# End Of Hostage Crisis'Imminent'

## Winter Chill In Dramatic **Encore Here**

WINTER returned to the South Plains in a rush late Thursday when a vigorous thunderstorm boomed into the area, spreading subfreezing temperatures, freezing rain, hail and several inches of snow across West Texas and Eastern New Mexico.

The storm reached Lubbock shortly before 9 p.m. and within an hour had bombarded the city with rain and hail as temperatures dropped 15 degrees in less than hour.

The National Weather Service officially reported only a trace of moisture at the airport by 10:30 p.m., although some parts of town received more than an inch of rain and BB-size hail during that time.

Storm Displays Power The high today in Lubbock is expected to be only 28 degrees; a drop of some 31 degrees from the 59 recorded Thursday afternoon. Lows tonight will be in the mid-teens, while the high Saturday is expected to rise only slightly to 32 de-

The powerful thunderstorm, spitting thunder and lightning, cut a wide swath across the middle of the Panhandle and South Plains during the afternoon and evening hours. One particular cell dis-played its power Thursday afternoon when it tore into Curry County, New Mexico, ripping the roof from a house and overturning two mobile homes at Melrose, near Clovis.

After 5 p.m., electricity in most portions of rural Curry County, including Melrose, Fort Sumner and Santa Rosa. had been knocked out as the storm battered power poles to the ground. The power remained out late Thursday, but New Mexico state police reported no storm-related injuries.

the Shallowater area about 8 p.m., on the heels of a similar thunderstorm that boomed into Amarillo about dusk. Portions of Amarillo were inundated by as much as four inches of rain and snow before daylight. Levelland also reported heavy rain and hail about 9 p.m. Light rain and drizzle were reported Thursday across most of the Panhandle.

Temperatures plunged dramatically as the massive front moved across the area, with the chilly effect heightened by a stiff northwesterly breeze that forecasters said would drop wind chill factors across the area to about zero. North of Lubbock, the wind chill factor could cording to the National Weather Service.

Rain and snowfall measuring 1 to 3 inches is expected for most of the South Plains by tonight, when the weather is expected to begin clearing. Traveladvisories issued late Thursday will remain in effect for most of the area, with highway travel on any but major routes being dis-

The front delivered 5 inches of snow in parts of Kansas about midday Thursday, with portions of Oklahoma receiving 3 or more inches. Two inches of new

## **Burned Prison Gym Sifted** In Body Hunt

SANTA FE (AP) - University scientists sifting through the rubble of the New Mexico State Penitentiary found bones in the burned out gymnasium Thursday, but officials were uncertain whether the remains were those of about 14 inmates still unaccounted for.

Some inmates who survived the weekend reign of terror at the maximum-security prison said leaders of the revolt stacked and burned bodies in the gutted

Deputy District Attorney Dick Baker said three bodies burned beyond recognition were removed from the gym Monday. He said it could not be immediately determined whether the bones discovered by forensic anthropologists Thursday were from those bodies.

The team of six anthropologists, from the University of New Mexico, were using yard rakes to comb the rubble in the gym. One researchers sifted debris with

## Force Based In City Nets Theft Suspects

eration, a virtually statewide undercover law enforcement group based in Lubbock has netted eight felony suspects and has recovered more than \$25,000 in property reported stolen across the city, according to a member of the new group.

And Thursday afternoon, a Lubbock County grand jury returned seven felony indictments against four suspects ed by the six-week-old "Lubbock (

Task Force. The clandestine, 13-member squau is a cooperative effort of four law enforcement agencies, a Task Force member told The Avalanche-Journal, and has been tracking suspected burglars and

thieves since the first week in January. While the bulk of the force - seven members - comes from the ranks of the police department, other participating officers include three Department of Public Safety agents, a sheriff's department deputy and two investigators from the criminal district attorney's office, according to the force member, who asked not to be identified.

Also lending additional assistance to the new squad, the member said, are Texas Rangers and DPS narcotics agents.

Although the unit has been working the streets on a 24-hour basis since the first of the year, the concept began tak-ing shape in November 1979. The coordinating effort was initiated by the criminal district attorney's office.

Force members now are operating on a 24-hour surveillance basis with suspected burglary and theft rings as prime targets, the squad member said. However, if the force proves effective in reducing the city's consistently climbing property crime rate, the squad's duties will be expanded to help combat other criminal

The four-department unit operates under the code name "catch" and uses the adage "it takes a thief to catch a

thief" as one of its prime weapons.

The force member said Thursday that much of the confidential information relayed to squad members is gained from nown criminals and channeled through the different departments.

After receiving information, force members armed with two-way radio and night scopes then will begin the time-consuming process of virtually following every step a suspect takes. If a suspect has not been spotted committing a crime within seven days, the plainclothes officers will drop their investiga-

## **New President** Blasts 'Rebels'

WITH TOUGH talk and stern action, President Abolhassan Bani Sadr hammered away Thursday at the U.S. Embassy militants' remaining power and prestige among the Iranian people, as reports persisted that the American hostages might be freed

For the second straight day, the new Iranian president blasted the young Moslem radicals publicly, calling them "rebels against the government." And the Revolutionary Council, led by Bani Sadr, took action against them, restricting their access to national radio and television.

Trying To Undercut Militants' Status

It appeared Bani Sadr was trying to undercut the militants' status as revolutionary heroes in preparation for a resolution of the hostage crisis being worked out behind

A Kuwait newspaper, the weekly Al Khadaf, reported from Tehran that the release of the approximately 50 American hostages at the embassy was "imminent The paper, which did not identify the source of its information, said the number of militants at the embassy had been reduced from 400 to 50.

Student Replacements Sought

It said U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim was trying to persuade Bani Sadr to pressure the students to leave the embassy and have them replaced by regular Irani-

At the United Nations in New York, a spokesman for Waldheim said he could not confirm the Al Khadaf report. The spokesman, Rudolf Stajduhar, said Waldheim had not talked with U.S. or Iranian officials in the previous 24 hours, but was closely following developments in Tehran "which indicate that the authorities are trying to stabilize the situation under the presidency" of Bani Sadr.

U.S. officials were cautious in commenting on the Kuwaiti report.

Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher said on NBC-TV's "Today" show the situation was "somewhat promising." Spokesman George Sherman said the State Department had no evidence to confirm the report. And Hodding Carter. chief department spokesman, said, "I do not see any imminent release of the hos-

Terms Still Uncertain

Carter said the U.S. government was still uncertain about Iran's terms for releasing the hostages, who spent their 96th day in captivity Thursday.

Waldheim has been trying to work out an arrangement whereby an international commission would be established to investigate the alleged crimes of the exshah's regime, in return for release of the hostages. But U.N. officials say the timing of the release - whether it will be as the commission begins its work or after it is completed - remains unsettled.

Adding to the confusion, some Iranian officials still say they believe the hostages cannot be freed until the ousted Shah Mohammad is returned.

Air Time Withdrawn

The Council Thursday ordered the state-owned broadcast system not to allow the embassy militants any more air time to publicize such allegations. The Council said it would first review any in criminating documents the militants

In a second rebuke of the militants. Bani Sadr denounced them in a frontpage editorial in Tehran's leading newspaper, Kayhan.

Why do those students who call themselves followers of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini violate the constitution by their illegal acts?" he asked.

He asked why the militants did not let those they condemn defend themselves.

Is this Islamic or Stalinistic? It is the judiciary system that can investigate whether some Iranians have had corrupt links with America, not you.... In any part of the world such rebels against the government would be punished severely. But we, as a revolutionary government have not done that."

American Visitors Rebuffed In another blow to the militants, Ira-

nian authorities refused to allow a 49member American group invited to Tehran by the militants to spend the full 10 days there they had planned. The group, invited to Iran by the young radicals to help them convey their positions to the U.S. public, was given only four-day vi-

On Thursday morning, the Americans visited the Tehran cemetery where many of those killed by the army in anti-shah protests in 1978-79 are buried.

## **Demo Official Denies** Texans Down On Party

HAVING a Republican governor in office shouldn't hurt the chances of Texas Democrats during the upcoming election, a party official said Thursday in Lubbock, but the candidates aren't tak-

ing anything for granted either. Deralyn Davis, vice chairman for the state Democratic party, doesn't predict a great drop in the number of Democrats in the state legislature in the 1980 election. Though political experts have predict-ed that Democrats will lose the farm vote because of President Carter's embargo on grain shipments to the Soviet Union, Mrs. Davis cites the results of the Iowa caucus as evidence of the party's strength with the farmers.

"Farmers are patriots too," she said This is a temporary problem." The embargo would have come about regardless







the constitutional process and pretend SALT II has been ratified.

Interesting as the monomania of the SALT II lobby is (Carl Marcy of the American Committee on East-West Accord, a detente lobby, had a column similar to Warnke's, the same day, in the New York Times). Warnke's proposal is not interesting for its originality. Indeed, what he proposes

is national policy.

Marcy says. "According to the State Department, the principle of international law, shared by the United States and the Soviet Union, that is applicable is that a state should refrain from taking actions which would defeat the object and purpose of a treaty it has signed' until the treaty has been ratified and enters into force.

But Marcy is quoting too selectively. He omits something from the language of the principle, something inconvenient to his argument.

THE PRINCIPLE actually is that a state should refrain from actions which would defeat the pur pose of a treaty "until it shall have made its inten-

tions clear. The principle properly pertains to a normal in-

terval between the signing of a treaty and the reasonably expeditious conclusion, one or the other, of the ratification process.

