NEWS IN BRIEF

Marine dies

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — A third U.S. Marine has died at Brooke Army Medical Center of burns suffered in a freak fire at a Japanese base, an Army spokesman said Friday. He was the eighth Marine to die from the accident.

Spokesman Jerry Dubois said the name of the victim would be withheld pending notification of ill relatives. The Marine died at 1:15 p.m., Dubois said.

Agency 'barred'

DALLAS (AP) — The only government agency investigating a midway accident at the State Fair of Texas has been barred from inspecting the "Swiss Skyride" by a court order.

Engineers for the State Fair and an attorney representing injured fairgoers were allowed to inspect the four damaged gondolas Thursday. Others in the inspection task force included representatives for the ride manufacturer, Von Roll Co. of Berne, Switzerland, and the ride's operators, Steck and Stapf Attractions, and insurance investigators.

But State Fair attorneys were granted a temporary restraining order that prohibited the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission from inspecting the rides. One of the three commission investigators locked out of the inspection site worked on a similar skyride crash at a Missouri amusement park last year.

Confession accepted

GEORGETOWN, Guyana (AP) — A court of inquiry on Friday accepted as evidence a confession by People's Temple member Larry Layton admitting responsibility in the November 17, 1978 shooting deaths of Rep. Leo Ryan and four others.

Layton made the confession shortly after the shooting, which triggered the murder-suicide of more than 900 cultists led by the Rev. Jim Jones at Jonestown, the jungle commune of the People's Temple.

In his confession, Layton admitted responsibility for the deaths of Ryan, a People's Temple member seeking to flee the commune, and three American journalists: NBC reporter Don Harris, NBC cameraman Bob Brown and Greg Robinson, a photographer for the San Francisco Chronicle.

'Kennedy' born

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — With only her husband helping with delivery, the eldest daughter of the late Sen. Robert F. Kennedy gave birth to an 8½-pound daughter at her home, family spokesmen said Friday.

The child, named Maevae Fahey Kennedy Townsend, was born Thursday and was reported in excellent health.

A smiling Kathleen Kennedy Townsend, the 28-year-old mother, was out of bed Friday, also in excellent condition. The late senator's widow, Ethel Kennedy, paid a visit Friday and cuddled her newest grandchild.

Jury acquits refugee of 'crab war' killing

SEGUIN, Texas (AP) — A state jury acquitted a young Vietnamese refugee of murder Friday in the death of a local fisherman during a "crab war" in the coastal town of Seadrift.

The jury, containing two retired Air Force officers who served in the Vietnam War, deliberated three hours and 20 minutes before returning its verdict for Nguyen Van Sau.

The 21-year-old South Vietnamese soldier-turned-fisherman was charged with killing Billie Joe Aplin,

35, in a summertime dockside shooting in the small town of Seadrift on the Texas coast.

His brother, Nguyen Van Chinh, 20, had been found innocent of the same charge Thursday on an instructed verdict from State District Court Judge Clarence Stevenson.

When Friday's verdict was announced, the victim's older sister, Sarah Vincent, 41, hysterically wept and said, "My brother was killed in cold blooded murder and I believe

they will murder all of us. I believe the Vietnamese will attempt to murder each and every one of my family. They own Seadrift now."

Judy Aplin, the victim's widow, was taken from the courtroom just after the verdict was read and could not be reached for comment.

Aplin's younger sister Ann, cried and attempted to comfort her brother's oldest daughter, 14.

"They (the jury) don't know what they've done to America," said Ann,

who would not give her last name. "They don't know what they've done to us."

Prosecutor William Day said, "I'm very disappointed in the verdict. I felt the evidence was there."

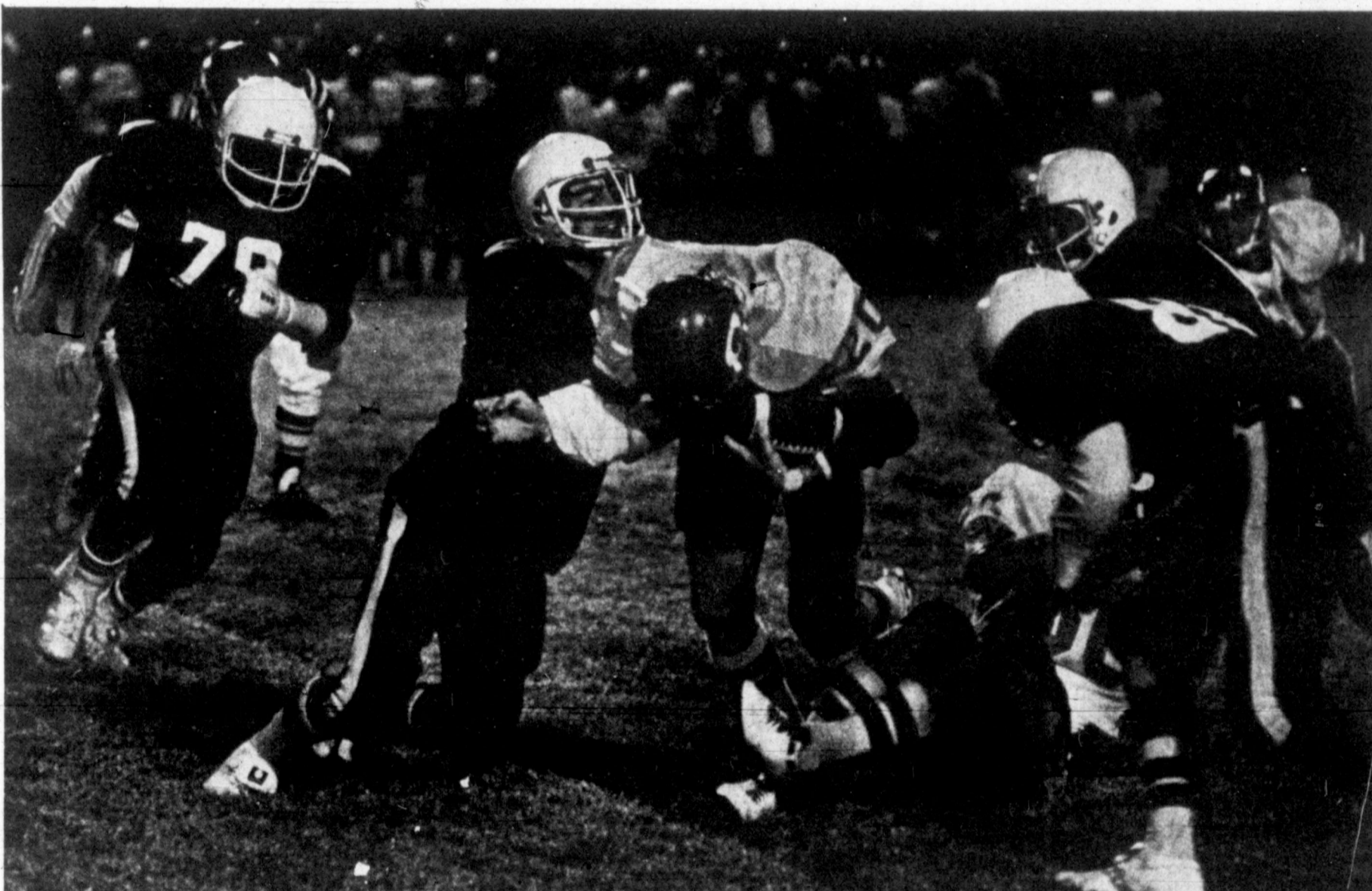
Mrs. Vincent said, "Never in our wildest dreams did we imagine they would be found not guilty."

Defense lawyer Pat Maloney said, "It's just magnificent. A magnificent social event. Justice has so richly been served."

He said it is "one of the most reassuring events in my belief of the judicial system."

Sau began crying very slightly when an interpreter told him of the verdict. He later managed only a slight smile and later shook hands with each of the jurors as they went by him.

"He was very moved and very grateful and very happy," said interpreter Dr. Nguyen Van Chau.

Six percent unemployed, figures show

WASHINGTON (AP) — Unemployment increased slightly to 6 percent of the labor force in October, up from 5.8 percent in September, but officials said it is too soon to say whether the long-awaited slide into a recession has started.

"You would have to have a crystal ball to say these are indications we're in or about to enter a recession," said Labor economist Norman Bowers. "The figures don't say that."

The Labor Department reported Friday that the number of unemployed rose by 200,000 to a total of 6.2 million in October, with most of the increase occurring among blacks and women. Employment dropped by 220,000 to 97.3 million, the department's household jobs survey showed.

The jobless rate of 6 percent was the same as in August. Unemployment has hovered in the range from 5.6 to 6 percent for the past 14 months.

Anticipating a recession in the economy, the Carter administration has been forecasting a rise in unemployment to about 7 percent next year. However, the recession has been slow to develop.

At the White House, press secretary Jody Powell said he did not believe anyone could make a projection for the future on the basis of the October figures. He said the economy "has been surprisingly."

Treasury Secretary G. William Miller said the October increase was "consistent with the general trend of the economy" and that there was "nothing particularly significant" about it.

Bowers said it would take several more months of increases of the magnitude of the October rise to say that unemployment was definitely rising as the result of slower economic growth.

But Janet Norwood, the commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, told a congressional committee that the October employment report does "reflect a clear slowdown in the rate of employment growth."

While total employment has increased 2.1 million during the past year, less than one-fourth of the gain, or 451,000 jobs, have been created in the past eight months.

The Labor Department said the increase in unemployment last month resulted from workers losing their jobs. However, a supplemental survey of business establishments reported a contradictory rise in non-farm payroll employment of 305,000 jobs to a total of 90.2 million.

Manufacturing employment was unchanged, while jobs in the construction increased by 30,000, the payroll survey showed.

The Labor Department, which relies primarily on the household survey for employment data, said such discrepancies have occurred before.

