Short Warmup Due Over Area

Much Of Central U.S. Digging Out From Heavy, Crippling Snowfalls

LUBBOCK AREA RESIDENTS can expect most of the snow to melt today as temperatures climb into the upper 40s, but the National Weather Service says the South Plains has a chance for more snowfall by midweek.

The storm, which moved into Texas Friday from the west, rapidly moved eastward through the state, leaving in its wake one to seven inches of snow in the Panhandle-South Plains area and coating bridges and highways with sleet as far south as Aus-

The Lubbock area received 2 to 3 inches of snow, while Jayton had seven inches by Saturday morning. Other area snowfall reports included 2 inches at Abernathy, Big Spring, Crosbyton, Dimmitt, Levelland, Littlefield and Tahoka and 3 inches at Morton, Muleshoe, Plains, Plainview and Tulia.

Matador received 3 to 4 inches and Lamesa reported 3 1/2 inches. Hereford was coated with 4 inches and Seminole had 4 1/2 inches. Brownfield reported 5 inches of

Today's forecast in Lubbock calls for generally fair and warmer weather through Monday, with a high in the upper 40s and a low tonight in the lower 20s. Monday's high is expected to be in the upper 50s.

The extended forecast for West Texas calls for cloudy, cold weather Tuesday through Thursday with the possibility of snow in both the South Plains and the Panhandle on Wednesday or Thursday.

Skies over West Texas were expected to clear today, giving a brief respite as a high pressure system builds into Texas. But temperatures are expected to continue in the lower regions early in the week, with highs expected in the 30s and lows in the sub-

The wet winter weather also visited the Atlantic coastal states from North Carolina to New Jersey and into West Virginia, Pennsylvania, southern New England and across the upper Ohio Valley.

Before moving eastward the storm stranded thousands of cars in Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma, and many remained in ditches Saturday.

National Guardsmen manned four-wheel-drive trucks to ferry doctors to and from hospitals in Springfield, Mo., where 18 inches of snow put public buses out of service and forced the post office to close. Motels along Springfield's main arteries reported they were heavily booked with truckers and other travelers awaiting clear roads.

Guardsmen also provided emergency transportation in Pittsburg and Emporia, Kan. Officials said the 14 inches of snow recorded at Pittsburg was the heaviest in a quarter-century of record-keeping.

In Arizona heavy rain and snow continued to fall Saturday, prompting state officials to close a section of Interstate 10 east of Willcox before dawn.

Afternoon temperatures around the country ranged from 4 at Landers, Wyo., to 77 at Orlando, Fla.

Clayton Rejects Charges

Speaker, Others Subpoenaed In Bribes Probe

By A-J News Services AUSTIN — House Speaker Bill Clay-

ton has been subpoenaed to appear before a federal grand jury Tuesday in Houston with his telephone and appointment book records, but he has denied accepting a \$10,000 bribe to help an insurance firm win a state contract.

Rather, he declared, he is the victim "apparent political assassination" by

Clayton admitted he has a stack of \$100 bills given him Nov. 8 as a "political donation." He said the money was never accepted, but "held in a place for safe keeping" and that he intended to return

his office for another visit.

Clayton, first elected to the Texas Legislature from the South Plains in 1962, held a news conference Saturday afternoon after The Los Angeles Times published a story saying Clayton had ac-cepted \$10,000 in a wide-ranging FBI "sting" operation.

Clayton grew up on a family farm at Springlake in Castro County, a farm he still owns. He has represented District 74 for 18 years and has been speaker of the House since 1975. The district includes Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Deaf Smith,

Lamb, Oldham and Parmer counties. Veteran Houston City Councilman paed to go before Tuesday's grand jury in

Louisiana Gov. Edwin Edwards has been subpoenaed to appear before a fed-eral grand jury the same day in New Or-leans in connection with alleged payoffs growing out of the sting, code named "Brilab," short for bribery-labor.

The Brilab operation in Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Arizona and Arkansas initially was designed by the FBI and the U.S. Justice Department to ferret out corruption in union health and welfare insurance plans, an unnamed Justice Department source was quoted as saying in

The Times' Saturday edition. Accompanied by his attorney, Charles Burton of Austin, Clayton told reporters, favors for Prudential Insurance Co. other than to assure them that they have a fair and equal chance to participate in the bidding process."

Burton refused to let Clayton answer questions, saying the session was "not a political-question-and-answer

The plant, which will be constructed on what Hamilton calls, "some of the finest farmland in Lubbock County," will cost between \$5 million and \$10 million, depending on its size. Hamilton said he is studying the feasibility of building a plant that would produce 2.5 million gallons of 190-proof alcohol or one that could squeeze 5 million gallons of alcohol from South Plains corn and grains. Economics, he says, will be the deciding fac-

Hamilton's farm, which produces alfalfa, milo, corn and cotton, has been a family venture for more than 30 years, and the alcohol plant will be handled in

Although Hamilton has formed a corporation with his daugher and son to finance the venture, he is willing to share the enterprise with others, but no more than 35. "We will do this (build the alcohol plant) by ourselves or with 35 others." Hamilton said. "You run into too many problems when you get too many people involved," he said.

Hamilton indicated interest in the plant was growing and that he had "mon-ey waiting for him," if he wanted it.

Smallest Baby Pays Visit To Hospital

THE SMALLEST baby to survive premature birth at Health Sciences Center Hospital celebrated her first birthday this month weighing a healthy 18 pounds.

When Stacy Hunt was born, two months prematurely, she weighed 28 ounces and remained in the hospital's neonatal unit for more than two months. Statistics show that babies of that weight have a 50 percent chance of survival.

Stacy's parents, Sid and Tammy Hunt of Lubbock, estimate that by the time Stacy is 31, and possibly a mother herself, the \$53,000 hospital bill will be paid The high cost of neonatal care is attributed to the expensive equipment required

for the critical care babies and the one-to-one nurse-to-patient ratio. One nurse is assigned to each critical care neonatal infant around the clock at HSCH. By the time Stacy was dismissed from the hospital, at age 10 weeks and weighing four pounds, the nurses knew her well.

But Stacy was hardly recognized by the nurses this week when Mrs. Hunt took the child to the hospital for a visit. Stacy cheerfully went into the arms of registered nurse Holly Freeman, who was

one of several who cared for her in her first weeks of life.

Stacy's grandmother, Johnnie Maness, described the child's fingers as "matchsticks" when the baby was dismissed from the hospital last spring.
"Her feet were the size of my thumb," Mrs. Hunt said, explaining that even the

smallest baby clothes were too large for Stacy. "I went to a toy store and bought doll Although Stacy was born with underdeveloped lungs, a common problem of pre-

mature infants, and required the aid of a respirator to live, today she is described as in perfect health and normal development for her age.

"She plays patty cake and picks up on things fast," Mrs. Hunt said, hugging her giggling baby. "You're a wiggle worm," she told Stacy as the child bounced in her

mother's arms.

It may be years before Stacy's bill is paid; but as Dr. Thelma Kwan noted while watching the nurses get reacquainted with Stacy, "I tell the families don't worry

The worry for the Hunts was when Stacy was in the critical care unit. 'I did lots of praying. They told me they didn't expect her to live," Mrs. Hunt said shortly after the

baby was dismissed from the hospital last spring.

This week, worry was far from Mrs. Hunt's thoughts as she joyfully showed off her daughter to the nurses who helped make the first year of life possible.

Militants Warned To Obey Government

Iran's President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr praised the aims of Islamic militants who were holding some 50 Americans hostage for the 98th day Saturday. but issued them a veiled warning to obey government decisions, according to an interview with a Persian Gulf newspa-

Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh, meanwhile, said in a British Television interview that force might be used if the Iranian government met resistance in trying to take control of the U.S. Embassy in Tehran, which the militants seized 14 weeks ago when they took the hos-

Another top official, arrested and briefly held last week after the embassy captors accused him of being linked to the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency, urged Bani-Sadr to clean up what he called the various power centers in Iran.

Two television correspondents John Cochran of NBC, an American, and Arden Ostrander of CBS, a Canadian -were taken into custody by revolutionary guards early Sunday and were to be expelled from Iran, it was reported by other reporters. Government spokesman Abolghassen Sadegh said Cochran and Ostrander were in the country illegally and had ignored repeated requests to

The government ordered all journalists working for American news organizations to cease operations in Iran in mid-January, and most then left the country.

Cochran and Ostrander were taken from their hotel by the revolutionary guards and were believed to have been driven to Tehran's Mehrabad Airport. They joked with reporters from other Western countries as they left the hotel.

There were these other develop-·Andrew Young, former U.S. Am-

bassador to the United Nations, arrived in Algiers, Algeria declaring he had "no plan" for securing release of the Americans at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran. Young arrived from Rome, where he was asked about reports he would visit Iran. "I wish I could go," Young said. There have been persistent rumors in the Mideast that Young may figure in an international tribunal to investigate charges against deposed Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi as part of a package deal to release the Americans.

•The governor of Turkoman province in northern Iran appealed for calm and warned army troops would intervene after clashes Friday in which 12 persons were killed and 25 were injured, according to a Tehran radio broadcast monitored in London. The situation in the Turkoman city of Gonbad-e-Kavuz was

"on the whole critical," it said. Most of the inhabitants of the province are a Turkish-speaking minority that seeks self-rule.

A Tehran radio broadcast said the city was under the control of revolutionary guards and security forces. A representative of Iran's Moslem leader, Ayatollah Ruhollah Khorneini, was in Gonbad-e-Kavuz to investigate the clashes, the ra-

It reported one man was killed and another injured in a hand-grenade attack unidentified "suspicious elements," but did give details of the other casualties in Friday's clashes.

•The Iranian military announced the armed forces will stage a parade before Khomeini in Tehran on Monday, if his health permits, Tehran radio said. The 79-year-old Khomeini is in a Tehran hospital convalescing from a mild heart attack Jan. 23.

In the interview with Al-Ittihad, a semi-official newspaper published in Abu Dhabi, capital of the United Arab Emirates, Bani-Sadr was quoted as saying, "Let there be no suspicion that our students (embassy captors) are sick people, or bear animosity or any special feelings against the American hostages and the

rest of the American people."

According to the newspaper, Bani-

"The students are acting in order to achieve a high and safe objective. When the revolution and the state are sure that the operation of taking hostages has borne the required results, it would become its (the Iranian government's) responsibility to take the proper decision regarding the question of hostages.

'And when the state takes a decision. everybody should obey it and implement its decisions. Anyway, we continue to discuss the subject at the Revolutionary Council and when we take a decision re-garding the hostages, we will announce it, and the others (students) will implement it immediately.

In his interview broadcast Friday night on the Independent Television News of London, Ghotbzadeh said force might be used if the Iranian government met resistance from the militants. Force "isn't really necessary at this time," he said, adding: "If at any time the Revolutionary Council, with the backing of the imam (Khomeini) decides anything as such ... it will be exercised with, obviously, discussion and persuasion and if necessary with force."

Meanwhile, Information and National Guidance Minister Nasser Minachi, who was arrested last week after the militants accused him of CIA connections, urged Bani-Sadr to do something "serious about the various power centers. We are all Moslems, but are victims of a conspiracy. Today we are appealing for justice," added Minachi, who also denied the allegations of the embassy militants.

The militants broadcast their claims on national radio and television Tuesday night, which led to Minachi's unauthorguardsmen. Bani-Sadr had him freed Wednesday and called the militants "dictators who have created a government within a government."

Bani-Sadr also was briefed by Maj. Gen. Shadmehr, chief of Iran's combined general staff, on overall plans for the Iranian armed forces, Tehran radio report-

Saudis Soften Opinion Of Treaty Negotiation

WASHINGTON (AP) - Carter administration officials have detected a softening, at least in private, in Saudi Arabia's opposition to the U.S. attempts to negotiate a Middle East peace treaty beween Israel and the Arab nations.

Administration officials disclosed that two high-level officials, visiting Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, last week, found that Saudi officials were complaining that the peace process spawned by the 1978 Camp David meetings was moving too slowly.

Until recently, the Saudis had denounced the Camp David process as a fraud and an indication that the United States was not pursuing a peace agreement seriously.

Their oil wealth gives the Saudis a key position in almost all Middle East poliics, and support by the royal Saudi government in Riyadh is considered crucial to the success of a peace agreement reaching beyond Israel and Egypt.

The report on the Saudi position was made by well-placed sources who discussed the trip last week to Pakistan and Saudi Arabia by Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher and President Carter's national security adviser, Zbigniew Brzezinski. The trip was designed to reassure Pakistani officials about the U.S. commitment to their nation's security, and then report to Saudi Arabia on he Islamahad visit.

The officials spoke to a group of reporters Friday evening under ground rules that they not be identified by name, that no direct quotations be used and that their comments not be made public until Saturday

Both the Pakistanis and the Saudis have been particularly concerned about the role the United States will play in the Persian Gulf region following the Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan, which began in late December.

The sources said that while the Saudis were concerned about the settlement of questions about the future of the Palestinians, three-fourths of the longest discussion they held in Riyadh dealt with the developments in Southwest Asia and did not touch on Arab-Israeli issues.

The officials said this emphasis on the overall political picture in the region, rather than a single focus on the Palestinians, was significant, but they said it was important to emphasize Saudi con-cerns for the Palestinians lest they appear to be endorsing the Camp David

By talking both about the Palestinians, whose search for a haven is a key part in finding an overall peace agreement acceptable to all countries in the region, and about the role of the Soviet Union in Afghanistan, Saudi Arabia recognizes that the United States is "deadly serious" in its peacemaking efforts.

One of the officials said that those on

the trip were struck by the way Carter's opposition to the Soviet occuption of Afghanistan was becoming a "positive new element" in the Middle East, where Saudi opposition to Soviet threats has benefitted the United States



Kennedy Still Pushing For Debate With Carter

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) — Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, campaigning in Maine where polls show him running behind President Carter, said Saturday his challenge of the president will not be truly tested until Carter agrees to debate the

Kennedy told a news conference that "I don't think it's any mystery to the American people that there has to be a full dialogue and discussion and debate

"I think my candidacy will be tested truly when we do have such debate and

The Massachusetts Democrat declined to make any predictions on the outcome of Sunday's Democratic caucuses, saying only that "I'm confident we have support in the state."

However, published polls show Kennedy running behind Carter in this New

Kennedy said that regardless of the outcome in Maine, "We're going to con-

Kennedy long since has backed away from his statement that he "must" win in Maine and New Hampshire, which holds its primary Feb. 26. The senator made that assertion after losing to Carter by a 2-1 margin in the Jan. 21 Iowa pre-

Kennedy urged the Democrats to send a special message to Mr.Carter to come out of the Rose Garden and begin to debate and discuss the important issues of our time.

Carter's refusal to debate has been a major theme of Kennedy's campaign since his lowa defeat.

Earlier, Kennedy accused Carter of pursuing "milk toast" economic policies that will keep inflation and interest rates high while more than one million workers lose their jobs this year.

California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr., also seeking to wrest the nomination from the president, spent the day campaigning in Maine, hoping to cut into Carter and Kennedy support.

Appearing at a rafly in Rockland, Brown said the Maine caucuses shouldn't be a referendum on Kennedy and Carter, but rather a "referendum on the draft, on the militarization of the country and on the bankruptsy of our economic poli-

"A lot of people don't want to register guns," he said. "I hope they don't want

to register their teen-agers either."

The Maine spotlight fell solely on the Democrats, with the GOP caucuses taking place over a six-week span. None of the Republican contenders campaigned in the state Saturday.

Among the major GOP presidential contenders, former California Gov. Ronald Reagan stumped for support in New Hampshire and Sen. Howard H. Baker of Tennesse campaigned in Puerto Rico.

During a visit to Hooksett, N.H., Reagan called for an immediate program of otion and incentive enlistment to build the strength of the Army Reserve.

And he repeated his opposition to registering women for the draft.

"I wouldn't want to belong to a society that would put its women in trenches with men," he said.

Most observers have said they believe Carter will add a victory in Maine to his win in last month's lowa's precinct caucuses, further damaging Kennedy's already staggering campaign. And a poll published Friday by the Bangor Daily News said Carter leads Kennedy among registered Democrats in the state by 19 percentage points.

But Vice President Walter F. Mondale, stumping Maine on Friday on behalf of Carter, said, "This is going to be a very, very close race.

Maine Gov. Joseph Brennan, a Kennedy backer, declared, "I think Sen. Kennedy will come in first."

Brown has mounted a late-starting campaign, stumping the state personally and using radio and television commer-

Maine will send 22 delegates to this summer's Democratic National Convention, and Sunday's caucuses are the first step in a two-step selection process. The final step will be when the party holds its state convention on May 16-17.

In his speech before the American Federation of State. County and Municipal Employees in Washington, Kennedy said Carter's recent economic forecast is for "double digit inflation, very little hope about lowering of interest rates and a million and a half people who are holding jobs today are going to be put on the unemployment lists of this country."

In an economic report to Congress last month, the administration estimated that inflation would run to 10.4 percent this year while unemployment rose to 7.5. percent. Inflation was 13.3 percent on 1979. Unemployment during January was

FBI Swerves From Auto Thefts, Heists, Spying

WASHINGTON (AP) - The FBI's undercover investigations of major crime at work." one government official, who and corruption represent a sharp departure from its old preoccupation with car thieves, bank robbers, and political dissi-

In 51 major undercover operations, the bureau has launched its first serious attack on the crime conspiracies which influence much of the nation's economy.

Some investigations, such as the probe of insurance bribery disclosed in Los Angeles on Saturday, involve the classic mob operations the bureau calls La-Cosa Nostra. Others involve looser confederations of crooks banding together to seize a piece of an underworld traffic estimated in the billions of dollars.

Inevitably, law enforcement authorities say, the investigations are implicating public officials in influence-peddling. bribery and kickback schemes.

Though the FBI has been moving steadily into such major cases for the past five years, it had not until last week produced evidence of a major scandal involving members of Congress.

Although previous investigations had led to the indictment of dozens of state and local officials, few in Congress had questioned the propriety of the undercover "sting" tactics used by the FBI and other federal and local authorities.

But when the investigations spread over Capitol Hill, some members of Congress cried foul even though they were not personally implicated.

Sen. Adlai Stevenson, D-Ill., for instance, accused the bureau of "trying to harass and entrap innocent citizens, and

play games with the U.S. Senate." Other longtime bureau critics repeated earlier warnings that such undercover decoy operations carry a high risk of improper entrapment.

The developments have left some FBI officials frustrated at yet another round of congressional criticism for conducting exactly the type of investigations the Congress had urged.

Officials Sift Clues To Fatal Mid-Air Crash

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Investigators pieced together clues Saturday to the cause of a fiery mid-air collision that sent two small planes hurtling to the ground Friday, killing three people and injuring six on the ground.

Most of one plane, a Cessna 150, plunged into a construction site in El Segundo, injuring six workers, three critically. The other, a Piper Cherokee, hit about a mile north - just yards from the packed Hacienda Hotel.

The crash occurred in crystal-clear skies in a five-mile wide north-south corridor used by small planes to cross Los Angeles International Airport. The Cherokee was believed to be northbound and the Cessna going south when they collided about a mile south of the airport.

Bob Raizk, a student at El Segundo High School, said he was watching the two planes from the schoolgrounds They kept getting closer and closer. My heart started pumping. the 16-year-old said. There was a flash, and then parts of the planes filled the sky

Thomas Romero, 57, of Wilmington, who was working on a scaffolding at the contruction site, said he heard a crash just before debris rained down

I was surrounded by flames. I tried to protect my face with my hands. Everybody was telling me to jump. said Romero, who was treated for burns at Hawthorne Community Hospital and released, along with James Reid, 46, of Los Angeles' A third worker. Thomas Eames 35, of Los Angeles, remained in the hospital in good condition with a leg frac-

Two other workers, Mark McFarland, 26, and David Hepburn, 24, both of Pasadena. were listed in critical condition at David E. Brotman Memorial Hospital in Culver City with burns. Also in critical ondition at Torrance Memorial Hospital was Jose Sanchez, 51, of Los Angeles, with burns over one third of his body

The pilot of the Cessna was identified as Bruce Edward Leighton, 27, of Northridge, who was alone. Authorities decfined to identify the two occupants of the Cherokee pending the examination of dental records.

Federal Aviation Administration spokesman Al Garvis said the two planes were apparently operating under visual flight rules in the corridor and that neither had requested air traffic control assistance and therefore were not being followed on radar. National Transportation Safety Board officials were investigating the cause of the accident.

Sources say investigators never purposely set out to snare politicians, but rather aimed their efforts at breaking up crime conspira-

But it's very difficult to do an investigation like this without running into some politician or labor leader. They just seem to keep dropping in there," a veteran investigator observed.

Whatever the results of the criminal cases, congressional committees were certain to demand more details of the un-

The undercover role, a relatively new one for the FBI, was launched in a small way in 1974 and has been refined and expanded since then to a total of 85 current operations with 51 of them of them considered long-term and complex.

Before then, the bureau had focused on political subversion and simple cases of car theft and bank robberies. Those routine theft and robbery cases often were solved quickly, producing statistics that J. Edgar Hoover used year after to year impress Congress with the bureau's

Hoover, the bureau's legendary director for 48 years, balked at investigating organized crime though some mavericks in the field were arguing for such investigations years ago.

Soon after Clarence Kelley became director in 1973, he began steering the bureau into investigations of organized crime, white-collar crime and political corruption. Publicly and privately, he lectured investigators on the importance "quality over quantity" in developing

During the same period, the dirty laundry of the FBI's spying on domestic political organizations was exposed to public and congressional scrutiny. The ensuing pressure for reform led to Justice Department guidelines, and now a proposed legislative charter, spelling out when, how, why and whom the FBI may investigate.

The disclosures in the 1970s also led to federal criminal charges against three





He has never been arrested. He said he had witnessed the arrest and sentencing of two Ukrainian dissidents - musicologist Mykola Horbal and writer Yurij Badsio - before leaving the Soviet Union.



GOP Filings 'Amuse' Democratic Party Executive Director

A-J Austin Bureau AUSTIN - Final reports won't be in until Valentine's Day, but it appears that Texas Republicans are fielding quite a few challengers to Democratic office holders throughout the state.

That's a situation which, says State Democratic Party Executive Director Garry Mauro, delights him. Not that he's that impressed with the

GOP effort, Mauro adds

According to the GOP, the candidates filing for various congressional, judicial and legislative posts reflect voter unhappiness with the Democrats, and herald a new day for the Republican party in Tex-

"I find it kind of amusing," Mauro says, reporting he hears the GOP talking "recruiting good candidates who can defeat Democrats.

They're out recruiting candidates, and we're trying to find secretaries to handle all the candidates trying to file."

Nor will he be disheartened if the Republicans take a few matches this year. They have four per cent of the elected officials in Texas; we have 96 per

cent," he notes. "They can win a heck of a lot of races" without changing that very much, he adds

Mauro doesn't think that's likely to happen.

Texas, he argues, has an efficient state government, with low taxes compared to other states.

"I see no great move to throw the Democrats out: I think people want to keep things as they are.' Mauro believes the larger number of candidates at the local level will result in

a greater turnout among voters - which will work to the Democrats' advantage. In 1978, he says, there was "real complacency among the Democrats" - leading to the election of Gov. Bill Clements. That isn't likely to be the case in 1980,

he comments. There are more of us than there are of them" Mauro reasons, "so all we have to do is excite our people, and they'll get out and vote."

Last year, a poll taken by the Democrats showed only 39 per cent of Texans described themselves as Democrats, Mauro says, but a recent "Texas Monthly" poll showed 58 per cent now refer to themselves by the label.

"I personally hope they file somebody in every race," Mauro adds

Some Democratic candidates have expressed unhappiness that there is - at least as yet — no presidential preference primary on their ballot.

Mauro agrees that "if we had a primary we would have a little bit larger

We appeal to him to turn himself over to police authorities so he can get the help and treatment he so desperately needs," said Deputy Police Inspector Nicholas Cuccia. He said the man can surrender by calling police or going to any police station.

were not seriously injured. McCabe underwent six hours of surgery as doctors tried to repair the dam-

Despite Fiancee's Pleas, Jury Recommends Bundy Be Executed

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) - Despite a plea from his fiancee, a jury recommended Saturday that condemned killer Theodore R. Bundy be executed for kidnapping and murdering a 12-year-old school-

Circuit Court Judge Wallace Jopling set sentencing for Tuesday. He has the option of rejecting the recommendation of the jury. A death sentence would be the third such sentence for Bundy.

In asking that he be sentenced to life in prison, Bundy earlier questioned his fiancee, 32-year-old Seattle resident Carole Boone, during a session that ended with an unusual courtroom exchange:

"I want to make this very clear -Will you marry me?" the 33-year-old "Yes," Miss Boone replied, giggling.
"I do hereby marry you," said Bundy,

He testified however, that after Gacy placed a phone call to his mother in Arkansas, he hung up and told the police he did not have time to come to the station to make a statement because his uncle had died and he had "more important

We told him the young man that's missing is pretty important, too," Pickell testified. "He said his uncle had died and he asked the question: 'Don't you have any respect for the dead?"

'Maybe it was an accusation that we were not having any respect for his dead uncle." Pickell said. He later confirmed that Gacy's uncle had indeed died the day before.

Father Of Molested Girl Spots Suspect 19 Months Later

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - The father of a 12-year-old girl who was sexually molested spotted the man she accused and marched him at gunpoint to a police station - nearly two years after police began looking for him, authorities said.

Police said Clayton Rodriguez. 53. was wanted on 15 counts of sex offenses involving five children. At least one of the counts was aggravated rape, they

They had been looking for him for 19 months, authorities said.

A spokesman for the sheriff's office in populous Jefferson Parish, a New Orleans suburb, said they had been investigating complaints about Rodriguez when a girl and her mother came to them with another complaint.

Under questioning, the girl reportedly told them of other offenses against five girls from 10 to 12 years old.

Thursday, the father of the girl spotted Rodriquez on a busy New Orleans street, got a pistol from his car and ran ahead of Rodriguez and slipped into a telephone booth, police said.

The father made sure it was Rodriquez, then stepped out of the booth, stopped him at gunpoint and marched him to the nearby 2nd District Police Station, police said

Jefferson Parish officials said that while they had never stopped searching for Rodriguez, the trail went cold after he allegedly quit his job, left home and cut off contact with friends just before deputies showed up to arrest him in the







'Life's Necessities' Show 17.6 Percent 1979 Price Jump

energy, food, housing and health care jumped 17.6 percent last year, a group of private economists said Saturday, in a stinging critique of President Carter's anti-inflation policy

The National Center for Economic Alternatives, an academic research organization that studies economic problems, said skyrocketing prices for these "necessities of life" accounted for virtually the entire increase in 1979's overall inflation rate of 13.3 percent.

Prices of all other items rose 6.8 percent, only slightly more than in 1978 and actually less than in 1976, the center said.

Center codirector Gar Alperovitz said the administration's "failure to face up to the real causes of inflation now require wage and price controls.