But surely the principle should cease to be controlling when the interval is significantly (or, as with SALT II. indefinitely) extended because those who negotiated the treaty know that the body that must ratify it has insurmountable objections to the treaty.

Even before Afghanistan, the administration strenuously tried hard and decisively failed to find sufficient votes to ratify SALT II. If the votes had been found, ratification would have been pressed.

SO THERE certainly is a sense in which the United States, through the constitutionally responsible Senate, has "made its intentions clear." When Carter bowed to the inevitable and asked the Senate not to take up SALT II, the Chicago Sun-Times produced a bizarre headline: "Carter Wins SALT Delay." The Chicago Cubs' home town has forgotten what a win looks like.)

Warnke favors a U.S. policy of compliance-without-ratification, but does not pick an inspiring pre-

The U.S. Soviet treaty limiting nuclear weapons tests to yields of 150 kilotons is treated as binding although the Senate has never acted on

Yes, the United States has complied with the treaty without ratifying it. The Soviet Union has violated it.

OVER THE years. Warnke has made some celebrated, and peculiarly condescending, observations about the Soviet Union. The most memorable was this:

The United States is the Soviet Union's only superpower model." So assuming that the Soviet Union is mindless and imitative, and that it is disposed to emulate us, then unilateral U.S. restraint regarding arms should elicit reciprocal restraint.

Warnke was wrong. The Soviets were not moved to emulate our gleaming example. The words of Harold Brown, the Secretary of Defense, should be the epitaph for Warnkeism; "When we build, they build. When we cut, they build."

Undaunted. Warnke now offers another observation about the Soviet Union, this one, too, expressing a laconic condescension toward the Soviet rulers. It concerns the curious inability to keen their minds on the rules of the game:

THE SOVIET leadership seems to be losing sight of the cardinal rule of superpower competition-that neither side improves its own

## **Spies Out In Cold Die** From Over-Disclosure



WASHINGTON-For the past few years, a systematic campaign has been conducted in this country and abroad to expose case officers of the Central Intelligence Agency and name others al-

legedly working for the CIA Together with other attacks on our intelligence services, this onslaught has had a demoralizing and disruptive impact. In two well-known instances, individuals named as CIA operatives

were subsequently murdered All of which has caused the House Intelligence Committee to come up with a bill to prevent unauthorized disclosure of the names of intelligence

As I see it, the threshold question in this debate is: Whose side is one on? I mean this literally

THE ATTACK on our intelligence agencies and the attempt to expose their operatives is based on the premise that the intelligence services of the U.S. are enemies to be relentlessly combatted.

You need only scan some of the relevant literature to grasp the viewpoint of those engaged.

In one such publication, for example, case officers of the CIA are referred to as "latent criminals" who are engaged in "atrocities" and who should be encouraged to redeem themselves by returning "to the human race.

No such epithets are aimed at the Soviet KGB or the Cuban DGI, nor are these Communist espionage and intelligence networks targeted for similar exposure.

Such attitudes are understandably in the case of explicit enemies of the U.S. such as East Germany -whence came the exposure of AID official Dan Mitrione, falsely identified as a CIA agent and subsequently murdered by the Tupamaros (who used the exposure as justification for their action).

THEY ARE less comprehensible coming from people who profess devotion to the free institution of the West in general, and of the U.S. in particu-

To the degree that it is merely confused, the recent animus against the CIA had its origin in the

time when we were being assured the Cold War was over and done with. Recent events have served to correct that mistaken perspective, and to demonstrate that we need to insure our intelligence operatives can function effectively, and when possible safely.

The Soviet invasion of Afghanistan and other recent actions by the Communists have demonstrated all too clearly that the Cold War is by no means over-that it is, if anything, intensifying, and that the principal enemy confronting the American people is the apparatus of international Commun-

BY THE same token, the crisis in Iran has shown that our intelligence agencies are, or should be, an essential component of our defen-

Most observers are now willing to concede the crippling of our intelligence agencies severely limited our ability to monitor and forecast events in

In addition, the seizure of American hostages at our embassy and the charges lodged against them make it plain that our personnel abroad, particularly those allegedly connected with intelligence, are targeted for hostile actions by our adversaries.

From all of which I think it fair to conclude that systematic efforts to secure and publicize the names of our intelligence operatives overseas is fully comparable to publishing military information useful to the enemy.

From which it follows that Congress has not only the right, but the imperative duty, to impose sanctions against such disclosures.

The bill being considered by the House Intelligence Committee aims at this objective, and while it is by no means perfect as it stands, it is a step in the right direction.

FEDERAL AID The House rejected, 185 for and 207 against, an amendment stipulating that some \$200 million in antirecession aid to cities could not be released until the national jobless rate hit 7.5 per cent. This would have made it tougher for certain cities - those hardest hit by recession — to get the "targeted fiscal assistance." Defeat of the amendment left five per cent as the trigger for release of the aid. The amendment was offered to a bill (HR 5980) headed for final passage and the Senate.

Rep. Clarence Brown, R-Ohio, the sponsor, said the 7.5 per cent trigger would benefit non-urban constituencies such as his own, whose "hard-earned money" supples much of the aid to large

Rep. Jack Brooks, D-Tex., an oppo-nt, said that if it raised the threshold from five to 7.5 per cent the House would bring about defeat of the entire "targeted fiscal assistance" section.

Members voting "yea" wanted to make it more difficult for some of the nation's cities to get the special federal aid.

AGENT ORANGE By a vote of 28 for and 59 against, the Senate refused to kill an amendment to speed up federal research into any health damage inflicted on Vietnam veterans by Agent Orange. The herbicide was used as a defoliant in Vietnam, and there is evidence that it can severely harm persons who come into contact with it and their offspring.

This vote okayed the softer of two legislative approaches before the Senate. It shelved a proposal to give the VA one year to set up a benefits program for veerans who are at least 10 per cent disabled by Agent Orange. It came during debate on a Veterans Administration bill (HR 5288), passed and sent to conference with the House

Sen. John Heinz, R-Pa., who voted yes, said the more extreme approach was needed to force the VA "to the point where they can and will respond to the needs of Vietnam veterans who have been disabled by Agent Orange."

Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., who voted no and favored more research into Agent Orange, said "we must legislate responsibly and on the basis of valid findings, which we do not at present have."

Senators voting "nay" want Agent Orange to undergo more research before the VA starts paying benefits to those disabled by it.

Sens. Pete Domenici, R (N.M.), and Harrison Schmitt, R (N.M.), voted

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D, voted "nay." Sen. John Tower, R, did not vote DISABILITY BENEFITS On a 47-47 tie vote, the Senate failed to prevent a

cut in Social Security disability benefits. Left intact was legislation preventing a person getting benefits in excess of 85 per cent of his or her predisability pay. Combined with incentives to put the disabled back on a payroll, the limit would apply to persons coming on disability rolls after Jan. 1, 1980. The overall bill (HR 3236) was headed for final passage and conference with the House.

Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, who favored leaving benefits at 100 per cent of salary, said the cut to 85 per cent would amount to Congress "breaking its word" to the American worker.

Sen. Russell Long, D-La, who favored the 85 percent ceiling, called it "foolhardy" for Congress to "make it so generous that people make more money by being disabled or being declared disabled than they are working on a job." Senators voting "nay" favored the 85

per cent ceiling.
Bentsen, Tower, Domenici and
Schmitt voted "nay."
THE TERMINALLY ILL The Senate

adopted, 70 for and 23 against, an amendment enabling the terminally ill to immediately receive Social Security disability payments. The amendment, which eliminates the present five-month waiting period, would increase Social Security payments by an estimated \$711 million over

five years.

Sen. Warren Magnuson, D-Wash., a supporter, said it is unjust that the terminally ill "often die before they get a

chance to use the Social Security benefits they paid for all those years. Sen. Russell Long, D-La., an opponent, called the amendment budget-bust-ing and said: "When we tell people with

cancer, You are going to die, you are disabled, you cannot do anything, it tends to make those people give up."

Senators voting "yea" favored the mendment.

Q. Although I am a young man, I am alarmed by statistics showing that many people reach retirement with income be-low the poverty level. To avoid that fate, I feel I must either die before I retire or

start an investment program - now. I am self-employed and very busy at my work. So I don't have a lot of time to spend managing my investments. What do you recommend?

A. Don't plan on dying before retirement time. But do get an investment plan into operation. By recognizing the financial problem you face, you're a giant step up on most people - young

Because you're self-employed, you can start a Keogh plan, through which you can tuck away 15 percent - up to \$7,500 - of your annual income and not pay income tax on that money each year. Also, the income your Keogh plan investment earns - in dividends and-or interest - will be tax-deferred.

You will have to start paying income taxes on your Keogh plan money when you start drawing it out. But that will be after retirement - when you should be in a lower tax bracket.

So, the natural advice to you is to start a Keogh plan.

Where? Because you don't have the time to manage your own investments, the answer comes easy. In a mutual fund of the "no-load" variety - where you won't be hit with commission charges.

Q. I have approximately \$8,500 to invest for retirement to supplement the pension fund I will eventually receive from my employer. After reading about them in your column, I wrote to the No-Load Mutual Fund Association, Valley Forge, Pa., 19481, and obtained information about no-load funds.

