# Oil from burning tanker washes ashore

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) - Oil from the tanker Burmah Agate was carried ashore along the Texas Gulf coast today about 60 miles south of where the vessel is burning, a government scientist said.

"We had two reports early today that patches of oil washed up just south the jetty near Galveston Pass and some more had hit near Cedar Cut about 120 miles south of here," said Nancy Maynard, a scientist with

the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration.

The Burmah Agate, a Liberian tanker carrying 400,000 barrels of crude oil, and the freighter Mimomsa collided near the entrance to the Galveston Ship channel before daybreak Thursday killing 11 crewmen and leaving 21 others missing.

Oil had been seeping from the tanker since the collision but had been kept off shore by northerly winds.

Ms. Maynard said patches of the oil from the stricken tanker were spread out along a 60-mile stretch of the coastline and were moving steadily closer to shore.

"The oil had been staying three to six miles off shore, held there by winds from the north," she said. "But we've had winds from the south and the east yesterday (Sunday) and today, which has caused the oil to move toward shore.

"Most of it is now about two miles off shore. If the winds continue south and east, more oil will be pushed ashore, causing a major pollution problem.

Coast Guard Lt.j.g. Don Zelazny said the Coast Guard has had a 612foot skimming barrier operating 21/2 miles from the tanker since Sunday

"We've had trouble with containment because the danger of explosion

from the Burmah Agate has kept us away from the ship," he said. "Because of the currents and the fact that our vessel doesn't have enough power, some oil has been passing under the barrier.

"We're going to get a vessel with more power and try to maneuver within one half mile of the Burmah Agate, so we can scoop up the oil as it comes from the tanker.

Rescue ships found another body

floating in the water this morning about four hours after a series of three explosions roared through the crippled tanker, causing a large fire.

This includes what appears to be a body in the stateroom aboard the Mimosa. A medical examiner's ruling was pending on that one.

# Anti-shah protesters take consulates, embassies

Urged on by Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, Iranian protesters seized two U.S. consulates, an American cultural center and the British Embassy in Tehran today, and continued to hold the U.S. Embassy and more than 50 hostages, it was reported.

Khomeini called on the student militants to act against "the great Satan, America," in order to force it to extradite the deposed Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi, hospitalized in New York for cancer treatment, back to Iran for trial, Radio Tehran report-

The Moslem clergyman and revolutionary leader also demanded that Britain hand over former Prime Minister Shahpour Bakhtiar, now living in exile in Britain

Radio Tehran said the students who seized the U.S. Embassy Sunday added a new demand today — a break in relations with the United States.

The Iranian oil minister, meanwhile, raised the possibility of cutting off Iranian oil exports to the United States - 900,000 barrels a day that amount to 5 percent of all U.S. oil.

In a Radio Tehran interview, the oil ister, All Akbar Moinfar, said the decision was up to Khomeini. The British Foreign Office an-

nounced that its embassy in Tehran was seized today. Further details were not immediately available.

The official Tehran Radio, monitored in London, said student protesters also took over the U.S. consulates in Tabriz, in northwest Iran, and in the southern city of Shiraz. There was no word on the fate of the consular staffs.

Later, the State Department reported that students occupied and ransacked the Iran-American Society building, a cultural center, in the central city of Isfahan. No injuries were reported there. Radio Tehran said other anti-American demonstrations were staged across Iran.

Tehran Radio said Khomeini's son, Ahmad, traveled to Tehran to meet with the students occupying the U.S. embassy.

Some Iranian government officials said they hoped the younger Khomeini could obtain the release of the hostages, seized when 200 or 300 students overpowered Marine guards and took over the embassy Sunday.

But the students said they invited Khomeini's son to the embassy only to have him inspect "the great nest of U.S. espionage in Iran," and the ayatollah himself denounced efforts to have the students abandon the build-

As for the hostages, State Department spokesman Mark Johnson said this morning in Washington, "We continue to get reassurances from the students that all are well.'

Another department spokesman said there may be as many as 65 American hostages, along with an unknown number of Iranian employees. Earlier reports on the number of hostages had ranged from 43 to about

Radio Tehran said Sunday the students were motivated by a "message" from Khomeini. The revolutionary leader openly endorsed the embassy takeover in a speech today in Qum, his headquarters city.

"When we face plots, our young people cannot wait around.... Our young people must foil these plots," Radio Tehran quoted him as saying.