Russians Said **Eyeing Afghan Partial Pullout**

The Soviet ambassador to Japan said Saturday that some of the estimated 90,-000 Russian soldiers in Afghanistan may be withdrawn "in the near future" if the United States and China don't escalate tensions there. But Afghanistan's new strongman said the Soviet troops will remain a while longer

Ambassador Dimitrii Polyanskii told Japan's Kyodo news service that he had no knowledge of a report that Moscow plans to begin a substantial reduction of its troops in Afghanistan by the end of

"Much depends on the United States and China," Polyanskii said. "The present situation in Afghanistan can end in the near future unless the two countries try to escalate it.

The Kremlin has repeatedly accused the United States and China of interfering in Afghanistan's internal affairs by allegedly arming and training the anti-Communist Moslem rebels who have been fighting a succession of pro-Moscow governments in Kabul for the past 21

In Washington, administration officials said they expected the Kremlin to make only a "cosmetic" withdrawal of its troops in an effort to defuse Western opposition. They also said the government was monitoring unusual, unexplained Soviet military activity north of the Iranian border near the troubled

Azerbaijan region of Iran. And in Kabul, the Afghan capital, the new Moscow-favored president told an interviewer the Soviet troops would leave his country only when "all signs of aggression against us are eliminated."

The center considers these items necessities because they can't be avoided easily. Families must pay the rent or mortgage payment; buy groceries, gasoline, fuel and electricity; and seek medical care when illness strikes As recently as 1976, the prices for

these necessities rose only 3.7 percent, while non-necessities increased a much higher 7 percent, the center said. Thus far, government has not only failed to attack the causes of necessities

inflation, but in connection with energy and housing costs, it has made the problem significantly worse," Alperovitz and center codirector Jeffrey Faux said.

Tight monetary controls have pushed interest rates to record-high levels, while price decontrol of domestic oil is fueling energy inflation, Alperovitz said.

Alperovitz said wage and price controls are "inevitable," but warned that unless the administration and Congress address the underlying causes of inflation and not its symptoms," controls could be a disaster for Americans.

"Controls by themselves won't work. The day they are lifted will be the day inflation re-explodes, Alperovitz said.

The question is: do we use the time that controls are in effect to deal with the real problems of inflation or do we

use controls purely as a political gesture? The center says inflation won't be solved unless the government invests more heavily in solar energy and mass transit, while pushing much harder for conservation, including gasoline ration-

It also calls for a massive expansion in the supply of housing, with federal help; and hospital cost-containment legislation and a program to stabilize cattle and grain supplies.

"This will take more leadership than either Congress or the president has exerted," Alperovitz said.

He said he would favor trimming any fat in the budget to find enough funds to cover the busing costs if an extensive desegregation plan is mandated

Medina also said he favors prayers in the public schools, but he believes prayer should be optional to the students.

The 36-year-old candidates operates an accounting service and formerly was director of the Business Development Center. Medina said he has two children in Lubbock public schools and a third child who will be in the school system in the future.

Medina joins realtor Med Hunt in the race for the Place 5 spot. Hunt announced his candidacy for the school board in January.

Witnesses Accused Of 'Benign Perjury'

SAN DIEGO (AP) - A California judge Saturday accused some psychiatric witnesses of "benign perjury" - altering their trial testimony to get defendants into therapy instead of prison.

Superior Court Judge Frank S. Pierson of Stanislaus County told a group of psychiatists at the California Medical Association's annual meeting that "some psychiatric experts will engage in what has been termed benign perjury.

"It may not be difficult for the benign perjurer to rationalize his compassion Pierson said. "He substitutes the word patient for defendant, and the courtroom oath to tell the truth (is overruled) by the Hippocratic Oath to do no harm to his patient. Judges take a dim view of this."

lion to \$80 million annually. Clayton said in his prepared statement that he had "gone through my re-cords and files" and determined that on Nov. 8, 1979, "a man purporting to be a representative of Prudential Insurance Co. came to my office" with a Clayton political supporter, L. G. Moore of Houston, regional director of the International Union of Operating Engineers.

Moore had requested the appointment, Clayton indicated, and was accompanied by Joseph Hauser, who presented a card identifying himself as representing "Fidelity Finance Consultants, representing Prudential Insurance Co. of America" out of Beverly Hills, Calif., according to a copy of a business card attached to Clayton's prepared statement to the news media

Hauser, a twice-convicted insurance promoter turned FBI informant, was an apparent key to the success of the sting operation. In 1977 Hauser received a 30month prison term for masterminding similar schemes in the Los Angeles area.

"Mr. Hauser indicated in his conversation with me that if Prudential Insurance Co. could bid and win the state contract that Prudential would save the state a million dollars on this contract," Clayton said.

"I replied that I'm always interested in any project that could save the state a million dollars, and that I would inquire as to what it would take to get on the list to receive the bid specifications and when the bid date would come up," he

At the end of the meeting, "Mr. Moore said that he wanted to give me a political contribution," Clayton reported.

"Instead of creating a scene with the resulting embarrassment to Mr. Moore in front of his business associate, I laid his offered contribution on my desk.

Afterward, Clayton said, he asked his assistant, Rusty Kelly, "to put the money in an envelope and put it in a safe, locked place" to be returned to Moore "the first time he came back to the office because I had no intention of accepting any contr bution under those circumstances.

"In my mind that was the end of the

"The money has not been touched, looked at or counted since that day," he said. "I don't know how much money there is, but it is exactly where it was put for safe keeping on Nov. 8 because Mr. Moore has not been back to the office so it could be returned.

He said he had been advised "that certain of my political adversaries are already attempting to take advantage of these unfounded accusations, but I am confident that my colleagues in the House will withhold judgment until all the facts are in.'

Burton, who was hired after Clayton was subpoenaed by federal officials, confirmed that Clayton has no plans to give up his race for an unprecedented fourth term as speaker of the House.

Burton also reported that Clayton and ossibly Kelly had had telephone conversations with Moore since the Nov. 8 meeting, but that to his knowledge the question of returning the money had not been discussed. Asked why Clayton had not sought to

return the money immediately, Burton said that as a busy official, Clayton had instructed that the money be returned and "thought no more about it." Clayton was not "paranoid" about the

money at the time, Burton said, although the speaker may not have been sufficiently suspicious to take immediate action to return the funds.

Burton said he had not counted the

Gov. Bill Clements expressed surprise at the charges against Clayton.

Clayton's troubles prompted immediate speculation and increased manuevering in the 1981 speaker's race, which already had shown signs of greater activity.

On Tuesday, Dallas Rep. John Bryant, a persistent critic of Clayton during the 1979 legislative session, fo announced his challenge to Clayton for the House's top leadership position, attacking Clayton for promoting "lobby boondoggles.

Bryant, 31 and a three-term member, claimed to have 62 "absolutely solid" pledges from incumbent House mempers, including 16 who have signed with

Clayton countered in an interview after Bryant's press conference that he could list at least 100 of the 150 members as among his solid supporters.

A source close to Bryant reported a number of House members, including some "surprising names," had contacted the challenger regarding changing their

Bryant himself was in Dallas but an aide said he was considering coming to Austin, possibly to meet with reporters. Another challenger, Fort Worth Rep.


Gib Lewis, was reviewing plans for a 1981 race if Clayton is not running. Lewis previously had indicated he intended to seek the speaker's post in 1983,

The state medical investigator's office, meanwhile, announced that none of the 33 inmates killed had died of a drug overdose

And prosecutors said Friday they plan to seek the death penalty where the law will allow it

District Attorney Eloy Martinez said prosecutors won't know who to charge for a month or two. He said earlier he expects that 75 to 125 prisoners will be

charged with a variety of counts. New Mexico's 1979 capital punishment law makes the death penalty applicable in some kinds of killings, including killing of a witness or a person who might report a crime, killing during an attempted escape or in a kidnapping or a killing in connection with rape.







Some regional junior high and high school students who have set their sights on a teaching career will begin training Monday that will give them a taste of the educator's life.

Representatives of Future Teachers Clubs from Idalou, Ralls, Lorenzo and Crosbyton, plus interested students from Post, will attend a workshop in Ralls designed to instruct them in teaching a remedial reading program.

The representatives will take the training back to their own club members, who will tutor students in their schools who need improvement in reading skills.

Deficit Spending Linked To Decline

WASHINGTON (AP) - The chief onomist for the National Association of Realtors says the December decline in nome sales can be attributed to federal deficit spending and the resultant tight-

Jack Carlson noted that sales of existing homes fell in December, the third

straight month that has happened.

Carlson said this emphasizes "... the damaging effect of the federal government's economic policy - loose spending and tight credit - on the housing industry. Sales were adversely affected in every region of the country as credit availability decreased everywhere."

Each tutor will spend his or her study hall with an individual student in need of the program for 30 minutes a day, three to five days a week.

'We're finding real success with it," she said, adding that the cooperative de-cided to expand the program in order to include students in the regular classroom who also need reading improvement.

The tutoring program was developed not only to improve all students' skills, but also to give the future teachers first hand experience in the educational pro-

"The kids are going to find out how complicated a thing the language is and that teaching really is scientific," Mrs. Roy said. She added that peer tutoring is often

more effective than tutoring by an adult because the younger tutor and his charge 'sometimes gain a quicker rapport." The tutors themselves also "improve

their reading scores drastically," Mrs.

Roy said. The reading program, called "Basic Reading for Secondary Schools," is a highly structured step-by-step reading skills program with comprehension built in," she said. Students learn the basic letter sounds and sight reading and are re-

quired to master certain skills before a peer tutor at her junior high school. they can advance.

The tutors also are tested for their reading skills to ascertain their ability before they are allowed to teach the read-

Tech Production Termed 'Pure Delight'

The director's notes for the production of Neil Simon's "The Good Doctor" make an important point in saying Russian writer Anton Chekov is more noted for his heavy works and Simon is more noted for his fluff. Had the notes been as tacky as this writer, they may have gone on to say the University Center's dramatic productions have been noted for their grand failures. That would complete the setting for this production's punchline, namely that nothing is as it once seemed. In an awesome use of small stage area and crowded seating, this "backstage dinner theater" production is pure delight, a series of vignettes which are always charming, often hilarious and occasionally honestly painful.

Simon's "The Good Doctor" is a group of comedic sketches adapted and suggested from the short stories of Anton Chekov. In it, humor is found in such unlikely places as high government, old wharfs, bank offices and public parks. We laugh at such unlikely oc-

currences as pain and death and rejection and adultery; we feel for these characters. just as we recognize the human

qualities and foibles Chekov (Simon) is attempting to illustrate. Not enough praise, though, can be administered director Richard Privitt as he has combined music and setting to suprisingly good effect. It has also been uttered by some that the director's most difficult task lies in the casting process; if so, Privitt was up to the task. He not only cast capable, sometimes tremendously effective, young actors, but evidently managed to recognize in advance how he would be able to use a face, an expression. The most effective part of the segment called "The Governess" is not the apparent vicious selfishness of the title character, who we indeed grow to despise for her initial cruelty, but instead the look on the face of the humiliated employee.

The pain in actress Terre Finley's face and, more specifically, her eyes was the catalyst which set our emotions into turmoil. Privitt stages the scene brilliantly, as he does the others

in which Gary Walters - playing the writer Anton Chekov, relating and sometimes acting out his own stories - will step smoothly from reality into fiction before our very eyes.

Walters is, by the way, a real theatrical find here. He is nothing short of perfect, absolutely flawless, as The Writer: our guide throughout the play. His asides to the audience draw us not just into the play's format, but into his very rooms and settings. Walters has mastered every necessary pause, every nuance. He is wonderful merely talking about writing, extremely effective as he's approached and asked to shell out rubles to watch a fake drowning and believable as the father paying his son's way into manhood.

Even his use of voice alone adds sensitivity to "The Audition," one of the more difficult scenarios and one which, unfortunately. Miss Finley is not able to pull off. But the best segment of the play is the one entitled "The Seduction," which closes Act One. In it, Walters moves from Chekov to one of his characters (again, Privitt's decisions on timing of repetitive dialogue by different characters is masterful) and plays the role of the "foremost seducer of other men's wives." He hilariously and cockily offers us a play-by-play account of the action, a rare revelation of his techniques and secrets, and we are left practically on the floor laughing at his egotistical, smug looks.

Terre Finley, who bears a remarkable resemblance on stage to Jane Curtin (Of "Saturday Night Live" fame), also offers her

Clara Crockett is, as mentioned, effectivly wicked as the governess, and really makes the most of the ribald, Carol Burnettish comedy in "A Defenseless Creature." Here she is a crotchety wife, driving everyone crazy as she tries to get money out of a bank official for her husband - who does not even work at the bank. Calling herself a meek old woman, she proceeds to antagonize and attack, belabor and belittle, irritate and initiate both fear and potential nervous breakdowns. It's slapstick, but it works.

In the same line, "Surgery" offers a wonderful bouncing of physical comedy back and forth between Walters and Darren Roy Walker. The latter steals the scene (a difficult task with Walters around) with his painful praying and defensive reflexes. Indeed. Walker is solid throughout, with one of his finer mo-

But he, too, impresses, with his able mastery of dialogue in The Sneeze," his best work in "The Seduction" (playing the unknowing husband, complete with a snicker and innocence worthy of applause), and his excellent version of a seedy wharf rat peddling strange entertainment. As the young Chekov in 'The Arrangement," his fear seemed a bit too forced, but the scene still managed to expose a tender memory

In fact, of the many segments — stories, if you will — the only ones which failed to work were "Too Late For Happiness." surprising because of its ripe potential to tug at heartstrings, and "The Audition." (It may not be fair, but I found myself making comparsions to actress Debbie Lemen's work in the same part in Ronald Schulz's 1977 production).

Playing no small part in the success of the production were also set designer Robyn Williams, lighting designer Larue Willis and costume designer Vicki Woolridge. Though I've mentioned countless times my dislike for having to watch set changes take place (unwanted reality), there was no way to get around it with this small stage. That the changeovers were never once bothersome is more reason to laud Privitt's ability to divert our eyes, and the quiet professionalism of set running crew mem-bers Chris Roberts, Kathy Mossello and Mary Donahue. A final tip of the hat to lighting director Pat Donelly, and I hope I haven't left anyone out - because this is a team effort.

The University Center has been trying to offer something different in its backstage dinner theater productions, a sort of alternative theater. As something new, it takes time to get the kinks worked out. But with capable direction and casting, with the contributions of people who care about the final product, the result can be commendable entertainment. "The Good Doctor" is proof of that.

"The Good Doctor" will have its final dinner theater performance at 7:30 p.m. today. No tickets remain for dinner & show, but those wishing to skip the dinner and buy tickets for the play alone should show up at the Tech University Center at

Seminole Schedules Bond Issue, Municipal Elections April 5

SEMINOLE (Special) - The Semi- 3,000 to 25,000 gallons will go from 35 nole City Council has agreed to try again its \$1 million revenue bond election for improvements to the city's water and sewer systems. The election has been set for April 5 - the same day as the municipal election.

About three months ago 161 voters here turned down the bond issue by nearly a two-to-one margin.

The revenue bond, which is divided into two propositions, calls for \$650,000 in water improvements and another \$350,000 to upgrade the city's sewer sys-

If the issues pass, the water and sewer rates will be raised by \$1 a month. The present water rate of \$4 a month for the first 3,000 gallons would be increased to \$5. and the sewer rate would jump from \$3.50 a month to \$4.50. The water rate for ground storage reservoir, a new 1,000 gal-

cents to 40 cents per thousand and for water usage after 25,000 gallons, the rate will be raised from 40 cents to 45 cents a thousand.

Seminole City Administrator Mike McGregor said he thinks passage of the bond issue is important for the future growth of the community. McGregor said the city has sufficient water to meet present needs, but based on projected population growth, Seminole will need more water by 1989.

The recommended improvements to the water system include:

 Drill wells at the two remaining well locations in the existing well field; •Install a third 1,000 gallon per min-

ute pump at the well field pump station; Construct a new 500,000 gallon lon per minute booster pump station and chlorination facilities approximately one mile west of the intersection of Southwest 11th Street and Southwest Avenue

•Implement control system improvements inorder to improve control of well pumps and booster pumps in town and to allow remote monitoring of water system conditions at water superintendent's off-

·Provide additional feeder mains in areas around the new high school and mercantile district:

•Replace system lines that are two inches in diameter and smaller;

·Provide cathodic protection for ex-

isting ground and elevated storage tanks. meet present needs but added that the main problem is in their distribution sys-The proposed improvements for the sewer system are to replace the existing

Glaser cited three reasons the city needs the water and sewer improvements — to increase system reliability, to better enable the system to meet peak demands in the summer and to improve the operational control over the system.

The improvements should be adequate for Seminole through the year 2000, but sometime after 1990, additional water supply will be needed because of

the declining water table," Glaser said. The engineer explained that Seminole relies on wells for its water supply and that over the years continued use of ground water reduces the amount of ground water available.

Sometime after 1990, the city is probably going to have to get new water wells and transmission facilities. But, then again; they might go until 2000; it's really difficult to predict what the long term ground water supply picture will be," Glaser said.

The city's present well field is located about four miles west of Seminole, but Glaser said that the city has water rights to land about 16 miles west of Seminole. However, he said that city officials intend to evaluate the suitability of closer water supplies that would be more readi-

Plans Mapped Out For Gerontology Center

nearly died.

South Plains politicians, bankers, physicians, ministers, hospital administrators and Texas Tech University officials met Saturday to coordinate plans for a model of a long-term care gerontology center.

Gail House, executive director of the Southwestern Gerontological Institute, said 82 of 100 members of the project's nine committees met on the Tech campus to discuss the federally funded center that is destined to become a rurally based model for the care of the aged.

The institute, which begam last October, was one of 22 programs funded by the Administration on Aging to develop comprehensive care centers for the aged, especially the frail and vulnerable elderly. Dr. David English, an official with the Administration on Aging. which is part of the United States Department of Health and Human Services (formerly the Department of Health, Education and Welfare), told the group that the basic thrust of their long-term care center should be to meet the needs of the people it will be designed for and not for program needs.

Mrs. House said it will take at least five years to completely develop a comprehensive model. When in operation, the program will be based at Texas Tech and will have a three-pronged approach which will include research and training, education and service. Mrs. House said some phases of the program, which has a strong community emphasis, may be in operation

Of the 22 projects underway across the nation, only 10 care enters will evolve. Mrs. House said the one serving the Lubbock area will be unique in that it will emphasize a rural concept and the needs of the Hispanic community.

The care center committees will be meeting individually during the next few months, with the next conference tentative-



Corporate Profits Expected To Hit Record Level

NEW YORK (AP) - Although corporate profits are expected to reach a record level when all returns from the fourth quarter are in, some economists say the numbers are deceptively strong.

Overall, after-tax corporate profits are expected to total about \$149 billion in the final quarter of 1979, according to preliminary figures from the Commerce Department That's up almost 13 percent from a year earlier and higher than many economists had predicted at the start of last year.

But individual corporate earnings reports coming out in recent weeks show apatchwork effect.

Exxon, for instance, reported a 60 percent earnings jump in the final quarter of 1979, bringing last year's total earnings to a record \$4.3 billion, more than any other industrial concern last year and a 55 percent increase from 1978.

Fellow industrial giant General Motors showed a decline in earnings of almost as much - 57 percent in the fourth quarter. GM's earnings for the year were \$2.9 billion, off 18 percent from the year

American Telephone & Telegraph,



the largest non-government company in the world, this past week also made news with its \$5.67 billion in earnings for 1979. That was the highest ever reported by any U.S. company and represented a 7.6 percent increase from the utility's earnings from the year before.

But financially ailing Chrysler Corp. turned in a grim record, announcing a \$1.097 billion loss last year, the largest operating deficit for a company in the na-

Data Resources Inc., a Lexington, Mass.-based economic forecasting firm,

says its survey of 25 industry group shows a fairly broad range of industries showing strong results as fourth quarter profit reports come in.

"Interestingly enough, although pe troleum profits have been getting a lot of attention, there are at least four other industries with bigger profits," said Lee Phillips of Data Resources.

Based on samplings of profit reports out so far, Data Resources calculates that petroleum profits were up about 31 from the previous year. But rail companies' profits were up about 32 percent; aluminumn copper and non-ferrous metals producers' rose 59 percent, and a small sampling of farm equipment manufacturers posted gains of more than 900 percent, Phillips said.

Still, he notes that sagging profits in auto, steel and some other industries are likely to spread next year if, as Data Resources and many economists predict, a recession develops in 1980.

Even the results of the last quarter, Phillips says, are less impressive when inflation is taken into account.

demand for goods and services this year will cause the deepest drops in profits in the last half of the year. For 1980 as a whole, the company is forecasting a 2.3 percent decline in aftertax profits to \$141.3 billion from \$144.7 billion in 1979.

But when adjusted for inflation, the forecasting company says that works out to a much steeper 10.5 percent drop.







Stocks Move Higher In Trade Sessions

Schneider, Bernet & Hickman, Inc.

After a sluggish start early in the week, stocks moved sharply higher in the last trading sessions. Oil, rail and metal continued their upward pace at top speed but the gain in other issues was not as spectacular. Volume continued to

run about 50 million shares on an average basis this week.

Strength in the rails, boosted by their oil and coal properties, moved the Dow Jones transportation average to another new high this week. The utility average reached its highest mark 1977. The American Stock Exchange average, New York Stock Exchange composite index and NASDAQ Over-the-Counter index all moved into new high ground. Only the Dow Jones industrial average continued to lag the over-all market.



Although most stocks were up this week, some of the airlines, computers and auto issues retreated. The airlines and autos are declining in response to a drop in consumer demand in the computers as only a technical correction since they are fundamentally on sound ground.

Analysts believe that the 900 level of the industrial average appears to be a psychological barrier for the market. They said that when the market approaches this level, many investors seem to step up their selling. The selling has had little effect thus far, however, since buyers are willing to purchase stocks as soon as prices begin to fall

Experts maintain that the stock market's recent action J.L. HUTCHESON has become concentrated in fewer and fewer issues. There also appears that some of the money fueling the latest rally has come from the bond market. The recent panic in the bond markets is giving rise to caution among many stock market investors.

As the collapse of bond prices continues, additional pressure is placed on the Federal Reserve to act to control inflation. If the Fed decides to take such action, the result could have adverse impact on the stock market similar to last October

Many institutional money managers assert that the individual investor is now moving back into the stock market after being dormant for many years. They feel that many people stood by and missed the meteoric rise in gold and real estate prices and now perceive that the stock market is one of the few bargains left in today's inflationary environment. Due to this, experts say, individual investors seem ready to take full advantage of any speculative opportunities

Economists continue to look for the recession that has yet to begin. Some believe that the strong indebtedness from consumers will result in a backlash which will move the country into the long waited recession. If such an event should occur, then most feel that the GNP could decline for the first three quarters of this year and corporate profits might fall about 10% below record

Single-Digit Interest Rates Not Likely

There has been some deline recently in home-mortgage rates from their recent record levels. While this is good news, home buyers can find little else to be optimistic about. Many housing experts now believe that single-digit interest rates are a thing of the past.

Mortgage rates soared after the Federal Reserve Board's money squeeze began last October. The average interest rate on mortgage commitments in January was 13% nationally with many areas demanding 14% or more. With few takers at such high rates, mortgage money is now available for a little less than 13 . Many housing economists are expecting a further decline later this year.

Most economists generally don't expect mortgage rates to drop below 10 1 2 in 1980, and nobody sees a return soon to the 9% range. Lenders maintain that continued inflation plus higher costs to attract money from savers will keep rates high.

Federal Home Loan Bank economists feel that the only thing that could push mortgage rates below 10% this year would be a recession that's much deeper than expected. They foresee rates at current levels for the next few months followed by a drop to 10 1/2% or 11% during the expected recession and then another round of increases during the recovery.

Due to the recent changes in the regulation of savings-and-loans associations, federal regulators are allowing S&L's to pay market-level interest rates on many deposits and attract savers who would otherwise be drawn to the money-market funds

In the process, savings-and-loans are losing funds that cost them less than 6 a year and gaining funds that cost almost twice that much. Money from passbook accounts has declined to only a quarter of total funds, while high-cost money-market certificates and deposits of more than \$100,000 account for more than a third of total deposits.

As a result, lenders are getting locked into paying higher rates to savers and will be under pressure to keep their mortgage rates up as long as possible. There is no way they can bring their costs down as fast as their rates come

Despite such high cost of money, housing officials predict homes will continue to be built and bought. Although home sales have slowed in recent weeks and prices have leveled off in some areas, average home prices nationwide are

still up considerably from a year earlier.



Higher Interest Not Supressing Stocks

AP Business Writer NEW YORK (AP) — The long-standing investment principle that rising interest rates mean falling stock prices is being severely tested in the early weeks

Since the start of the year, long-term rates in the bond market have risen sharply as bond prices fell.

But instead of attracting money from the stock market, the bond market's troubles seem only to have contributed to a feverish rally in stock prices.

Analysts at Dean Witter Reynolds Inc. oint out that traders in the bond and stock markets seem to be looking at the same set of economic issues through op-

posite ends of a telescope.

Both evidently see continued inflation and an economy that remains stubbornly strong, repeatedly postponing a long-forecast recession. "A moderation in economic activity just hasn't occurred," said Hugh Johnson, an analyst at First Albany

But investors in stocks are taking that as positive news, while those in bonds have seen it in a decidedly negative light.

While the bond market was nosediving this past week, stock prices advanced for the fifth consecutive week on continued heavy trading.

The New York Stock Exchange composite index, up 1.49 at 67.57, and the American Stock Exchange market value record highs.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, up 14.25 at 895.73, reached its highest level in four months. In the last five

weeks the average has risen 66.89 points. Big Board volume averaged 50.49 million shares a day, against 54.56 million the week before.

"Can the assumptions on the outlook for business activity, inflation, interest rates and profits fit such a pessimistic attitude for bonds while the stock market thrives on them?" Dean Witter analysts asked. "The economic case which calls for

continued growth in real business activi-

ty and high inflation and interest rates

would appear to have the ingredients to satisfy the optimism for equities while feeding the bears in the bond area. "Corporate profits would be maintained, and it is assumed that companies

will be successful in passing along inflationary costs.' But as Dean Witter analysts and others point out, there is a big question

mark in that view of the economic outlook: The future behavior of consumers, who up till now have been keeping the economic fires burning by spending, rather than saving.

The decision to spend in the face of virulent inflation marked a reversal of old attitudes," economists at New York's Morgan Guaranty Trust pointed out. "In earlier years, consumers tended to re-

index, up 11.22 at 288.79, both reached duce spending and increase saving when inflation worsened

"Whether the new attitudes toward spending and saving will persist is crucial to the pace of business activity in the

months just ahead." At Dean Witter, Lee H. Idleman, senior vice president and director of research, concluded: "We remain concerned that the consumer, the ultimate recipient of higher prices, has a finite tol-erance already stretched by high personal debt burdens and a very low apparent savings rate.

'It occurs to us that the ingredients still favor a recession, which is not likely to be forestalled. If, however, fiscal and monetary policy is aimed at delaying the recession until after the election (we're not convinced that is the case), then pain postponed is likely to be more acute."

Baylor opened up a 20-point lead only minutes into the second half and skipped to a 79-56 whipping of Texas Tech. The 23-point margin of defeat was the Raiders' worst loss of the season. The Raiders, after a disastrous road trip, are now

7-6 in SWC play and 13-10 on the year. The Raiders, who had a two-game lead on third place after defeating Texas A&M on Monday, are now lodged in fourth place in the conference standings, a half-game behind the Longhorns. The Bears are now 5-8 in conference play and 10-13 on the year.

