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# Kennedy wants tax cut, new wage-price guides

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, at the brink of a 1980 challenge to President Carter, suggests it may take a tax cut soon to cope with rising unemployment, and tougher wage-price guidelines to cope with inflation.

Insisting that he hasn't decided whether to run, Kennedy said he has been "heartened and encouraged" by the support generated in the 10 days since he said he'd consider it.

The Massachusetts senator said he had decided by Labor Day "that I at least would not preclude the possibility of candidacy.'

Always before, Kennedy had said he expected Carter to run and intend-

ed to support him. But he said he reconsidered during the summer at the urging of congressional colleagues and other supporters.

He said his family approved, and he also concluded that a challenge to the incumbent president would not divide the Democratic Party more than it already is divided.

"I became convinced that the divisions that existed in the Democratic Party and in the country existed today...and were very deep-seated, and they would be there whether I was a candidate or not," he said in an interview with The Associated Press

While Carter supporters contend a

sive as to make the Democratic nominee vulnerable to a Republican in the general election, the senator said past contests have seemed to "energize the party, bring new people in.'

He said those factors and, most important, "my own deep concerns about the direction of the nation, our ability to deal with many of the problems that we're facing here in this country, about the mood of the nation, 'glbed him to consider running.

Kennedy said his decision is not made yet, and he doesn't know when it will be. But he also said that if he runs, he expects to compete in the Iowa Democratic caucuses.

# Texas Republicans see Kennedy as Demo choice

DALLAS (AP) - Sen. John Tower. saving his Democratic colleagues in Washington consider Jimmy Carter a "politcal embarrassment," predicts Sen. Edward Kennedy will be the

Democratic nominee in 1980. Tower told the State Republican Executive Committee here Saturday that Kennedy is "eminently beatable" - if the GOP can make it through a potentially cutthroat nomination process.

"It may be becoming more clear now who the Democratic nominee will be rather than who the Republican nominee will be," he said.

The senator said that any of the leading potential GOP candidates — assumed to be George Bush, Ronald

Reagan and John Connally - "easily have (Kennedy's) number.

"I can't see how we Republicans can do anything but expect to elect a Republican president next year," Tower told the committee members. But he warned that a bloody inparty nomination fight could hurt the

"Some people have said the Republicans have the singular talent for snatching defeat from the jaws of victory," he said.

At the SREC session, the committee approved a 5,000-signature petition process for candidates who want to get on the May primary ballot. The committee also chose Houston as the site of the June GOP state conven-

Tower's prediction of a Kennedy nomination was echoed by other Texas GOP leaders. State Sen. Betty Andujar of Fort Worth, a Republican national committee member, said, "If this is the dish we have to eat sometime it may as well be now.'

Ray Hutchison, a former state GOP chairman and now a Connally supporter, also predicted a Kennedy run for the White House. Hutchison said a Kennedy-Connally race would be a "classic" confrontation that would draw the largest voter turnout ever.

'Kennedy clearly is the choice of the overwhelming number of the 1979 variety of Democrat," Hutchison

The Forest Service asked for 800 firefighters to help the 2,473 men and women battling the blazes which had consumed more than 55,000 acres.

Orders closing four national forests in the area were issued because of the extreme fire hazard.

Only one of the major fires was expected to be under control



# Republicans urged to aid candidates

Instead of following a suggestion by one state Republican committeeman to retrict members from actively supporting a presidential candidate, the State Republican Executive Committee Saturday moved in the opposite

Midland Mayor Ernest Angelo Jr., who attended the session in Dallas, today said a move last week by John E. Kirchhoff of Plainview to request all committee members involved in a presidential campaign to resign never made

Instead, Angelo said, the SREC moved in the other direction and adopted a resolution for its members to actively support the presidential candidate of their choice and, subsequently, the winner of the primary.

"There was practically zero support for a resolution proposed by Kirchhoff," said Angelo. After the resolution to support the candidates passed

with only one dissenting vote - and that from David Cardner of Orange - Kirchhoff decided not to bring his resolution before the committee, Angelo said.

Kirchhoff had mailed a letter last week to Angelo, asking him to resign one of two posts he held - as a member of the Republican National Committee and as state chairman for Ronald Reagan's campaign for presi-

Angelo said last week he would not resign from either post, even if the state committee adopted such a resolu-

Kirchhoff initially said his proposal wasn't aimed specifically at the mayor. Purpose of his actions was to eliminate fighting among members of the committee who support various candidates, he indicated by telephone.

"There was just a little bit of talk on the committee" about the resolution, said Angelo. But about three-fourths of the SREC members are involved in a presidential campaign, he added. The mayor said he didn't "feel any concern" about

Kirchhoff's request last week. Overall, the members Saturday adopted some imple-

mentation resolutions for conducting the presidential primary next spring.

"It was an enthusiastic, unified party meeting," Angelo said teday.

# It was the wind that caused our 'different' weather

"You don't need a weatherman to tell which way the wind blows," rock singer Bob Dylan once commented in one of his songs.

Nonetheless, weathermen at the National Weather Service at Midland Regional Airport have some insights into why the weather in Midland this summer has been, to put it mildly,

The winds, the weathermen said. have been blowing primarily out of the southeast.

