Texan testifies

ROME, Ga. (AP) — A Texas trucker testified Friday that he helped wire a pipe bomb into the van of a peep show operator whom the government contends was killed as part of a racketeering enterprise operated by pornographer Michael Thevis.

Fred Michael Bryson of Fort Worth told the jury that he and William Ross Mahar built the dynamite bomb in Mahar's Atlanta apartment on Sept. 13, 1973, and planted it the following night in the van of James

Thevis, 47, is charged with having Mayes and three other men killed in a scheme to gain nationwide control of the pornography business through a pattern of racketeering activity. The multi-count federal indictment also charges Thevis and his two corporations with arson, extortion, mail fraud and obstruction of justice.

Reactors needed

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rep. Morris K. Udall, a leading congressional skeptics of nuclear power, said Friday he has concluded that the nation's 70 existing commercial reactors and 96 others licensed to be built are all needed.

The Arizona Democrat said uclear power will have to continue to play a major role in the nation's energy future, at least for the rest of the 20th century. He spoke as the House Interior Committee, which he chairs, began winding down its fivemonth inquiry into the Three Mile Island nuclear accident.

Udall began the investigation last spring by leading his panel on a tour of the crippled power plant, where he told reporters that the March 28 accident had seriously clouded the future - if any - of nuclear power in this country.

Vote postponed

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House on Friday postponed until next week a fourth vote on a proposal to raise the pay of congressmen and top bureaucrats.

Announcement that no votes would be taken until Tuesday on the pay proposal, which already has been, defeated three times, came as the House was debating the ground rules that would govern the fight.

Majority Leader Jim Wright, D-Texas, said the vote on the newest pay proposal - to hike salaries 5.5 percent - was postponed because many members were not present for the debate. House attendance often drops sharply on Fridays as many members lewve early for their home districts.

It's official

WASHINGTON (AP) - Neil Goldschmidt, former mayor of Portland, Ore., was confirmed by the Senate Friday to be secretary of transportation.

The vote was 83 to 0. Goldschmidt has been serving as acting secretary since President Carter appointed him to succeed Brock Adams, who resigned July 20.

U.S. hasn't asked removal of brigade

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has not asked the Soviet Union to withdraw its combat brigade from Cuba because it would be "unrealistic" to expect the Russians to leave, Carter administration officials said

Instead, they said, the current negotiations between the United States and the Soviet Union are aimed at eliminating the combat capability of the

The officials, who asked not to be named, said the administration feels that demanding withdrawal of the troops would be "unrealistic and un-

They refused to specify exactly what steps the administration feels would eliminate the combat capability of the Soviet troops

But in the past weeks, the administration's definition of combat capability, while vague, has centered on the command structure of the troops and the equipment that allows them to perform combat roles.

The Soviets have insisted publicly that the troops are only advisers to Cuban forces, that they have been in Cuba since 1962 and that they have a The United States traditionally has accepted the presence of Soviet ad-

visers in Cuba. The current uproar started last month when U.S. intelligence decided that the Soviet troops in Cuba had formed a combat brigade of 2,000 to 3,000 men. Since the announcement of that finding, Secretary of State Cyrus Vance and

Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin have held five negotiating sessions in an effort to resolve the issue. Officials said the initial negotiations were information-gathering ex-

changes in which Vance sought answers to specific questions that American intelligence officials raised about the troops. With those answers in hand, the talks have shifted to a discussion of

what can be done about the situation. President Carter, who has said he will not accept the status quo in Cuba, was quoted by his chief spokesman Thursday as saying the United States will act on its own to alter the status quo if the negotiations with the Soviets are not fruitful.

White House press secretary Jody Powell said Carter would "be prepared to take whatever actions are appropriate," although he ruled out any direct military action.

Other administration officials have said the National Security Council is considering a number of options to apply economic pressure to the So-The dispute over the troops has stalled Senate consideration of SALT

II, the new strategic arms treaty between the United States and the Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, who has been kept abreast of the negotiations, told reporters aftzr a White House briefing Thursday that he

thought the solution to the Cuban problem would require a presidential certification that Soviet combat forces are no longer deployed in Cuba. Otherwise, said Church, who is chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, the SALT II treaty will not be ratified.

