Extra services still free

Midland stations won't charge for wiping windows

By DAVID CAMPBELL Staff Writer

"Fill 'er up, check the oil and wipe the windshield" is still free in Midland. And chances are it will be free

for a long time. The Department of Energy released Wednesday a new set of regulations allowing service station owners to charge for the traditionally free services. Most Midland operators interviewed feel that is not a way to make additional revenue

However, Midland operators are taking advantage of the 15.4 cents a gallon profit the DOE will allow the owners to take. But even that is not enough to cover rising operation costs, they claim.

"It's ridiculous," said Joe Richards, owner of a local vices. "You can't survive very long if you start charging for small courtesies. Customers won't trade with you.'

'We (service stations) have been wiping windows, checking oil and pumping gas for years without charging for it," Jimmie Williamson, another owner, said. 'Why should we start charging for it now?'

Charging for these services is an attempt by the Department of Energy to provide a means to help the gasoline dealer make additional profits to cover other

operating expenses. The new DOE regulations, according to officials, are designed to protect the consumer, make compliance with the rules easier for dealers, provide price relief to small independant retailers and to provide a modest shift in gasoline supplies from refineries to existing retail gasoline stations.

According to local service station owners interviewed, the 15.4 cent gross margin does not help out very much in paying the costs of operating a service station. If a service station owner can pump enough gas to cover

his employees' payroll, he is barely making ends meet, according to Paul Thorne, an Exxon dealer. Typically, employees' salaries take about six cents

from the 15.4 cents gross margin. Three cents are allocated to insurance payments and about a cent is relegated

The remaining 5.4 cents cover bad debts, owner's salary, maintenance costs and supplies. If the owner is

One service station owner predicted that stations might start charging the same price for self-service gas as they are for full service. Self-serve is considered by most. owners as an out-of-the-pocket expense for an economy service.

In other words, station owners can charge the 15.4 cents profit only on full service, said the station owner. Those who pump their own gas are giving the station owner a smaller profit. Considering that the owner only gets about one cent profit from full service, he winds

Invasion of oil creeps toward coast of Texas

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) - An army of scientists and engineers readied a two-mile floating defense line Saturday in an effort to repel a coastal invasion by the world's largest oil spill.

The first wave of 60 million gallons of Mexican thick crude was expected to enter waters off the U.S. coast Sunday, ending a slow trek north from an oil well in Mexico's Bay of Campeche that blew out June 3.

Reconnaissance flights Saturday over the Gulf showed the oil within 10 to 15 miles of the South Texas shoreline. Carl Posey of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration said

612 feet of boom equipment will be put in the water off the southern tip of Texas on Sunday

Posey also said projections that the oil will cross into waters off Brownsville on Sunday and onto beaches Tuesday "seem like they are right on the money

Officials say the impact on the South Texas shoreline - "America's third coast" - could be catastrophic, endangering a lively tourist trade at beach resorts, killing wildlife and wiping out catches of Gulf of Meico

"We're pretty much resigned to the fact that there's nothing we can do," said Ralph Thompson of the South Padre Island Tourist Bureau. "Just

bite the bullet. The flow of the now-scattered slick - becoming bigger every day as the runaway well keeps flowing - continued unchecked. Scientists aboard a reconnaissance flight Friday spotted globs of oil on Mexican beaches within

30 miles of the U.S. border: Computer projections say the oil will begin to wash ashore on the South Texas coast Tuesday, and oceanographers fear it could continue threatening the beaches for several months.

The battle against the oily threat has attracted about 150 state and federal scientists, engineeers and other workers.

Officials stood by Saturday awaiting orders to put in place a two-mile-long floating fence they hope will corral some of the oil and keep it out of environmentally sensitive areas.

A team of divers set out Saturday to jump into the slick. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration spokesman Posey said the divers will try to determine how much oil is seeping north below the water line. John Robinson, a scientist with the agency, said the oil expected to show

up in waters off the U.S. coast this weekend probably was the oil that first spewed from the well when it blew out. If so, Robinson said, oil could continue to head north for two months

after the well is capped - and that is not expected until mid-September at "We're getting the first effects now and we're two months removed from the event," Robinson said. "We expect to be here a long time."

So far, the approaching slick has not hurt business at the long strip of sun-bleached sand that has survived the natural threats of sharks and

hurricanes and attracts 850,000 tourists a year. Hotels are at peak occu-But Thompson is looking ahead and he wants to know who is going to pay for the damage the oil causes on the Texas coast. Mexican and American

officials both have declined to comment on liability. Officials have said the fine-grained sand along most of the shore would be he best place for the oil to hit. Robinson said those beaches are relatively

Gulf shrimpers awaited results of toxicity tests on oil taken from the spill. The tests have not been completed, but Robinson said that preliminary indications are not good. He said a sample showed high levels of

potentially damaging toxins. The persistent slick also poses a danger to the varied wildlife in the gulf and in nearby inland waters. It has raised a serious threat to the

concentrated effort to save the Atlantic Ridley turtles. Robert Stratton, refuge manager at the Laguna Atascosa Wildlife Refuge, said special detergent is ready for use if birds in the area are doused in the

oil. Refuge workers are also set to force-feed injured birds.

Fuel switching: Illegal but common practice

Are you a fuel switcher? If you are and live in Midland,

you're not alone, according to service station operators and mechanics. Fuel switching is an illegal but ap-

parently common practice, they say. Federal law makes it illegal for service station operators to sell leaded gasoline to a car owner whose vehicle requires unleaded fuel. And state law prohibits a vehicle owner from removing pollution control devices used in conjunction with unleaded gasoline.

But according to estimates by Mid-

land service station operators and automobile mechanics, as many as one in every four drivers here - and possibly more - still use leaded gasoline illegally.

THE PRACTICE of using leaded gasoline in a vehicle designed for unleaded fuel is commonly referred to as "fuel switching." The practice of fuel switching has been increased by the difference in price of the two types of gasoline and by the gasoline short-

Estimates on how many Midlanders engage in the practice vary, but service station operators and others indicate that the practice is

One service station operator who wanted to remain anonymous estimated that five to 10 customers each day at his station buy leaded gasoline illegally - often without his knowledge.

Another said he had "no idea" how many customers buy leaded gasoline illegally from him. Most of the customers he suspects of buying the gasoline do so at self-service pumps, he

Both service station operators said they will not knowingly sell leaded gasoline illegally. But, they said, they know many of their self-serve cuslomers purchase the gasoline illegally anyway.

Jim Pruett, service manager for Rogers Ford Sales here, estimated one in every four Midland drivers engages in fuel switching. Gulf Oil's local retail marketer, Don Messer, said he believes that estimate may even be conservative.

"I'D VENTURE a guess that it's higher than one in four," Messer

In addition to the savings in price of leaded gasoline and the greater abundance of it, Messer noted another reason for the increasing number of fuel switchers. "Leaded gasoline will increase the performance. The car will run better on it," he said. But, according to Pruett, the small savings in the price of leaded gasoline compared to that of unleaded may prove costly in the long run.

Leaded gasoline, he said, will ruin the catalytic converter on a car over a period of time. Essentially what happens is the lead in leaded gasoline causes "the catalytic converter to be coated with lead," he said. A tank of leaded gasoline may

be used in a car designed for unleaded fuel periodically in an emergency without harm, he said. But over a . period of time the lead will ruin the

Can you tell me if any of the school buildings in this district have the blown-on type acoustical ceilings that contain asbestos, which is considered to be a serious health hazard?—J.T.

ANSWER: An article appeared in The Reporter-Telegram March 31, 1979, which was headlined "No trace of asbestos found in city schools."

The report stated that Midland schools have "not even a trace" of asbestos on their walls or ceilings.

It seems that scrapings from three representative schools were tested by chemists at Southwestern Laboratories and were found free of the substance which the Environmental Protection Agency has called a health hazard.

The EPA had urged school districts to check for the potentially dangerous material, which was sprayed on the walls and ceilings of some 10,000 schools in the country.

Test scrapings were taken from Lee High School, San Jacinto Junior High School and Rusk Elementary School, which were chosen because they represent the three major eras of school buildings in the district, according to L. A. Klebold, maintenance director for the district.

I would like to know why the Midland County Sheriff's Department handled the investigation of the recent multiple shootings at the Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church Family Fair, instead of the Midland Police Department. The shootings occurred within the city limits?-T.N.

ANSWER: Midland County Sheriff Dallas Smith says that each year off-duty law enforcement officers are hired by the fair officials. In the case of the shootings, officers of the sheriff's department were on duty and the closest to the shootings.

It was agreed by the police and sheriff's departments that in this particular case, it would be better if the sheriff's department continued with the investigation.

Sheriff Smith stated that normally the police department receives calls pertaining to incidents happening within the city limits, but there does exist joint jurisdiction between the police and sheriff's departments within the City of Midland. Incidents occurring outside the city limits, within Midland County, are handled by the sheriff's department.

Whatever happened to the traffic signal proposed for Wadley and Big Spring Streets?-N.T.

ANSWER: John Aldridge, senior resident engineer with the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation, said the light should be in place within two to three

Aldridge said the light was one of nine the highway department was installing in the city this summer. Alder Electric Co. of San Antonio is contractor for the \$362,000 project. So far, the contractor has been installing conduits at the intersection. Once specifications are approved in Austin, a company will manufacture the traffic signal. Southern states plan regional 1980 primary

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - Three Southern states, encouraged by President Carter's campaign strategists, are quietly piecing together what amounts to a regional presidential primary.

Florida and Alabama already have set their presidential primaries for March 11, 1980. Carter's homestate of Georgia, led by Democratic Gov. George Busbee, is expected to follow suit.