Sports In Brief Vance Delivers Message To IOC damental Olympic principle to conduct a "token" withdrawal of troops within

Carter administration finally had its head-on confrontation with the International Olympic Committee Saturday night over the issue of whether the Summer Olympics should be held in Moscow

Secretary of State Cyrus Vance told a meeting of the IOC the United States government will oppose sending an American team to Olympic Games "in the capital of an invading nation" and urged that the Games be moved from the Soviet capital.

In an earlier address, Lord Killanin of Ireland, president of the IOC, urged that the Olympic Games be kept free of politics, expressed his dislike of sport being used as a political tool, and also admitted "I have never denied or ignored the intrusion of politics into the Olympic

Killanin reiterated his stand that the IOC signed a contract with Moscow in 1974 to hold the 1980 Summer Games there and said it must be honored. "Solutions to the political problems of the world are not the responsibility of sporting bodies such as the International Olympic Committee, but of the appropriate governmental organizations.

President Carter has asked the committee to postpone, cancel or move the Summer Games from Moscow if the Soviet Union does not withdraw its troops from Afghanistan by Feb. 20. If the occupation continues past that date, the president does not want U.S. athletes to com-

State Department officials said, meanwhile, they have received informathe next three or four weeks to defuse Western opposition. The Russians began moving troops into the country in late December and installed a puppet govern-

Vance had met with Killanin before the opening of the IOC meeting and there were reports he implored the secretary not to inject politics into his welcoming speech to delegates here to meet before the Lake Placid Winter Olympics.

However, a prepared text of Vance's remarks had been shown to reporters in Washington earlier Saturday and he followed it almost to the letter.

After Killanin's plea to Vance had failed, he called Vitaly Smirnov of the Soviet Union to his room and asked the Soviet IOC delegate to do his best to avert what had been rumored as a walkout of the meeting if Vance spoke of Carter's position:

The Associated Press learned that Juan Samaranche of Spain, chief IOC protocol officer and Spanish ambassador to the Soviet Union, canvassed members of the committee and convinced them not to walk out or put up any other kind of demonstration in reaction to Vance's

Vance said the Games had symbolized peace from their beginnings.

'In the view of my government," he said, "it would be a violation of this fun-

or attend Olympic Games in a nation which is currently engaged in an aggressive war, and has refused to comply with the world community's demand to halt its aggression and withdraw its forces.

"Let me make my government's posi-tion clear: we will oppose the participation of an American team in any Olympic Games in the capital of an invading na-

Without mentioning the Soviet Union by name, he said:

We already see the nation selected host of the Summer Games describing its selection as recognition of 'the correctness of (its) foreign political course and its' enormous services ... in the

struggle for peace'. In his remarks introducing Vance, Killanin pleaded that the Games be excluded from politics.

Solutions to the political problems of the world are not the responsibility of sporting bodies such as the International Olympic Committee, but of the appropriate governmental organizations," Killanin said.

One cannot ignore the increasing violence and intolerance in the world. As I have repeatedly said, we have the greatest dislike of sport being made the target, when political, diplomatic and economic measures should be used by those with conflicting ideologies to resolve the dif-

'I would implore all those with different opinions and feelings: do not use the Olympic Games to divide the world, but to unite it-do not use athletes for the solution of political problems.

"I thought it was rather unfortunate," Douglas F. Roby, a United States IQC member, said of Vance's remarks.

"I think it's time we not only talked about taking politics out of the Games but took practical steps to do it," said Lance Cross of New Zealand, a member of the IOC executive board. "We should stop asking heads of state and deputy heads of state to opening ceremonies.

Vance told a reporter "Everyone was very kind and listened. They may have disagreed but they were willing to lis-

Asked if there was any indication what the IOC might do about the problem. Vance said. "No. Some disagree. Some agree." He got into a car and left for the airport to return to Washington.

days, the XIII Winter Olympics begin at this picturesque Adirondack playground, and athletes from the United States appear poised to increase their medal count from the 1976 Games.

At the 1976 Innsbruck Games, America's winter sports exponents gathered 10 medals - three by speedskater Sheila Young-Ochowicz.

Mrs. Ochowicz is retired now, married and the mother of a 1-year-old daughter, but she left a legacy of U.S. dominance in speedskating that could propel America to its best Winter Olympics ever.

The most medals ever won by the United States in the Winter Games was 12 in 1932 at Lake Placid - six gold, four silver and two bronze. Last time around. America had three gold, three silver and four bronze

More medals are probable in figure skating. Several other categories - alpine skiing, bobsled, cross-country skiing, jumping and hockey - also could produce others.

In figure skating, Linda Fratianne, a 19-year-old from Northridge, Calif., is the reigning world singles champion for women, and is favored to win the gold here. The defending men's world champion is Vladimir Kovalev of the Soviet Union, but 1978 world champion Charles Tickner of Littleton, Colo., could come away with a medal.

The team of Tai Babilonia and Randy Gardner of Los Angeles reign as world pairs champions, but perennial Soviet titleholders Irina Rodnina and Alexandr Zaitsev have returned from a year's retirement and will challenge.

Those two skating sports alone then could yield as many as 13 medals. The United States' best shot at more is in alpine skiing - downhill, slalom and giant

Cindy Nelson, 23, of Lutsen, Minn., is America's only returning Olympic medalist in alpine skiing, having won a bronze in downhill at Innsbruck. She has to be considered a strong contender for another medal.

"I'm happy to have '76 behind me. she says. "Being the only medalist doesn't put any special pressure on me. I'm comfortable, I'm relaxed and I'm

Miss Nelson leads a large group of American women who have done well in the World Cup this season, Heidi Preuss, 18, of Lakeport, N.H., and Holly Beth Flanders, 21, of Manchester, N.H., have excelled in downhill. Christin Cooper. 20, of Sun Valley, Idaho, has had her best year in giant slalom, and Abbi Fisher, 22, of South Conway, N.H., is a threat in sla-

Legal Maneuvering Leaves Taiwan Athletes In Limbo

victory was sweet but very short for Taiwan athletes who want to be listed as representatives of the Republic of China if they compete in the XIII Winter Olym-

Minutes after state Supreme Court Justice Norman Harvey signed a formal order Saturday allowing a Taiwan skier to compete as a representative of the Republic of China, Justice A Franklin Ma honey of the Appellate Division stayed execution of the lower court order.

The Appellate Division, a middle-level appeals court which sits in Albany, N.Y., has agreed to hear an appeal of Harvey's decision Monday, but the stay leaves Taiwan's athletes in legal limbo at least until then

"I have full confidence in U.S. justice." said Tom Hsueh, a spokesman for Taiwan's Olympic Committee. "But to allow discrimination to continue on and our athletes are kept away from practice

is very, very disappointing. He and other officials had gathered at the Lake Placid Olympic Organizing Committee headquarters in town hall to serve committee lawvers with Harvey's order. Then they received word that the

order had been staved. LPOOC chief counsel William Kissel said the athletes would be given housing and accreditation only if they agreed to use a new name, flag and anthem mandated by the International Olympic Committee last year in an attempt to keep Taiwan in the Olympic movement while allowing mainland China to rejoin it

Taiwan's delegation has refused to comply so far, insisting that it is entitled to the Republic of China designation.

For years, mainland China has refused to compete in international sport with any Taiwan team that calls itself the Republic of China and uses the old Chinese flag, even though it is different from the flag of the People's Republic of China


Athletes and officials from mainland China have been living in the Athletes' Village for several days. The Taiwan group checked into a Lake Placid motel after being denied accompdations under the name Republic of Chins. The group refused the IOC-approved name.

The 1979 hunting season appears to be the salest season since 1965 according to a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department spokesman

Only 50 hunting accidents were reported through the Uniform Hunter Casualty Reports filed by Texas game wardens. Of these accidents, nine were fatal Shotguns lead the list of firearms involved in the accidents; rifles were a

There was a total of 80 persons involved in these accidents and 26 were 16 years of age or younger. Sixteen of the aecidents were classified as "Hunter Judgement -caused. In other words,

when another shooter swung on game, were hit while out of sight of the shooter. or were mistaken for game by the shoot-

Among shooters hunting game animals and birds, deer hunting accounted for 12 accidents, and quail and dove hunting accounted for eight accidents

Shooters in four of the accidents were reported to be graduates of formal hunter safety training courses. Two of them were graduates of the Texas Volunteer Hunter Safety Training program.

Common Cause: Government Taken Over By Lobbyists

has been taken over by special interests, each battling for its particular cause to the neglect of the national welfare, Common Cause charged

The citizens political action group also alleged in a new study that costly government subsidies for special interests are a leading, but largely overlooked, cause of inflation.

For example, the 104-page report says, the government paid five Arizona beekeepers more than \$1 million for dead bees between 1967 and 1974, and investors in "irreplacable natural resources" such as sand and gravel get a \$364 million yearly bonus from Uncle Sam. Common Cause contends that breaks for the

trucking industry cost consumers \$1 billion or more each year, and some of the nation's biggest land owners get what amounts to free irrigation water worth \$1,540 an acre.

"Although they operate very differently, these four groups share one important charactaristic: all benefit from subsidies provided by groups," the report says. "The costs are paid for by taxpayers and consumers.

Despite widespread public frustration over inflation and wasteful government spending, public officials and citizens pay far too little attention to the federal subsidy system," the report complains.

Common Cause says this is caused in part because no government agency keeps track of these special breaks and "partly it is because most subsidies are not direct grants from the public treasury but are tax benefits, subsidized interest rates, or economic regulations that do not show up in the federal budget."

The study claims this is one of the reasons inflation is as much a political problem as an

"A growing number of organized interest groups seeking to acquire and maintain benefits from the government are placing tremen dous demands on our economy and the public treasury - demands that far exceed what cur-

Common Cause says it is the job of the country's political leaders to look at the broader picture of national interests in making policy decisions, "but in recent years they have capitulated more and more to the pressures and political

clout of narrow interest groups."

Based on their actions during 1979 on 11 different special interest issues, from subsidies for agricultural and transportation industries to political reform, Common Cause graded President Carter and Congress and gave both poor

Carter drew a C-minus for his resistance to special interest subsidy demands and a C on government reform issues. The House got a C in the first category and a C-minus in the second, while the Senate got D-minus and D.

"The president's report card represents a mixed record," the report says. "Although good on institutional reforms, President Carter

was soft on special interest groups. "In the House of Representatives, votes for campaign finance reform and against increasing the sugar subsidy were shining exceptions to an otherwise poor performance," it says. "With the exception of significant steps it took toward budget reform, the Senate failed to stand up to the special interests."

The greatest danger of the "Special Interest State," however, is to democratic government, Common Cause conclude

"The Special Interest State is a threat to our political and economic well being," the report says. "It offers special pleading as a substitute for democracy — government run amok. It is government by interst group — a system in which the national interest is too often forgotten as the parts war against the whole."

Common Cause recommends a series of remedies, including restrictions on political action funds, partial federal funding of congressional elections, disclosure requirements for lobbyists and sunset legislation to require regular review of special interest programs and tax

South Chiefly Republican Battleground

ATLANTA (AP) - The South, where a horde of Democrats brawled openly in 1976, is chiefly a Republican presidential battlefield this year. And some GOP hopefuls likely will find their campaigns limping or mortally wounded when the dust clears.

The skirmishes already have begun, with GOP contenders approaching the first of 11 southern primaries - South Carolina's Republican contest on March 8. Republicans and Democrats hold March 11 primaries in Georgia, Alabama and Florida. The final southern primary is among Republicans in Mississippi on June 3.

Unlike 1976, when Jimmy Carter battled a crowded field of Democrats for recognition, Republican candidates seem to have the most to gain from votes in Dixie, which swung Republican for Richard Nixon in 1972 but returned solidly for Carter four years later.

This is the first good shot at what we have to do to get the nomination," said Haley Barbour, southern coordinator for the campaign of former Texas Gov. John Connally, who has been the most visible presidential candidate in the South.
"We feel that there basically are two contests

going on - Bush and Baker vying to be the candidate of the 'moderate wing' . .. and Reagan and Connally in a contest for the mainstream, conservative voters," Barbour said. "If that theory is correct, we need to defeat

Reagan and our first shot is in South Carolina and the southern states," he added. A decisive defeat for Connally in South Caro-

lina. on the other hand, could cripple or kill his campaign. He has invested much time and money; and has won the endorsement of Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C.

For former California Gov. Ronald Reagan, major victories in the South, where he finished well against Gerald Ford in 1976, would help overcome the stigma of a second-place finish behind George Bush in Iowa. The 69-year-old Reagan is banking on well-organized, grassroots support, much of which has been in place since

For Bush, the former CIA head who scored a surprise victory in Iowa, some early southern victories could cement his position as a viable

Sen. Howard Baker of Tennessee has focused

We expect to do pretty well down here," said Reagan's southern coordinator, Dave Nichols. "Now that Bush and Baker are on the ticket. I think they probably will pull some votes away - to a great extent from Connally."

However, Nichols emphasized that there should be no comparison between Reagan's significant primary support in 1976 and his performance in the 1980 primaries - something many political observers and other candidates "In 1976 you had a two-man race - Reagan

and Ford - which was clearly philosophically oriented," Nichols said. "This time what it comes down to realistically is a Reagan versus Stop Reagan.

"The 'Stop Reagan' is a multi-financed, multi-philosophy entity, and different tentacles of that entity will be beefing up in different states. The challengers - Bush, Connally and Baker have the luxury of being able to say, 'We'll run hard in one or two states.

David Sparks, field director for the Bush campaign, agreed that Bush, enjoying the media spotlight because of his Iowa victory, is targeting South Carolina, Alabama and Florida.

'Our goal at the beginning was to emerge as an alternative to Reagan," said Sparks. "And this time around Reagan has shown some cracks.

"Our specific goal in South Carolina, Alabama and Florida is to score as close as we can to Connally and Reagan," Sparks said. "Connally has said his campaign begins in South Carolina

"By scoring close to him we hope to show that if his national campaign begins in South Carolina, that Connally's candidacy was doomed be-

fore it hit the voting booths." Baker and Rep. Philip Crane of Illinois have used different tactics in campaigning in the

Baker has spent most of his time and money campaigning primarily in the Midwest and Northeast, scheduling only four southern appearances in coming weeks in Arkansas and South Carolina. Baker finished a surprising second to Reagan in Arkansas earlier this month, obtaining four of 12 national convention delegates during

congressional district caucuses there. Crane, however, has made several southern visits. primarily in Georgia and Alabama, touting his "ability to run with the front-runners.

On the l'emocratic side, President Carter as expected - has built a solid, grassroots campaign in his native South, quietly picking up en-dorsements of such major black leaders as Coretta Scott King and Birmingham Mayor Richard

Several family members have campaigned in the region, telling crowds that Carter, who has said he will avoid campaign appearances as long as Americans are held hostage in Iran, is busy doing his job in Washington.

Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., the chief challenger, has made few forays into Carter's home territory. A survey of 12 southern states showed little Kennedy campaign activity except in Alabama, where his nephew, Robert F. Kennedy, is working now, and in Florida.

California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. has said he will not concede the South to Carter, but his campaign efforts in this region are all but non-existent.

First, the lady Anthony had to fight for her place on a coin. Then it was a matter of coping with the same type of rejection that met the two-dollar bill.

Now, add numerous cases of mistaken identity to the woes that have plagued the Susan B. Anthony dollar ever since it was put into circulation last July.

If you've lost money in a vending machine since July, you may have been a victim of that misunderstanding.

For example, suppose you have just pushed what you assumed was a quarter through the slot in a soft-drink machine. The coin disappears, but there's no clinking sound to tell you your money has been accepted. You don't even hear the definitive jangling of your money being dropped into the coin return slot.

All you get for your money is silence. You could cuss the machine and then kick it. But you might be better off blaming it on the Susan B. Anthony.

Or you may be innecently victimized by being the paying customer who follows:

Or you may be innocently victimized by being the paying customer who follows the guy who fed Susan B. to the machine. Your money stacks up behind his with the same results.

"The problem is that the Susan B. Anthony dollar is too small a coin. People

reach into their pocket and think it's a quarter," said Roger Younger, service manager for B&M Vending Co. in Lubbock.

In many vending machines, the money slot is wide enough to accept the new

In many vending machines, the money slot is wide enough to accept the new dollar coin. But once inside the machine, the coin is too large to be accepted. It can't even take the coin return route. As a result, the machine is jammed, unable to function again until a serviceman removes the trapped dollar coin.

Several local vending machine company operators aren't particularly pleased with the appearance of the Susan B. Anthony dollar.

"It's a pain to have to make a service call all the way across town because of one of these cotton picking dollars, especially when the trip is likely to cost me more than a dollar," said Stanley Spyker of Spyker Vending Co.

Vending machine servicemen generally are thankful that the new dollar coin hasn't caught on with the money-spending public. Searching for the stuck buck has joined the ranks of other machine service jobs, such as pulling bobby pins, slugs and "tunny money" out of the machines.

Guy Burroughs of Standard Cigarette and Music Service said he gets about three calls each week concerning machines that have been jammed by the Antho-

"This occurs mostly in cigarette machines in darkly lighted businesses, such as lounges," Burroughs said.

The new dollar coin bearing the likeness of the women's rights crusader was referred to in less than ladylike terms by a couple of the vending machine company owners.

Other businessmen, however, see the eventual replacement of the one dollar bill by the coin as a boon to the vending machine business.

Despite widespread rejection of the new coin by the public and business, the U.S. government still plans to phase out the dollar bill, which is expensive to print

U.S. government still plans to phase out the dollar bill, which is expensive to print and quick to disintegrate. It will be superceded by the longer-lasting dollar coin and the equally unpopular \$2 bill.

Vending machine operators believe their customers will be more eager to

spend one big coin than a handful of smaller ones.

"There is a stigma in the public mind about buying a product from a vending machine when they have to put in a quarter and a nickel, a quarter and a dime or

even two quarters," said Cliff Gallarneau of Gallarneau Services, which operates about 400 machines in Lubbock.

"It is much more pleasing to be able to put in one coin, such as a dollar coin, and then get change with your purchase." Gallarneau said.

He said he has a machine at Health Sciences Center Hospital that dispenses

food items that cost up to \$1.75.
"Seven quarters seems like a lot of money," he said. "Customers would rather

put in two dollar coins and get some change."

Local businessmen say any vending machines they buy in the future will be

made to accept the dollar coins.

Until all the old machines are replaced with the new ones, some vendors plan

to paste stickers on their machines that read, "This machine does not accept Susan B. Anthony dollars."

Others say using signs won't prevent people from mistaking the dollar coin for a quarter. The only solution, they say, is to replace the coin mechanisms in the old machines with those that accept the dollars.

"This is because people have a tendency not to read signs," said one vendor. How many times have you seen somebody look at an 'Out of Order' sign on a machine, and then go ahead and desposit his money?"

Funds Available For Four Drug Abuse Programs In South Plains

Applications for four drug abuse prevention programs, to be funded through the state and federal Criminal Justice Division budget, will be reviewed by the South Plains Association of Governments board Tuesday.

About \$80,000 has been made available to SPAG's 15-county region by the criminal justice office for juvenile drug and alcohol abuse prevention programs.

Three of the projects will be given a favorable or unfavorable comment by the board before funding applications are submitted to the state office. The fourth project is being sponsored by the association of governments, so comment on it will be waived.

The council of governments' project will be included in operations of SPAG's Law Enforcement Academy and is expected to cost \$2,730.

Garza County is requesting funding for a \$3,625 project which would provide drug and alcohol-abuse prevention education to middle and high school students. In the past, the project has established Al-A-Non and Al-A-Teen organizations.

A project in Hale County will use \$27,-844 to provide a referral service for the 64th and 242nd District Courts and the Hale County Juvenile Probation Department through work with the Central Plains Mental Health-Mental Retardation Center.

The project will provide drug abuse education to 85 school teachers, plus allow law enforcement and probation professionals to counsel 47 families. Emergency medical care will also be provided for five juvenile offenders, and 65 juvenile offenders will receive outpatient counseling if the project is funded.

The city of Lubbock is submitting an application for a \$53,000 project which would employ 20 to 25 high school-age individuals, with between 8 and 10 of them high school dropouts, to build a mural depicting black history in West Texas at one of the Canyon Lakes projects.

Program director Oscar Jones, however, said the project previously has been refused funding by the Criminal Justice Division because it is not directly related to law enforcement.



Expanded Emergency Efforts, Skills 'Bringing Back The Dead'

The private firm's ambulance technicians checked for a pulse and blood pressure and got nothing. Minutes later, EMS paramedics arrived and started CPR on the woman, hooking her to a cardiac

The woman's heart was still flutter-

But because of the time which had elapsed between the woman's heart failure and the call to EMS, the woman died. Enabnit is frustrated by that kind of occurence because it sometimes can

Before advanced life support, all you could do was CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation)," Enabnit explained.

Sometimes the heart needs more help than manual hand massage provided by CPR. The electronic defibrillators, which pump electric shocks through the cardiac victim's chest, can sometimes jolt the heart back into a more normal pattern.

But the defibrillators only work if the heart is registering some kind of rhythm on a cardiac monitor - a heart registering a straight line on the monitor will not re-start from defibrillation. But there are cardiac drugs available, which paramedics are licensed to administer with a phy

heart rate high enough the react to defibrillation.

"It's a whole new ballgame with advanced life support," Enabnit stressed. "All those patients we were carrying with chest pains - now we know why.

The sophisticated, postable cardiac monitors had been on order for months, but did not arrive until October 1979. The use of the monitors created a sharp increase in the number of cardiac patients paramedics were able to resuscitate and deliver to area emergency rooms alive.

Enabnit said the local EMS success rate for patients given CPR using the advanced life support techniques is much higher now than in past months - by about 45 percent. He said the national average for CPR success is about 30 per-

"If we can just get the family (of the cardiac victim) to call us," Enabnit pleaded. "They call their aunts, uncles, brothers - and then call us.



It never occurred to James Robert Steele that he might go blind someday. But for the past year he has only been able to see forms with his left eye, and he is totally blind in his right eye.

The 32-year-old Steele has been a diabetic for 23 years. Blindness is often an accompaniment to diabetes, but as Steele explained, "I thought it would happen to someone else, but not to me."

Six years ago he started having headaches, and as it turned out, he needed glasses. Still, there was no danger of blindness. But suddenly in the spring of '78 his left eye began to hemorrhage. It was over as quickly as it began. Steele couldn't see out of that eye and it didn't appear that much could be done to restore sight.

Steele was still able to work, and it was at his desk at a local car dealership that he began to have trouble with the right eye. "All of a sudden things got fuzzy and I could hardly make out the desk," he said. His right eye had started to hemorrhage and within a matter of a few hours he couldn't see. "I knew it could happen but I didn't think it would be that soon or that fast," he said.

Since that time both eyes have been operated on in an attempt to restore vision. The operation on his left eye helped him to see light and shapes to some extent but the operation to the right eye was unsuccessful

"I think it was easier to go blind a little bit at a time, than just waking up and not being able to see." he said. But it is still an adjustment that he, his wife, and three boys have all had to make during the last year.

After it was evident that Steele would not regain his sight, he began seeking ways to deal with his handicap. He contacted the State Commission for the Blind, which was able to

help him deal with the problem.

Through the Commission, Steele has received vocational counseling, is learning braile, and is receiving the help of a mobility instructor. Through these services, Steele is learning to deal with his daily routine of living. "If not for the Commission I would have had to figure a

lot of things out for myself," he said.

First Steele had to learn to get around in an environment that he could not see. His mobility instuctor. Lynne Witten of the Southwest Lighthouse for the Blind, has been teaching him to walk with a cane. "I wouldn't be able to find my way to the end of the block if I didn't have cane skills," he said.

"The cane is just like a third arm," said Steele. He explained that you tap the cane from side to side, clearing the way for each step. The tapping is done in a rhythmic way, which enables the blind, or visually impaired, to walk at a smooth pace

The cane used for the blind doesn't look like a regular walking cane. It is a long narrow tube-like aluminum pole with a tip on the end. The tip gives off a tapping sound which serves as an indicator, telling the person where he is. "If you are walking down a hallway it will echo. You can also distinguish concrete from asphalt by the sound it makes." he

Steele said it took some time to get the hang of the rhythmic motion, but it soon became easy. "At least I know I won't fall on my face," he

After he got used to the cane, his mobility instructor took him to a shopping mall. Once he was familiar with the layout he had to find designated places. "I had to depend on my sense of smell and on sounds to determine where I was," he said. The mall is filled with different smells that most of us are not aware of, like shoe stores, candy stores, restaurants. A good memory is another plus for the blind, and it is something that seems to develop more after going blind. "You know you have to use more of your brain. It is just something that comes from within," he said.

While Steele was learning to use his cane, he was also learning braile. This works on the principle of using six different dot patterns. With these patterns, more than 63 different letters and symbols can be made by using a stylis and slate or a brailer, which is similiar to a typewriter with six keys. Braile is not only a useful way of reading and writing, but it also serves as an aide to coping with daily living.

Without the use of braile, Steele would not be able to cook or to dress himself. His stove, canned goods and clothes are easily identified by marking them with braile tags.

"You can buy braile tags for your clothes that have all the basic colors," he said. But getting dressed takes longer than usual, because after feeling for the tag you then have to match the correct color of shirt with pants, jacket and socks. Steele made tags to mark canned goods, which consist of a piece of plastic with an elastic band to secure to the

Now that Steele is able to function independently he is ready to tackle the outside world. He doesn't deny that it is frightening to go out in public, but he is becomming more comfortable. "It's scary to go to someones' home that you are not familiar with. Should I move now; would I hit someone with my cane if I did? It's

always on your mind," he said.

Being more confident has made him ready to start working again. "I haven't been blind long enough to know what I can do, or what I really want to do," he said. "I'm the same person I was before this happened,"

In Dallas, she was introduced by a monk who had been with Mother Theresa in India, and the children, for that reason, had thought that she WAS Mother Theresa.

She grins with delight as she tells about it.

Two young people from a local television station — a cameraman with a beard and a lot of gear and a young reporter — are intrigued by the idea of an Episcopal nun, but at a loss what to ask her.

When I was a child in the northeast, nuns in habits were commonplace; today they seem remarkable. Mother Mary Christobel says she likes wearing the habit, that it serves as a witness. She says people come up to her on the subway to ask her to pray for them.

"And, of course, one does..." she

She is not a large woman, but the habit makes her seem so; we tend to maintain a respectful distance. She says sometimes people look at her as though she were a remnant of the Middle Ages.

She was originally from Quebec, which explains her slight accent. The community was founded by nuns from the Canadian order, who came to New York to start a settlement house and found themselves, instead, opening a school. She speaks casually of testing one's vocation, of the Mother House, of Rules of life. The nuns I know now wear street clothes and speak of social needs, of full personhood, of relationships...

"Mine was what we call a late vocation," she explains in answer to a question, "the closing of some doors, the opening of others...no voices, no Joan of Arc experience," which evokes a ripple of laughter around the room.

The only picture I can frame is of the sisters at prayer among the unicorn tapestries at the Metropolitan's museum—the name Cloister is, of course, what has trapped me...

