crashed in Mississippi. Six people were killed, including three band members — among them the lead vocalist Ronnie Van Zant.

"It took us a long time to get back," said Rossington one of four Lynyrd Skynyrd members forming the nucleus of the new group.

In a telephone interview from their

headquarters in Jacksonville, Fla., Rossington and Collins said the group's music is similar to the Lynyrd Skynyrd style but not a duplicate of it.

There'll still be heavy emphasis on electric keyboard, with the same-style three guitars alternating between lead and rythym. But they have a female lead vocalist - Dale Krantz, who used to sing backup with Leon Russell. And most of the songs will be new.

We might do Free Bird (a Lynyrd Skynyrd biggie) because the people like it and we want to please them," Rossington said, "but we have our own songs."

He said, "We didn't want to fall back on Lynyrd Skynyrd because that was one group and that group is no more. We wanted to go ahead on our own."

Collins said the new band also wants to modify the Lynyrd Skynyrd image of hard-partying, good old Southern boys who had frequent run-ins with the law.

"It was a fad," Collins said. "We are a band from the South but not a Southern

Besides guitarists Rossington and Collins, the new group includes Lynyrd Skynyrd alum Billy Powell at keyboard and Leon Wilkeson on bass.

The Skynyrd drummer, Artimus Pylen was in line to be a part of the new group too, but he broke his leg in 12 places in September and has been replaced by Derek Hess.

Barry Harwood, an old friend from Florida, comes on at guitar and vocal. The Superdome performance Monday puts the band on stage right after a Mardi Gras Parade rolls through the dome.

## Salt Tablet Dangers

By LAWRENCE LAMB, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - Since sol-

diers or hikers take salt tablets to retain water, therefore permitting them to go for a longer period of time without water, why can't they just drink salt water'

DEAR READER - You've made a couple of presumptions that are not correct. In the first place, not all soldiers or hikers take salt tablets and they shouldn't. The only people who should ever take salt tablets are those who really lose a lot salt and that's through copious sweating. That's why salt loss usually occurs only in vigorous athletes or heavy laborers. They can get additional salt through food and liquids that contain salt.

. Thus, salt tablets are not to keep a person having to drink water. The salt is merely to replace the salt lost in sweat. In fact, if a person takes salt tablets and fails to drink adequate amounts of water at the same time, he may increase his chances of having

DEAR DR. LAMB - Recently my grandfather had some kind of a respiratory attack. He had been outside in the evening air when it first started. He said her couldn't catch his breath. He asked for a glass of hot water because he said afterward that it opened his chest up so he could breathe.

At the moment he was having the attack, his face turned purple, his eyes watered and he was unable to exhale. He could breathe in but he couldn't breathe it back out. Sometimes he looked swollen around the chest. Could it be his heart? The doctor said he had a slight heart attack a year ago but he hasn't been back to any doctors for any checkups since

DEAR READER - You're a very good observer. Your grandfather apparently had some form of asthmatic attack. Characteristically, these individuals can inhale but they have trouble exhaling. It's the effort they have to make to force the air out of the lungs that causes the wheezing one hears during an acute asthmatic at

The blueness of the face was because the lungs were not able to provide anough fresh oxygen to the circulation. We call this cyanosis.

It's possible that your grandfather had the typical allergic attack. But the rest of your story of his previous heart attack raises the possibility of cardiac asthma. This is a term we use for people who suddently develop fluid in the lungs because of heart disease.

The fluid causes swelling around the air sacs and triggers the asthmatic-like response. The attack goes away once the fluid is cleared from the

In any case, your grandfather should see his doctor right away. If he's having fluid in the lungs because of his heart, the doctor will want to give him some medicine which will help to relieve the condition and should improve his breathing. If he has the ordinary form of asthma, there are numerous medicines that can be used to help, too.

## Vote Count Pleases Candidates

By United Press International For years, the New Hampshire prima-

ry was the first milestone on the long road to the Democratic and Republican presidential nominating conventions.

This year, instead of anticipating the

effect its primary will have on the future presidential race, the Granite State is assessing how earlier votes will affect its primary results Feb. 26.

New Hampshire still has the first state primary, but it now follows a whole series of political events: delegate selection caucuses in Iowa, Arkansas and Maine, and preliminary straw votes in Maine and Florida.

