

'Killer storm' changes course, hits shore of Dominican Republic

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) - Hurricane David turned abruptly from its open-sea course Friday and slammed ashore in the Dominican Republic with winds up to 150 mph, weather officials re-

They said the erratic killer storm. which already has strewn death and devastation among other Caribbean islands, thundered into the Dominican Republic just southwest of the capital, Santo Domingo, and moved

inland. At 9 p.m. EDT it was reported 60 miles northwest of Santo Domingo. near the mountainous center of the country, and moving northwest at 12 mph toward the northern coast and the Dominican Republic's western

border with Haiti. Winds in Santo Domingo surged from 55 mph to 120 mph in late afternoon, weather officials said, uprooting trees, sailing rooftops like playing cards, and toppling utility poles. Torrentjal rains inundated the capital and nearby towns.

Telephone lines snapped and no immediate casualty or damage reports were available.

The hurricane had been moving

about 50 miles south of the Dominican Republic, heading for Haiti, when it suddenly turned north, threatening the lives of thousands of Dominicans who huddled in shelters from the huge waves and terrifying winds. The two nations share the island of Hispanio-

David was blamed earlier for a dozen deaths on Puerto Rico and at least 18 on the tiny Caribbean island of Dominica.

The U.S. National Weather Service in Miami reported its measuring devices in Santo Domingo registered winds in excess of 100 mph "before the equipment blew down.

It plotted this probable course for the wandering destroyer:

The hurricane, moving northwest, is expected to turn more toward the west-northwest as it nears the north coast of Hispaniola. Its circulation has become disorganized with diminishing winds during passage over the island's high mountains, but it is expected to regain a large portion of its force as it emerges over open water

early Saturday. The Weather Service said hurricane-strength winds could hit eastern Cuba Saturday afternoon and a hurricane watch remains in effect for Jamaica. There was no forecast of its direction after that, and no way of knowing if it might turn north toward the United States.

Puerto Rican Gov. Carlos Romero Barcelo, in a radio address Friday night, placed that island's death toll at 12, but said only four were confirmed. The Red Cross in San Juan , had reported earlier that 11 persons, perished in one town - Toa Baja, 25 mies west of San Juan. No explanation was given for the different re-

Romero Barcelo toured the stricken zone by police helicopter and said in the broadcast that he will ask Washington to declare the U.S. commonwealth a disaster area. He said more than 20,000 persons are being housed in refugee centers, a third of the island's three million residents are without water or power, 12 percent of the telephones are out and damage to the coffee and sugar crops is estimated at \$55 million.

News reports from Barbados said the death toll on Dominica could reach 26 and about 60,000 of the population of 81,000 were homeless.

Donald McHenry, Young's deputy, to fill U.N. post

dent Carter chose Andrew Young's soft-spoken deputy, Donald F McHenry, on Friday to replace Young as American U.N. ambassador. McHenry told a news conference here he was "extremely pleased and de-lighted," and hopes to "build upon the work" of his predecessor.

McHenry, who handled U.S.-Soviet negotiations during the Kennedy Airport dancer-defector standoff, said he would do the job in his own way and "I don't feel that I have any shoes

At a half-hour news conference at the U.S. mission opposite United Nations headquarters, he said he had always had "a very warm and close working relationship" with Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance.

But when asked if he favored pitting his own judgment against the State Department, he replied: "We also have to follow the dictates of our own conscience in pursuing policy objectives and I believe every diplomat faces the point where he has to decide how a particular policy goal should be accomplished, and also to face the music if he must.'

Asked how he stood on talking to the PLO, McHenry said talking to Palestinians "is necessary for us, as wasmade clear in the Camp David agreements." The PLO is barred from talks on Palestinian autonomy in Israeli-occupied Arab territory now going on between Egypt and Israel under the accords.

McHenry declined to say whether he agreed with Young that U.S. policy of not talking to the PLO was "ridiculous." But speaking in general terms, he said, "I would hope that one of the things we would continue to work for would be the opening of channels of communication.

McHenry's nomination is considered likely to ease black leaders' anger over the departure of Young, the highest-ranking and best-known black in the Carter administration. McHenry, 42, also is black.

Asked if he thought his appointment would decrease tensions between blacks and Jews that have surfaced since Young's resignation, McHenry said: "I would hope the appointment is not aimed at that. I would also hope that the American people and those of you in the media would look on my appointment as that of somebody who has been working in the field of foreign policy for a long time, and on the basis of that.'

