this jurors impose 99-year sentence

Raymond Wesley Mathis, described by his defense attorney as a victim of circumstances, Friday afternoon was found guilty of murder in the July 18 shooting death of Army Sgt. J.B. England and handed a 99-year prison

The eight-man, four-woman jury deliberated little more than an hour before returning the guilty verdict against the 20-year-old defendant, who in a statement to deputies entered as evidence in the trial had said it was the co-defendant in the trial, Kelly Joe Chamblis, who shot En-

Jurors began deliberations at 10:50 a.m. and returned the guilty verdict about 1 p.m. They began deliberating a sentence about 3:30 p.m.

The courtroom was hushed when the jury returned about 4:10 p.m.to give its sentence in the case.

Mathis sat emotionless as 238th District Court Judge Vann Culp read the 99-year prison term, but some members of his family burst into tears.

Midland attorney Rusty Wall, who headed the defense for Mathis, declined a comment initially on whether the verdict will be appealed, but he did note that Mathis had taken a 10-day option in which he can file an appeal.

During final arguments, District Attorney Vern Martin told the jury, "Common sense tells you Mathis, at least, was a party to the offense."

Wall, however, described Mathis as a victim of circumstances. "All evidence points to Chamblis," he told jurors, "but the spotlight falls on Raymond Wesley Mathis...because he was there.'

Testimony during the week-long trial revealed that Sgt. England, on his way to Fort Bliss from Marion, N.C., was shot in the early morning hours of July 18 about 10 miles east of Midland on I-20. He was found by law enforcement officers about 4:30 a.m. that day and taken to Midland Memorial Hospital where he died shortly before 6 a.m. Sgt. England sustained three wounds from bullet fragments to his

face and one wound in his left arm, testimony revealed.

Dr. David W. Shneidman, the Midland pathologist who performed the autopsy on England, said the sergeant literally drowned in his own blood after being wounded on the highway. Shneidman said that blood flowed into England's air passage and his body would not repel the blood as it would a foreign substance.

Mathis was arrested later on the morning of July 18 in Ward County and brought back to Midland. A .22-caliber rifle and three different calibers of bullets were found in the car he was driving, according to testi-

But in a statement Mathis gave to deputies on the night he was arrested, he contended it was the co-defendant in the case, Chamblis, who shot Sgt.

In the statement, Mathis said he and Chamblis, 17, went driving around on the morning of July 18 and "Kelly shot this man.

Mathis, who was driving the car, said he continued on, but that Chamblis told him to go back to where the man had been shot.

When they returned to that location, according to the statement, Chamblis again shot the sergeant. Chamblis and Mathis then returned to the home of Mathis' parents and

told them a man had been shot and they were leaving town. Chamblis, yet to be tried in connection with the case, was arrested July

19, according to testimony in the trial. Defense attorneys for Chamblis have filed a motion for a change of venue in his trial, contending that pre-trial publicity of the case, including news coverage of the Mathis trial, has made it impossible for the defendant to receive a fair and impartial trial in Midland County.

That motion was scheduled to be heard at 4 p.m. Friday in 238th Dis-

trict Court, but was postponed until 5 p.m. Monday. Reporters from at least two newspapers and one radio station have

been subpoenaed to testify at Monday's hearing. Meanwhile, Chamblis remains in Midland County Jail pending posting

a \$150,000 bond on the charge of murder.

Death toll rising in wake of Hurricane Frederic

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) - The stunned communities of the Gulf Coast got a little encouragement from the White House on Friday but it will be a long time before life returns to normal in the 100-mile-wide swath of wreckage left by Hurricane Frederic.

President Carter helicoptered over the coastal regions of Mississippi, Alabama and Florida and promised government help "with the taxpay-

But no early relief was in sight for the homeless and tens of thousands of others without electricity. Food was scarce, and the death toll from the storm that tore through here early Thursday rose to at least eight, with two others missing and presumed dead.

Damage was expected to soar into the hundreds of millions of dollars, but officials still were not making estimates.

In the port city of Mobile, where authorities had imposed a dusk-todawn curfew, at least 64 people were arrested for looting overnight as National Guardsmen reinforced local police who had orders to "shoot to

kill" if necessary. There also were reports of scattered looting in severely-damaged Pascagoula. Miss., and the governor warned, "The first person we find looting.... I want that person placed under the jail and never let out."