Not to mention Puerto Rico, where registered voters are allowed to cast bal-\ lots in both the Republican primary next Sunday and the Democratic primary two weeks later.

Workers in all three Democratic presidential camps in New Hampshire found something to cheer about Monday in the Maine caucus results of the day before.

The president absolutely did win in Maine. We're very pleased ...." said Gov. Hugh Gallen, chairman of President Carter's campaign in the Granite State. Sen. Edward Kennedy's spokesman, Jeff Petrich, also said, "We're certainly

pleased ... I think this spells trouble for Carter in future primaries. Stephen Rivers of the Gov. Edmund

Brown campaign said the results were real encouraging to us. I think it makes it a three-way race.

But none was quick to project the Maine results into New Hampshire. Kennedy's campaign, meanwhile, estimated CBS News had cost them 3 or 4 percentage points by projecting Carter as a big winner in mid-afternoon, when a third of the caucuses had not yet begun.

The network interrupted a tennis

match to project Carter the winner with slightly more than half the vote, and Kennedy with less than one-third.


Final, unofficial figures gave Carter 45.2 percent of the delegates to Kennedy's 39.4 percent - not a large distinction in numbers. But holding an incumbent to less than half the vote is considered a plus psychologically. Brown finished with 13.8 percent.

Kennedy press aide Thomas South-

wick said the CBS projection "definitely had an impact, probably three or four points." He called it "outrageous."

But CBS spokesman Ernest Leiser said, "We were able to extrapolate, using our computers, and based on past results as to what would be expected to hap-

He conceded the language used in the broadcast - that Carter would win more than half the vote - "was unfortunate."



Powell dismissed Kennedy's claims of having done better than expected. When you win, you win," Powell said.

When you lose, you lose. He lost. But on his arrival back in Washington later. Powell told reporters, "I'm sure we were hurt" by Carter's failure to campaign actively. He said that policy will not be reassessed, however, until the hostages are released in Tehran.

Brown, who did not start campaigning until 10-days ago, said Maine gave his campaign a lift. But by failing to get the required 15 percent he won no actual delegates unless he can persuade every uncommitted delegate to sign on with him. If the unofficial figures are confirmed, Carter and Kennedy will split the delegates with 12 for Carter and 10 for Ken-

Press officer Bob Waite said Dole dismissed a report Monday in the McGraw-Hill magazine Medical World News, which printed doctors' reports on nine presidential candidates.

"In general," the magazine said, "the health reports of the 1980 presidential candidates range from typical to excellent for men of their ages.

California Gov. Edmund Brown Jr., of the 10 candidates solicited, turned down a request for medical information.

Waite quoted Dr. Freeman H. Cary, Dole's doctor and the attending physician to Congress, as saying, "I do not be-lieve Sen. Dole has ever had a heart attack. His (electrocardiograms) have variations that are normal for him. However, these variations show up with athletes and others who share his excellent

Neither Dole, who was campaigning in New Hampshire, nor Cary could be reached for comment Monday night.

The magazine, which is distributed to doctors, carried a report by Cary in which the doctor said abnormalities in a vector cardiogram, a heart test related to the electrocardiogram, showed Dole had evidence "suggesting (an) old IMI (inferior myocardial infarction)" or heart at-

Cary's report did not specify when the infarct occurred, but it said there were abnormalities in Dole's electrocardi-

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ogram as far back as 1977, although an exercise stress test at that time was normal. The stress test measures heart strength and can disclose problems of heart blood supply.

But in the magazine report, Cary said the 56-year-old Dole was in "excellent health" and "there is nothing in hishealth status to contraindicate his pursuit of the Presidency."

Ronald Reagan - The former California governor, who turned 69 on Feb. 6, had prostate surgery in 1967 and has been taking shots for allergies. A doctor said Reagan achieved the maximum expected heart rate for his age during a stress test last October and was in "remarkably good physical condition.

Howard Baker - The Tennessee senator had a CAT scan when he began to get headaches last September but they eventually went away.

## Clayton Vows To Reveal 'Plot'

HEREFORD — "I have done nothing wrong," Speaker of the Texas House Bill Clayton told cheering supporters here Monday night, pledging that he will "get to the bottom" of a wide ranging insurance bribery scandal.