The department provided this breakdown on unemployment rates for October:

- Adult men: 4.3 percent in October, up from 4.2 percent in September.
- Adult women: 5.8 percent, up from 5.5 percent.
- Blacks and other minorities: 11.7 percent, up from 10.6 percent.
- Teen-agers: 16.6 percent, up from 16.4 percent.
- Whites: 5.2 percent, up from 5.1 percent.
- Full-time workers: 5.5 percent, up from 5.4 percent.
- Part-time workers: 9 percent, up from 8.3 percent.
- Blue-collar workers, 7.3 percent, up from 7.1 percent.
- White-collar workers, 3.5 percent, up from 3.3 percent.

Liberian official inspects tanker

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — A representative of the Liberian government inspected the charred hulk of the burning Burmah Agate and theorized Friday that some of the 27 missing crewmen still could be on board the tanker.

Two Liberian-flagged ships, the Burmah Agate and the freighter Mimosa, collided shortly before dawn Thursday near the entrance to the Galveston Ship Channel.

Four crewmen aboard the still burning tanker were killed and 27 remained unaccounted for as Coast Guard pulled out all but one search and rescue vessel in the Gulf of Mexico area Friday.

Capt. R.F. Ingraham, commander of the Marine Safety Office in Galveston, said seven professional fire fighters should arrive from the Netherlands some time Friday night. Owners of the Burmah Agate contracted with Smith International of

the Netherlands to put out the fire, Ingraham said.

Kenneth B. Hofstra, who will investigate the collision for the Liberian government, toured the collision area and said some crewmen could be aboard.

"You'd have to speculate that," Hofstra said. "It happened before 6 a.m., so, basically, other than the people on watch, and possibly the cook, most of them probably were asleep."

"You've got a fire going and some of them might never have made it out of their bunks. But it's still all speculation at this point. You can write your own ticket as to what really happened."

While Hofstra was inspecting the scene with Capt. Robert Ingraham of the Port of Galveston, another explosion rocked the Burmah Agate shortly before noon.

The explosion sent a mushroom-

shaped cloud of fire and smoke spewing about 300 feet into the air.

Three boats that had been spraying water on the tanker's deck since Thursday afternoon quickly pulled away as flames again belched out of the rear portion of the tanker.

Flames also spread out across the water but burned down in a short time, as did the spiraling flames from the stern.

The tanker continued to burn, however, at mid-afternoon.

Hofstra said he was surprised at indication the Burmah Agate was at anchor at the time of the collision.

One of the first Coast Guardsmen to arrive at the scene, Chief Petty Officer Ray Baker, also said the tanker's anchor chain was in the water when his helicopter arrived about 30 minutes after the collision.

"It is apparent to me from pictures I have seen that the tanker was at anchor," Hofstra said Friday. "The

anchor chain is out from the bow of the boat and into the water. That surprised me."

Hofstra said it was "very unlikely" that the force of the collision might have jolted the anchor and chain from its locker and into the water.

The tanker Burmah Agate, carrying 400,000 barrels of crude oil, collided with the freighter Mimosa about five miles off this island city. Both ships caught fire and still smoldered Friday, despite an all-night water barrage by commercial fireboats.

Coast Guard Chief Petty Officer Ray Baker said the Burmah Agate was preparing to sail for Houston at the time of the collision, but officials were not certain about the status of the tanker's anchor at the time of impact.

Lt. Kenneth Harry said the tanker was at anchor when he arrived at the scene about 80 minutes after the collision.

'Moscow' blamed for new violence in Soweto

SOWETO, South Africa (AP) — Black guerrillas struck a police station in this sprawling black community early Friday with Soviet-made hand grenades and assault rifles, killing two black policemen. The government blamed "Moscow" for the attack.

A black policeman and a civilian were wounded in the assault, the second in six months on a police station in Soweto.

Maj. Gen. Victor Verster, police commander of riot control, said as many as four blacks attacked the Orlando police station at about 12:40 a.m.

He said the attackers burst loose with an "indiscriminate" lurch of fire from Soviet-made AK-47s at police-

men and civilians in the charge office. At the same time, Verster said, other men threw four hand grenades at the back of the station. All the shooting victims were black.

Police officers said the entire attack lasted only a few minutes, and the guerrillas fled by car.

According to Soweto residents, police units poured into the township of about 1.5 million persons 10 miles southwest of Johannesburg and mounted a house-to-house search. But by Friday night there had been no arrests and the township was functioning normally.

Verster described the attack as a "fiasco." The raid did little damage to the police station.

scow gave them to carry out this attack I do not know," Verster said.

Verster's statement reflects the government's belief that there is a connection between organized black terrorism and Moscow, and the belief that exile black organizations like the African National Council and Pan African Council get financing and training from the Soviet Union.

On May 3, the Moroka police station in Soweto was hit by a guerrilla attack. One policeman was killed and five other persons were injured. One suspect was arrested, but he escaped from police custody. Leaflets scattered at the station identified the guerrillas as members of the African National Council, a militant black nationalist organization banned in

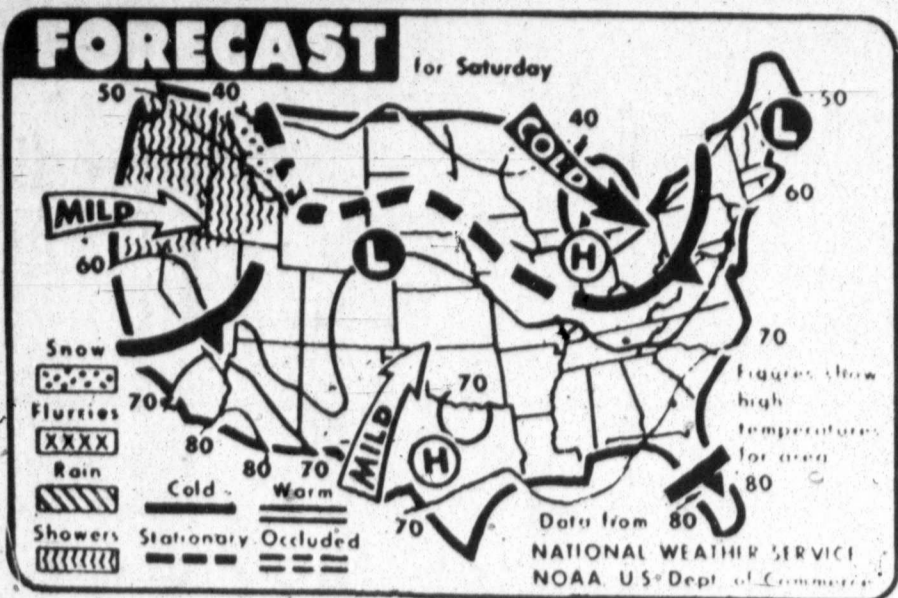
side South Africa.

No leaflets were left in Friday's attack, Verster said.

Bishop Desmond Tutu, secretary-general of the South African Council of Churches, declared that the Soweto attack demonstrated that "countless thousands of black people are becoming desperate because of the inhuman and oppressive conditions under which the apartheid laws force them to exist."

In June 1976, Soweto was rocked by blood rioting that left hundreds dead. The upheaval was sparked by a student protest over education policies, but later vented general black majority resentment of the white minority government.

Davis defense closes after hearing witness

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — The defense closed its case Friday after a rebuttal witness furnished testimony both helpful and harmful to millionaire Cullen Davis. Trial Judge Gordon Gray instructed the jury to return to court Monday morning for closing arguments and said to come prepared to spend the night. "Bring your toothbrush," he said. The defense called it quits at 2 p.m. and Gray called lawyers back later in the afternoon to hammer out the formal charge he will read to the jury Monday morning. The jury, unsequestered during the 12 weeks of testimony, will be locked up for the deliberation phase of the

marathon proceedings. The trial began July 30. Davis, 46, is accused of plotting the summertime 1978 contract murder of his divorcee, one of 15 persons on a purported hit list. The slender, stoic industrialist insists he was framed by his ex-wife Priscilla, key defense witness David McCrory, and karate instructor Pat Burleson. An earlier trial ended last January in Houston with the jury deadlocked 8-4 for conviction. The state has indicated it would not re-prosecute the case in the event of another hung jury. In the event of a conviction, the jury of eight men and three women would then hear additional testimony before determining punishment which ranges from five years to life in prison. A 12th juror suffered a broken leg midway through the trial and was excused from the panel. "I think the most obvious strength of the state case are the same as in Houston," said chief prosecutor Jack Strickland, referring to the physical evidence. "The tapes, photos, video tapes, the gun, the silencer, and the fact that witnesses for the state are by and large professional law enforcement people — people who have no motive, no reason not to be objective." Strickland dismissed the Davis defense as "illogical, unreasonable and ridiculous." The defendant's attorneys, insisting that the state did not prove its case, ended rebuttal testimony after a rather meager attempt to impeach a state rebuttal witness.

30 pounds of pills confiscated

More than 30 pounds of pills believed to have been taken in the burglary of a local pharmacy last month were confiscated Thursday afternoon by the Midland Police Department narcotics division.

Information from an informant led to the confiscation of the drugs which ranged in type from barbituates and amphetamines to vitamins, said Lt. Gayle Reeves.

One man has been arrested in connection with the burglary and more arrests are expected, Reeves said.

The pills, mixed together, were found in a pillow case and a shoe box, the narcotics officer added.

"I imagine the idea (of taking the pills out of their respective bottles) was to get rid of the bottles so the drugs would be harder to trace," Reeves said.

Giving a rough estimate, Reeves said street value of the confiscated drugs is probably about \$7,500.

Many of the drugs that police believe were taken in the pharmacy burglary have been showing up for sale on Midland streets, said Reeves.

The officer said he suspects another 4,000 to 5,000 pills taken in the pharmacy burglary are still for sale in Midland.

Warmer day predicted

It should be a little warmer in Midland today, according to the National Weather Service at Midland Regional Airport.

Skies should continue to be mostly fair through Sunday.

But while temperatures are expected to warm up from Friday morning's 32-degree reading, Midlanders may still be wearing sweaters and light jackets.