Another 36 were arrested for violating the curfew, said Mobile police Sgt. R.D. Roy. "Most of these were running the streets," he said.

More than 50 juveniles and 14 adults were arrested on looting charges, mostly for stealing television sets, clothes, beer and soft drinks. Dozens of other looters eluded police on the blackened streets, Roy said. The number of storm-related deaths rose to eight late Thursday when an

explosion killed two people in the picturesque fishing village of Bayou La Batre, southwest of Mobile. Police said they apparently were trying to use kerosene to light a fire for light or cooking purposes in a storm-wrecked

Carter flew into the Mobile airport at midmorning aboard Air Force One and was joined by Alabama Gov. Fob James, Florida Gov. Bob Graham and Mississippi Gov. Cliff Finch for an aerial inspection. A convoy of three helicopters took them aloft.

"We are in it together," Carter said after landing at Mobile's Bates field. "The whole nation cares.

Carter said an estimated 500,000 people were evacuated in a four-state. coastal region. He said mobile homes were being brought in to shelter the

homeless temporarily. Word came from Havana, Cuba, on Friday that when Frederic passed through Cuba early this week, 15 people were killed and 300,000 were evacuated from their homes.

Radio Havana, monitored in Miami, said damage to crops had been heavy and Havana's Jose Marti International Airport had been closed. Meanwhile, Frederic - now labeled a tropical depression - whirled into

the Great Lakes region and the Northeast, still delivering torrential rains andsome tornadoes over a widespread region. The deluge, more than six inches in parts of the area, caused scattered

flooding in Ohio and western New York. Columbus, Ohio, schools were closed Friday when buses could not get through flooded streets, and several families in low-lying areas of the city had to be evacuated by boat when water surrounded their homes

In the Buffalo, N.Y., suburb of Amherst, some persons were evacuated and taken to a fire hall when a creek began rising. The National Weather Service in Buffalo said 4.99 inches of rain fell in a 14-hour period Friday, breaking the record set for a 24-hour period in 1893.

A rainstorm spawned by the remnants of Frederic caused a covered bridge spanning the Connecticut River between New Hampshire and Vermont to collapse. In Akron, Ohio, where the weather service reported 6.13 inches of rain, the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. closed two plants.

Miller predicts futher rise in unemployment

WASHINGTON (AP) - Treasury Secretary G. William Miller said Friday he thinks the current recession is half over, but predicted that unemployment will rise above 7 percent next year, higher than the Carter administration had forecast previously.

The likelihood that unemployment will keep rising was underlined in a report that showed the nation's industrial output plummeted 1.1 percent in August, the first decline since April.

Production declined in most industries during the month, including household goods and autos, where output was down 15 percent to an annual rate of 7.5 million vehicles. Declining production leads to job lav-

Unemployment stood at 6 percent of the labor force in August, and the administration previously had said it would rise no higher than 6.9 percent by the end of next year.

While the difference between 6.9 percent and 7 percent isn't great about 100,000 jobs - Miller's estimate shows the administration has started to retreat from its more optimistic projection. He said he didn't know how much above 7 percent the jobless rate would go.

A 7 percent jobless rate means 7 million people would be out of work. An unofficial internal administration foreast says unemployment could reach 8.2 percent in 1980, which would mean more than 8 million people would be out of work.

The peak unemployment rate during the last recession in 1974-1975,

which was the worst downturn since the depression, was 9 percent. In separate remarks to reporters and to a group of businessmen. Miller repeated earlier statements that he believes the nation is in a recession. He said it started in the second quarter of this year, when the nation's gross national product declined at an annual rate of 2.4 percent.

But he said he thinks the recession will be mild, and will last only a few more months. "I believe we are half-way through it," he said.

Because the recession is expected to be mild, Miller said he opposes a tax reduction to help bring it to a quick end. "I do not see conditions now to justify departing from our commit-

ment...for a fiscal austerity," he said. "At the moment, it would be inappropriate to consider a tax cut." Miller also all but ruled out the possibility that Carter can achieve his goal of submitting a realistic balanced budget for fiscal 1981. He said the recession will result in lower tax receipts at the same time that spend-

ing increases for such things as unemployment insurance and welfare

The Sunday supplement features a cover picture of the stars of CBS's Friday night comedy, "The Dukes of Hazzard," as well as stories and pictures on the network's other prime-time programs and personali-

Sohmer said local affiliates were given the opportunity to buy inside space in the supplement, and for taking that option the stations would have their logos printed on the





He says the home is under direction of the People's Baptist Church instead of the Roloff **Evangelistic Enterprises** Inc. As a church facility, he said, the home is exempt from state licens-


State Department of Human Resources personnel are monitoring the situation, Attorney General Mark White said in a telephone interview. He said he would have to check the situation closely before taking any ac-







Periera flipped the ball back to Snodgrass who threw a perfect strike back to Periera, but it was wiped out by the penalty.