That fact has provided cooler, wetter, and - most would add - more pleasant weather than the last two summers, weathermen said.

In terms of statistics, it's rained more, temperatures on the average have been less and humidity has been higher than average.

A synopsis of weather statistics for the month of August shows the average maximum temperature at 91.4 degrees was 3.4 degrees "below nor-

Average minimum temperature at 66.9 degrees was 2.3 degrees "below normal." Even the average monthly temperature at 79 degrees was 2.8 degrees below normal

WITH THAT IN mind, Midland residents with evaporative coolers are probably wondering why it seemed so hot a summer.

It has been on average about 20 percent more humid than average this summer in Midland, Roger Mallory, principal assistant at the weather bureau, explained.

That humidity negates the cooling effects of evaporative air conditioners, which cool the air by removing its moisture.

So what has caused the change in the weather?

Again, it has been the wind. 'We've had a predominately southeasterly flow up from the Gulf," Mallory said. "It's an up-slope wind which gives us idiomatic cooling." Such cooling produces more mois-

ture and more clouds. Actually, changes in climate are nothing new to the Midland area.

MALLORY SAID THAT, more than 100 years ago, the area around the Basin was more moist, supporting vast fields of Buffalo grass.

Climatologically speaking, even the area around the Big Bend has been desert for only a short period of time. Much of what now constitutes the national park was grassland less than 100 years ago. Today, most of the flatland has

been claimed by the Chihuahuan Desert, which is progressing northward at a slow - but steady - rate. While the weather this summer

does not herald any new climatological change, it has strayed from the "average."

According to Mallory, the wetter weather in the Midland area actually began when a two-year drought ended

last September. Record rains assailed the Trans-Pecos and Fort Davis region. There was flooding on the Pecos and Rio Grande Rivers last fall when the remnants of a tropical storm wafted northeastward across the mountains of Mexico and into the United States.

mally located over the Bermudas moved eastward.

HIGH PRESSURE systems produce winds in a clockwise direction, prompting winds in Texas to originate out of the southeast. Besides being more abundant, rain-

fall has also been more evenly dispersed this year, a development guaranteed to keep farmers smiling. Mallory said the 315-statute-mile radar which the weather service operates has recorded thunderstorm activity almost every day this sum-

"Thunderstorm activity has occurred much more this summer than in any of the seven years I've been here," he said.

The total for August, for example, was 11 days with thunderstorms inside the range of the radar. Two of those days, as residents in Martin County remember, included hail.

Winds averaged 11 mph for the month of August with the highest recorded wind speed at the weather bureau exceeding 60 mph on August 17. That was during a local thunder-

'Averages computed by the weather bureau are based on measurements recorded over a 10-year period.

Weathermen are anticipating new averages when the next set of figures is computed next year.

THE WEATHER BUREAU has been keeping records on Midland's climate since 1930.

Mallory pooh-poohed the usual jokes about the weather bureau's ac-

"There are not many occupations that try to predict the future," he said. Mallory said the weather service, with 85 percent accuracy, had the best shooting average of those occupations that do.

'Find a stockbroker that gives you 85 percent accuracy and you'll become rich quick," he said.

Nonetheless, Mallory shied away from any long-range predictions of the weather this winter.

"Your odds are better in Vegas," he

Sailor drives off nuke sub attackers Suspects flee when shots are fired at them

KITTERY, Maine (AP) - Two divers tried to overpower a sailor guarding a nuclear missile-firing submarine at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard but fled when the sailor fired at them, the Coast Guard said today A search of the harbor for the divers, who the guard said were wearing scuba equipment, was called off after four hours, officials said.

Coast Guard spokesman Norman Wolfe said the guard reported that he thought he shot one of the divers, who he said attacked him about 9 p.m. Sunday on a barge moored next to the submarine. Early reports had said the divers attacked the guard on board the

submarine, but officials said they did not get on the ship. Wolfe said he did not know if the divers were armed. The guard, who patrols both the submarine and the barge, was being interviewed by military

In Washington, a Navy spokesman who asked not to be identified said the Navy was "investigating an alleged intrusion" at the Maine base.

hopert Johnston, a spokesman for the shipyard, said the submarine was the nuclear-powered Stonewall Jackson, which carries 16 Poseidon ballistic

missiles. It was at the shipyard for repairs. Several cruisers and a Coast Guard vessel carrying Kittery police searched the waters around the shipyard after the incident until 1:30 a.m. today when


the search was called off. "Until they come up with some divers," there is no known motive, Wolfe

The guard told authorities the divers attacked him as he made his rounds on the barge, Wolfe said. The guard said the "two divers tried to overpower him, and in the process he discharged two shots," and the divers jumped back into the water, Wolfe said.

He said he did not believe anyone else was aboard the submarine at the

Lt. Nancy Barnett, a spokeswoman at nearby Pease Air Force Base in Newington, N.H., said "increased vigilence" had been ordered at the base.

#### Process of ratifying UAW's new contract begins today

DETROIT (AP) - United Auto Workers leaders, calling their tentative new contract with General Motors Corp. a "historic" agreement, say they expect no trouble persuading members to vote for it.

