# 'Operation Sombrero' continues in Gulf

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Mexican oil workers hope to finish capping the runaway Ixtoc-I oil well today after lowering a 125-ton steel cone into place over the maverick gusher that has fouled Gulf Coast beaches from Mexico to southern Texas.

The capping operation, aimed at reducing the flow of oil and natural gas by 85 percent, was halted by darkness Sunday. A team of 300 technicians, divers and engineers from the Mexican state oil monopoly PEMEX had worked for a dozen hours Sunday to lower the 35 foot by 69 foot cone onto the underwater superstructure over the well.

"The cone is in place on the structure and (Monday) we will rotate it 90 degress to put it over the mouth of the well." said Jose Luis Garcia Luna, a senior PEMEX engineer working on the project, dubbed "Operation Som-

A company spokesman said the team hoped to complete its work by the end of the day.

The purpose of the cone is not to plug the well, but to turn it into a producing well" until it can be closed, said a PEMEX spokesman in Mexico City, who declined to be identified. "Fifteen percent will still possibly spill into the ocean and have to be collected.'

PEMEX says it has spent about \$1 billion so far on several attempts to cap the runaway test well, located 50 miles off the Campeche Bay shrimping port of Ciudad del Carmen in southern Mexico. It also is drilling two relief wells at angles to the blowout in hopes of eventually shutting it

About 84 million gallons of oil have spilled into the bay and drifted as far north as the southern Texas coast. In the seven weeks since oil first began blackening South Texas beaches, U.S. damage claims and cleanup coasts have climbed to about \$360 million.

Three suits seeking a total of \$355 million in damages have been filed in Texas against PEMEX and firms working at the well site.

U.S. Coast Guard officials fear more oil may stain the Texas coast, but they say the autumn shift of offshore currents to the south has helped push many large patches of crude away from the coast.

In one of its earlier attempts to cap the well, PEMEX workers forced about 80,000 steel and lead balls down the well under pressure. The company says that effort stemmed the flow of oil by one-third, from 1.3 million gallons a day to about 420,000 gallons.

An equal amount of natural gas has been pouring out of the well and burning in a brilliant torch that rises in a spectacular fury out of the sea. PEMEX claims about half of the spilled oil is burned in the surface

fire, part evaporates and part is cleared away by surface skimmers. The spill is more than double the worst previous, that of the wreck of the supertanker Amoco Cadiz off the French coast in March 1978.

# Bokassa granted political asylum in Ivory Coast posed Central African dictator Jean

Bedeal Bokassa flew to this West African nation from France today and was granted political asylum, ending a three-day odyssey in search of an exile home.

The self-styled Emperor Bokassa I was flown to Abidjan aboard a French military aircraft after spending 56 hours at a military air base at Evreux, France, 65 miles west of Paris. The French had refused to allow him to disembark there and

The government's refusal of asylum for Bokassa aroused the ire of legal circles and the French Democratic Association of Jurists, an organization of lawyers and judges, expressed astonishment at the official

"It is a violation of fundamental law, according to which one cannot deny a citizen access to his own country, and above all that it is incumbent upon the government to hand Jean Bedel Bokassa over to the courts because of the crimes charged against him," the jurists said in a written statement

The London-based human rights organization Amnesty International charged that about 100 schoolchildren were massacred in the Central African Empire's capital of Bangui in April. That charge was confirmed by an independent commission of African jurists who concluded that Bokassa's "presence at the sites (of the killings) is proven, his participation is quasi-certain.'

Reports from Bangui quoted Dacko as saying during a brief meeting with reporters Sunday night that he rest warrant for Bokassa. Diplomatic sources said earlier, however, that if the ex-emperor were allowed to enter France, officials in Bangui also would be faced with legal problems posed by his dual nationality.

Dacko, 49, who was the country's first president, was himself overthrown by then-Col. Bokassa, commandant of the army, on New Year's Eve 1965. Dacko was held under close house arrest for 10 years until Bokassa freed him and named him a personal adviser.