"I'm convinced this is part of some plot; that there's something behind all this that we don't know about," Clayton told a crowd of 350 Deaf Smith and Oldham County residents gathered at a special appreciation dinner. "And I promise you, we'll get to the bottom of this."

The packed dinner marked the threetime speaker's first appearance since his implication in a Justice Department undercover probe that alleges he accepted \$10,000 from an FBI agent posing as a representative from a major insurance

Clayton is scheduled to testify Wednesday before a federal grand jury in Houston investigating bribery and kickback charges resulting from the latest FBI investigation of government officials and political figures from across the South and Southwest.

At a news conference Saturday, the millionaire farmer from Springlake said he accepted "a stack of \$100 bills" only to avoid embarrassing a supporter in front of a business associate. The speaker insisted the money was neither a bribe nor a political contribution because he

The last two or three days have been a difficult time," he admitted. "But my collegues in Austin have said they'll stand firm behind me and I'll vindicate myself from this political assassination."

With his wife, Delma, Clayton re-ceived the first key to the city of Hereford ever presented and a western painting from Hereford's National Cowgirl Hall of Fame. As he accepted the art work, Clayton turned to the crowd, grinned, and asked, "Is this a bribe?"

Clayton concluded his remarks by declaring, "Right will win. I have confid-

After the banquet, Clayton told The Avalanche-Journal, "We're going to whip this thing. If I have to be an example to find out what brings these attacks on, then I will. I'm really gratified with the turnout tonight and with the support we've gotten from all over Texas.

He told reporters, however, that he could not answer specific questions "under the advisement of my lawyer.'

"I'd like to speak openly and freely with you, but I can't because I don't know the answers," he said before re-

DALLAS (AP) - Texas Gov. Bill Clements says he hopes the public will not jump to conclusions and "crucify" Texas House Speaker Bill Clayton because Clayton has been linked to a federal bribery investigation.

Clayton is being investigated in connection with allegations that he accepted \$10,000 from some men who wanted help in securing an insurance contract with the state. The money was paid in connection with what the FBI calls Brilab, a "sting" operation in which money was allegedly paid to various officials in several states for help in obtaining insurance contracts.

Clayton is scheduled to testify Wednesday before a federal grand jury at

"I see no point in trying him by television or in the press," Clements said Mon-day night following a speech here.

Brilab is the second major undercover FBI investigation to surface within two weeks. The other probe, called Abscam for Arab scam, allegedly involves eight members of Congress as well as business-



For most of his adult life, Penn had to lay flat in a bed "in one room, only getng out once in awhile."

After spending almost a year in the hospital, where he had artificial hips implanted, Penn was accepted into the program and lives at the center during the week, returning to Wilmington on week-

"It's good to be meeting people," said Penn, who maneuvers his wheelchair expertly past the computer terminals. "It's

But Penn, who is able to walk with the help of crutches, is especially excited about the prospect of being financially self-supporting, something he hasn't known since he was a young man. He has also learned how to drive again. Bill Montgomery, manager of the cen-

ter, says Penn has gone from being totaldependent to taking care of himself. All the students in the class have discovered new worlds opening up for

them, Montgomery said. "Computer programming does not require a great deal of physical activity,' Montgomery said, "so it's an opportunity

for the severely handicapped." The project, a cooperative venture between the rehabilitation center and the Johns Hopkins University, opened in

April 1979 with 17 trainees. The students, ranging in age from 20 to 54, were referred to the center by vocational rehabilitation counselors in Maryland and Delaware.

They must be certified severely disabled; have a high school diploma or the equivalent; have a reading comprehension level of high school and score in the 30th percentile on a computer aptitude

test. Montgomery said. When the students finish the course. they will receive a joint certificate of achievement from the center and Johns Hopkins.

The trainees learn about the history of computers and different types of computer systems. They also get on-the-job experience during a month-long, workstudy internship with businesses in the Baltimore area.

It costs about \$2,500 a year for a day student in the class, while those who need room and board pay \$9,000, Montgomery said. But the state and federal governments pick up the tabs on the costs because the trainees - most of whom have never worked before - do not have money available, he added.

"One of the basic keys to the success of the program is the involvement of an industry advisory board," Montgomery

The board, made up of members from the business community, aids the program in course planning, provides guest lecturers, allows the students into the businesses for field trips and helps in the placement of the graduates in jobs.