And, thanks to your column I studied the Wiesenberger Investment Companies Service manual at the public library. As a result. I narrowed my proposed investment choices down to a few no-load

Now, however, another means of investing has been suggested - an annuity. Can you comment on the advantages and disadvantages of the annuity versus noload method of investing?

A I would lay long odds that the suggestion" for the annuity came from a salesperson - who should collect a fat commission or other fee out of your \$8,-500. if you go the annuity route.

My suggestion to you is to find out the total charges that would be extracted from your money, if you put it into an annuity. If it's a "variable" annuity, it comes under U.S. Securities & Exchange Commission regulations and all charges must be spelled out in the prospectus. If it's a "fixed" annuity, it comes under state regulation and it is often difficult to find out all the charges.



"The political situation is very volatile right now," Briscoe said. "We've seen the Democratic candidates reverse their position in the polls in only a short time. The same thing is happening on the Republican side, and I'd think it will happen all the way until the election."

Briscoe reflected momentarily on the 1978 gubernatorial election, in which Republican Bill Clements won out over Democrat John Hill, who had nosed Briscoe out of the governor's office in the Democratic primary. Many Democrats were upset that Briscoe did not actively support Hill after the primary, but Briscoe today explained that, "I was not asked to campaign for Hill, nor were any of my supporters.

On Clements' bid to streamline the state bureaucracy, Briscoe said, "I always support the idea of economic efficiency, but there's no way to implement cutbacks across the board. Some departments just cannot be cut back without re-

Last year one American in four participated in some form of camping. It's estimated that this year close to one American in three will be camping — and more than half of that number will use tents.

Perhaps because my earliest child-hood recollection is playing inside a Gypsy tent, I can never see a tent without assessing its design and quality of construction. However, with approximately 30 million people using tents this year, I won't be alone in considering what will add to the enjoyment of camping.

The tent has been a convenient form

of portable shelter as far back as record-

ed history. Many of the earliest styles of American tents (pioneer lean-to, Indian tipi, and military pup tent) are still seen today. However, tents have also kept pace with modern design and materials; there are cloth shelters today that Alexander the Great, Napoleon, and Valenti-no would envy. Modern tents are lightweight, convenient and practical. "Now tents are showing up as sculptural art forms," writes E.M Hatton in The Tent Book, "and tent architecture is beginning to serve as a superb alternative to rigid right-angled steel and glass."

What do you look for when you get ready to purchase a tent? First of all, the size of the tent will be important. Don't

try to cram two adults and three children into a tent that was designed for two persons. Keep in mind that a tent may become the family's living room, den and bedroom on a rainy day. When you go shopping for a tent, ask that the tent be set up if one isn't on display. Place a cot or air matress inside to get an idea of the space needed for a person to sleep with some degree of comfort. Now imagine or measure the amount of space for each person that will be using the tent. Is there enough room for everyone, plus the radio, lantern, and other items that will be placed inside the shelter during incle-

Tents are available in various sizes, everal styles and different materials. Cabin style or vertical-sided wall tents are roomy and are usually preferred for large families and semi-permanent camps. Some families will use a mediumsize tent for the adults and pup tents for the children. Just keep in mind that if something goes bump in the night, every one may be sharing the adult tent.

Cabin-style tents usually have high doorways for easy entrance and a roof of sufficient height to provide stand up room. Outside frames allow for more useable space inside the shelter, and generally make for easy assembly of the portable abode

Backpackers, because they often carry their camping equipment long distances, need small tents that are lightweight. This writer uses a two-person Peak 1 tent manufactured by Coleman. Like many backpacking tents, it has fea-tures found in larger cabin tents such as outside frame, netting to keep out insects, a rear window for ventilation and a separate fly to protect against rain. The compact tent, including poles and stakes, weighs only five pounds nine ounces.

No matter what size or style tent you select, you should set it up before using it on a camping trip. This will familiarize you with the various parts of the tent and give you an opportunity to inspect the seams and stitching for proper workman-

Large tents are usually made of cotton or canvas, while smaller tents often use nylon. The newest fabrics on the market are 100 percent spun polyester; the man-made fabric is designed to breath and repel water much the same as cotton. Both cotton and synthetic fabrics are available in a number of weaves and

A separate piece of fabric (fly, tarp, or poncho) over the tent will keep the tent roof from being saturated during a downpour, and the fly will reduce conof a tent roof.

Color of the tent should also be considered. Dark material can make the inside of a tent during a warm summer day seem like an oven. Red and orange also absorb heat from the sun, but the safety aspect of the colors is often preferred for mountaineering and expedition shelter. A white or light gray tent will reflect some heat from the sun while admitting

Proper care of a tent will extend its usefulness. Two of the best things you can do for a tent is to clean and air it after you have returned from an outing. It is also a good time to inspect your tent for any damage that needs repair.

The floor of a tent usually accumulates a lot of dirt, plus gravel and twigs. You can reduce the problem substantially by removing your outdoor footgear before entering the tent. A pair of softsoled shoes or heavy socks can be worn inside the tent. A small whisk broom can be used to sweep out the tent, and a sponge will help remove any water that may have seeped through a seam or hole.

Here's an important warning - tents are not fireproof. Although most tents are treated for flame retardance — they will burn. Keep fires outside and down

## Invading Russians Warned By Saudis

DAVOS, Switzerland (UPI) - Saudi Arabian oil minister Sheik Zaki Yamani warned Thursday that if the Soviet Union moved against Middle east oil fields it would mean World War III.

Yamani, making what he called a mafor policy statement to a business symposium in this winter resort, said he was convinced the Soviets invaded Afghanistan "to gt closer" to Middle East oil because of shortages expected in Communist Eastern Europe in five years.

But if the Soviet Union marches to the oil fields, there will be a third world war because it will be met by the armies of the United States. Western Europe and Japan." the oil minister declared. Atmosphere "Boiling"

The atmosphere is boiling and I'm afraid it could lead to disaster if nothing is done. Yamani said.

Yamani defended the recent series of oil price hikes by his country and other oil producers.

He said countries like Algeria and Nigeri cannot be blamed for raising their

"Ultimately, oil prices must reach the price of alternative sources of energy supply." Yamani said.

## Case Against New Jersey Senator Among Strongest

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal case against Sen. Harrison A. Williams

Jr. was described Thursday as among the described Thursday as a mong the described Thursday as strongest in the FBI's political bribery investigation which has implicated eight

members of Congress.

As FBI agents interviewed members of the New Jersey Casino Control Commission, which figured in the allegations against Williams, the House of Representatives turned its attention to the ethics of the manner in which the FBI con-

ducted its 16-month inquiry.

In advance of the House floor debate, FBI Director William Webster told an Oklahoma City news conference his agency had "followed the rules of law" in its undercover operations. He denied any entrapment of members of Congress.

Allegations have been made against as many as 20 public officials and 10 busi-nessmen after FBI undercover agents, posing as wealthy Arabs or representatives of Arab interests, paid nearly \$500,-000 in cash in exchange for promises of political favors and other services.

Webster said the law allows use of deception when there is evidence of a predisposition to commit a crime. "We follow criminality." he said Wednesday. We do not target individuals. We do not target institutions. ... We have no interest in testing any public officials.

Williams, a New Jersey Democrat, is reported to have told FBI agents on videotape that Joseph Lordi, chairman of the casino commission, helped him save such a deal.

In addition, government sources said last weekend that Williams last August had accepted stock in a titanium mine in return for a promise to help obtain gov-ernment contracts for a venture backed by an Arab sheik.

Officially, sources close to the investi-gation say all eight members of Congress remain subject to possible grand jury action, although the government considers its case against Rep. John Murtha, D-Pa., to be the weakest.

Williams was reported in The Washington Star and the New York Daily News to be a strong target for federal prosecution. Quoting unnamed Justice Department sources, the papers also listed Reps. Michael Myers, D-Pa., and Richard Kelly, R-Fla.

The Star said other strong cases were being prepared against Reps. John Jenrette, D-S.C., and Raymond Lederer, D-Pa. Instead of those two, the Daily News listed Reps. Frank Thompson Jr., D-



## Collectors Throng First Day Ceremony

Avid stamp collectors and fans of the windmill swarmed into The Museum at Texas Tech Thursday for first day of issue ceremonies for a \$3 booklet of postage stamps honoring five historic American windmills.

Many maintained their places in a lobby line for first day covers and stamp booklets while official ceremonies held forth in the main gallery in the shadow of the Eclipse windmill towering two sto-

'Do not tilt at windmills," Carl C. Ulsaker, senior assistant postmaster general for the U.S. Postal Service, urged visitors jamming the gallery and hanging over the balcony.

Americans, he noted, are accustomed to expecting the better life and, with expectations now exceeding resources, Americans must learn to apply self discipline by reaching for the possible, not dreaming of the impossible.

"Maybe I will get enough recognition to have them realize that I am serious."





## To Your Good Health

It begins with the always sensible advice to be sure you're physically able. A pre-season physical would not be a bad dea for a middle-aged person. Even healthy persons with no heart symptoms, but who are not accustomed to strenuous activity, should proceed with caution.

The Chicago organization urges going about shoveling slowly. Do the job slowly About dress:

One should dress so that exposed areas, such as hands, neck, head and face are covered, particularly when the wind chill factor is below 15 or 20 degrees fahrenheit. Wear multiple layers of light clothing so that some may removed as you become overheated. This also provides better insulation than a single bulky cov-

How to shovel: Push snow out of the way. Lift small amounts and lift from your legs, using your entire body, not just your arms and back. Good advice for any similar activity.