Bokassa proclaimed himself emperor in 1976 and changed the name of the country from the Central African Republic to the Central African Em-





## Israeli jets down four Syrian MiGs

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Israeli warplanes, including the advanced American-made F-15, battled with Syrian jets in the skies south of Beirut today and shot down four Syrian MiG-

A Syrian military communique said two Israeli fighters also were "hit," but the Israeli military command in Tel Aviv said all its planes returned safely to base.

Two of the Syrian jets crashed in flames near Beirut International Airport, but their pilots parachuted to safety, Lebanese government sources said. The other two MiGs reportedly went down in nearby mountains.

Syria charged that the Israeli jets had attacked civilian camps south of

It was the second dogfight between the old enemies in four days, and came at a time when the United States and other countries are growing increasingly critical of Israeli military actions in Lebanon. But Israel vows to continue its policy of striking at Palestinian guerrilla bases in southern Lebanon.

Washington has also complained to the Israelis about the use of U.S.made warplanes in Lebanon, saying this violates agreements under which the aircraft were provided for defensive purposes only. Israel says its operations are pre-emptive strikes to defend against Palestinian attacks.

The Israeli command said its jets, including F-15s, were on a surveillance mission over Palestinian guerrilla bases when they were attacked by the Syrian planes.

Lebanese government sources said the Israeli jets earlier had flown over Beirut airport and the nearby Sabra Palestinian refugee camp, which houses Yasser Arafat's Palestine Liberation Organization headquarters.

The Syrians intercepted them in late afternoon as they flew east over the Lebanese mountains into the Begaa Valley, the sources said. The Israelis then flew back westward and the two sides clashed in the mountain foothills near the airport.

A Syrian military communique issued in Damascus said the Israeli jets 'raided civilian camps in the Damour area south of Beirut. Our jets confronted them. A dogfight followed. Two Israeli jets were hit and the remaining jets fled. We had four jets hit while the remaining planes returned to base safely.'

### McInnis issue due answer

EDINBURG, Texas (AP) - A crucial question in the civil disbarment trial of District Attorney Oscar McInnis whether jurors will hear tape recordings of the prosecutor's alleged plot to have someone killed may be answered this

week. The State Bar of Texas said it will ask District Judge Joe B. Evins to admit the recordings into evidence. McInnis claims he was the victim of a conspiracy that tried to trap him and force

NEW YORK (AP)—It was billed as a protest against nuclear power. By the time it ended, sunny skies, free music and a controversial issue drew an estimated 200,-000 people to the tip of Manhattan for a "No Nukes" rally.

Why did they gather here on the crisp first day of autumn?

"It was mainly for the music that I came, and to remember Woodstock and the '60s," said Princeton student Janine Verbinski, 20.

'People here will learn about the cause," said Jonie Miller, who came to take a stand against nuclear energy and sat in the front row

The peaceful day-long gathering was the largest anti-nuclear, prosolar rally in history and the focus of a day of similar protests nationwide. There were no arrests or other incidents here.

Elsewhere, however, protesters blocked the main gate to the Vermont Yankee nuclear plant in Vernon to disrupt its annual refueling. and police arrested 167 persons on charges of unlawful trespass.

## U.S. sides with China

Vice President Walter Mondale came startlingly close to voicing a United States commitment to protect China militarily during his visit to Peking, and then hastened to say that was not at all what he meant.

First, he told the Chinese in a televised speech that the United States is committed to "joining with you to advance our parallel strategic interests" and "any nation which seeks to weaken or isolate you in world affairs assumes a stance counter to American interests.

When these remarks were taken by Americans and others as going pretty far, Mondale had to do some explaining. "We do not have and do not anticipate a military relationship," he said in a later statement. He further emphasized that "Sino-American friendship is not directed against anyone"-meaning, of course, the Soviet Union.

