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American officials to interview ballerina

NEW YORK (AP) — State Department officials said today that the United States and the Soviet Union had reached a compromise in the stand-off over interviewing Russian ballerina Ludmilla Vlasova.

The announcement came from Washington as Miss Vlasova and 52 other Soviet citizens remained aboard an Aeroflot jetliner grounded at Kennedy International Airport.

Hodding Carter, a State Department spokesman, said the interview would take place at the airport in a mobile lounge — a kind of bus that ferries passengers from airport terminals to planes. He said the lounge would provide the "non-coercive atmosphere" which the United States says Miss Vlasova needs to decide

whether to stay in America with her husband, Alexander Godunov, who defected last week.

Miss Vlasova, like her husband a star of the Bolshoi Ballet, has been confined in the jetliner since Friday, along with the other Soviet citizens.

State Department officials had said earlier that both Soviet and U.S. representatives would be present at the interview. Carter said the question of who would attend was the subject of some last-minute "horse trading" between officials at the airport.

Miss Vlasova's mother, meanwhile, appealed to President Carter to end the "cruel moral torture," a Soviet news agency said.

The White House confirmed a telegram was received over the weekend,

purportedly from the ballerina's mother.

American officials want assurances that Miss Vlasova, also a member of the internationally renowned troupe, was returning to the Soviet Union voluntarily.

But Soviet officials said Miss Vlasova, 36, wanted to return to her homeland and was afraid to leave the plane to meet privately with American authorities for fear that they would spirit her away.

Chief U.S. negotiator Donald McHenry, deputy U.S. representative to the United Nations Security Council, told reporters late Sunday that the crisis would soon be over. However, McHenry did not disclose the basis for his optimism.

Meanwhile, Orville Schell, Godunov's lawyer, said he and Godunov were certain Miss Vlasova wanted to remain in the United States. The dancer was standing by near the airport, the attorney said.

And the Soviet news agency Tass on Sunday published the text of a telegram from the ballerina's mother, Alexandra Gerasimova Drozdina, asking Carter to end the "cruel abuse of elementary human rights."

"For two days my daughter has been subjected to cruel moral torture," it said.

The woman charged: "The American authorities are setting absolutely illegal conditions for the departure of the aircraft with my daughter and other Soviet passengers aboard."

Tass said today Mrs. Drozdina sent a second letter to Carter after the he failed to respond, demanding "that he give instructions to U.S. authorities to stop torturing her daughter and let her go home."

The Soviet Union has formally protested to both the United States and the U.N. the decision to hold the plane until U.S. officials could talk privately with Miss Vlasova.

Henry Owen, U.S. ambassador at large, said President Carter was being briefed on the stalemate "several times a day" during his weekend at Camp David, Md.

Owen said Carter was making policy decisions in the negotiations, but declined to specify whether he was referring to talks at the airport and

elsewhere in New York.

Meanwhile, the passengers aboard the Aeroflot jetliner were probably "quite uncomfortable" as a result of their long confinement, McHenry said.

Tass said today that women and children aboard the plane were experiencing "special difficulties" and that the passengers had not slept in three days.

At one point, the air conditioning failed, but it was restored. A suggestion that the passengers be transferred to a secluded airport lounge was rejected, McHenry said.

Forty-nine Americans and 10 other non-Soviets left the Moscow-bound plane early Saturday.

Wounded guard says prisoners shot each other

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Two prisoners shot and killed each other today in a burst of gunfire at the city hall jail where 84 inmates were holding three guards hostage, said a guard who was wounded. Police quickly ended the three-day siege.

Police sharpshooters with automatic weapons entered the second-floor lockup shortly after the gunfire erupted and began emptying cells and taking the inmates to a nearby county jail. Five guns were recovered.

All three guards later emerged from the second-floor lockup. The wounded guard, William Melton, 52, walked without assistance and the other two were unharmed.

Melton later told officials that the two prisoners who died, said to be leaders of the siege, killed each other.

"They apparently had some kind of disagreement," said Capt. Dan Stopka. "He (Melton) said they were shooting at each other. He (Melton) jumped out of the way and was hit in the hand."

Inmates involved in the jail incident were not available for comment on Melton's report on how the two men died.

Police Lt. J.O. Smith said seven or eight shots rang out at 5:32 a.m. in the lockup where the inmates had been holding the three guards hostage since Saturday morning.

He said some of the inmates apparently turned against the ringleaders of the siege and began firing.

The dead prisoners were identified as Felix Lorenzo and Eugene Shaw. Lorenzo, serving a 150-year term for two armed robberies and a previous incident in which hostages were taken, had been seen earlier wearing a guard uniform.

Melton was grazed in the hand and leg. He was taken from the jail by ambulance. The other guards were identified as Dave Murray, 35, and Bob Hansen, 52.

The shooting ended the siege that began when an unknown number of inmates overpowered a guard, took his gun and used it to take the other two guards hostage in the lockup.

Sharpshooters were stationed on the roof of the three-story police building, situated about 4 miles from the Strip casinos.

Earlier in the day police had agreed to a list of 18 demands issued by the inmates dealing with jail conditions and prisoners' rights, but the prisoners refused to release their hostages.

Smith said "they didn't like all of them (the police responses)."

The points that were denied included demands for better representation by public defenders, improved facilities for Sunday religious services and radios in every cell.

A local attorney and a television newsman had served as mediators during negotiations with the inmates.

Smith said the first two demands could not be met because they were outside police jurisdiction, and the third was impossible because not all jail cells had electrical outlets.

The prisoners had demanded better medical care, access to court records and an exercise area. They also complained about cold food and lukewarm showers, and sought better laundry service, complaining poorly-done laundry "makes us look even worse when we go to court and confront the judge."

The prisoners also demanded that their terms and the police reaction to them be published in a local newspaper.