They rise early, pray, meditate, study, run two schools, give retreats. Her visit to West Texas is partly to keep in touch with associates, friends of the order, who share in its prayer life.

She describes the life of the convent to listeners whose lives are full of work and talk, of television news and getting the car repaired and the problems of children and politics and the market-place. It is hard for us to believe that there is such a sanctuary in the world as she describes.

She says that the community has remained constant during the last decades of change and rebellion within the church. "But," she adds, "you must send us some vocations." Her listeners are nonplussed; many did not know the church had nurs.

It is the time, I thought, that is out of joint. Six months testing one's vocation, five and a half years of novitiate, before taking final vows. Who has that kind of time these days? We would not even give a marriage that much grace. "Yes," she is saying, "we do consider the final vows irrevocable." Which explains the difference: who considers marriage vows irrevocable?

Caught in a time warp, I try to focus on her words, but my mind slips. I have been on my feet all day, I have a story due tomorrow; the sink is full of dirty dishes, and the Angel needs lime water, whatever that is, for her class experiment Friday.

Life in the cloister, even without the unicorn tapestries, seems very attractive...



Poet, Psychologist Offer 'Love' Definition

LOVE. Madness or affliction? It's been called both since at least the time of the ancient Greeks.

But there's another side. Plato, for one, described love as "the greatest of heaven's blessings.

So senders of cards, flowers and love notes on Valentine's Day can side with Plato and bask in the joy of sharing heavenly feelings. Or they can consider themselves afflicted with madness.

The sex revolution doesn't get all the credit for those expressions of love real, imagined, unrequited or gained. Love and sex are not one and the same. psychologists and sexologists agree.

The accepted thinking that: you can have sex without love. And love without sex. Sex. say they, is more a bodily func-

And love? A state.

Poets celebrate the state in words. A contemporary one. Susan Polis Schutz. claims she and her husband. Stephen. still share love - even though they have been married a decade and work together in Colorado, near Vail.

She writes the poetry and he provides the illustrations for books, posters or cards. The books, bought by more than 2 million. include "Come into the Mountains. Dear Friend," "I Want to Laugh, I. Want to Cry." "Peace Flows from the Sky." "Someone Else to Love.

"I feel we have as much now and

more," she said when asked how they keep romantic love alive - since the usual thing is for it to be transformed into another kind of love a year or so after marriage, studies show

We keep interested. Love is giving and taking, sharing. It is the giving and taking and sharing tht really helps.

We are not lazy about ourselves. We try to appeal to each other just as we did before. If he wants me to be with him, I

"If you really analyze it, you see some people get married and look at the piece of paper - the wedding license - and stop working on the relationship." Speaking out on Valentine Day, the

"Why not send a love letter? And why not celebrate around the calendar, not

just on Feb. 14?" I just wish it were celebrated every she said. "All over the world."

Why should you write a love letter? "I think a person would rather get personal thoughts," she said.

How to write a love letter? 'Just put down your feelings," the

poet said "Being honest is the most important thing in life. The love letter should be honest.

So what do you do with the love letters in the event an affair ends, a marriage crashes?

Love letters should be saved. No matter what." said the poet. "They are an awfully nice memory of a happy time.

Don't look at them until the bad feelings

Sometime later you will see they are nice to come back to. Eventually time heals. You remember the good things. Like a diary. This love happened. The letters record.

"What happened is still a part of life. The letters reflect back on a part of your

However wonderful love is, there are the risks of love's lumps to contend with. Bruised feelings when an affair ends, for

And then, there's love sickness to han-

dle: loss of appetite, absentmindedness. Dr. Dorothy Tennov, University of Bridgeport psychologist, says love sickness is a real thing. That head-over-heels feeling in romantic love includes extreme joy when together and extreme pain when apart.

The professor bases that point and many more on her investigations of romantic love over 14 years. She calls romantic love "limerence"

It includes, she claims, walking on air when reciprocation seems evident and an aching in the chest when uncertainty is strong.

Over a thousand people poured out their stories to Dr. Tennov and some of the tales are in her book. "Love and Limerence: The Experience of Being in Love" (Stein and Day).

"I heard tales to rival the grands amours of fiction." she said.

"They ranged from a three-day spree in Naples to a 50 year unrequited yearning

Whether love resembles a sublime spirituality or mental illness, Dr. Tennov maintains it follows a consistent, recognizable pattern. And that's what she claims limerence is all about.

In "Love and Limerence," Dr. Tennov describes the different aspects of the limerent state, incuding:

The range of emotions from compulsive daydreams and fantasies to fullblown ecstasy when together and jealously and despair when apart.

Intense suffering when the limerence of one person is not returned by the "One of the strongest limerent feel-

ings is a wish to hide the condition ... as an inevitable part of the game until reciprocation is certain and some commitment has been made." she said. One behavioral change that is also

likely to be obvious to close friends and family is the limerent's disappearance from customary places. 'And one of the signs of limerent be-

havior hardest to hide is the effort at self improvement. especially in physical appearances. Dr. Tennov said a better understand-

ing of limerence can make one more sympathetic and less likely to take it as an affront when a formerly reliable friend disappears.

When limerence strikes, your friend's sudden aloofness has nothing to do with you," she said. "You are still friend, and may be much needed during the recovery phase.

The psychologist said those in the limerent state are prone to extreme emo-

spring. You need look no further to see all that is new for Spring 1980. The shaped triple darted blazer is fully lined. The matching pleated skirt lays flat on the hip line A white ruffled front crepe de chine blouse adds softness to the suit.

The shift from the elation of perreived reciprocation - real or not to the despair of rejection - again, real or imagined - can occur with such swiftness as to seem instantaneous.

Dr. Tennov said the behavioral aspects of limerence, with certain excep-

tions, tend to be undesirble. "As well as interference with other relationships, they include interference with work, destruction of peace of mind.

With these effects it is not surprising that certain societies have held the gen-eral view that the limerent state is a madness to be avoided if at all possible, or else simply denied."

Consider - In traditional China, romantic love was viewed as dangerous. The important decision of who would marry whom was made with the cooperation of family and

matchmaker - Nietzsche is said to have regarded love as the enemy of achievement and

- Love has been accused of disrupting the equanimity of communal life, and one hears leaders of communal groups consider it their duty to break up attachments between couples and generally try to control members' love lives.

"Limerence, however, cannot be controlled by the unhappy limerent who wants to end it. nor does it bow to the dictates of society." Dr. Tennov said. What starts romantic love - o

limerence?

'The ancient theories about love that focused on initiation by cupid's arrow or a love potion or spell have yet to be replaced," the psychologists said.

Is the love potion a hormone? That so many of us have had our first limerences around the time of puberty ... suggests that physiological processes occurring during normal develop ment may have to reach a certain state of readiness, which, however, might be insufficient to stimulate a limerent reaction unless other factors are also favora-

Can we find out what those factors

Until a cold scientific eye tries to answer that question, just take Dr. Tennov's words for it:

"Limerence is the source of the greatest happiness and of the greatest

Many Medications Contain Alcohol

EMMAUS, Pa. (Special) - Alcoholics and others who have to avoid whiskey should be particularly careful about their medications, warns PREVENTION. At least 500 medicinal products, including cough syrups, pain relievers and sedatives, contain up to 68 percent alcohol: most whiskeys have only about 40 percent. According to John A. Newsom. M D . who presented these statistics at a recent annual meeting of the Calfornia Medical Association. people with peptic ulcers, diabetes mellitus and those suffering from obesity - and many who are pregnant - all commonly receive alcohol-containing drugs Taking this alcohollaced medication can result in high blood sugar levels followed by a sharp decline. central nervous system depréssion and fluid and potassium loss.



LARGEST SELECTION Medical School Completes Lab By BEVERLY O'BRIANT Family News Staff

Each week four to six couples come to the genetics lab at the Texas Tech University School of Medicine to have an amniocentesis test performed; three to four couples come for counseling and there are about 10-12 telephone inquiries from the public and local and area doc-

According to Dr. Harlan Giles, associate chairman of the project, "almost no field is untouched by genetic implications." The lab receives referrals from area doctors and answers many questions for them.

obstetrics/gynecology department and the medical school, the lab is extremely expensive to operate. Some of the equipment was provided by the medical school and the remainder by volunteer dona-

The genetics lab has only been functioning a few months. Recently it was named the Fuller Cytogenetics Laboratory in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Rex Fuller for "service for the unborn." The couple donated a new microscope, completing the laboratory. The Fullers, according to Giles, have done a great deal to support the lab, wishing to promote more knowledge about genetics in memory of a child they lost.

Giles feels that the most important facet of what is being done in the genetics lab is in the area of counseling. Testing is done; but more important than test results is helping a couple or family to deal with the results of the tests.

When a couple first comes to the genetics lab, one of the doctors discusses the procedure to be done and the couple's situation. Giles points out that he does not allow a couple to come to a decision prior to obtaining test results.

Amniocentesis is done when the woman is 15-16 weeks pregnant. The diagnosis will be obtained by the 18th week of pregnancy; there is still time to terminate the pregnancy at that point. If the couple decides to continue the pregnancy, the time factor doesn't matter. But some defects can be treated during pregnancy and the ill effects prevented.

"Literally hundreds of disorders could be found," said Giles, when an amniocentesis is done in the genetics lab. Persons who should consider such testing are pregnant women over 35, mothers who have previously delivered a child with a birth defect or a couple who has a family history of birth defects.

The highest risk of chromosome abnormality is in those women over 35. Three percent of all babies are born with some type of birth defect. Many are so subtle they are not diagnosed. As a woman ages, the percentage of risk rises. For a woman 45 years old, the risk can be as much as 8 percent of all live births.

Amniocentesis can determine a large number of defects. Multifactoral defects such as cleft lip, club foot, diabetes and congenital dislocation of the hip are difficult to diagnose this way. However, the test is virtually 100 percent accurate for "gross alterations;" and 80-98 percent accurate for several hundred other defects. Ninety-two to ninety-four percent of all central nervous system defects are detected by the test. These include spina bifida and "water on the brain."

Ultrasound can detect structural defects before birth in the nervous system, intestines, kidneys and spine.

When amniocentesis is done, the woman must be at least 15 weeks pregnant. An ultrasound scan is done to find the right spot to insert the needle. The area is numbed and two ounces of amniotic fluid are withdrawn.

The fluid is put in a centrifuge to break down the cells; the cells are placed in a nutrient broth and put in an environmentally-controlled incubator for two

The cell culture is "fed and put to bed" many times during that period. When the cells are properly developed, a chemical, colchicine, is placed in the culture to arrest the cells in the metaphase stage of division. Each chromosome is indicated at this time.

The chromosomes are mapped and counted. A karyotype is prepared. The chart will indicate if the fetus is a boy or girl and at first glance indicates such things as extra or missing chromosomes. The most common defect determined this way is Down's Syndrome, in which

there is an extra No. 47 chromosome, characterized by certain physical traits and mental retardation. Gro

Further examination of the chart will indicate if there are any genetic disorders. The test is so explict that according to Giles it will show such subtle problems as how the child will reproduce 20 vears later.

Amniocentesis is a safe test and it can be a very reassuring one. There is no cou-ple who is at no risk, said Giles, but frequently there is little risk. The test is often a way of reassuring couples whose child is normal and also of preparing couples who face life with a child with birth defects. There is a stigma attached to people who are carriers, he pointed out, when realistically all of us are carriers for something. There is no reason these people cannot have normal children, but it is good for them to know where they


Birth defects are innumerable, and some are unpreventable. But such tests as these can eliminate a number of them in some way. As time goes on, more will known about each defect and how to treat it. Genetic labs, such as the one at Tech, are a strong beginning in that direction.



WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. (Special) - They played with marbles and yo-yos. There were few electronic toys. Even so, Philip Vandermeer, 32 believes growing up in the 50s probably offered him experience his infant son will never know.

The era through which he passed to become a man will probably never be repeated, he believes. As a youngster in Grad Rapids, he recalls best trading conic books and

watching a preponderane of cowboy-

One of my earliest mimories is the excitement of getting our irst television set." Soon after, he remembers watching, spellbound, as his fathe made an appearance on an early public-affairs pro-

Describing those years, he remarks, There seemed to be no sense of limits on what could be done. Maybe, he adds, the attitude was influenced partly by the excitement surrounding the prospect of space exploration.

In the environmental sense, it was a naive time - "The emphasis was on growth and industry - there was very little public awareness then."

Education, especially with the arrival of Sputnik, was worshipped. "With education it was commonly thought, 'The more, the better.' It never entered your mind that you might not get a job in your field," he recalls. If there were any question, it was "how good a job" you'd get.
One of the most profound changes

since then, Vandermeer believes, has been for women

When I was growing up I perceived little expectation that the girls would pursue full-time careers. A career was considered for them only a part-time thing — until they were married.

On the subject of drugs and other temptations, Vandermeer says, "I don't recall ever hearing about drug use in our school." At Central Christian High School, it was only a very small minority who even ventured into the use of alcohol, he explains.

A city of about 200,000 Grand Rapids is located only 30 miles from Lake Michigan. One of Vandermeer's fondest memories is of the times he spent at a lake cabin with his family.

"I remember when we went to our cabin on the lake, there were only cottages around us. Today there are winterized homes," Vandermeer remarks.

"At that time few roads around us were even paved," he adds. Since then, housing developments have sprouted throughout the area and, to serve them, a large power plant has been erected near-

Adds the professor, "I suppose my children won't have such easy access to the kind of environment I remember." How does he envision his son's

future? "I don't really think the future will be radically different from the present," he

But one of his hopes is to "see our so-ciety regain some of that confidence of

the late 50s and early 60s

It was a time when there seemed, at least, to be a real sense of dire .ion and confidence in the future.







City Couple Makes Unique Team

Among the more than 30 local ministers who serve as volunteer chaplains at Lubbock's Health Sciences Center Hospital is the unique team of Benny and Adela Brito. He is a permanent deacon in the Catholic Church and she has been specially commissioned to assist in this min-

Brito is employed as a counselor in the Regional Mental Health-Mental Retardation office and Mrs. Brito is employed by the Texas Tech University Medical School. Both feel that helping in the chaplaincy program is most rewarding: saying that their greatest satisfaction comes from being able to express caring and to share in the lives of the patients

whom they visit. They also feel that this ministry, which has been rewarding to them in many ways, has brought them closer together as a couple.

Particularly meaningful to this bilingual husband-and-wife team was a relationship with a 26-year old cancer patient with whom they came to be friends as well as supporting chaplains. When the patient went to Dallas for further treatment, she called the Britos every Sunday to give a report on her progress. When she eventually died, the Britos attended the funeral. They still hear from the girl's relatives, who valued their friendship throughout the ordeal.

Because Mrs. Brito works at the hospital, she is able to use her "break"

tients who might need and appreciate the ministry the couple offers. Often she will take a few minutes to visit with a patient, pray with him or her, and discuss any particular needs the patient may have. Sometimes she is the one who calls the priest, at the patient's request, to ask for a visit. She may also take communion to patients and tell them about the brief Catholic service which is held at the hospital chapel each Sunday at 9:30 a.m.

Like all the chaplains at the hospital. the couple are often the key link between persons with particular needs and those who may be able to help them. This may involve such basics as housing, food and clothing for a patient or family, or referral to an agency which can provide assist-

Tne Britos have been part of the HSCH chaplains program for about a year. Before beginning in this program. they had participated in a similar supportive ministry with the elderly in local Mrs. Brito is really impressed by the

extreme loneliness of some of the patients she sees at HSCH. "Some have no one near to care or say they care. That we are there and we care is most important," she said.

The Britos have four children who. they say, appreciate their parents' involvement in the helping program at the hospital. In at least one case, the children also got involved in the ministry: last summer a 12-year-old who was working in a nearby farm was injured and treated at the hospital. He needed some companionship from someone his own age and the Britos' son came to visit with him.

The office of permanent deacon has ained new importance in recent times. Brito feels this is healthy for the Catholic Church and hopes to involve others in the ministry he and his wife now share with one other couple. Alfredo and Guadalupe Jaime, also of the parish of Our Lady of



Self Image Important To Mastectomy Victims

Probably no one but a woman who has lost her breast to surgery can understand the emotional trauma of that

It includes not only the devastation of a brush with cancer, but the loss of a part of her body which a woman may equate with her womanhood, her femininity.

Breast cancer strikes men as well as women (a fact not widely known) but probably only a woman suffers the threat to her self-esteem that the loss implies.

For Edra Ayers, in Lubbock recently on a promotional tour for a breast prosthesis, the campaign to make such a woman feel both hopeful about the future and good about her own image amounts to something of a personal cur-

Nearly everyone in our company is a mastectomy," Edra comments easily as she explains the guiding spirit of her product, "Nearly Me."

That shared experience, she believes, gives the company's staff a particular insight into the problems their customers are facing.

Ruth Handler, head of the firm, achieved status by being one of the first women in the country to rise to the top of the corporate ladder, as head (with her husband) of Mattel, Inc., and creator of the "Barbie" and "Ken" dolls, named for her own children.

When Ruth had her breast mastectomy, she discovered that there were no products on the market that came close to duplicating a woman's natural breast. In frustration, she went to a man in Los Angeles who specialized in prostheses, and described what she wanted. Working together, they came up with "Nearly

Surgery for removal of a breast has been performed for many years, Edra explains, although the trend is now away from the most drastic and disfiguring surgeries in favor of less radical ones. Only in recent years, however, and with the encouragement of women like Betty Ford and Happy Rockefeller, who spoke openly about this surgery, has it become a subject which women could discuss. "I meet women," she says, "who have had this surgery for 20, 30, even 40 years. For many of them, it is a closely-guarded secret which they cannot share even with their families.

The development of a replacement breast has not kept up with other tech-

that would have the right weight, that was comfortable to wear.

The "Nearly Me" design is different: it extends back under the arm and up above the breast area, as a natural breast does. It is slightly convex above, slighly concave below. It comes in a wide range of sizes, and in "rights" and "lefts." Its foam backing gives it shape and strength, but the liquid-filled front follows the line of the natural breast. (It can be enclosed, for comfort, in a cloth pocket, or a pocket may be sewn into the bra to accomodate it; tabs make adjustment easy.)

"The first thing we do when a woman comes for a fitting," Edra says, "is to get her into a well-fitting bra. Not a surgical bra. We can fit any bra that the woman finds comfortable, if it covers the breast area. There's no reason why it can't be lacey and pretty.

The joy of her work, Edra says, is seeing the change in the women she fits.
"They come in slouching, wearing something concealing. They leave with their shoulders back, their heads high. We make sure that they try on a silk blouse, so they can see how good it looks."

But the product is only part of Edra's ob. (She is about to set up a regional office in the Dallas area, a development which delights her because she is originally from that area.) She travels around the country to stores which are handling "Nearly Me" to teach the clerks how to work with and fit their customers. 'Salesclerks can be unsympathetic," she explains. "They don't mean to, but they can hurt a woman. I have known cases where the clerk handed the bra over the top of the fitting room door.

I find some way of letting the woman know that I have had a mastectomy."


























































Real To Reel

Every time I hear The Harlem Globetrotters are coming to town - which is almost every year in Lubbock - I swear up and down'I'm going to skip the show. I mean, why go, right? When you've heard "Sweet Georgia Brown" as much as I have, when you've watched the gray appear in Geese Ausbie's hair, when you've witnessed the all-business attitude of the Globetrotters' courtside crew, it just doesn't make

Last year Lubbock got the B-team (sans stars) and the Coliseum was still sold out completely for the game. Yet the new Trotters had a cold night shooting while displaying hot tempers. There were all these seemingly impressionable kids watching the Trotters argue and curse and miss layups. As usual, the scorekeeper cheated watch closely and you'll see the Trotters rack up more points than they've really earned, so as to build a big lead which enables them to goof around a bit) and the clock rarely stopped.

The Globetrotters played in the Lubbock Coliseum again last Thursday night, and again I hadn't planned to attend. But we got the A-team this year, with Geese Ausbie and Curly Neal and Nate Branch, and I thought, shoot, my wife loves the 'Trotters and has never seen the biggies. So there I was at courtside, ballpoint in one hand and a Coke in the other, watching acrobats and wondering where the ping pong artists were earning paychecks this year. Again, there were tricks played with the scoreboard. A Washington Generals' husky forward (wearing number 40), who looked liked he'd rather be playing tackle basketball, let loose with a bit of blue language, and a young Globetrotter was earlier charged with a serious (not staged) technical foul.

The play-by-play announcer was sarcastic, and the fellow coordinating interviews off the court was downright rude. The timekeeper kept the clock ticking even when nothing was happening, inspiring a group of fans at one point to chant, "Stop the clock

Fast in, fast out But, while I didn't stop to smell any roses, I did stop this time to look at the crowd and examine its reactions. And like so many times before, I discovered the worst thing in the world had happened: I had grown up. I was admiring the solid basketball played at times by the Globetrotters' opponents (especially a quick guard wearing number 25), while every kid in the Coliseum knew that you were supposed to boo when the Bad Guys made a bucket. I was in awe that 'Trotters were accurate enough to even hit the rim on mid-court hook shots, but the kids knew that, heck, Geese Ausbie MAKES those shots, man. I was taking note of the scoreboard tricks and predicting what would happen next, while the kids to my right were yelling the names of

Ausbie and Neal. A glance or a wave was enough for them. They were having fun, while it was fast becoming apparent I had lost sight of my

Luckily. I loosened up when Geese Ausbie called a 2-year-old fan out onto the court to play catch. Actually, to roll her ball back and forth. While eight players thundered to the boards right behind him, Ausbie, oblivious to it all, changed positions and played with 2-year-old Kathryn Eubank. The referee, a wonderful burlesque fatty, plopped down and tried to join in, but Miss Eubank, recognizing a friend, would play only with Ausbie. Mind you, we all know the game is not that important - it's the routines the water bucket, the wobbly ball, the disco bumps. Or so one thought, Thursday saw Ausbie and Neal play a great deal to the kids and the adults who acted

Maybe they do it every night, but I haven't witnessed this sort of sincerity before. I'd like to think there's a bit of contagious spontaneity behind it. Why? Because it was the most heartwarming and enjoyable and memorable part of the evening. Sure, Ausbie made his hook in warmups and Curly Neal swished from outer space before the end of the game. There were slam dunks and the usual gimmicks. But there were also moments when a grown man stood up and pretended to protect Geese Ausbie from a threatening General, when a grown woman (perhaps a mother) walked onto the court to retrieve a stolen purse and wound up doing the twist and literally raising her heels, when a small boy would bend over in eager anticipation so he could get his free Globetrotter T-shirt on faster. These were the moments that make the Globetrotters worth

Personally. I don't think they occur often enough these days — but maybe I haven t been looking hard enough.

I wanted to talk with Ausbie or Branch or Neal about this at halftime: it was supposed to have been arranged. But some rude manager with a British accent grabbed rookie Reggie Franklin by the arm and practically shoved him into me, saying, Here's a local boy. Talk to him." No matter. Franklin, who played his college ball at SMU in Dallas, was able to offer some insights into the Trotters of the future. He was recruited to try out for the team ("They saw me play about five times at SMU, and I was one of 40 guys asked to try out for one of five openings.") and said the most surprising thing he learned was that the team doesn't practice

They just put you in the game. I mean, you learn some of it in training camp, but they never hold any practices. You know that weave we run out there; man, I was bumping into Geese. I was bumping into the Generals. I was falling all over everybody. They just said it would come. ... Now occasionally, me and some of the new

guys will come out early and warm up, but the older veterans don't. While there's no complaints about "the road" despite all the travel time, Franklin does state flat out that only part of the cursing and shaking of fingers and glaring gazes between opponents is faked. "Like that technical tonight," he explained. "That was real. We have to play these guys every night, and there's a lot of hostility at

what about the fact all the kids are yelling for Ausbie and Neal? No one was screaming Reggie Franklin's name. The rookie says that doesn't bother the younger players, noting. "Man, you find out in college about roles. You're either a shooter or a blocker or a playmaker. Just like you find out about the roles here. You find out who s the stars. It doesn't bother me any. I'm just trying to become better. I'd like to stay a Globetrotter for 10 or 12 years.

Perhaps he will. But I worry about the Globetrotters of 1985, of 1990. Meadowlark has left the team. Curly isn't the dribbler he once was, and Geese doesn't even try to keep pace up and down the court. Luckily, these veterans know the Trotters exist because of the youngsters need for heroes, for clowns of good will, for men who can make people laugh and still hit 90 per cent of their shots from 30 feet out. Or at least make kids believe they can. But the young Globetrotters? They're kept in the background. They line up in bunches at training camp. They're not shown the comedy ropes with daily practices. They take part in the traditional group routines but what they re really doing is, heaven forbid, just playing basketball

So what happens when the stars fall, as they inevitably must? For that matter, how many new Globetrotter stars have emerged during your lifetime? And more importantly, what happens when a 2-year-old girl grows up and takes her own daughter to see The Harlem Globetrotters? Will she be able to? And if so, will that daughter be able to share her mother's memory, or will the magic have disappeared? Thursday night I found my heroes again, if only temporarily, and I believed the magic would linger Friday morning. I wondered

The Avalanche-Journal is the only paper I'm aware of that takes the time to request reader feedback when the time comes to list the previous year's best films. But the readers' picks could be one of the more important (not to mention entertaining) film stories printed — since if every critic paid to see every movie, they still wouldn't provide enough revenue for a theater manager to pay his 16-year-old usher.

It is the public, not the critics, which determines which films will be successful. A critic offers a qualified opinion, a guide, so to speak. But the average movie-goer couldn't care less about overworked themes or daring camera work. He merely wants to get a return in entertainment for his investment of \$3.50.

That's why the fact critics did not care so much for "Rocky II" or "Star Trek" or 10" did not stop those movies from becoming monster money-makers. That's why The Rose" and "The Muppet Movie" can end up on so many readers' Best lists.

Lubbock, as I've said countless times before, has a fine national reputation as a movie-going city. And it was to be expected that, especially in a year that offered so many good movies, the response to the A-J's readers' poll would surpass that of the year before. (Though, I must admit, I did not expect to receive twice as many letters this year as were submitted for the 1978 films.) The readers' favorite film of the year was Peter Yates." Breaking Away." it broke into the lead fast and ended up winning by a whopping margin. Quite a surprise, since the film didn't break box office records during its fall run at the Mann Fourplex. Another big surprise was "The China Syndrome winning acclaim from so many readers — and yet enough negative votes to give it a spot on the Worst list as well

Chuck McDonald seems to have spoken for a great many viewers when he said flat out. Breaking Away is the greatest movie I ever saw. At the end you wanted to laugh, cry and have more popcorn." Sandy Martin (who picked "Norma Rae" as her favorite film) wrote of "Breaking Away". "Ah youth! Young people's hopes and dreams are often the subject matter for movies, but no other has been done as well. It was an exhilarating experience." James Pevehouse of Spur calls "Breaking Away" the best film of the 1970s. Rick Aguero says it is a "plain great movie." Vickie Sigler wrote. It left me feeling good about just about everything.