Eastwood got a gift three plays later on a fourth and 10 at the Bulldog 10 when Midland was called for pass interference in the end zone, giving the ball to the Troopers at the Midland one with one tick left on the clock. Dedrick, a 200-pound junior, came up with the pla of the game for the Bulldogs.

While Midland was thankful to win, the Bulldogs seemed more excited to Odessa Permian losing to Amarillo Friday. The Pack faces Mojo in two weeks in its District 5-4A opener in Midland.

Michael Feldt had another good night for the Pack, but was shaken up in the third period and left the game after Midland had its 21-7 lead.

Feldt wound up with 82 yards in 17 carries while tailback Billy Applin added 60 yards in 16 carries.

Midland's defense was tough in the first half, giving up a total offense of two yards. With only two first downs to their credit, the Troopers, came back with a more potent running and passing attack to make the game

In fact, Eastwood wound up with 11 first downs to Midland's 10.

Midland drew first blood in the opening period after Rick Ankerholz put the Bulldogs in business by recovering a fumble at the Eastwood 24. In four plays, Feldt completed his only pass of the night, but it was a big one as he hit Billy Taylor with a perfect 24-yard touchdown toss. Bobby Stovall split the uprights for a 7-0 lead with 2:09 left in the first period.

In the second period, Applin had a five yard touchdown run, capping a 40-yard drive in 10 plays. Stovall's kick made it 14-0 with 46 seconds left in the first half.

In the second half, on Midland's second possession, the Bulldogs drove 59 yards in three plays and it was Feldt's beautiful 53-yard touchdown run on a keeper that made it 20-0 before Stovall's third conversion. There was 6:21 left in the period.

Fullback Lewis Colorado scored on a one-yard plunge for the Troopers after Jeff Robnett fumbled at the MHS 38. Righard Ruelas kicked the point to leave Eastwood behind 21-7 heading into the final periods.

"Zowie Batman! Someone uncaged the Joker again, and what he did to El Paso Austin Friday night at Memorial Stadium was close to murder.'

The Midland Lee Rebels did have a laugher. It was 51-13 worth of jokes that left the poor Panthers wishing Batman would come to the rescue, or any other super hero for that mat-

Coach Gil Bartosh stated before the game that he wanted a little more offensive consistency in his attack. One wonders if seven touchdowns and a field goal is enough consistency even though the Rebs were penalized 11 times for 115 yards.

The penalties was about the only drawback to what was otherwise a devastating. Lee ground and air parade. The hungry Rebs ground out 353 yards rushing behind the 139-yard performance of Steve Waldron and quarterback Gary Butler hit on four of eight passes for 115 more yards. And the Lee defense had so many stars that the milky way couldn't contain them all. Barry Corley recovered a fumble and interecepted a pass while Cartwright and Cliff Collver also stole passes from Austin, which managed to complete one of nine passes for a meager 15 yards.

Coleman, Anthony Johnson, Keith Brown and Craig Ellis. Brown was a headhunter and produced four big, defensive plays. Lee jumped to a 17-0 lead in the very

first period, but Austin narrowed the margin to 17-13 when tailback Polo Miranda returned a kickoff 90 yards and scored from 81 yards out on the Panthers' next series. The first was a special teams mistake and the second was the only breakdown of the Lee defense all night. Miranda had 123 of the 127 yards rushing posted by Austin. Most of it came on his 81-yarder.

Now Lee will be looking to hold onto what they have. And that wouldn't be

In fact, when one compared the two, the Raiders, Aggies, Longhorns, Frogs, Owls, Mustangs or Bears, whoever it may have been that suffered the Jones Stadium idignities that day, life wasn't so cruel after all.

And the two announcers always tried to be so cheerful and optimistic as Nile Kinnick Stadium came tumbling down around the Hawkeyes.