Khomeini has repeatedly demanded that the shah be handed over and accused the United States of plotting against Iran. He reiterated those

# Bolivia's congressional leaders say new president will resign

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) - Members of the Bolivian congress began meeting at noon today amid reports from congressional leaders that Col. Alberto Natusch, who seized power in a

coup last week, would resign shortly. The president of the senate, Leonidas Sanchez, said after a meeting with Natusch that "the political-military crisis we are experiencing will be solved in a matter of hours." A member of congress, Ruben Sanchez, said

that Natusch has promised to resign. Earlier today, soldiers in downtown La Paz fired machine guns as a crowd of students and workers protested the coup, and witnesses said at least six persons were wounded, two of them

The congress is controlled by supporters of President Walter Guevara, overthrown in the coup.

It appeared that the troops fired over the heads of the protesters and the bullets struck civilians beyond the scene of the demonstration. An army captain said the military moved into the San Francisco Plaza at the center of town to open streets that had been blocked by protesting students and workers who made barricades and stoned cars.

While the captain was talking, a 30-caliber machine gun began firing into the air, reporters said, but at an angle that was certain to bring the bullets into a residential area on the edge of the business district.

Ambulances entered and left the area and the plaza was cleared out by soldiers who started removing the paving stone barricades.

An area about six blocks long on the business district's main street was deserted except for soldiers and armored units. Hundreds of persons, mostly those who had intended to go shopping in marketplaces or to return to work, gathered at each end of the closed-off sector. Natusch's government on Sunday

instituted press censorship and sent two air force jets screaming over the downtown plaza with guns blazing, scattering protesting students and No casualties were reported in that

incident, and witnesses said it appeared the jets were firing into the air rather than into the crowd. But shortly afterward fighting broke out in the downtown area between troops and demonstrators.

A doctor working with the Red Cross said today that 24 persons were killed and dozens wounded in Saturday night disturbances when soldiers opened fire on civilians. He said the number of civilians wounded was difficult to determine but that the toll was probably more than 100.

#### Reforms sought in South Korea SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - The electoral college packed with his sup-

leader of South Korea's major opposition party called today for sweeping democratic reforms, immediate release of all political prisoners and free elections to choose a successor to assassinated President Park Chung-

Kim Young-sam, head of the New Democratic Party, warned at a news conference that "there may be some disorder and instablility" if free presidential elections are not held.

Acting President Choi Kyu-hah and other key civilian and military officials now making most of the decisions in the government have not said how Park's successor should be named. But informed sources said Park's Democratic Republican Party wants the election in accordance with constitution Park wrote in 1972 to perpetuate himself in office, by an

Earlier today, the government party convened the National Assembly to reject the resignations of 69 opposition members. All 66 assemblymen from the New Democratic Party

and three splinter Democratic Unification Party members quit en masse Oct. 13 to protest Kim's expulsion from the body for criticizing Park. Kim said he and his colleagues had not decided whether they would re-


turn to the Assembly when it meets Nov. 15. However, some members of the party said there was no need to stay out longer since Park was assassinated Oct. 26 by the head of the Korean Central Intelligence Agency.

Leaders of the opposition party, which topped Park's party in the popular vote in the 1978 election, met today to formulate a platform. Afterward Kim told a news conference:

"The first step toward reform should be the lifting of Emergency Decree No. 9 (outlawing criticism of the government, the constitution and the president) and the release of political prisoners." Kim said.

The next step, he continued, should be amendment of the constitution to provide for a popular election, then scheduling of elections. Kim also said the constitutional requirement that a new president be named within 90 days need not be heeded so long as the president is elected by the people.

The Democratic Unification Party, meanwhile, called on the acting president to release former President Yun Po-sun and former presidential candidate Kim Dae-jung. Both were under house arrest for opposition to Park and for advocating democratic government.



#### Klan march brings Dallas 'together'

DALLAS (AP) — A weekend march staged by the Ku Klux Klan in downtown Dallas brought the city's citizens closer together, says a minis-

"Bigotry and hatred are not yet dead in Dallas, this so-called city of excellence" said Rev. Zan Holmes. 'We ought to thank them for reminding us we have not yet overcome.'