McHenry played a highly visible role in the recent Kennedy Airport negotiations with the Soviet Union concerning Bolshoi ballet dancer Ludmilla Vlasova after her husband, Alexander Godunov, defected to the

"He's a highly qualified professional, thoroughly familiar with the major issues that confront the United Nations," Carter said of McHenry. The president is vacationing in Plains, his hometown

McHenry "has been highly recommended to me by Ambassador Andrew Young" as well as Vance and

Carter won't let Arab nation 'blackmail' U.S.

Carter says he will let no Arab nation blackman the United States and that he foresees no linkage between his Middle East policies and oil sup-

The president also said in an interview that despite their public pronouncements, no Arab leader he has met has in private "professed a desire for an independent Palestinian

The president's comments were released by the White House press office in Americus, Ga., Friday while the president was on the first day of a four-day weekend.

Carter, speaking to a group of Florida newspaper editors in what one observer said became an angry session, adamantly denied that blackmail played any part in his decision to approve a single shipment of kero-

sene to Iran last month. "I have never been the subject of a threat and I have the same attitude now that we had when the Barbary pirates were in war: millions for defense but not one cent for tribute. I wouldn't let you blackmail me and I would not let an Arab country blackmail our nation. We don't have to take



ODESSA - An Odessa man was listed in stable condition Friday night after a collision between a tractor-trailer truck and a car about noon Thursday, according to a Medical Center Hospital spokesman.

Leon Perry, 24, was removed from the intensive care unit Friday at Odessa's Medical Center Hospital. He received head injuries when the car he was driving and a tractor-trailer truck collided at the intersection of FM 1882 and Hillmont Street, about two miles north of Odessa, officials

Two passengers in the car were treated and released at Medical Center Hospital. The driver of the truck was not injured, police reported.

TESCO facing energy 'realities'

Nuclear plant will produce 'cheaper' electricity

GLEN ROSE - The facility will generate "cheaper" electricity, but it costs much more to build.

That, basically, is the reality behind Comanche Peak Steam Electric Station, according to electric utility

And that reality governs the future of similar facilities as well.

Comanche Peak Steam Electric Station is the name provided the nuclear power plant which Texas Utilities Co. currently is constructing near Glen Rose, about 40 miles southwest of Fort Worth.

When finished, two nuclear reactors will generate a total of 2,300 megawatts of electricity for distribution to customers in Texas through Texas Electric Service Co.; Texas Power & Light Co. and Dallas Power & Light Co.

Each of the three utilities will receive one-third of the electricity and finance one-third of the plant's cost.

That cost now is estimated at \$1.7 billion, an increase of \$1 billion over the projected cost five years ago when construction on the plant

Today, utility officials say that . nuclear energy will generate only a portion of future electrical needs. Utility officials confirm, also, that

the company will be moving away

from nuclear power plants as a source of electricity in the future There are no definite plans to build anymore nuclear reactors after Comanche Peak," Winston Barclay,

western division manager for Texas Electric Service Co., said. Barclay's comments came last week during a TESCO-financed media tour of the nuclear facility. which is now about 65 percent com-

The first reactor is scheduled for operation in late 1981 with the second reactor scheduled to go "on-line" in

Each reactor will produce about 50 percent more electricity than coalfired generating units now in operation at Big Brown near Fairfield.

WHY THE SWITCH away from, nuclear energy?

The major reason, according to . Barclay, is the lead-time involved in getting a nuclear power plant licensed.

It takes several years of plann public hearings, documentation studies before the Nuclear Regulatory Commission will license a plant, he

The second reason is cost. Texas Utilities is paying about \$740 per kilowatt of capacity currently to build the Comanche Peak plant - about six times the cost for the first coal-fired generating unit built in 1971 at Big

When the Big Brown unit was finished, the average cost per kilowatt of capacity was \$130. By 1978, those costs had risen to \$320 per kilowatt of capacity on coal-fired generating units at Monticello (located northeast of Dallas), according to information supplied by TESCO employees.

When finished, the Comanche Peak plant will be licensed to operate for 35 years. But unless radically new technology is developed, company officials say, the plant will be shut down and decommissioned at that time.

"We have no definite plans for what to do with it," Kirby Sewell, an executive assistant with TESCO, said. Sewell has been involved with the project since its inception.

THE COMANCHE PEAK plant is a pressurized-water reactor, according to utility spokesmen

What that means, basically, is that water kept under pressure passes by a nuclear reactor vessel where it is heated. Pipelines and pumps forward the water through a reservoir of nonpressurized water, which is turned to steam

That steam powers the turbines that produce the electricity.