One requirement is a basic knowledge of music. "People have to know the major scales and chords and be able to accompany themselves on an instrument."

"We'll also look at the business side of music, how to copyright a song and the law that goes with it, music licensing and various licensing agencies, publishing and analysis of the pop charts. We'll study Billboard Magazine, for example, which lists the top 100 songs in several categories each month," he said.

LAS CRUCES (Special) "Economic growth is not the only driving force in recent migration patterns to the West, especially for New Mexico,' says Robert Coppedge, Extension economist at New Mexico State University. Economic factors, such as energy, will continue to move development towards New Mexico. However, these developments are not the sole cause of growth." Some people come to New Mexico for

noneconomic reasons, the NMSU specialist says. They hope to find employment, but may not have a firm job prospect. 'In many cases they expect to receive

a lower salary," Coppedge says. The low-er salaries are acceptable in their quest for a better life. "This says something about the state's appeal."

Changing value systems in the world, and especially in many parts of the United States, underlie many of the shifting migration patterns toward rural areas and toward the West, Coppedge says. The desire or the need to reduce consumption, to live a simpler life, to enjoy life, is on the mind of many people even in the middle class.

Many businessmen, especially small businessmen, are also considering noneconomic factors when selecting busi-

Coppedge says, "Our development strategy at state and local levels should take these new factors into consideration. It is always hard to change. But our society as well as our economy is changing and we will fare better if we anticipate some of the changes."







H. Eugene Knight, pilot of the Capri-corn, testified Monday the "unknown vessel" was already west of the Sunshine Skyway Bridge over Tampa Bay and coming toward the 586-foot tanker when he radioed "No response," he told a Marine

Board of Inquiry investigating the Jan. 28 collision that was the Coast Guard's worst peacetime disaster. No one aboard the Capricorn was hurt. Knight said he "never took my eyes

off" the cutter which was "seven or eight ship-lengths" away when he first spotted About the time of Knight's second ra-

dio call from a walkie-talkie, the Blackthorn failed to start a slight right turn from one leg of the channel to the next, he testified. "I decided he was going to make the course change," the pilot said. "I decided ... that it had to be a critical crossing."

Knight said he ordered a slight left turn and then "hard left rudder" to avoid the cutter as it continued to move in the Capricorn's path.

He said he pulled two whistles to indicate the left turn and seconds later

pulled the four-whistle "danger signal." He said he also stopped the engine. As the two boats collided, Knight said, he could see a red light appear on

## Student Killed In Riot By Turkish Militants

IZMIR, Turkey (UPI) - Armed leftists clashed with police in the riot-torn Aegean port of Izmir where a student died today of injuries suffered in weekend violence.

About 200 militants remained barricaded inside a state-owned textile factory where they took refuge after clashes with police Sunday. The militants fled to the factory after firing at a police patrol vehicle and triggering riots that spread through the slums and the back streets.

Commando forces ringed the factory but there was no indication of when they would move in to evict the militarits.






**Energy-Saving Measures** 

WASHINGTON (AP) - Fifty-nine hospitals in the Philadelphia area are sharing a \$682,500 grant this year to evaluate energy-saving measures in hospital

The grant, aimed at cutting health care costs, is jointly funded by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare and Blue Cross of Greater Phil-

"If the institutions included in this project carry out the expected recomndations, we estimate these hospitals could save more than \$4.5 million annually in energy costs, said Leonard D. Schaeffer, administrator of HEW's Health Care Financing Administration.

Under the program, engineers will study hospital energy consumption patterns and recommend ways of reducing energy use.



The first hint of the underworld plan surfaced when a letter from Assistant Attorney General Philip Heymann was made public in federal court in Los Angeles on Friday. Heymann wrote that the FBI "is on the verge of developing evidence regarding a massive, nationwide conspiracy relating to the allocation of territories in the United States for certain types of illicit activities.'

The planned conclave was reminiscent of the Apalachin summit, which startled the nation with the strongest evidence to date that a national crime syndicate did, indeed, exist.

Until then, J. Edgar Hoover, the FBI director, had resisted urgings to investigate organized crime. After New York state police disclosed the Apalachin summit, Hoover was forced to pay attention to crime syndicates.