High temperature today is expected to be in the upper 60s and the mercury should drop to near 40 tonight. High on Sunday is predicted to be near 70.

It won't be a kite-flying day today, as the weather service is predicting winds to blow out of the southeast at only five to 10 mph.

The high temperature Friday was 65 degrees, a full 20 marks below the record-high for that date — 85 degrees — set in 1945.

But today's predicted low wasn't expected to break — or equal — the 29-degree reading recorded in 1951.

Only 86 vote absentee on amendment questions

Only 86 Midland County residents bothered to vote absentee in the Tuesday general election on three constitutional amendments, reported Rosennelle Cherry, county clerk.

Of the 86, 76 voted in the Midland County Courthouse and 10 persons mailed in their ballots. The first amendment would provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and a term of not less than two years and not more than four years.

The second amendment would give the State Legislature authority to review the process of rulemaking by state agencies in the executive department.

Last on the ballot is an amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds by the State of Texas.

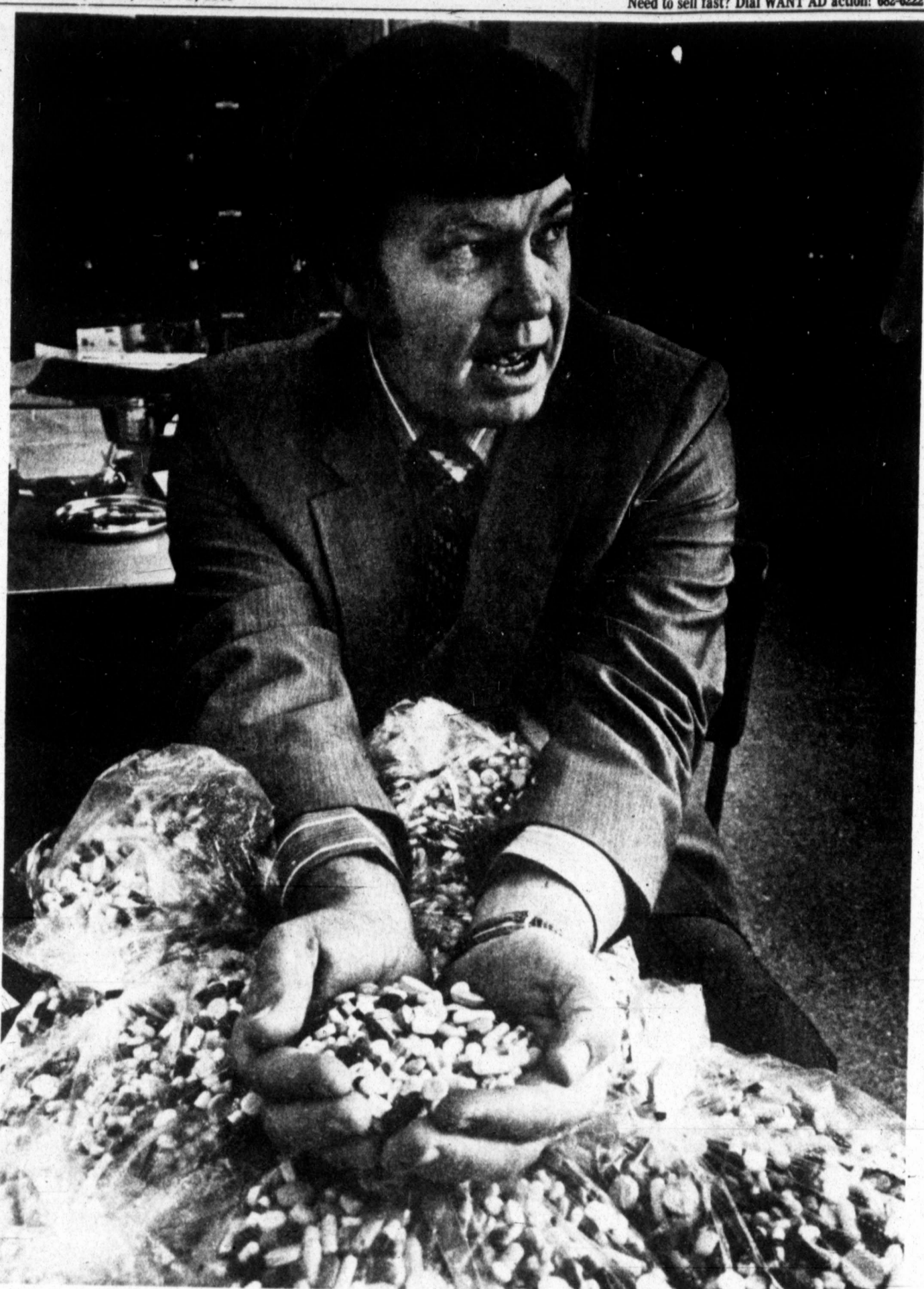
Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday for registered voters to cast their ballots on the proposed amendments.

Ross, Califano announce plans to open law firm

WASHINGTON (AP) — Social Security Commissioner Stanford G. Ross said Friday he will resign at the end of the year to start a law firm with former HEW Secretary Joseph A. Califano Jr.

Ross said he had "absolutely no" policy or political differences with President Carter or Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Patricia Roberts Harris, who replaced the fired Califano in August.

Ross, 48, a longtime friend of Califano, became commissioner 13 months ago. He was the first non-career civil servant appointed to the post and will have had the shortest tenure.

Much aid to refugees hindered

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — A cargo ship filled with food was forced to wait five days recently before unloading at a Cambodian port, illustrating the difficulty of delivering the massive aid pouring in from around the world.

Daily aid flights from Bangkok are limited by Thai controls, the Cambodians have rejected the idea of overland truck convoys, and deliveries by sea have become the main lifeline for the more than two million Cambodians said to face death by starvation.

But the country's only deepwater port, Kompong Som, can handle only four ships at a time and unload them at the rate of only 350 tons a day, according to aid officials here.

When two ships bringing 6,000 tons of supplies donated by international agencies arrived late last week, three Soviet vessels were already docked, and one of the new arrivals could do nothing but wait.

But the aid keeps pouring in — from international aid groups such as the World Food Program, the International Red Cross and the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), and

from the Soviet Union and other communist countries.

When they rejected a U.S. proposal to truck huge amounts of aid across the Thai border to the capital Phnom Penh, the Cambodian government claimed that sufficient aid is reaching the country by other means.

The government also said the agriculture system which it claims was disrupted by the regime of ousted Premier Pol Pot is beginning to revive, with a harvest of some 56,000 tons of rice expected soon.

But this figure, along with the claim that the huge amount of 200,000 tons of relief has been delivered by communist allies, is questioned by analysts here.

Meanwhile, Western relief agencies are quietly delivering hundreds of tons of supplies directly across the Cambodian border from Thailand to areas that are not under the control of the Vietnamese-backed government of Heng Samrin in Phnom Penh.

This aid, including so far more than 900 tons of food, a ton of medicine, tens of thousands of vitamin pills and thousands of shelter tarpaulins and mosquito nets, goes to people in areas controlled by Pol Pot guerrillas and

by third-force right-wing "Free Khmer" troops.

In the next few days, sources here say, another cross-border delivery of 1,500 tons of rice and several hundred tons of dried fish and cooking oil is planned.

The Heng Samrin government vigorously objects to these relief operations, which are carried on without publicity, and because of them has refused to acknowledge officially the air and sea deliveries.

Grandson of Midlanders is 'youngest scholar'

AMHERST, Mass. (AP)—On most mornings, 12-year-old Miller Maley, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. V.C. Maley of Midland, Texas, like millions of other school children, feeds the cats, eats his cereal, hops on his bicycle and heads for school. Only his school is Amherst College.

School officials say Miller, a freshman, is apparently the youngest student in the liberal arts school's 158-year history.

He takes advanced mathematics and physics courses, introductory German and a required freshman humanities course.

After school, he spends a lot of time at the college's computer center, says his mother, Ann Maley, a planner with Holyoke's Office of Community Development.

Mrs. Maley moved to Amherst three years ago with Miller and his 10-year-old brother, Carlo — also "a very bright kid" — after she and her husband, Dr. Carlton Maley, were divorced. Miller's father is a physics professor at Wayne State University in Detroit.

Mrs. Maley declined to discuss Miller's IQ, and stressed that he had never been pushed.

"Miller's desire for knowledge is insatiable," she said. "All I've ever done is feed him, as you feed a child who's hungry."

Miller went to a school for gifted children for four years, but he switched to public school when they moved here.

Through the sixth grade and during the summer before seventh grade, Miller burned through geometry and two algebra courses, a load that normally takes three years to complete. After he finished high school chemistry halfway through seventh grade last year, a math teacher suggested Miller take a course at Amherst College.

His success in the course paved the way toward his becoming a full-fledged college undergraduate.

"Since I was taking the courses anyway, we decided I might as well get college credit for them," he said.

Miller is at his own age level when it comes to play, throwing Frisbees or kicking a soccer ball with neighborhood children.

But with his high school and college-age friends, Miller plays chess — which he mastered at age 5 — and computer games.

Arizona court says cartoonist has right to sue publisher

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — The Arizona Court of Appeals has ruled that a Tucson cartoonist has the right to sue a New York publishing company because it stopped buying his "Sad Sack" comic book drawings.

The ruling handed down Thursday reversed a Superior Court decision earlier this year in which Fred Rhoads' suit

against Harvey Publications Inc. was dropped.

"I'm thrilled to death," Rhoads said of the appellate decision.

He is asking for the payment of royalties on the cartoons he drew for years for Harvey Publications up until 1977.

Then the company notified him it needed no more of his drawings, while it continued reprinting old drawings.

Rhoads filed for unemployment but found the comic book publisher had not considered him

an employee, so he was ineligible for benefits.

He later filed suit on the basis that he had operated as an independent contractor and was owed royalties on an estimated 400 million sheets of Sad Sack comics published by Harvey.

Rhoads said he had not worked since Harvey stopped asking for his drawings.