Officials in the three states cite various reasons for setting the primaries on March 11. But Carter's southeastern campaign director, Russ Marane of

PBRPC will study application for airport apron funds

The city of Midland will seek review and comment on a pre-application for \$1.5 million in Federal Aviation Administration funds to upgrade the aviation parking apron at Midland Regional Airport when the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission gathers for its regular monthly meet-

Directors will gather at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday in the Midland Country Club.

The airport project would upgrade an area about 3,300 feet long and 300 feet wide at the air terminal. Pavement in the area has deteriorated over the years, according to city and airport officials. Under current proposals, the money would be used to clean and seal joints in the concrete apron and to seal the cracks in the existing pavement.

All told, the project would cost an estimated \$1.8 million with the Federal Aviation Administration contributing \$1.5 million. City officials hope to start the project in October and estimate work will be finished about six months later.

The city is also seeking \$75,000 from the Texas Aeronautics Commission to finance the work. The city will supply \$301,000 in bonds and airport funds for the remainder of the money.

If favorable comment is received from the planning commission, the pre-application will be forwarded to the FAA. If the FAA accepts the pre-application, the city will be invited to apply for

The city of Lamesa is seeking \$500,000 in community development funds to be used for street paving and to provide storm drainage in three low and moderate income neighborhoods in the city.

A pre-application for the project was approved in March by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Under current plans, the city would allocate most of the money for paving and curb and gutter work in three neighborhoods comprising 39 blocks in the city.

Also up for review before the planning commission is a project authorizing the agency to submit an application to the Urban Mass Transportation Administration for a study on mass transit possibilities in the Midland-Odessa area.

"It's not any particular master plan or strategy," Marane said last week. "Georgia and Alabama and Florida are in close proximity. In terms of having a concerted campaign, we'd rather have it wind up at the same time. It just makes sense.'

The importance of fiming was underscored last Sunday when U.S. Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., said the beleaguered president would not be a viable 1980 candidate and should consider withdrawing if he loses the early presidential primaries next

Regional primaries have been discussed ever since the presidential selection process became cluttered with primaries. But the major impetus for the Southern change lies in a Democratic National Committee rule requiring primaries be held between

Elaine Kamarck, director of the committee's Compliance Review Commission, says the national committee has not yet exempted any states. But several states want to hold pre-March 11 balloting, including Iowa's precinct caucuses on Jan. 21, New Hampshire's primary on Feb. 26 and Massachusetts' primary on March 4.

Altogether, Florida, Georgia and Alabama will choose 208 delegates.

Florida's primary is set by state law for March 11, and Carter already has two organizers in Orlando and Miami. They have high hopes of winning Florida's 100 delegates because the state was the scene of a watershed event in Carter's rise to power when he beat former Alabama Gov. George Wallace in the state's 1976 primary.

Alabama's first-ever full-fledged presidential primary had been set for March 4. State Rep. A.L. Harrison of Birmingham says legislators decided on an early primary because Alabamans, who will chose 45 delegates, wanted to upstage Florida.

"We thought it would give a positive reflection of Alabama," says Harrison. "And we thought Alabama was truly representative of the South. I don't think Florida is representative of southern attitudes.

Soviet Tass slaps Congress for 'devilmay-care' attitude

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet news agency Tass had some harsh words for Congress Saturday, saying it demonstrated a "devil-may-care attitude" by recessing with major national problems unre-

In a report on the August congressional recess, Tass said commentators "unanimously state the obviously leisurely pace of the proceedings and the unproductiveness of the 96th Congress' first session," which adopted "only an insignificant part" of the measures before it.

"The law-givers' devil-may-care attitude far from suits the gravity and urgency of the problems on which the highest legislative body of the U.S. has made or must make decisions," said the official Soviet news service.

Father commits suicide believing he killed children

PRAGUE, Czecholslovakia (AP) - A man committed suicide believing he had poisoned his two daughters with wild mushrooms he picked, but doctors managed to save the children, a Czechoslo-

vakian newspaper reported Saturday.
The 34-year-old man from Sunava in East Slovakia brought home fresh mushrooms from a nearby forest, and his wife served them to the family for dinner, the paper said. During the night, the children showed symptoms of poisoning, the paper said, and early in the morning they were taken to a hospital.

Later in the morning when the father learned his daughters, aged 8 and 10, were in critical condtion. he hanged himself, the paper said. The children were saved and reported out of danger.

Hijacker may find asylum in Portugal

LISBON, Portugal (AP) - A stateless Hungarian who tried to hijack a Portuguese airliner last October has been released and the government is studying his request for political asylum.

Adam Paragh, 33, who fled Hungary in 1973 and had been living in Portugal, was granted his freedom Friday by a court at DFunchal, capital of Portugal's Madeira Island, nearly 10 months after he used toy pistols to try to force a plane of the Portuguese airline TAP to take him to Morocco. The pilot prevented the hijack by overpowering Paragh.

The island court issued a certificate stating Portuguese authorities felt the Hungarian "presents no danger to society." Paragh had complained he merely wanted the Portuguese government to act on his request for political asylum. He had been in the country for over a year at the time of the incident. The immigration chief said Paragh's request would be handled in routine fashion.

Fear of prime minister's return prompts order to shoot planes

ST. GEORGE'S, Grenada (AP) - Fears that ousted Prime Minister Eric Gairy is planning to return has prompted Grenada's new government to give the order to shoot down any plane flying at night through the island's air space without permission.

Acting Prime Minister Bernard Coard announced the order Thursday in a radio address to the eastern Caribbean island's 110,000 residents. The warning came five days after the government called a full military alert when suspicious boat movement was reported near the island.







Bolivia breaks deadlock; Mrs. Carter cancels planned visit

Tulsa Washington

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) - The House of Representatives broke a three-day deadlock Saturday and elected a leader, clearing the way for a joint session with the Senate to choose a president from three candidates.

Hernan Siles Zuazo, who received the most votes in the national election July 1 that failed to give any contender the necessary majority for direct election, began a hunger strike.

In Washington, the White House announced first lady Rosalynn Carter canceled plans to attend the inaugural ceremonies because it was uncertain when the new president would be

The House elected Lida Gueiler of the National Revolutionary Movement as president of the lower chamber. Representatives of the Popular Democratic Union, who had walked out of the deliberations Friday and prevented the seating of a quorum, returned Saturday, permitting the

The joint session convened after the

House chose Gueiler. Siles immediately began his hunger strike in the national legislative palace, demanding that Congress declare him president.

The Navy destroyer Parsons took the refugees from their flimsy 20-foot boat at dusk Friday about 150 miles southwest of Vietnam. A reconnaissance plane launched from the carrier Kitty Hawk had spotted them hours earlier crammed onto the deck and the cabin roof of the tiny vessel.

The latest group brought to 115 the number of fleeing Vietnamese rescued since President Carter on July 21 ordered a five-vessel task force headed by the 80,000-ton aircraft carrier to seach for boat people

Vietnam has demanded the rescue mission be stopped, saying it encourages more of its people to flee. Refugees plucked from the sea by the fleet last week said they left their home-land after they heard of Carter's

Nine congressmen arrived in Bangkok from Hong Kong Saturday on the second stop on a four-nation Southeast Asian tour that winds up in Hanoi next week. The nine will visit refugee camps for Cambodians at Aranyaprathet and Surin and for Laotians at Nong Khai. Thailand has granted temporary asylum to some 200,000 Indochînese refugees.

Besides Vietnam, the congressmen are to visit Indonesia and Malaysia.

Delegation leader Benjamin S. Rosenthal, D.-N.Y., said that in Hanoi they will ask Vietnamese leaders what they are doing to fulfill commitments made at an international conference on refugees last month in Geneva. Vietnam promised to stem the flow of boat people and step up a U.N.-sponsored program to allow an orderly emigration from the coun-

In Hong Kong, the congressmen visited Kai Tak North refugee camp, run by the Red Cross, and talked with a half-dozen of its 14,000 occupants.

As Rep. Robert F. Drinan, D.-Mass., a Roman Catholic priest, sat listening to Doong Lap Nhon explain how he escaped from a "new economic zone," which was a remote forest without houses or food, Drinan murmured: "It's the new gulag, that's what it is.



Is this the way psychiatrists operate? I redid I pick a homen? How many more sessions do you think I



Ancient bison discovered

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) - The whole carcass of a 500-pound giant bison that roamed prehistoric Alaska has been found preserved in the permanently frozen ground north of Fairbanks, according to a published report.

The animal, 20,000 to 40,000 years old, was found by two miners, the All-Alaska Weekly said in a copyright story Friday. 



The battle to save gasoline

WASHINGTON - Like many other Americans, Jimmy Carter has become curious about the rumors of amazingly gas-efficient cars being developed by imaginative mechanics and other automotive tinkerers far removed from the high-powered engineering laboratories of Detroit.

Transcripts of secret Cabinet minutes show that on April 23 the presi-dent asked Energy Secretary James Schlesginer about new accounts of experimental diesel cars that could achieve 84 miles per gallon.

With the characteristic compla cy that has enraged his critics, the pipe-puffing energy czar, who might have been expected to be on top of the latest developments in fuel economy, replied with the old Will Rogers line that all he knew was what he read in the newspapers. He did promise to have his staff check into the re-

What his energy detectives learned, as we did when we looked into the situation recently, was that the reports of miraculous gas-saving automobiles unfortunately are somewhat exaggerated. Experimental cars have been built that can get an astonishing 375 miles per gallon, but these are such super-streamlined, finely tuned freaks as to be commercially irrelevant.