But it was not until the 1970s that the bureau focused on organized crime in a

When William H. Webster took over as director two years ago, he accelerated the investigations with more sophisticated techniques, often employing court-authorized wiretaps and agents working undercover for months at a stretch.

Evidence of the new gangland summit was developed partly from the Southwest insurance investigation, another long-running FBI probe of organized crime in the Midwest, and at least one other separate but interwoven investigation of organized crime.

Dozens of politicians and labor leaders have been implicated in the insurance investigation, which the bureau calls Brilab, a contraction of bribery-la-

Federal prosecutors are taking those cases to federal grand juries in Houston today and in New Orleans on Thursday.

The Brilab probe "ranges nationally, John Volz, the U.S. attorney in New Orleans, told a news conference Monday.

"I think you can safely say it involves all 50 states. By the time this is over, it will involve other jurisdictions ... other cities ... other states," he continued.

Another aspect of Brilab involves the Immigration and Naturalization Service and its former deputy, Mario Noto, now a Washington lawyer. The FBI is investigating whether No-

deputy, Rex Granum, passed this word to reporters after the Washington Post reported the United States apparently was willing to give the Soviet govern-ment additional time beyond Feb. 20 to pull its troops out of Afghanistan before calling for a boycott of the Summer Games in Moscow. Carter had set the Feb. 20 deadline

and said that if Russian troops were not withdrawn and the games were not postponed, moved or canceled, he would seek a boycott of the summer Olympics.

Granum said: "Our position is as it has been. Unless Soviet troops are withdrawn from Afghanistan by Feb. 20, the president would not support, nor would he expect the American people to support, U.S. participation in the Moscow

However, the Post quoted Lloyd Cutler, White House counsel, as saying the United States might consider entry if the Soviets withdraw from Afghanistan, or present a plan for withdrawal, by May 24 the date the U.S. Olympic Committee has to send in its entry.

Cutler was quoted as saying that the International Olympic Committee should be given "a reasonable amount of time" to make a decision about the Moscow Games. Carter's latest position was formally

presented to the IOC by a delegation from the U.S. Olympic Committee, the

# Delay Sought On Abortion Fund

government sought permission from Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall today to continue denying money for most welfare abortions.

The Justice Department asked Marshall to postpone the Feb. 15 effective date of a federal judge's order that federal money finance all poor women's medically necessary abortions.

U.S. District Judge John Dooling of New York City last month struck down as unconstitutional the so-called Hyde amendment, which restricts federal spending for Medicaid abortions to women whose lives are endangered by their pregnancy or who are victims or rape or

Persons opposed to expanded federal spending for abortions last week filed a similar request with Marshall, who handles emergency matters from New York

for the nation's highest court. On Monday, the full Supreme Court was asked to add the New York case to a similar one from Chicago before deciding the government's abortion-funding obli-

The justices already have agreed to study the Chicago case, in which a federal trial judge struck down the Hyde amendment in far less sweeping constitutional language than Dooling's ruling.

In today's emergency request to Marshall, government lawyers cited numerous "administrative problems" as one justification for postponing the effect of Dooling's order.

Noting that Justice John Paul Stevens and then the full court refused to issue such emergency relief in the Chicago case, the government said the New York case is different.

## **GAO Official Raps Energy Department**

plained increases in oil company profits, the Energy Department has refused to investigate why heating oil prices have gone up so sharply in the midst of an abundant supply of fuel, the General Accounting Office said today.

There seems to be an indifference on the part of the Department of Energy." GAO official F. Kevin Boland said.

Boland testified before a House energy subcommittee examining recent studies which show sharp increases in heating oil prices which the studies say go well beyond explanations of inflation, operating costs or increases in the cost of imported oil.

There was no immediate response from the Energy Department, whose officials were scheduled to testify later.

The House subcommittee conducting the inquiry is chaired by Rep. Toby Moffett. D-Conn., a consistent critic of Carter administration energy policies.

Boland said a GAO investigation of

heating oil profits made by refiners shows that profits from 1976 to 1978 went up about 2 cents per gallon. In the first seven months of 1979, he said the figures rose to 8.6 cents per gallon.

The figures include operating costs,

but Boland said there is no explanation why the refiners raised their prices so dramatically during 1979.

Heating oil prices in many areas have doubled compared with a year ago, and in New England have now reached \$1 per gallon in some states.