Don't smoke or drink while shoveling. Alcohol, notes the association, can give a talse sense of energy that isn't really there. The result can be over-exertion. Smoking and cold weather combine to constrict blood vessels.

Avoid shoveling after meals. Try to get at it a couple of hours before eating.

Dear Dr. Donohue: My daughter, who is a youthful and slender 59, has recurring blackouts, at which time she says her heart feels almost stopped. Her doc-tor says it's caused by the vagus nerve. Can you please tell me a little more about it? I'm extremely worried. — G.E.

The vagus nerve is one of the cranial nerves that orginate in the lower part of the brain. Their roles are difficult to explain. Vagus means "wanderer." The vagus branches out to serve various organs in the chest and abdomen, the stomach and heart among them. Suffice it to say that this nerve has dual roles. It both slows the heart rate and increases stomach activity.

If your daughter is having blackout spells that can be linked to her heartbeat slowing too much, then the vagus nerve might be the site of the problem. It's

## String Art Materials Simple, Inexpensive

pensive or complicated. With a lowly length of string or yarn, a handful of nails, and a hardboard background, anyone can learn the craft of string art and make decorative wall hangings at the

The basic materials for string art are simple and inexpensive - string, nails, hammer and a piece of wood for the background. Or instead of string, a variety of other types of fibers such as yarn, thread, crochet cotton, or nylon fishing line can be used. Nails for most projects are 1/2 to %-inch long brads.

The best background boards are plywood, lightweight lumber and corkboard. You can either stain or paint your background board or cover it with some type of fabric such as velvet, cotton or

Before beginning your string art project, choose a design. For your first project, select one that is relatively simple - a series of circles that create a flower, a geometric design of your own, or some motif from nature.

Draw your design on brown paper or shelf paper to the size you want it to be when completed. Place your pattern on the background board, covering it first with fabric if desired. Using a hammer, place nails along the outline of the design about every ¼ inch. Hammer the nails through the paper pattern into the background so that about one-quarter or one-half of the length of the nail remains above the surface of the board. Keep the

the nails are in place, lift the paper pat-tern away from the background. You are now ready to thread your design.

Finish off by knotting the thread around the last nail. Cut off the excess, leaving about a 1/2-inch tail. Then coat the end of the tail with clear nail polish or fabric glue and wrap it around the



The admiration and respect that Miss Austen evokes in professional circles were reflected some time ago in a section of Infinity Magazine devoted to her work. The article, by Regina Benedict and Hugh Humphrey, said in part:

"Alice Austen recorded with precision, humor, warmth and historical perception a panorarna of American life during a period of more than 50 years, from the 1880s to the 1930s. Working with unwieldy wooden cameras and bulky equipment, she produced thousands of exquisite glass negatives, each of which she placed in an envelope, diligently recording the date, subject, exposure time, weather conditions and other pertinent data. She carefully developed each plate in a tiny, closet-like darkroom on the second floor of her home, rinsing each one at an outdoor pump, summer and winter.

## **Disadvantages** Of Fluorescent **Light Given**

Q. I know fluorescent lighting is considered much better than regular incandescent lighting, most especially because it is more efficient, but I seem to remember reading somewhere that it also has some disadvantages. I expect to do some changing around soon, so I asked the dealer in the electrical section of a department store what the disadvantages were, but he didn't seem to know, except that he thought fluorescent lighting made some persons look kind of pale when directly under it. Is this so? And what are

the other disadvantages, if any? A. Yes, fluorescent lights tend to make some complexions take on a sallow appearance at times. Also, fluorescents cost more when originally installed; do not work well, if at all, in cold temperatures unless used on a special circuit; and occasionally will produce a hum under certain conditions. But their many advantages outweigh their disadvantages a wide margin, the chief one being that they give tar more light with less use of energy, which means lower electric

Q. We are having a new roof put on our house, which is 28 years old. What's the best way to keep it in good

condition A. Don't allow water from a downspout to pour directly onto a roof below; keep the downspout connected to the gutter which drains the lower roof. Keep gutters, downspouts and roof surfaces lear of fallen leaves, twigs and other litter so that water will drain freely and not back up. Keep trees trimmed to prevent scutting of the roof by branches or damage by falling limbs. Keep climbing roses and vines trimmed back. Don't walk on the rooting. Not only can it damage the shingles, it's dangerous. Workmen who go on the roof should use walk boards, scaffolding or other suitable protection. If any tools are used on the roof (such as when removing snow or branches), be careful the tools do not dig into the shin-



He wanted to try directing, even though the only time he's been at the helm of anything was in 1962, when he drove a Navy destroyer escort.

But he's bowed as a director with "Mecca," a drama about British tourists in Morocco. It's not on Broadway, but in the tiny, 99-seat Quaigh Theater, located in an elderly mid-town hotel here.

It's a limited-run show, too, and will close on Feb. 16.

But having taken the plunge, with hopes to get "Mecca" to a larger house, Conway has no regrets, even though his director's job pays little and nobody, save showfolk and maybe a few critics, ever applaud directors.

"I'm a late starter in this business, he says. "I'm going to be 38 soon and I've got to start gambling more ... I'm not against being in a long-running show, but you can't ride the same hit from year to

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - Roger Vadim's latest discovery is an Oklahomaborn, Texas-raised soap opera actress named Cindy Pickett.

She follows a distinguished tradition. Other Vadim protegees: Brigitte Bardot, Catherine Deneuve, Annette Stroyberg, Jane Fonda. All but Miss Deneuve he

Vadim, who introduced a new sexuality to the screen as a member of France's New Wave of the 1950s, is bringing out his first film in three years, "Night Games." Cindy Pickett stars as a Beverly Hills wife whose sexual repression is played out in nightly fantasies.

Vadim explained: "I prefer making tests away from a studio, using a small



crew and 16 millimeter, so I can take my time and not worry about the expense."

The director shot a week of exteriors here, but the major portion will be filmed in Manila. The reason was pure economics. With a six-day work week (instead of five here) and lower costs, Vadim figured his seven and a half weeks' shoot in Manila equalled 10 or 11 weeks

"Night Games" is necessarily erotic, Vadim remarked, "but it is not vulgar at pleasant for the audience.

The erotic scenes were something new for Miss Pickett, who had appeared in only one bedroom scene in "The Guiding Light," and then with her husband and clad in a nightgown. In "Night Garnes" she appears with no nightgown.

"I had only one scene without clothes," said the green-eyed blonde. "By that time the people in the crew were like family to me, and they made it as easy as possible for me." Vadim observed: "Some actresses are

exhibitionists and have absolutely no shame in performing sex scenes. Others will do nothing naked and will freeze at the suggestion. Before I start a picture, I try to check it out in the screen test. Can she take it or not?

"Actresses like Jeanne Moureau and Jane Fonda take an intellectual approach to erotic scenes and reason, 'If I have to do it, I will do it.'

But to others, their body is the most important thing and they make a fuss about showing it.


Roger Vadim lived here alone during and after his marriage to Miss Fonda, returned to France in 1972 and was wed to the daughter of a rich family - "I thought it was a good idea to marry

someone who wasn't an actress." Two and a half years ago, he faced the dilemma of "being a director or living the good life." He chose the former.

When Vanessa was younger I took care of her. Even when I moved back to France, she would spend half a year with me, so she was able to be bilingual.

HOLLYWOOD (AR) - Thuffering thuccotash! Mel Banc. who has entertained two generations of cartoon addicts with his offbeat voices, has entered the space age as an educated ro-

That's Blanc's voice as Twiki on NBC-Universal's series Buck Rogers in the 25th Century." This little fellow seems to make a series of computer noises, but every once in a while he throws in a punchline phrase. That's was Blanc's idea.

For 42 years Mel Blanc has been originating weird and comical voices for the film studios, and he isn't slowing down at 71. He still plays Barney Rubble in endless reincarnations of "The Flintstones, as well as new TV cartoons like "Speed Buggy" and "Captain Caveman." He can be heard on TV and radio commercials, some produced by Blanc Communications Corp., of which son Noel is president.

Lately I've developed another line of work;; lecturing at colleges, "says Blanc. "I've gone to 83 campuses in the past two years — just got back from New Jersey and West Virginia. I talk about the creation of the voices and show three Academy

The kids know all about the old cartoons; they grew up on

them. I've broken attendance records everywhere I've gone. Interviewing Blanc in his penthouse office in Beverly Hills is like talking to a crowd. With his round face and trimmed mustache, he looks like any businezs executive behind a massive desk. But into his conversation drops a variety of voices - Porky Pig. Wyle E. Coyote, Yosemite Sam, Foghorn Leghorn, Speedy Gonzalez, Roadrunner, and especially Bugs Bunny ("my favorite, because he's the most popular").

Blanc told how he had broken into the cartoon voice busi-

It took me a year and a half. I had been doing dialects on radio and I wanted to try cartoons. I applied for a job at Warner

Brothers, and the man in charge of hiring told me, "We have all the voices we need.