If Schlesinger's aides should contact the Environmental Protection Agency, however, they will discover that there is indeed a car that meets all EPA anti-pollution standards, and

off Detroit's assembly lines today. The car is an experimental model that the transportation department commissioned Volkswagen to construct; essentially it's a Rabbit with a turbo-charged diesel engine.

The potential impact of a car that gets better than 50 miles per gallon is fantastic. Energy experts have estimated that even a 10-mile-per-gallon improvement in American cars would save about 2 million barrels of oil a day That's the amount the United States was importing from Iran before the revolution. The cut-off of Iranian oil has been blamed for the gas shortage.

The president was obviously aware of this vast potential when he made development of more fuel-efficient automobiles one of the goals of his energy program. The big mystery is why Carter hasn't done anything to shake the Big Three automakers out of their pipedream fantasy that they can continue to produce gas-guzzling dinosaurs in an era of permanent shortage and \$1-plus gasoline.

This not only will slow development of the fuel-efficient automobiles; insiders say the president is also considering a softening of fueleconomy standards that Adams was insisting the automakers meet.

Meanwhile, only \$100 million is earmarked for research. And it's not the kind of research that might produce new automobile designs or new manufacturers to compete with De-

Carter might do better to encourage small independent entrepreneurs instead of the giants of industry with their outdated, bigger-is-better philosophy. A number of mechanics, the kind of inventive geniuses who were once the pride of this nation and the foundation of its industry, have already produced cars that get 50 miles per gallon using Detroit's own parts and no federal subsidies.

One of these go-getters, for example, Mike Shetley of Oak Hill, Fla., has taken a Mercury Capri, fitted it with a Perkins diesel tractor engine and matched some of the most efficient imported cars with 34 miles per

gallon in the city, 51 on the highway. The Carter administration continues to be reluctant to throw the full weight of the federal government behind the search for fuel-efficient automobiles. The excuse given us by one presidential adviser is that the government should butt into private industry's bailiwick only in matters of

national security. There is, of course, a fundamental contradiction between this line of reasoning and the president's pronouncement that the energy crisis is the "Moral Equivalent of War." Where Detroit is concerned, apparently, MEOW is more than just an acronym

If Carter's backbone can be sufficiently stiffened, it may still be possible to win this battle of the energy war. One proposal gaining support on Capitol Hill is to turn the fuel-economy project over to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Interestingly enough, NASA ala ready has the most intensive fuel-efficiency research effort in government. It is spending \$150 million this year on auto research alone.

His position on nuclear weaponry is alarmingly similar to that of Britain's socialist regime, and his stand on thermostatic control of public buildings carries strong overtones of totalitarian dicta-

Karl Marx foresaw the final stages of capitalistic destruction to be marked by a period of extensive government controls over production and distribution until the last vestiges of capitalism were removed. Finally the state would wither away with the development of a communist economic, political and socialist order.

It is disturbing to see the work of generations destroyed by the imposition of socialistic ideology on our capi-talistic system. In 1980, let's pool our efforts to keep Mr. Carter and Mr. Kennedy out of the presidential office, and elect a man such as John Connally to whittle down our oversized government, reduce social programs, and allow a free market to operate.

MCAA needed?

THE MIDLAND REPORTER-TELEGRAM, SUN., AUGUST 5, 1979

Do we need a new Midland Community Action Agency? The MCAA requested an administration fund of \$72,000 annually from taxpayers. Two thirds or \$52,000 of that was used for salaries. That left \$20,000 for operations. Could a business operate this

MCAA listed its functions as:

Medical Transportation: It carried on the average of only 65 persons per month with a \$650 grant per month regardless of the number of persons carried since 1971. Action Line volunteers carried from 120 to 130 persons a month. Individual churches have also carried this program on a volunteer basis. Casa de Amigos is now carrying up to 300 persons a month.

Insulation Program: With an annual grant of \$6,948 they insulated only 20 homes last year. Could this material be made available to the Christmas in April program which always needs more materials and could the needy help supply workers for this project which does not require skilled workmen?

Weatherization Program: A+separate program so that it could receive a \$48,000 grant from another agency; \$16,000 a year was paid to a "Weatherization Coordinator."

Emergency Appropriations Program: This seemed like the agency's sole justification. It received a \$17,000 a year grant to pay rent and utility bills that were impossible to meet for 156 families, averaging about \$100 each. This program could be administered by an existing agency or

MCAA has also listed senior citizen activities and classes in typing, upholstery and nutrition

It was voted that the agency was a "limited purpose agency" and therefore received less funds than a full fledged community action agency. Thank goodness for that! Shame on those who profited from MCAA's greed during its 11 years.

Denver, playing in its first preseason game, built a 6-0 lead in the first half on chipshot field goals of 23 and 30 yards by Jim Turner before Carano harnessed the Cowboy offense for a 76-yard scoring drive.

Carano hit tight end Jay Saldi on passes of 17 and 14 yards before a costly interference penalty by Bronco rookie Wiley Turner of Angelo State in the end zone set up Larry Brinson's one-yard scoring plunge

Rafael Septien kicked the extra point with 1:46 left in the first half. Denver also lost two of its players in the hard-hitting matchup before 61,-192 fans in Texas Stadium as defen-

seive tackle Don Latimer and running back Rob Lytle departed with knee Dallas, which lost to Oakland 20-13 last week, evened its preseason rec-

Denver used three quarterbacks

with starter Norris Weese completing

five of nine passes for 81 yards in favor of Craig Penrose.

Rookie Fred Martensen of Arizona State finished up for the Broncos who fumbled away an excellent chance to go ahead late in the fourth quarter.

Cowboy rookie defender Mike Calhoun of Notre Dame stripped the ball away from Martensen and recovered at the Cowboy 43 to end the final Denver threat.

Second string quarterback Danny White directed the Dallas offense in the second half but was intercepted on the only scoring drive he could ignite by Denver's Bill Thompson in the Bronco end zone

Koch breaks world record in 400 race

TURIN, Italy (AP) - Marita Koch broke her own world record in the women's 400 meters with 48.60 seconds in the first day of the European. Track and Field Cup, topping a strong showing by East Germany, which led both the men's and women's stand-

The East German 4x100 women's its world record, for the second outstanding showing of the day

The first day of the Cup produced a string of excellent performances, reaffirming Europe's leading role in international track and field.

The East Germans topped the men's standings with 55 points, followed by West Germany 60, Soviet Union 55, Poland 47, Italy 40, Britain 37, France 29.5 and Yugoslavia 26.5.

The East German total for the women Was 52 points, the Soviet Union had 48, Britain 34, Bulgaria 32, West Germany 27, Romania 25, Poland 24 and Italy 10.

West Germans Dietmar Moegenburg, who won the men's high jump with 7 feet, 71/4 inches, and Harald Schmid, who won both the men's 400 and 400 meters hurdles at an hour's interval, scored impressive vic-

Schmid captured the hurdles in 47.85 for a European record, then triumphed in the 400 in 45.31

Marina Makeyeva of the Soviet Union ran the women's 400 meters hurdles in 54.82, just missing her world record of 54.78 set in Moscow last week Koch, a medicine student, had a

fantastic start and led all the way, cracking her record of 48.89 set at Potstdam on July 29. Maria Kulchunova of the Soviet Union settled for second place in 49.63, a Soviet nation-

The East German relay team was anchored by world record holder

Marlies Goehr, who battled Ludmila Kondrateva of the Soviet Union to the finish, taking a two-yard margin for victory. Goehr previously had won

the women's 100 meters in 11.03.

Schmid received a rousing ovation from the crowd of 40,000 at the Turin Municipal Stadium for his two victories. His 47.85 clocking in the 400world record of 47.45 by Edwin Moses of the United States, erased from the books the ll-year-old European record of Britain's David Hemery, who ran the distance in 48.12 in Mexico in

The West German star had a slow start in the 400 meters, but then rallied for a strong finish, overtaking Nikolai Chernetski of the Soviet Union, second in 45.70.

Moegenburg battled East German Rolf Beilschmidt up to 7-6%. He had barely made 7-5% and 7-6% at his last try, with the East German making it at his first jump

At 7-714, the second highest after the world record of 7-81/2 by Vladimir Yaschenko of the Soviet Union, Beilschmidt elearly missed his three tries. Moegenburg created a small drama at the second jump.

He made it, but after several seconds the bar dropped. Up went the red flag, drawing immediate protests. from Moegenburg and the crowd. After a few minutes of consultations, officials waved a white flag signalling the bar had been cleared.

NORTH CONWAY, N.H. (AP) -Harold Solomon, recovered from a bad cold, whipped defending champion Eddie Dibbs 7-6, 6-3 and iron man Jose Higueras of Spain stunned Guillermo Vilas of Argentina 6-2, 6-1 Saturday to gain the finals of a \$175,000 clay court tennis tournament.

The slightly built Solomon predicted a tough match against Higueras. 'He's very steady," Solomon said. 'He was out there for an eternity against (Corrado) Barazzutti. I don't intend to stay out there that long." The 26-year-old Higueras, who de-

feated Barrazzutti in a 3-hour and 44-minute marathon Friday, took only an hour and 50 minutes to beat the third-seeded Vilas

McEnroe gains finals in Grand Prix Tennis

SOUTH ORANGE, N.J. (AP) -John McEnroe advanced to the finals in the \$75,000 Grand Prix Open Saturday by overpowering Princeton University junior Jay Lapidus, 6-2, 6-1, in an 80-minute semifinal at the Orange Lawn Tennis Club.

McEnroe, ranked No. 3 in the world behind Bjorn Borg and Jimmy Connors and No. 1 in the tournament, will meet the winner of the Vitas Gerulaitis-John Lloyd match. Gerulaitis is the tournament's No. 2 seed. Lloyd, of Great Brtian, is unseeded.