The process of ratifying the pact starts today when the union's 27member executive board meets to review it. On Tuesday, the 400-member UAW General Motors Council officers of the 151 GM locals - meets in Detroit and will be asked to recommend it to the members.

On Saturday, some 3,000 plant representatives will hear details of the agreement in Dallas. Voting in the local unions will begin after Saturday and should be complete by Oct. 1, allowing the union to turn its attention to Ford Motor Co. and Chrysler

Ford will be expected to match the gains won at GM, but financially troubled Chrysler likely will get con-

Though full details of the contract officially were being withheld until Tuesday, more features leaked out over the weekend.

The contract reportedly includes extension of the stock purchase plan, now available to white-collar employees, to UAW members under a provision of federal tax laws that provides extra tax credits if companies set stock aside for their workers.

The shares and accumulated dividends will be put in trust until participants in the plan leave GM through retirement or resignation.

Increased pension benefits will be financed in part through the diversion of 1 cent per hour of pay increases under the cost-of-living formula for two years and 2 cents for a further three months.

A similar diversion in 1976 financed a \$600 lump-sum payment to retired workers.

Along with automatic recognition at future new plants and a total of 26 paid days off over the next three years, the union won a rising schedule of pension payments, a first for the industry.

"It's quite historic in many, many areas of breakthrough," UAW Vice President Irving Bluestone said. "Our membership will recognize that, appreciate that and they will

ratify overwhelmingly.' No average rate of pension increase has been provided, but some rates can be deduced from examples given

by the UAW. A worker who now receives \$700 a month until Social Security begins at 62 will get \$800, an increase that will go to \$915 by the final months of the

contract. A worker who retired in 1974 and now gets \$390 a month from GM, plus Social Security, would get \$437 and eventually \$498.50.

A worker retired before 1970 now receiving \$298.50 per month would get \$355.50, rising to \$417.

In the beer-drinking contest, Sergio Urias downed three cups of beer quicker and with more gusto than the other contestants.

"That guy must have had a funnel," said Raymundo Dutchover "Lightning" Rayos Jr., who came in third.


John Rendon placed second. Next was the watermelon-eating

#### What's VAT? It's an old idea for new tax

An old idea for a new tax is back in the spotlight.

The levy is VAT — the acronym for value added tax. It has been talked about for decades. It was adopted by France in 1954. And it is being promoted here by U.S. Rep. Al Ullman, the chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and U.S. Sen. Russell Long, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

The tax gets added to goods and services as they move from the producer to the consumer. Some people describe VAT as a national sales tax - a description supporters don't like.

Ullman, a Democrat from Oregon, says Americans could be paying VAT by 1981. He wants Congress to enact the new tax to replace some existing taxes. No one, says Ullman, should end up paying any more taxes than he or she does now.

Ullman has indicated he is thinking of a VAT in the neighborhood of 10 percent. He wants to reduce Social Security taxes by 25 percent and cut some other existing levies as well. Long, who is also a Democrat and is from Louisiana, wants Social Security taxes to be eliminated.

Donald Lubick of the Treasury Department said earlier this year that it would take a VAT of 13 percent to completely replace the payroll tax as a source of financing for Social Security.

The Tax Foundation Inc., a research group based in Washington, D.C., calculated that in 1978, each one percentage point of VAT would produce \$11 billion in revenue. Social insurance taxes - basically, Social Security - are expected to raise a little more than \$140 billion in the

VAT is a tax on the value that is added to a product on its way to market. It is based on the difference between each manufacturer's buying price and selling price. Suppose, for example, there is a 10 percent VAT. A baker buys flour and other bread ingredients for \$100. He plans to sell the finished loaves to a supermarket for \$300. The VAT would be \$20 - 10 percent of the \$200 in value added by the baker. The final retail price paid by the consumer includes the sum of all the VATs paid along the

Ullman has said he wants the addition of VAT to stop at the wholesale level. Supermarket News, a trade publication, quoted him as saying: "I am thinking only about the wholesale level. Retail taxes are totally preempted...by the states already. There will be no retail tax. I am opposed to a national retail tax.' VAT may or may not apply to all products. Some European countries

exempt essentials like food and drugs. Great Britain considers reading material an essential and exempts books. Ullman has indicated he would favor exempting at least food.

Supporters of VAT concede that the new tax would raise prices. But Ullman says the higher prices would be offset by decreases in other taxes. Supporters of VAT also note that it is based on consumption. People who save money are rewarded. Opponents say the tax puts an unfair burden on the poor since they spend a greater proportion of their income on needed goods and services.

A report by the Tax Foundation said the inflationary impact of VAT is hard to measure. "Actual experience (in other countries) has varied and the possibilities for this country are so complex that no unequivocal answer can be given as to the results most likely," the report said.

There are other arguments over VAT. On the plus side, it could be used to help our balance of trade situation. Foreign buyers of U.S. goods would get a refund equal to the amount of the VAT. That would make the American products more attractive overseas.





nist has reported that the Soviets have built a sophisticated electronic listening post and that the troops are there to guard it. He's right about the listening post, but wrong about the troops. The Soviets will guard such a facility, but it is not necessary to have 3,000 men pose for satellite pictures in order to guard a spy installation.