That was a slight but significant shift from Church's earlier statement that the treaty could not be ratified unless the troops were removed. It left open the possibility that they would not have to physically leave the island for Senate concerns to be satisfied.

State Department spokesman Hodding Carter said Friday that there were still no firm plans for Vance to meet with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko when the two are in New York next week for the United Nations General Assembly meeting.

Sunrise, sunset: It signals summer's end

Summer is coming to an end faster than most Midlanders realize.

At 10:17 a.m. Sunday, the sun will journey south across the earth's equator, bringing the astronomical summer to an end in the northern hemisphere — and that includes the Tall City.

That moment — the autumnal equi-

nox - marks the beginning of fall,

one of four astronomical seasons re-

sulting from the earth's elliptical orbit around the sun. The equinox ("equal night" in Latin) results in equal segments of light and dark at the equator. In

addition, the sun rises directly out of the east at the equator on that day.

Sunday's sunrise for Midlanders will occur at 7:37 a.m. with sunset that day following at 7:45 p.m.

Sunlight will not fall below the 12hour mark in Midland until Thursday, when the sun rises at 7:40 a.m. and sets at 7:39 p.m.

The solar orb has quickened its pace southward across the earth as the planet careens along an elliptical orbit around the star. According to various reference books, the sun moves south at a rate approaching 21/2 degrees each week at this particular time in the season, bringing a rapid end to the long daylight periods of summer.

According to reference material, the rapid motion of the sun sometimes results in violent storms known as equinoctal gales, caused when unequal heating of warm and cold air masses develops.

While Sunday marks the change in the astronomical season, the climatical season changes at different rates across the country.

Autumn traditionally is blessed with warm days and cool, crisp nights. Sound seems more clear during autumn evenings than at any other time of year. In addition, descending cool air clears the skies in the evening, making the autumnal months among the best for stargaz-

Autumn also is the time when birds, butterflies and other migratory animals go south in seeking the sun's

Climatically, summer is far from finished. Normally during autumn, sections of the United States experience a period of hot daily temperatures known as Indian Summer. Residents of equatorial regions experience a very short fall and spring.

Autumn also is the traditional time of harvest, though in Texas that harvest takes place in late autumn.

While farmers may miss the rapidly fading daylight in their agricultural chores, they are aided in October and November by a series of harvest moons

The October harvest moon is due to rise at sunset on Oct. 5, according to various reference sources.

The autumnal equinox occupies a unique spot among the four astronomical seasons. The time between the spring and autumn equinoxes is about six days longer than from the autumn to spring equinoxes, according to various reference materials. That fact illustrates the earth's elliptical path around the sun, scientists say.

The time between the winter and summer solstices is about equal, according to reference materials.

Other cosmic events in the near future include the return of the moon to the evening sky next week as the lunar orb heads toward its first

The moon will reach perigee, or its closest point to the earth, on Oct. 4, when the heavenly body will be a mere 223,253 miles away from the planet. The moon should appear larger than usual those days as it rises above the horizon.

Apogee will be attained Oct. 19 when the moon is 252,442 miles

Sept. 29 marks the return of the first quarter moon

The next astronomical season will not occur until Dec. 22 when the winter solstice transpires. That event marks the arrival of the sun at the Tropic of Capricorn, south of the equator. While it will be winter here, residents of the southern hemisphere will just be entering the summer sea-

And Midlanders - sitting in their heated homes - will begin making plans for next summer.

MiG-19 jet fighters. But Egyptian officials indicate they are concerned about the time lag in obtaining U.S. equipment and note that its value is still unproven to the Egyptian military man.

The Soviets have large numbers of tanks and planes stockpiled in depots and can deliver very quickly," the high-ranking Egyptian official said. 'It takes a long time to get weapons from the United States because of the lack of stockpiles and the congressional process.'

The Phantoms, rushed to Egypt in time for the Oct. 6 annual military parade, came from operational U.S. units.