Frederick Jackson called "Apocalypse Now" a "powerful, vivid movie. While it may not be the ultimate Vietnam film, the film's images are fantastic." McDonald didn't agree, calling the Coppola film: "Hype. Hype. Hype. You wait five years for a movie and it's almost always a letdown. This was no exception. The critics were brainwashed into claiming it was the greatest thing since sliced bread, but not even Francis Ford Coppola (anybody with a name like that can't be trusted) couldn't think of an ending." Mark Mendel wrote a long statement lauding "Apocalypse Now," say-It's much more ambitious and meaningful than anything I've ever seen. And for all those who say they don't understand it, don't kids have to read 'Heart Of Darkness' anymore?

Evidently not, Mark

Some complained about the last half hour in "Apocalypse Now," but Gordon K. Smith wrote: "If the last half hour of this movie was a rousing rendition of 'Howdy Doody Time. what precedes it would still qualify as one of the best of the decade." Susan Mendel wrote a two-page intelligent explanation of her concept of "Apocalypse Now too detailed to go into here, but indicative of a caring viewer. Eric Gale was also deeply affected, writing that "Coppola's direction, Storaro's eerily majestic cinematography and a swarm of unflawed performances make this extraordinary film a



Best, Worst Albums Picked By Music Critic

The year 1979 may well be remembered for a number of things, both pleasant and unpleasant. It was a year in which new and previously unexposed (read that unexploited) talent was allowed to emerge, taking commercial strides as large as the aesthetic ones they were used to taking. Women emerged as a force within the male dominated realms of rock'n'roll and hard rock. The new wave wasn't new anymore, but the public finally caught on to it. And, as usual, prices reached new heights on their way to the \$10 single LP one can expect to see in the not-so-distant future.

Why was rock and roll so abnormally rife with quality and good sense? Two reasons, basically: a renewed sense of urgency which began to infiltrate rock with the emergence of Bruce Springsteen, and a new sense of awareness on the part of lyricists. performers and the buying public.

Rock and roll, and pop music in general, displayed an urgency not seen in the generally dismal music of the past half-decade. Some of it was voiced pleasantly but with daring by the likes of Fleetwood Mac. Some was depicted with dark and foreboding overtones, as was that of Pink Floyd. Others rocked their socks off with their pressing messages, especially people like The Talking Heads. Graham Parker & The Rumour and Elvis Costello & The Attractions.

In general, it was a good year, better than 1978. It was a year in which quality productions could be expected from every field without trendiness getting in the way. The year's usual plethora of embarrassments and projects that shouldn't have been were lost to the pursuit of the supreme effort. People were caring about their products again.

Rock's renaissance was vested in the balance struck between between the voluminous business sector that arose around the music during the 1970s and new aesthetic aspirations of equally gargantuan proportions.

I direct your attention to a pair of lists, one which represents the top 15 of more than 40 albums personally nominated as best of 1979, the other consists of albums as forgettable as they were rank. In fact, the latter list can't really be called a ranked list, since I found them all equally disgusting.

The following lists represent my opinions. They're personal picks and ranked accordingly

BEST ALBUMS OF 1979

1. "Tusk." Fleetwood Mac (Warner Bros.) - One can't help but feel that the magnitude of this album was exploited by some and downplayed by others. The daring two-record collection of highly stylized songwriting will propel pop music through new courses in the early 1980s. Not a weak song exists on the album, an album which draws heavily from personal inspiration and a devotion by one of rock's most respected acts to advancing musically, rather than falling prev to the success formula

Note the subtle blending of instrumentation and vocals on the album. It's as well-orchestrated as any of Beethoven's best works. Fleetwood Mac helped bring the word "art" back to pop music, for "Tusk" is truly the most moving work of 1979.

2. "The Wall." Pink Floyd (Columbia) - This dark depiction of man's deteriorating post-World War II mentality is a showcase of Pink Floyd's musical artistry, as well as bassist Roger Water's most brilliantly worded vendetta against man's willingness to self-destruct. "The Wall" is by no means a pleasant album, so if you're looking for happy songs, you'd best stick with AM radio. (Indeed, even the album's theme song has made Top 40 playlists.)

The Wail was by far the most threatrical production of the year, one which lent itself to myriad mental images with its biting storyline and diverse, but often grueling musical accompaniment.

3. "Fear of Music." Talking Heads (Sire) - Talking Heads enlarge their scope and talent by quantum jumps. The group has recorded but three albums, yet singer David Byrne's often banal subjects find a way of crossing universal philosophies with simple, rhythmic arrangements. Byrne's voice is an imperfect vehicle which spasmodically depicts Talking Heads' cerebral music in a very listenable form. Particularly good are songs like "Life During Wartime," which paint a vivid cityscape of urban war and destruction. A very prophetic

4. "Squeezing Out Sparks," Graham Parker & The Rumour (Arista) - Producer Jack Nitzche has come closest to revealing the urgency and desperation with which Parker & The Rumour play. The music is fierce, aggressive and often bitterly worded. Parker himself chews his words before spitting them out indignantly while a forceful backbeat is played upon by the guitar mesh of Brinsley Schwarz and Martin Belmont. Parker deals with any number of subjects. most noticeably abortion in "You Can't Be Too Strong," revealing themes of self-dependence and looking out for number one.

5. "Bad Girls." Donna Summer (Casablanca) - Miss Summer has often been chastised as the leader of the disco movement, often considered the most deplorable musical form this side of punk. But what people fail to notice amidst their prejudice and myopia is the emergence of a potentially artistic form of music. Miss Summer has done more, with producers Giorgio Moroder and Pete Bellotte, to advance disco and pop music in general.

Bad Girls represents one of the year's most grandly musical productions. one in which four very diverse sides of music have been blended in a slick, but highly personal manner. The execution is good throughout and Miss Summer's vocal performances are some of the best of the year.

6. "Communique," Dire Straits (Warner Bros.) - Subtlety fast became a key in 1979, and Dire Straits mastered the art with more confidence, smoothagility so as to go largely unnoticed by press and public alike. Many were disappointed with this follow-up to the group's surprising 1978 debut, which came out of nowhere to dominate singles and album charts in early 1979.

True, singer Mark Knopfler is given to lyrical excesses, but his stark sense of realism is accentuated by his poignant guitar work and fluid arrangements. No band rocked with the ease and presence of mind as Dire Straits did in 1979. Songs like "News" and "Lady Writer" express deliberate themes of disenchantment, while "Once Upon A Time In The West" chastised personal selfishness, which seemed to peak last year.

7. "Armed Forces," Elvis Costello (Columbia) — Costello's albums are consistently strong and angrily worded. Costello more than any single artist in 1979 showed that reason sense of urgency mentioned earlier. Costello's anger was so rampant on this album he had to title it. Armed Forces, to reflect the protection he so desperately needs. The album would have appeared higher in the list had it not lagged so much on the second side. Angry themes may be artistic, but they get old when the music begins to sound a little monotonous.

8. "Exposure." Robert Fripp (Polydor) - Few artists take their works to the edge these days. Most play it safe or word things in such a way so that they might cash in on a trend without really sounding like it. Fripp is quite the op posite. He, along with Brian Eno, is one of the most innovative characters in rock. His first solo release since he broke up King Crimson in 1974 is a dazzling menagerie of personality and daily life. "Exposure" is theatrical in nature. daring, but compromisingly commercial from Fripp's philosphical point of view.

9. "Slow Train Coming." Bob Dylan (Columbia) - Dylan's much publicized move to Christianity served as inspiration for this brilliantly religious package. Dylan is still an eloquent spokesman, one whose messages become all too clear funfortunately, people still tend to overlook them out of arrogance), "Slow Train Coming" portrays this conversion in glorious language and some of the best music Dylan has concocted in several years.

10. "Low Budget." The Kinks (Arista) - Singer-songwriter Ray Davies has influenced scores of people with his whimsically brilliant lyrics. Davies was up to his old tricks again in 1979, but in grander form. "Low Budget" could be regarded as the common man's album, because Davies chose to reflect the dayto-day misery of a recessionary world. Others have yet to shed light upon the present day economic situation. Davies chose to focus in on it, criticize it, even kid about it. Perhaps the album's theme is best reflected in the single "A Gallon Of Gas. a song in which the narrator offers all the black market drugs one desires in exchange for a mere gallon of gas.

11. "The Jukes." Southside Johnny and the Asbury Jukes (Mercury) - An

overlooked album because its lyrics tend to be naive in spots, "The Jukes" is best enjoyed with the volume cranked and the mind turned off. Then, if one chooses to dig into the album's thematical core, one can find feelings as pressing and urgent as those so eloquently worded by the Pink Floyd's and Elvis Costellos of the world.

Particularly good is Southside Johnny's "All I Want Is Everything." which opens the album, and the entire second side, which represents one of the most flowing sides of rock and roll produced in 1979.

12. "Regatta D'Blanc," The Police (A&M) - Two impressive albums marked The Police's American debut. But this, the second one, is a far cry better than its predecessor. Lyricist Sting developed a prose sensitivity only hinted at by the first album. Sting's messages of loneliness and frustration echoed the thoughts of millions as he shaped these themes into lyrics guided at his genera-

tion. Musically, the album stands tall with excellent guitar work from Andy Sommers and punctual drum work from Stewart Copeland.

13. "Breakfast In America," Supertramp (A&M) - This album's languidity and catchy melodies were exploited on the airwaves, but that doesn't detract from the truth that "Breakfast" was a smooth, flowing production. Lyrically, it faltered at times with the group (predominantly English) voicing sometimes myopic, arrogant opinions about the supposedly artificial American landscape upon which the group relocated a couple of years ago.

14. "The Sound Of Sunbathing." The Sinceros (Columbia) - Easily one of the best pop-disguised-as-new-wave albums of the year. Singer Mark Kjelden's pop sensitivy is complemented by his short, quick songs and the frequently bouncy arrangements he and the band gave them. "Sunbathing" is light, often humorous lyrically, but remains absorbing and highly listenable nonetheless.

15. "Stay With Me Till Dawn." Judie Tzuke (Rocket) - One of the prime debut LPs of the year, Miss Tzuke's "Stay With Me Till Dawn" is a splendid self-depiction of a singer who really seems to care about her work while not giving in to the excesses of sexual appeal and cutes. Miss Tzuke writes intelligent odes about her obviously vulnerable, but strong character. A highly overlooked album which lists for only \$5.98

WORST ALBUMS OF 1979 1. "Part Of The Game." Pablo Cruise (A&M) - This LP represents Pablo Cruise at its blandest, most dismal stage. The band fails to vary the tempo much, not a sin in itself but, without it, a group should make at least one song distinguishable. The problem with this album is the music reminds one of wall paper - its hardly noticeable.

2. "Head Games," Foreigner (Atlantic) - Boston managed to get away with releasing the same album virtually two times. Foreigner can be accused of triple unoriginality. "Head Games" confirms the group's desire to have the big hit single, which leads to more big hit singles which inevitably lead to big bucks. And, in the case of delinquents like Foreigner, big bucks leads to vapidity.

3. "Cornerstone," Styx (A&M) — "Cornerstone" serves as confirmation of

Styx's pompous approach to repeating itself. The idea is to record one or two good albums, build a large following of predominately undemanding teenagers, and shovel the same old junk at them once a year. If you've got one Styx album, you've got them all. "Cornerstone" is proof positive.

4. "Real Life Ain't This Way," Jay Ferguson (Elektra-Asylum) — Ferguson has denigrated since his days with Spirit and Jo Jo Gunne to becoming rock's answer to Neil Sedaka. His music is trite and his lyrics, particularly in Shakedown Cruise," are abysmally shallow.

5. "Back To The Egg," Wings (Columbia) — A giant, confused flop from a group of people who should known better. Certainly a group led by Paul McCartney and his inimitable talent could piece together an album with a bit more direction. The problem with "Back To The Egg" is that its string of songs (14 in all) fails to create the flow McCartney so obviously desired. Few songs stand out on this album, an LP with little or no longevity. It makes one wonder if McCartney will ever produce another good album, as this one is merely a continuation of disappointing releases from the former Beatle.

6. "Eat To The Beat," Blondie (Chrysalis) - A case in point for those who don't believe success spoils the riches. Find more than three good songs on this album and discover just how undemanding a person can be

7. "Boogie Motel," Foghat (Bearsville) - A tired collection of empty lyrics and all too frequently trod upon music. What makes this album any different from previous Foghat LPs. Not much, really, save for the fact the group is trying harder for a hit single or two. That it may be assured of before all is said and done, but the low quality of the music proves dreary nonetheless.

8. "Stormwatch," Jethro Tull (Chrysalis) - An album which features nothing particularly listenable, as far as longevity is concerned. Altogether, 'Stormwatch' is confirmation of Ian Anderson's lack of vitality and abundance

9. "I'm The Man." Joe Jackson (A&M) - The disturbingly disappointing follow-up to Jackson's respectable "Look Sharp" debut. Sometimes the lyrics hit their mark, but all too often they are pretentious while the music is dull.

10. "Discovery," Electric Light Orchestra (Jet) — A dismal attempt by a big name band to dethrone The Beatles, the group founder Jeff Lynne has emulated since his days with the Move. The album is a shallow collection of instantly

11. "The Ethel Merman Disco Album," (A&M) - Disco music has been the rock upon which practically every rock and roll fan has slung his most derisive of comments. Though many of those comments are the result of prejudice and misguidance (especially in light of the progress the form has made in the past year), one can understand just a little bit better why people cringe at the men tion of the word. Albums like this are confirmation enough that disco's unrelenting thump-thump can drive older people to do shameful things like this. Miss Merman had little or no reason to cut this album other than to perhaps salvage some last bastion of her youth or, vainly, hope to earn a lot of sales. of this LP. Both are suspect, but neither matters. Miss Merman's disco album is an assault on one's intelligence and is not entertaining in the least.

12. "Van Halen II," Van Halen (Warner Bros.) - A very depressing, commercialized follow-up to a fine 1978 debut album, "Van Halen II" is an obvious attempt by this group of hard rockers to compromise its earlier accomplishments by going for the all important hit single. The album produced a couple of mild hits, thus bearing out the indefinite nature of the album. It's not quite hard enough to render it credible in that area, and it's not quite commercial enough to make it as accessible as the band would have liked. Still, it sells well.

13. "One Voice." Barry Manilow (Arista) - I'll tell you flat out that I harbor little respect for this man. But that doesn't mean he isn't capable of producing good music, as he has occasionally in the past. "One Voice" is not among those rare instances. It is as insipid as much of Manilow's other work. The album is, I must admit, a better treatment for the yawns than sleeping pills.


14. "Kenny," Kenny Rogers (UA) — "Kenny" isn't a country album. It's

pop - pure, unadulterated pop, produced for mass consumption and little else. Sales figures are proof of the album's mass accessibility, but Rogers has put little more than that into the album. It's trash, a claim made all the more difficult by the existence of "The Gambler." the 1978 release that portrayed Rogers at one of his finest stages. The hit single "Coward of the County" is indicative of this lighthearted attempt at music. It is trite, ridiculous - and extremely popu-

15. "Dancin' Is Makin' Love," Gap Mangione (A&M) - The Mangione name is not necessarily equated with quality. But for Chuck's less popular brother to release such a relentless bore should be some kind of musical crime. Lousy albums like this far outnumber quality ones on the annual scale, but one hopes never to run across such garbage. The pain is too excruciating. Mangione's 1979 release was a total embarrassment, one which compromised any grain of talent the less popular Mangione had in favor of the disco trend. Again, disco can be a pleasurable listening experience. if an artist knows how to put some conviction

How many times have you read this? "Nobody around here expected that of him," she said of her neighbor, the axe-murderer. "He was always so quiet and so sweet." It seems still waters run deeper and more violent than anybody expects. It's always the quiet guys you have to look out for, seething volcanoes under a placid exterior. Well, there but for the grace of a sweet steel guitar goes Lloyd Maines.

Not that Maines is a mean sort. I'm sure there are no tortured kitty cats in his background, but all you have to do is catch one rock and roll ride on that wailing steel and you'll know what I mean.

Maines, who usually calls the Joe Ely Band home but can also be found sitting in with his brothers, plays the steel guitar like Friday night on an oil field. It's wild, it's raucous, it's infectious and it's one of the trademarks of the popular Lubbock group. n fact, it might not be too far off to say it is THE trademark of the Elv band.

And all of it comes from Maines, who

looks like a choirboy grown up. Some girl came up to me while we were in New York playing the Lone Star Cafe," Maines said. "She said, 'You play so good, but you look like a driver's ed teacher.' I guess if I was a real conformist, when I started with Ely I'd have grown my hair out, started smoking dope and the whole works. But I'd just as soon stay myself and try to do the music as well as I can.

No hippie, he. Maines is the consumate professional musician. He takes his job seriously, plays with great technique yet still gets his emotions into the music. "I don't really live like that," he says. "I try to live

I'm playing music. The steel is a pretty emotional instrument. 'I never really had anybody teach me, but I used to go out an watch Jimmy Day when he was playing with Willie Nelson. He was one of the most soulful players ever. Every note had so much feeling in it you could just grasp it. I picked up a lot of the

LLOYD MAINES

In addition to his steel playing, Maines is heavily involved in recording and engi-

neering at Caldwell Studios. Or, rather, make that the other way around. "The studio, there's no doubt about it," he said when asked which was more important. That's where my main interest has always been. I enjoy working the live shows with Ely, but my main interests have always been here (in the studio). I've been here for seven or eight years now and I've really been fortunate so far to be able

'Probably it's inevitable that I'll leave the Ely band because both my playing and my recording have got to keep growing. I'd have to have a clone to keep growing here and do a good job playing. I really dread the day, but I'm sure it'll happen. It'll be pretty tragic because I've given Joe a pretty good portion of the last six years of my life. But I've given more to the studio. I guess you might say I've had to split my life

I figure the older I get, this burning the candle at three different ends is going to have to stop. I really want to get into producing. Of course, I'll want to keep advancing on the steel. I want to always play, no matter what. I always said that I didn't care if I was filthy rich, I'd still play, one way or another. But the studio is where my heart really lies as far as a career. I really feel like I've got about as good an ear as anybody else as far as getting a balanced sound and getting things in tune.

'Now, a lot of people who come in here are requesting me on their sessions. I guess those six years of experience are starting to pay off. I've still got a ways to go, but I feel like in two or three years I'll be able to produce a record as well as anybody

As someone so heavily involved in both recording and playing with the Ely band, who could better critique the group's three albums?

"That live sound is what we're after," he said. "We've got it on some of our stuff already, on 'Johnny's Blues' for sure and on 'Boxcars' and 'Cornbread Moon' we got it. But that third album ('Down on the Drag'), we didn't get nothing. It was, well, I won't go into that. But, we've always thought the only way to get that sound was

It's only fitting that Maines is such a family man, since he comes from a big, musical family himself. But, even as the oldest of the brothers, he says his father, the leader of the first Maines Brothers band, never pushed him. "Shoot no. As a matter of fact, when we started out my dad didn't push us at all. We learned some of the songs off his record and the first time we sprung it on him, he was totally surprised. He didn't know we were doing it.

"He always encouraged us and urged us to do it, but he never pushed it on us at all. But growing up, there were so many of us in the family and for an auto mechanic, it was pretty hard to feed all of us. So for a long time we gave everything we made to the family. We just put it all in a big pot and if there was enough to go on a date afterward. OK. If not, we just stayed around. We were all happy doing that."

The Maines brothers certainly had an upbringing different from most people.


When Lloyd was 14, he and a couple of other brothers started playing the Cotton Club, at that time a notorious brawl palace.

Twe seen some of the worst free-for-alls out there that you can imagine," he said. People just don't fight like they used to. Used to be, 30 or 40 people getting after it seriously out there. I've seen everything from those fights to a guy getting shot in the mouth out there with a .22-caliber pistol. Steve was about 16 then. He was standing about a yard from him.

"They were always having stabbings or chootings or whatever out there and I guess we just primarily learned what not to do, what we didn't want to grow up doing. I saw so many good people but they were deteriorating just because of the alcohol."

That doesn't mean Maines lives a monk's life, but he does plan on being around a

"After it's all over I'll still have these articles and things to show my grand kids," he said. "I'll say, 'Look what daddy used to do.' I'm sure I'll still be playing then, but by that time I'll be out at the Westernaire with old Sylvester (Rice)."

ART TALK: By La Wanda Murfee

Life drawing classes can be the most challenging and satisfying of any art instruction. Learning to draw and paint the human form is the ultimate achievement of the fine arts. Browse through any museum, any art book and you will find a preponderance of paintings of people.

In one such class a student hesitated to begin a figure drawing, a new attempt. Being gifted in drawing, after a few sessions she astounded herself at



the ease with which she could attain an attitude and likeness. Diving into the first painting, she realized color application was no different than observing and

Another student refrained from any serious undertaking of painting until an introduction to figure drawing when she discovered she had a knack for portraying people. Her first drawings were boldly simplified. lacked detail, but she intuitively drew the design in the form. Although she had enjoyed a weekly painting ses-

sion, the student begn to explore a talent unknown to herself. Working seriously on figure painting, a new interest enveloped her.

A third student painted the figure with great care and understanding. He sensed the personality of the sitter, could determine the mood and execute it quickly. He liked subtle humor and could draw out that trait in most of the models. However, he was terrified of landscape painting. Although he had never attempted painting from nature, other than the figure, he felt he could not arrange so many subjects within a landscape onto one canvas. He refused to paint anything but people, and them only from life.

There are many opportunities to draw people. In classes all levels of learning participate. The pros refresh their skills along with the beginners. Michaelangelo had to learn about the figure in the dead room in secret. Van Gogh drew and painted people wherever he could find them, in the fields, at the table, out on the streets. He asked friends to pose. Mary Cassatt painted her fami-

Although paintings are seldom completed in group study, drawings and ideas are preserved for future reference. Like the musician who must practice every day, the serious painter must maintain a continuity in his own develop-

One model is always available in the mirror and any portrait painter worth his salt has painted many self portraits. The idea is not glorification, but simply to paint, to relish the application of juicy color while making a picture of the human form. The pleasure of people can be recorded in the joy of painting

An entire film class - Sara Duncan's class at Lubbock High School - decided that "Manhattan" was the year's best film, writing (together, I assume): "Another milestone from the creative genius Woody Allen." Sandy Martin agreed, saying, 'Although I've never been a Woody Allen fan, this film captured my heart as well as my mind." Jeff and Laura Young liked it "because it deals with people and ideas." Martin Meredith writes from Dallas: "This incredible black and white film explodes on the screen with an energy that creates a kaleidoscope of image and beauty. All this and Woody Allen, too! Ah, New York, New York, it's a helluva town!

Johnny Holmes wrote, "I guess it's chic to like Woody Allen, but I do anyway." Steve Gilbert disagreed in New Mexico, writing of the same film: "Boring. Boring. Manhattan did about as much for me as The Statue Of Liberty did, which was defi-

Don Shanks liked "Star Trek," insisting this critic didn't give it enough credit; Judy Roop seemed to agree. Randy Davis put "Star Trek" on his Best list; but added, It should have had a better story." Brian McLean called it one of the worst, describing it with "I donna think it'll stand the strain, Cap'n!' Damn right, Scotty." Les Adams was just as sarcastic, saying, "Kirk, Spock, Bones and crew, in search of a single original idea, fly the broad line between '2001' and 'Star Wars' - and fall off.'

Denise Baker liked "The Black Hole" for its special effects, and added she found 'The Great Train Robbery' too suggestive and "Time After Time" too violent. Cathy Shumaker liked "Kramer vs. Kramer" best of all, but added she can't decide between Dustin Hoffman or Martin Sheen ("Apocalypse Now") for best performance. Jeff and Laura Young concurred, saying "Kramer" should be "number one." Anne Mansur describes the drama as "absorbing, heartwarming, funny, sad and the acting is superb. especially the little boy (Justin Henry).

The China Syndrome" was Candy Sagon's pick "for all reasons: acting and relevance." Brian McLean calls it "a horror movie about things we really should be scared about." Gordon K. Smith wrote: "No one else seems to have noticed, but I think Michael Douglas' performance was as good as Fonda's and Lemmon's." But Eric Gale was not alone when he decribed it as "a clumsy storyline hatched in an attempt to make social commentary ... a mushroom cloud rising out of southern Califorma would've been an even less incredible and insulting ending than the one used." Peter Harris followed with, "Even if you despise nuclear power (and I don't), you can't avoid being insulted by this blatant influence-peddler, which makes a point of showing the good as people who curse gratuitously, defy authority and plunge into accusations without even trying to document facts presented.

Rick Aguero liked "Alien." saying, "I like to be scared out of my wits. I loved this movie. The alien itself (himself?) was a masterpiece in costuming and special effects." Joe Gulick calls the horror film "scary as hell.

Interestingly enough. Pat Daniell thinks the critics are picking unfairly on all those disaster movies. She makes the point, "It seems to me that most of you have preconceived notions when it comes to your reviews of disaster films in particular, I would hardly rate 'Concorde' or 'Beyond The Poseidon Adventure' among the top 10 movies, but I feel if the movie industry had used the exact same stories with a different title, you, the critics, wouldn't have been so vehement in your criticism." While we're patting critics on the back. Kelly Bensing says, "I don't care what some critics have to say about 'The Champ.' I think either it or 'Kramer vs. Kramer' deserves best movie, and I ve seen practically every movie, including 'Breaking Away.

Les Adams thinks "The Jerk" is "almost as silly (but not near as funny) as those telvision commercials featuring bankers, out in the middle of a cotton patch, wearing personalized hardhats." His pick for the year's worst, though, is "Winter Kills." Bobby Flores lists his worst film as "The Main Event," explaining, "I really like Barbra, but lately she's been picking real losers and getting knocked out. Maybe the problem is her curis: not enough oxygen for the brain.

Martin Meredith didn't have nice things to say about "Bloodline" and "Running. He describes the former as "a totally misleading movie. The array of big name stars misleads one to assume the movie will be passable, while the title misleads one to assume the movie is about justice in the Ayotollah's modern Iran. A true piece of garbage. Of "Running," he says, "Who could believe a movie wherein the major character runs to work in his suit and tie, jacket tied around his waist and necktie tied around his torehead? Anyone wonder what he smelled like after his little cross-city jaunt. Certainly no worse than this movie, I suppose.

now behind us. Now its time for all the candidates to stop primping and preening and take a position on the issues. Or, as the country boy said, "Put up or shut up, Mister." ISSUE: THE SHERIFF'S BUDG-

ISSUE: PERSONNEL. I raised this issue and pointed out that personnel has increased over 100% during Sheriff Blanchard's tenure. My Democrat opponents are confused on this issue. Sheriff Blanchard has asked the County Commissioners for additional personnel. He asked for 7—he got 4. At this meeting the Sheriff's Jail Administrator said he "needed four

or words to that effect. (He would do well at the Department of HEW). the other Democrat, Mr. DeRosa, alleges inefficiency, but he neglected to set forth any specifics. One Republican, Mr. Keesee, also alleged inefficiency, but he too failed to deal in specifics or outline his corrective program. As recent employees of Sheriff Blanchard they are in a position to have the best information on the apparent inefficiencies—but they also have a duty to tell us what those inefficiencies are, what they did to correct them while they were on the public payroll under Sheriff Blanchard, and what corrective action they plan. The other Republican, Mr. Southerland, alleges "a lopsided organization" and would attempt a solution by reorganization. He points out that the Jail Administrator earns \$3000 more per year then does the Chief Deputy. If his plan is to set up three divisions (jail, administration, patrol), with each division head under the Chief Deputy—will the Jail Administrator's pay be reduced, or will everyone else's be raised? I'd like to know. I'm sure the taxpayers would like to know.