It is all to the good that the vice president has put America's present China policy into focus. The essence of his statement is that a special intimacy has been achieved with China, but the United States is not officially taking China's side in the cold war between the Chinese Communists and the Soviets, nor has the United States any intention of allying itself militarily with China against Moscow.

Yet it is obvious that this nation is moving closer to China than to the Soviet Union. Witness Mondale's visit. The vice president committed the Carter adminstration to the Sino-American trade agreement which would extend most-favored-nation treatment to goods from China, and said the adminstration is prepared to grant China up to \$2 billion in Export-Import Bank credits over the next five years to finance the purchase of U.S. goods.

The Soviet Union has neither the privilege of most-favored-nation status nor Ex-Im Bank credits. Nor has the Soviet Union been placed in the category of a "friendly nation," a classification recently ruled applicable to China by Secretary of State Cyrus Vance and communicated to Peking by Mondale. The latter designation qualifies China for U.S. technical assistance in such areas as the hydroelectric project discussed in Peking.

Thus while the United States is not being exactly even-handed toward China and Russia, at the same time it can legally maintain it is basically neutral and not playing one nation off against the other. Not being formally committed to either side in the Soviet-Chinese dispute leaves the United States with freedom of action. 

## Justice Department shreds papers

WASHINGTON - One of the Watergate routines was the "deep-sixing" of documents, which showed negligence or worse on the part of government officials. It is a practice, unhappily, that still has not stopped. Senate investigators were stunned

to learn recently that as many as 50,000 grand jury documents had been shredded last March. The documents had been subpoenaed by a grand jury investigating price fixing by the international uranium cartel. The department's cavalier attitude toward documentary evidence would come as no surprise to senators if they had seen an internal Justice Department memorandum that was part of the records sealed by the court.

By a coincidence that, remarkably, struck government investigators as innocent at first, the destruction occurred between the arrival by mail of an "information copy" of the subpoena and the service of the actual subopoena by a U.S. marshal a few days later.

The funny coincidence became no laughing matter, however, when testimony by other Nuexco officials was heard by the grand jury. There was damning evidence that White had taken the documents home and destroyed them deliberately, and that he then tried - unsuccessfully, as it turned out - to get a subordinate, Sanford Anderson, to tell the grand jury less than the whole truth about the matter.

The recommendation of the Justice Department's Fabrikant and Freiberg was that White be indicted on two counts of obstruction of justice each punishable by a \$5,000 fine and five years in prison. But Shenefield let the erring uranium executive off with a contempt of court charge.

Shenefield may now be on the hook himself since several senators want to know about his role in stonewalling Senate investigation of the uranium cartel.



The Fed got its last grip on a monopoly over money and credit in the 1930s when the legal tender law was passed. That law requires you to accept Federal Reserve Notes, which are backed up by nothing, for all public and private debts.

The Fed is actually a money-making machine - for banks, for it creates new money by increasing bank credit. A bank credit is a bookkeeping entry, a clever way for people to make something from nothing.

Most people think when they borrow money from a bank, they are borrowing dollars previously deposited by the bank's customers. Not so Banks lend several dollars for each one dollar on deposit. What you walk out of the banks with is a bank credit; when you spend it, it becomes

A co-equal partner in creating inflation is the Congress. Deficit budgets are "monetized" by the Fed. The public debt these deficits create means money in the pockets of the people who own the government debt securities, mostly banks, including some foreign banks. Right now, taxpayers are shelling out around \$50 billion annually in interest payments on this debt.

If you are curious about the "collateral" for this huge debt, it is you and your children and your grandchildren. The only thing the government has is the power to confiscate a portion of the goods and services you create. It's called taxation.

So where does this leave you? It leaves you in a double bind. The less your dollar buys, the more pressure you put on your boss for a raise; the more raises you get, the higher the tax bracket.