Water for the units will be provided from the 3,300-acre Squaw Creek Reservoir, which the company built adja cent to the nuclear plant. The nuclear reactors are made of

carbon steel and stand about 43 feet tall: Each will be cemented into two separate containment buildings that rise 265 feet above the surrounding landscape, about the size of the Wilco Building and tower at 415 W. Wall St. in downtown Midland.

Thousands of feet of pipeline and valves are arranged in rows on several acres of ground surrounding the plant while the construction project is in its final stages.


The facility itself has been built to withstand tornadoes and other natural disasters with steel-reinforced concrete walls 54 inches thick in the containment buildings.

More than 12 feet of concrete comprises the floor of the plant, and officials say that if a meltdown were to occur, radioactive gases would be kept within the containment build-

Kirby Sewell said the molten mass would stop just below the concrete floor of the building.

The groundwater table under the plant starts at 100 feet, Sewell said, a distance less than the diameter of the. containment buildings;

Several beaches will be clean for Labor Day, officials predict

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) -Coast Guard officials predicted Friday that cleanup crews will have some beaches ready for Labor Day vacationers but long sections of the South Texas shoreline will likely remained soiled by brown Mexican oil this weekend

"It doesn't look too good on the beach," said Sylvia Castillo of the South Padre Island Tourist Bureau. Hopefully, they will get it cleared

Coast Guard Captain Roger Madson could not promise 100 percent oil-free beaches but said work crews should clear several hundred yards along the section of South Padre Island where tourists normally crowd to enjoy summer's last holiday.

"The beach cleanup is progressing, and we hope they will be in pretty good shape for the Labor Day week end," Madson told a daily news brief-

The oil spill has cut the South Texas island tourist trade by at least 50 percent, officials estimate.

The largest oil accumulation threatening Texas beaches is a one-milelong stretch of light film floating about 60 miles southeast of Cavallo Pass which leads into Matagorda

'If Elena moves in at Matagorda Bay, it could come across that patch and could be a natural dispersion which could help us," the Coast Guard captain said.

Beach visitors should find fairly clean conditions at the Nueces County park on Mustang Island north of Corpus Christi where about three-tenths of a mile of beach has been stripped of its oily coating.

Other sections of Mustang Island remained fairly covered with blotches of oil extending about 100. feet from shoreline at low tide.

South Padre Island hotels are keeping maintenance crews busy removing globs from their beachfront and report shorelines are fairly clean.

Many feet-cleaning stations have been set up for surf frolickers who step in the messy oil. The team battling the oil spill is-

more concerned with the crude's threat to wildlife breeding grounds than with the beaches that protect the sensitive areas in bays and back

\$26 billion in tax revenues lost annually, IRS study determines

WASHINGTON (AP) - The government may be losing \$26 billion or more each year in tax revenues because people fail to file returns or don't report the full amount of their income, according to a new study released Friday by the Internal Revenue Service.

The finding, said a high-ranking IRS official, represents the federal government's "first attempt to estimate the amount of unreported income com-

And it is coupled with a series of proposals to step up IRS vigilance over collections.

The 166-page report is the product of 18 months of research into tax reporting in 1976, the most recent year for which complete data was available, said the IRS official, who spoke under ground rules that

WASHINGTON (AP) -South Texas home buyers apparently are paying less than their counterparts elsewhere in the state, new figures from the Department of Housing and Urban Development indicate.

The lower prices, however, may be offset by the smaller square footage the department found in the typical homes in that part of the

generally were next to the lowest.

THE PROTOTYPE for \$50,000. housing cost figures researched by each HUD. field office are being published for the first time this year as a congressional requirement.

HUD spokesman Andy Gasparich said the figures are intended to help consumers learn what kind of deal they are making.

"It's just supposed to be a guide to people," he said. "I think it's more like the EPA mileage thing - here's what you should expect, give or take."

The Environmental Protection Agency twice a year publishes estimated gasoline mileage for each make and model automobile.

Gasparich cautioned that the housing cost figures are six to eight months old, so inflation should be taken into account.



Faltering Phillies ax manager

ATLANTA (AP) - Danny Ozark was fired Friday as manager of the Philadelphia Phillies, putting an early end to a season troubled by injuries to key players and capped by a dive into fifth place in the National League East.

Dallas Green, a former Phillies pitcher and currently director of minor leagues and scouting for the club, was named interim manager for the final month of the season.