From January 1979 1979. Boland said, natural gas prices nationally rose by 18 percent, electricity rose by 13 percent, while heating oil costs to the consumer rose by 59 percent.

Boland said the Energy Department has refused to answer who is responsible for looking into rising heating oil costs.

A GAO report on which Boland based his testimony says, "It appears the Department of Energy is not on top of this situation and is not in a position to say what current heating oil prices are equit-

We believe that the Department of Energy's inattention to the escalating heating oil prices ... borders on indifference and incompetence," the GAO said.

One study done by a House consumer subcommittee said consumers may have been overcharged by as much as \$3 billion over the last year. Heating oil prices have been decon-

trolled since 1976. Liberals such as Moffett have urged that controls be reimposed as a means of preventing "price gouging" by some refiners and retailers. Opponents of decontrol say prices

should be permitted to seek their natural. levels to insure a steady supply. Moffett said Monday, "DOE's failure to assure equitable heating oil prices is

inexcusable, irresponsible and simply unconscionable." The consumer subcommittee study



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# Clinic Measures Performances Of Businesses

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Scores of businesses come each year to Dr. Sidney Schoeffler's clinic for their regular physical checkup - Rate of return, productivity, market share, tactics, cash flow and the like

The companies are put through a detailed set of tests in which their performance is measured against standards obtained from a data base of 2,000 business units that report in strict confidence to the clinic.

When the data analysis is completed, company strengths and weaknesses are revealed as clearly as those of a human being whose pulse, blood pressure and lung capacity are examined in a hospital

Schoeffler and his staff operate the Strategic Planning Institute, a nonprofit think tank into which 250 member companies pour data about their performance, and from which general health standards emerge.

Input is understandably enormous-

and varied. It comes from large corporations operating many business units, and small companies with one or a few units. And from foreign as well as domestic

All members (their dues range from

about \$10,000 to \$20,000 a year) report in a commmon format what they do about pricing, expansion, personnel, marketing They describe the market and their

share: expanding, shrinking, local, national. The competition: few or many, small or large, similar product or differentiated. And results: growth, cash flow, The tests seek to determine the

PIMS, or profit impact of market strategies. The data bank establishes a par for the various marketing strategies, based on companies with similar characteris-

If profits are below par there is strong evidence of an operating problem," says Schoeffler. "Either that or the company is in the middle of a price

war." Additional tests bring out the facts.

An audit of productivity follows, often giving early warning of poor management decisions. It might be found, for example, that the company has increased labor productivity 1 percent, but only by spending 1.5 percent on costly equipment. Yes, there is good productivity and

Marketing-type information - sales force and advertising expenses as a percentage of sales - are examined for each business unit of a member company. Depending on goals, market share and other characteristics, a par figure can be provided for sales or advertising expenses.

Changes in market share are examined. If a company increases its share by 3 percent, and par for a company of its characteristics is 5, it can lead to a revision of tactics. If the reverse is true, it can mean either of two things: a temporary windfall or superior tactics.

A cash flow (cash generated versus cash used) test follows. Because of high borrowing costs, it can reveal critical flaws for small, growing companies in need of cash. Or, if the company has a large market share and little chance to expand, it might suggest investment pos-

Few companies fail to benefit from what Schoeffler calls the tactics optimality test, sixth in the series. Look-alikes in the data base are sought and their tactics matched against the company being ex-amined. Some of the tactics from the base have led to success, some to failure. Is the examined company falling into the same traps?

A company's entire portfolio of business units is examined. Is the mix of units well balanced? Which of the units are performing well? Where are the weaknesses? What corrective action can

The final tests deal not with a company's existing businesses but with the future. Even before that stage is reached, however, Schoeffler and his staff have come to a great generality:

have serious problems.

If it's the latter, a decision must be made: With the knowledge gained, can the company deal with the problems on its own or does it need further assistance

Probably one-half the member com-panies decide they do need assistance, and thus sign up with the institute's con-sulting arm, PIMS Associates, paying a negotiated fee in addition to the regular membership arrangement.





LAKE PLACID, N.Y. (AP) - Hounded by continuing political problems and haunted by logistical nightmares, the Games of the XIII Winter Olympiad began on schedule today in this picturesque village nestled in the Adirondack Moun-

The official opening of the Games, complete with the ceremonial parade of nearly 1,300 athletes, is scheduled for Wednesday. But the hockey competition got a jump on the other sports with six games on today's schedule.