McEnroe broke Lapidus' serve in the first game of each set and was in complete control in the battle between the 20-year-olds.

Lapidus twice had a double break point - in the eighth game of the first set and in the fourth game of the second set. But he failed to capitalize each time as McEnroe served and volleyed brilliantly.







Nicklaus having poorest season

BIRMINGHAM, Mich. (AP) - "I don't remember - not even when I was a kid - having a worse season,' a dejected Jack Nicklaus said Saturday after skying to a 78 in the third round of the PGA Golf Champion-

"I can't stand playing golf like that.

At 223, 12-over par for three rounds, the game's greatest player found himself trailing a dozen par busters by from 13 to 20 shots as many mangled the Oakland Hills course.

HE SAID this is his last competition of the year and he is undecided over how challenging a schedule he will tackle in 1980.

"I will play in the four majors (Masters, U.S. and British Opens and PGA) and Muirfield (his own memorial event in Columbus, Ohio) and I don't know what I will do beyond

Nicklaus, winner of an unprecented 17 major championships and the only player to exceed \$3 million in prize winnings, was bitterly disappointed over his failure in this 61st PGA, a tournament he has won four times.

"I have been hitting the bal well - I thought I would do better," he lamented. "I was atrocious around the

THIS MARKS the first time since he turned pro in late 1961 that Nicklaus has not won at least one tour event. Going into the PGA, he was 50th in the money list with \$58,919.

"In my first years as a junior -1953-to-56 — I won every tournament I played in," he said. "My worst year before this was probably 1957 - I started playing in men's tournaments - but even then I won the World

Jaycee Juniors." Nicklaus is now 39, but he has shown little inclination to surrender his recognized title as king of golf. Every time people start predicting his decline, he manages to come up with a major victory - such as the British Open at St. Andrews last

THE REASON Jack hoped to win

the PGA was that it would qualify him for the U. S. Ryder Cup team, which will meet the British-European team in White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., next month. It was his only chance.

I three-putted the second, lipped the cup on the third, didn't even get close with a couple of 12footers and really kicked it around on the seventh and ninth.

"That's when I quit concentrating. Now it's back home — some fishing and tennis and family affairs. Maybe an exhibition or two, but no serious golf until next year.'

Journalism teacher contests re-assignment

Calvin Baker, Midland High School's journalism teacher and student newspaper adviser, is contesting the re-assignment of his duties to teaching English by MHS Principal Jack Stone, Baker told The Reporter-Telegram Saturday.

Baker said he plans to take his case before the Midland Independent School District Board of Trustees, and possibly to federal court.

Baker, 40, has been teaching jour-nalism in Midland for 17 years.

He claims the administration has 'trumped up' charges to get him out of journalism because he does not "censor the newspaper and allows his students to be critical of the administration, school spirit and the athletic program. Baker said he supports freedom of the press.

However, Stone said Saturday Baker was re-assigned because "some of his (teaching) skills need to be improved." Stone said that was determined in a routine evaluation of the high school's 70-odd teachers.

Baker's teaching performance was judged by Stone; Patricia Smith, as-

sistant principal, and Sarah Macina, chairman of the MHS English Department.

"I don't have the (constitutional) power to censor the kids," Baker said. "I can advise and suggest. That's supposed to be the American way."

In a letter signed by the three MHS administrators and dated Feb. 8, 1979, Baker was told he must take "a firm position...in giving direction to the publication of The Bulldog," the MHS student newspaper.
Stone said Baker would be teaching

four courses in sophomore English and thereby would have the opportunity to improve his teaching techniques and lesson plans,

"He's still going to be teaching at Midland High School; he'll not be sponsor of the student newspaper," Stone said.

Stone said he was "concerned about the academic program" and about Baker's effectiveness as a teacher and not about censorship.

"His (teaching) contract is not in jeopardy for this year," Stone told The Reporter-Telegram.

Baker's attorney, Odessan Michael McLeaish, who is a volunteer counsel for the American Civil Liberties-Union, is requesting a public hearing for Baker before the Midland Independent School District's board of trustees. Failing in that, Baker said he would take his case to federal court to test the constitutionality of Stone's

decision. Baker said he was notified in a letter in mid-July of his change in status and that the administration had been critical in past years of his effectiveness as a teacher. His teaching abilities were not questioned or under scrutiny, he said, but the administration described his classroom preparation as "weak.

"He (Stone) has tried to claim that my teaching was not up to par and that my teaching skills are not polished," Baker said. "Those charges are completely trumped up as far as I'm concerned.

Furthermore, Baker was critical of the rule "Right to the Freedom to Publish" in the "Pupil Rights and Responsibilities" booklet approved by the Midland Independent School District's board of trustees.

"Students have the right to publish under the direction of a teacher and with the permission of the principal.

"Good, responsible journalism will be the hallmark of all our publica-

Student Press Law Center director Michael D. Simpson of Washington, D.C., said in a letter, dated Oct. 24, 1978, to Baker that that rule "is blatantly unconstitutional.

.The students on the official school newspaper are free to publish without censorship" unless "legally obscene, libelous or (material) which will cause a substantial disruption of school activities.

"If the principal seeks to prohibit the publication of 'controversial' or 'negative' articles, then he will be violating the constitutional rights of the student journalists.'

Baker said his background is in journalism and that he holds a master's degree from the University of Missouri and has worked a year for the Pittsburg Press and about 10 years part-time for The Midland Reporter-Telegram.

Baker said his decision to contest his change in status has been "difficult because it's going to be hard on me and my family." His wife, Marilyn, is a home economics teacher at

Use of herbicides calls for caution

By CHARLES W. GREEN Midland County Extension Agent (Agriculture)

A week of variable weather brought welcome moisture for agriculturists in the Midland area but bad news for some. High winds and hail caused locally heavy damage to crops and outbuildings on farms south and east of Midland.

Soaking rains covered lot of farm and ranch land, which will result in greener pastures and rapid cotton growth. Insect damage remains light, with some increase in cotton bollworm egg

Lush growth in the weeks ahead could result in increased problems. We will keep producers advised of any developing trouble sport with the monitoring being done on 19 fields by demonstration aide Tom Brice.

FERTILIZER AND WEED KILLER combinations are designed to appeal to the inherent lazy streak in almost all home gardeners. The idea of fertilizing the lawn and killing the weeds all in one application is difficult to resist.

Weed killers when used properly can be great time savers and eliminate a lot of back-breaking work. However, they must be used according to the directions given on the containers if they are to be effective and not endanger valuable plants in the landscape.

The same chemicals that will kill the weeds are frequently harmful to the trees, shrubs and vines used in the landscape. Since tree roots invade the lawn area and usually extend beyond the branch spread, it is difficult to apply a fertil-izer-herbicide mixture to the lawn without danger of damage to the desirable plants in the lawn, especially in the sandy loam soils of West

CONTACT HERBI-CIDES, primarily the hormone types, organic arsenicals and the soil sterilants also pose risk of injury to desirable plants if used in windy conditions and drift occurs. Sterilants used to clean up alleys or graveled areas around the home can move down to injure roots of trees located many feet away. Also, washing rain will sometimes move these materials out of the treated area to other areas in the vicinity or maybe blocks away.

All too often the time to apply fertilizer is not the correct time for effective weed control. Each type of herbicide must be used at specific rates and at a certain critical time to be effective in killing

While fertilizer should be applied at the recommended rate, there is usually little harm if the homeowner fails to calibrate his distributor correctly and makes a slightly heavier application. If herbicides are contained in the mixture, this error can be very damaging to desirable vegetation.

Many of the more popular landscape trees including oaks, mulberry, pecan, locust and others are highly susceptible to the weed killers. When contemplating the use of a herbicide or herbicide and fertilizer mixture, always read all of the precautions given on the label. risky. It is better to replace the grass with a shade-tolerant species or a ground cover such as English or Algerian ivy, or vinca.

DURING THE MONTH of August and through the first partof September, the pecan has a tendency to shed immature nuts. This is commonly known as "August drop." This occurs during the water stage of nut development. 





"She was very prosecution oriented up until a week ago," Schick said. But suddenly, just a few days before the trial is supposed to begin, she changes her mind."



Windbreaks next 'hopper target LUBBOCK - Grasshoppers that are stripping and severely damaging

rangeland and crops in the Texas Panhandle may turn to the tender leaves of windbreak trees as their next source of food.

"When grasshoppers exhaust their food supply of grass and small plants, they feed on the tender foliage of trees," said Robert Fewin, windbreak silviculturist with the Texas Forest Service. "In the Panhandle, this means the trees in windbreaks and shelter belts.

Conifers and evergreens, especially ponderosa pines, are the most susceptible tree species to grasshopper damage. And during epidemic outbreaks, grasshoppers eat green foliage and thus cause trees to

AUSTIN — Livestock exports through the Texas Department of Agriculture facilities in the first six months of 1979 rose to 40,624 head with an estimated value of \$14,047,653, said Agriculture Commissioner

The half-year total marked an increase of 30,000 head over the 1978 number of cattle, goats, swine, sheep and horses processed through the department's six pens operated at border sites and at Houston International Airport. The highest increases were in cattle and sheep.

Most of the animals shipped were from Texas ranches. And "large numbers" of slaughter goats were sent to Mexico, said Brown. Mexico remains Texas' most consistent foreign livestock customer, the commis-

Co-ops to be under pressure

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Farmer co-operatives apparently need not fear loss of their exemptions from antitrust laws, but can expect renewed federal pressure on a key aspect of the co-ops' relationships with their

Two years ago, a special U.S. Department of Agriculture report on co-ops warned them that the reasons most gave for failure to set up fair, routine systems for retiring equity certificates "are without merit." Changes were repeatedly urged.