In response to the first set of 10 demands, authorities tried to alleviate problems, police said. But the inmates expressed complete satisfaction only with pledges for improved dental care and increased access to telephones.

Lorenzo was convicted in connection with an incident last year at a Las Vegas bar in which he held eight persons for five hours before surrendering to police.

Drainage improvements proposed

New signals, street work included in bond issue

Midland may be located in an arid section of West Texas — far from any lakes — but when a downpour occurs, out come the small boats as a few Midlanders enjoy a quick sail before the water disappears.

If Proposition No. 3 on the city's nine-point \$16.83 million bond issue is passed, the drainage problems in Midland which create those small sailing lakes should be alleviated somewhat, said Fred Baker, director of public works.

The street bond issue is for \$6 million and will go for drainage improvements, street work and installation of traffic lights.

About \$1.2 million is slated for improvements to the drainage system, Baker said.

Plans call for constructing a storm sewer north along Garfield Street from Wadley Avenue to Auburn Place. Water which currently drains onto Garfield and causes flooding will be directed into the storm sewer, and from there to the Northwest Midland Drainage Channel, he said.

Another storm sewer system will direct flow north along North A Street, starting at the intersection with Scharbauer Drive and continuing to Ventura Avenue, Baker said.

The Northwest Drainage Channel will be upgraded to recommendations made by engineers of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, according to Baker. Those improvements include widening sections of the channel and installing culverts big enough to handle the drainage.

"Since the recent development in the northwest part of Midland, the

amount of water draining has increased dramatically," Baker said.

These improvements should enable the city's system to handle the heaviest rainfall in 100 years, which would be about 6.8 inches in a 24-hour period.

Four intersections would be getting traffic signals under the bond issue, according to Baker. These are A Street and Wadley Avenue, Ward Street and Wadley Avenue, Neely Avenue and A Street and Garfield Street at Neely Avenue.

Six other intersections should have sufficient traffic on them within two or three years to warrant traffic signals, he said. But, as traffic patterns in the city change with growth, intersections needing signalization also could change in a few years, Baker added.

Six more flashing lights also are planned for schools experiencing heavy traffic, he said.

About \$500,000 is slated for the city's assessment paving program. Baker said he has received several petitions from property owners wanting their streets paved. The city must meet at least 10 percent of the paving costs, with the property owners paying the remainder.

"If the street is wider than 40 feet, then the city must bear all costs of paving that street past 40 feet," Baker said. "In cases like this, the city would be paying more than 10 percent."

The last bond election in September 1975 saw \$900,000 spent on assessment paving, he said.

Additional street money would go for improving major thoroughfares to make them last about 15 to 20 more years, according to Baker. The process for rehabilitating the streets, many of which Baker said are 20 years old, would involve planing the streets to an even level, then adding a pavement overlay.

Storm driving oil toward coast

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Coast Guard officials say they will keep oil slick booms in place and hope they can weather an approaching depression threatening to slosh spilled oil beyond barrier islands and into the fertile inland bays.

The depression, packing winds of 36 mph, did not weaken or strengthen during the morning, but drifted northward to within 100 miles of Texas' southern tip.

"The system is moving north-northwest at 10 miles an hour and is expected to spread inland over South Texas this afternoon," said a National Weather Service advisory issued at 11 a.m. "Since a large portion of the circulation is expected to be over land, further strengthening is unlikely."

Coast Guard Lt. Jake O'Neal said if the depression should become a storm, "Our major concern is not going to be for the environment or equipment — it's for our people."

Task force officials acknowledged floating booms protecting the lush

Laguna Madre from the Mexican oil spill could be upset by rough seas, and said there could be some "splash-over" of the oil into the bay.

"If the winds are too high, the booms will be ineffective in stopping the oil at Laguna Madre and other bays. We are very concerned," U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service spokesman Hans Stuart said.

The bays and lagoons behind barrier islands that line the Texas coast serve as breeding grounds for commercially important sealife, harbor many rare species of birds and serve as the winter nesting grounds for endangered species such as whooping cranes.

"Apparently booms are ineffective if the winds are more than 20 knots," said Stuart.

Oil spewing from the blownout well in the Bay of Campeche, 500 miles south of Brownsville, already has soiled Texas beaches from South Padre Island near the Mexican bor-

der to San Jose Island 150 miles further north.

Surveillance flights Sunday showed an area off of Padre and Mustang islands 30 percent to 50 percent covered a sheen with a significant patch of thicker concentration 10 miles west of Port Aransas.

Another significant concentration of thick crude drifted 10 to 15 miles north of the Port Mansfield pass.

More than 2 million barrels of oil have been spewed into the Gulf so far by the Mexican well that blew out June 3. Capping efforts have reduced the daily flow at the damaged well-head from 30,000 to 10,000 barrels, but Mexican officials predict it will be mid-September before the gusher can be quelled.

Workers began filling in a narrow pass between two islands Sunday to stop oil slicks from reaching the winter nesting grounds of a rare flock of whooping cranes.

Wildlife officials said there are only

126 of the endangered cranes left in the world, and the largest flock, consisting of 74 adults and 14 newly hatched chicks, is due to arrive at the Aransas Wildlife Refuge near here in mid-October.

Heavy sludge coated 10 to 15 miles of San Jose Island during the weekend near the Cedar Bayou Pass where the Coast Guard dispatched bulldozers to build the dam.

The pass is half a mile wide at the mouth, but narrows to 200 feet before entering Aransas Bay where the cranes and other sea life and waterfowl spend the winter.

State and local officials joined the clean-up effort in hopes of getting most of the oil off the beaches by the Labor Day weekend, which normally draws thousands of tourists.

Stuart said Sunday night that hotel row beaches on Padre Island are now clear and that cleanup efforts elsewhere would be intensified this week in preparation for the Labor Day weekend.