Holmes made his remarks Saturday after more than 30 robed Klansmen, surrounded by police wearing riot helmets and carrying billy clubs, marched through the downtown area for the first time in almost 60 years. Hundreds of hostile spectators

walked beside the group, yelling obscenities and threats. An hour later, about 2,000 members of the Coalition for Human Equality

staged a counter demonstration, protesting everything from the "racism of the Klan" to the "conservatism of city administrators.' During the 20-minute KKK march, several spectators attempted to

break through police lines. Three persons apparently angered by chants of "White Power" were arrested by po-The parade, billed as "The March

of the Christian Soldiers" to "save the white race" ended abruptly when police, fearing trouble would develop, herded the group into the basement of the Dallas County Courthouse. "I'm mad at the police," said Addie

Barlow Frazier, the 73-year-old grandmother who organized the march. "They wouldn't let us hold a rally at Dealy Plaza. Yet they allowed the burrheads and the apes to go down to city hall and yack all they want. That should tell you who's running

#### White leadership helped 'curb' rally violence

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) - The fact that organizers of an anti-Klan rally in which four persons were killed were mostly white and communist-oriented probably helped keep further violence from erupting in this Southern city, a federal official says.

"It wasn't one white group against one black group," H.M. "Mickey" Michaux, a black who is the U.S. Attorney, said Sunday, the day after the violence that also left 10 wounded. "It was one white group against another white group that was trying to elicit support from the black commu-

Police reported no violence in Greensboro in the two nights after the shootings Saturday at a "Death to the Klan" rally in a predominantly black public housing project.

"I don't see any polarization of the community coming about because of this," Michaux said. He said the group's communist leanings weren't widely shared in the black communi-

Michaux urged FBI action, and FBI officials said they were trying to determine whether civil rights laws had been violated.

## Court hearings begin for 14 charged in Klan rally shooting

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) -While the FBI looked for possible civil rights violations, court hearings began today for 14 men charged in the deaths of four persons gunned down Saturday at an anti-Ku Klux Klan

The first two suspects to appear before District Court Judge Robert Cecil were Rayford Milano Caudle and Michael Eugene Clinton, both of Winston-Salem.

Wearing jail-issued jumpsuits and sandals, the two asked Cecil for court-appointed attorneys. The judge said lawyers from the Guilford County Public Defenders office would be named to represent them.

Caudle and Clinton were arrested Sunday on charges of conspiracy to commit murder. Twelve other men who were arrest-

ed immediately following the ambush at the "Death to the Klan" rally were charged with first-degree murder and conspiracy to commit murder.

After requesting an attorney, Caudle, visibly trembling, asked the judge, "Can I say something, your honor?" "Yes," said Cecil

"God save America and this honor-

able court," Caudle said. Cecil told them provisions for bond would be discussed later.

In the meantime, the mayor of Greensboro promised an internal inguiry on how the police handled the violence that ended with three white men and a black woman dead and 10 other persons wounded. But civil rights groups have demanded an outside investigation of police actions.

Police said some of the suspects had declared they were members of the Ku Klux Klan, but local Klan leaders denied their factions had anything to do with the shootings. At least one suspect said he was a leader of the National Socialist Party of America, the Nazis

The agent in charge of the FBI's Greensboro office, Andrew Pelczar, said the bureau was trying to determine whether there were any civil rights violations. FBI Director William Webster "has taken a very personal interest in this case," he said.

The most seriously injured among the wounded was Paul Carl Bermanzohn, leader of the anti-Klan communist Workers ViePOINT Organization. Bermanzohn, 30, was in critical condition after undergoing brain surgery. Three others remained hospital-

Bermanzohn's group confronted Klansmen in August at a Klan rally in China Grove, south of Greensboro. There was shouting and a brandishing of weapons on both sides but no shots were fired and no one was injured.

Greensboro Mayor Jim Melvin and City Manager Tom Osborne at a news. conference defended police actions, but said questions about a police response must await an internal inves-

Police Chief William Swing said his men did all they could to handle the situation when carloads of whites, some armed with automatic weapons. drove into the rally site at a predominantly black public housing project. Gunfire broke out after words were exchanged between the two groups. All the victims were from among the 100 participants at the rally, authorities said.

Swing conceded that police knew suspicious vehicles were heading toward the crowd. He said at the time of the shootings the nearest officers were a block away.

Police arrested the 12 men who are facing murder charges about a block from the scene of the shooting, and officers confiscated a yellow Ford van which contained an array of weapons

#### Michigan UAW members seek 'Smash the Klan Terror' rally

DEARBORN, Mich. (AP) - United Auto Workers union members at a Ford Motor Co. plant here are calling for a "Smash the Klan Terror" rally Saturday in downtown Detroit.

The rally plans grew out of a resolution passed by UAW Local 600 calling for the firing of two plant foremen who came to work in September wearing Ku Klux Klan-type garb. Ford transferred the foremen to

other plants. But leaders of the local said they had assumed the men would "The workers thought that was just

a slap on the wrist," Frank Hicks, a Rouge tradesman, said Sunday.