But a new report by congressional investigators last week states that little has been done to upgrade co-ops' systems since 1977 and suggests legislation requiring such systems.

USDA disagreed with that suggestion, proposing instead a new nationwide campaign of education and technical aid to get such systems in

But the General Accounting Office report could spur "small-fix" legislation to offset any calls for more sweeping change in cooperatives' legal status. One or two bills a session have been introduced to do this. Some have passed one chamber before.

Secretary Bob Bergland told the National Milk Producers Federation board last week not to worry.
"President Carter and I both believe in cooperatives," he said. "After

rigorous examination, we are convinced even more strongly that this historic law continues to serve its purpose and does not need to be

Disaster-loan program changed

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Small Business Administration last week made major changes in its disaster-loan program as required by a new law President Carter recently signed to replace one he vetoed last fall.

Because the law is retroactive to disasters on or after Oct. 1, 1978, SBA officials said, loans already on the books are being reviewed individually while up to \$1 billion in new aid is processed.

The new law was designed to lower interest rates in most cases but also to send farmers back to the Farmers Home Administration for aid, where

requirements were slightly softened. SBA Administrator A. Vernon Weaver said interest rates on the first \$55,000 of residential and personal-property loans have been dropped to 3 percent from 7% percent and to 5 percent for business loans when the borrower cannot get credit elsewhere.

Research set on health-food freaks

WASHINGTON, D.C. — One of the 14 basic-research grants worth more than \$1.3 million that Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland awarded last week may warm the hearts of certain farm groups and food company executives everywhere.

He gave \$65,000 to the University of Texas at San Antonio "to develop

psychological profiles of 'nutrition enthusiasts' "-known at the corporate corner of the bar as "health-food freaks."

# Firms sign agreement

MONTEBLLO, Calif., — Texaco Inc. and Southern California Edison Company today affirmed their conviction that coal gasification will be capable of commercial use on a large scale within the next decade by signing an agreement to build a \$300 million test facility in conjunction with other participants.

At a press conference here, at Texaco's Research Laboratory, representatives of the two industries committted major investments to the new technology, stating they believe that gasified coal can provide an environmentally acceptable option for replacing millions of barrels of imported oil and billions of cubic feet of natural gas for the generation of elec-

tric power. Texaco and Edison also announced that the Electric Power Research Institue has been invited to join in this major research and development project. The two companies also are extending an invitation to other firms to participate in the project and share

The joint endeavor is the cool water coal gasification project, named for Edison's cool water generating station, near Daggett, which has been selected for demonstrating the viability of coal gasification in actual power plant operation, the companies said.

Using the Texaco coal gasification process, the project would utilize coal to generate synthesis gas, a mixture of hydrogen and carbon monoxide, and burn the gas in a new integrated combined cycle unit to generate elec-

The Texaco process has essentially complete carbon conversion and insignificant particulate and sulfur emissions. A pilot unit of the Texaco process is in operation at Texaco's Research Laboratory in Montevello,

# \$4.5 million award made

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) - A U.S. District Court jury has awarded more than \$4.5 million in a pipeline welding suit and countersuit filed by Ketchbaw Industries Inc. and Alyeska Pipeline Service Co.

Houston Gamma Ray, doing business in Alaska as Ketchbaw Industries, was awarded \$3,135,300 in punitive damages and \$265,400 in actual damages Friday.

The jury found that Alyeska had falsely represented that Ketchbaw would continue to be X-ray contractor on the trans-Alaska oil pipeline past the 1975 construction season. Alyeska fired Retchbaw in January 1976 after falsified weld X-rays were discov-

The punitive damages were for "malice or outrageous conduct on the part of Alyeska," the jury said.

Alyeska was awarded \$1,170,000 in damages after the jury found Ketchbaw failed to live up to its contract to X-ray all the welds south of the Yukon River during construction of the pipe-

Said Alyeska attorney Gary Zipkin: "This case is far from over.

Zipkin said Judge James Fitzgerald had agreed to consider a motion by Alyeska to reduce or strike any punitive damages awarded to Ketchbaw. The motion will be filed within the next 10 days, he said.

A decision to strike or reduce the punitive damages is the judge's pre-rogative, Zipkin said, "if he finds the jury's verdict was based on passion or prejudice. Our position is that there was no evidence that Alyeska acted wth malice.'

Ketchbaw argued that Alyeska purchased Ketchbaw's X-ray equipment and offered Ketchbaw a more favorable contract in the fall of 1975 when a decision already had been made to replace the X-ray firm.

Alyeska witnesses testified during the six-week trial that the decision to terminate Ketchbaw's contract wasn't made until December 1975. It came after widespread publicity over falsified X-rays and after continued problems with what Alyeska said was lack of proper management and su-

Ketchbaw argued that Bechtel Corp., Alyeska's 1975 construction management contractor, should be held responsible for the X-rays.

(Abo) field. Currently, the wells have a total project allowable of 2,128 barrels per day, or 133 barrels a well. Within a year, Amoco told the commission, the lease could produce 3,000 barrels of oil daily resulting from the waterflood project now operating there.

The commission also said authority for other waterflood projects in the field may be granted through administrative channels, according the a press release

Senior Staff Geologist Bill Watson told the commission the maximum lease allowable 2,128 barrels of oil daily is expected to be exceeded in July or August.

# Import ceiling exceeded

LUBBOCK - Railroad Commissioner James E. Nugent said crude oil imports exceeded President Carter's stated ceiling in each of the last two weeks for which figures are avail-

"Increased imports, together with decreased gasoline consumption, is producing an improvement in stocks of gasoline and home heating fuel."
Nugent noted in a speech before Lubbock Rotarians.

According to Nugent's figues, U. S. Companies imported an average of 8.3 and 8.5 million barrels of crude oil and petroleum products per day in the second and third weeks of July. President Carter's stated import ceiling for the current year is 8.2 million barrels per day on an annual basis. "The point of these numbers," The

Commissioner stated, "is not to dispute the President's goal, but to emphasize our dependence on imports" "You can't have it both ways," Nugent continued. "As long as do-

mestic production is strangled by red tape and inadequate incentives, the only way to meet consumer expectations is through imports-the very imports that are wrecking our economy and keeping us vulnerable to sabotage and blackmail," he explained Nugent cited statistics of the

American Petroleum Institute which show gasoline stocks returning to normal levels. Stocks of home heating fuels are growning at rates which should bring them to adequate levels by the beginning of the winter season,

The Commissioner also cited "supressed demand" for gasoline as a factor in the improved supply situa"This will be the first time in the 27-year history of the Desk & Derrick Club of Midland that a governor of our state has taken part in one of our programs," Mrs. O'Bannon said. And recent reports indicate a significant weakening of sales is already underway. Reports by major retailers on July sales generally showed smaller gains that those early in the year and a sluggish trend when compared to sales in July last year.

When inflation, now running at a 13 percent annual rate, iconsidered, most July reports indicate a real drop in volume sales.

J.C. Penney Co. had a modest sales gain of 2.4 percent; Montgomery Ward reported a 1.8 percent gain. K mart and F.W. Woolworth had larger gains. K mart's sales rose 13.3 percent and Woolworth's were up 11.6

While a softening in retail sales has been expected, the latest reports showed most companies below budgeted levels for the month, said Jeffery Feiner, a retail analyst at Merrill . Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith.

The latest figures "continue to reflect that the consumer is pressured by recession, energy problems and inflation," he said.

With gains in personal income running below the rate of inflation for five out of the first six months of the year, consumers end up with real incentive to be cautious in their buying habits especially in the face of widespread predictions that a recession may continue through the end of this year or perhaps into 1980.

In other business developments this past week: -Chrysler Corp. asked the federal

government for \$1 billion in a cash tax credit over the next two years to help bail it out of financial trouble. The No. 3 automaker announced a record loss in the second quarter of \$207 million, an amount that was larger than its loss for all of 1978. Administration officials promised to look into Chrysler's surprising request.

And on Friday, Chrysler asked the United Auto Workers union for a twoyear freeze on wages and benefits for more than 100,000 workers.

-The nation's unemployment rate crept up slightly in July to 5.7 percent, but government officials said the rise was too small to indicate that a recession is taking its toll in the job

The July jobless rate compared with a June unemployment rate of 5.6 percent, which was the lowest in nearly five years. The number of people without jobs rose during the past month by a mere 74,000 to 5,848,-

000, the Labor Department reported. Productivity in private business dropped by the biggest amount in five years during the April-June quarter of the year. The Labor Department said productivity tumbled at an annual rate of 3.8 percent, and was the second consecutive quarter showing a decline. The drop was the largest since a 6.9 drop in early 1974.

# Service company act may not have funds

AUSTIN - Among the measures due to go into effect this Aug. 27 is HB 962, the "residential service company act," but the agency charged with implementing the measures says it may not have funds to carry out the

HB 962, by Rep. Jim Browder, Coldspring, provides for the Texas Real Estate Commission to regulate "residential service contracts, which are defined as contracts under which an entity "undertakes for a specified period of time to maintain, repair or replace all or any part of the structural components, the appliances, or the electrical, plumbing, heating, cooling or airconditioning system of residential property."

Part of the reason given for passage of the act was to clear up confusion over whether such contracts are or are not insurance.