Terrorists claim responsibility for death of Mountbatten

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP) — Earl Mountbatten, war hero and uncle of Britain's Prince Philip, was killed today when an explosion ripped apart his yacht off the Irish coast, police reported. Irish terrorists claimed responsibility.

Police said the 79-year-old Mountbatten's grandson Nicholas, 14, and a local boy among the boat's crew, 15-year-old Paul Maxwell, also were killed, and four other persons were hospitalized with injuries. They said there were believed to have been nine persons on the boat.

The explosion occurred in Donegal Bay off Mullaghmore, an Irish Republic village in County Sligo near Mountbatten's summer residence. The site is just miles from the border

with Northern Ireland, where guerrillas of the Irish Republican Army's "Provisional" wing have been fighting to end British rule.

Mountbatten, a great-grandson of Queen Victoria and cousin of Queen Elizabeth II, had just set out with a group of friends on a fishing trip from the harbor at Mullaghmore when the explosion occurred, police said.

They said the cause of the blast could not be determined immediately, but they were working on the theory that a timebomb had been placed aboard.

"But everything is very confused. A lot of vessels are out there searching for wreckage," a police spokesman said.

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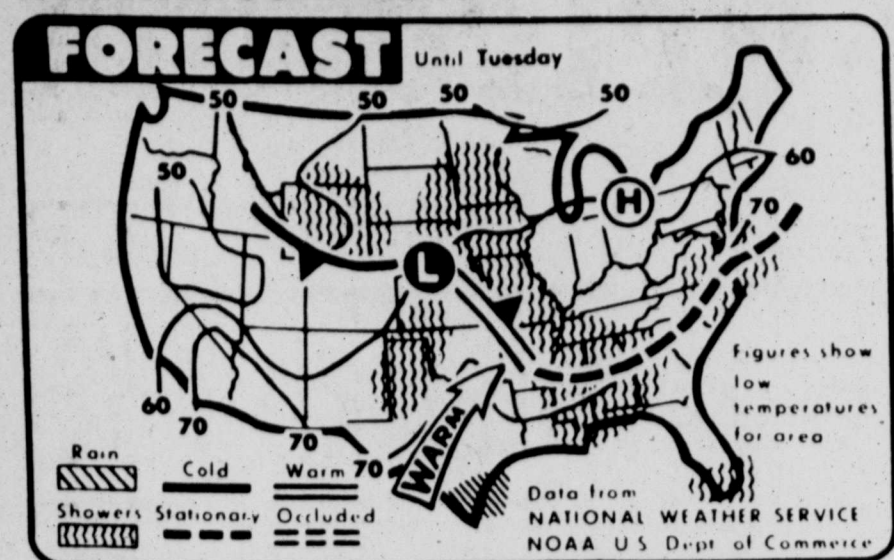

Herb buyer keeps ancient Indian craft alive in West Virginia hills

ONA, W.Va. (AP) — For years, Frank Baird's sharp gaze has studied the rolling hills and twisting valleys of Appalachia, searching for rare plants and herbs whose secrets and comforts have been sought across the centuries and half the world.

Baird is a herb and root buyer. He gathers a crop that is harvested by people whose skill and knowledge of the land was acquired from Indians and passed down through families that have lived in the hills for generations.

"We're back to the medicine doctor up here," Baird said.

Baird buys Kansas snake root, blue vervain herb, wild plum bark, queen of the meadow root, slippery elm bark, May apple root and a hundred other plants. Often, just one or two people know the secluded spots where the plants can be found.

The secret of his business has been finding where a certain plant is prized and then finding someone who can gather it, Baird said. Black cohosh root is

shipped to West Germany where it is used as a cough syrup. Scullcap root is used to relieve stomach aches in the Caribbean, and ginseng is taken by many in the Orient to revive flagging passions.

Baird remembers growing up with herbal medicine and the remedies that many rural families, who often could afford nothing else, used to cure their ailments — stomach aches, headaches and fevers. Sometimes the medicines were taken simply to ease weary muscles after a long day, he said.

Many people still practice this traditional form of healing that predates the rise of modern medicine, he said.

His customers are not cranks, however, Baird said. Indeed his biggest clients are pharmaceutical companies who combine the wild flowers and herbs with drugs to cure countless ailments, he said.

The farmers and hunters who bring Baird plants and roots spend years learning the skills of the herb-gatherer. Some of his gatherers are descendants of families who have roamed southern West Virginia for decades, he said. And many of them gather plants to supplement the livings they wrest from their hilly farms.

Habit Can Betray You

But for our habits we'd have to think before every action, and we'd get nothing done. Still, habits can betray you to a sharp-eyed observer.

West took a diamond and shifted to spades. Declarer won, drew trumps and led a club to the king. Then he returned a club from dummy.

Since East was obviously out of the picture, West could have made an unorthodox lead justifiably. However, West habitually led the ace from the doubleton ace-king, and his actual lead promised at least a third diamond.

COUNTS HAND

South credited West with five spades for his overall, and West had followed to three rounds of hearts. If West also had three diamonds he could have only two clubs.

Declarer therefore played low from his hand on the club lead from dummy. West had to play the ace, and South later discarded a diamond from dummy on a good club. This limited the diamond loss to two tricks and assured the contract.

Light bulb only one of bright Edison ideas

DEARBORN, Mich. (AP) — Presumably every school child knows that Thomas Alva Edison invented the first practical incandescent light bulb, even if it's not recalled that he did it 100 years ago this Oct. 21.

But not so many know that Edison invented some esoteric and even a few unsuccessful devices, notes Robert Koolakian, keeper of Edisoniana at the Edison Institute here, who has made a lifetime study of some of the inventor's less famous feats.

Koolakian presides over one of the largest collections of Edison works in the world at Greenfield Village and Henry Ford Museum, a 260-acre complex where the institute is playing a major role in this year's international observance of the Centennial of Light.