What you have to do is to understand that inflation is not an accident, but a deliberate policy, a hidden tax the politicians and the Federal Reserve are levying on you. Forget OPEC, unions and businesses; they are not the culprits. They are red herrings used to hide the truth.

Understand that since inflation is a political decision, the only way you can fight it is politically. You will have to defeat incumbents and elect men and women who are not afraid to reform the monetary system and you will have to force the passage of constitutional amendments which will limit the taxing and spending powers of governments.

Otherwise, you will remain what you are - a serf.

## Energy leaders express skepticism about Carter's synthetic fuel plan

Energy Committee is beginning work in earnest this week on President Carter's proposal to offset U.S. dependence on imported oil with a huge synthetic fuels program.

Key energy leaders in both the House and Senate have expressed deep skepticism about Carter's proposal to spend \$88 billion over the next 10 years to extract oil from shale and on other unproven means of producing oil alternatives.

As a result, Carter said last week he would accept a smaller, phased-in \$20 billion effort.

Energy Secretary Charles W. Duncan was called before the Senate Interior Committee today to explain Carter's present position on synthetic fuels, which are to be financed by a new, independent Energy Security

During a House committee hearing on synthetic fuels last week, Rep. Richard L. Ottinger, D-N.Y., voiced some of the criticism heard in Con-

gress about the president's proposal.
"There is a lot of suspicion about turning over \$88 billion to an agency. that will have no political accountability to anyone," Ottinger said.

Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash... chairman of the Senate Energy Committee, has indicated he will propose that about \$20 billion be spent while various methods of producing synthetic fuels are tested.

## Some analysts believe interest rates peaking

NEW YORK (AP) — Don't hold your breath, as they say, or keep your fingers crossed, or in fact get involved in any of those physically uncomfortable positions, but.....could interest rates be peaking?

That notion is spreading among securities and economic analysts. It worked its way into the latest bond market review of Smith Barney Harris Upham & Co. And Merrill Lynch Economics sees a sharp drop ahead.

More importantly, some investment institutions, such as pension and mutual funds, apparently feel the same way — or so you would judge by their sudden interest in blue chip stocks late last Thursday.

Among those who have declared themselves most forcefully is Albert Cox Jr., president of Merrill Lynch Economics, a subsidiary of the big investment house. He foresees a "downward spiral" of interest rates.

In Cox's opinion, the reversal most likely will begin "in a matter of weeks," although he admits to some indecision. The downturn might be delayed until yearend, he concedes, with even higher rates until then.

No matter, he forecasts, the prime interest rate, now at 13.25 percent, will reach 8.5 percent by late 1980, aided by cutbacks in industrial inventories and thus the need for credit to finance them.

In theory, as interest rates drop stocks become more attractive. Or, to rephrase, as interest rates fall investments in debt securities pay poorer yields, while investments in equities, or ownership, pay more.

The explanation is uncomplicated: When interest costs fall, so do business costs. Moreover, companies canagain afford to invest in more productive plants and equipment, further lowering unit costs.

While most investors remain cautious about all markets, and others seem intent on getting the last fraction of a percent advantage out of rising interest rates, some already have been returning to stocks.

Are they acting prematurely? Investors recall that last spring, hoping to spur interest in stocks, some brokers told clients that interest rates already had peaked. So much for foresight.

It is true, too, that attempts to see the future are complicated by convulsions of the dollar, gold, interest rates, stocks, housing, energy. Alone and as they relate to each others, they baffle reason.

Hunches — now they're another thing. With interest rates at levels never before recorded, and with the signs that industry and individuals are lowering their credit demands, the feeling is spreading.

The feeling, that is, that interest rates that seemed headed to the heavens might be returning to earth, accompanied by economic static, to be sure, but returning nonetheless to their natural environment.

The re-entry isn't to be awaited with bated breath, any more than the next appearance of Haley's Comet. But it will be an event, a big one, and already they're talking it up in business and investment circles.