"That didn't stop me. I kept going back every two weeks and always got the same answer. Finally the guy died. The man

who took his place decided to give me a chance. Blanc's first impersonation was a drunken bull. Porky Pig followed, then in 1938 Blanc was present at the creation of Bugs

Bunny. The voice did not spring full-grown from Mel's mouth. At first they drew Bugs Bunny with two long teeth," he recalled. "I tried to imitate someone talking through two teeth, but you couldn't understand what he was saying. So I forgot about the teeth and just did the voice of a regular little tough


The late 1930s and the 1940s were the heyday of the cartoon short and Blanc remembers that the studio turned out 52 a year at a cost of \$50,000 per short. So valuable was Blanc's voice that he signed an exclusive contract. That meant he couldn't contin-

ue voicing Woody Woodpecker for Walter Lantz. Walter hired a woman named Grace Stafford to do Wood-Blanc smiled. "I always say Walter married Grace so Woodvoice wouldn't get away again."

Blanc free-lanced as television began to take over the cartoon businss and has created many voices for Hanna-Barbera. Oddly he worked only once for Disney: "I was supposed to do the voice of Giddy the cat in 'Pinocchio' and he started out to be a tipsy character. Than Walt became worried that the audience might consider him a drunk, so my dialogue was thrown out, and Walter Catlett played the role.


"I worked 18 days and in those years Disney paid \$50 a day. All that remained of my work was one hiccup. Not bad - \$800

Mel said he discovered when Noel was 12 that the boy could imitate all his father's voices. "But he doesn't like to copy, just as I never did," Mel added, "When I kick off, he can carry on."

# Herbicide 2,4-D Blamed For Rural Miscarriages

CONDON, Mont. (AP) - Nine of 10 pregnant women who came to this parsely populated area of the Swan Valey to escape the hazards of big city living suffered miscarriages in a one-year peri-od, and area residents blame the annual spraying of the herbicide 2,4-D.

The area's only successful birth during the 12-month period ending last fall was by a woman who had been attending school out of state and returned to the area to have her baby, said Dr. Ralph Campbell, Lake County health officer.

Residents of the 10-mile stretch along Montana 83 just north of Missoula County say they are increasingly frustrated by "the ho-hum attitude of the bureaucracy" toward the situation.

'They just don't seem concerned, and they don't like the questions that are being asked," Virginia Polsen, whose miscarriage in the fall of 1978 was the first, said in a recent interview.

Lake County Commissioner Bill Burlev said the Swan Valley residents had not contacted the commission directly. but that Campbell had reported their concerns. Commissioner Don Corrigan said he was sure the county would start an invesigation if residents asked.

Campbell said it has been almost imossible to find out who has been sprayng in the area, and with what chemicals.

The state Highway Department contracts with counties to spray "noxious" weeds along roadsides, and the department specifies 2,4-D, said Bill Hebert, field maintenance chief in the Kalispell office. The herbicide is not restricted and may be bought by the public, he said. Campbell said he is convinced 2,4-D is

the culprit, "but it's like all these cumulative poisons - how do you prove it?" Campbell used questionnaires to in-

terview the families after he and Virginia Reber, county health nurse, met with

"We found these people to be living the pristine life, growing their own food and watching their eating habits," Camp-

bell said. "The striking thing is, without exception, that they all seemed to be healthy, well-informed people with good living habits. They came to live in that area to be away from the hazards of the civilized

world. He said the families had been eating vegetables grown in their own gardens, and beef, wild meat and eggs produced in the area, and drinking milk from cows that grazed along the roads.

Mrs. Polsen, who now has a healthy 2month-old baby, said most families in the area, especially those trying to have families, are carefully monitoring what they eat. Some, she said, have abandoned their gardens and won't eat eggs or meat raised in the area.

The herbicide 2,4-D is being studied by the Environmental Protection Agency, but the study is not complete. That study began after Oregon reported a high incidence of cancer, miscarriages and migraine headaches among some residents of the Alsea Basin area where the herbicide was used.

Oregon had used another herbicide. 2.4.5-T, but switched to 2.4-D after the EPA linked it to a high rate of miscarriages and serious physical ailments.

Lake County weed control officer George Stonehocker said his operation does not extend as far south in the Swan Valley as where the miscarriages oc-curred. He said Missoula County would be responsible for weed control in that

Missoula County weed control officer Bill Otten said his crews had not sprayed in that area, either. He said farmers in the area might be using 2,4-D.

The Chaps played sluggishly throughout the contest, partly due to the illness

of guards Bill McGee and Marshall Smith, both of whom competed but did not execute well and lacked stamina.

They trailed by as many as seven points, 26-19, in the opening half, and waited until guard Bruce Carver's steal and breakaway layup to take their first lead with only 2:45 left in the game.

The score was 58-56, less a tribute to the Chaps' comeback ability than to stale shooting by the Marauders, who managed only one field goal and four points during a ten-minute stretch midway through the period.

LCC never took full advantage of the Mary College lapse, scoring only nine points in the same span.

We played a flat game, but we were on top right near the end to win it," Hay said. "We had two one-and-ones there in the last seconds and missed the front end of both. We just didn't help ourselves.





# Gervin Says Contract, Absence Not Related

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - San Antonio Spurs guard George Gervin, unhappy with his current contract, returned to practice Thursday after missing a game and three practice sessions. Gervin insists the absences were caused by illness, not contract problems. Gervin, who's leading the National

Basketball Association in scoring for the

third consecutive season, inexplicably missed practice sessions Monday and Tuesday morning. He called in sick for Tuesday night's loss to New Jersey and Wednesday's practice. The absences came after Gervin told reporters at the last weekend's All-Star

game that he wanted his \$350,000-peryear contract renegotiated. The timing prompted speculation that Gervin's illness was dollar-related. But Gervin and his agent Pat Healy had insisted Gervin was really ill, not on a holdout. "The timing is totally coinci-

dental," said Healy "I'm not hiding. I was ill," Gervin said Wednesday. "I feel much better. There was no use in my coming out there if I wasn't 100 percent. I don't know what

the chaos is about. Team officials maintain they will not even consider renegotiating Gervin's contract until after the season.

Gervin has four years remaining on an eight-year pact that reportedly pays \$350,000 per year, plus incentive bonuses. It was renegotiated in 1978 after Gervin demanded to be traded Gervin, 27, reportedly makes only a

third as much money as other NBA superstars. About 15 NBA players make


more money than Gervin, said Healy.

Gervin scored 34 points and was the most valuable player in Sunday's NBA All-Star game. He is averaging more than 33 points per game, twice scoring more than 50 points this season. Thus far, it's been his best pro season.

Healy said he has "on-going communication" with Spurs officials about Gervin's contract.

"George wants to stay in San Antonio. He feels he must get security for his wife and three kids. He's willing to sign to stay in San Antonio for life to get that,"

'Klammer had won all those races coming into the Olympics," noted Harald Schoenhaar, the U.S. men's alpine ski coach. "He had an obligation to win at

The U.S. team won't have to worry about such pressure next week when the 1980 Winter Olympics begin at Lake Placid, N.Y.

In general, no one expects the American skiers to do well. Based on recent Olympics and World Cup competition, the United States might be good for one or two medals. Anything more would be a bonus, and a gold medal would be

cause for glorious celebration.

For this reason, the American skiers and coaches agree that competing at Lake Placid is nothing but an advantage.

You have to realize that in Europe, skiing is the No. 1 sport," said slalom specialist Steve Mahre. "That's not the case in this country, obviously. So there's not really very much pressure on us. People want us to do well, sure, but I don't

know if they really expect us to." Mahre, who has been hobbled by an ankle injury which could limit his effec-

tiveness at Lake Placid and possibly keep him out of competition all together, notes that the United States has traditionally skied well in World Cup events held in this country.

Just being in the States has always been a boost for us," he said. "It helps to hear people cheering for you in your own

language."
Mahre's twin brother, Phil, who owns more World Cup victories — seven — than any other U.S. skier, agrees. "We've had a majority of our success on home

Another potential edge for the American is the preponderence of manmade snow on Whiteface Mountain, where the Olympic downhill, slalom and giant sla-

lom races will be held. The seven-member U.S. team is training at Killington, about 70 miles from Lake Placid, in snow condition that approximate those in Lake Placid.

Europeans, by contrast, rarely ski on artificial snow, although a handful of European teams currently are training in

other areas of New England on manmade snow.

Manmade snow has slightly different properties than natural snow. "It's not particularly faster than fallen snow." said Schoenhaar. "But one thing it forces you to do is ski precisely. Manmade snow is not as forgiving as falling snow. The slightest mistake can really hurt you."

The men's ski team has been training at Killington since Tuesday, and the seven members of the women's team were to begin arriving for training.



IOC Members Cool Toward Move

mood of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) hardened Thursday against President Jimmy Carter's plan to move the Olympic Games from Moscow.

Some 20 members had arrived for this weekend's session and the XIII Winter Games that follow. Not one of them showed any sign of going along with Cart-

"We can't even think of moving the Games because Moscow has not broken an Olympic rule," said Lance Cross of New Zealand, a member of the executive

The board was scheduled to meet Thursday, but Lord Killanin, the presi-dent of the IOC, postponed the meeting until Friday. Killanin stayed in his office in the quaint, rambling country hotel where the IOC will hold its most critical session this weekend.

Killanin spent the day going through files of recent events — the Soviet inter-

vention in Afghanistan, Carter's de-mands that the Games be moved or canceled if Soviet troops are not withdrawn, and the president's threat to ask the U.S. Olympic Committee not to send a team if these conditions are not met.

Killanin studied reports from many of the National Olympic Committees. More than 30 governments have supported Carter's boycott plan, but some have made it clear they will leave the decision to the national Olympic committees.