Senate holds secret debate on fate of draft registration

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate went behind locked doors Friday to near secret details about manpower problems facing the armed forces in wartime and arguments for compulsory draft registration.

For nearly three hours the public and press were excluded as senators reviewed the outcome of a Pentagon test pointing out the armed services' equipment and personnel shortages.

It was the Senate's first secret debate since May 15, 1978, when it was considering the sale of U.S. warplanes to Egypt and Israel.

Friday's closed session was requested by Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., to bolster his case for registering young men for a military draft - an idea that appears to have died in Congress

this year. Faced with a 252-163 House vote against registration and a threatened filibuster in the Senate, Nunn said he would settle for a debate on manpower shortages and would drop his campaign for passage of a registration bill

Temperatures in 80s forecast

Nunn's bill, opposed by the Carter administration but supported by the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the nation's top military body, would require registration of all men between the ages of 18-26, beginning next January. Senate leaders agreed Thursday to

Nunn's request for a secret meeting. At 10:13 a.m., Nunn requested that the Senate go into closed session, and the presiding officer ordered the sergeant at arms to clear the visitor and press gallaries and lock the doors. Eight senators were present at the

Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., who had threatened to filibuster to block registration, said the closed session

did not persuade him to change his Describing the closed session, Hatfield said the sergeant-at-arms was sent out after the doors were closed to round up enough senators for a quorum - half the 100 members. The attendance quickly dropped to about

45 senators and had dwindled to about 15 at the end. 'That so many drifted off was indicative there was skepticism...or they felt we weren't going to reach any conclusion," said Hatfield.

Nunn argued that registration alone would not solve the military's manpower problems, but said it would cut three months from the time it would take to mobilize new recruits, complete training and make them available for duty.

Nunn sought the session after Defense Secretary Harold Brown refused to lift the secrecy stamp from details of a 1978 mobilization exercise called Nifty Nugget. The senator, chairman of the Armed Services manpower subcommittee, argued that Nifty Nugget underscored the need for registration.

Sen. William Cohen, R-Maine, a member of the manpower subcommittee, said he also had reviewed the classified information, but had not come to Nunn's conclusion that registration would solve problems that were unveiled.

Shrine Circus: It's more than fun

The three-ring Shrine Circus that's designed to delight children and adults alike is also employed to raise funds for the Shriners' 18 hospitals for crippled children and three hospitals for young burn victims.

Yeah, we're proud of what we're doing," said Billy Carr of the Midland Suez Shrine, which is sponsoring the circus. Shriners hospitals have been rendering free medical help to children,

from infancy to 16, who need orthopedic and burn treatment. "It costs the patient no money at all," he said. Circus performances will be at 2:30 and 7:30 p.m. today and Sunday in the

Chaparral Center at Midland College. The show will be the 29th annual edition of the Clyde Bros. Carden-Johnson Circus Inc. To date, Shriners such as Joseph Burrell have given away thousands of

circus tickets to school children through the third grade in Midland. Shriners hospitals are in the United States, Mexico and Canada and care for crippled and burned children from throughout the world.

Since the Shriners' first hospital was established in Shreveport, La., thousands of children have been treated and lives have been saved. Two Shriner units are in Texas: the orthopheic unit in Houston and the

burn unit in Galveston. 'You talk to anybody who has had a child down there," Burrell said of the Galveston burn unit, "and they'll sing the praises."

"I guess that's our whole purpose — children," Carr said.
One who knows of that first-hand is Linda O'Donnell. Almost four years ago, her son, Cecil "Skeeter" Tipton, who's now 18, suffered severe burns over 42 percent of his body when he threw volatile fuel onto a pile of leaves and tree trimmings in the back yard. He assumed an earlier fire in the pile had died out.

Fumes got in Tipton's clothing, ignited, and he - on fire - ran. Much damage had been done by the time the fire was out.

That very day, Tipton was sent to the Shriners hospital in Galveston. He was there for three months, and has undergone treatment since. Mrs. O'Donnell estimated the monetary value of that treatment at \$150,-

"We're firm believers that if there had not been a Shriner hospital, he wouldn't have made it," she said of her son.