General Manager Paul Owens made the announcement at a news conference shortly before the Phillies, who had dropped five straight and eight of nine games to fall under .500 for the season, faced the Braves in Atlanta.

Ozark, 55, who managed the Phillies for seven seasons, guiding them to consecutive East Division titles the last three years, saw the ax fall as his club fell 12½ games behind division-leading Pittsburgh.

"This change is an organizational move that owner Ruly Carpenter and I decided to make after two or three days of deliberation," Owens said. "We were disappointed in the way the club has performed the past few weeks and felt that something had to

Green, 45, who had a 20-22 major league record with the Phillies, New York Mets and Washington Senators in the 1960s, said he wants the team "to grind it out for the next 30 days and as professionals take a look in the mirror and see if they can't accomplish something with pride and dig-

"I feel disappointed in the way the players performed for me this year. I think I could have gotten more out of them but I couldn't find the answer. That's probably why they made the move," said Ozark, who ranked as the senior manager in the league before his ouster.

"I did things to try to shake up the club but they didn't work out," he said. "I still feel like I could do something now.

Ozark, however, refused to use injuries as an excuse. Several key players were sidelined for extended periods during the season, including shortstop Larry Bowa, second baseman Manny Trillo, outfielder Greg Luzinski and pitchers Dick Ruthven and Larry Christensen and Randy Lerch.

Ozark said Owens informed him of his dismissal earlier in the day. The players were told when they arrived at the ball park.







It is a matter of public record that only one former collegiate football player ever got elected President. Dwight D. Eisenhower. Only one other ever made it to the White House at all. Gerald R. Ford.

It is also history that only one for-mer professional football player ever made it to the U.S. Supreme Court, Byron (Whizzer) White.

The gridiron is not a fertile breeding ground for the corridors of future

Which is why a lot of us thought Patrick Capper Haden had put a serious crimp in his career when he signed with the Los Angeles Rams in the spring of 1976. "Well," we thought, "there goes the State Department, the White House, or maybe even chief justice.

Pro quarterbacks are not ordinarily thought of as candidates for Foggy Bottom, The Hill, or even a consular job in Peru.

But P.C. Haden, Esq., was not your run-of-the-mill pro quarterback. Pro quarterbacks come from Beaver Falls, Pa., East Canebrake U. or Louisiana Normal, not Oxford University. Most pro quarterbacks are not Rhodes Scholars. They not only couldn't get into Oxford University, they probably couldn't even get into Ohio State. Most can read defenses, but not William Faulkner. Most of them didn't require an education, just a football. Most pro quarterbacks thought the Thirty Years War was won by Al Davis.

Patrick Haden found nothing particularly difficult about throwing the football. Nothing to be compared to the difficulties of Ciceronian Latin, for example, or the logical thickets of Aristotle or even Alexander Pope

But, quite clearly, he was destined for a career in a homburg hat and cutaway coat, not a helmet with an animal on it or a suit with a number

AMONG THOSE who didn't consider Patrick C. Haden a pro prospect was Patrick C. Haden. You don't put in for a Rhodes scholarship unless your ambition is to go to Pennsylvania Avenue, not the SuperBowl. Oxford University is not your everyday shortcut to the Green Bay Packers of L.A. Rams. In fact, it's a form of tossing in your hand.

Years of being told he was not a pro prospect had finally gotten through to Pat Haden, years of seeing coaches faces drop when their hot young prospect drove up in a Volkswagen, and wearing a hat, had had their effect. He just shrugged when the Rams picked him on the seventh round. which is kind of the "Don's call us, we'll call you" phase of the draft. Other clubs were less kind. "Have you

ever thought of politics, kid?" they would ask. "Or how about Wall Street?" You would have thought Haden came from Harvard not USC.

When the World Football League came around with an offer, Pat Haden thought so little of it he only promised them half a season. He was just moonlighting at football. His real " were not fulfilled. His career lay in an English library. When the World Football League folded. Haden thought it was the end of his world, too. When the Rams made him an offer and agreed to building his training around his education, he probably should have been insulted. It was clear the Rams really needed, a mop-up quarterback. They thought Haden had as much chance of getting in the House of Lords as the NFL.

Haden accepted the role as thirdstring quarterback. Until he saw the first and second-string quarterbacks. One of them got sacked 10 times in one night. When both of these quarterbacks got hurt, Haden took over, and came within one pass of putting the Rams in the Super Bowl that year.