## Lead poisoning continues serious threat for children

ATLANTA (AP) — Lead poisoning is not the killer of children it once was, but it remains a serious threat and reports of youngsters being contaminated are increasing, the national Center for Disease Control reported last week.

Too much exposure to materials containing lead can lead to mental retardation and possibly death, the

According to a CDC survey released in its Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, the number of children aged 1 to 5 identified with lead toxicity increased 41.1 percent during the threemonth period ending March 31, 1979, compared to the same period a year

Dr. Vernon Houk of the CDC's Environmental Health Services Division said more health centers around the country are recognizing that "lead poisoning is a problem.

The scientist estimated that about 1 percent of the nation's children have

'undue lead absorption. He said deteriorating homes, heavily coated with lead paints, pose the greatest dangers to young children. "If the lead is high enough in a child, it leads to mental retardation and death," Houk said. "As for deaths, that part of the iceberg is down. What we are left with now is dealing with more lower level lead

Houk said the only way to prevent this is to "identify these children at the lowest level of exposure."

Dear Dr. Solomon: I sweet butter and unsalted nuts; those with modwas told to watch my inerate amounts of sodium include vegetables. bread, cereals, pasta and grains; while those high

take of salt because I have a tendency to high blood pressure. Since then, the meals my wife has been preparing have been so bland I really can't enjoy them. How about a word of advice to get her to relax a little? Milt Dear Milt: My word of

advice is this: Ask your physician what he meant when he told you to watch your intake of salt. For some people, that might simply mean not adding salt at the table; others, however, who have to be on a nearly salt-free diet, might have to severely restrict the use of salt. Your wife evidently is taking no chances - and she may be right.

Even a person who does not add salt to his food may be ingesting much more sodium than he should. Processed meats, for example, such as salami, are high in sodium, as are snack foods such as potato chips, and condiments such as mustard and ket-Many canned, frozen

and packaged foods, in-

cluding cereals and TV dinners, also contain substantial amounts of salt. One way to avoid inadvertent ingestion of large amounts of sodium is to get into the habit of reading labels. You may be surprised to learn how many of the products you have been using, possibly for years, contain salt or sugar or other ingredients of which you

are not aware. Foods low in sodium I recommend for my patients include fruits and fruit juices, cooking oils,

salt shaker by substituting a seasoning of kelp, which is dried, ground seaweed, and which is available in health food in sodium include milk,

meats, poultry, fresh fish, eggs, soft drinks, alcoholic beverages, candy, coffee, gelatins, lightly salted cheeses (such as Swiss and American), syrups, honey, molasses and leavening agents (such as baking powder and baking soda).


Very high-sodium foods include the processed meats, smoked fish, cooking wine, pea-nut butter, relishes, ketchup, mustard, strong cheeses (such as Roquefort), processed cheeses and, of course, salted snack food items.

În a medium saucepan, combine all ingredients except sugar. Cover and simmer until apples are tender, adding water if needed. Stir in sugar if you choose. Press through coarse sieve or food mill. CLEVELAND (AP) — If history repeats itself, as some believe, then the Cleveland Browns should be favored to beat the Dallas Cowboys in their National Football League clash

Instead, the Cowboys head into the meeting of undefeated teams as three-point favorites.

The kickoff of the nationally televised game is scheduled for 8:05 p.m. CDT in front of a sellout crowd of more than 82,000 in Cleveland's Municipal Stadium.

The Browns helped launch Monday night football on Sept. 21, 1970, with a 31-21 victory over the New York Jets. In fact, they've won four of their six appearances on Monday night, while the Cowboys have managed just one victory in eight appearances before the ABC cameras.

Dallas Coach Tom Landry shrugs off his team's Monday night history, saying, "I don't know why we've had so little success, but every game is different. You just have to take them as they come.

The Browns aren't thinking about past performances either, but most of them are happy for the chance to gain some national limelight. Don Cockroft, the veteran place-

kicker who booted the winning field goal in Cleveland's last Monday night appearance - a 30-27 overtime victory over New England two years ago is one of them.