Leaders of the U.S.Olympic Commit-

ee - Robert Kane, president, and Col. Don F. Miller, executive director - are scheduled to meet with the IOC executive board Friday to deliver Carter's re-

But USOC sources said Kane and Miller are not likely to advocate moving the Games with any great enthusiasm. When the USOC executive board met at Colorado Springs two weeks ago, the body voted to take Carter's demands to cate course between duty to the White House and loyalty to the Olympic ideals.

Vitaly Smirnov of the Soviet Union, a vice president of the IOC, will be at the meeting. He already has spoken of possible sanctions against the USOC if it breaches the Olympic Charter.

Rule 24 of the Charter, dealing with the 140 recognized National Olympic Committees, says: "NOCs must be autonomous and must resist all pressures of any kind whatsoever, whether of a political, religious or economic nature. In pursuing their objectives, NOCs may cooperate with private or government organizations. However, they must never associate themselves with any undertaking which would be in conflict with the principles of the Olympic movement and with the rules of the IOC."

If the USOC blatantly advocated a government plan to change the site of the 1980 Games it might be in danger of sus-

pension, or even of losing the 1984 Games scheduled for Los Angeles. The USOC has no power to propose resolutions at meetings of the IOC, which follows a pattern of its own and is not answerable to anybody. Its members are the IOC's representatives in their countries, not the other way round.

The two American members, Douglas Roby and Julian K. Roosevelt, do not support the plan for moving the games from Moscow.

Of the 89 members, some 76 are expected at Lake Placid.

"The USOC has been buying time," one IOC member said. "Now President Carter asks us to move the Games, we will say no, and then we will have to wait and see what the White House does next. It may be difficult for the USOC to play for more time when Carter's deadline of Feb. 20 comes round and the Russians have not withdrawn troops from Afghan-

# Contenders Set Sights On Borg

BOCA WEST, Fla. (AP) - As four of the world's top tennis players tuned their strokes Thursday for the start of the \$300,000 Grand Slam tournament, they all agreed that the man to beat - as usual — is Bjorn Borg.

The three-day event gets under way Friday afternoon with Borg, a three-time defending champion and the world's topranked player, going against Guillermo Vilas. Saturday's match pits Vitas Geru-laitis against John McEnroe. The winners will play Sunday for the biggest top prize in tennis — \$150,000.

"I don't have much to lose and I have a lot to gain," said Vilas, an Argentinian who hasn't beaten the cool Swede in four years. "I know someday or later I'm going to beat him."

The only major title that has evaded Borg, fresh off last month's triumph in the Grand Prix Masters in New York, is

Even if he never wins another point, he'll be one of the greatest players of all time," said McEnroe, the only one of the

three challengers to beat Borg since 1976.

The 23-year-old Borg, known for his icy on-court demeanor and explosive topspin ground strokes, has won all three Grand Slam tournaments here, beating Jimmy Connors in the finals each time.

Connors didn't qualify this year because he didn't win any of the so-called Grand Slam events - Wimbledon, U.S. Open, Australian Open and French Open.

'It feels funnny not to have Jimmy the tournament this year," said Borg, winner of Wimbledon and the French Open. "I'd like to see him here...I will miss him, but I think the public will miss him more.'

Connors' absence has not hurt the box office, though. Tournament officials say all three days are sellouts (11,180).

# NTSU Star Returns To Coaching

What one will do after college is one of the toughest and most important decisions a person makes.

After an outstanding basketball career at North Texas State University. Lisa Risinger had to decide whether to continue playing the game or finish college. She decided to finish school then follow in her father's and brother's footsteps and become a basketball coach, a decision she sometimes regrets.

"It's quite a change," Miss Risinger says. "It's been hard for me to make the transition from player to coach in such a short time. I went to school all summer and attended basketball camp, but right after graduation I was a coach. It all happened so fast."

Miss Risinger was drafted the the Minnesota Fillies of the Women's Professional Basketball League two weeks before she was to graduate. Though she was very honored and surprised, instead of losing a whole semester's work, she decided to stay in school instead of turn

It was really no surprise to those who follow North Texas State basketball that Miss Risinger, a 5-11 scoring machine for the Mean Green, was drafted by the pros. She broke career and season records in scoring, field goals and free throws during her two years at NTSU.

In 1977-78, her first year as a member of the Mean Green team, Miss Risinger averaged 19.6 points per game, hit 47 percent of her field goal attempts and set school records for points during a season (585), field goals during a season (244) and free throws (97). Her 245 rebounds put her second on the all-time list for re-

Last year Miss Risinger averaged 17.2 points per game, and coupled with her 1977-78 statistics, set school records for scoring with 1101 points, 457 field goals and 187 free throws made. She also ranks third in career rebounding by grabbing 405 rebounds in her two seasons at NTSU.

Texas A&M coach Cherri Rapp, who coached Miss Risinger at North Texas State those two years, says, "Lisa was truly an outstanding player. She worked hard all the time and had a lot of courtsense. She is one of the best shooters I ever coached

"She got along with the other players well, and I never had to worry about her because she was such a respo er. She knew what needed to be done.

"I was very lucky to have recruited her." Rapp continued. "I was really surprised at her ability in the beginning, but after I watched her play for a while, I bewon't get another player like her for a

"I remember that first practice session she was on the team," Rapp contin-ued, "Lisa just picked up a ball and shot it from out of bounds — and she made it. I was never really surprised at what she could do on the court after that.

Before playing for Rapp at North Texas State, Miss Risinger enjoyed a line career at South Plains College playing for Dale Nicholas. "Both of my college coaches, coach Rapp and coach Nicholas, were really great," Miss Risinger said. "But the best coaching I ever got came from my father, who coached me a year in junior high, and my brother, who was my coach in high school. It's no wonder I'm a coach now - I come from a coaching family.

After playing for winners in college, it is hard for Miss Risinger to cope with coaching a team that is not winning

"We started out just fine," Miss Ris-inger said of her 7-16 Olton team, "but we've been in a slump since Christmas and have only one one game. Miss Risinger calls this season "terri-

ble," but considering she is the fourth coach the school has had in as many years and the majority of the her players have no varsity experience, it is not bad

"It's really been a different kind of gan to take her for granted. I probably year for me." she says, "It's hard for me

When Bobby missed those four (free throws)," said Schuler. "I turned to our trainer and said 'I guess it's just not in the cards for us to win this one





HEARTLINE: My wife and my sister keep telling me that my radio costs more in electricity than their microwave oven. I haven't been able to get any figures, but I don't see how my little am-fm radio could use as much electricity as these microwave ovens. Could you give me some kind of cost comparison and how much othe appliances cost to run per year? - G.F.

ANSWER: Your radio probably costs about half as much to operate than your wife's microwave oven. This is based on 1,211 hours of radio play compared to 131

An Indian religious man visiting Lubbock Thursday criticized leaders in Iran for mixing religion with politics, but he praised President Carter's efforts in handling the hostage situation.

President Carter is doing an excellent job," observed Swami Bhashyanan-da of the Vivekananda Society of Chica-

According to Bhashyananda, the president is doing the right thing in seeking the help of friends from around the world to resolve the crisis situation at the American Embassy in Iran. "I'm sure your hostages will come back un-harmed," the swami said. "It will take a little time.

Bhashyananda took issue with current state of affairs in Iran, where politics and religion have been mixed together under the regime of the Ayatollah Khomeini. Such a situation allows dogmatism to enter the picture, and a leader can assert that his truth is the only truth, the swami

Politics increases the drive for power, Bhashyananda said, and power demands money. "A true religious experience must keep all this away," he added. The swami believes he at least partial-

ly understands the motives behind Khomeini's actions, however. According to Bhashyananda, Khomeini feels that his Islamic religion and his people are threatened by the West. But he said that the difficulties should be overcome through education and reconciliation, not


as head of the Vivekananda Vedanta Society, the Chicago center for the Ramakrishna Mission.

# **Averaging Can Cut Taxes** In Good Year

Just as some years are extra good for vintage wines, some years are much better than others from an income stand-

If 1979 was a very good year for you because of a substantial salary increase, a big bonus, a clean-up in the stock market or winning the top prize in the state

lottery, you could have a problem.

Admittedly, it's a "problem" that most people would like to have, but it is going to call for a helty tax increase.

There's a solution for you, though, and it is called income averaging. When you use this system, you include this year's big income with the total income you reported in the four previous years. Then you average it out. This has the eftect of pulling you down into a much low-

To take advantage of income averaging, you must use Schedule G. You will also need copies of your income tax returns going back to 1975, because you will be required to take figures from those former year's returns

If you think you might be using Schedule G this year and you don't have copies of those older returns, write now to the IRS Service Center in your region for copies. Allow a few weeks for a reply and expect a modest charge for the cop-

1. - Total your base period income figures (Line 6 of Schedule G) for the years, 1978, 1977, 1976 and 1975.

2. — Multiply the total by 30 percent.
3. — If your taxable income figure for 1979 is at least \$3,000 higher than your answer on Line 2, averaging will be to your advantage.

Schedule G is somewhat complicated and calls for many mathematical computations. Have the four previous year's returns in front of you before you start. Then check and recheck all of your figures before submitting your return.

Schedule G may take you an hour or more to complete. But if it saves you several hundred dollars in tax (not an unlikely prospect), you will be well paid for your time

KANGAROO OFF LIST



# Rural Use Of Electricity Off Significantly, Survey Shows co-ops, or 23 percent of all the NRECA

WASHINGTON (AP) - The growth in electricity use by farmers and other rural people has slowed significantly, a new survey shows.