Training the Cuban army is out; the Soviets have been doing that for years with advisors and a training cadre does not engage in manuvers. Deployment in a combat role is out: 3,000 not large enough and is totally unnecessary when the Soviets have a large Cuban army at their dispos-

All the above leads me to believe that the Soviets were put there as a favor to President Carter. Why would I think such a sneaky thought? Well, 'll tell you. Look at all the benefits.

First, let's go back to the sequence of events. Two senators, Stone and Frank Church, D-Idaho, both White House buddies, both in bad trouble with their constituents, broke the news. This tells me that they got the news from the White House in the first place. Now Stone and Church who both voted for the Canal Treaty and probably plan to vote for SALT II can play tough guy with the Soviets for the benifits of their constituents.

The President himself has several options. He can use the incident as an excuse to hold up SALT II so he can keep it alive as an issue in 1980 and hopefully distract the voters from the lousy economic conditions. Nothing is worse than having to run for reelection in a bad economy and nothing is better for rallying support than a foreign crisis.

Or, the President could "back the Russians down." All the Soviets would have to do is take their uniforms off and President Carter could claim they have departed. This way a weak President could pretend to be strong and he could cite the Soviet cooperation as another reason for ratifying SALT II. This ploy would also give Church and Stone the excuse they are looking for to support SALT

This is the game I think they are playing, but there is a third possibility and that is that President Carter will give up the U.S. base at Guantanamo "in exchange" for the withdrawal of Soviet combat troops

I realize this is a cynical view, but that's the way the pieces seem to fit since we know the Soviet Union wants SALT II ratified and President Carter re-elected. I hope I am wrong, especially about Guantanamo, but I don't see any other rational explanation for the soviet troops. What do you

#### INSIDE REPORT: Will Andy Young affair cost Carter at the polls in '80?

By ROWLAND EVANS AND ROBERT NOVAK

WASHINGTON - President Carter's dilemna in limiting damage of the Andrew Young affair was revealed when he rejected advice from Jewish leaders to depict Young's departure from the U.N. as "an act of his own volition," not the result of Israeli or Jewish pressures.

The advice came from several sources, including a confidential memo to Carter from Stuart Eizenstat, the president's chief domestic aide. It was rejected by the president essentially because he cannot staunch the loss of Jewish support resulting from his bold Mideast policies without losing black suport. Having been led to expect their advice would be followed, the Jewish leaders were aghast when the language was omitted from Carter's Aug. 30 speech in

At stake is whether the Andrew Young affair, both his firing and events leading up to it, will cost Carter unacceptable losses of Jewish or black votes in 1980. In 1976, if the strongly pro-Carter Jewish vote had split evenly in five key states, Gerald Ford would have had an electoral college landslide. Without his 95 percent of the black vote, Carter would have lost the South - and the elec-

Eizenstat's memo went to the president two days before his Aug. 30 speech at Emory University in Young's hometown of Atlanta. Eizenstat was backed by Edward Sanders, chief adviser on Jewish affairs inside

the Carter administration His memo was based on pleas which



had been feeding into the White House from top Jewish leaders across the country ever since Young's ouster.

They warned that black fury over Young's ouster was exploding in a way that threatened a dangerous outbreak of anti-semitism. The Jewish community felt it was being made the scapegoat of the Young affair, with the Carter administration in complicity. So, Jewish leaders wanted the president to make clear that Young was the victim of his own conduct.

Carter was advised to tell his Emory University audience that neither Israel nor American Jews caused Young's "resignation;" that Young had wanted more freedom to speak out on his own without official restraints (a bit hard to swallow considering Young's unlicensed verbosity); that he left the U.N., as one presidential aide put it, "as an act of his own volition" (also less than credible, since Secretary of State Cyrus Vance

demanded Young's head). Even if what Carter was urged to say at Emory was not exactly accurate, liberties with the truth are unavoidable in any damage-limiting operation. Besides, the reason for

Young's departure really was Vance's refusal to retain an official who had not told him the whole truth about his meeting with the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) dele-

"My feeling was very strong that anything the president said, no matter how carefully he said it, would risk worsening the situation, not helping it," confided one White House aide who disagreed with Eizenstat.

For one thing, putting the blame wholly on Young would not please black political leaders. For another, they would not believe it. They had read both headlines and fine print of Jewish demands for Young's ouster. The whole first page of the Aug. 16 issue of the authoritative Jewish Telegraphic Agency's daily news bulletin was devoted to such demands.

"Only the dismissal of Ambassador Young can restore confidence in your administration," Rabbi Joseph Sternstein, president of the American Zionist Federation, wired Carter. Bertram Gold, executive vice president of the American Jewish Committee, issued a statement that if Young "indeed did talk with the PLO on his own, he should be fired.'

Such heat-of-the-moment demands played no part in Vance's refusal to keep Young at the U.N. But for the president to exonerate both Israel and anti-Young Jewish leaders would risk

a new political storm against him by the blacks. Unfortunately for Carter, however, word had leaked to Jewish leaders that at Emory Umniversity he would do just that.