ISSUE: EXPERIENCE. I issued a news release covering my twenty-five years experience and training, from rookie "beat" patrolman to Chief Deputy Sheriff. Two of my opponents, one Democrat, One Republican, seem anxious to refer to their military service. While I respect public service, military, doctors, nurses, judges, teachers, etc., there is ;no magic here unless that military service has something to do with being a better candidate for Sheriff of Lubbock County in the 1980s. I had a friend in the U.S. Navy who was a cracker-jack cook but even he would admit he'd make a hell of a poor Sheriff. Sheriff Blanchard dhas experience, but I don't think the taxpayes can afford to prolong it. After twelve years, its time for a change. Mr. Southerland points to his lack of experience in a Sheriff's office as a "plus" for him. I don't agree. We need experience and know-how—Lubbock County can't afford an "on-the-job" trainee Sheriff. Whether the voters are called upon to elect a President or a Sheriff, there appears to be recent evidence favoring the man with the experience. Mr. Keesee appears to have limited experience—and his lack of a positive program and/or stand on the issues seems to reflect this. It is more than clear that of all the candidates, I am best qualified.

ISSUE: JAIL OPERATIONS. I raised this issue by citing a recent escape as "the lastest chapter in a book that Sheriff Blanchard has written on jail mismanagement" during his tenure. Let me point out that the new jail is not the results of Sheriff Blanchard's wisdom and vision in the field of penology. It was mandated by the Federal Courts after a suit against the present Sheriff by his inmates, who alleged abuse and neglect. Again, the record speaks for itself, the jail was built because Sheriff Blanchard failed his duty-not that he performed his duty. Candidates DeRosa and Keesee took no specific position on the jail operation. Mr Southerland has raised the issues of reorganization and salaries, but only by innuendo and inference. It is apparent he has no plan. I want to take a hard look at his organization plan. The Department of Defense has been reorganized to the point where the bureaucrats can't find the U.S. Army, so we need to look before we leap. I am on record as saying over the past thirteen months that the Sheriff has a management problem, a personnel efficiency problem—not a jail problem. I have handled inmates over my twenty-five years as a peace officer and I neither had problems or lost any prisoners. One need look no farther than Sta Fe to realize the cost oif a penal system is meaningless, it doesn't matter who built it—the test is how it is managed. I don't view the jail as a problem, because if it's run right, it won't be a problem. I can run it right. I cannot tell you schedules, numbers of persons, etc., at this time because the new jail is still under construction. The people talking about the new jail as a "thing" probably dont know what they're talking

about since most of them haven't even been inside it yet. I would caution my fellow candidates against becoming instant jail experts.

ISSUE: UNSOLVED MURDERS. I am the only candidate that raised this issue and sopoke on it. I'm shocked (and disappointed) that my fellow candidates chose to ignore this tragedy. I promise the citizens of Lubbock County that if I'm elected Sheriff I will immediately reopen these six or eight cases and personally take charge. I cleared every murder case ever assigned to me (approximately fifteen) and I have to believe some good hard investigative work on these cases will be productive. I WILL DO SOMETHING! I'm sure the Criminal District Attorney would like to see the Sheriff pursue these cases and present him some "probably cause" information, so that he could take them into court. The Sheriff first has to do his job. I challenge Sheriff Blanchard to furnish a progress report on what action has been taken, and is being taken on the murders. Surely, we haven't spent all this money on manpower and equipment over the years only to be told that we must acept murderers in our midst! If so, will they kill again?

ISSUE: CRIME RATE. I raised this issue and spoke out. My opponents remained silent, or dodged the issue. A peace officer should reject crime as a physician rejects death-still, it is always there. The answer lies in how hard you fight it.

I'll use all the tools available. I'll cooperate fully with the Crime Line Program, the Crime Eye Program, Operation Identification, increase rural patrols, list all stolen vehicles by description in the newspaper once a week, cooperate and coordinate with area law enforcement officials, estabish area and neighborhood security programs, estabish cooperation and coordination with private and commercial security agencies. These programs can work. They willwork. We don't have to surrender to a higher crime rate, or to the thugs who are reponsible. It takes hard work. It takes management. It can be done—and I ask you to join me in doing it.

ISSUE: VEHICLES. I raised this issue and spoke out on it. My opponents remained silent. My position is that the taxpayers cannot afford to furnish their law enforcement officials luxury-class automobiles. America is the only country in the world where a thug rides to jail in a luxury-class auto: Complete with air conditioner, carpets, chrome trim, white sidewalls, etc. I say this is both stupid and wasteful! The poor taxpayer. His money is taken from him and loaned out to the men who get into trouble building these "gas hogs"—and then his money is taken from him to purchase, operate and maintain them! Sheriff Blanchard needs his Impala on LTDs like a pig needs mittens. Further, common sense and good economics dictate that automobiles purchased with taxpayer funds be used for OFFICIAL BUSINESS ONLY. PERIOD. I say cut out the fat and frills. Sheriff blanchard, in his new Impala, with no numbears, markings, warning lights, etc., can't move across town any faster than a kid in a secondhand Datsun. I favor a mixed fleet of small sub-compact cars for routine civil law travel, i.e., serving papers, citations, etc., and some compact-size cars for general use, and some mid-size cars for "emergency" or "heavy duty" work. NO LARGE, ELEGANT CARS. WE CAN SAVE MONEY.

ISSUE: RURAL PATROL. I raised this issue and spoke out on it. Sheriff blanchard indicates that he needs more people. He hasn't had a good rurual patrol program since 1971 or 1972. Candidates DeRosa and Keesee appareantly have no workable plan. Mr. Southerland alludes to his "reorganization" as somehow providing "better patrol coverage in the county's rural areas", but he doesn't appear to have a program. My program will work—effectively, efficiently and at a reasonable cost. I intend to divide the county into zones, and place men and cars into those zones. They will have a nix of "drive" time and 'station" time. (The stations will be coded and different stations used on different days). If this program is coordinated with area police, at all levels, along with citizen participation in area and neighborhood security programs, and by using citizen CB radio participation to the fullest, along with people, people, people it will work. People are fed up with crime! They are tired of being ripped off! They want to see some action—all they need is LEADERSHIP. Someone in a position of authority to request their sacrifice and service. It will work. I can make it work.

These are the issues we need to discuss (and I'm sure there are others——for example, the roadways being used as dumping grounds bothers me. And the stray animal problem over the county is also a problem that bothers me. But I'm running for Sheriff, not Garbageman or Dog Catcher. These matters will receive attention). If any concerend citizen is reading this and thinks the present Sheriff has marshalled all the resources available to him—and I stress people—drive to the all-night gas stations, restaurants, stores, shops, etc., etc., and merely ask two questions: (1) How often do you see the Sheriff (or Deputies)? and (2) Has the Sheriff ever asked you to be on the alert and report suspicious persons and events as a volunteer? You will get a shock. I did. I say Lubbock County needs to go into the '80s with a "can do" and "will do" Sheriff! I challenge all of the candidates to come out of their closets and be tested. This is the place. Now is the time.







WHAT WILL A three-week diet of oysters, 40 days of sexual abstinence and copious quantities of hard water get you?

In this case, "management" is the legislators and local school trustees as representatives of the taxpayers. Since public employes also help elect management, collective bargaining means they are represented on both sides of the bargaining table.

IN RECENT YEARS, the TSTA has become more and more militant in response to erosion of membership into labor organizations promising to do more for Texas teach-

In a similar move, activist college teachers only last month organized the Texas United Faculty Local 4033 of the American Federation of Teachers, AFL-CIO.

Classroom teachers at all levels are concerned, as are all American salaried workers, about double-digit inflation that is eating away at their purchasing power.

PUBLIC SCHOOL teachers are among those who certainly need as much a raise as the state can responsibly afford when the Legislature meets next January.

Teacher strikes in other states, however, show that collective bargaining is no answer either for the teachers or the general public -and certainly not for the students whose schools have been closed, interrupting their educations sometimes for months.

In Lubbock, three out of four voters said a loud "no" last month to collective bargaining for firefighters.

The Avalanche-Journal believes that was wise-and hopes that the TSTA will also experience a crushing defeat if it is foolish enough to push its demand for legalizing teacher walkouts.

Best, Worst 1979 Films Picked By A-J Critic

ADMITTEDLY, MOVIE CRITICS love to print their Best and Worst of the Year lists. It's one of the lighter and more ego-satisfying aspects of their jobs. But picking the finest films of any given year is never an easy task, never one which endears the critic to his readers. Inevitably, he will place a movie on the wrong list and be forced to endure the wrath of a fan who took it personally. And of course those who consider the Academy Awards a definitive statement will always call back in April to remind the critic that he blew it.

Though Lubbock does keep pace with most Texas cities in receiving new films, it is important to note that several 1979 pictures have yet to play this area. Those which probably will play a part in Oscar balloting include Bob Fosse's "All That Jazz" (opening March 14 at the Fox Fourplex), Hal Ashby's "Being There," Carroll Ballard's "The Black Stallion" (opening March 14 at Showplace Six), Robert Moore's film version of Neil Simon's "Chapter Two" (opening March 14 at the South Plains Cinema) and Jerome Hellman's "Promises In The Dark" (opening Feb. 22 at the Cinema West). Most of these films have been available only in Los Angeles, New York, Chicago and Washington, D.C.

Other 1979 releases which have yet to play Lubbock include "An Almost Perfect Affair," "City On Fire," "Five Days From Home," "French Postcards," "The Great Santini," "The Human Factor," "The Magician Of Lublin," "The Marriage Of Maria Braun," "Nosferatu, The Vampyre," "On The Yard," Fellini's "Orchestra Rehearsal," "Quadrophenia" (opening Friday at the South Plains Cinema), "Tree Of Wooden Clogs," "When You Comin' Back, Red Ryder?," "Wise Blood" and "Woyceck," Lubbockites were also able to see "The Bell Jar," "Fedora" and "The Last Wave" only by way of Home

Box Office television. This has been a strong year nationally for foreign films, and the usual complaints about Lubbock's lack of such have again arisen. And I must admit it would be nice to see what this new German cinema is all about.

Still, the theaters cannot be blamed. In 1979, Showplace Six screened "La Cage Aux Follies" and the Fox Fourplex booked "Wifemistress," "The Innocent" and the superb Duth film "Soldier Of Orange." None earned much of an audience.

Then there are the motion pictures I could not consider because, for one reason or another, I missed them during their sometimes brief visits. These include "The Apple Dumpling Gang Rides Again," "California Dreaming," "The Class Of Miss MacMichael," "Fast Break," "Fast Charlie, The Moonbeam Rider," "The Fifth Musketeer," "Game Of Death," "In Praise Of Older Women," "Love And Bullets," "A Man, A Woman & A Bank," "More American Grafitti," "Old Boyfriends," "The Passage," "Quintet" (this one didn't even last a week in Lubbock), "Rich Kids," "Skatetown USA" and "Unidentified Flying Oddball."

Thanks to an improvement in the quantity of good films released, I've managed to come up with 15 carididates for Best and Worst. Quite a few 1979 films will live on and, indeed, I struggled mightily to pick my favorite. I juggled "Apocalypse Now," "Manhattan" and "Kramer vs. Kramer" so many times that each held the top spot more than once, as deadline approached, however, a poor ending eliminated "Kramer vs. Kramer" and Apocalypse Now" nudged out "Manhattan" on a basis of sheer scope and effect. Even so, choosing 15 out of the hundreds of releases always leaves a few admirable efforts behind feeling rejected.

For example, at one time or another I had seriously considered listing "Going In Style," "The Great Train Robbery," "The Onion Field" and Peter Bogdanovich's remarkable comeback called "Saint Jack." I liked the performances in "La Cage Aux Follies," the mood set by "Murder By Decree" and Al Pacino in "...And Justice For All." "Boulevard Nights" deserved more viewers. "The Champ" manipulated me into crying, "Love At First Bite" was a fun spoof and "The Electric Horseman" good entertainment solely for entertainment's sake. Bette Midler made a stunning debut in "The Rose," and "Starting Over" was a fine sophisticated comedy.

But enough of the ones which came close. With a bit of trepidation and secure in the knowledge that my selections may change upon reflection 10 years from now. I offer you the finest films of 1979 — listed in order of preference.

THE TOP 15 FILMS OF 1979

1. "Apocalypse Now." Francis Ford Coppola gambled his fortune, his reputation and his career on "Apocalypse Now" and the audiences staggering out of theaters across the country, still uncertain about the soul-baring they've just witnessed, are proof that the gamble has paid off. Indeed, Coppola has emerged with an epic version of war and morality, of the madness hiding within the shadows of both, which is nothing short of overpowering. The acting, especially that by Martin Sheen and Robert Duvall and Frederic Forrest, is stunning. The surrealistic visuals provided by cinematographer Vittorio Stararo are rich in color and anger. "Apocalypse Now" attacks the conscience and the nerve centers, and we do not leave unaffected.

2. "Manhattan." Woody Allen's "Manhattan is an absolutely flawless film of purpose, a loving and extremely personal mixture of wit and tenderness which manages to spark both comedic and emotional reactions as it damns fashionable intellectualism in favor of the drama of losing relationships. Indeed, "Manhattan" makes us first laugh and then fall silent in respect for honest emotion. It is a film rare in structure and scope and courage, elegantly romantic and honestly realistic. It is both sophisticated drama and meaningful comedy, touching us and affecting us as few films do these days. It is, further, Allen's definitive statement, a sparkling testimonial to our very human capabilities of creating our own happiness and misery.

3. "Kramer vs. Kramer" Dustin Hoffman will win his first Oscar for his brilliant work here as a man who learns how to be a father only after the mother leaves the nest. But writer-director Robet Benton deserves applause for his sensitive and daring insistence on giving us only four major characters. We understand them all too well by the end of the film. Benton could have made a Hero and Villain movie, a la "The Champ," but opted instead to show both pro-

tagonists' good and bad points. It is this feeling, combined with an effective simplistic structure, which makes the film succeed despite its poor ending.

4. "Breaking Away." In an age of growing cynicism and corruption, there has been very little reality to cheer in our movie theaters. British director Peter Yates produced the exception with "Breaking Away," a movie filled with laughter and laced with tenderness, one whose characters are constructed from our own souls and emotions. It is more than entertaining. It is important — and I do not use the word lightly — because it allows us to revel in the power of dreams which, with age, may be exposed as limited in scope but still retains the status of a vital part of our lives. Indeed, we are caught up from the start in the humor and tragedy which goes with the struggle for dignity, but "Breaking Away" never hides the fact that victory can never be as important as the decision to fight for it

5. "Yanks." Sparked by memories of American GIs stationed in his native England during World War II, director John Schlesinger has attempted to recapture the conflicts and the romance and the loneliness in this old-fashioned love story. I admit it resembles a large-scale soap opera at times, but it is nevertheless a consistently attractive and moving film which has as its inner strength not just wartime romance, but a sensitive and touching glimpse of believable characters and emotions. Schlesinger makes use of no war footage as he returns to a genre once regarded as "films for women," no doubt very much aware that contemporary men, no longer forced to bottle up their feelings, will also appreciate the juxtaposition of love and loneliness in each of the film's key relation-

6. "Norma Rae." It's not unusual for director Martin Ritt to give us underdogs scraping for survival in the shadow of big business or cruel authority. And this formula works well in "Norma Rae." Sally Field must be considered an Oscar frontrunner for her warm portrait of a textile mill worker inspired to put her courgae to the test and, in the process, learn not only about women's rights, but human rights and human dignity as well. Because of Miss Field's performance and Ritt's eye for detail, "Norma Rae" emerges a triumphant celebration of the spirit and courage within us all, entertaining on a personal and inspirational level.

7. "Hair." Czechoslovakian filmmaker Milos Forman has taken the original tribal love-rock musical "Hair," an art work I'd considered dead and buried ever since the Osmondish Cowsills transformed its social conscience into bubblegum, and molded it into a statement relevant in 1979. He has done more than create an exhilarating musical, he has recaptured our most enlightening era in both light and shadow: its celebration and confusion, its innocence and arrogance. He has brought back memories through his skillful manipulation of familiar music, and offered a better storyline as transition. Forman's "Hair" is cause for celebration and contemplation, musical history that can send chills up our spines and still make us want to sing and dance.

8. "The China Syndrome." In my original review, I called "The China Syndrome" a powderkeg of suspense and closed with: "The key to its success, however, may lie elsewhere. To be specific, that key may be the effect the film

has on audiences the next day, when they've left the theater and are faced again with reality's headlines and controversies." Not long afterward, we had an incident at Three Mile Island and talk of life imitating art. Perhaps the most controversial film of the year, "The China Syndrome" is an exciting film dealing with nuclear and human reactions, but one more anti-greed than anti-nuke. It owes a large part of its success, also, to Jack Lemmon's superb performance.

9. "A Little Romance." The most overlooked, and one of the most delightful, movies of 1979. George Roy Hill follows his profane humor in "Slapshot" with a picture of unabashed innocence and tenderness. The acting of its young stars (Thelonius Bernard and Diane Lane), trying to create their own legend by running away to Italy to kiss under the Bridge Of Sighs, is just as effective as that of Laurence Olivier in support. This is a picture to believe in, a small inoffensive film guaranteed to make you laugh and weep with admiration for its sweetness.

. 10. "Alien." The most involving and foreboding outer space horror film ever made. Derek Vanlint's cinematography is outstanding, creating its own suspense with incense and strobe lighting, its visionary concept of the inhuman with the standard tools of light and shadow. But this is British director Ridley Scott's baby. He opens his film with a slow, deliberate pace and gradually picks up the visual tempo again and again until we become just as frantic as the charaters, our hearts pounding just as fast. Logic be damned, "Alien" scares us. And in doing so, it entertains us immensely.

il. "North Dallas 40." Actor Nick Nolte and director Ted Kotcheff chose to defy the odds and scrape back the epidermal layer of professional football to reveal the ugliness hiding just below the surface. They have substituted pills and pain for pride and power, hypocrisy for heroism, and emerged with an aching masterpiece. Every sportswriter at this newspaper had only negative comments about "North Dallas 40," and one must admit the locker room "psyching-up" was overdone. But Kotcheff used technique to make a point. And while "North Dallas 40" is no documentary, it remains the most dynamic, challenging and intelligent sports film this country has seen.

12. "Time After Time." One of the year's most clever, imaginative and well-acted pictures. It's biggest asset, though, is the multiplicity of its themes. Though the murder scenes are too graphic for very young viewers, the picture still appeals to the fantasy lover in all of us. The love story is well-played, and the film's excellence as a mystery-thriller can't be denied. There is also a good deal of just-below-the-surface social commentary on violence in today's society. And there are also scenes of sheer hilarity, as we watch a 19th century scientist contend with a brave new world of cabs, garbage disposals and Big Macs.

13. "Dawn Of The Dead." The second film in a proposed trilogy by director George Romero about the dead returning to kill and eat the living, and not an easy one to watch. Indeed, in that respect, it's little more than an effective horror film — and one which was no doubt embraced by many as yet another example of violence as pornography. But Romero is out to satirize as well as frighten. And the film's underlying statement, not to mention its surprising sense of humor, grant an added dimension and importance. Indeed, amidst all the bullet-riddled corpses, the entrail-gnawing and the brain matter splattered on the walls, there exists an authoritative mirroring of human nature, an underlying effect which makes this extremely original motion picture very much

14. "1941." Most critics hated it. A good 75 per cent of the A-J readers polled hated it. My co-workers in the newsroom hated it. I've heard director Steven Spielberg even dislikes it. Tough! I found it an unpredictable, noisy, hilarious, whiz-bang comedy which kept me laughing all three times I saw it. Thanks to superb special effects, blazing pacing and good acting from the supporting cast, this old-fashioned, anything-for-a-laugh slapstick kept me rolling in the aisles.

15. "The Warriors." Director Walter Hill does not bother with the sociological aspects of gang life, the tribal bondings or disturbed psyches. Rather, he gives us a cut-and-dried chase movie, a sort of street survival test. And the result is one of the year's more exciting efforts. Highlights include two battle sequences which, despite the distinct lack of blood, still come off as mesmerizingly violent and beautifully choreographed. The best sees The Warriors outnumbered by The Baseball Furies, the latter wielding baseball bats with frightening expertise.

Picking the Worst Movie of the Year is even harder since there are infinitely more films to choose from. It was really tough narrowing the finalists to 15 and I cried when I found myself forced to give reprieves to despicable trash like "Arabian Adventure," "Avalanche Express," "C.H.O.M.P.S.," "Hanover Street," "The Legacy," "Meteor," "Players," "Prisoner Of Zenda," "Roller Boogie" and "Sidney Sheldon's Bloodline." "Jesus" was a film made for one certain audience; it was slow and boring and dared its viewers to respond negatively. That's not what movies are for. "Star Trek: The Motion Picture" is not

on my list of worst films, because the special effects were mind boggling.

Others which came close included Dustin Hoffman's ill-fated "Agatha," Clint Eastwood's "Escape From Alcatraz," Gene Wilder's failure "The Frisco Kid," Robert Altman's amazingly idiotic "A Perfect Couple," Michael Douglas "Running" (a truly insulting movie) and "The Wanderers." Only Dudley Moore's amazing comic talent kept "10" off my list. The list could go on and on, but it's time we made the nosedive into Pit City. So here, in descending order of atrociousness, are the boring remembrances of the previous year.

THE BOTTOM DOGS OF 1979

1. "The Villain." It's one thing to be a bad movie; it's quite another to be bad, boring and stupid. "The Villain" is more. A Roadrunner cartoon in human form, with bodybuilder Arnold Schwarzenegger as the fast bird and Kirk Douglas the Wile E. Coyote prototype, this film insults the intelligence almost as quickly as it wastes its stars. Ann Margret, who worked so hard through "Carnal Knowledge" and "Tommy" and "Magic" to be taken seriously, goes back to depending on her chest for laughs. Indeed, "The Villain," like "Up In Smoke" the year before, wins the Worst Movie poll hands down.

2. "Winter Kills." A sick ripoff of the Kennedy legend which never knows whether to spoof or take itself seriously. The laudable technical quality, bigname cast and obvious expense makes one think the latter. But the plot throws a monkeywrench into things. What we're told is that Joseph Kennedy had his son John assassinated, that Robert Kennedy's girlfriend was seduced at age 12 by John Kennedy, and on and on and on... Only the fact that this film is so bizarre, and thus keeps our interest while we struggle to find out what's going on, keeps it in second place.

3. "Cuba." I can't help but feel that there must have been a plot when this screenplay first made the rounds, but you sure can't tell after seeing the final product. A confusing and boring mishmash about pre-Castro Cuba, this picture seems to boast an assortment of subplots, far too many characters and not a bit of cohesion. indeed, after "Meteor" and this picture, one has to wonder how much emphasis Sean Connery is putting on his wallet rather than his pride these days. Brooke Adams is the love of his life in this movie, whom he meets again after first seducing her in North Africa when she was still 15 years old. Jack Weston makes for a nonsensical ugly American, and I still haven't figured out who the fellow is making his getaway by plane at the end. Indeed, this slop might be laughable had it not taken itself so seriously. Boring, at best, it will be completely forgotten by this time next year.

4. "Luna." The film which set out to prove that Bernardo Bertolucci, one of our most talented directors, can also fall victim to the pretentious concept that we care about his childhood fantasies. Jill Clayburgh is totally miscast as the mother who tries to cure her son's drug addiction by way of a little incest. Their confrontations are laughable, almost as hilarious as the dubbing of operatic voices when Miss Clayburgh is singing. Unfortunately, the film is one of the most dreary efforts of the year, a boring picture which makes its mark only through Matthew Barry's solid debut as the addicted son.

5. "The Promise." Oh brother, talk about your shopgirl romances! Kathleen Quiplan plays a young woman who has her face destroyed in a car accident, Stephen Collins is her fiance and Beatrice Straight is Collin's mother. After the accident, mama tells the girl she'll pay for the plastic surgery if she moves away and changes her name. The girl agrees, thinking Collins will follow her anyway. Ah, but mama tells Collins the girl died. And, since he's so much in love that he never asks where his fiance buried or tries to visit the grave, he believes mama. Then, in another city, the lovers run into each other again. She has a new face and a new name. Despite the fact she neglected to get a new voice and new personality traits, he doesn't recognize her. Until... Ah, true love.

6. "Hurricane." Dayton Ka'ne goes to great lengths to prove that surfers know how to dance those native pelvic thrusts, but are hard put to keep up with this acting stuff. Mia Farrow, no doubt cast because she can get soaking wet and still maintain a PG rating, is the WASP who falls in love with Ka'ne. So what we have is an idiotic love story (Jason Robards has the Beatrice Straight part in this film) in search of a 45-minute rainstorm. Along with the titled rain, we also get one of film's most ridiculous endings: a conclusion which wipes out an island and everyone in the movie but the two lovers. Jason Robards dies

when he has a head-on collision with a ship. Enough said.

7. "The Black Hole." OK, so this one has special effects too, full of color and mystery. But it also unfortunately boasts a new trend in Disney Studio releases: the rip off. Not satisfied to provide reliable family entertainment, this multimillion dollar effort was Disney's first PG-rated release, trying to grab the kids with dialogue out of a third-grade reader and the adults with five minutes of metaphysical meandering at the end. In effect, the first part insults anyone over age 6 and the ending will totally confuse the youngsters. It's a shame, but Walt must still be spinning in his coffin.

8. "Prophecy." One of the biggest duds of the year, if only because we walk in expecting so much from screenwriter David Seltzer and director John Frankenheimer. An old-fashioned, monsters-created-by-man's-pollution story, this tale of a 15-foot-tall mutant killer (a giant bear with leaky brains, it would appear) in the Maine forests is predictable and often laughable. Subplots are not resolved and the special effects, with the exception of closeups of the baby monster, are ineffective. Robert Foxworth is the city boy trying to figure out what's messin' up all those Injuns in the woods; after seeing a fish eat a duck and being attacked by a brainless raccoon, he still isn't convinced anything's really wrong. But when he finally spots a big tadpole, hey boy...

9. "Americathon." A hopeless parody on the future problems, when gasoline is non-existent and John Ritter is president. According to the film, the country's debt is being called in by a manufacturer of clown shoes, and money must be raised by way of a month-long telethon. (It was either that or auctioning off the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.) Telethon entertainment includes rock singer Meat Loaf fighting a car and host Harvey Korman dropping his

pants.

10. TWO-WAY TIE: "Beyond The Poseidon Adventure" and "The Concorde: Airport 1979." The last disaster films? We can always hope. The former found Irwin Allen and a cast which should have known better (Sally Field, Michael Caine) looking for lost gold and lost drugs in the eight-years-sinking Poseidon. The latter puts the "Airport" format into the Concorde, allowing George Kennedy as co-pilot to put his arm out the plane's window to fire a flar-

egun — while it's traveling at the speed of sound.