Edison was working in a telegraph office in Indianapolis in 1864 and had devised a printer-recorder, Koolakian relates of

early 1860s, where young Edison found the telegraph office infested with roaches and mice.

He cut concentric circles out of sheet brass, one larger than the other, and then connected one to the positive pole of a zinc battery and the other to the negative pole. A morsel of food was the bait inside the smaller circle.

When the hungry roach came for dinner, its body closed the electrical circuit and it was electrocuted. Slightly larger devices were used for mice. The idea worked, but never was patented nor manufactured.

Perhaps one of Edison's most unusual inventions, Koolakian says, was one "discovered" almost accidentally. The principle of the Tasmeter came to Edison's attention in 1877 when he was working on his improved carbon telephone transmitter, the speaking piece of the hand set.

Edison noticed that a

shrieking sound was emitted from the phone when he picked up the hand set. He concluded after tests that the heat of his hand changed the conductive resistance of the carbon in the transmitter and slight changes in temperature could be measured.

The inventor, a habitual cigar smoker, found he could cause the device to run an electric-current-measuring Galvanometer right off the scale by holding his stogie 8 feet from the Tasmeter.

The device was so incredibly sensitive that in 1878, Edison measured the heat emitted by the star Arcturus from the porch of his Menlo Park, N.J., laboratory. And in July 1878, he took the de-

Genuine achievement

There is good reason for some of the pessimism and self-doubt that afflicts the American psyche these days. Even a cursory survey of the economic and political landscape affords cause for serious concern. But Americans do themselves and their institutions a disservice when they permit acknowledged shortcomings in one area to cloud perceptions of genuine achievement in another.

The measurable and heartening progress made by black Americans since 1960 is a case in point.

By almost any yardstick, black Americans are better off today than they were in 1960. Saying this aloud, however, strikes some Americans of both races as a sign of opposition to further progress. It need not and should not be so. If the past is prologue, the record of the last two decades ought to be examined honestly.

Figures for family and individual median income show disproportionate gains for blacks. In 1960, the median income of working blacks was \$3,723, just over half the \$6,263 income median for whites. For 1977, the latest year for which statistics are available, the comparable figures were \$11,028 for blacks and \$14,917 for whites. The gap between white and black family income is also closing notwithstanding the massive influx of white females into the labor force in recent years.

The larger percentages of blacks holding high school and college degrees signifies past progress as surely as it holds forth a promise of greater gains in the future.

Nineteen years ago, a mere 12.9

percent of black Americans were high school graduates. In 1977, the figure stood at 28.4 percent. During this same period, the percentage of whites with high school degrees increased from 25.8 percent to 37.7 percent. The percentage of blacks with college degrees rose from 3.1 percent in 1960 to 7.2 percent in 1977 — a rate increase slightly above that for whites over the same time span.

Election of black candidates to public office is a sure measure of political power. The number of black elected officials has almost quadrupled just since 1970.

These are the collective fruits of a civil rights movement that helped pry open the doors of opportunity for black Americans. The record of black progress represents an achievement in which all Americans can and should take pride even as they recognize that much remains to be done.

Unfortunately, the nation's penchant for excessive self-criticism coupled with considerable guilt over past racial injustices has been permitted to obscure these successes. And just as unfortunately, some of the country's current civil rights leaders seem to believe that acknowledging past gains would jeopardize chances for future progress. The opposition is more likely the case.

The struggle for full equality of opportunity continues, as it must. Removing the remaining barriers to unfettered opportunity for all Americans requires an enduring national commitment to racial justice. Acknowledging how far we have come should encourage and strengthen us for the journey that lies ahead.

rooms, downing a little vodka while in their golf carts, working on their swings at the practice range, following the pros on weekend television, even telling golf jokes around the office.

One can hardly wait for Nakhbino Country Club to hold its grand opening in 1982. Golf is bound to draw us all closer together.

White House staff changes downgrade Mondale's influence

WASHINGTON — White House insiders close to President Carter's Georgia mafia are blaming Vice President Walter F. Mondale's staff for a spate of bad publicity about soon-to-depart White House aide Greg Schneders, a small tempest that reveals the weakened role of Fritz Mondale in Carter's inner councils.

Minor troubles between the Mondale staff, headed by long-time aide Richard Moe, and the president's own senior staff visibly worsened after Carter installed Gerald Rafshoon as his new image-maker slightly over one year ago.

Now, with Rafshoon about to leave the White House for full-time campaign work on the president's re-election drive and his chief deputy, Schneders, about to leave for private life — voluntarily, and without prejudice — political intimates of Mondale are exhibiting a certain relish. "If the image-makers were so damn good," one such intimate told us privately, "why are they leaving?"

But in fact, to perceive in the departure of Rafshoon and Schneders some kind of triumph for Fritz Mondale would be a grave misreading. Indeed, the muted crowing of Mondale men over the alleged downfall of the image-makers conceals this far more important fact: Carter's White House staff changes are all but certain to downgrade Mondale's influence in the brief period remaining in Carter's first term.

While Mondale is touring China for Jimmy Carter, ex-Time editor Hedley Donovan will be getting accustomed

to his new White House role as chief listener, hand-holder and across-the-board strategist for President Carter. That job description closely matches Mondale's own duties in the White House. "Donovan is going to have automatic access to Jimmy," one staffer says, "and he will use it."



In addition, Carter's search for a heavyweight White House counsel, now centered on Lloyd Cutler, one of Washington's super-lawyers, won't stop until Cutler or some one equally high-powered is willing to serve. This concession to the despised Washington establishment will also cut back Mondale's Oval Office role, no matter how many demurrers are heard from the White House. The New White House staff, one Carter insider told us, will be older, more seasoned and less self-conscious, "all of which threatens Mondale."

That may partially account for the continuing assault on Greg Schneders, Rafshoon's departing deputy, by unnamed attackers believed by Carter men to be close to Fritz Mondale.