His speech was eloquent, warning that "differing political views...must not become the occasion for deep and damaging divisions between groups of citizens in our society." But it contained no word to calm black suspicions. "I was sure the president would get the blame off our backs," a foremost Jewish leader told us. "But he must have decided he could not risk the political backlash of the

In truth, there is no easy way for the president to reconcile Jewish and black interests in the emotionalized issue of Palestinians vs. Israel. He is trapped in political currents beyond his control that threaten Mideast policy, his own re-election and national

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

# Factory output shows decline

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's factories in August operated 1.3 percent below July's level as autoproduction plummeted and inventories swelled, the government said today.

The Federal Reserve Board said factory operations declined from 85.9 percent of capacity in July to 84.6 percent last month. It was the lowest level since June 1978, when it was 84.3 percent.

Manufacturers operations have fallen 2.5 percent since March when activity had reached 87.1 percent of factory capacity, the highest level since 1973.

# Camp David agreement one year old today

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Camp David accords are one year old today, but their promise of peace in the Mideast is only half fulfilled.

Egypt and Israel have negotiated a peace treaty. Israel is withdrawing from the Sinai. And Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat seem to have developed an effective relationship.

But negotiations on Palestinian autonomy have gone almost nowhere, according to sources familiar with the negotiations. And their validity may not be accepted by inhabitants of the West Bank and Gaza Strip, or the rest of the Arab world.

It remains to be seen whether the Egypt-Israel peace can survive a failure in those talks.

President Carter said Sunday the negotiations "are proceeding on schedule, in an atmosphere of good will and serious cooperation."
"I am confident those talks will succeed," he said.

Recalling the signing of the accords, Carter said, "We believed then that we had reached an historic turning point in the bitter history of that long-suffering region. One short year later, that belief has become a firm reality."

The president said achievements of the past year justify "keeping our eyes firmly on the goal of peace rather than in heeding the inevitable cries

that say peace cannot be achieved."

Some of the problems were foreseen last Sept. 17, when Carter, Sadat and Begin gathered at the White House to sign the documents they had labored over at the summit.

"We knew the Palestinian framework was very vague," recalls one U.S. official.

Even more important in retrospect was the failure of Carter and Begin to agree on the duration of a freeze on new Israeli settlements in the occupied West Bank, he said.

carter thought the freeze was to last at least a year, until negotiations for the West Bank autonomy plan were complete. Begin insisted it was to last about three months, until the Egyptian-Israeli treaty negotiations

were finished.

Begin's view has prevailed and new settlements have been established.

In retrospect, officials believe U.S. failure to enforce a one-year freeze contributed to the Arab world's hostility to the accords, because it is convinced Israel has no intention of giving up the West Bank and the United States will not force it to.

In the Arab view, Camp David destroyed Arab unity by making a separate peace between Israel and Egypt. It also did not provide for the return of the West Bank and Gaza Strip captured by Israel in 1967, nor guarantee Palestinians the right to self-determination.

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

Recruiters often make several stops during a trip, bringing enlistees into the city from more than 200 miles away, Galkin said. All must arrive at the examining station by 6:30 a.m.

#### Amin succeeds Taraki as new Afghanistan president

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - Haff zullah Amin, Afghanistan's hard-line communist prime minister and secret police boss, took over as president and chief of the ruling party from Nur Mohammed Taraki, and reports today indicated he might have staged a brief but bloody coup in the former

Radio Afghanistan reported the ultra-leftward power shift Sunday, and said Taraki resigned all his posts on health grounds. But Taraki looked fit in Moscow last week en route home from the Havana non-aligned meeting, and although he was fond of TV appearances did not broadcast his

Diplomatic sources said this immediately triggered reports in Kabul, the Afghan capital, that Taraki was forced out by Amin and possibly even killed or wounded since his whereabouts were unknown. The sources said troops and tanks were guarding key ministries and the Radio Afghanistan complex.

The state radio added to the speculation by reporting Air Force Mai Syed Daoud Tarun, who often served as Taraki's submachine gun-toting bodyguard, was killed Friday along with three others in the former royal Arg Palace, now the president's official residence called the People's House.

The three were not named, but an informed source in New Dehli who asked to remain anonymous, said four pro-Taraki men were killed in Kabul the same day. They were iden-tified as: Interior Minister Col. Aslam Watanjar, Frontier Affairs Minister Sheirjan Mazdooryar, Communica-tions Minister Sayed Mohammed Golabzoi and Public Works Minister Dastagir Panjsheri.

Afghanistan, bordered on the north by Russia, the west by Iran and the east by Pakistan, is currently embroiled in a bloody civil war and torn by an internal split in the ruling Khalq (People's) Party.

The 50-year-old Amin, long-considered more radical than the 62-yearold Taraki and the real strongman in pro-Soviet Afghan government, is expected to step up the fight against rightist Moslem rebels who are reported to have seized about half the mountainous nation in their war against what they call the "Godless" Marxist regime in Kabul, the capi-

#### Two families gain freedom via balloon

NAILA, West Germany - Four children and four adults bet their lives on a hot air balloon made of nylon and bedsheets and drifted through the darkness of East Germany, hitting the jackpot - freedom across the border in West Germany.