She and her husband were so impressed that he, Robert O'Donnell, became a Shriner. This year he ischairman of the circus. "The only injury worse than a burn is death," Mrs. O'Donnell said.

The Shrine is a religious fraternal order.

"So many people have the idea that the Shriners have fun and good times," Mrs. O'Donnell said. "But that's not why they're Shriners. Their main objective is to help burned and crippled children.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter, concerned over his defeats in Congress, is threatening to cut off White House favors to congressmen contended "that is no threat." who repeatedly vote against his pro-

grams. House Democrats said Carter made the threat Thursday night after several voiced complaints that the president was not using his powers in an effort to help them get his programs passed.

"Burns affect every organ of your body."

Rep. Gunn McKay of Utah, who attended the meeting Thursday night at the White House, quoted Carter as telling the congressmen:

"Look, I'm not going to reap retribution on every person who doesn't vote the way I want, but I've been into a lot of your districts and if you're not going to give me any help I'm not going to keep going into your districts or send my wife or family there.

Other Democrats said Carter told them he is keeping computer printouts of their votes in his desk.

Another congressman, who asked that he not xe identified, said Carter told the group: "I'm watching the votes and if you expect me to send myself, my wife or my Cabinet to your district when you're not helping me, you're kidding yourself."

Carter made the statements in a meeting with members of United Democrats of Congress, an organization of moderate to conservative con-

Participants described the meeting as a lively, plain-talk session. About

60 Democrats attended the session. They said both Carter and the House members spent much of the two-hour session discussing a string of Carter defeats in Congress, including an embarrassing rejection Thursday of a bill designed to implement final details of the Panama Canal

Rep. Richardson Preyer, D-N.C. who also attended the session, said Carter was hurt most by the Panama Canal vote. The treaties are to go into effect on Oct. 1.

Preyer quoted Carter as saying: "It's the worst blow of my presiden-

Preyer said Carter "did not strike me as harsh. I think the president was really very patient with us."

On Friday, House leaders angrily denied that Carter's statements constituted a threat to his opponents. Democratic Leader Jim Wright said the meeting "was inspiring" because Carter got tough.

"This was a family meeting and whoever selectively leaked out what he said is a crum - and wrong," Wright said. "I did not hear any

Kennedy would be primary 'favorite,' UAW leader says

DALLAS (AP) - Sen. Edward Kennedy would be the United Auto Workers' "overwhelming favorite" in a primary race against President Carter, the president of the 1.5 mil-

lion-member union said Friday. Douglas Fraser's statement marks the first time he publicly predicted his workers would back Kennedy and stems from a Monday vote by the union's International Executive Board that allows UAW members to support the candidate of their choice

in next year's primaries. Some UAW members in Florida had asked for the sanction because of some "draft Kennedy" movements

"In a head-to-head run against Carter, Kennedy would be the overwhelming favorite among out active people," Fraser said.

UAW union officials from across the country are in Dallas for two days of meetings on the proposed contract with General Motors.

Fraser said the executive board's vote to officially let the union officers and members work for their choice of candidate is "a change for us" in recent elections. The last time was in

Salem, Massachusetts, jury convicts man of raping his estranged wife



James J. Chretien was also convicted on a related burglary charge, but was acquitted on one charge of rape and one charge of burglary. He could face up to life in prison on the rape charge. The burglary charge carries a minimum mandatory sentence of 10

Judge Thomas J. Morse Jr. scheduled sentencing for Monday. Chretien was led from the courtroom after the verdicts and taken to the Salem jail. His 32-year-old wife, Carmellina, and their 9-year-old son, James Jr., were not in the courtroom

"We got more people than we expected," said Louis Ellis, director of curriculum development and services. "We are in the midst of a massive reproduction, and supplies will be reinforced.'