Mondale staffers also clashed repeatedly with the Rafshoon-

Bill Brock sees an exciting decade ahead

WASHINGTON — "The 1980s are going to be the best, the most exciting decade this country has had," said Republican National Chairman Bill Brock in an interview.

"I think new leadership will restore our sense of hope, and there is just nothing this country can't do as long as we have our self-respect and our self-confidence," Brock said. "We have unlimited opportunities."

That optimistic message comes from a man who two and a half years ago was elected to preside over a party that seemed devoid of hope. Republicans then were contemplating abandoning their party label. Watergate was still haunting them, Republicans had lost the White House and held only one out of three seats in Congress.

In January 1977, the same month President Carter was inaugurated, Brock began his own campaign to rebuild the GOP at the grass-roots level.

Precinct work and state legislative races were the focus of a national campaign to shore up the party.

In 1978 Republicans seized an innovative tax-cutting program preached by New York Rep. Jack Kemp and tried to carry candidates to victory on the issues.

In the recent interview, Brock shared his thoughts on the failure or success of those programs and decisions. Here are excerpts:

Brock: We decided to focus on tax reductions too late in the 1978 campaign. We should have started earlier to sell that program and explain how people in this country will benefit from it in the long-term. We won't make that mistake again. Starting this year we will make a real effort to talk about reducing taxes and how

that can create real economic growth. Taxes have to be a central part of the Republican message.

CNS: The Democrats also capitalized on the tax-cut issue in 1978 and today are talking about a \$20 billion tax cut for next year. Doesn't that cut into your issue?

Brock: Not at all. I am delighted. Anything they want to do to reduce taxes is great. It is wrong just to cut taxes in election years, though, because that is demagoguery. You need to cut taxes regularly over a period of three or four years to really get this country moving again.

In 1978 the Democrats were dishonest. They said they wanted to cut spending, and they didn't. What they did was raise spending and now this year they raised taxes.

I have never been troubled by Democrats stealing our issue. What I do object to is they talk the right way and never vote the right way. I object to them saying one thing at home and voting a different way up here. That cannot continue to go with the American people before they realize they are being had.

CNS: Is this one of the areas where you see parallels in the British and Canadian elections?

Brock: I do. The Conservatives in both England and Canada were elected this year on the themes Republicans were talking about here last year. The English elections and the Conservative Party's approach was to be warm and positive and present ideas that people can understand and support. They got rid of the negatives in politics. I think people in this country want to get excited again. They want something to hope for.

CNS: Are there enough electable Republican candidates to present that message?

Brock: Yes. They have been here all along. Fundamentally, the role

CHARLEY REESE Arab nations deliberate in waging economic war effort

ORLANDO, Fla. — Most Americans realize that the Arab nations are waging economic war against us. The most immediate visible evidence is the rising price of gasoline.

But I doubt if most of us are aware of just how deliberate and widespread their war effort is. Hoag Levins, an investigative reporter from Philadelphia, has done a fine job of pulling together the story in a series he wrote for "Expo" magazine.

Levins is not Jewish so you can't discount his work as Zionist alarmism. He reports that the war began in 1973 and its purpose is the destruction of Israel by cutting off all of its outside support, especially American support.

He reports that the strategy involves seven areas: (1) Direct physical acquisitions of U.S. properties; (2) financial "paper" acquisitions such as U.S. Treasury bonds (Arabs held \$10.7 billion in 1975); (3) short-term bank deposits (he says they stopped a Senate investigation by threatening to withdraw them); (4) petrodollar courtships; (5) linkage programs with American industry; (6) direct political action using sophisticated American lobbyists, and (7) educational grants and endowments to American universities.

Levins said the precise extent of Arab penetration is impossible to measure. Much of the buying is done secretly through a string of corporate fronts. Congress has failed to pass

proposed legislation that would require a detailed accounting of how much of the United States is being purchased by foreigners.

It doesn't take much imagination, however, to realize it is a serious problem. The total amount of dollars transferred to Arab possession by oil imports is staggering. It is the largest transfer of wealth in modern history.

The list of prominent Americans receiving fees from Arab governments or individuals, however, gives you a hint of how they are using petrodollars to buy influence. Levins lists the following:

John Connally, GOP presidential candidate; Spiro Agnew, former vice president; Stuart Symington, former senator and secretary of the Air Force; J. William Fulbright, former senator; Clark Clifford, former secretary of defense; Richard Kleindienst, former attorney general; Richard Helms, former CIA director; Ray Close and John O'Connell, former CIA station chiefs, Middle East; Frederick G. Dutton, former assistant secretary of state; A. Linwood Holton and William C. Armstrong, two more former assistant secretaries of state; Gerald L. Parks, former assistant secretary of the treasury, and Pat Caddell, President Carter's close friend and pollster.

This is only a partial list and of course it's not news that American influence peddlers will hire themselves out to foreign powers.

What should concern us, however, is that we are dealing with people who are using money, not as an investment, but as a political weapon to gain control of our foreign policy. We are dealing with fanatics who are out to destroy a little nation simply on religious grounds and who do not care a whit if they wreck our nation in the process.

Some people say let the Arabs buy all they want; we can always confiscate it later. This, however, is bad thinking. If they buy America, they will buy the government so they can be sure to avoid confiscation.

Money is a great temptation, especially if you're sitting on something and looking for a buyer, but in the long run, we may be cutting our own throats. I certainly don't want to be in the position of having to please an Arab shiek in order to get a raise or a new car loan or a home mortgage.

Money and credit are the arteries of our economy and we should see to it that no foreigner, least of all an Arab fanatic, gets a chance to cut them.

Once more, we had better build a fire under the Congress before the sheiks have a chance to buy too many of them.