Peter Strelzek, an airplane mechanic who designed the escape craft, told reporters Sunday the 12-mile, 20-30 minute flight was his second attempt to escape by balloon from his communist-ruled home-

'It was no longer possible for us to lie to our children and put up with the political conditions in East Germany," he said.

He, his wife and two children, along with stonemason Andreas Wetzel, his wife and their two children, got onto a gondola made of an iron plate. Gas burners were fired, filling the handsewn envelope with hot air at a field near Lobenstein and the bailoon

Borne toward the south by a good breeze, the refugees flew over the "death strip" border and put down in this Bavarian town, far from the border's electrified fences and minefields. It was believed to be the first time refugees had used a balloon During the flight, the children rode in the middle of

the 18-square-foot iron plate, and were huddled around bottles of gas used to fuel the fire that heated air in the 5,230-cubic-yard balloon. The adults rode on four iron rods projecting laterally from the plate, each grabbing onto inch-thick ropes attaching the gondola to the balloon.

Strelzek said he designed the balloon using principles he learned from his work with airplanes

The escape began about 1:30 a.m., Strelzek told reporters, and the balloon climbed to 8,000 feet in the moonless sky as the breeze pushed it toward free-

As the balloon came down, it was met by two West German police officers who had raced to the landing site, thinking the floating object might be a UFO.
"Are we in the West here?" one of the balloonists reportedly asked.

We were convinced that we were in the West even before the police officers came because we saw a modern farm machine on the field unlike anything we have," Strelzek told a reporter.

He said his first attempt, during the night of July 4, ended 220 yards short of the border, but the balloonists were undetected and they returned home.

After their arrival in Naila, the mayor reportedly offered the families housing and jobs but the group had not decided whether to stay here.

#### Swedish socialists hold slight edge in election

STOCKHOLM (AP) — The opposition socialist bloc held a one-seat edge over the governing non-socialist coalition today in Sweden's general election, but with the conservatives posting the biggest gains, mail-in votes from traditionally conservative areas could easily reverse the standings.

Preliminary returns from all 357 municipalities in

Sunday's voting gave the opposition Social Democrats and Communists a 175-174 parliamentary majority over the conservative Moderate Alliance Party, the Center Party and the Liberals of the non-socialist bloc.

But statisticians predicted the pendulum would swing to 175-174 for the non-socialist bloc after an estimated 40,000 mail-in votes have been counted Wednesday. Experience shows that the non-socialists get the bulk of the mail-in votes and since the race was in a dead heat just a few thousand votes could tip the balance.

"What is essential is that we have turned the trend upwards," Social Democratic leader Olof Palme said. "The party emerges strengthened and united from the election campaign.'

The Social Democrats saw their vote percentage shrink in three consecutive elections - all of them with Palme at the helm - and the 52-year-old leader's political career appeared to be on the line in the latest campaign.

The Social Democrats gained a modest 0.6 percent for a total of 43.6 percent, or 2.3 million of the 6 million eligible voters. This would give the Social Democrats 155 seats — up three — in the 349-seat



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#### Nurses can buy copies of exams

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) - State officials said they will not accept results of a standardized test for registered nurses taken by 100,000 persons nationwide because copies of the test were offered for sale.

The test, given twice a year, has not been invaldated nationally. But state officials said nursng candidates in New York and three other states were believed to nave acquired test quesions in advance for up to \$2,000. Arnold Bloom of the

state Education Departnent said applicants for nursing licenses in the state will be able to take another test, probably in February. Some nursing candi

dates hold temporary licenses in New York and will be able to work. But others must wait for the next test. Bloom said he did not know how many candidates hold temporary licenses.

'Not only will we not accept the test results for the exam given in New York state, but we will not accept results from candidates who took the exam in other states," he

More than 100,000 candidates nationwide took the test, known as the nursing boards. State officials said there were indications that the questions were available in Chicago, Philadelphia and Detroit, as well as in New York state.

The five-part exam was developed by the National League for Nursing in conjunction with the National Council of State Boards for Nursing. About 12,000 persons in New York state, who paid an examination fee of \$60 each, took the test July 10-11.

Bloom said the state police's Bureau of Criminal Investigation and the nursing profession's national council have begun investigations.

"I'm very distressed and this is going to make it very hard for nurses," Dr. Mildred Schmidt. president of the national council and executive secretary of the New York state chapter, said Saturday.

"We began getting let-ters in mid-July from candidates who said they had either purchased the exam or knew of people who had." said Thomas Sheldon, coordinator of professional education for the Education Department.



# Nation's southernmost village offers quiet life

NAALEHU, Hawaii (AP) - This small, quiet village resting between the world's largest active volcano and the sea is marking its 20th anniversary this year as the "Southernmost Community in the U.S.A." Hawaii was admitted to the Union on Aug. 21,

Naalehu (Nah-ah-lay-who) is a picturesque oasis of green in the seemingly endless miles of jagged, black, lava-rock terrain in the southern half of Hawaii Island

The town, with huge monkeypod trees shading the main drag, once thrived as the community center for the some 3,000 residents of the Ka'u District. It has lost much of its vitality

to Pahala, a sugar mill town 13 miles up the road "If you like the quiet, you'll like it said Zachary DeBernardi, a

onetime Benedictine monk who now runs an arts and crafts training center at an abandoned sugar mill on the outskirts of town. "This is a place where some will never want to leave and others can't

wait to get out," DeBernardi said. Roni Arlos, 15, agrees. "It's pretty quiet here and there's not much to "They closed down our theater,"

she said, adding that most of the

functions for young people take place

at the Ka'u High School, located in

Pahala.