For American athletes, the 1980 Games could yield a record winter medal haul. The United States won 10 medals in the 1976 Winter Games at Innsbruck and never has captured more than the dozen it won the last time Lake Placid hosted these Games in 1932.

But stars like speed skaters Eric and Beth Heiden, cross country skier Bill Koch, figure skaters Linda Fratianne and Charlie Tickner and skiers Phil Mahre and Cindy Nelson could make this a memorable Olympiad for the United

Most of the hockey interest centered on the awesome Soviet Union team, considered almost certain to win the hockey gold. The Russians open against Japan tonight. In other games, Norway meets Czechoslovakia, Canada plays Holland, the United States faces Sweden, West Germany opposes Romania and Poland takes on Finland.


"I wanted to play in the Southwest Conference, at a school where I thought I'd get a chance to play quickly," Wells said. He said he had been considering Texas and North Texas State.



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

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
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## Foreign Languages Easy To Learn, Teacher Says

BELOIT, Wis. (AP) - Webster's defines clarity as "directness, orderliness and precision of thought or expression."

Hence, Bud Clarity is aptly named, in this or any of the other four dozen or so languages he speaks and writes.

Clarity retired recently as a linguistics professor at Beloit College, where he taught 35 different foreign languages. Students would come to him, an-

nounce what language they wanted to learn and Clarity would teach it to them. "I can learn a language today and teach it to you tomorrow," he says matter of factly.

Clarity, a 66-year-old bachelor, admits he was often only a day or two ahead of the student, depending on the language. But he taught them all, from Arabic to

"Once you know the system of a language, you may lose the vocabulary, but you still have the system," he says. "By system, I mean each language has a way it all fits together in theoretic patterns." His first system was Irish, the ancient

Gaelic spoken at home by his parents. He picked up Latin and French in high chool, but really didn't begin collecting languages until he was out of work for five years during the Depression. With a short-wave radio, he listened

for hours to broadcasts from Poland. Russia and Norway. He went to libraries for books and taught himself those sys-

He majored in German in college and was an Army intelligence officer interrogating German prisoners in World War II. He then taught at Cornell and Louisiana State universities before going to Saudi Arabia in 1950 as a language con-

sultant for an oil company.
"I didn't know any Arabic at the time," he says. "But if you can learn one language, you can learn another.'

He spent 12 years teaching the company's American workers the general and technical work-related aspects of various Arabic languages, and returned to Beloit to teach German in 1962. Some Jewish students expressed an

interest in modern Hebrew. Clarity didn't know any, but he organized the class and from then on would teach any language a student wanted to learn. "I had had the experience of nobody

wanting to help me," he explains. Whatever language they wanted, I'd teach it."

He says he is an expert phonetician and loves alphabets — "I know dozens of them" - but believes anyone can learn foreign languages.
"It enriches your life," he says. "It's

human-oriented. You shouldn't just study the language. Look at the history, cook the food, listen to the music and learn the folk dances."

He believes children should be taught languages because their ability to pronounce odd sounds begins to fade at age 16, but says much of this country's foreign language education is wasted.

"If you want to make progress in a language, you have to have a goal, preferably to visit the country," Clarity says. "I don't believe you can learn to speak a language in the classroom. You have to go to the place where it's used if you

Keeping his own languages up via short-wave radio and planning more trips abroad. Clarity wants to spend his retirement on an academic project: finding the vowels that were somehow dropped out of Egyptian thousands of years ago. But first he has to learn Coptic, a language that died out somewhere around the 16th century.

He suggests that people tracing their family "roots" also learn the languages of the ancestors, and advises, "languages like Norwegian, Swedish and Dutch are probably easiest for the English speaker

He says modern Greek is his personal favorite for pure beauty, but, "Italian feels good in your mouth. It has good vowel quality, a great language for sing-ers. You show emotion by lengthening the vowels

"French has too many nasals to sound good, but it has been used beautifully."
He likes Russian for its expressiveness, thinks Cambodian sounds odd be-

He likes Swahili's vowels and finely 'the toughest" to learn.