"Every game is important, but I can say I'm glad they feel we're worthy of being on national television, and it also will be great playing one of the best teams in football," Cockroft

Browns running star Greg Pruitt has another reason for looking forward to the national exposure.

"It should be a great measuring stick as to what kind of team we are, and how good a running back I am. I think I'm as good as any guy in the game, and I'm looking forward to going head-to-head with (Dallas run- actually crazy.

'I know it and they know it," Franks said in an interview before a Cubs game with the Pittsburgh Pirates. "I don't know what they are waiting for."

Franks, who managed the San Francisco Giants from 1965-1968, indicated that he no longer finds managing enjoyable.


I've had it right up to here," he said, putting his right hand up to his throat. "Some of these players are



## Ron Luciano may sue AL over new decision

NEW YORK (AP) - Ron Luciano says he's going to sue the American League over its policy decision preventing the colorful umpire from working as an NBC broadcaster for the league playoffs.

"Right now, NBC is trying to make up its mind if they want to use me and not let baseball dictate to them," said Luciano from Milwaukee, where he was umpiring the Twins-Brewers game Sunday.

But Don Ohlmeyer, excecutive producer of NBC Sports, said baseball was not telling the network which announcer to use; baseball was merely making a policy decision that restricted an AL employee.

"Our position is simple," said Ohlmeyer. "He's one of the guys we're considering. But we're not going to get in the middle of a policy squabble between them. Baseball's taken a position that Ron is a baseball employee and they have a right to make that policy. We won't have baseball dictate policy to us, so we won't presume to dictate policy to them."

Ohlmeyer said NBC was also considering using Detroit Manager Sparky Anderson or Kansas City Manager Whitey Herzog as expert

Luciano also said he was thinking of also suing NBC because he and the network had a verbal agreement, including salary arrangement and dates. He said he wanted to work the playoffs, despite the AL's threat to fire him. Ohlmeyer, however, says he doesn't want that responsibility.

"I've been threatened with being fired all my life," said Luciano. Every time I make what somebody thinks is a bad call, I get threatened, which is about every couple of innings.

Luciano is not scheduled to work as an umpire for the playoffs or World Series. Luciano's lawyer, Richie Phillips, said nothing in the collective bargaining agreement would bar the umpire from working in a broadcast-

ing booth after the regular season. Lee MacPhail, the AL president, said Saturday that a league policy would prevent Luciano or any other umpire from working as a baseball commentator. MacPhail said the policy is not a written rule and never before has been called into question.

## John Fought pulls surprise

NAPA, Calif. (AP) - John Fought reached the final hole in a \$300,000 golf tournament Sunday and found himself in a situation that, two weeks ago, might have seemed frightening.

'I looked at the leader board and realized that if I made that putt, I could win the tournament. I couldn't believe it," said the 25-year-old golfer who made the putt and won his second consecutive title.

Two weeks ago, Fought was a virtual nobody on the pro golf tour, a rookie with \$22,000 in tournament winnings. Then he won the Buick Open by beating Jim Simons in a playoff and earned a check for \$27,-

'A lot of the credit must go to their defense. It has to be one of the finest we've played against since I've been at Baylor. I would certainly compare their defense to Texas, and it is widely acclaimed."

Alabama not only allowed Baylor to cross midfield just once in each half but intercepted six passes, recovered two fumbles and blocked a punt while the offense reeled off 431 yards on the ground.

Heisman Trophy winner Billy Sims scored twice while romping for 109 yards on 11 carries while J.C. Watts rushed for 122 on 20 to lead Oklahoma over Tulsa. Texas, which meets Oklahoma in three weeks, got a pair of 1-yard scoring runs from A.J. "Jam" Jones in the last two periods and fought off Iowa State. The Longhorns were the last major college team to get under way.