11. "The Seduction Of Joe Tynan." Alan Alda plays the dual role of screen-writer and star in this modern-day look at both political corruption and a man yearning for change — and he's halfway successful. That is, his acting is sincere enough, but the script is one long tired cliche. We tire of this movie early, if only because Alda's character is so superficial and Meryl Streep's is completely artificial. Only Barbara Harris' superb performance as the lonely, misunderstood politician's wife made this movie even halfway bearable. Originally titled, "The Senator," the movie won raves from the East Coast critics. I continue to wonder why

12. "Wanda Nevada." Peter Fonda directs and stars in this 1950ish western about a con man who wins a young girl, Brooke Shields, in a poker game and then goes looking for gold in the Grand Canyon. Unfortunately, he handles neither his directing or his acting with style — and the writing is horrible, to boot. Indeed, filled with unnecessary minor characters and emphasis shifts, "Wanda Nevada" is a rather confusing little diversion which offers nothing more than good cinematography and another promising performance from the (now) 14-year-old Miss Shields. Neither of which is enough to sustain any of us.

13. "Phantasm." Unintentionally funny at times, unintentionally stupid at all others, this weird little film is a complete flop. Basically, it deals with two brothers trying to fight off evil forces at the local mortuary. But the evil is never explained, and the director's attempt at creating a sheer visual experiment in terror falls flat. Truly a dumb, insulting movie.

14. "Last Embrace." An attempt to rip off Hitchcock, with the talented Roy Schedier and Janet Margolin losing in the process. The mystery never held our interest, and the ending was so abrupt the viewer was inclined to think the director had simply run out of film.

15. "Main Event." Barbra Streisand and Ryan O'Neal, reunited for the first time since Peter Bogdanovich's "What's Up Doc?," never click in this boring comedy. Miss Streisand struts about like a chicken with its head cut off, playing the same character (only the names change) she's played in her last several films. Indeed, it's been six years since she's come through with a decent movie. And O'Neal is little more than a granite-faced straight man.

Financial Squeeze Threat To Baptist Foreign Missions

MEMPHIS (Special) - A devastating combination of overseas inflation and devaluation of the dollar is threatening to squeeze the financial life blood out of Southern Baptist foreign missions, according to a Baptist Press report.

The problem is so critical it prompted R. Keith Parks, the new executive director of the Foreign Mission Board, to tell Birmingham pastors recently that Bold Mission Thrust will not succeed if the present trends continue.

We're not going to get there at the rate we are going." said Parks. "Last year Cooperative Program gifts increased 7.8 percent, but worldwide inflation, compounded by dollar devaluation overseas, averaged 27 percent." Therefore, Parks said, Southern Baptists have lost "approximately 20 percent in buying power worldwide"in just one year.

Parks observed that most Americans seem to be so caught up in their own inflation problems that they are not aware of what is happening in the rest

We stagger under 13 percent annual inflation

here, when several countries have 30 to 40 percent inflation," he said. The annual inflation rate in Argentina, believed to be the highest in the world currently, is about 180 percent.

Spiraling inflation has caused some missionaries to change their eating habits, using less meat and more fresh vegetables and fruits. Car pools are springing up in overseas settings as well as at home.

Parks said that the rampant inflation overseas has made it necessary for many of the budgets of Southern Baptist mission organizations in 94 countries around the world to be slashed. It also has created critical problems at the Foreign Mission Board in projecting budgets for 1980.

Bill O'Brien, the board's director of denominational cooperation, said, "Once the decreased percentage of dollars given to foreign missions actually gets on the mission field, it gets clobbered two more times -once by overseas inflaton of that particular country's currency, and again by the devaluation of the American dollar overseas.

To help the board plan for the 1980 budget, Lew-

is Myers, associate to the overseas division director, prepared a complicated chart comparing the 'actual" dollars budgeted over a 23-year period to the "constant" dollar factor - a figure adjusted to compensate for overseas inflation, dollar devaluation and U.S. inflation. Myers used 1967, the year used by the U.S. government, as a basis for comparison of "actual and constant dollars."

The study showed that over the past 10 years, buying power of foreign mission funds has been reduced by a total of 128 percent by the three factors of U.S. inflation, dollar devaluation overseas and overseas inflation

Using these factors, the \$46,768,000 budgeted by the Foreign Mission Board for missionary support in 1980 amounts to only \$36,946,000 in equivalent buying power compared to ten years ago, Myers said. That's a loss of almost \$10 million.

In operating budgets for the missions overseas, the \$14,165,000 budgeted amount has an actual buying power of only \$11,190,000; and the \$5 million budgeted for capital needs has an actual buying power of only \$3.9 million, Myers said.

Positive Thinking

THE PRINCIPAL THING IN this world is to keep one's soul aloft," wrote Gustave Flaubert the great French novelist. Those words are among the most stirring I have ever read and I thought of them when I read about Rick Fox in a Houston, Texas newspaper

Rick Fox came from Colorado. He had been top student in high school and then excelled in both scholarship and sports at college. All his life he had wanted to be a doctor; so he went on from college to the Baylor University School of

In his first year there he was again top man in his class, as he had been in college and high school. He had an enthusiasm for medicine that insired his professors as well as the other students. Then, in his second year, this boy developed a pain in his stomach. It kept growing worse. He went into the hospital.

One day his doctor came and sat down by his bed. "Rick", he said, "I've got

to give it to you straight. You have terminal cancer, son, and you can't live." The boy looked up and asked, "Doctor, let me have thirty minutes alone with God." The doctor and nurses went out and left him. When he called them back, his face was shining, and this is what he said: "Now, what I want to do is to stay in the hospital and have you use me as a laboratory specimen. I will

keep memos of my reactions so that my illness will help you fight this disease

and cure others of it in the future. A doctor, you see, to the last; he never thought of himself

HIS CLASS MATES WOULD come in day by day to see Rick. He would always tell them, "Be a good doctor." When, finally, Rick was told he had only two or three more days to live, he said he wanted to go home to Colorado to see his family and friends and the mountains once again.

So they took him in an ambulance to the airport and the students from the Baylor Medical School lined up to say goodbye to him. The attendant wheeled him down the line in a wheelchair. He shook hands with each one and called them by name. Then, before he was wheeled up the ramp into the plane, he turned around, smiled at them all and said, "Remember, be good doctors."

They watched as the little silver plane took off, climbed, passed into a cloud and disappeared. Two days later, the body of Rick Fox was dead. But only his body died. For, as long as they practice medicine through the years, sixty men and women will remember the indomitable spirit of a boy who kept his soul aloft in the face of death.

In an anthology, "The Spirt of Man," edited by Whit Burnett, there appears a section from an unplublished book by a distinguised scientist. Anthony Standen, which is worth quoting:

The soul then, is something which is not destroyed by the death of the . A man who has lost an arm or a leg has his soul just the same, and his soul is not harmed by the loss. A wheelchair case, from polio, can go on to be President of the United States. It often happens that people suffering from a serious disease are cheerful, courageous, friendly, loving - in other words they have splendid souls, though their bodies may be wasting away and even approaching death. . . Some things can harm the body and even destroy it. . But they do not harm the soul at all. How then can they destroy it?

In you is something very great. It is your soul. Only sin can kill it. Nothing else can. Our great job in life is "to keep the soul aloft.

The agency is presently taking inquiries about adoptions although intake regularly will be in September, Jensen said. The office will limit those accepted so that long waiting lists do not develop. The exception to this, he said, is that the list will be open at all times for older (2year or older) children and for handicapped children.

In conjunction with this service, the social service agency will need help in the Lubbock area from two kinds of co-operating families. One will be for shortterm foster care and the other will be in the category of "mutual service homes This latter category, Jensen explained. will give a pregnant girl a protected environment and emotional support and she will offer, in turn, some help to the family with household and child care. Both categories of homes will be supervised and licensed under the regular licensing provisions of the Texas Department of Human Resources, Jensen said.

Commenting on the opening of the new office, Jensen said, it "opens up new avenues of mission for Lutherans in the West Texas area." Pastoral counseling services will expand also as the program gains momentum.

Jensen, who formerly was an LSS director for Western Pennsylvania, will be installed at the service planned for Feb. 24. At a later time, the agency will hold an open house for social service professionals in the region.

Although the services of LSST are available to all on a sliding fee scale according to ability to pay, the major group served will be the more than 5,000 Lutherans in the Panhandle-Plains area. Jensen and Stolleis said.

Fight Against World **Hunger Launched** NEW YORK (Special) - A series of

regional conferences which will be held this month mark the kick off to a nationwide campaign to spur greater efforts by the U.S. government to combat world The campaign is jointly sponsored by

the National Council of Churches' Coordinating Council for Hunger Concerns and Bread for the World. It will branch out from the February regional meetings into many local study groups in March and community forums in April. According to NCC Hunger Coordina-

tor Louis Knowles, both the study groups and the forums will review the soon-tobe released recommendations of the Presidential Commission on World Hunger.

'Our real goal is to renew people's interest in and concern for the problem of world hunger and to deepen their understanding of its root causes," Knowles explained.

There is every indication that there are more hungry people in the world to-day than there were in 1974, during the World Food Conference in Rome. We have only been saved from more severe famine situations by a series of good harvests, but we can't rely on that happening indefinitely.

We believe the Presidential Commission's report will give us an effective way to raise the underlying issues behind the hunger problem.

Local legislators and political leaders will be invited to the community forums in April, Knowles said. Through the resulting citizen input, he said, the campaign hopefully will build "poliitcal will" around hunger concerns.

The regional conferences, scheduled throughout February, will prepare state and local leaders within the hunger net-

works to organize the study groups and community forums.

The campaign will be supported by a grant of \$39,608 from the Presidential Commission on World Hunger. According to Knowles, however, the grant comes with no strings attached and will in no way influence the positions taken by the groups involved in the campaign.

In 1952 President Truman's Materials Policy Commission clearly warned that in the 1970s the United States would be dependent on Middle East oil, and that unstable political conditions there could result in a serious energy shortage in America.

The Commission's prediction, which turned out to be surprisingly accurate, was based on the fact that after World War II oil production in the United States no longer met domestic demand, and we became a net importer of

But few people heeded the Commission's report or its plea for energy conservation. After all, America had always had abundant energy resources. The Commission's bleak outlook was, for most Americans, just another example of how wrongheaded "experts" can be

It is true that the increasing availability of cheap and flexible sources of energy was one of the most important factors in the transformation of America from a predominantly agricultural nation in 1850 to an industrial giant a century later. In 1950, in fact, the United States consumed about 15 times more energy than it had in 1850.

What most people failed to realize, however, was that in the process of industrialization, our economic and social organization, our jobs and our daily routines had become increasingly reliant on the availability of petroleum products. The Materials Policy Commission clearly perceived the true state of affairs.

UNTIL ABOUT 1880 AMERICA depended on wood, water, and wind for its energy needs. The primeval forests were a hindrance to people seeking land to farm, but, when they fell to the axe, they provided huge quantitites of wood. Wood was practically free, and it was consumed in the roaring open fireplaces of the pioneers, in the fireboxes of locomotives and steamboats, and in iron blast furnaces and other industrial processes requiring heat. In 1850 about 100 million cords — over four cords per capita of wood were burned annually, a very large amount when one realizes that a cord of wood is four feet wide by four feet high by eight feet long.

For local manufacturing, waterpower, provided by uge water wheels or primitive turbines, was plentiful. The Pawtucket Falls of the Merrimack River powered the textile mills of Lowell, Mass., and the Great Falls of the

COAL MINERS, ALABAMA, 1939-Coal, a major source of energy in the United States since the 1880s, helped fuel the industrial revolution

Pasaic River provided Paterson, N.J., with the energy for itsilk, jute, gun, and locomotive factories. As the 19th cetury progressed, water turbines became more common an more efficient, foreshadowing the large hydroelectric plnts of modern times

Windmills dotted the eastern seaboard and accompanid the westward expansion. The Halladay windmill, usd to grind flour, pump water, and saw wood, was a famiar fixture on most farms and ranches of the great plins. Windmills rapidly disappeared from the landscape, hovever, after the Rural Electrification Administration brught electricity to rural areas beginning in the 1930s.

tion and caused a drastic shift from wood, water, and wind to other energy sources. The first was the discovery and employment of the Bessemer and open hearth processes for manufacturing steel inexpensively. The second was the appearance of a new science-thermodynamics, whose application enabled engineers to desgn more efficiently steam and other engines that converted heat into mechanical work. The third was the drilling of the Drake well in 1859 at Titusville, Pa., which ushered in the era of petroleum. The fourth was the founding in the early 1880s of the electric generating industry.

Cheap steel rails made possible the nationWide expansion of the railway network. Shipbuilders constructed steel ships; steel girders were used in bridges and later in skyscrapers; and steel wire fenced the cattle ranches of the west. Wood, however, Was no longer a suitable fuel for the rapidly expanding steel mills. Steelmakers turned to coal and built their plants near the extensive coal reserves of Pennsylvania, West Virginia, and Ohio.

COAL WAS ALSO FOUND to be a cheaper, more convenient fuel both for railway locomotives and for urban buildings and residences. By the mid-1880s coal had become the nation's chief energy source.

The age of coal and steel demanded more powerful engines for mining, for the manufacture and fabrication of steel, for transoceanic steamships and transcontinental locomotives, and for driving electric generators. Using the laws of thermodynamics, engineers learned how to employ steam efficiently at very high temperatures and pressures, and their efforts culminated in the development of high-speed steam turbines.

Initially, electricity provided power for arc lighting, street railways, and electric illumination of buildings.

Electric motors, however, introduced about 1900, produced a revolution in industry and the home. Large electric motors were attached directly to the massive rolls fabricating thick steel plates or girders, while tiny motors powered vacuum cleaners and washing machines.

IN PROVIDING AN EFFICIENT power source for each individual machine, the motor caused the redesign of factories and the reorganization of industrial work. Similarly, it transformed household work. The electric generating industry exploded, expanding its capacity more than 650 times between 1900 and 1950. In the process, generating costs were dramatically reduced, and the price of electricity was progressively lowered.

A gradual but drastic change in the organization of society accompanied the process of industrialization. An increasingly dwindling proportion of our population engaged in agriculture or was needed to provide our food. Mass production industries employed armies of workers, causing massive urban growth, which, in turn, stimulated the expansion of service establishments - hospitals, hotels, department stores, groceries, and restaurants.

City dwellers needed cheap and dependable transporta-tion, energy to heat and light their homes, cook food, and run vacuum cleaners, washing machines, and the new electric refrigerators. The city began to resemble a complicated machine, in which energy in its various forms was dispensed to consumers through complex networks.

INDUSTRIES BECAME CONCENTRATED and were dominated by such giant corporations as Standard Oil, U.S. Steel, American Telephone and Telegraph, General Electric, and Du Pont. In turn, governmental bureaucracy burgeoned in order to regulate trade and industry practices and to check monopolies, and political power became increasingly centralized in the federal government.

In the late 19th century, three German engineers - Nicholas Otto, Eugen Langen, and Rudolf Diesel - became convinced that centralized, expensive energy sources gave an overwhelming advantage to industrial barons. They de-termined to design and manufacture inexpensive power sources which would enbable small entrepreneurs to compete successfully with the giants. The eventual products were the gasoline and diesel internal combustion engines, which, ironically, gave birth to the greatest mass production enterpises of the 20th century -the automobile and

As petroleum production increased in response to the demand for gasoline, many electric generating plants and other industries took advantage of the availability of the cleaner liquid fuel oil or of natural gas to fire their boilers. The role of coal as an energy source declined sharply, while the consumption of oil multiplied 25 times between

IN 1952, WHEN THE Materials Policy Commission report was published, few government leaders thought about supporting research to enable the ailing coal industry to exploit deep deposits profitably or to process successfully coal having a high sulfur content.

Future energy requirements apart from transportation, it was thought, would come from a new energy source the atom, which gave promise of clean, dependable power for the foreseeable future.

WASHINGTON (U1) - Overall income in the United Staes has grown five times faster than theincomes of food stamp households dumg the past four years. As a result, say assistant agriculture secretary Carol lucker Foreman food stamp househols are especially hard hit by inflation.

A recent survey shaved they have an average monthly incone of only \$320, compared with about \$,500 in the general population. Worse sill, 60 percent of the households receiving food stamps have no liquid assets tdall back on, Mrs. Foreman says, and 95percent of them have assets of less than 1,500.

'Articles Of Faith' Under Fire

DALLAS (Special) - W. Marvin Watson, president of Dallas Baptist Col lege, said recently that his emphasis on making that institution a "distinctively" Christian school and requiring the faculty, staff and trustees to sign a statement of their beliefs and practices is meant to tell parents of prospective students and the students themselves "what they can expect" from the

The emphasis. Watson said, certainly is not to be judgmental of the practices and stance of any other educational institution nor to cast any aspersions on what has been done in the past at Dallas Baptist College.

What I proposed and was adopted by unanimous vote of the trustees present," he said, "was done because I believe if we are to be Christian we must be willing to say to the world that if you want to consider this as your college home, this is what you will be taught.

The presidents of other Texas Baptist college (including Wayland in Plainview) have said they have no intention of following Watson's lead in having their faculties and staffs sign a statement of faith. And though all defended any college's right to do as it pleases, a couple of

them indicated they felt such a requirement would have the effect of making their institutions less "distinctively" Christian and would be a violation of Bap-

Though none requires faculty or staff to sign a statement of beliefs, all of the presidents emphasized they interview faculty members personally before they are employed and their religious beliefs and practices are carefully scrutinized.

In November Watson presented to his trustees "Articles of Faith" based on the statement of Baptist Faith and Message approved by the Southern Baptist Convention of 1963. The Articles of Faith, however, included additions to the portions of the 1963 statement on the Scriptures and man.

In the Scriptures portion, Watson added a sentence which said, "We believe in the Scriptures of both the Old and New Testament as verbally inspired by God and inerrant in the original writing, and that they are of supreme and final authority in faith and life.

In the portion on the nature of man, a sentence was inserted, stating, "By this statement we affirm our belief that man was created by a direct act of God in His image, not from previously exisiting creatures, and that all of mankind sinned in Adam and Eve, the historical parents of the entire human race."

Watson explained he resents "the abuse" of the original wording of the Scriptures portion to permit a wide latitude of belief. He added the part about man in response to the growth of teaching of evolution in the schools, he said. The trustees approved the Articles of Faith and required that they be signed

by all 128 faculty and staff members of the institution. The action has had several repercussions. The student division of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board has suspended some \$70,000 in tuition equalization grants and federal tuition grants

because of an attorney general's ruling in 1974 that students attending colleges

which require their faculties, staffs and trustees to hold certain beliefs are not eligible to receive such grants.

Even before the grants suspension was announced, however, opposition to

signing of the Articles of Faith was voiced on the Dallas campus. Some faculty members altered portions of it before signing and six have refused to sign at all.

One of the faculty who refused to sign, Larry D. Braidfoot, an instructor in philosophy and religion who has been at the college since 1973, was abruptly reassigned from the classroom to do institutional studies at the start of the cur-

Watson denied Braidfoot's stand on the Articles of Faith had anything to do with his reassignment. He said the instructor was the only faculty member with

Watson said he has not made a decision to terminate Braidfoot or the other faculty and staff persons who refuse to sign the statement or who have changed

He said he could not believe there is anything wrong in asking a person to sign a statement of faith, and said as far as he was concerned that since the Southern Baptist Convention action in 1963, "there has been nothing new about

Neither the Baptist General Convention of Texas, nor the executive board, according to the office recording secretary, has taken action on the 1963 statement, per se. Last November at the Lubbock meeting, however, the convention passed a resolution recognizing Texas Baptists have "embraced the highest views of the Scripture as 'truth without any mixture of error'" and encouraged trustees to insure integrity of Baptist institutions by upholding the "fullest implications of the 1963 Baptist Faith and Message statement."

Even if the convention had not taken action on the statement, Watson said, he felt his action was in keeping with the 1975 Texas Baptist institutional study committee report which stated the objective of Christian education was to make the institutions "distinctively Christian in purpose and accomplishment" with a strong Christian influence "permeating the entire institution.

Watson acknowledged the criticism of his action in some quarters but said it apparently has had no effect on contributions. "We raised more money in December and January than in the previous 12 months," he said.

And in spite of the grants suspension, which Watson has pledged to make up from other funds, spring semester enrollment apparently will exceed the 1979

among swollen wine barrels, said he was busy grading cotton seed each year from the first truck load in the fall through February or March.

The amount of samples I do depends entirely on the size of the crop," said Eix. who is one of about 30 U.S. Department of Agriculture licensed cotton seed graders in the nation

"Oil mills sample seed as the trucks are received," he explained. "They may sample one truck load or several truck

All samples are tagged and sent to one of various testing labs

The grade that is assessed the sample determines the value of the seed. If a sample is rated 91.5, for example, the oil mill will pay the ginner 91.5 percent of the base price. Fix said.

"The grade is determined by the amount of cake and oil that could be made from the sample," the chemist said. "Of course, foreign matter and seed quality enter into the final grade.

Fix recalled his early years in the business when he could perform the twoday-per-sample tests faster than farmers could hand-pull their acreages. But, he added, a lot of things have changed in the cotton industry since then.

"The main change that has affected my job." he noted, "is the size of the crop and the speedy harvests. In my first year in Lubbock, only 582,405 bales were harvested. About 2.9 million bales are expected to be harvested this year. Beginning with the 1980 crop. the

grading of about 8,000 samples a season usually performed by Fix will be done by his associates. I sold out in 1977 with the stipulation

that I would continue to run tests until 1980." Fix said. "Now my wife and I are going to do a little traveling and other things we've been wanting to do.

Another veton of the Food Security Reserve Act introduced by Rep. Mat-thew McHugh, P.N. Y., does not contain the provision that permits emergency release of up to00,000 tons annually.

Scientists Unite In Nationwide Battle With Agricultural Pests

COLLEGE STATION - In a scenario that sounds like it came from a Grade B science fiction thriller, an army of scientists from throughout the country has joined forces to do battle with the evil elements of the insect and plant world.

More than 250 scientists from 15 major American universities, armed with \$3 million in reseach money, have launched the first effort of its kind to develop a combination of weapons to economically manage weevils, worms, bugs, weeds and diseases that damage and destroy millions of dollars of American agriculture each year

The massive project is supported by the Environmental Protection Agency and led by researchers at Texas A&M Iniversity The scientists say they are looking for a combination of controls in an approach that will integrate biological agents, pest-resistant plants, better farming practices and less dependence on strictly chemical controls

The destruction of the insect's natural enemies has allowed formerly innocuous species to become major pests." said Dr Perry Adkisson, vice president for agriculture and renewable resources at Texas A&M and project director. Chemical pesticides still offer the most reliable, short term, immediate control

NEW YORK (AP) - Major oil companies, smarting from criticism of large profits and believing the public doesn't understand their problems, have launched advertising campaigns aimed at explaining and justifying their earnings.

Yes. \$2 billion is a lot of money, but begins an advertisement from Mobil Corp. Mobil. the most vocal of the companies. is referring to its 1979 earnings of \$2.01 billion. up 78 percent from the pre-

The ads vary, but they have stressed several points:

-Profits are not a very large part of sales, and eliminating them wouldn't lower prices very much. A Gulf ad concludes the retail price of Gulf regular gasoline would fall only 2.7 cents per gallon if it earned no profits.

-The companies are investing amounts larger than their profits to find and produce new energy supplies. "The more we earn, the more we can plow

back into energy," says Conoco. -Oil companies are investing in alternative energy sources. "Getting oil from stone? Texaco's trying," says an ad tout-ing efforts to exploit oil shale deposits.

The spate of ads, which followed reports of high third-quarter profits and returned after annual profits were announced in January, has largely supplanted traditional product advertising. There is still some promotion of car service and accessories such as tires and batteries, but it doesn't require much of a marketing effort to sell gasoline these

The ads have prompted some expressions of outrage from those who believe the oil companies are getting rich at the expense of the American people.

'It may not be ideal to receive all information on public matters from journalists. writers or academics," says Rhoda H. Karpatkin, the executive director of Consumers Union. "But balanced national debates are jeopardized when only corporations can afford advocacy advertising and when opposing points of view go unheard for want of funds."

But the oil companies think there has often been a lack of balance in the media, and that they have suffered from it. Reports of oil company profits usually emphasize the percentage increase from year to year, not the return on invest-

"There isn't a lot of balance when it comes to reporting business, especially on TV," said Standard of Caliornia. Mo-

bil took a two-page newspaper ad in Ocdeemed unfair, but Mobil Executive Vice President Herb Schmertz says the quality of reporting has since improved. The oil companies have had little dif-

ficulty getting their messages published in newspapers and magazines, but on television they have run up against network rules that generally prohibit advocacy ad-

Exxon had no trouble placing a broadcast commercial trumpeting its \$6.5 billion annual spending "to find, develop and distribute new energy." but a Mobil ad concluding television networks were more profitable than Mobil was rejected by all three networks.

Proper Use Of Petroleum Funds Responsibility Of Government

HOUSTON (AP) - W.F. Miller says the crude oil tax now being finalized by Congress came from a negative action.

'It is now government's responsibility to see that revenues from the tax are used for positive results." Martin said.

The chairman of Phillips Petroleum Co. said that since the tax will affect all Americans it is important to understand what it will do and to consider where revenues from it should go.

Martin said the point has been made many times but it still is not widely known that the tax is misnamed.

'It is not a 'windfall profits' tax," he said. "It is a tax on the additional revenues resulting from gradual price decontrol of U.S. crude oil. The tax has nothing to do with whether a company makes a

Writing in the February edition of Philnews, a monthly publication for active and retired Phillips employes, Martin said the distortion of the true nature of the tax has had harmful effects.

By falsely implying that the tax is needed to penalize or punish America's oil companies, the proponents have further confused and divided the public about the energy problem," he said.

They have cast the oil industry as part of the energy problem, when the industry is really the best hope for a solu-

The tax is being designed to provide government with an additional \$227 billion over the next 10 years but Martin said the total tax revenues that will accrue to government from oil production during that time will in fact be much

"Under present tax laws and royalty agreements, nearly 60 cents of every additional dollar resulting from decontrol already goes to government and royalty holders," he said.

Under the new tax, the government will get a large share of the remaining 40

Martin said the tax is being designed so different tax formulas will apply to different categories of oil. with newly discovered oil and harder-to-produce oil not as heavily taxed.

But the key point is that all oil production will be taxed more heavily," he

"Furthermore, if past experience is an indicator, the tax will bring on new. complex regulations that will confuse producers, stimulate more bureaucracy to oversee producers' actions and waste more valuable time while our energy problems worsen.

More confusion and delay is just what we don't need at this critical period when our energy future has never been more vulnerable." Martin said.

The crisis in Iran and the disturbing ctions of the Soviet Union in the Middle East have painfully underscored the need to more fully develop U.S. energy

Martin said the excise tax works di-

rectly against the national goal of increasing fuel supplies at home.

The \$227 billion taxed away from the petroleum industry means \$227 billion taken away from direct investments in finding and developing U.S. energy resources," he said.

Thus, the true effect of the tax is not to penalize oil producers but to penalize oil consumers. In other words, the Amer-

Martin said that since the tax will be taking investment dollars away from direct energy production it is his hope the funds will be used at least indirectly to help overcome the energy problem.

Some of the money should be used to help people who face hardships because of higher energy costs." he said.