Both times a back fumbled the football and Charlie Phillips, a linebacker, caught the ball and ran the length of the field for touchdowns and, of course, USC won. Phillips was named lineman of the week, naturally, and Iowa went back to the drawing board.

Then, after Saturday night's USC-Texas Tech game, it looked like all that had changed. It was halftime and the Hawks were trampling Indiana 26-3. Our joy knew no bounds. By golly, Hayden Fry was going to win the Big 10 in his very first year on the job at Iowa City. Even the announcers were

caught up in the excitement. In one half, they bubbled, Iowa had



shown more offense than it had all last year. A back who had toiled in obscurity as a defensive back for two years had completed 12 of 17 passes. An end who caught 12 passes for 45 yards last year, already had caught four for 75 yards.



AP Sports Writer It was Nov. 23, 1887, when a school in South Bend, Ind., which was founded in 1842 by a priest of a French missionary order known as the Congregation of the Holy Cross fielded its first football team.

The University of Notre Dame du Lac lost that game to the University of Michigan 8-0 and its next two contests, also against Michigan on April 20-21, 1888, produced two more setbacks by scores of 24-6 and 10-4.

Obviously, Michigan doesn't play a prominent part in Notre Dame's football legend. Michigan holds a 10-2 advantage, including last year's 28-14 triumph, and game No. 13 is on tap Saturday when the sixth-ranked Michigan Wolverines entertain the ninth-ranked Fighting Irish at Ann

Michigan is favored by a touchdown

or so but the outlook isn't all bleak for Notre Dame. For one thing, the Irish have compiled a 20-1-2 record in opening games played away from home. That one loss came in 1956 at Southern Methodist, 19-13.

In addition, the 1979 campaign marks the 10th and 20th anniversaries of a pair of victories over Michigan for Dan Devine-coached teams. In 1959, Devine's Missouri team beat the Wolverines in Michigan Stadium 20-15 by scoring on the final play of the game. Ten years later, Devine coached Missouri to a 40-17 rout that marks Michigan's last regular-season loss toa team from outside the Big Ten Conference.

Saturday's game is Notre Dame's opener while Michigan played a week ago, thumping Northwestern 49-7. Besides the Irish, six other members of The Associated Press Top Twenty will get under way this weekend - thirdranked Oklahoma at home against Iowa, Rutgers at No. 7 Penn State, Utah State at No. 8 Nebraska, Wake Forest at No. 12 Georgia, Kansas at No. 16 Pittsburgh and Colorado State vs. No. 17 Arkansas in a night game at Little Rock.

ELSEWHERE, top-rated Southern California visits Oregon State, fifthranked Purdue is at UCLA under the lights, Oregon at No. 10 Michigan State, No. 11 Missouri at Illinois, Florida at No. 13 Houston at night, Utah at No. 14 Washington, No. 15 Ohio State at Minnesota, Arizona State at No. 18 Florida State in a night game at Tampa, Virginia at No. 19 North Carolina State and No. 20 Southern Methodist at Texas Christian for a night contest. Second-ranked Alabama and No. 4 Texas aren't sche-

"Injuries have been a little bit of a problem for us on defense, but there's not much we can do about it," says Devine. "People like (cornerback Dave) Waymer and (strong safety Steve) Cichy haven't had much time

Just the opposite of Michigan's defense, which features a pair of superb tackles in Curtis Greer and Dale Keitz, linebacker Ron Simpkins, who needs eight tackles to become the Wolverines' all-time leader, and an experienced secondary.

"We did what we had to last week and now we have to defeat Notre Dame," says Coach Bo Schembechler. "There's nothing I can really add to this game that you don't already know.'

SATURDAY MARKS the 1979 debut of Oklahoma halfback Billy Sims, last year's Heisman Trophy winner. Although the Sooners are heavily favored to beat Iowa, Coach Barry Switzer is steaming because the Hawkeyes wouldn't send him their film of last week's opener, a 30-26 loss to



If you want real quacker, you better go about it right

Although we are in the midst of dove season, this weekend is the opener of the special teal season and I thought I would get in a few words that will hopefully put more ducks in your freezer.