The resolution was approved Saturday, the same day four people attending an anti-Klan rally in Greensboro, N.C., were shot to death. Police said 10 others were injured when two carloads of whites emptied automatic weapons into the crowd. Fourteen people were arrested.

"The (Dearborn) workers are really mad," said Hicks, a white worker. We want the union to make a powerful statement in defense of the rights of blacks.'

The resolution called the actions of the foremen "outrageous KKK provo-

#### Polling places listed for Tuesday's constitutional amendment voting

Polling places for voting on three constitutional amendments will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday.

The first amendment on the ballot would change the appointment of notaries public from the county to the secretary of state office, and the terms would be for four years instead of two. The second amendment would provide for legislative review of

the rulemaking process by agencies in the executive department. The final amendment would authorize the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans to purchase farm and ranch real estate by qualified borrowers through the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of

By the end of absentee balloting on Friday, only 86 persons had voted, said Rosenelle Cherry, county clerk.

Voting precincts have been combined for this election, according to the Midland County Clerk's office.

Voting precincts 1, 5, 17 and 24 will go to the Public Safety Building, 404 E. Texas Ave. Greenwood School will be the voting site for precinct 2. The

### Von Dohlen fund-raiser nets \$25,000 in campaign funds

Austin consultant Jim Ray, who handled the details, said advance ticket sales raised \$35,000, and "I am guessing it will total \$40,000." He said Von Dohlen will have \$25,000 after expenses from the \$25-per-person Sunday night reception. Von Dohlen, 36, is speaker pro tem

PETROS. Tenn. (AP) - James Earl Ray, imprisoned in the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., tried unsuccessfully to escape from Brushy Mountain Prison early today,

prison officials said. Ray, serving 99 years for the 1968 assassination plus a year for an escape in 1977, was recaptured inside the prison grounds but outside the fortress-like building in the rugged East Tennssee mountains.

Prison Sgt. Ray Tucker said inmate Donald Eugene Wolverton accompanied Ray in the attempt but was also recaptured. Tucker said a guard fired one warning shot but that no one was

Ray, who pleaded guilty to the killing but has since declared his innocence; escaped with several other inmates from the prison in June 1977 but was recaptured after a few days. King, a black civil rights leader was

gunned down in Memphis, Tenn.

According to Tucker, Ray and Wolverton began their freedom bid at about 2:05 a.m. EST by sawing through a vent in the back of their cell into an open space called a pipe chase. They cut through a set of bars that leads to an exhaust fan, wired the bars back together, removed an access plate in the fan, moved through and replaced the plate.

They reached a small room on the top of the building, cut two bolts from a lock hasp and attempted to open the door. Then they pushed a hacksaw blade between the door and the jamb and sawed through, reaching the roof.

Climbing down a pipe they reached the ground between the officers' dining room and cellblock B.

There, an officer spotted Ray crawling on the ground and recaptured him.

#### Fellow Iowans remember Mamie in memorial service

Two hundred people in Boone, Iowa, remembered Mamie Eisenhower as the meatpacker's daughter who didn't turn her back on her hometown when she became first lady.

"She came back, which is a reaffirmation of rural life," the Rev. David Crow said at memorial services Sunday for Mrs. Eisenhower, who died in her sleep Thursday.

Mrs. Eisenhower, widow of the former President Dwight Eisenhower, was to be honored today in memorial services in a suburb of Washington, D.C., and in a day of mourning in Pennsylvania, where she spent the last ten years of her life on a Gettysburg farm.

First Lady Roslynn Carter was to be among the dignitaries at a memorial service at the military post chapel in Ft. Meyer, Va.

Flags were to be flown at half staff throughout Pennsylvania On Sunday, friends and admirers gathered at the First Presbyterian Church in Boone. Mrs. Eisenhower attended the church when she came to visit Boone, and relatives asked that a memorial service be held

Stanley Moffitt, co-chairman for the memorial service, said the mood of the ceremony was "cheerful" and "upbeat" and that he saw no tears shed during the ceremony.

"It was a time for happy reflection on Mamie and her Iowa roots," said

Mrs. Eisenhower was born in Boone 83 years ago Nov. 14. She died of heart failure at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington and was buried Saturday in Abilene, Kan., beside her husband of 53 years. She had been undergoing physical therapy at the medical center since she suffered a stroke Sept. 25 at her Gettysburg farm.

A White House plane flew her body to Abilene, where a military honor guard carried her bronze coffin into the Place of Meditation, a chapel at

She was buried following a 45-minute service attended by about 35 family members and invited friends, including former President Richard Nixon and his wife, Pat.