Jobs in the area are scarce, with the work force at the Ka'u Sugar Co. plantation fixed at about 425, mostly filled by recent immigrants from the Philippines.

Also providing jobs are macadamia nut orchard operations, a dairy and ranching.

Faced with strict federal and state environmental protection regulations, C. Brewer and Co. Ltd. closed its Hutchinson Mill just outside Naalehu six years ago instead of making the costly improvements.

Sugar cane grown on the lower slopes of the 13,680-foot-high Mauna Loa volcano above Naalehu is now

trucked to Pahala where C. Brewer's sugar mill is located.

This has caused the economic focus of the Ka'u District to shift to Pahala, where there is a new high school, a new shopping center, a new hospital and a new fire station.

Reflecting this shift was the closing of the movie theater in Naalehu in 1977 at about the time cable television was finally brought to the communi-

The bright light on the horizon for Naalehu may be tourism, as visitors at the newly developed luxury resorts along the Kona Coast pass through the Mamalahoa Highway en route to Kilauea volcano, which stages spectacular eruptions every few years.



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

NEW YORK (AP) - Stock prices moved up sharply today in response to the first auto contract settlement without a strike in 15 years.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks rose 6.48 to 885.58 after the first two hours of trading. Advancers led losers by a margin of almost 2-1.

Investors shrugged off other news, including predictions the prime rate will rise further from the current record 13percent and a new record price of gold, above \$350 an ounce for the first time.

#### Fire destroys apartments in Dallas

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas fire officials were still investigating the cause Monday of a devastating fire of 'suspicious origin" that leveled 10 buildings of a north Dallas apartment complex causing an estimated at \$3 million damage. No one was injured.

Lt. Tom Oney of the Dallas Fire Department arson investgation squad. said he was "completely undecided" on the cause of the fire early Sun-But arson investigators initially

called the five-alarm blaze - which broke out in a section of apartments under construction - "suspicious." About 64 occupied units were des-

troyed and an additional 24 units in another complex under construction Oney said damage from the blaze

would exceed \$3 million, an increase from earlier estimates of \$1.5 million. The investigator said the blaze was one of the costliest in Dallas history. Remarkably, there were no injuries reported from the giant blaze, Oney

"Not even any pets were killed as far as I know," he said.

Firefighters said the fire spread rapidly because the buildings in the complex had wood shingles and at least two sides of the building were made of wood. "These wood-shingled roofs are like

pouring gasoline on a fire," said Battalion Chief Travis Zuber. "If we had had 15-20 mph winds, it would have gotten the whole complex.' 'When we first rolled up, the first

# DR. NEIL SOLOMON 'Moderate' drinking may be good for you

While my wife doesn't openly disapprove, she usually makes some comment - jokingly, of course — about my becoming an alcoholic. Wouldn't you consider that a glass of wine each evening falls under the heading of "moderation?" - Mr. E.S.

Dear Mr. S.: Not only is your practice of a glass of wine each night "moderate," but there is evidence that it may be good for you. Unlike cigarettes, liquor has done more good than harm, according to Dr. Morris Chafetz, a former director of the Na tional Institute of Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, and an expert on the subject. Evidence for the beneficial effects of alcohol comes from studies about its effect on the heart.

For example, Dr. Arthur L. Klatsky, of the Kaiser-Permanente Medical Center in Oakland, Calif., studied more than 450 people who had had heart attacks. He found that a surprising number of them did not drink alcohol. One of Dr. Klatsky's conclusions was that moderate drinkers have 30 percent fewer heart attacks than people who do not Similar findings were obtained

from another study in which the drinking habits of more than 1,700 Japanese men living in Hawaii were studied. It was determined that subjects who drank three bottles of beer daily had only half as much coronary heart disease, and one-fifth as many heart attacks, as those who did not

Still another research approach was taken at the Medical College of Wisconsin. Researchers there mea-

> Why alcohol protects the heart in this fashion is not clear. Some physicians feel it increases the level of high-density lipoproteins in the blood. a substance associated with reduced risk of heart attacks.

Dr. Chafetz notes that alcohol is an anesthetic, and its moderate use eases tensions and, as you have found, helps people relax. An estimated 10 million Americans, however, have passed the bounds of moderation. They are alcoholics and for them liquor is not a friend, but an addiction. Alcohol abuse may lead to a variety of ills, including disorders of the liver, stomach and brain.

Since your drinking obviously is in the moderate category, you can assure your wife that it has the stamp of approval of at least some medical researchers.

Dear Dr. Solomon: What is diabetes? Is it contagious? - Joyce.

Dear Joyce: Diabetes is a metaboldisease characterized by high blood sugar. It now ranks as the third leading cause of death in the United States, and as the leading cause of new cases of blindness. The predisposition to diabetes is inherited, and obesity is clearly a risk factor. It is not contagious.