Governor-for-a-day sometimes very hard-to-explain

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — One of the hard-to-explain things about state government is the traditional governor-for-a-day celebration.

Most taxpayers can't see the need for it, but state senators seem to think they can't do without it.

Every time the Senate begins a legislative session or ends one, a new Senate president pro tempore, or assistant presiding officer, is "elected" for the following period. Actually there is very little election, since the senator is chosen on seniority of service. If two or three senators have the same amount of seniority there usually is a coin toss — or the honor goes to the senator who has to run for re-election first.

The president pro tempore ranks

immediately behind the lieutenant governor in the order of succession to the governorship if a chief executive should die or become unable to serve.

The main honor given the chosen one is the "governor-for-a-day" celebration staged by his supporters and lobbyists during his or her tenure.

On that particular day — when both the governor and lieutenant governor are supposedly out of the state — the president pro tempore is honored as Texas' governor with all its privileges and ceremony, including a day's pay as governor.

In the past, some elected governors have had such little faith in governors-for-a-day that they locked their private offices and refused to let them inside. Others have carefully locked

up all important papers and instructed employees of the governor's office to take orders from no one.

But the brief day of simulated power and glory lives on.

The latest all-day celebration was that for Sen. Bill Meier, D-Eules, whose chief claim to fame is that he holds the world's filibuster record of 43 hours.

Bands and choral groups from the University of Texas, Tarrant County Junior College and Fort Worth high schools furnished music. The governor-for-a-day marched to his swearing-in ceremony beneath the drawn sabers of the Ross Volunteers military unit at Texas A&M University. After Texas Supreme Court Justice Joe Greenhill administered the oath, a unit of the National Guard fired a

19-gun salute from cannon on the Capitol lawn.

There was a cake and punch reception in the governor's reception room, then a barbecue luncheon on the Capitol lawn. Meier's office said 1,100 tickets were sold at \$10 each.

The current Senate pro tempore is Sen. Bill Braecklein, D-Dallas, whose governor-for-a-day celebration will be held in November.

Actually, Braecklein missed a good chance to be a real governor-for-a-day. Last weekend, Gov. Bill Clements was in New Mexico and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby was in Wyoming. However, Braecklein was also out of the state, in Alaska.

As a result, Speaker Bill Clavton, fourth in line of succession, served as governor, the first time a speaker has

served since 1959.

The going rate for governor-for-a-day contributions is about \$200 per lobbyist, according to a prominent Austin lobbyist. The amount of money raised from local supporters depends on the strength of the senator's campaign organization.

"Some of these senators take home a pretty nice check for the next campaign," said the lobbyist.

There have been some memorable governor-for-a-day celebrations in the past.

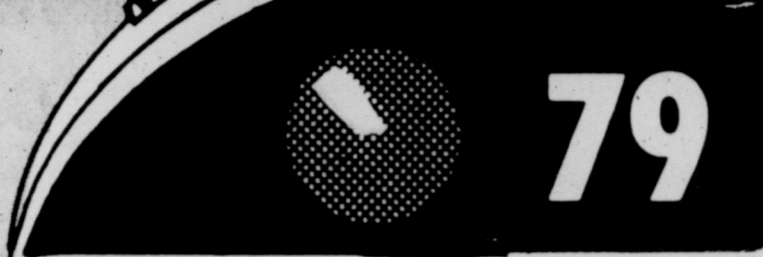
Sen. Tati Santiesteban, D-El Paso, was sworn in twice and celebrated twice — in Austin and El Paso. He was the first person with a Spanish surname to serve as governor of Texas — even a ceremonial one — since 1835.

Dallas Sen. Ike Harris served as governor-for-a-day in 1973, the first GOP governor of Texas since Reconstruction days. Sen. Betty Andujar, R-Fort Worth, was the first Republican woman governor-for-a-day.

When Sen. Wayne Connally, brother to the former governor and present aspirant for the GOP presidential nomination, was sworn in in 1972, he spent the rest of his speech urging Texans to vote for Richard Nixon.

Austin oldtimers still recall the governor-for-a-day celebration of former Sen. Culp Krueger in 1962. State government was moved to El Campo, his home town, for three days with various state agencies setting up office in tents. There also was an all-nations festival with Danish, Swedish and Mexican dancing and eats.