Poster doesn't tell the 'naked' truth

MIAMI (AP) — In a few weeks, Northerners shivering in the cold of winter will see topless Gail Kelly enticing them to come to Miami and "See it like a native."

A lot of Dade County natives wonder: "Where does Gail Kelly go swimming without her top?" The more prudish ask: "Where are her clothes?"

But Dade County tourist officials say the most important question of all is: "When is the next plane to Miami?"

Ms. Kelly, a former junior high school teacher, posed with her naked back to the camera, clad only in bikini bottoms and a snorkeling mask. More than 20,000 copies of the poster will be mailed to travel agents and airline offices all over the country.

She says if she can find an isolated beach, she wouldn't mind taking a dip with nothing on even though no beaches in the county are set aside for skinny-dipping.

"If I were on an isolated beach, I would be delighted to go scuba diving with nothing on," Ms. Kelly said. "To me, that's freedom to do what I want."

Gary Marcus, creative director of the advertising agency that developed the poster, says "I hope it's sexy; Miami is a sexy place. This is to give a young, fun image to Miami."

Fort Lauderdale tourist officials tried a similar poster last year — showing a young model in skimpy shorts and a T-shirt — and promptly enraged women's rights groups. They said the model was a sex object.

But advertising executives say Ms. Kelly is not a sex object. Says Joy Beber of Beber, Silverstein and Partner: "She's got diving equipment. She's a participant. She's not an object. The implication is that she's doing her thing, which is diving. This is quite different."

Miami tourism officials say the poster is not exploitative of women. The poster is "thought-provoking and provocative — I guess I'd better watch what I say," said Peter Weiner, an assistant to County Manager Merrett Stierheim.

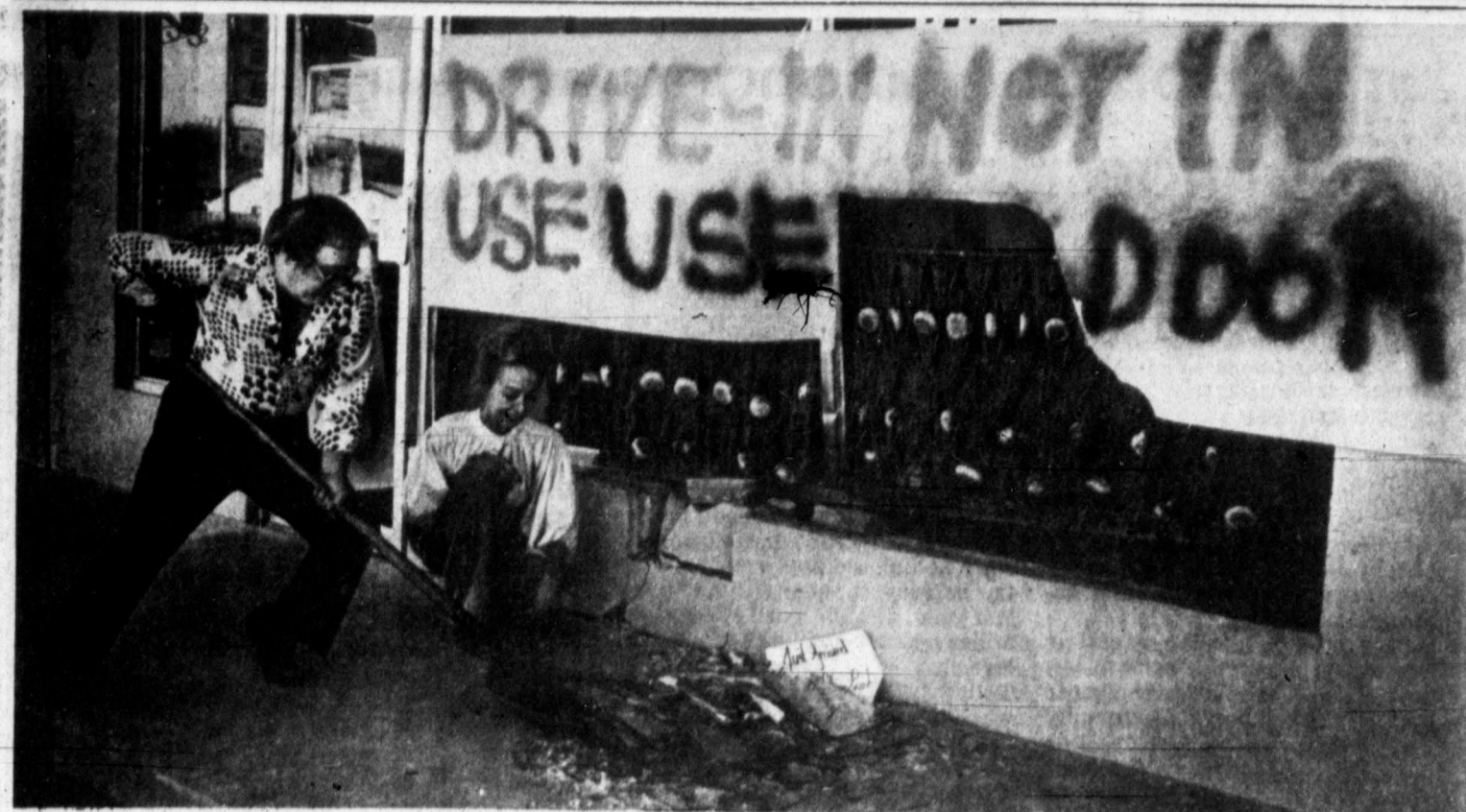

FmHA reveals temporary halt in rural home loans

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Farmers Home Administration said Friday it has temporarily stopped making new loans and grants for rural housing because of a delay in Congress in extending its authorization.

Gordon Cavanaugh, head of the Agriculture Department agency, said notices were sent to FmHA state directors telling them the authorization for the program expired Oct. 31.

Legislation for a \$7 billion package of rural development programs, including housing, is waiting on conference committee action to work out differences between the Senate and House versions.

Cavanaugh said Congress "is expected to pass such legislation in the near future" and that FmHA local offices "can continue to accept and process housing applications" although the loans cannot be approved until new authority is provided.

Senate-passed bill could override state interest law

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas' interest rates as set in state law and the constitution would be overridden by federal law if a U.S. Senate-passed bill is finally approved, state officials say.

However, said Savings and Loan Commissioner Alvis Vandygriff, there is hope for a compromise with a more moderate measure passed by the House.

"I think the House bill is more realistic and palatable," Vandygriff said Friday, "but what will come out of the conference committee is anybody's guess."

The U.S. Senate passed Thursday night a bill that would override state laws that restrict the interest charged on home mortgages and big loans for farm and business. The measure goes to a conference committee to be considered with a House-passed bill that would simply authorize interest-paying checking accounts nationwide.

"It would flat preempt and usurp the usury provisions of our state law and constitution," Vandygriff said of the Senate version.

"There is not much we can do right now but if they do have more hearings we certainly will be contacting our congressmen."

Vandygriff said that among other things the Senate version would "waive" Texas regulations on home mortgage loans and business and farm loans over \$25,000.

The large business and farm loans are still under the constitutionally required 10 percent maximum interest rate. The Senate bill would have the federal unlimited rate take precedence only through July 1, 1980 and give Texas and other states a chance to exempt itself from the federal provision.

Home mortgage loans in Texas are under a 12 percent interest maximum. During November the rate was 11 1/4 percent, but will go up to the top 12 percent in December, Vandygriff said.

The Senate bill would permanently override any Texas ceiling on home mortgage interest rates unless the Texas legislature acted within two years to retain the limit.

State Banking Commissioner Robert E. Stewart said his staff was studying the bill and watching developments closely. "So far, as I can tell now, there would be no required changes in our state banking laws, unless it is the usury rates," he said.

Clements may stop renovation of old San Antonio building

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Gov. Bill Clements hinted strongly Friday that he would try to stop a \$3.1 million renovation project on a 1912 building in San Antonio now owned by the state.

Clements, in his weekly Capitol news conference, challenged reporters to take a personal look at the Perry Shankle building in San Antonio and tell their readers what they saw.

"You look at it and we'll talk about next time we meet," he said.

"I have all the authority I need to investigate the use of taxpayers' money."

He was asked what he could do stop the renovation.

"I didn't say I was going to stop it. I'm just studying it," he answered.

The renovation project was voted by the 1979 Legislature.

Clements said he did not veto the project because it was "buried" in a special provision that included money for other items, including the renovation of the governor's mansion.

"I could not get to it," he said.

He said his aide Don Cavness was taken off an investigation of alleged irregularities at the Department of Health because the investigation was turned over to the Travis County district attorney. "It was decided to proceed through criminal charges,"

Roloff's followers testify

Girl says license would 'cripple' facility

By SUSAN STOLER

LAREDO, Texas (AP) — Embattled evangelist Lester Roloff listened Friday as residents and former residents of his Rebekeh Home for Girls told a federal judge the facility's power to change lives would be crippled if it were licensed by the state.

"I don't believe brother Roloff as a Christian has a right to accept any license from the state," said Elizabeth Martin, a 17-year-old who came to the home after several

suicide attempts and experiments with drugs.

Roloff closed the home in June after a state judge ordered him to either get a license or get out of the child-care business.

The radio minister claims the state has no business imposing regulations on his homes, where children are taught to memorize the Bible.

Roloff reopened the home in September and said the facility is operated by the People's

Baptist Church of Corpus Christi instead of the Roloff Evangelistic Enterprises, Inc.

The church, some home residents, their parents and staff members filed suit to keep the state from trying to impose licensing requirements on the home now that its official operator is the church.

Texas Attorney General Mark White says it makes no difference if the home is Roloff's operation or the church, where he is pastor, runs the home. The attorney

general said under Texas law anyone operating a home for children under 18 needs a state license.

Approximately 26 girls clad in navy blue skirts, white blouses and blue sweaters, and 23 young men from Roloff's Light-house Home for Boys packed the federal courtroom for the hearing.