There are duck hunters and then there are those who call themselves duck hunters. The latter group goes after the quakers in a hit or miss fashion and kills ducks infrequently, at best. There a few rules of thumb that should always be followed if baked duck is to appear regularly on

The most obvious must is to avoid the places where the ducks "ain't". I've seen decoys set out around many a beautifully camouflaged blind in water that was completely barren of duck appeal. Before a hunter goes to the trouble of setting up a blind and placing decoys, he should be certain that he is in an area that attracts the attention of the pintails, mallards or teal he is after. A good bit of scouting is in order before making a decision as to where the duck blind will be located. Taking into consideration such factors as food and shelter from the wind will make the decision easier. A pair of binoculars can make a scouting job much easier and the duck concentration can be noted as to their proximity to a good spot for a

are good, 10 dozen are better. The little calling goes a long way. larger the decoy spread, the more with spoonbills. Ducks of a feather up. flock together and it doesn't look natural to their breathren in the air when they look down and see a conglomerated spread of decoys. A crucial point to remember is that ducks land into the wind and will not attempt to come into a spread of decoys that is close to the blind when the wind is in the hunter's face. The ideal situation is a brisk wind at the shooter's back which gives the shotgunner the classic "flare" shot as the ducks put on the brakes coming into the wind. Many hunts have been ruined by a wind that puts the ducks down, far out of shotgun range.

Decoys are a big plus when dove hunting and, in truth, doves are more susceptible to decoys than ducks. If things are slow around the stock tank, try few dove decoys. They make all the difference.

HAYNES AND HIS colleagues insisted that McCrory's credibility was in shambles after two weeks of often tumultuous testimony in Davis' murder-for-hire trial.

"When you destroy McCrory, you effectively put a dent in the state's tapes," declared defense lawyer Steve Sumner. 'And we destroyed McCrory.

"Wishful thinking." snapped chief prosecutor Jack Strickland. "The state's tapes stand on their own.

"McCrory fared much, much worse in Houston and eight people were convinced of Mr. Davis' guilt. Let's just wait and see on this one."

A HOUSTON JURY last January deliberated six days after an earlier trial and deadlocked 8-4 in favor of conviction. This trial began July 30.

Davis, 45, the Fort Worth industrialist czar, is accused of plotting the summertime 1978 contract murder of his divorce judge and more than a dozen others.

The dark-haired defendant claims he was duped by McCrory into making a series of incriminating tape recordings that lie at the heart of the state's case.

Davis was the "patsy" the defense contends, in a bizarre conspiracy orchestrated by the defendant's ex-wife Priscilla to enhance her multimillion-dollar divorce settle-

McCRORY'S testimony revolved largely around four critical days in August 1978 that ended bloodlessly outside a West Side restaurant with Davis' arrest.

The burly friend turned-informant testified that Davis ordered him to hire a gunman to kill divorce Judge Joe Eidson and paid him \$25,-000 when he thought the judge was dead.

Prosecutors mounted their case around two taped face-to-face discussions and three television conversations between the accused and the accuser and also produced the alleged blood

"The tapes can stand by themselves," said Strickland, conceding that McCrory's testimony was peppered with inconsistencies and his demeanor less than endearing to the jury.

Natural gas price increases limited

- The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission voted Friday to limit the amount of natural gas sel fuel. price increases loaded onto large industries, postponing for a year a heavier shift which the commission feared might do more harm dustries. than good for ho-

One very rough estimate predicted the compromise proposal would save the average homeowner 23 cents per thousand cubic feet of natural gas, or \$27 a year, with wide regional variations.

That figure was based on what homeowners would have been forced to pay if the entire price hike for natural gas this year had been allocated across-the-board.

Congress, in passing the highly controversial bill that began the deregulation of natural gas prices, had ordered the commission to make large industries bear a high share of the in-

However, the commission, in taking its position Friday said Congress' high target would not work and would in fact have the opposite effect. By making the cost of natural gas so expensive, it would drive large industries to switch to burning the lowest priced oil.

That would mean homeowners and small businesses would be left to pay the entire amount of the price hikes.

The 1978 law sought to ease the burden of the new price increases on residential users by shifting a larger share of the costs to large indus-

trial gas users. Congress said this should be done by charging the extra costs to the industries until their gas price reached the equiv-



Boost in gasoline tax proposed

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. J. Bennett Johnston, D-La., Friday proposed boosting the federal gasoline tax by 50 cents a gallon over four years to force energy conservation.

Johnston, a key member of the Senate Energy Committee, proposed rebating the tax revenues directly to the states, which he said could then reduce their sales, property and income taxes.