The Rams were so impressed, they reacted by bringing in an overage, over-publicized semi-invalid to play quarterback ahead of Haden the next year. Joe Namath not only couldn't run, he couldn't even walk. He had to exercise by swimming in a pool. He might have made it if the game had been water polo, but the coaches who handles the quicksighed and handed the ball over to starting Sages Belle Haden again by the fourth game.

SO, PAT Haden never really did unpack.

If size were that much of an equalizer, King Hill would have been the all-time professional quarterback and Bob Griese would be selling cars someplace. But while the Rams didn't change, Pat Haden subtly did. He suddenly began to come to camp and practice without that apologetic air of a guy who feels sorry he's completing all those passes and showing everybody else up, particularly those tall guys. He felt entitled to sit down and eat with the family. He stopped feeling guilty about running "Shack" Harris, Ron Jaworski and Joe Namath clear to San Diego, Philadelphia, Ft. Lauderdale and points east. He no longer keeps a fare well note. typed in his pocket, and the bedsheets knotted and hanging out the window for a quick getaway. Only last season, when a television director approached him and suggested he pose with the Dallas Cowboys' "Too Tall" Jones, Haden indignantely refused. fruit juice until all the nuclear reactors are shut down. He interrupts the steady flame of his intensity with a smoky smile. "I have a feeling it's going to be a long time before I see solid food again. But by the time I'm down to 70 pounds, people will start thinking about what I'm talking

Right now there are about 127 pounds attached to Gregory's long frame and the cream-colored suit fits him well. He greets his well-wishers in the Harambee House Hotel with quiet benevolence. It is the morning after his speech at Howard University, one of the first of the fall speaking season, and he was up at four that

His voice continues like rain on the roof as he talks of conspiracies and the King James Bible, of racism and sexism and future and past, and he seems at times to be talking from a long way away. He seems to be talking from deep in the eye of his own

"I JUST WANT TO work on all my hang-ups," he says in that deep and deeply earnest quite voice, in the rare moments when he will talk of himself and not the things that must be done, that should be done. "The system brought the animal out in me. I want to bring my spirituality out. I want to get myself straight even if the system isn't changed."

Twain, Lenny Bruce, the men he considers the three greatest comedians. But look at what happened to Lenny," he says. "He had to destroy himself in the process of being great." It is, says Dick Gregory looking back, "very ungodly to be fa-

Dick Gregory is famous still. Not the way he was is the '60s when he traded in his success as a college track star to become the brilliant young black comedian, one of the first and still one of the few to reach a popular success with a white audience by turning their racism around on themselves and making them laugh at the same time they acknowledge the accuracy of the barbs.

but the quest for popular success grew less intense as more of his time was devoted to fasting and protesting war and hunger and racism, the kind of issues that brought thousands to green grassy spaces, to march down long buulevards.

NOW GREGORY RUNS less traveled roads, where humor finds it hard to follow.

He has spent, he says, hundreds of thousands of dollars pursuing leads and theories on the Kennedy and King, assassinations. Long fingers beckon attention to other facts caught in the web. He mentions the allegations that White House Chief of Staff Hamilton Jordan used cocaine at Studio 54. 'Consider the implications of this,' he imagines. "Suppose that place was under the control of the CIA. Think of all the powerful and famous people who go there. There would be a lot that they could use against them. Sometimes they have to prove who the boss is.

"A lot of strange things go on," Dick Gregory says.

There are only distant echoes of the early angry humor in the finely spun theories, but the importance of his comedy to him is affirmed, even if his relation to it is left ambiguous. "All of my identity" is wrapped around comedy, he says, but the "demand for being funny is not in my subconscious mind the way it was when I was doing nightclub.

GREGORY RARELY appears in nightclubs now, having decided about six years ago that there was implicit hypocrisy in appearing in places that serve liquor when he was advising college kids not to touch the stuff. He does about 300 college speaking engagements a year. "I can be funny if I want to then, but I don't feel like I

Still a small bouquet is tossed to the memory of what it was like when he began, and where it might have gone. "If I was doing it every night now, I would be fantastic," he says. "Back then my comedy was so far ahead."

Right now he is busy "rooting out" racism and sexism. He will not let his 10 children read the King James version of the Bible; he finds it sexist. He won't let them watch TV or go to a film. "They see 'Superman,' what's that going to make them think about white men and their powers?'