New concept in housing explored

By BILL MODISETT Staff Writer

A representative of a California company Friday presented a concept for alternate moderate income housing to members of the Midland City Council, Planning and Zoning Commission, financial institution representatives and others involved in

housing. The informational meeting, held at 1:30 p.m. in Council Chambers, was conducted by Odessa mobile home park owner Mike Furman and Wayne Cruson, director of marketing for Immobile Home Co. of San Jose, Calif.

What the two men presented was a plan to develop subdivisions of manufactured housing. These houses would be offered to prospective homebuyers for about a 30 percent reduction from the price of a conventional, or sitebuilt, home.

Although the basic dwellings are essentially mobile homes, Cruson noted, they are designed in such a manner as to provide private living in the mode of a "patio home.

The concept, Cruson said, was developed in California after developers realized that mobile home parks, in the contemporary sense, were not well-accepted by the public.

"The houses (mobile homes) are architecturally and aesthetically unacceptable," Cruson said, explaining

The homes are situated on the lot in such a way that private patios can be provided for each home. Fences usually of solid construction - also are recommended for such subdivisions, Cruson said.

He discouraged those at the meeting from using such housing in conjunction with an existing mobile home park, saying the existing park would detract from the concept of the new type of housing. On price, neither Cruson nor Fur-

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The chairman of a Senate committee looking into the state's mortgage money crunch said Friday that Texans - those who can qualify for home financing — pay more for interest than for everything else in their homes.

But Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, also predicted that a new state agency may be able to come up with \$200 million for Texans looking for home financing. "It's abundantly clear to me that unless govern-

ment takes a role in making money available single-family housing may be a thing of the past in the not too distant future...unless you happen to be born rich," he said. Parker is leading the Senate Interim Committee

on Financial Institutions as it tries to figure out how to make home finance money more available to Texans. At Friday's session, the committee's first, the members said they want to hear from lending institutions, state agencies that deal with lending institutions and home-buyers who cannot find financ-

The committee chairman said he is confident that the new state housing authority will soon be able to make financing available at 7 or 8 percent.



"I used to have a little pop, I sure did," Carson says in an interview taped for CBS' "60 Minutes." "I don't handle it

"You and McMahon, really, you don't," Wal-lace asks, referring to Carson's longtime "Tonight" show sidekick, Ed McMahon.

"I don't handle alcohol well at all, no. Really, I don't," Carson says, adding: "Oh, Ed and I have had some wonderful times in the past."

The segment, to be aired Sunday evening, was taped at Carson's California home last spring. A portion of the interview, in which Carson proclaims he would like to leave "Tonight" after 17 years as host of the late-night show, was edited for broadcast in

The dispute with NBC over Carson's desired departure still has not been settled.



On second thought, make that the Rebel Fact because Midland Lee proved the point Friday night at Memorial Stadium with a 10-0 victory over the highly respected Plainview Bulldogs. The Rebels just knew how

to prove the point. Even though the Rebels played two different halves of football, the result was good. Lee used awesome ball control to post 10 first half points and then came up with at least two big key defensive plays in the second half to salt away their second shutout of the season and their third victory in as

many starts. Now bring on the 5-4As. Lee went to reserve fullback Scott Collins often (23 carries for 78 yards) to control the ball and quarterback Gary Butler passed for 43 yards in the first half to guide Lee to 10 first half

Plainview coughed up the ball three times in the first half and displayed a punting game kin to Pee Wee football as Lee started every first half drive inside the Plainview 50-yard line. So, in five chances Lee managed two

scoring drives.

Larry Linne, the soccer style phenom, hit on a 22-yard field goal midway through the first half after missing on a 35-yard attempt on Lee's first march goalward. 
Three share LPGA tee lead

Purdue's Larry Gates, who has established himself as the top backup for quarterback Mark Herrmann, and Notre Dame's Tim Koegel, who could get the starting job against the Boilermakers Saturday, are former high school teammates.

Koegel, a junior, and Gates, a freshman, both played at Cincinnati Moeller. Koegel could be thrust into action this week as a result of an ankle injury to Irish starting quarterback Rusty Lisch a week ago.

Gates showed his potential in a fourth-quarter relief appearance last week against UCLA.