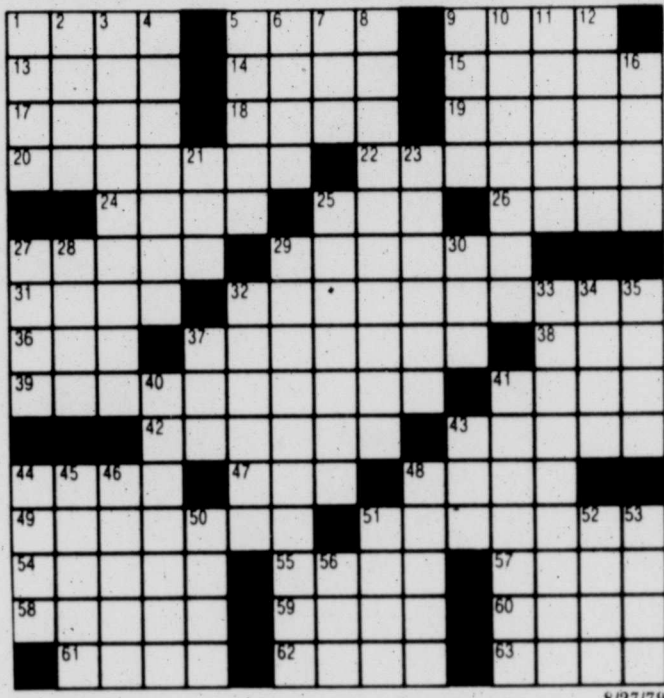

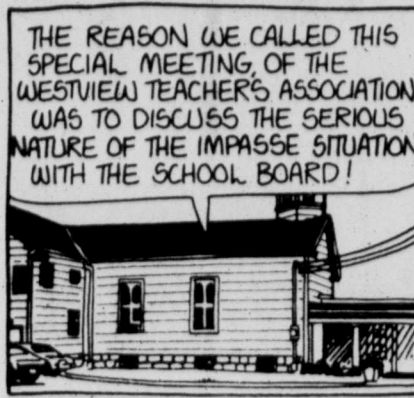

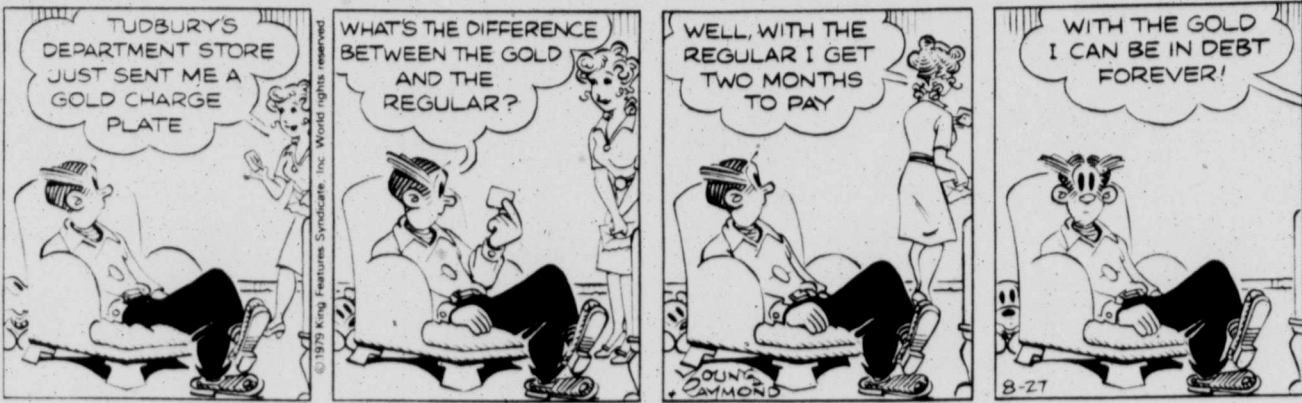

High gas prices may speed switch to metrics

The United States is still clinging along the road to the metric system, but the soaring price of gasoline may speed up the switch.

Authorities say it is easier and cheaper to convert fuel pumps to liters than to adjust them to register prices of more than \$1 a gallon.

Bill DeReuter, a spokesman for the Metric Board, said a growing number of service station operators - particularly independents - are starting to sell gasoline by the liter.

It has been almost four years since the passage of the Metric Conversion Act, designed to encourage Americans to voluntarily adopt the measuring system used by most of the rest of the world.

Thus far, however, there have been few changes for the average consumer.

The Metric Board itself did not get completely organized until last year; a proposal to convert road signs from miles to kilometers was abandoned because of negative comments.

In a report late last year, the General Accounting Office said the alcoholic beverage industry had done more to convert than anyone else. But the GAO also said: "Most wines and distilled spirits that were converted to metric sizes experienced unit price increases greater than those that did not convert."

DeReuter said part of the Metric Board's job will be "making sure that consumer interests are protected." He also said the board is not out to force people to go metric; that would be against the law.

He said the main push toward metrics right now is coming from multinational companies that want to be able to sell their products in the rest of the world.

Supporters of the switch to metrics concede there has been strong public opposition to abandoning the traditional system of feet and inches, pounds and ounces.

The anti-feeling will disappear," said DeReuter, noting that virtually every state has some kind of metric education program for youngsters.

To help educate the general public, the Metric Board has proposed spending more than half a million dollars for advertising, toll-free telephone information lines, publications and research studies.

The non-profit American National Metric Council, including businesses and trade and technical organizations, also is trying to ease confusion.

The council has prepared a Metric Consumer Information Kit, including a wallet-size conversion card and two pamphlets, "The Metric System Day-to-Day" and "A Metric Reference for Consumers."

Like our monetary system, the metric system is based on multiples of 10. The most common units of measurement are the gram, the liter and the meter.

The U.S. Metric Association, a volunteer, non-profit group in Boulder, Colo., which has been promoting the use of the metric system for more than 50 years, says the easiest way to learn the new measurements is to forget the old ones.

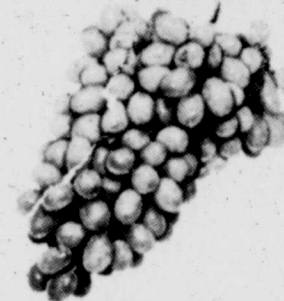

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Thunderstorms that pummeled maturing crops in five counties in the South Plains area of Texas caused more than \$10 million damage, insurance adjusters say.

U.S. Rep. Kent Hance, who surveyed the damage Sunday called it the "worst I've ever seen." He said he would ask Gov. Bill Clements to declare the counties disaster areas.

Heavy rain and large hail hit the area Friday, causing flooding that forced at least 100 persons to leave their homes in Olton.