Recently Gregory and five of his children were arrested together with 61 others on an 80-mile march from Atlanta to Reidsville, Ga., in protest of a capital punishment case being tried there. They were met by a burning cross. "It was the first time my children had seen such a thing. They didn't know what to make of it. They didn't know if it was for toasting marshmellows or what."





Character out of Jewish tale vital part of religion

With his long wispy beard, a black yarmulke stuck on the back of his head and his faint air of distraction, Rabbi Saul Teitelbaum could be a character out of a Sholem Aleichem tale of Jewish life in a Russian

But the services he performs as an itinerant scribe are vital to the religious life of a modern-day suburban Jewish congregation.

Teitelbaum 32, is one of a handful of men who travel around the country restoring and repairing the sacred Torah scrolls that are the heart of the Jewish congregational worship. His work is vital because, according to Jewish law, if the scroll from which the sabbath portion is read is defective - if, for instance, the Hebrew letters on the parchment scroll have

begun to flake - the reading may lose its validity for the entire congrega-

So, as he did recently at the Arlington-Fairfax (Va.) Jewish Congregation, Teitelbaum unroils the scrolls on a long table and goes through them word by word, checking them for flaws.

The scrolls are inscribed with the first five books of the Bible - with its accounts of the origins and earliest history of the Jews and the religious laws that have guided their lives ever since.

Religious laws are as much a part of Teitelbaum's life as the air he breathes, and they prescribe the tools of his trade. The quill pen is cut from the feather of a kosher fowl .- "This one is turkey; I've used the same one for years," he says. The ink he uses is made in Israel, he explains, "from the goa nut, grown in India.... They make it into a powder and mix it with copperwood and gum arabic and cook it together. Supposedly, it doesn't

As he answers a visitor's questions, Teitelbaum's eyes never leave the unrolled Torah portion before him, his concentration a quiet witness to the

Scanning the lines, he pauses here and there to retrace with his quill a flawed Hebrew letter, a letter whose imperfections are so minute they are not seen by the untrained eye.

From time to time he picks up a steel scalpel to scrape away a corpuscle of ink that has drained into the next letter. The law says that the letters must not touch each other.

"The law stipulates the number of columns in the Torah scroll, the lines per column and the size and shape and spacing of each letter," explained Rabbi Marvin I. Bash, spiritual leader of the Arlington-Fairfax congrega-

The law makes other demands. "You have to be very righteous" -Teitelbaum corrected himself - "you have to try at least to be a righteous Jew" if you are a scribe dealing with the holy scriptures. And if there were one readily accessable, Teitelbaum would immerse

himself in a mikvah, the Jewish ritual bath, for purification before begining The Torah is always hand-written in Hebrew on sheets of skin from a kosher animal. The sheets are neatly stitched togeher with sinews to form the continuous scroll. That is all in the law

They say a constitutional provision for religious freedom, ignored in repressions by the former so-called 'gang of four' regime, is again being implemented.

'Now steps are being taken to resume religious activities in churches and temples in accordance with practical needs," Buddhist leader Zhao Puchu, chairman of the delegation, told a news conference.

"Religious organizations are on the way of consolidation.'

THE NINE CHINESE religious leaders, including four Christians, three Buddhists and two Moslems, are here to participate in a World Conference on Religion and Peace which started Wednesday at Princeton Theological Seminary in New Jer-

They are the first interreligious delegation to come from mainland China since it became Communist 30 years

Bishop Ding Shoubao of Nanking, a Christian of the Anglican tradition, said that while Communism rejects religious faith, the present government leaders recognize the need to mobilize people of all walks of

"They know very well that building socialism in China cannot be monopolized by any single party or persuasion," he said, adding that the policy of religious freedom is to enlist cooperation of all, including believers. Li Shoubao of Shanghai, a Baptist and deputy secretary-general of the Chinese YMCA, said religious groups in China are "all in the midst of rehabilitation.

CHURCHES ARE BEING restored, he said, "and we are hoping in the future to begin having regular ser-

Four of the nine-member religious delegation, accompanied by a staff aide, took part in the news conference at China's permanent United Nations mission headquarters on Manhattan's West 66th street.

They maintained that although religious activity was suppressed during the 10-year domination by the "gang of four" until 1975, religious belief remains just as pervasive in China as before Communism came to power in

At that time there were about 3 million Roman Catholics, 700,000 Protestants, 100 million Buddhists and 10 million Moslems in China. Estimates of the totals remain about the same, the delegates said.

"In many areas, there have been new converts," Bishop Ding said. The delegation did not include any Roman Catholics, who chose not to send representatives.