"I was happy the coaches called on me quickly; it'll give me confidence for the future," said Gates, who completed five of seven passes and one touchdown in a 73-yard scoring drive for the Boilermakers. "It was a thrill getting to play. I was nervous, but after the first few plays I was OK."

HERRMANN, who was slightly dazed from earlier contact against the Bruins, said Gates "did a great job. He was pressured and kept his cool and found the open man. He gave the offense a lift. He's going to help us and should be an excellent backup quarterback, one the offense can have

confidence in. Barring injury, however, Herr-mann will be the chief worry for the fifth-ranked Irish in Saturday's game at Ross-Ade Stadium before an expected sellout crowd of more than 70,000, the largest ever to attend a football game in the state of Indi-

"Herrmann might be the best quarterback in the country," said Notre Dame Coach Dan Devine. "The key to our game will be what we can do with Herrmann. Along with his passing. now he's scrambling, and that puts additional pressure on the defense."

The Notre Dame defense shut down Michigan in the second half last week as the Irish posted a 12-10 victory. The big problem for Purdue this week should be the running of senior halfback Vagas Ferguson, who carried 35 times for 118 yards against the Wol-

"Ferguson is one of the top running backs in the country," said Purdue Coach Jim Young. "Based on the way our defense played last week, I'm sure he'll be getting quite a few car-

The Boilermakers' defense, a much-heralded veteran unit that returned nearly intact after allowing only 9.9 points per game last year, has been a big disappointment this season. Last week, Purdue fell behind 21-0 and lost 31-21 at UCLA.

Devine, whose teams have beaten Purdue the past four years in the annual series, said the Irish are capable of showing more offense than they did against Michigan.

"I'm also sure that having a game under our belts will be a great help to our offensive execution," Devine

The game at West Lafayette, Ind., is the only game between top 20 teams, the Irish ranking fifth and the Boilermakers 17th.

Guy changes 'Hang Time' meaning

By JIM MURRAY

The Los Angeles Times Syndicate 'Hang time' in the Old West was a time when the rustlers turned slowly, slowly in the wind under a cottonwood tree. For Kipling's Danny Deever, it was the morning. For Captain Kidd, it was high noon off the highest yardarm in the British fleet. For Nathan Hale, it was the time just before the battle of Long Island.

is the agonizing eternity when they wait, scanning the skies anxiously, like aircraft spotters in a war, waiting for a football which seems to be in orbit, to make its reentry and splash down, usually around their own 4yard line. The guy who catches it knows exactly what Captain Kidd, Danny Deaver and the other felt like as they mounted the gibbet. By the time the ball arrives, so have the Oakland Raiders, the most ferocious 11-man boarding party this side of Morgan the Pirate's black-legged

"Hang time" is the contribution to modern footballof Mr. Ray Guy, a man who has elevated the punting of a football to, a, you might say, a high art. "Hang time" is the — so it seems to the receiving team — in between the time a football leaves this Guy's foot and again becomes visible to the naked eye, descending. Sometimes, it comes down with snow on it.

ACTUALLY, THE football is in the air only a little over five seconds, or even a little under, but, since this is a league where even 280-pound linemen

run the 40 in 4.8 or less, it seems to the guy waiting under the football as if his whole life were flashing before his eyes, like a guy going down for the third time.

I don't know the physics involved, but years ago they made a big thing out of a guy catching a baseball dropped from the top of the Washington Monument. Compared to catching a Ray Guy punt, that's like snatching But, for special teams in the NFL, it a pie off a window sill. Ray Guy's punts go far - 50 to 60 yards from the line of scrimmage — but that's not the

> They go in a high, hyperbol rc like a shell leaving a railroadgun, and, if they go 50 or 60 yards as the crow flies, they are a menace to airline navigation where they reach their apogee. Ray is the only Guy to ever kigk a football as high as the scoreboard in the Superdome in New Orleans, which he did in a Pro Bowl game. Teammates swear he kicked a ball in the first quarter in practice once that didn't come down till the fourth quarter. "It looks like a seed up there, it's so high," a punt returner once grumbled.