U.S. District Judge George Kazen said before the lunch break he wanted to know specifically why a state license would prevent Roloff's home from continuing its special ministry.

Stanley Williams, Lighthouse superintendent, testified he once worked at a Christian home that had a license. Williams said the facility was constantly harassed about requiring children to read the Bible.

"State-licensed homes do not allow God's word to be presented to these children, like we do," said Williams. Residents at the Lighthouse Home are all more than 18 years old.

Attorney William Ball of Harrisburg, Pa., re-

presented the school and said the licensing law amounts to excessive entanglement with rights to religious freedom.

"Churches have a special and unique status under the First Amendment," argued Ball.

Assistant Attorney General David Young asked Kazen to dismiss the church's suit because previous court cases have decided the same issue.

After the church filed its suit, the attorney general filed a second suit in state district court to force the church to license the home. Young told Kazen that the state suit should be decided before the federal case.

Ball said he was afraid Roloff could not get a fair trial before State District Judge Charles Mathews of Austin, who signed the order to close the homes in June.

"I dread going back to that same judge. I don't think we can get a fair shake in that court," the Pennsylvania lawyer said.

Expert joins government drive to find, recall hair dryers containing asbestos

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government's action to get millions of hair dryers out of consumers' hands has the support of one of the leading experts on the dangers of asbestos.

William J. Nicholson of the Mt. Sinai School of Medicine in New York City, an internationally known expert on the cancer risks of breathing asbestos, gave his support in a report Thursday to the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

The commission earlier this year pressured manufacturers and retailers to take asbestos-containing hair dryers off the market and offer to replace or modify an estimated 11 million of the devices already in consumers' hands.

While making the offers, some of the companies maintained that their hair dryers posed no risk to consumers. Such statements may have caused some consumers to retain asbestos-containing dryers.

Nicholson wrote his report evaluating risks in hair dryers based on test findings of the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health.

"Using analytical techniques which may underestimate the concentration of asbestos, NIOSH has clearly demonstrated that some hair dryers release considerable quantities of asbestos fiber," Nicholson said. He added, "The fiber concentrations in the effluent of some dryers exceeded the highest we have measured in eight years of surveillance of environmental asbestos concentration."

People who work around asbestos are exposed to it for longer periods than consumers who use hair dryers for relatively brief periods. However, "The large number of individuals that may be exposed (because of hair dryers) clearly calls for elimination of the exposure," he said.

In Chicago, Marian Johnson, a spokeswoman for the Association of Home Appliance Manufacturers, could not be reached for comment. The trade association represents companies that make hair dryers.

Nicholson's report and the report from the institute did not release names of the 30 models tested. However, it was learned separately that some of the tests involved these brands: General Electric, Conair, Hartman, Norelco, Schick, Korvette, Gillette and Hamilton Beach.

He said special concern should be paid to standing hair dryers "because of the possibility of their nearly continuous use, often in confined spaces, in hair salons." He said the standing models can cause higher asbestos concentrations in the air in salons.

Peter Preuss, the commission's top health scientist, called the Nicholson report "fairly clear substantiation of the actions that we have taken."

He said it provides additional reason for consumers not to use hair dryers containing asbestos, which was used to insulate against overheating.

The commission, together with the Environmental Protection Agency, is trying to locate all users of asbestos and decide whether other types of products emit asbestos fibers. It is known that asbestos is used in many products because

Work a Little Harder

By Alfred Sheinwold

If the President telephones to ask why you've lost faith in the American dream, don't complain that tricks aren't what they used to be. You must simply work a little harder.

Today's South ruffed the second heart, drew trumps and led three rounds of clubs. The heart return forced out South's last trump.

Declarer cashed his clubs and led a diamond, but East had saved the ace of diamonds and a heart. Down one.

DEVELOPS CLUBS

After ruffing a heart at the second trick South should take the ace of clubs, lead a spade to the ten and return a club, guarding against a bad club break. Since the clubs break normally, South takes the king and gives up a club.

South ruffs the next heart and leads a diamond to force out the ace. Now if East leads a fourth heart, dummy can ruff.

Regardless of the defense, South can draw trumps and cash a diamond as well as his last two clubs. The American dream still works if you don't draw trumps in your sleep.

DAILY QUESTION

Partner bids one club, you respond one heart and he bids two hearts. The opponents pass. You hold: ♠ 8 3 ♡ A 9 8 3 2 ♦ A 10 6 2 ♣ J 10. What do you say?

ANSWER: Bid three diamonds. If partner has minimum strength for his two bids, he will bid three hearts; but if he has maximum strength he will jump to four hearts. If in doubt, he will count something extra for strength in diamonds.

OHS belts Midland; Permian blanks Rebels

ODESSA — The scoreboard seems to stick at 10-0 when Midland Lee and Odessa Permian play in W.T. Barrett Stadium.

For the third straight time, the Panthers shut out the Rebels with a 10-0 tally in a District 5-4A football battle. Mojo turned the trick by the same scores in 1975 and 1977 and again Friday night before more than 8,500 fans.

Permian's defense was tremendous and it was a pair of juniors that were the undoing of the Rebels along with senior quarterback Kelly Howard.

Junior tailback Kent Sager, a 160-pounder, ripped through the Rebels for 122 yards and a touchdown and the other junior, Roy Dunn, a 6-foot-4, 230-pounder, booted a 38-yard field goal for all of the scoring.

After being held to one first down and a total offense of 12 yards in the first half, the Rebels made some adjustments and came back to shut down Howard, who hit seven of 13 passes for 105 yards in the first two periods. Howard misfired on four second half passes, but the damage had already been done.

Lee's only first down in the first half came on a penalty, but the Rebels had eight first down to Mojo's five in the second half and did mount one threat right at the end of the game, but that was halted when Reynolds, an all-state safety last year, picked off a Gary Butler pass at the Panther five and raced all the way down to the Lee five as the gun sounded. The Panthers were guilty of a clip on Reynolds' great run, but it didn't matter.

PERMIAN HAD to overcome the loss of Reynolds on defense as the senior tailback only carried the ball twice and senior fullback Alan Hainline, who left the game when struck on the knee by a helmet after rushing for 14 yards on four carries in the first period. Phillip Crain, a diminutive 151-pound junior fullback, filled in the rest of the way for Hainline.

The first period ended in a standoff as the two teams seem to feel each other out like two heavyweight boxers, although Howard drove the Panthers all the way to the Rebel one where Barry Corley picked off a pass to turn the Odessans away.

Howard hit junior tight end Jimmy Sample and Sager on passes of 15 and 26 yards with the latter a beautiful screen pass to the Rebel 29. He also dialed Bruce LaRoque's number for a 15-yard pass on the drive before Corley stepped in front of Mike Williams for the interception.

Permian drove 61 yards in 12 plays at the offset of the second period to score with Sager carrying the ball nine times and finally capping the drive with a two-yard plunge. Dunn's kick was true for a 7-0 lead with 6:14 left in the first half.

FOLLOWING THE kickoff after Permian's touchdown, Lee got its only first down of the first half when Mojo was flagged for piling on fullback Mark Thompson, but after great plays by Bryan Lambert, Jerry Hix, Rex Brown and Keith Rodgers, the Rebs were forced to punt with Corley getting off a 43-yarder. The talented junior had a pair of 53 yards punts during the night.

Permian drove from its own 17 to the Rebel 20 where Dunn booted his 38-yard field goal with only four seconds left on the clock. A pass interference call kept the drive alive at the Lee 41, but the big play was a 25-yard pass from Howard to LaRoque and another to LaRoque for 15 more.

Permian kicked off to Lee to start the second half, but the Rebels were unable to move and the Panthers got a lucky break when Lee was called for interfering with the punt receiver and the 15-yard penalty gave Mojo the ball at the Rebel 41. Sager ripped off a 16-yarder, but this time, four plays later, Dunn's attempt for a 37-yard field goal was wide-right.

Lee started to move the ball after the missed field goal but Steve Guthrie recovered a Lee fumble at the Rebel 43.

CLYDE SMITH pounced on a fumble by Reynolds at the Lee 40 and the Rebs drove to the Panther 33 before being turned away by the rugged Panther defense. Steve Slater and Richard Orsco made the bug plays for Mojo.

It was Lee's turn to play some great defense and the Rebels did by halting Mojo at their 14 after Permian had driven 48 yards, mainly on a 16-yard run by Sager and a 12-yarder by Howard. Howard was stopped a yard short at the 14 moments later, however.

Lee mounted a determined drive from its own 29 to the Panther five where Reynolds picked off the Butler pass. A 23-yard pass from Butler to

split end Larry Linne along with a 15-yarder from Butler to Tom Williams, keyed the drive which just fell short at the final gun.

Butler was the leading rusher for Lee with 41 yards in 13 carries as the Panther defense held the Rebs to only 81 yards on the ground and an additional 78 passing. Permian, meanwhile, had 174 rushing and 105 passing for a balanced attack.

James McGarrity, Corley, Waldron and Scott Collins stood out for Lee on defense.

Kush's Maricopa County Superior Court suit charges conspiracy, defamation, due-process violations and interference with his contract as coach.

The attorney general's opinion said the university erred in failing to observe due process adopted by the State Board of Regents for suspending an accused administrator. Corbin

said the coach should be reinstated but noted that only the courts have power to issue such an order. "We would hope, of course, that the university does that and starts over," said Corbin.

"If Kush had been fired without being given any reason, it would have been legal under the rules," Corbin added. "But once the allegations of lying and covering up were made, the code was triggered."

Huskies remember what happened on way to No. 1 in '78

Well, here we are one year later with Nebraska again ranked No. 2 in the nation and about to tangle with a stumbling block named Missouri.

Last season, Nebraska had just knocked off Oklahoma and thought it was heading for a national championship Orange Bowl showdown with top-rated Penn State when a funny thing happened.

Not funny ha-ha... funny strange. The Cornhuskers were upset by Missouri 35-31 and wound up losing an Orange Bowl rematch to Oklahoma, of all people, while Penn State lost its No. 1 ranking against Alabama in the Sugar Bowl.