Under the bill, such contracts are exempted from regulation by the State Board of Insurance, and placed under TREC, which is given the authority for making rules and regulations, and for enforcing them, and the

provisions of the act. Administrator Andy James, however, notes that the new law was "not accompanied by an appropriation," although the act is intended to be self-supporting, once it begins opera-

tion, through collection of fees. "We didn't sponsor this legislation; we just acquired it," James says, adding that his "philosophical position" is that it's good for a homebuyer "to have the option of obtaining such

warranty coverage. But as far as implementing the legislation, James says, "we're not sure right now what we're going to

He has met, he reports, with some companies interested in providing

TERC also has veted to set annual broker fees at \$22.50 for the coming year, with salesmen's fees at \$18, and to publish changes in rules to conform to changes in the Texas Real Estate Licensing Act which take effect Sept. i; and to adopt rules dealing with licensing of partnerships and corporations.

Changes in regulations dealing with financial requirements have been proposed by the Properietary School Advisory Committee to the State Board of Education.

Among the suggested alternations are liberalized rules on reporting of financial statements, to eliminate the need for an audited financial statement (requiring only a rule which has been "reviewed"); eliminating audit requirements for small schools, with incomes of less than \$50,000 a year (the present exemption is for schools with incomes under \$20,000); and allowing collection of tuition on a quarterly, rather than a monthly, basis.

Despite recent criticism at the Federal level of so-called "tie-in sales" of credit insurance and loans, State regulatory officials say there appears to be no major problem wich such sales in Texas.

Robert McAnelly, manager of the credit insurance section of the Board of Insurance, says the agency hasn't gotten out there in the field and listened to the sales pitch" being used by persons offering such policies, but has not received very many com-

plaints on the subject. There have been a few, he says, "mostly through savings and loan debtors," who apparently believed it was necessary for them to take out credit life insurance when the accompanying "truth in lending" disclo-

sures indicated they did not. "We do oppose tie-in sales," McAnelly stresses, but notes studies have indicated most borrowers feel such insurance "is a good thing.

Commissioner Sam Kelley, Office of the Consumer Credit Commissioner, like wise reports the OCCC has received a small number of complaints, but says there has been no

increase in such cases. Sen. William Proximire, D.-Wisconsin, has charged such tie-in sales are widespread and has accused the Federal Reserve Board of attempting to down-play the practice.

# Crysler loses rank

DETROIT (AP) - Chrysler Corp.'s unprecedented request for a two-year wage and benefit freeze for 100,000 workers means the company is no longer one of the Big Three, the head of the United Auto Workers union

When reminded of an earlier statement that a request for concessions from the union meant confession by the company that it was not in the big leagues, UAW President Douglas Fraser said Friday: "I never thought they'd do it, for just that reason."

Chrysler, currently negotiating with the UAW, is seeking a \$1-billion government loan through advance tax credits to keep it going until 1982. The UAW earlier proposed that the government buy \$1 billion in stock for a direct stake in the company.

The company says it has lost \$466 million in the past 18 months.

Fraser was unable to respond to the company's request for the freeze, saying "this burden should not be shouldered by the (negotiating) committee.

He said the union had called a special meeting of officials from its Chrysler department to discuss the proposal. Others said the meeting would probably be held in Chicago next week.

"One thing we cannot make a judgment on is the company's asking us to accept, for two years, wages and fringes below those which will be enjoyed at Ford and GM (General Motors)," Fraser said. "We can't make any intelligent judgment on that until we know what the settle-ments in those firms will be."

He said that including inflation, the freeze meant a decrease in living standards for the 100,000 Chrysler employees currently working at plants in the United States and Canada.

Chrysler President Lee A. Iacocca attended Friday's bargaining session. The current Chrysler-UAW contract expires on Sept. 14.

Iacocca declined to meet with reporters after the meeting.

Iacocca outlined for the union the company's product and financial plans, even showing the union committee pictures of the 1981 models - a first for labor negotiations.

"You get the impression after seeing the (future) product line that with some help, Chrysler Corp. can indeed become viable and increase its position in the market," Fraser said. "I'm not a salesman for Chrysler, but it's a pity they don't have them (1981 models) now.

Meanwhile, figures reported Friday showed that Chrysler's sales for July fell 27 percent compared with the same month last year. Sales for Ford were down 20 percent, and GM sales fell 4.9 percent. In sales so far this year, compared to 1978, Chrysler's figures show an 18 percent decrease, while Ford showed a 17 percent de-cline and GM was off 5.3.

Chrysler employs 123,926 UAW members in the United States and Canada, of which 19,200 have been laid off in the United States and some 4,000 in Canada. They earn an average of \$9.00 an hour, within pennies of the average at other companies, before overtime and other premiums. Chrysler says that last year an hour of labor cost \$14.11 because of fringe

# Electrical utilities making healthy market comback

NEW YORK (AP) — With all their much-publicized problems, the stocks of electrical utilities have staged a healthy raffy in recent months.

The upswing has received little fanfare, in keeping with the utilities' image as slow-moving stocks suited mainly for investors interested in current income rather than capital

But it nevertheless produced a gain of better than 10 percent in the Dow Jones average of 15 utilities from

mid-May through this past Tuesday, when it closed at a new high for the

year of 108.80. The rise of the stocks might seem illogical at first glance, given the world oil situation, as well as nuclearpower uncertainties resulting from the accident at the Three Mile Island plant near Harrisburg, Pa., earlier this year.

But analysts noted that those concerns have been overridden to a considerable extent by recent hopes for a decline in interest rates.

"Lower long-term rates would mean a reduction in borrowing costs for the utilities, an important consideration in this capital-intensive industry," Standard & Poor's Corp. said in a recent appraisal of the group.

"At the same time, softening rates would make the high-yielding stocks more attractive in relation to bonds, with which they compete for the funds of income-minded investors.'

While the utilities were hovering around their highest levels of the year, the Dow Jones average of 30 industrials posted a 6.40 gain to 846.16 in the past week, after an 11.69-point rise the week before.

The New York Stock Exchange composite common-stock index picked up 0.60 to 59.33, and the American Stock Exchange market value index rose 0.41 to 198.99. Big Board volume averaged 33.09

supertanker Atlantic Empress and the 63 million gallons of crude oil it took with it could present the insurance industry with history's biggest shipping loss.

The Financial Times, Britain's respected business newspaper, said the bill could total between \$85 million and \$90 million.

It said claims for about \$54 million will be made to London insurance brokers, including about \$32 million to Lloyds of London. The remaining claims will be filed in other capitals.

The 128,000-ton Empress and its original cargo of 70 million gallons of crude were insured for \$95 million. The supertanker, longer than three football fields, was believed to be the biggest commercial vessel ever lost at sea.

It sank Thursday night in the Atlantic about 350 miles east of Barbados after two new explosions rocked the

blazing ship. Two tugs towing the Empress were forced to cut their lines because of the intense heat caused by the explosions. The blasts also ended attempts to fight the fire and transfer the remaining oil into other ships

Mobil Oil Corp., owner of the cargo, said a lot of the 7 million gallons that spewed from the Empress's ruptured tanks burned and that none of the rest touched land.

The Empress, owned by the Branco Shipping Co. Ltd. of Britain, was taken under tow several days after it collided with the supertanker Aegean Captain off Tobago in the Caribbean in heavy fog July 19.

Twenty-six crewmen from the Empress and one from the Captain were killed in the collision, which touched off towering flames and explosions.

The Empress, listing badly and streaming an oil slick 15 miles long, was towed into the Atlantic after the collision, and the Captain was towed to Curação for repairs.

The Captain, owned by Greek interests, suffered only one ruptured tank, and lost about 4 million gallons of the 70 million gallons of crude oil it was carrying. None of the Captain's cargo touched land either.

Thus, the utilities presumably have less leeway than usual in considering possible dividend increases. "Because of this and the likelihood that earnings will increase only modestly, dividend boosts this year probably will only approximate the growth in earnings (about 3 percent)," S&P

"The industry is not without prob-lems," the firm also noted. "Many utilities are having difficulty in get-ting rate relief and are facing power supply uncertainties in the wake of the Three Mile Island nuclear accident. Soaring fuel costs, moreover, are substantially boosting the indus-

try's operating expenses. "Thus, while buying is warranted for income investors, purchases should be made on a highly selective basis. Concentrate on issues that have relatively conservative payout ratios, offer good prospects for dividend growth, and meet near-term yield requirements."

# Domestic auto sales rebound, but still lag

By GUY DARST DETROIT (AP) - Do-

mestic auto sales rebounded in the last 10 days of July but were still below those of a year ago, the automakers reported Friday. For the full month, domestic car sales were down 9.6 percent from last year.

Analysts said the end of gasoline lines during he period appeared to have played a major role in stimulating sales and July noted that automakers had also offered special incentives to get dealers to sell large cars.

In the last 10 days of the month, sales of the domestic industry trailed the year-ago period by only 2.8 percent, and General Motors Corp. set a record for the period.

For the month as a whole, import sales were up a strong 23 percent from the previous July, leaving total auto indus- cars. try sales down only 4.1 percent for the period.

"Contrary to the opinion stated by every living economist in the United States, the auto industry's back was not broken in June," said an analyst with a domestic manufacturer, who did not want his name used. He said sales in the last third of the month would mean annual sales of 10.8. million cars according to past seasonal patterns.

**GM Chairman Thomas** A. Murphy on Thursday dropped his model year sales forecast from 11.3 to 10.8 million. He gave

no calendar forecast. With the end of gasoline fears, "there's life in

the market yet," the an-

alyst said. "It's a volatile market, but we're not going to see a rate of 9.6 million, like we saw in June, again.