In the opening game of the season, against the Rams, Ray Guy punted six times for a 41-yard average. The Rams' punter punted five times for a 24-yard average, and two of them were blocked. In addition, one of Ray Guy's celestial punts took so long returning to earth that the Rams' Eddie Brown was hit as he caught it and fumbled it away. And that, sports fans, was the old ballgame. And maybe the old Super Bowl.

THE LATE Red Sanders, the wiliest of football on the bulletin board before a season opened. Commandment No.7, as I recall it, read as follows: "Stress the kicking game, for it is here games are won or lost." To Sanders, the kick was an offensive weapon. He frequently quick-kicked opponents into hopeless field position. He frequently kicked on third down, reasoning he could gain more yardage that way than any other.

But punting, as a weapon, has fallen into such disuse, of late, that when Ray Guy was drafted by Oakland as its No.1 draft choice in 1973, the league was baffled. Ray Guy was a quondam quarterback and free safety at Southern Mississippi University, and, at neither position, did the Raiders appear to need help.

Canny Al Davis, resident genius of the Oakland battlefronts, wanted Guy for defense, all right, but not the way Ray thought. A passing scout reported to Davis that Ray Guy had kicked one so high one day that three duck hunters four miles away had taken aim and tried to shoot it down.

IT MARKED the first time a punter had been drafted No.1 in the NFL. Guy was among those unimpressed. "He resented it," laughs Al Davis today. "But, at the time we drafted him, he was in the hospital with a broken leg. I had our doctor examine him, and when he said he was all right I knew our kicking situation was solved for 10 years.

scrimmage is nothing, it's the dis-

tance from earth that counts." Guy became reconciled to his specialist's role, but he is as unable to explain why he is able to kick higher, farther and more consistently than any punter in history as a bumble bee is to explain how it can fly. "It's repetition, I guess," he shrugs.

Closer students of the game say Ray Guy's form is like that of a crack golfer who has a repeating swing. The foot, like the clubhead, comes into the impact zone at precisely the right time, every time. The foot is fully extended and pointing skyward like that of a Radio City Music Hall Rockette. The velocity is maximum. Also, because he has such distance, Ray Guy is able, so to speak, to play from the blue tees.

What's the most important thing to have to be a successful punter? Guy was asked. "Confidence in your blockers," he laughs

Punts are designed plays with Ray Guy, and not just kind of put in a bottle and thrown overboard. Like Minnesota Fats, he calls his shots. He all but diagrams the parabola of the kicks for his teammates. "I want them to know what kind of a kick I'm planning so they won't outrun their coverage," he explained. "You have to remember, they can't see the kick." Neither, of course, usually, can the opposition. Reportedly, in Texas Stadium one night, a punt-return team member shouted to another 'Whether is it?!" on a Guy kick and the teammate answered "It's over Adds Davis: "The distance from Abilene but it's due here any mi-





Nuns, social activists file suit against coal company

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - A group of Roman Catholic nuns and social activists has filed suit against one of Kentucky's largest coal producers to force safety, environmental and labor reforms.

The Knoxville-based Blue Diamond Coal Co. company had no comment after the suit was filed Wednesday at Chancercy Court in Wilmington, Del., where it is chartered.

The Sisters of Loretto, an order of nuns based in Nerinx, Ky., and 13 other plaintiffs said they have bought a total of 159 shares of Blue Diamond stock over the past 18 months. They charged the company has refused to list them as stockholders in an effort to keep the number of registered shareholders below 500.