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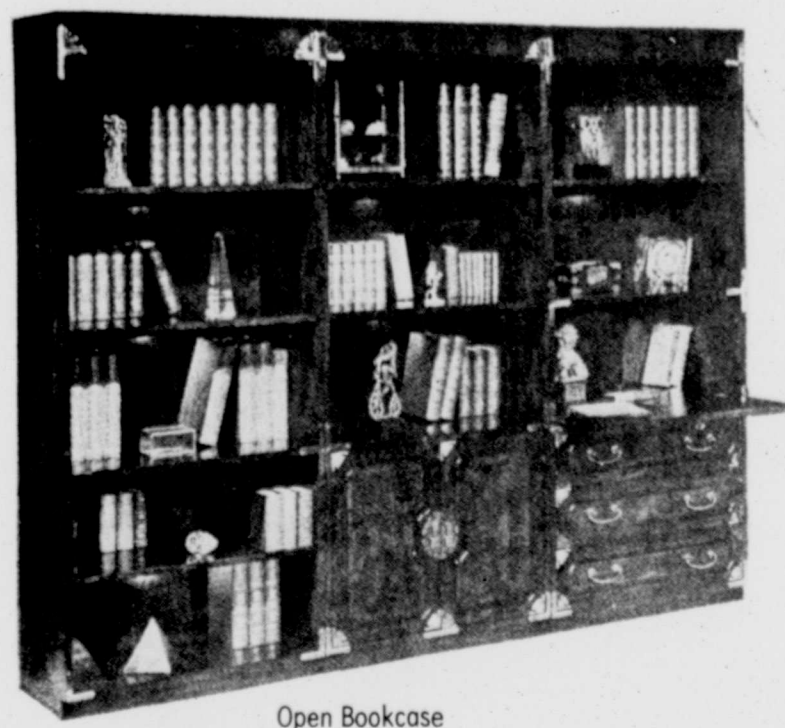

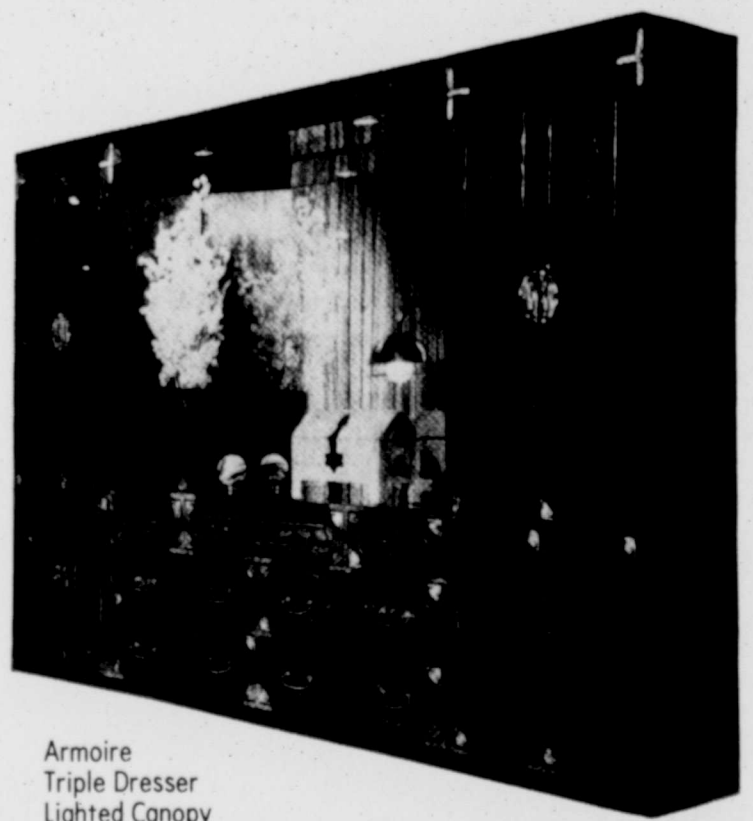

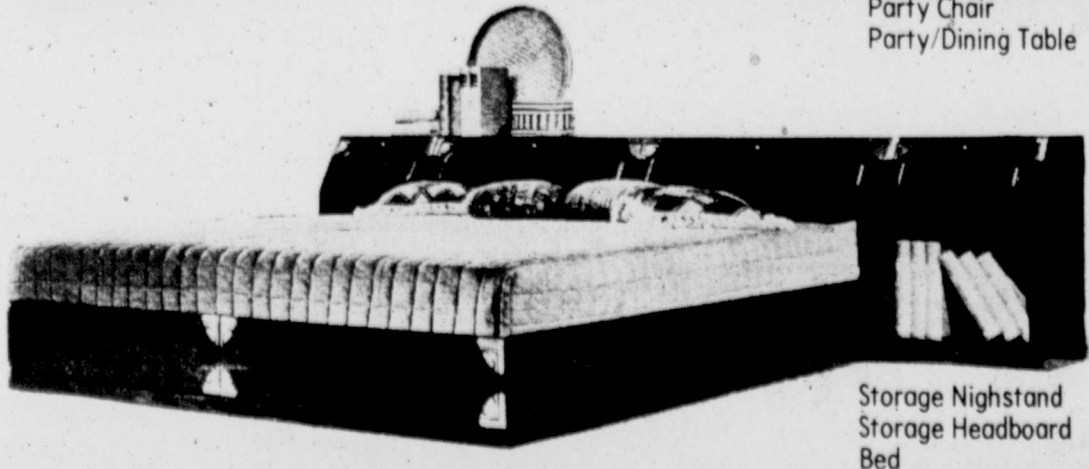

Brewers belt Texas to move into second

The Milwaukee Brewers and Kansas City Royals begin an important three-game series in Kansas City tonight but their thoughts are likely to be elsewhere.

Like in Minnesota and Detroit, where the American League division-leading Baltimore Orioles and California Angels will be playing the Twins and Tigers, respectively.

For the first time since June 6, a team other than the Boston Red Sox is on the heels of Baltimore in the AL East. Milwaukee climbed into second place, one game ahead of Boston, by downing the Texas Rangers 6-2 Sunday while the Red Sox were bowing to the Royals 6-3.

The Royals are still in third place in the AL West but are only one percentage point behind Minnesota — the 'Twins' game with the New York Yankees was rained out — and just 2 1/2 in back of the Angels, who lost to the Toronto Blue Jays 9-3.

Two-run homers by Gorman Thomas and Cecil Cooper powered the red-hot Brewers over Texas behind the eight-hit pitching of Billy Travers. It was Milwaukee's third victory in a row and 13th in the last 15 games.