A report by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association released this weekend said the nation's rural electric systems "have nearly cut in half their historical annual power growth rate" of 10 percent a year.

The NRECA represents at the national level some 908 member cooperatives that distribute electricity locally to more than 25 million consumers in 46 states.


According the the survey, the amount of electricity used by consumers served by the cooperatives increased only 5.8 percent in 1978. During the 10-year period that ended in 1975, rural electric power sales increased an average of 10 percent a year, reaching a peak growth of 12 percent in 1972.

The NRECA said the cooperatives and their customers have carried out effective conservation actions that have contributed to the reduced growth rate in electricity consumption.

NRECA officials told a reporter that obviously higher energy costs contribut ed to the growth rate slowdown.

Much of the focus of the survey - in which 789 of the NRECA's member cooperatives participated - dealt with electricity conservation and how those will develop further.

It showed the co-ops have budgeted



more than \$25 million for conservation activities in 1980. Those programs and the survey itself will be reviewed at the NRECA's annual meeting in March.

"It's clear that rural electric systems and their consumers are making an important contribution to our nation's conservation efforts," said Robert D. Partridge, executive vice president of NRE-

"In fact, if we were still expanding at our historical growth level we would have consumed an additional 5.7 billion kilowatt-hours in 1978. That's enough to power all the homes in Washington, D.C. for a year and a half.

However, Partridge said in releasing the study, rural electric systems "will probably continue to be the fastest growing segment of the utility industry" and noted that in 1978 an estimated one million persons were added as consumers to rural electric lines.


According to Agriculture Department annual surveys of farms, electricity use overall increased by about 2 percent per farm in 1978. Costs of electricity rose eight percent that year from 1977.

In 1979, USDA electricity use per farm declined an average of three percent from 1978. Prices per kilowatt-hour rose an additional six

The USDA figures, however, apply only to farms and include those that are served by utility companies other than the co-ops, which also serve millions of non-farm consumers in rural and suburban areas

Those figures illustrate that farmers and other rural people have seen electricity costs climb along with just about evhousehold.

# Seminar Stresses **Energy Alternates**

HEREFORD - The growing importance of on-farm energy alternatives plus farming methods to make conventional energy go farther were stressed during a feed grains seminar conducted at the Hereford Community Center.

The session was sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Deaf Smith County Crops Commit-

The morning portion was devoted primarily to feed grain topics and the afternoon portion touched on gasohol and other forms of energy.

Dr. Frank Petr of the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland discussed minimum tillage methods involving wheat, corn and milo,

Petr pointed out that although minimum tillage has primarily been considered a soil conservation tool in the past, it has come into its own as a method of saving both irrigation water and energy, and predicted that in the future producers may become willing to "sacrifice a little in production for the sake of saving

He cited an example in which preparing ground following a wheat crop involv-ing three diskings, bedding and two cultivations resulted in costs of \$18 per acre.

A limited tillage operation under which 2-4-D and a trazine were applied had a cost of \$12 per acre and a preplanting irrigation was saved.

'If you can control your weeds, there's no reason to do a lot of shallow plowing operations that compact your soil," Petr advised.

Dr. Robert Berry, plant pathologist, discussed diseases of corn and sorghum and pointed out that although research doesn't indicate so at this date, diseases could grow more important with a trend toward more extensive mimimum til-

"Concentrations of fungi could be built up in the soil over a period of time in this manner," he related.

Berry pointed out that head smut is still a primary disease concern of corn and sorghum producers in this region.

Dr. John Sweeten, extension agricultural engineer in waste management spoke on prospects for methane production at the area's cattle feedlots.

"This is one of the few areas that has such an abundance of manure that it could have the potential for energy production," commented Sweeten.

The engineer pointed out that massive energy use by feedlots in their steam flaking operations makes them a natural area for an energy alternative such as methane production.

"In a survey I conducted, an average feedlot of 30,700 head capacity used 85 cubic feet of gas per head per month for steam flaking. That's 2.85 cubic feet of gas per head per day, along with 0.19 kilowatt hours of electricity per head per

day, average," he explained. "We're looking at 83,980 BTUs per head per month for steam flaking, and with electricity added, we're looking at a total of 101,070 BTUs. Much of that energy might be made right on the feedlot site through methane conversion," Sweeten maintained.

He then referred to bioconversion processes including anaerobic digestion for methane production and thermochemical processes which include direct combustion, high temperature combustion without oxygen, and hydro-gasifica-

According to Sweeten, all of these processes are subject to economic constraints that require large capital investments, large plants to achieve economics of scale and competition with fossil fuels or related products for markets.

He also stressed that the quality of feedlot manure in terms of ash content, moisture, age, BTU value, and absence of residues is an important consideration 'that may eventually necessitate change in traditional methods of feedlot manure handling and feedlot design.

Sweeten pointed out that feedstuffs obtained from processing manure outvalue methane by about a three to one margin, and finding markets for this by-product will have a major bearing on the economics of producing methance in feed-

"Feedlots must pay more attention to harvesting their manure, instead of just collecting it. The best quality will come off the feed bunk, where it's relatively free of dirt. Although using front end loaders has been the traditional method of handling manure, using a grading system would probably get better quality and less dirt. It's hard to get uniformity of the product with a front end loader,

Henry O'Neal gave an updated report on gasohol production in Texas, focusing on the energy requiremenmts to produce a gallon of fuel-grade alcohol.

"We hear a lot of talk about the energy balance involved, and that it takes more energy to produce the alcohol than it yields. We've got to become better users of waste energy," commented

He cited a chart which listed a 50,000 BTU requirement for growing the crop

and 60,000 BTU for cooking and distilling a gallon of alcohol.
"A gallon of 200 proof alcohol has a

BTU value of 84,000, for a cost of 112,000 BTU to produce it. We have to remember that we have some BTUs left in the distiller's grain and solubles, however. There may be 130,000 BTUs of energy there, and that would give us a value of 134,000 BTUs for the alcohol and stillage. That's not a great improvement in the output BTUs over input, but if we can accomplish it with fuels which have no other value, then it has been done economi-

O'Neal also emphasized that farmers should use the cheapest feedstock with the highest potential alcohol production for their raw product.

He indicated that there is currently no

real feel for the efficiency of alcohol production units being marketed at this time because they have not been in operation for a sufficient period.

O'Neal estimated net on-farm production costs for alcohol at \$1.85-\$1.95 per gallon, and indicated that large plant costs will probably drop to about half of the small scale on-farm units. A question was asked about the possi-

bility of using feedlot manure as a fuel source for making alcohol, and Sweeten replied that burning the manure will yield nearly the same BTU value as converting it to methane for use as boiler

Dr. Noland Clark of the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland discussed experiments with wind energy, and told producers that coupling wind machines to alcohol distilling equipment might prove a natural method of producing the heat needed to steam cook the grain being distilled.

Clark indicated that high cost has been a major factor with modern wind machines, and the greatest efficiency with windmills yet is 42 percent.

"Wind energy machines have come down 40 percent in cost, and I hope they are like calculators and get cheaper," he stated.

Relative production costs of corn and sorghum were discussed by Dr. Ray Sammons, extension economist.

"It looks like corn may retain its favorable position over milo if irrigation costs remain somewhere near the same. If you're going to produce corn, take a hard look at pricing corn and milo some-time between April and June. Spend as many days pricing your crop as you do producing it," Sammons advised.

He also told his audience that micro = computers are becoming an important farm tool, and with the volatility of today's commodity markets "it's cheaper to make a blunder on paper than in the

A FEW OF THE 13 EXPORT FIRMS whose grain and oilseed sales to the Soviet Union were embargoed are balking on signing the Commodity Credit Corp. buy-back agreement designed to compensate them for embargo losses, according to trade sources. Grain exporting companies have until Feb. 15 to respond to the govern-

ment's offer to assume the contracts. The U.S. Department of Agriculture can accept or reject any of the exporter contracts if acceptance is received later than Feb. 15 USDA officials said. Formal offers to assume the contracts were sent out earlier this week, offi-

Exporters and the USDA expect most of the firms to sign the agreement.

None of the export officials have said their firms wouldn't participate, but some clearly are waiting for others to act first. We are studying (the agreement) and if the majority of the exporters sign,

we will too," Ray Fretz, president of Tradigrain in New Orleans, said

A SPOKESMAN FOR PHILLIP BROTHERS in New York would not comment on the company's stance, but other trade sources said the company was among the most likely to reject the CCC plan.

Of the firms with the largest sales to the Soviet Union, Cargill Inc. has indicated it will sign. James Howard, head of Cargill's commodity marketing division, said that "you can assume we still will participate.

Cargill had said publicly from the outset that some government compensation to the firms would be needed. Howard pointed out.

A spokesman for Goodpasture in Houston said his company definitely would

sign the CCC agreement. Continental Grain Co. senior vice president Myron Laserson said he expected "general acceptance" of the agreement, but added that the firm had not re-

ceived the final agreement and would make its judgment after it arrived. Industry sources said some of the firms are hesitant to sign because they will be required to open their books to the CCC to reveal terms of business with the U.S.S.R. for the past three years.