Under the Securities Exchange Act, a firm with assets above \$1 million and more than 500 shareholders is required to register with the SEC, and disclose information about its operations and communications with stock-

Sister Marian McAvoy said the effort was aimed at forcing Blue Diamond to improve its record on mine safety, water pollution and labor re-

With more than \$75 million in assets, Blue Diamond is one of Kentucky's largest coal producers, mining more than three million tons a

It also has had more than 4,600 federal safety violations since 1970. Twenty-six men were killed at its Scotia mine in two explosions in March 1976. Blue Diamond also was barred from getting federal contracts for three years because of its safety

Standard Oil Co. (Indiana) offered to buy Blue Diamond for \$140.7 million in an exchange-of-stock transac-

tion in December. The deal was called off in March after Standard raised questions about Blue Diamond's reserves and pending litigation, including a suit by families of the men killed

at Scotia. The Sisters of Loretto, who purchased 81 shares of stock last November and December, also want to end d's status as a privately held corporation exempt from the scrutiny of the public and the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Ralph Dye, a Blue Diamond vice president and secretary and one of the defendants, said the firm would have no comment on the suit until its attorneys could go over it.

Blue Diamond President Gordon Bonnyman could not be reached for comment Wednesday. But he said earlier this month that the action appeared to be a continued effort at harassing his firm because of its successful resistance to efforts by the United Mine Workers union to organize miners at its Justus mine at Stearns, Ky.

Other plaintiffs in the suit include the Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary in Monroe, Mich.; the Commission on Religion in Appalachia; the Council of the Southern Mountains, the Episcopal Church Publishing Co. and the Jesuit Appalachian

Agreement to import gas from Mexico announced

Carter announced an agreement Friday for the purchase of Mexican natural gas - an accord he termed "a significant step toward providing a new energy source for our country." Carter told reporters the agree-

ment, which climaxed two years of often difficult negotiations, also represents a "breakthrough" in the development of a "deeper and broader relationship" with Mexico.

Although the Mexican gas, to be imported by a consortium of U.S. pipeline companies, will fetch a higher price than gas from Canada, Carter said "the price is fair to both countries.'

Assistant Secretary of State Julius Katz said the higher price for Mexican gas would be "hardly noticeable" because it will represent only one-half of 1 percent of U.S. consumption.

Negotiators for both governments had pushed to complete the elusive agreement in advance of the arrival here next Thursday of Mexican President Jose Lopez Portillo, who will confer with Carter on a host of bilateral issues

Initial imports of gas piped in from Mexico will be small - about 8 percent of total gas imports. But officials say they view the agreement as significant because it establishes rules for U.S. access to the Mexican gas reserves, believed to be potentially among the largest in the world.

At the outset, Mexican gas will cost \$3.625 per thousand cubic feet, the equivalent of \$21 per barrel for crude

Although this is sharply lower than Mexico's original demand of \$4.95, the quarterly price hikes, keyed to an index that ties gas to the price of fuel

The purchase price of the Mexican gas compares with a current American market price of about \$2.25 and a Canadian price of \$2.80.

to review its price for gas exports to the United States because the Mexican price is higher. They said the Canadian price could go to \$3.30 or

Originally, Mexico wanted the price tied to the cost of high-grade heating oil delivered to New York. The equivalence is calculated by determining how much gas would be required to match the potential heating power of

Senate committee votes on heat pump tax credit Bid specifications, regulations 4 forms may be secured from Parchasing Agent, 801 South Moran, Midland, Texas, 683-6228

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate Finance Committee voted Friday to make heat pumps eligible for a proposed \$1,000-per-home tax credit for energy conservation.

Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., sponsor of the amendment, cited industry estimates that the tax incentive would result in installation of heat pumps in enough homes to save the equivalent of 166,000 barrels of oil per day by 1990.

The cost to the Treasury in tax revenues would be \$755 million a year by 1990.

A heat pump, generally considered to be more efficient than other forms of electric heating, cools in the summer and extracts heat from the outside air in tions may be made Saturthe winter to heat a home. The credit would go to day morning between 8 am those who replace an existing resistance heating and 10 am only. system with a heat pump.

The committee had agreed earlier in the week to expand an existing tax credit for home weatherproofing. The credit under current law is for a maximum of \$300 per home, with most of the expenditures representing the purchase of storm windows and insulation.

Under the proposal approved tentatively by the committee, the maximum credit for all home weather-proofing would rise to \$1,000, including insulation, storm windows, heat pumps and other devices. The a.m credit would be for 50 percent of the first \$2,000 of expenditures, starting next July 1.