Sales of the five domestic manufacturers totaled 688,377 in July, 9.6 percent below last year. Sales of imports were an estimated 200. 000, 23 percent ahead of last year, giving foreign producers a 22.5 percent share of the market against 18 percent last

# India's Parliament to reconvene Aug. 20

Charan Singh on Saturday fixed Aug. 20 as the date when Parliament will reconvene. When it does, Singh's new government is expected to face a confidence vote that will determine

whether it can last. "Parliament will meet for at least one week, and if necessary, for three weeks," Singh told reporters. Before scheduling the new session, Singh formally adjourned the old session, which had been in recess since the resignation of Singh's predecessor, Morarji Desai, almost

three weeks ago. At another news conference, Desai said he was resigning his seat in Parliament. He had already given up leader-ship of his Janata Party.

Desai stepped down as prime minister July 16 after a series of Janata defections to a rural bloc led by Singh. Until last week he was still claiming that he - not Singh could muster a majority in Parliament.

President Neelam Sanjiva Reddy settled the dispute by asking both men to compile lists of their supporters, and then by picking Singh to form the next government. Reddy also advised Singh to call a confidence vote when he had been in office about three

# Retired Army colonel works at dream job

GOSHEN, Conn. (AP)

— Col. Henry A. Siegel packs his fishing gear three or four times a year and goes after Atlantic salmon in some of Canada's most picturesque rivers. This year it's Iceland for fishing,

During the hunting season, his attention turns to upland game and waterfowl.

Best of all, the sport and travel is all in a day's work for the retired Army colonel. From his home in this

sleepy northwestern Connecticut town, he runs what he says is the biggest dealership in rare and antique sports-men's books in North Amerca.

"I'm a guy who's doing exactly what he wants to do ... and making a living at it," says Siegel, 65.

The stocky native of Utah directs his 12-yearold business from behind the clutter of a desk in the large 1830 house where he and his wife. Natalie, have lived for 11 years. Several hunting and fishing hats hang in a side room within sight

from the office.

Siegel says he frequently gets calls from far-flung clients about fishing conditions here or there, and, he adds, "the sales grow out of that."

But that doesn't explain the labor required to amass the nearly 6,000 listings in the current catalogue of Siegel's Angler's and Shooter's Bookshelf. Or the work necessary to ride herd on 50,000 or more volumes he has either for sale or in his own collection of fishing books.

Looking back in time, he says, "If I were to start today with what I know, I probably wouldn't have the guts to do it."

Nearly all of Siegel's sales are by mail order to collectors. Although the bulk of the volumes and prints in the catalogue are priced below \$100, one can pay up to \$3,350 for an 1888 edition of "The Ristigouche and Its Salmon Fishing" by Dean Sage, a philanthropist and ardent fly fisher-

Siegel was so im-pressed by the 275-page


illustrated book that he and a partner chose in 1973 to reprint 250 leather-bound copies, including an original color print and hand-colored frontispiece. Each copy sells for \$500.

Because leather has doubled in price and collecting a profitable as other costs have soared in the past six years, the time, Siegel says. He same reprinting would have cost twice as much today, he says. Today's rapidly chang-







Do you have a spare bedroom you would like to see occupied?

Area representatives for the Youth For Understanding Program, Mr. and Mrs. Wilburn Buttery, 3216 Frontier St., are seeking a family in the Lee High School district that would like to host a teenage ambassador of goodwill.

Thousands of American families have discovered that they can cement the bonds of international friendship right in their own living rooms.

They are doing it through the Youth For Understanding Host Family Program, a unique living experience that brings teenagers from Europe, South America and the Far East together. with ordinary families all over the United States.

The 3,500 international students will arrive in the U.S. the latter part of August, said Mrs. Buttery.

Typical of these eager and enthusiastic exchange students are a Brazilian girl, 15, who said, "My target is to learn English and meet new people, a Swedish boy, 18, who said, "I am very much looking forward to living with an American family," and a Japanese boy, 17, who said, "I want to get to know the U.S. from the in-

Under the program, a family provides a home for six months or a year to an international high school student from one of 24 countries. Whether the student comes from France, Sweden or the Philippines, the job of the host family is to help a young person learn about a way of life that is different from his own.

Host families are asked to treat the student not as a guest, but as another member of the family. Like any American teenager, the exchange student may be asked to walk the dog, make his own bed or wash the car, said Mrs. Buttery.

Also like any teenager, the student will need supervision, love and guidance. His host parents will want affection and respect in return, and if the student falls short, he or she can expect to hear about it, she added.

As volunteers, host families are expected to provide the exchange student with room and board. Clothing, spending money, insurance and other personal expenses are provided by the student's natural family and by program fees.

All kinds of families can participate in the program, including childless and single-parent families, families with small children and families with teenagers in the home. "It is not required that the exchange student have his or her own room, or that the family's accomodations be lavish," said Mrs. Buttery. "The intangibles of love, understanding and respect are far more important to the community volunteers who help se-

lect families for the program."

Mrs. Buttery explained that participants in the program say the experience results in all kinds of unexpected surprises. Sometimes the misconceptions can be funny: "Our student wrote home that he would put his dirty laundry in a little door upstairs, and his clothes would be delivered to him cleaned and pressed," said one host mother. "We had to explain that the laundry chute wasn't quite so

Another mother who has hosted exchange students from Switzerland, the Philippines and Brazil describes their impact on her family like this: "You learn more about America as you explain things you would normally take for granted - like fastfood restaurants, TV commercials and shopping malls - to your new family member. As you see your own country through another person's eyes, you come to appreciate what we have here, but you also begin to see that there are more ways of doing things than 'the American Way.'"

According to Mrs. Buttery, a family who decides to become a host family has a choice of a student from 24



# **Paneling** can warp

Q.-I have purchased some wood paneling to be installed in my attic. It hasn't been delivered yet and won't be for several months, but I made the deal ahead of time because the prices seem to keep going up. In talking with the dealer, he said I should keep the paneling in the attic for a week or two before installing it. His explanation of why this is necessary was somewhat vague, proba-bly because I didn't question him enough. Anyway, what I would like to know is the reason for keeping the paneling in the attic, because I have a feeling that storing it for a week or two might cause some of the panels to warp before I put them in place.

A .- Paneling is kept in the room where it will be installed to prevent the very thing you fear warpage — as well as shrinkage or other changes in the shape of the wood. By not installing the paneling immediately, it has time to accustom iself to the differences in temperature and humidity between your attic and the dealer's storage yard or wherever the panels had been stored. This minimizes changes in the wood after it is nailed or otherwise attached. You have some justification for your fear, however, so be sure to stack the panels properly - flat, with air spaces between

Q. - Is it necessary to put drain tiles around a house foundaton if there is water seepage in the basement?

A. - Many details are required before an answer to that question can be given. Generally, however, digging up the area around the foundation to install 'drain tiles should be a last resort, since it is a major job. First, try packing dirt around the foundation at ground level, slanting it so water runs away from the house. Also, check the gutters around the house, cleaning out leaves or any other debris that may be blocking the passage of water and forcing it to run over the sides.

Q.-We recently moved into a house which has wooden shingles on the outside walls. They apparently never have been finished with anything. We would like to paint them, but aren't sure what kind of paint to use. Our neighbor has suggested a stain to avoid the problem of repainting every few years, but we want a definite color. Besides, in a few years we might want to change to a different color. Can we use a latex paint?

A. - Yes, but read the directions on the label. most exterior latex paints require a primer when used on wood not pre-viously finished.

Q. - Please settle an argument about how far the feet of a long ladder should be from the bottom of a house when using the ladder to paint the outside. I said onethird the height of the ladder.

A.—Sorry, you are wrong. It should be onefourth the height of the ladder.





Do you have a spare bedroom you would like to see occupied?

Area representatives for the Youth For Understanding Program, Mr. and Mrs. Wilburn Buttery, 3216 Frontier St., are seeking a family in the Lee High School district that would like to host a teenage ambassador of goodwill.

Thousands of American families have discovered that they can cement the bonds of international friendship right in their own living rooms.

They are doing it through the Youth For Understanding Host Family Program, a unique living experience that brings teenagers from Europe, South America and the Far East together with ordinary families all over the United States.

The 3,500 international students will arrive in the U.S. the latter part of August, said Mrs. Buttery.

Typical of these eager and enthusi-

astic exchange students are a Brazilian girl, 15, who said, "My target is to learn English and meet new people," a Swedish boy, 18, who said, "I am very much looking forward to living with an American family," and a Japanese boy, 17, who said, "I want to get to know the U.S. from the inside."

Under the program, a family provides a home for six months or a year to an international high school student from one of 24 countries. Whether the student comes from France, Sweden or the Philippines, the job of the host family is to help a young person learn about a way of life that is different from his own.

Host families are asked to treat the student not as a guest, but as another member of the family. Like any American teenager, the exchange student may be asked to walk the dog, make his own bed or wash the car, said Mrs. Buttery.

Also like any teenager, the student will need supervision, love and guidance. His host parents will want affection and respect in return, and if the student falls short, he or she can expect to hear about it, she added.

As volunteers, host families are expected to provide the exchange student with room and board. Clothing, spending money, insurance and other personal expenses are provided by the student's natural family and by program fees.

All kinds of families can participate in the program, including childless and single-parent families, families with small children and families with teenagers in the home. "It is not required that the exchange student have his or her own room, or that the family's accomodations be lavish," said Mrs. Buttery. "The intangibles of love, understanding and respect are far more important to the community volunteers who help select families for the program."

Mrs. Buttery explained that partici-

Mrs. Buttery explained that participants in the program say the experience results in all kinds of unexpected surprises. Sometimes the misconceptions can be funny: "Our student wrote home that he would put his dirty laundry in a little door upstairs, and his clothes would be delivered to him cleaned and pressed," said one host mother. "We had to explain that the laundry chute wasn't quite so automatic."