The Senate panel, reporting on a July 30 scientific symposium, said large-scale synthetic fuels production alone would not significantly affect carbon dioxide concentrations.

But it said massive development of synthetic fuels, "coupled with continued emphasis on traditional fossil sources, may have severe climatic consequences."

Synthetic fuels produce more than twice the carbon dioxide emissions of natural gas, 1.7 times the emissions of oil and 1.5 times the emissions given off by coal, the committee reported. Some scientists fear increased car-

bon dioxide concentrations will produce the so-called greenhouse effect and cause global temperatures to rise, with resultant changes in weather, ocean currents and sea levels, the committee reported. Energy Action's figures on the im-

pact of decontrol of domestic crude oil prices were obtained by comparing controlled prices, averaging \$10.24 per barrel in 1978, with world oil prices of about \$20 per barrel. President Carter has ordered the gradual lifting of domestic price con-

trols over the next two years, which would raise domestic prices to world levels and thus encourage increased domestic production.

Energy Action says the decontrol would represent "some of the largest

lower heating oil prices income transfers to individual private corporations ever accomplished by a single act of a government official."

An American Petroleum Institute spokesman, Mike Waters, said the consumer group "totally overlooks the purpose of decontrol.'

"Our national objective is to reduce our reliance on uncertain foreign sources of crude oil," Waters said, adding, "The plain fact is that reserves left in the ground won't help us cut imports, and additional capital is essential to achieve this goal."

Meanwhile, the Office of Management and Budget says the Energy Department is hastily issuing poorly analyzed regulations that have grown into an error-filled mess.

The report covers all Cabinet departments and was aimed at determining their compliance with Carter's orders to make federal regulations easier to read, more open to public comment and more thoroughly analyzed.

Overall results were mixed; the Energy Department drew the strongest criticism and the Department of Transportation was lauded for its ef-

The report said the Energy Department has been "less than satisfactory" at allowing public comment on regulation of fuel prices and allocation. It also said the department's analysis of the impact of its rules was

not satisfactory.
"There is a lack of structure and continuity" in the department's regulations, the report added.

"This team is a veteran team and that is why they are sometimes able to pull games like this one out in the late going. That's the reason that we have been so successful because they have the confidence to get the job done when it needs to be completed in order to win."

Landry praised Chicago's defense. "The Bears played awfully good defense against us and they kept pushing us back when we got to the 20-25 yard range, commented Landry

'Their defense is the strength of their team this year and the only way to beat that is to come up with the big play which we did." Chicago really wasn't interested in throwing all that

much with Payton running so well, but quarterback Vince Evans, the former USC great, did manage to burn the Cowboy secondary twice to make it

"On the Golden Richards touchdown catch we had two backs playing two different defenses and no one was playing Richards. Benny Barnes was the outside man and he should have picked up Golden as Cliff Harris took the inside receiver, ' added Landry.



49ers' O.J. Simpson (32) eludes Los Angeles tacklers for eight-yard gain Sunday. (AP Laserphoto).



powering pitcher he once was. Ten years ago, a typical Seaver victory was a three-hit shutout with 10 strikeouts. Sunday he had to settle for

a three-hitter with four strikeouts. The 34-year-old right-hander was being written off by some after his 16-14 record in 1978 and a 2-5 start this season. But he has silenced his critics with a 13-1 record since June 9, which has allowed the Cincinnati Reds to overtake and pass the fast-starting Houston Astros in the National

League West. Sunday's 2-0 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers was Seaver's fifth

shutout of the season and 52nd of his career, more than any other active pitcher. And it gave the Reds a 21/2 game lead over the Astros, who lost 2-1 to the San Francisco Giants.

Meanwhile, the Pittsburgh Pirates lost 3-0 to the New York Mets and fell .001 percentage points in the East behind the Montreal Expos, who won the second game of a doubleheader against the St. Louis Cardinals 5-1 in 10 innings after losing the opener 4-3. In the only other NL game, the Philadelphia Phillies edged the Chicago Cubs 4-3.

Seaver, who has one more career shutout than Baltimore's Jim Palmer, allowed only two walks in addition to the three Dodger hits, and three of the baserunners were erased by double plays.

#### North Carolina truckers strike gets slow start

By The Associated Press

A strike called by a North Carolina independent ruckers association got off to a slow start as other groups of independents resisted the call and rigs kept olling, an Associated Press spot check showed.

Dave Edwards, president of the Greensboro, N.C.-based Independent Owner-Operators of America, called the strike for midnight Saturday. By early today, an AP spot check in 26 states showed little apparent strike action.

The independent truckers, who staged a nationwide strike that ended July 4, want such things as relief from rising fuel costs, uniform rules on the cates they are paid and truck size limits.

Edwards had estimated Sunday morning that about 60 percent of the independent drivers in North Carolina and the rest of the nation had parked their rigs. He said it would probably be Wednesday or Thursday before there would be any accurate estimate on how many drivers were participating in the strike. Edwards claims his group, one of nearly 20 associations of independent truckers, has 2,700 members and chapters in 37 states.