So it's Nebraska-Missouri time once again Saturday, this one to be played at Columbia, Mo. Nebraska is 7-0 while Missouri is 4-3 and struggling after a 3-0 start. The Cornhuskers also have outscored the opposition 215-27 over the last five games.

"Right now, Nebraska looks like it's the best football team in the country," says Missouri Coach Warren Powers, who was on the Nebraska staff when the Cornhuskers won national championships in 1970-71. "They're playing well, scoring a lot of points and their defense is doing a great job. They are playing with a lot of confidence and a lot of authority."

While Nebraska takes to the road, the Nos. 1-3 teams will be at home — top-rated Alabama against Mississippi State and third-ranked Southern California against Arizona.

ELSEWHERE, No. 4 Houston visits Texas Christian, fifth-ranked Ohio State is at Illinois, No. 6 Florida State travels to Cincinnati and No. 7 Oklahoma is at Oklahoma State. Rounding out the Top Ten, eighth-ranked Texas entertains Texas Tech, No. 9 Arkansas is at Rice and No. 10 Michigan hosts Wisconsin.

In the Second Ten, No. 11 Brigham

Young is at Colorado State, Syracuse at No. 12 Pitt, Navy at No. 13 Notre Dame, No. 14 Wake Forest at Clemson, No. 15 Purdue at Iowa, No. 16 Washington at California, Rutgers at No. 17 Tennessee, No. 18 North Carolina at Maryland, Miami, Fla. at No. 19 Penn State and Florida at No. 20 Auburn.

Alabama is crippled up but the Crimson Tide has won 21 in a row from Mississippi State — the series stands 50-10-3 — and Bear Bryant has never lost to the Bulldogs. In fact, Bama has won 16 in a row from all comers, the longest streak in the country, and a win against State would give the Tide a record 21 consecutive Southeastern Conference triumphs.

But, warns the Bear, "State has some exceptional athletes, especially wide receiver Mardys McDole, who is the best in the nation. They are big and strong and when they are emotionally ready they can play with any team in the nation."

"They have a history of playing well one week and being off the next. I'm sure this will be their week to play great. Coach Emory Bellard started the wishbone when he was an assistant at Texas — in fact, helped us when we decided to switch to it, so he will have some things ready for us we aren't expecting."

"We had 14 players who did not play last week, 10 of them who had been starters at one time or another, and until we get at least some of them back playing regularly we aren't nearly as good as a team as we were when they were healthy. State always is one of the hardest-hitting teams we play, so we had better buckle up our chin straps if we intend to win."

SOUTHERN CAL and Arizona are meeting for the first time since 1928. On the other hand, Houston and Texas Christian didn't start playing until 1976 and Houston has rolled to victories of 49-21, 42-14 and 63-6.

"They're one of the top four teams in the country and they're unbeaten," says TCU's F.A. Dry. "What else can I say? That speaks for itself."

Ohio State is one of the hottest teams around right now. The Buckeyes have averaged 47 points and 536 yards a game the last three weeks while allowing just six points and recording two shutouts.

"We are playing with great enthusiasm and confidence," says Coach Earle Bruce. "You can tell we are excited about getting out on the field

ad playing football. The better the opponent, the better we seem to play. I like that. Golly, I like that."

While the Nebraska-Missouri clash matches former coaching colleagues in Powers and Nebraska's Tom Osborne, so does the Oklahoma-Oklahoma State contest. Oklahoma's Barry Switzer was an aide under Chuck Fairbanks before succeeding his while Oklahoma State's Jimmy Johnson was the Sooners' defensive line coach from 1970-72.

In the conference races, Nebraska

and Oklahoma share the Big Eight lead at 3-0 while Ohio State and Michigan are atop the Big Ten with 5-0 league records. In the Pacific-10, Southern Cal is 3-0-1 to 3-1 for Washington and Arizona State, which visits Stanford.

Alabama is 3-0 and Mississippi State 2-0 in the Southeastern Conference but both trail 4-0 Georgia, which entertains Virginia in a non-league game. However, if Georgia wins its final two SEC games from Florida and Auburn the Bulldogs will go to the

Sugar Bowl despite what anyone else does.

Houston leads the Southwest Conference at 4-0 while Baylor, which has this week off, is 4-1. Arkansas 3-1 and Texas 2-1. North Carolina State, which leads the Atlantic Coast Conference at 4-1 visits South Carolina for a non-league game. Wake Forest trails at 2-2. Brigham Young is the Western Athletic Conference front-runner at 4-0 while Colorado State and Utah are 4-1. Utah visits New Mexico.

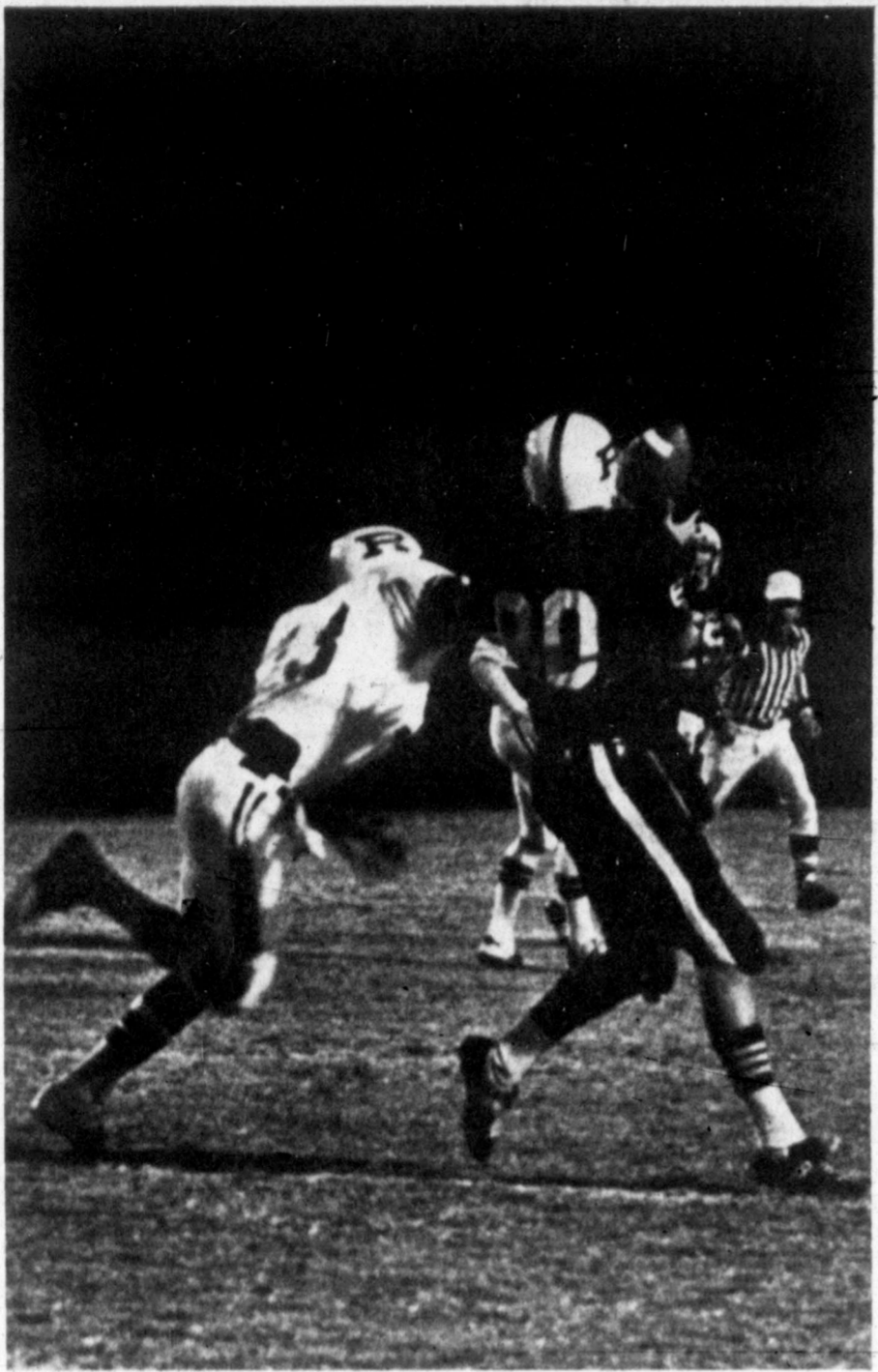

ANDREWS — Yes, Virginia, the Odessa Ector Eagles do have one heckuva football team.

They proved the point quite nicely, thank you, Friday night in front of a near-capacity group of witnesses at the Mustang Bowl.

The final score read Ector 26, Andrews 6. But it could've been worse, much worse, as the home-bound Mustangs did nothing but embarrass themselves.

Well, that's not quite true. The Mustangs, with the District 2-AAA loss, knocked themselves out of any chance for the district crown as their record dropped to 0-2 in league and 6-2 overall.

On the other hand, Ector, 3-0 in 2-AAA and 8-1 overall, took a giant step toward the loop crown with the victory. Ector has one game remaining, a date in two weeks with Monahans, the "only other 2-AAA unbeaten."

For the night, the Eagle offense racked up 217 total yards, 182 of which were produced by a lightning-quick running attack sparked by James Ricks, the leading 2-AAA rusher who carried 10 times for 77 yards and one touchdown.

Brooks tossed the final five yards to end Larry Parnell. The run failed, and with 47 ticks remaining in the third, the score was final, 26-6.

13 teams draft Twins' Dave Goltz

By HAL BOCK NEW YORK (AP) — In the fourth year of the baseball's re-entry draft, the owners apparently have decided to engage in some selective shopping. Rather than go after the high-priced free agents in a spiraling dollar war, some clubs seemed content to aim a little lower in hopes of turning up a bargain in the annual auction Friday.