Some should be used to encourage development by private enterprise of better methods of energy production and new supplies. A major amount, however, should be used toward balancing the federal budget so as to stabilize the dollar reduce inflation and help put our country on a sound economic basis

Martin said Phillips, even though funds for energy production will be re duced, is committed to programs helpful to the supply and distribution of domes-

"We likewise are committed to work ing with the rest of the industry, government and the public toward developing a unity of purpose in making America more energy self-reliant," he said.

Pipeline Firm **Awarded New Gas Contract**

ODESSA (Special) -Palo Duro Pipeline Co. has announced a gas purchase contract for 131.4 billion cubic feet of natural gas from Pioneer Natural Gas Co. over the next five years.

Joe Feagan, president of Perry Gas Transmission Inc., operator of Palo Duro Pipeline, said contract gas deliveries be-gan in January at 72 million cubic feet Palo Duro is installing one new main-

line compressor station and plans are underway to install additional mainline compressor stations to handle the increase in pipeline capacity The special sales contract with Pi-

oneer has provisions for up to 90 million cubic feet of gas on any one day. The contract also provides for annual extensions through 1989, upon mutual agreement of the companies involved.

Palo Duro Pipeline owns and operates a gathering and transmission system. The program had been originally sub-mitted to the Department of Energy in

Gross capital costs for development of the area, estimated to contain about 300 million barrels of liquid hydrocar-

bons, are expected to be \$1.6 billion. Installation of facilities is planned during 1982, with first production to begin in 1983. Major fabrication contracts are expected to be awarded between April and July, 1980. Some orders have already been placed for equipment with long delivery times.

The development will include a conventional steel platform with 46 well slots. Two drilling rigs will be used. Production facilities will handle 100,000 barrels of crude oil per day plus 12,000 barrels per day of natural gas liquids. Living quarters will accommodate a staff of 240

Negotiations for shipping the liquids through British Petroleum's Forties field pipeline system are in the final stages. Associated gas not consumed on the platform for power generation will be reinjected into the reservoir, after removal of natural gas liquids and carbon dioxide, until a suitable sales outlet is available.

The area to be developed is in Block 16-7-A in the U.K. sector of the North Sea. It lies approximately 155 miles off the northeast coast of Scotland in a water depth of 370 feet. Brae is the ninth offshore development to be approved from the outset under terms of the U.K.'s Petroleum and Submarine Pipelines Act of







Social Security . Out West

By BILL WEST S.S. Field Representative

ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT questions you may have about your retirment is "Will I have enough money to live on?

How you answer that question depends on may factors - whether you have a job-related pension, your savings and investments, the amount of private insurance you have, and the requirements of your lifestyle. The variety of factors involved in successful retirement are directly related to decisions that you make over your working life. This is one of the reasons why most authorities agree that planning for retirement is most effective when it begins early in a person's career.

How a person views retirement probably varies with that person's age. At least my view has changed over the years as I have talked with hundreds of people about their retirement plans. Early in my working career, laying money aside for future use was very difficult if not impossible. I felt that I was never going to see the money again. It was not until I was "over 30" that my view changed to the much more practical view that by saving a few dollars off the top of my pay check I was actually paying myself first and the money saved and invested was going to work for me over the years so I would not have to work so hard in my later years.

ALSO, I WAS LIVING OR trying to live in the future. I was actually wishing my life away by wishing that I already was retirement age. Now I'm "over 40" and retirement doesn't look all that good. I don't think that I'll ever retire completely - as long as my health holds up. But, without a crystal ball, we don't know what tomorrow will bring so planning for retirement, voluntary or involuntary, early in a person's career appears to be a wise thing to do.

I am sure that you have noticed I have not listed among the critical factors of successful retirement, the question of how much your social security check will be. This is because your social security benefit should not be the most important factor determining if you will have enough income in retirement. Social security is intended to provide a floor of income protection, a base on which you can build to provide the finanial security to maintain your lifestyle through the retirement years. It is not intended to provide all of your retirement in-

Of course, no one can tell you how much money you need in retirement, since it all depends on so many personal choices. But a general rule of thumb authorities are using is that, on the average, most people need from 60 to 70 percent of their pre-retirement income to maintain their pre-retirement life-

YOU CAN GET AN ESTIMATE of what your social security benefits will be from your social security office-if you are age 55 or older. Under age 55 it is more difficult to give you an estimate because of the difficulty in forecasting your future earnings. However, because of the way social security benefits are figured, we can still give you some idea of what kind of floor or base your social security benefits will provide.

At 65, for example, if you make low wages, around the Federal minimum wage, over your working life, you can expect your initial social security checks to replace about 55 percent of your monthly pre-retirement wages. If you were making average wages, the first checks would replace about 40 percent of your pre-retirement earnings. If you had paid the maxiumum social security tax over your working life, your first checks would be about 30 percent of your pre-re-

It you have a wife the same age, her benefit would amount to 50 percent of yours and the combined benefit would reflect a higher earnings replacement

You should also note that these benefits will increase automaticaly if the cost of living increases. Most private pensions do not have a cost of living increase provision

President, U.S. Chamber Of Commerce WASHINGTON-Here in Washing ton, nothing can beat the speed and efficiency of Congress spending the public's money, except the IRS, when it collects what Congress taxes away. Through the years, we have learned our tax code is unique-it's the only code that actually breaks people. Imagine then my surprise, with tax time again upon us, to have re-cently heard one television network calmly announce: "The Internal Revenue Service says the average U.S. taxpayer will pay less federal income tax this

How, I wondered, could the IRS make such an absurd claim? When I saw the statement I realized what had happened. and I understood why millions of Americans are often misinformed and confused

The IRS spokesman was quoted saying: "Generally, the average American will pay less taxes in 1979 than he did on the same income in 1978, because the tax tables have been broadened . . . There are more pluses than minuses for

That statement is fine, and technicaly correct, as far as it goes. However, because it is incomplete, and because it omits the essential, it is misleading. It clearly gives the impression the average

taxpayer might get a break. Will he or

l'axes are not going down, they are going up, way, way up. In fact, they are rising by one of the fastest rates in the last 25 years. According to Commerce Department estimates, federal individual income tax receipts increased by \$35 billion in 1979. That works out to about \$400 per return. Funny, isn't it, that the IRS never cited those numbers?

THE PROBLEM IS SIMPLE, but rarely acknowledged. When taxpayers seek cost-of-living increases, they are automatically bumped into higher tax bracklets. For each perscentage point that taxable income increases, individual income tax receipts go up about 1.6 percent. As inflation accelerates, the resulting loss in net take-home pay and purchasing power becomes more severe.

The federal government is the biggest inner, because inflation permits it to line its pockets at the average citizen's expense. Anyone who still believes otherwise should ponder very carefully the following facts. Since 1970, federal tax receipts have jumped from \$195 billion to \$514 billion without Congress ever voting a major tax increase. Indeed, we've supposedly had tax cuts! Taxes at all levels have shot up so fast, they have outpaced increases in both wages and profits, and

now consume the largest share of the

family budget. The bottom line is this: As the federal government increasingly benefits from these automatic windfalls, more and more moderate-income Americans are being pushed into tax brackets formerly reached only by the wealthy. By allowing the tax system to transfer these huge sums of precious capital away from investment in research and technology. and into often wasteful government spending and consumption, we are damaging our prospects for real economic growth, more jobs, secure pensions, a better standard of living for all Ameri-

cans, and ultimately, our national securi-

MISINFORMATION HAS played a key role in our recent economic decline. Profits, which are the very lifeblood of our economy and which, when adjusted for inflation, have not been keeping up with income, prices-or taxes, have been systematically denounced as excessive. On the other hand, taxes, which have risen so dramatically, and which have done so much to cripple personal savings, risktaking, incentives and overall industriousness, have been described as declining. Finally, double-digit inflation was caused by government's own excessive creation of money to finance its own unrestrained expenditures, and has led to higher taxes and mounting deficits.

Howard Jarvis Aims Blow At State Income Tax

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) - Howard Jarvis, co-author of Proposition 13, is pushing another proposal - this one aimed at the state income tax - and early indications point to another victory for the abrasive, outspoken tax cut

Two years after Proposition 13 cut California property taxes in half, reducing local government revenues by \$7 billion annually, the jowly, 76-year-old Jarvis has placed a second initiative on the June 3 primary ballot.

The proposal, nicknamed "Jarvis II" but officially known as Proposition 9. would cut the state income tax in half, reducing annual state revenues by \$5 bil-

State income tax rates currently range from 1 percent to 11 percent. Jarvis II would set those rates at 0.5 percent to 5.5 percent.

Jarvis says the new cut is needed because, while Proposition 13 succeeded in cutting tax bills, "it didn't do a damn thing" to reduce the size or cost of gov-

Jarvis' foes believe Proposition 9 will have much greater impact than Proposition 13, even though it is a smaller tax cut. That's because the state — sitting on an inflation-fed \$5.5 billion surplus in

1978 - stepped in to cushion the fiscal blow of 13 on cities, counties and

Taxes were cut by an average of \$600 per homeowner, but government budgets were not. Predictions of chaos, widespread layoffs and wholesale cuts in health and education programs, police and fire departments never material-

Now, the surplus has shrunk to \$1.8 billion. Fiscal analysts say it will be gone by July 1981, and state aid to local governments must then be cut by 5 percent. They say that's when the first substantial lavoffs and other effects of

One of the problems of this proposition (Jarvis II), is that people should be allowed to see the effects of Proposition 13 before being asked to vote on another tax cut," says state Senate President pro tem James Mills of San Diego.

Jarvis dismisses that argument as "the same lies the politicians told before Jarvis says Proposition 13 tax cuts gave California an economic boost that created 562,000 new jobs, that Proposition 9 will create another 200,000 jobs,

and that the surplus will grow because more people will be working and paying The hell of it is, it's not going to cut government, really. I'm disappointed he adds, acknowledging he was contradicting his own claims for Jarvis



Black rolls 3-2. How should be play? ANSWER TO BACKGAMMON PROBLEM

Much has been written about the 5-point - the "golden point" of a backgammon game. It is true that it is difficult to over-emphasize the importance of the two 5-points. Still, there are other points on the board which are almost as

If you are afflicted with the "5-point syndrome," you probably used your 3-2 to make the Black 5-point. That is not a bad move. However, it is an inferior

It is a much better play to make the Black 4-point instead. Because of the attention tocused on the 5-point, the fact that the 4-point is also a key point is

Compare the two moves. If Black makes the 5-point, he strips himself of builders on his outside points. Now, he cannot make another point in his home board without leaving a blot on either his bar-point or his 8-point. (Barring, of course, a roll of a low doublet

As against that playing men from his bar-point and 6-point to make the 4point still leaves a builder on the 8-point. It has another advantage — it reduces the men stacked on the Black 6-point. By making the 4-point, Black leaves himself the possibility of making his 5-point with a 3-1 and not leaving a blot in the process. Or, with a 5-3 he can make his 3-point and leave no blot

If you have any doubts about our advice, set up the position on your board and try out the combinations. See if your board doesn't look better after making the 4-point rather than the 5-point. As is often the case in a game, when you have to choose between two plays, try them both on the board. You will be surprised how often the better-looking play is also the right play

Because of that skepticism and the widely held belief that Jarvis II will pass overwhelmingly, much of the opposition is cautious and indirect.

"We're not saying that Jarvis II is good or bad," said Gray Davis, Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr.'s chief of staff. "It represents a fundamental societal choice. Should this amount of money remain in the pockets of private individuals, or should it go to government?

We want the people to understand the options to make a judgment as to whether such a transfer is good or bad. Less money will come to state government as a result of Jarvis II, and less money will mean less government," Davis

Davis' stance, and Brown's refusal to take a stand on Jarvis II so far, is in sharp contrast to Brown's strident opposition to Proposition 13, followed by his quick adoption of the tax cut movement after voters gave 13 a 2-1 approval Asked about the different posture this year, Davis joked dryly, "We don't

want to trot out the kind of tactics that were so successful last time Instead, Davis is supervising the drafting of a Jarvis II Contingency budget which will cut spending from the \$24 billion Brown proposed in January to \$19

That's a 22 percent cut from proposed 1980-81 budget, but the first step in the contingency budget process is ordering each state agency to submit a budg-

et with a 30 percent cut, to give state officials some leeway Davis refuses to predict what specific cuts might be included in the contin-

But he says reductions in local government aid are "obvious" because that assistance is now the biggest item in the state budget

Direct post-Proposition 13 grants from the state to local governments total \$5.4 billion, 22.5 percent of the state budget. But when all programs involving state and local sharing of costs or responsibility, such as welfare and education, are added together, they total 83 percent of the budget.

Although the Jarvis II budget isn't yet written, state and local officials already are warning of layoffs and program cuts based on the contingency budg-

In San Franciscon officials say it would cost the city \$100 million and require layoffs of 5,000 workers. In Los Angeles, the cut is estimated at \$80 million, and in San Diego at \$34 million.



THIS MAY SEEM EARLY to be talking about April 15, but it isn't.

You're probably one of the 87.5 million federal income taxpayers to whom the Treasury Department's Internal Revenue Service already has mailed Form 1040, the individual income tax form that will be commonly used for filing 1979

Don't wait until one day in early April to start preparing to fill out your tax return. You're going to need information for that task, and you're smart to gather the information now.

This year, the forms are slightly different. Most important, from your standpoint, the 1978 Revenue Act which took effect Jan. 1, 1979, has changed the tax

Here are some changes listed by IRS Commissioner Jerome Kurtz: —The familiar personal exemption that goes to every taxpayer rises from \$750 to \$1,000. That also applies to the extra personal exemptions for the blind or persons 65 or older.

 Taxable income brackets have been widened, so that it takes more income to push you into a higher tax bracket.

The gross income levels at which you must file a return have been raised. For examle, a married couple (filing a joint return) last April had to file if their 1978 income was \$5,700 or higher; this year they'll have to file if their 1979 income was \$5,400 or higher.

HERE ARE EXAMPLES OF how the changes could affect you:

 A married couple filing a joint return showing a taxable income of \$17,000 in 1978 would have had a tax of \$2,710 (before any tax credits). On the same taxable income in 1979, the couple's tax would be \$2,505, or \$205 less than in 1978 (again, without taking credits into account.)

-A married couple with a taxable income of \$25,000 in 1978 would have had a tax of \$4,956 (before credits); on the same taxable income in 1979, the tax would be \$4 633 or \$323 less than in 1978, without any credits. Before you cheer, remember, first, that you're likely to have earned more

money in 1979 than in 1978, and, second, that your employer has been withholding taxes for you from your paycheck throughout the year. The second point suggests a critical step in getting your tax data together:

Be sure your employer gives you your Form W-2, which lists your total 1979 pay and the amount withheld. Check to see that it's correct (mistakes are possible) and if you haven't got a W-2 by Feb. 1, ask your local IRS office to jog your em-IF YOUR TOTAL 1979 income was \$20,000 or less (\$40,000 or less if you're

married and filing a joint return) and you receive ONLY wages, tips, unemployment compensation and not more than \$400 in interest or dividends in the year, you may be able to use Form 1040A. That's much easier to fill out, and you don't have to do the math if you don't want to: Just fill in the data asked on Form 1040A, mail it and IRS will do the math and bill you within 30 days after

Others changes this year include: Unemployment compensation payments may be taxable.

-Your credit for political contributions have been doubled, so that you can claim half of what you gave, but no more than \$50 (\$100 if you're married and filing a joint return)

-You get no deductions for state and local gasoline taxes. -Standard mileage for business use of a car or truck has been raised to 18.5

cents a mile for the first 15,000 miles (after which the rate drops back to 12 cents a mile). If you have questions, the best thing you can do is to phone your local IRS office listed in the phone book under "U.S. Government." Where this is a toll

call, there's a toll-free "800" number. You also can write Internal Revenue





Most Autos Poorly Maintained

By JAMES V. HIGGINS

DETROIT (UPI) - Most cars on the road today need routine maintenance, industry experts say

Many are so poorly maintained that fuel economy, pollution control equipment and even safety are severely compromised, they add.

While that isn't new, they suspect the situation is caused in part by people using selfserve gas stations to save money

We think some of it is just complacency." says David L. Walker, director of automotive technical services for the Champion Spark Plug Co.

People just assume that the car will run forever without doing anything.

Volkswagen of America recently decided to label gas filler pipes on its new cars to remind motorists to check the engine oil level after pumping fuel.

A VWA spokesman said: "Basically, because of the popularity of self-serve, there may be some instances where people do not check their oil as regularly as they would at regular gas stations.

Another automotive expert, Hal Kassin of General Motors Corp. says it is difficult to document but his "gut feeling" is that self-service tends to foster poor automotive maintenance. Kassin. an assistnt director in GMC's service section, said of his own stops at self-service stations. "It's a rarity to see anybody open up the hood and check the oil. Maybe the customer does it in his garage before he leaves home. I don't know.

Tve been in the service business all my life." he said. "My personl opinion is that the American public is a throwaway society. They almost feel that with the sophistication designed into the modern product, they don't have to maintain a

A reamt survey of 2,500 motorists for Champion, which caters basically to the replacement parts market, showed 43 percent always used self-serve pumps: 20 percent used them most of the time, 14 percent, seldom, and 23 percent, never.

Motorists who said they used selfservice most of the time, seldom or never were asked how often the attendant at

the full-service stations they patronize either checked under the hood or volunteered to do so.

Only 11 percent replied. "always." while 22 percent said the checks were made most of the time. 39 percent responded "seldom" and 28 percent said

Sixty-three percent of the sample used self-service stations most of the time or always, where they were less likely to perform engine, tire, braking system, radiator or drive train mainte-

Of those who patronized full-service stations, 67 percent seldom or never have any of those checked, the study conclud-

In a Shell Oil Co. check of 100 cars at

low on oil, 34 were low on radiator coolant, 27 batteries were low on water, 29 needed power steering fluid and 33 had at least one tire well below recommend-

ed pressure levels A 1978 B.F. Goodrich tire inspection program indicated nine out of 10 cars had improperly inflated tires, one of every five cars had at least one tire with too little tread for safe use and one out of every 20 tires was in danger of imminent fail-

Kassin said lubrication is the single most important maintennce item.

When a car runs a quart low on oil, he said, the lubricant sloshes around in the oil pan and, from time to time, the oil pump loses its prime. That starves en-

a self-service station, 56 were one quart gine bearings momentarily and causes wear, which over time accumulates into

a major problem When crankcase oil levels are not kept up the oil also tends to overheat and

break down. Kassin said Champion in a 1975-76 test of 5.666 cars, found almost 89 percent deficient in at least one area affecting fuel economy and emissions. Many cars needed tu-

The testmakers concluded Assuming the vehicles participating

in these tests are typical of those operating in the U.S. and Canada, most cars are not being properly maintained. As a consequence, fuel is being wasted, air quality deteriorates and performance suffers - all needlessly

Precious Peking Man Skulls Sought By Scientists

By ALINE MOSBY

PEKING (UPI) - On a cold December day 50 years ago in the nearby village of Zhoukoudian, a 26year-old anthropologist plucked a skull from under his shovel in a cave where local peasants had reported finding "dragon bones.

Professor Pei Wenzhong made one of greatest scientific discoveries of all time

The skull of "Peking Man," a human with overhanging brow and massive jaws who lived from 200,000 to 600,000 years ago, was the first solid evidence that modern man evolved from apes. The skull also proved man had used fire centuries earlier than had been believed

But the famous skull, and four out of five others found in the same cave, disappeared during World War II on their way to the United States.

The international mystery has never been solved. China's Peking Man specialist. Wu Rukang. a colleague of Pei, hopes the United States can find

The only specimens we have of our Peking Man are these five teeth, a lower jawbone and a skull in two pieces." Wu said in gentle dismay.

He held out a brown wooden drawer from an ordinary filing cabinet at the Institute of Vertebrate Paleontology. Inside weree molars much like those dentists work on today, except larger. In another drawer tay the skull and jawbone, like dusty rocks, covered with cotton

Wu said the precious skulls were kept at Peking University Medical College until the United States

entered the war in the Pacific in 1941. Two American scientists working at the college, Henry S. Houghton and a man recalled only as T. Bowen, took the skulls by train to Tianjin Port (Tientsin) to be shipped to the United States on an American frieghter for safekeeping.

We do not know what happened to the men, Wu said. "Some people think the train was captured by the Japanese, others say the ship was sunk by a

Japanese torpedo. A professor at the New York Museum of Natural History thought the boxes were seized in Tianjin We investigated but could not find them there.

When I went to a conference in Toledo. Ohio last spring, many American anthropologists said they wanted to help us find the skulls. We have not given up hope, but so far there is no trace of them in China, Japan or the United States.

On a small hill near Zhoukoudian, excavations continued in the 1950s in several caves. During Mao Tse-tung's 1966-76 anti-intellectual "Cultural Revolution." the anthropologists were "writing revolutionary posters and attending ideology meetings, Wu said

In late 1978, anthropologists and local workmen resumed digging in a new cave near the original

A dozen workmen, leather-hardened faces peering from beneath fur caps, haul wheelbarrows full of fist-sized rocks from the cave.

Over the hill, visitors poke around the cave - 40 yards high and 40 yards wide - where the six Pek-

ing Man skulls were found. High on the cave wall a white sign says. "Peking Man skull was picked up here in 1929.

Foreigners now can visit the caves but need special visas because Zhoukoudian is outside the 25mile radius of Peking in which foreigners can circulate. A soldier guards the 25-mile limit post, the Marco Polo Bridge, where the Italian explorer crossed into Peking and where the Sino-Japanese War began in 1937.

A four-room museum next to the cave has just been reopened. It displays remains that show the life of Peking men and women, members of the species "Homo Erectus" which emerged 1 million years ago, long before "Homo Sapiens" or modern

Between 30 and 50 people resided at about the same time in the cave.

The anthropologists found thousands of rocks cut into tools with which the cavepeople cut their meat. And they cooked it.

In the 13 layers of refuse of centuries dug from the cave, two are of ashes, some are as thick as six yards. The museum scientists said the Peking Man cave dwellers kept their fire burning all the time for fear it never could be re-started, and it probably burned for centuries.

In the museum's glass cases are thousands of animal bones from those of mice and birds to sabertoothed tigers and rhinoceros. Some of the animal fossiles date back 10 million years.

At booths in Japanese supermarkets and at trade fairs, Tennison explains techniques such as broiling and marinating to "get across to the Japanese that U.S. beef is juicy, flavorful and tender."

Tennison, who worked his way through Texas A&M Veterinary school by flipping hamburgers at a College Station fast-food stand, says the Japanese were opposed to the opening of an MEF office in 1978 because of what it might do to their own cattle industry.

Japanese cattle producers, he says, demonstrated by parading steers around the U.S. Embassy in Japan to protest the opening of the MEF office.

But opposition to the lobbying efforts of the American meat group has turned around. Now the Japanese Livestock Industry Promotion Corporation, which controls beef imports to Japan, has opened a Denver office. MEF president Alan R. Middaugh says this will enable closer contact with a leading importer of U.S meat and meat products.

Heretofore, Japan's prime source of meat has been grass-fed beef imported from Australia.

An MEF spokesman said Japan has a quota structure that essentially guarantees the continued purchase of Australian beef. But Tennison says younger Ja-panese, becoming more and more indocstyle, want the Western meat dishes

Middaugh says most of his organization's promotions are geared for hotel chefs and restauranteurs who want to "Americanize" their menus. But he says steaks sold in big hotel chains still are not cheap, and prime cuts sold in Japanese supermarkets are scarce and nearly prohibitive in cost.

"If you end up paying \$50 for nice steak dinner in the Ginza area, you can figure you're getting a fairly good bargain," says Steve Carpenter, assistant to the MEF president in Denver.

He said a New York strip sirloin sold in a Japanese supermarket is three to eight times more expensive than what an American housewife would plunk down for the cut at the grocery store checkout

United Press International Chocolate candy prices aren't rising as fast or as

high as gold -it only seems that way. Boxed chocolates for \$12-\$30 a pound this Valen-

tine's Day are no longer unusual.

One chocolatier. Thomas Kron, calls his plain one-and three-pound bricks "chocolate bullion" with good reason. They are \$9 and \$25 apiece - plus postage, if you order by mail instead of visiting one of the company's shops in New York City or posh suburbs such as Beverly Hills, Calif.; Bal Harbour Fla., Lakewood, Ohio, or Birmingham, Mich.

More such luxury chocolates have been sold during the past few months than ever before in the industry's history, says Don Gussow, chairman and editor in chief of Magazines for Industry

Candy sales, including chocolates, are rising steadily, he said. He expects retail sales to reach \$10 billion within a few years. Preliminary reports suggest they may have reached \$8 billion last year

All of a sudden the new generation has discovered candy as part of their lifestyle." said Gussow. The young will do what they want. They dress and eat as they wish. They have their own lifestyle.'

The fitness trend could explain how the younger generation is burning up all those calories from chocolate and other candies.

Like some other old-timers in the industry. Gussow sounds somewhat shocked by the retail prices some companies get for their products

"Five dollars a pound is absolutely right," he said. "You can't make better (chocolates) for any

'Anything beyond \$5 a pound and you're paying for the name and fancy packaging," said Thomas J Sullivan in a telephone interview from Glenview, Ill., where he is secretary and legal counsel for Retail Confectioners International. The group's 400member companies operate a total of 15,000 directly owned retail candy shops worldwide. Some also distribute through drug and deprtment stores.

The average price in the United States of \$4.50-\$4.75 a pound (for boxed chocolates) is really good value as a gift." Sullivan said.

The most expensive chocolates to date, from the buyers' point of view, may well have been two 50pound bars made by a Chicago company specializing in chocolates for fundraising. They brought a total of \$13,275 for the New York Cocoa Exchange's 50th anniversary ausction, which benefitted a nearby

Edmond Opler, board chairman of World's Finest Chocolate. Inc., said the fund-raising business is better every year. "Every school, every church

Lots of consumers apparently have enough to buy from such companies as Kron Chocoltier, the New York City-based manufacturer with nine shops nationwide. Kron gets \$16-\$25 a pound for boxed

chocolates, hundreds of dollars for special orders

such as a 15-pound, tabletop-sized birthday "eating card" the company made for a dress designer. It cost \$870 — mostly because of the handcarved message and names.

Kron said another popular item was made originally for the opening night cast party for "Chorus Line." the longrunning Broadway musical. It's a woman's leg with a ribbon garter. Price, \$60

The boxed chocolates at Fred and Pearl Karp's Treat Boutique in the Broadway theater district of New York City also command \$12-\$15. That makes their Valentine's Day specialty, twin, decorated solid chocolate hearts. 45 pounds and \$250, seem almost a bargain on price per pound basis: About

Karp estimated retail prices have increased about 33 percent in the past two years

He also said he plans to introduce life-sized busts sculpted in chocolate. The special orders will have a three-month delivery date and sell for \$1,500. For 80 pounds of chocolate, that's about \$21.50 per pound.

Kron already sells lifesize female torsos (headless), for \$50 each

The candy market of the future may well be an

adult market." Gussow says. There is no need to sell children on the pleasure of eating candy." he wrote recently in Candy & Snack Industry magazine. He urged manufacturers and retailers to appeal to "the mother and father and big brothers and sisters.