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## 'Aggressive Scheduling' **Backfired For Network**

LOS ANGELES (AP) - "Aggressive scheduling," it was called, a programming strategy aimed at exploiting a wealth of popular shows and, perhaps, setting the course of a prime time television dynasty.

ABC's plan backfired, or at least. sputtered, and the result is that ABC is engaged in a ratings battle with CBS that is closer than most TV observers imagined possible at the beginning of the sea-

Interestingly, the man responsible for ABC's 1979-80 schedule says he would do it again, that the shifting of popular shows — most notably, "Mork and Min-dy," "Fantasy Island," "Laverne and Shirley" — was sound strategy subverted by unpredictable circumstances.

Tony Thomopoulos, president of ABC Entertainment, considers the mixed reviews accorded his strategy:

"I think you can look at it from the marvelous perspective called 'hindsight.' But given the same set of circumstances - knowing what we knew then, not what we know now - we'd probably make the same changes with some minor adjust-

"The moves we made were not totally successful, but they did accomplish certain things. They did allow us to establish a hit with a show called 'Benson' and they did allow us to build another hit with 'Hart to Hart,' which has had some very positive effects for the network.

Actually, that is a matter open to question. "Laverne and Shirley" was moved from its very successful Tuesday night slot to lead the way for "Benson" on Thursdays. But "Laverne and Shirley" lost a substantial portion of its audience in the move, and has shown no signs of fully recovering in its new Monday night slot

And "Fantasy Island" was moved from its Saturday night slot to give "Hart to Hart" the advantage of "Fantasy Island's" former "Love Boat" lead-in; but "Fantasy Island" couldn't maintain itself on Fridays, and "Hart to Hart" became a hit not in that Saturday slot, but in its new Tuesday night time period.

"The 'Mork and Mindy' move from Thursday to Sunday was, as far as I'm concerned, and even in hindsight, a posi-tive move for us. Even though it sat NOTA MUTA

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averaged a 22 rating. If we didn't have 'Mork and Mindy' in that time period, I wonder what would have happened.

What did happen was that "Mork left the realm of 38 and 40 ratings scores for a man to man encounter with CBS Archie Bunker, and Bunker prevailed:

"There is no taking away from the fact that CBS scheduled very smartly on Sunday. But at the same time, there was an enormous benefit accrued to them by the lead-in of football."

Here, Thomopoulos has a point. He refers to a circumstance called "football runover," which worked strongly in CBS favor during the NFL season. Several times during the season, a CBS-televised game would run past its estimated threehour link, carrying viewers straight into '60 Minutes.'

Viewers were inclined to stick with CBS rather than miss the end of a game, and switching to the other two networks at game's end meant joining a program

The runovers led into '60 Minutes,' which carried into their 8 o'clock shows,

think if there was one factor we underestimated, it was the number of runovers and the impact of those runovers on 7 o'clock in the evening. I don't think we realized that circumstances would allow for that number of runovers. That's not to take anything from CBS, that's just the circumstances.

There was another factor at work on Sunday — the disappointing showing of ABC's "The Associates," the critically acclaimed sitcom about a Wall Street law firm that lasted just a few weeks before being lifted from the schedule.

"We scheduled 'The Associates' in a time period (following 'Mork' on Sunday) that was just too early. I think that, deep down inside, we might have known it was too early, but we were just wishing that it would be an early appeal show. It didn't turn out that way, but it did turn out to be a very good show, and in early March we'll bring it back at a later time

"Was our strategy totally successful? No, it wasn't. But I still think it was a sound strategy.

### Influenza Strain Spreading

ATLANTA (AP) - A mild strain of influenza is spreading across the United States, affecting mostly children and young adults in sporadic cases, health of-

The national Center for Disease Control has received reports of Influenza B. strains in 19 states, while state health officials in one additional state also have reported the disease.

The CDC said in its Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report that Influenza B has been confirmed in Georgia, Missouri, Montana and Texas during the latest reporting period. Oklahoma health officials also have reported Influenza B in that state.

Previously, the CDC said Influenza B has been confirmed in Arizona, California, Illinois, Wisconsin, Delaware, New Jersey, Colorado, Utah, Oregon, Hawaii, Alaska, Michigan, New York, Ohio and Washington.

A more virulent strain, Influenza A, has been diagnosed in a 59-year-old Arkansas resident, the third such case since the beginning of the current flu season, the center said.