Another mother who has hosted exchange students from Switzerland, the Philippines and Brazil describes their impact on her family like this: "You learn more about America as you explain things you would normally take for granted — like fastfood restaurants, TV commercials and shopping malls — to your new family member. As you see your own country through another person's eyes, you come to appreciate what we have here, but you also begin to see that there are more ways of doing things than 'the American Way."

According to Mrs. Buttery, a family who decides to become a host family has a choice of a student from 24 countries.

Can an exchange program like this really make a contribution to international understanding? The U.S. State Department apparently thinks there's merit to the program because it endorses Youth For Understanding and partially supports it with an annual grant-in-aid.

And for the more than 55,000 families who have hosted students since the program began 26 years ago, the world seems a lot smaller.



### Paneling can warp

Q.-I have purchased some wood paneling to be installed in my attic. It hasn't been delivered yet and won't be for several months, but I made the deal ahead of time because the prices seem to make the baseball team. keep going up. In talking with the dealer, he said I should keep the paneling in the attic for a week or two before installing it. His explanation of why this is necessary was somewhat vague, proba-bly because I didn't question him enough. Anyway, what I would like to know is the reason for keeping the paneling in the attic, because I have a feeling that storing it for a week or two might cause some of the panels to warp before I put them in place.

A.— Paneling is kept in the room where it will be installed to prevent the very thing you fear warpage — as well as shrinkage or other changes in the shape of the wood. By not install-ing the paneling immedi-ately, it has time to accustom iself to the differences in temperature and humidity between your attic and the dealer's storage yard or wherever the panels had been stored. This minimizes changes in the wood after it is nailed or otherwise attached. You have some justification for your fear, however, so be sure to stack the panels properly — flat, with air spaces between

Q. - Is it necessary to ut drain tiles around a house foundaton if there is water seepage in the basement?

A. - Many details are required before an answer to that question can be given. Generally, however, digging up the area around the foundation to install drain tiles should be a last resort, since it is a major job. First, try packing dirt around the foundation at ground level, slanting it so water runs away from the house. Also, check the gutters around the house, cleaning out leaves or any other debris that may be blocking the passage of water and forcing it to run over

-We recently moved into a house which has wooden shingles on the outside walls. They apparently never have been finished with anything. We would like to paint them, but aren't sure what kind of paint to use. Our neighbor has suggested a stain to avoid the problem of repainting every few years, but we want a definite color. Besides, in a few years we might want to change to a different color. Can we use a latex

paint? A. — Yes, but read the directions on the label. most exterior latex paints require a primer when used on wood not previously finished.

Q. - Please settle an argument about how far the feet of a long ladder should be from the bottom of a house when using the ladder to paint the outside. I said one-third the height of the ladder.



### **USDA** makes food standards

DALLAS-The U.S Department of Agriculture has proposed a nutritional standard for foods sold in competition with federally subsidized meal programs in the nation's schools.

The proposed rule allows states and local school districts to permit the sale of all foods which supply at least five percent of the U.S. Recommended Dietary Allowances for one or more of eight specified nutrients.

The proposed rule is in response to an amendment to the Child Nutrition Act, passed by Congress in November, 1977, authorizing the Secretary of Agriculture to regulate the sale of foods which compete with federally-assisted lunch and breakfast programs. Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Carol Tucker Foreman said the five percent figure is low enough to identify only those foods which are of "minimal nutritional





# Try Roquefort on vegetables, cooked or raw

Come summer, fresh vegetable lovers who have a back yard once again try their luck at growing greens. I specialize in tomatoes and cucumbers because I like them and they're the only vegetables I have any success with.

Besides, they go well with my favorite dressing; tangy Roquefort. You need a lift like that for the blander greens.

I'm slowly learning the secrets of successful mini-farming - from what plant foods to use to correct cultivating. More important, I have become aware that fresh vegetables must be treated properly to retain their nutritional value.

Don't leave your harvest, once picked, in the sun to wilt. Pop the vegetables into the refrigerator at once. If you are delayed for any reason,

The same rule holds true when choosing greens in a supermarket. Don' buy vegetables that

are limp, bruised or leathery looking.

There's another thing to keep in mind. When I was growing up, my mother, like so many other American housewives, used to overcook vegetables, apparently in the belief that the tenderer they were, the better. Actually they wound up soggy and tasteless.

Today, thanks partly to Chinese cooking, we realize that most vegetables are best cooked briefly or stir-fried for a couple of minutes. They remain crisp and hold their flavor, not to mention the vitamins.

Best of all, to my mind, are raw vegetables, and I don't mean just lettuce. cucumbers and such. Carrots, cauliflower, red

cabbage and many other vegetables are delicious raw with a tangy dressing or dip. If you haven't already done so, serve a dish of crudites, or raw vegetables, at your next cocktail party. Just be sure you have a good

Roquefort, the sheep's milk cheese from the Roquefort region of France, is one of the best accompaniments to both raw and cooked vegetables, in my opinion.

Marinate the greens in a Roquefort vinaigrette sauce or use it as a toping. It's delicious on cold vegetables such as raw mushrooms, zucchini, summer squash, tomatoes and cucumbers. It also gives a lift to steamed potatoes, Brussels sprouts and such.







# Harvest at proper time

#### By EARL ARONSON **AP Newsfeatures**

If you harvest your vegetables at the proper time they will have their best flavor.

Of course some vegeta-bles may be picked at any stage of their growth and the taste will be good but perhaps not uniform. But some do not have the desired taste or texture when over-ripe or underripe and must be picked at the peak of their development.

Here are a few harvesting rules to bring vegetables to your table at their best:

Asparagus - Do not pick asparagus until the third year you have it in your garden. Asparagus spears are ready to harvest when hey are 6 to 8 inches long..

Beans - Pick snap beans whenthe pods are young and succulent. Harvest limas as green beans when the seeds are nearly full size, just before they turn white. For dry limas, let the pods mature on the plants, but harvest before they become so dry they shat-

. Beets- Harvest beets when they are 11/2-inches or less in diameter for good quality.

Cabbage — Pick when the heads are firm. Cantaloupe - Pick when the melons slide

easily from the stem. Carrots - They may be used before they attain full size. Pick before they exceed one inch in diameter for fresh use; larger roots are good for canning and storage

Corn — Harvest sweet corn when it is in the milk stage, or when the juice in the kernel appears milky when punctured. Other signs that corn is nearly ready for harvest are drying of the silks, fullness of the tip kernels, and firmness of the unhusked ear. You can tell much by touch.





# Women may

need support

AUSTIN - Female athletes may need more support from a brassiere than the frilly garmentsmany stores sell. But finding an adequate bra that does not feel like a horse harness may be

At a presentation at an American Medical Association (AMA) sports symposium, researchers said a good sports bra should have several features. It should provide support firm enough to limit motion both up and down and side to side. Ideally, the bra should be titted for each athlete as part of her uniform and other protective equipment. It also should be mostly non-elastic and have a pocket to insert padding if a woman wanted extra protection in rough sports.

Requirements of a good ordinary bra are especially important in bras used for sports. Hooks and adjusters shouud not stab, and material should not be rough or cause allergic reactions. Common problems such as slip-ping shoulder straps and bras that "ride up" in front can be especially troublesome in sports.

Some athletes complain about such problems and so do not wear bras. But the Teaxas Medical Association says women may want to give special consideration to wearing bras for protection in certain sports.

The AMA symposium presentation cited a survey where some reported being bruised by participating in sports such as basketball, fencing, field hockey and football.





**Progress** grows for disabled

For many disabled persons, daily life can be filled with danger and rustration.

The reason is sometimes less their disability than it is the failure of our transportation, housing design and home furnishings products to meet the needs of this population, estimated to number as many as 25 million Americans.

However, according to Dr. Robert Goldenson, a clinical psychologist and author in the field of rehabilitation, the grow-ing field of barrier-free design is bringing real progress in the areas of housing and home furnishings product design.

Goldenson, part of a group which recently designed and hopes to build a barrier-free home in suburban New York, said recently that "the-basic information and technology necessary to construct a barrier-free home is advanced, but society's will to produce the buildings is so far less advanced."

New products and technology are coming onto the market more readily now as a result of federal and state laws requiring that new industrial construction accommodate individuals confined to wheelchairs. Furthermore, housing built with Housing and Urban Development Department (HUD) subsidies is now required to have units set aside for disabled individuals, said Goldenson

Removal of barriers will not only make it possible for partially dis-abled individuals to participate more fully in daily life, but will benefit able-bodied individuals as well.

Among some basic changes in home design which Goldenson sees on the horizon are replacing hard-to-tun door knobs and faucet handles with graspable levers.

Other modifications which provide access to the disabled include ramping and grading of steep entryways so that a wheelchair can negotiate them and the elimination of sunken or elevated spaces.

Among products already available, but likely to become more widely used, are amplified telephone for the deaf, phones with pushbuttons rather than dials, and phones that do not have to be picked up to work.

Public elevators with recorded announcements of floors and directions also are being specified with greater frequency.

In kitchen and bathroom design, manufacturers have begun developing products geared to the disabled market.

For example, General Electric has a kitchen for the handicapped, equipped withcontrol switches at the front of the counters, extensive countertop lighting, counters the proper height for use from a wheelchair and a recess beneath them so that a wheelchair can roll right up to the surface.

In bathrooms, grab bars mounted near the toilet and in the shower are available and are recommended as a general safety feature, regardless of whether or not a disabled individual will be using them.

### Beauticians, barbers to give service

CHICAGO, Ill.-Barbers and beauticians are being taught to recognize actual and potential skin cancers among their customers in an effort to bring these to a physician's attention at an earlier age.

As reported in the "Archives of Internal Medicine," the American Cancer Society is undertaing a nationwide project in cooperation with leaders of the beautician, barber and allied industries and medical organizations.