"Thus, while Americans will pay more at the pump they'll pay less at corner stores and lunch counters," he said in a floor speech outlining his

Vermont couple offers antidote for boring, conventional vacation

BURLINGTON, Vt. (AP) - For anyone who has dreamed over the Sunday paper's travel section while lounging near the pool at the Happy Pine Trees Motor Inn - your ship has come in.

Since last year, Kempton and Nancy Webb have been running a business that is their antidote for the conventional vacation: a week on Lake Champlain aboard the schooner Richard Robbins.

If their vacation was part of a college course synopsis, it might read: Week-long session on twomasted schooner condensing following courses: History of Lake Champlain; Practical Sailing - A Study for the Landlubber and Salt, and The Nautical Gourmet. Fee: \$265. Prerequisite: None.

In fact, Webb, who is head of the geography department at Columbia University, has taught college courses on the 58-foot deck, covering the rich and little-known history of New England's largest

For \$265, vacationers get three meals a day - New

England in taste and Texas in size. They also get a snug bunk and the privilege of reading or snoozing on deck while the crew runs around pulling on wet ropes. In most cases, even the rankest landlubber is unable to just sit and

In fact, the nautical lingo and easy-going ways of the four-member crew are contagious. Within a day, the passengers have been transformed from accountants, nurses and parents, into a cross between the chorus line of "H.M.S. Pinafore" and the cast of an

Errol Flynn pirate movie. Self-conscious in their newly purchased sailing gear, the passengers watched the weeks' groceries being loaded on board from a dock in Burlington on a recent Monday morning.

A seemingly endless stream of cardboard boxes filled with cans, boxes and sheafs of fresh greens were brought aboard by the captain, Douglas Greason, and Michael Mulhern, the first mate.



Many ex-GIs due radiation warning

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - More than 250,000 former GIs forced to witness experimental nuclear explosions in the 1940s and 1950s are being warned by the government they should seek medical ad-

Attorneys for the government officials have received court permission to publicize a notice that warns the soldiers involved in nuclear testing that they should have a physical examination.

U.S. District Judge Herbert J. Stern approved a one-page news release that warns former soldiers who were forced to witness experimental nuclear blasts in Nevada and the Pacific.

"Based upon research to date, it is believed that radiation exposures were low," the release says. 'While medical science has no proof that exposure to radiation levels as low as these are hazardous to health, it is generally assumed by scientists that even low levels of exposure carry some slight

The news release, which will be sent to about 2,500 radio, television and newspapers, advises the former soldiers that they can receive a free medical examination by contacting a local Veterans Administration

The participants in the nuclear experiments also may call the Defense Nuclear Agency for information by calling in the continental United States, 800-336-3068; residents of Alaska and Virginia are advised to call collect, 202-274-9161, while Hawaii residents are advised to call collect, 808-422-9213.

Stern previously had stopped the government from sending out a release he thought was so unalarming that it would lull the soldiers into a false sense of

The judge, however, said he thought the revised notice "neither unduly alarms them (the soldiers) or puts them to sleep.

"I think it's fair," Stern said. The amended notice was agreed to by the government attorneys and lawyers for a former soldier who says he developed breast cancer as the result is exposure to a nuclear blast in 1953

Stanley Jaffee of River Edge, N.J., had filed suit against the government, but the bulk of his complaint was thrown out because sovereign immunity protects the federal government from being A federal appeals court has said, however, that

although the government can not be sued, it still has the burden to warn the men that they should seek medical advice.

The release says that the DNA has been trying to "reconstruct a complete history of the atmospheric nuclear test program, including the names of participants and any radiation doses they received."

U.S. suggests advancing El Salvador election date

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Carter administration has suggested that President Carlos Romero of El Salvador move up the date of the next scheduled election by a few months, the State Department acknowledged.

Spokesman Hodding Carter said Friday that in a meeting between Romero and Assistant Secretary of State Viron P. Vaky in July, the idea was broached by Vaky as a possible "dramatic illustration" of Romero's commitment to free elections.

But Carter said Vaky neither requested nor demanded that Romero change the schedule.

The suggestion to Romero has been a matter of rumor for weeks. In a speech this week, Romero publicly denied that the United States had requested him to reschedule the elections.

State Department officials, declining to be named, concede that the administration is deeply worried about the stability of those three countries in the wake of the successful revolution in Nicaragua.