SEVERAL PRICING MECHANISMS WERE USED in the Soviet contracts that might represent special circumstances in dealing with the CCC program,

Trade sources once said the Jan. 4 embargo might have forced some of the 13 firms out of business had the government not agreed to absorb some of their

In general, they said, the largest firms would be able to withstand the losses but some small exporters could be extended beyond their capabilities. Some sources suggested, however, that the strength of market prices since the embargo may have changed that assessment.

Last week, a USDA official said the CCC probably would deduct an average of less than 3 percent of the contract price to arrive at the price at which it will assume outstanding Soviet sales.

The final version of the CCC exporter's agreement stipulates that the government will withhold from exporters 3 percent of the contract price until it determines how much should be deducted to account for a firm's profit and possible short position in the market, said Daniel Marcus, USDA general counsel However, in case these deductions amount to more than 3 percent of the

contract price, the agreement allows the USDA to recover some of the money it pays to exporters for the contract. A schedule will be attached to each firm's agreement, which will reflect the terms of the individual's outstanding contracts to the Soviet Union.

# Dr. Abernathy Honored By Researchers

A research scientist who helps West Texas farmers combat a multi-milliondollar annual problem is the first recipient of a new award presented by the Southern Weed Science Society.

Dr. John R. Abernathy, 35, weed research project leader at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station here. was presented the first "Outstanding Young Weed Scientist Award" at the society's recent meeting at Hot Springs, Ark. The award will be sponsored annually by BASF Wyandotte Corp.

Since joining the staff of the Texas A& M University Research and Extension Center here in 1973, the associate professor has supervised and conducted one of the largest field weed research programs in the United States. In addition to directing research at the stations at Lubbock and Halfway, he has research plots on a dozen or more area farms each year.

His work includes preplant, pre-emergence and postemergence herbicide trials on most field crops grown in the South Plains and research on specific weed problems.

In presenting Abernathy its new award, the society said he " has determined varietal response of cotton, soybeans, sorghum, cowpeas and corn to herbicides to which they could be exposed. His overall research program has also contributed valuable information to area farmers regarding herbicide resistance, soil buildup after repeated herbicide use, herbicide levels in the soil which affect rotational crops, and length of weed control achieved by specific

In 1977, he received the West Texas Agricultural Chemicals Institute Award for "outstanding contributions to West Texas agriculture." He also was co-author of the outstanding graduate student paper presentation of the 1977 SWSS

A native of Altus, Okla., Abernathy worked on an irrigated cotton farm there. He was graduated from Altus High School and received a Bachelor of Science degree in agronomy in 1967 and a Master of Science in agronomy in 1969, both from Oklahoma State University. He received a Ph.D. in agronomy in 1972 from the University of Illinois.

He then worked for Velsicol Chemical Corp., serving as regional manager of field development for 11 midwestern

Since joining the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station here, Abernathy has published 96 research reports and technical papers, presented more than a score of scientific papers to national and regional professional societies, and spoken to numerous groups.

He has been active in both SWSS and the Weed Science Society of America. He has served as secretary-treasurer of SWSS and a member of its executive board. He has been chairman of several SWSS committees and activities, including resolution and necrology committee. In the WSSA, he has served as membership chairman and on several commit-

"He has served as chairman of the Cotton Weed Science Research Conference of the Beltwide Cotton Conference, and as treasurer and a director of the West Texas Agricultural Chemicals Institute.

Abernathy is married to the former Cindy Canady of Tulsa, Okla. They have two children.



# Lubbock Among Leaders In Use Of Waste Water

A pioneer in use of sewage water for irrigation, the city of Lubbock will provide national leadership during the 1980s in effective use of city waste for agricultural purposes.

Urban sewage, produced at a daily rate of 80 to 100 gallons per person, can provide valuable nutrients and water for farming, especially in the Southwest. If used for land application, the sewage needs limited treatment, which reduces municipal expenses.

But techniques of applying partially treated sewage on agricultural land need to be perfected, according to Dr. Robert M. Sweazy, director of Texas Tech University Water Resources Center.

Sweazy heads a team of Texas Tech researchers who will provide information on applying waste water for agricultural purposes. The research effort, which will be completed by the mid 1980s, being supervised by a national advisory commit-

Once completed, the project will provide guidelines for cost-effective, productive and environmentally safe use of sewage water for land application. The Texas Tech research effort is

funded by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) through the Lubbock Christian College (LCC) Institute of Water Research.

The EPA-LCC contract calls for research and implementation of the sewage treatment project. Funded at \$9.5 million, the project represents one of the largest EPA contracts for research and development of sewage reuse, Sweazy

"The use of municipal effluent for agricultural purposes is becoming popular and with it has come the need for more information on the effects of sewage on crops, soils and groundwater reservoirs and the economics of the process," Sweazy said.

Lubbock can provide leadership in this endeavor because the city's waste water has been used for irrigating a 4,-000-acre farm since 1939, Sweazy ex-

"Using that farm and a similar farm which has never been irrigated with sewage - but will be during the next five years - we will be able to monitor the the nation could benefit from them."

long-and short-term effects of applying sewage on land."

Lubbock produces about 18 million gallons of waste water every day, "which represents about 44 acre-feet of water,"

Most of that water has been used for irrigating the 4,000-acre Frank Gray farm on the southeast edge of town since 1939. About 2.5 million gallons of that water percolates into the underground reseroir from which it is pumped into the Canyon Lakes Project for water-based recreation in Lubbock.

"Because the Gray farm received more than it needs, some of the water will now be used to irrigate 4,000 acres of farmland operated by 13 tenant farmers in the small community of Wilson, population 380, near Lubbock," Sweazy said.

Texas Tech research will generate baseline environmental data on the two irrigation sites, provide information on the effects of using effluent for irrigation on the quality and quantity of groundwater and study the number and type of any viruses associated with sewage.

The research team, headed by Sweazy, includes Drs. Billy J. Claborn and R. Heyward Ramsey, both of the Civil Engineering Department, and Dr. Clarence L. Baugh of the Biological Sciences Departmet. More than 50 undergraduate and graduate students will receive research

assistantships through the project. Most of the EPA money will be used for design and construction of pipelines to transfer the waste water from Lubbock to the Wilson farms and distribute

Texas Tech will be responsible for a major part of the research and will receive more than \$1 million for the work. Research also will be conducted by the Southwest Research Institute of San Antonio. Laboratory analysis of water, crop and soil samples will be conducted at

Besides providing research data on the use of waste water for irrigation, the project will evaluate existing EPA guidelines on using sewage for agricultural





Make \$200,000, \$500,000 - who knows? It's easy money. Just invest \$100 - and follow instructions in this chain letter exactly

Give \$50 to the person who hands the letter to you, place another \$50 in an envelope and mail it to the first person listed in the letter. Copy the letter, remove the name of the person at the top and add your name to the bottom.

If the 12 people on the list follow the rules, each will receive more than \$200 .-000 in approximately 12 days.

Get rich quick. Right. There's a sucker born every minute.

Participants all over the country say chain letters such as "Circle of Gold," "Business List" and "Platinum Pyramid" are fun and fruitful. Prosecutors condemn them as fraudulent and harm-

"People don't understand that the money has to come from someone else's pocket," said Victoria Vreeland, an assistant attorney general in Washington state. "It doesn't grow on trees."

Even the 13th buyer would be in trouble because each person ahead of him involves another 12 names. who themselves involve dozens of people. Oregon is seeking to halt the Business

"We felt we were not breaking the law," said Laverne Pace, a sometimes blackjack dealer and mother of three from Myrtle Point, Ore., who said she had made \$3,700 from the Business List. "It was our \$100. We worked for it, we paid taxes on it and it's our business what we do with it."

With apparent reluctance, unemployed Myrtle Point logger John Loors conceded he had received "in the neighborhood of" \$25,000 from participation in the Business List.

"I've worked my butt off on this thing, too," Loors said, explaining how he tracked the spread of the Business List to 14 cities in California, Montana, Idaho, Arizona and Nevada. "It's an elaborate setup - it's really neat. When it don't work, it's the people setting down doing nothing, being lazy."

Most people get back their original "investment," according to research analyst Josh Holtzman of the National Association of Attorneys General, but profit is another matter.

Coos County Sheriff Leslie Miller was among the Business List losers when Oregon began its crackdown: "I haven't

en any money yet."
Still, he said he endorsed the concept because his neighbors have received enough money to pay back bills and buy such luxuries as microwave ovens. "I feel it really helps the economy in Coos County," Miller said.

Then the Business List sprang up in eastern Washington. It died down when the attorney general's office threatened legal action.

"I've really had it," said Ms. Vreeland. "People just don't understand that maybe it's going to take two or three weeks, but the people at the bottom are going to get screwed."

### Government Selling Old Silver Dollars

WASHINGTON (AP) - Americans are being given an opportunity to pur-chase nearly a million silver dollars minted in the late 1880s at Carson City, Nev.

The sale of the "cartwheels" lasts through April 8, the General Services Administration announced.

In addition to making the historic coins available to the public, a set of the dollars is also being presented to the Sm-

ithsonian Instituton's coin collection.

These coins and a smaller collection of more rare ones to be auctioned later this year are all that remain of federal

holdings of Carson City coins. The coins are 90 percent silver and experts have estimated the value of silver in each coin at about \$25. They are, of course, of increased value to collectors.

Now being offered for sale are coins minted in 1883 at \$65 each: those from 1884 at \$60 each and mixed coins minted between 1878 and 1885 and 1889 to 1893