So flame-throwing Nolan Ryan, the brightest jewel in this year's class of 44 free agents, was chosen just twice in the first round of the draft, while Minnesota's Dave Goltz, a talented right-hander who's not quite in Ryan's class, went the maximum 13 times.

The Texas Rangers and Houston Astros were the first teams to draft Ryan, setting up an intra-state bidding battle that should prove fascinating. They were subsequently joined by 10 other clubs — St. Louis, Milwaukee, Atlanta, the New York Yankees, Pittsburgh, Los Angeles, San Diego, Montreal, Cleveland and San Francisco — in the Ryan sweepstakes.

For some teams, Ryan appears to be a primary target. Atlanta owner Ted Turner, for exam-

ple, picked only three players — Goltz, Ryan and pitcher Al Hrabosky and then quickly left the draft. Houston also picked only two other players besides Ryan and they were budget type selections — infielder Rennie Stennett and reliever Skip Lockwood.

Other teams, like the Rangers, made Ryan one of a fistful of choices. Texas chose him first and then kept right on picking players, making selections for 22 of the draft's 28 rounds.

Ryan has expressed a desire to return to his home state of Texas and that could mean a showdown between the Rangers and Houston. The Astros have been more aggressive lately when it comes to spending money, signing pitcher J.R. Richard and outfielder Jose Cruz to long term, expensive deals.

If Ryan decides to leave Texas, the other bidders are ready. George Steinbrenner of the New York Yankee, who always is bullish in the free agent market, picked Ryan on the third round after choosing slugger Bob Watson and pitcher Bruce Kison in the first two. That didn't diminish Yankee enthusiasm for the fire-balling right-hander, according to Gene Michael, the newly minted Yankee general manager.

Obviously, teams felt some others in the draft would be a little cheaper. Goltz was a favorite for the bargain hunters and became the first player ever to be closed out with the maximum 13 selections in the first round. He was picked by Atlanta, San Diego, the Chicago White Sox, Los Angeles, Philadelphia, Kansas City, St. Louis, California, Cincinnati, Montreal, Boston, Pittsburgh and Milwaukee.

The only other players chosen by the maximum 13 teams were pitcher Bruce Kison, who was closed out in the third round, pitcher John Curtis, who lasted until the fifth round, and infielder Rennie Stennett, whose eligibility was used up in Round 9.

The opening choice of the draft belonged to Toronto and the Blue Jays chose reliever Don Stanhouse, who also was on hand to watch the proceedings.

Of the 44 players in the draft, 16 became immediate free agents, eligible to negotiate with all 26 clubs, because they were picked by either one club or not at all. That list included veterans Ed Kranepool, Paul Blair, George Scott, and Lerrin LaGrow among others.

Kennedy, Baker take official campaign trips

Sens. Edward M. Kennedy and Howard Baker set out Friday on political trips that had symbolic overtones for the Massachusetts Democrat and posed an early campaign vote-getting challenge to the Tennessee Republican.

Kennedy traveled to West Virginia for a nostalgic visit to the state that gave John F. Kennedy one of his greatest political triumphs.

Baker, following his declaration of candidacy Thursday, flew to New England for a weekend of campaigning that would include competition for support in a straw poll by 1,500 Maine Republicans.

The West Virginia trip had been in the works long before Kennedy decided to challenge President Carter for the 1980 presidential nomination. But the symbolism of the West Virginia trip hasn't been lost on Kennedy organizers.

"Obviously, it's a special state for us," spokesman Tom Southwick said of Kennedy's first campaign-style trip since formation of a presidential campaign committee Monday.

THE SENATOR'S BROTHER, John F. Kennedy, won the West Virginia presidential primary on May 10, 1960, knocking Hubert Humphrey out of the race and showing the nation he was well on his way to the White House.

Edward Kennedy was scheduled to be the featured speaker at the annual Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner in Charleston, the state capital. He also planned to attend a rally Saturday morning in Buffalo, N.Y., before returning to Washington.

Kennedy officially will enter the presidential sweepstakes next Wednesday in Boston.

AT THE FIRST STOP on his New England tour, Baker renewed his plea for a strengthening of the nation's military might.

"The United States is fast becoming a second-rate military power and if we don't take steps to reverse that trend...the risk of war will surely increase," the Senate minority leader said in an address at Brown University in Providence, R.I.

Baker had asserted earlier that he could defeat either Kennedy or Carter in the general election next year.

Accompanied by his wife, Joy, the senator told more than 100 people at a reception that 1980 could be "the big-

gest Republican year we've seen in this country in almost 30 years."

And he told his university audience, "I am serious about being president. This is my life-long effort. This is my contribution to my country. This is all I can do."

THE TENNESSEE SENATOR faces an initial test of strength Saturday in Portland, Maine, where he will be involved in head-to-head competition with other Republican presidential hopefuls in the straw-poll.

Baker will speak at caucuses Saturday in Portland, where he'll be joined by other GOP candidates — George Bush, John Connally, Sen. Robert Dole, Reps. John Anderson and Philip Crane and Benjamin Hernandez.

Missing from the Maine contest will be former California Gov. Ronald Reagan, who plans to announce his candidacy Nov. 13.

MEANWHILE, WHITE HOUSE press secretary Jody Powell confirmed that there has been some discussion of the possibility of a debate between Carter and Kennedy.

Powell told reporters that "there was a brief discussion, not involving the president," about a Carter-Kennedy debate.

However, the press secretary said no recommendation has been made to Carter by White House and campaign staff members involved in the discussion.

Carter has remained generally non-committal on the question.

He reminded reporters on Oct. 9 that there had been no debates between presidential candidates in 1976 except for those involving himself and Gerald R. Ford, which took place during the general election campaign.

"But I feel at ease about it," Carter told the Washington news conference. "I will protect my record, which I think is a good one."

IN ANOTHER DEVELOPMENT, an electrical workers union that backed Carter in 1976 decided to endorse Kennedy this time around. The executive board of the International Union of Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers asserted that too many of Carter's promises had gone unfulfilled.

The 250,000-member union said the president had abandoned commitments to achieve tax code revisions, comprehensive national health insurance and had not taken "a populist stance."

Instead, it said, he has advanced a "pro-business advanced a "pro-business program on energy and inflation."

Elsewhere, Carter's campaign charged that Kennedy authorized at least some of the "draft" activity that preceded his formation of a presidential committee on Monday.

The claim was contained in an amendment to a complaint filed with the Federal Election Commission last month. It contended that Kennedy "by his actions and those of his agents" authorized and consented to formation of the various committees.

KENNEDY HAS REPEATEDLY denied authorizing the draft movement and has disavowed each draft committee. Carter's original complaint alleged that the draft committees organized in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and overseas were actually a coordinated movement and should be declared a single committee subject to the fund-raising limits of a single unit.

Former FBI official named new director of Texas DPS

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Texas Public Safety Commission went outside the ranks Friday and named former FBI official James Adams as director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Adams, who quit the No. 2 post at the FBI in May to head Gov. Bill Clements' Criminal Justice Division, will replace Col. Wilson Speir, 62, is retiring Dec. 31 after 11 years as director.

Commission Chairman Robert Shelton of Kerrville said Adams, 52, was the unanimous pick of the three-member commission. The commission had interviewed only Adams and Leo Gossett, Speir's top assistant.

Speir backed Gossett for the post, and Clements pushed Adams in a heavily political selection process. Shelton said "most every politician" in the state had contacted him about the post.

"The worst thing that could happen to this state would be for this to become a political football. It's not a prize to be won by a popularity contest or contributions," he said.

After the Adams' selection was announced, Gossett said he did not

think politics played a major role in the decision.

None of the commissioners was appointed by Clements.

After an hour-long closed door session, Shelton said the commission had also "affirmed the re-appointment" of Gossett as No. 2 man for the 4,500-person state police agency.

The commissioners said they foresaw no problems in selecting an outsider to head what Speir called a "pretty close-knit" agency. Commissioner Bill Blake-more of Midland said, "If I were out in the field I think I would be glad we had two men like this here."

Adams, a Corsicana native, joined the FBI in 1951 after stints as assistant Limestone County attorney and as a state representative.

In April 1978 he was named associate director at the FBI. Adams was with the bureau when it was accused of skirting the law in pursuing ambitious investigations.

But Shelton said the commission's research — "We did an awful lot of talking to people" — found nothing to taint Adams' record.

"We just looked at the man's record," he said,

adding the "press has tried him and everybody else has tried him."

Speir said he was disappointed Gossett, his long-time friend and associate, did not get the job.

"They made a choice they thought was best for the department," he said.

Before the announcement was made he said, "Most of the people in the department would like to see Mr. Gossett appointed."

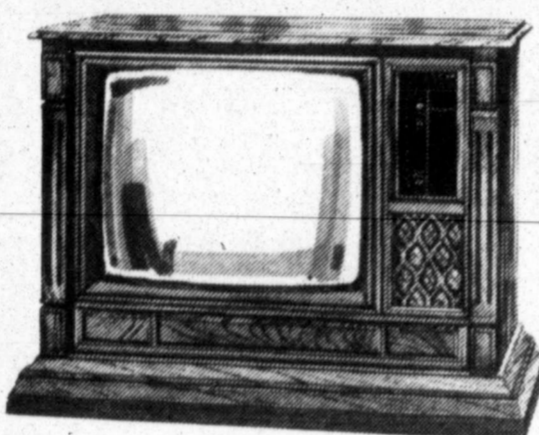
"It would take anybody from the outside some time to get acquainted with the inner workings of the department," Speir said.

He also acknowledged the DPS and the FBI have different attitudes about law enforcement.

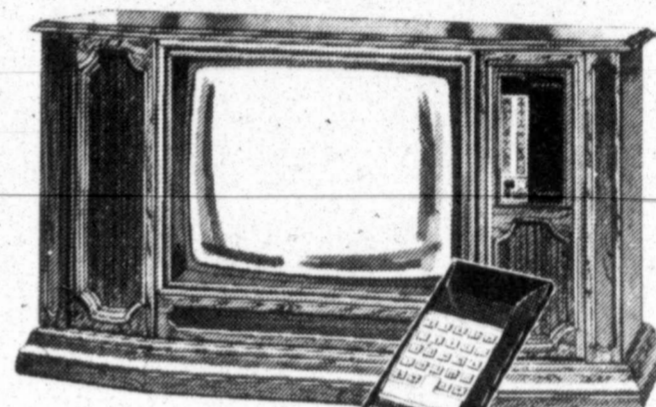

"As far as I know, the FBI doesn't," he added.

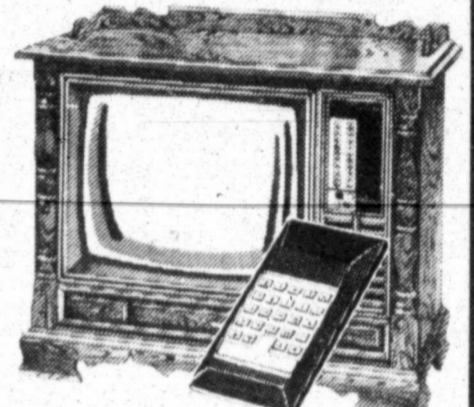

Arrival in Midland 'homecoming' for the Rev. Joseph H. Schley Jr.

When the Rev. Joseph H. "Buddy" Schley Jr., arrived in Midland earlier this week to become rector of St. Nicholas Episcopal Church, it was, in

a sense, a "homecoming" for him. St. Nicholas Parish is a part of the Episcopal Diocese of Northwest Texas, and Schley was ordained to the priesthood in this diocese five years ago while living in Amarillo. Schley is a native of Dallas but

resided in Amarillo for a number of years while practicing law, later becoming a judge in that city.

Schley comes to Midland from St. Simon's Episcopal Church in Miami, Fla., where he had been rector since 1976.

Before moving to Florida, Schley served more than a year as curate of the Church of the Heavenly Rest in Abilene.

Midland's St. Nicholas Church, organized in 1956, has had only two other rectors in its 23-year history. The Rev. Richard Neal was first rector of the parish, serving until the early 1960s. He was succeeded by the Rev. James L. Considine Jr., who served as rector until March 1979, when he resigned to take a church post in Sweetwater.

Schley attended the University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn., and later earned the bachelor of arts degree and doctor of jurisprudence degree from Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

He holds a master of divinity de-

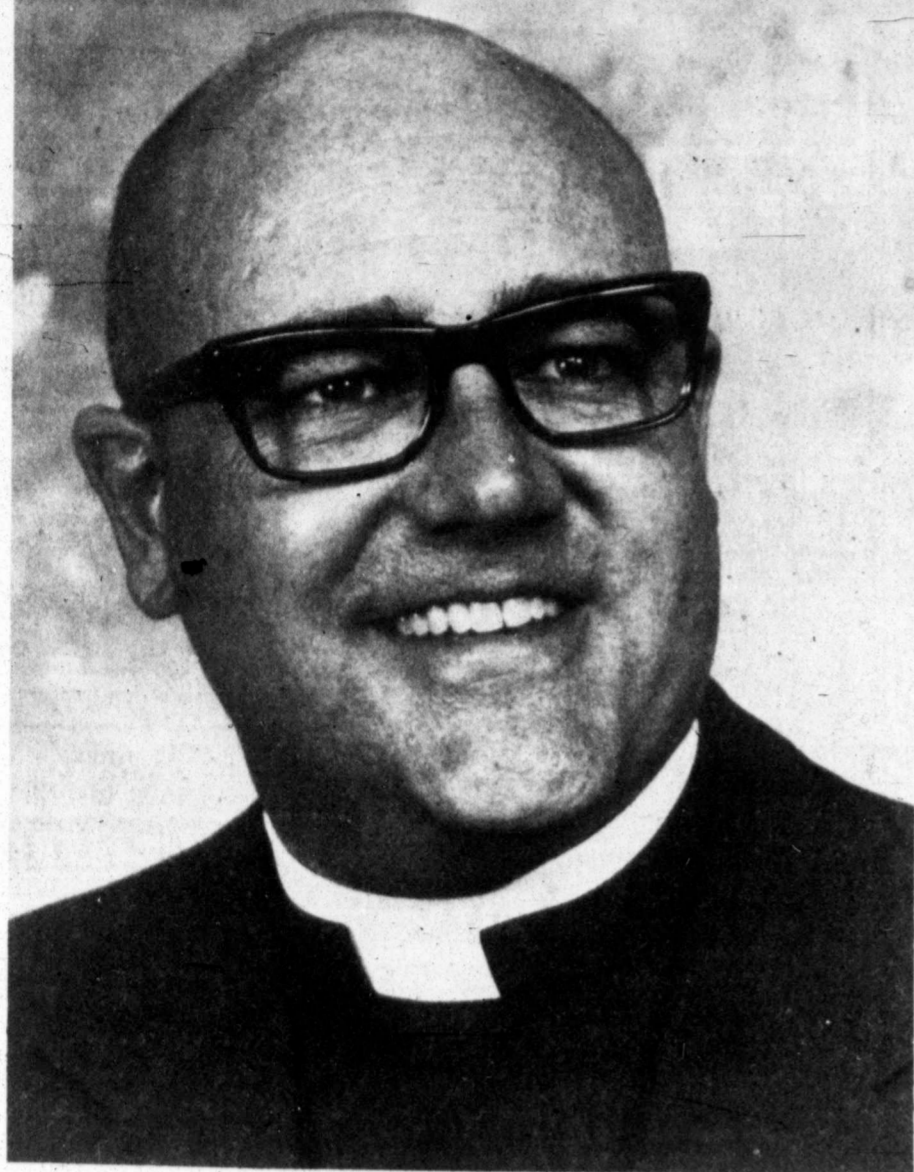
gree from the Virginia Theological Seminary in Alexandria, Va. He has had special study at St. George's College in Jerusalem, Israel, and the University of Pennsylvania's Psychiatric Institute in New York City.

Schley served in the United States Air Force, holding the rank of captain. He served as an Air Force judge advocate both in the U.S. and while stationed in Britain. Later he moved to Amarillo and began the practice of law.

Mrs. Schley, the former Carolyn Higginbotham, was born and reared in Dallas. The Schleys are the parents of two sons, Bryan, 14, and Scott, 9. The boys will attend Midland schools.

Schley will be officiating Sunday at his first service in St. Nicholas Church, 2900 Princeton Ave.

The congregation of St. Nicholas will honor their new rector and his family at a covered dish luncheon Sunday noon in the parish hall. The fellowship event will be open to all members and friends of St. Nicholas Episcopal parish.

Saul Weiss claims 8,000 success in his new career

Saul Weiss recently retired from his career as a certified shorthand reporter, but has a new career in psychic healing with a claim of 8,000 healings on his record.

Freedom of press must be saved

NEW YORK (AP) — The president of the American Newspaper Publishers Association says freedom of the press must be maintained in the face of court decisions that are sending public rights "down the tube."

Allen Neuharth told the Joint Conference of Religion and Press on First Amendment Concerns here Tuesday that Thomas Jefferson's statement 200 years ago that "our liberty depends on freedom of the press and that cannot be limited without being lost" was "never more appropriate than it is today."

"The majority of the U.S. Supreme Court has put severe limits on press freedoms in recent years," he told the church and media leaders.

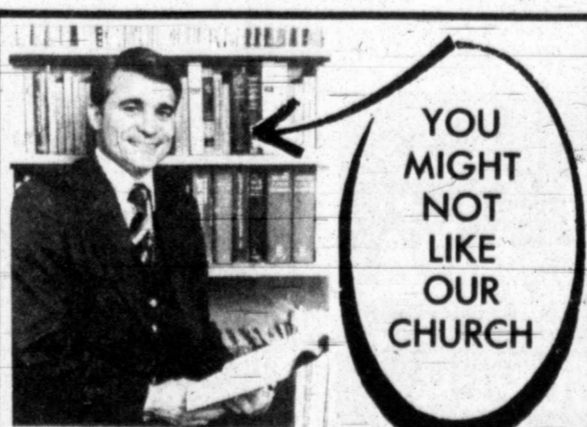

Documents say church leaders stole IRS records on Sinatra

WASHINGTON (AP) — Newly released documents say Church of Scientology leaders stole Internal Revenue Service records on singer Frank Sinatra and Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley.

Church memos in the documents reveal information was stolen on Bradley, Sinatra and other well known figures "to show IRS collection of non-tax related data on famous people."

The church claims the IRS and other agencies have carried on a vendetta against it over the years.

The actual records on Sinatra and Bradley were not among the six cartons of documents released Thursday by U.S. District Judge Charles R. Richey. The documents were seized in 1977 during FBI raids of the church's Los Angeles offices.

Last Friday, Richey convicted eight church leaders of conspiring to steal government documents about the church. A ninth member was convicted of a misdemeanor theft count. Just before the verdict, Richey released docu-

ments used by the government in the criminal case. Thursday, he

Castro's son to live in Spain?

MADRID, Spain (AP) — Cuban President Fidel Castro's 28-year-old son was reported on Friday seeking permission to live in Spain instead of returning to Cuba now that his studies in the Soviet Union are over. But his stepfather denied it.

Quoting unnamed sources, the Spanish news agency EFE said Fidel Castro Diaz-Balart, known as Fidelito (little Fidel), was believed to be in Madrid arranging to stay with his mother, who was divorced by Castro at the beginning of the Cuban revolution in 1959. She now is married to Emilio Nunez Blanco, a Cuban lawyer-journalist, living in Spain.

The agency said it could not confirm young Castro's presence in the Spanish capital, but the sources reported he came here from the Soviet Union. Nunez, responding to the reports, said "It is completely false that Fidelito is now here with the intention of seeking political asylum."

One exile source said Castro's son had visited Spain before to see his mother.

But Nunez denied that. "I can say for sure he is not here and reports about his visits to Madrid are untrue," he said.