About 2,000 other mourners, shivering in a cold wind, kept a vigil outside the chapel to catch a glimpse of the funeral procession.

"We are in a fight," Jackson said of the president's proposal for a big synthetic fuels development program. "It's a close one.

The Senate was beginning debate today on the legislation, which also includes about \$1 billion to encourage weatherization of residences and expanded use of solar heating and cool-

The 10-year synthetic fuels measure would provide an assortment of financing - including loans, loan and price guarantees, and grants - to encourage the extraction of fuel from

oil shale, tar sands and coal. The legislation would also create an independent Energy Security Corp., a five-member board to parcel out the

Jackson said an unusual collection of lobbyists representing environmentalists, oil companies and big business are allied against Carter's proposal, which the Washington Democrat also vigorously supports.

Late last week, Jackson bitterly attacked "the big oil companies who are calling the shots" in the synthetic fuels debate.

Those companies are seeking to keep the synthetic fuels market to themselves by blocking the legislation, Jackson said, adding, "The lobbying up here has been unprecedent-

Environmentalists say not enough is known about the potential damage to the atmosphere from synthetic fuel plants, which use large amounts of coal to produce heat for the extraction of oil from shale buried deep in a number of western states, including Wyoming and Colorado.

# Carter to come face-to-face with political reality

WASHINGTON (AP) - On Wednesday, when Sen. Edward M. Kennedy announces his presidential challenge, President Carter will be engaged in a struggle for Senate support of the arms limitation treaty.

On Thursday, when Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. of California declares his presidential ambitions, Carter will be conferring with the prime minister of Ireland

"A fairly routine week for us here," says White House press secretary Jody Powell.

This is the week, one year from Election Day 1980, when Carter comes face-to-face with the reality he has known for months: he is facing a stiff challenge for the Democratic nomination. Kennedy and Brown are hitting the road on cross-country campaign swings.

Carter is responding with a schedule lacking any overt political work. Today, for example, he was to sign

legislation giving him authority to impose gasoline rationing in a crisis. There is an arms treaty briefing, a breakfast meeting with the Democratic congressional leadership and a conference with economic advisers.

At the end of the week, there are three diplomatic events - the meeting with Ireland's Jack Lynch, a state dinner Thursday night for the prime minister, and then a trip to Canada for meetings with Canadian Prime Minister Joe Clark and a speech to the

It all adds up to a fairly common campaign strategy for an incumbent: a portrait of the president hard at work on presidential matters while his would-be replacements are out

Carter's own candidacy will be announced Dec. 4. It will be followed by a cross-country fund-raising trip certain to gain him wide media coverage after this week's focus on the Ken-

nedy and Brown announcements. Powell predicted that a straw poll, taken in Ames, Iowa, at a Democratic Party fund-raising dinner Saturday night, would offer a counter-measure on behalf of Carter.

The poll results were expected to

become available later today. Another weekend poll, meanwhile, indicated that the scramble for the Republican nomination may be heating up, as George Bush finished unexpectedly strong in a straw vote at a Republican forum in Maine

Bush got 466 votes; outpolling Senate Minority Leader Howard Baker of


Tennessee, who had 426 votes, and former Texas Gov. John Connally, who got 236 votes.

Former California Gov. Ronald Reagan, usually considered the frontrunning candidate among Republicans nationwide, came in a distant fourth, picking up only 98 votes. Reagan plans to declare his candidacy in New York on Nov. 13.

Baker's campaign since his formal declaration of candidacy last week had been aimed at winning the straw vote in Maine.

He said on Sunday, however, that he was encouraged to have finished ahead of Reagan. And Bush, Baker told television interviewers, "didn't win by much.'

Kennedy, meanwhile, campaigned over the weekend in upstate New York and in West Virginia.

#### A new departure

The Carter administration's decision to bolster Morocco's King Hassan in his struggle with leftist Polisario guerrillas marks a refreshing departure from recent U.S. policy in Africa.

Heretofore, the administration has proved all too willing to subordinate American interests, and those of our allies, in a transparent attempt to curry favor with antagonistic African leaders. The net result to date has been an unprecedented, and largely unresisted, expansion of Soviet and Cuban influence on the African continent.

Although this self-defeating policy has been identified chiefly with former U.N. Ambassador Andrew Young, its devotees still wield influence at the State Department and on Capitol Hill. Thus the sensible White House decision to sell King Hassan a handful of light reconnaissance aircraft and helicopter gunships has aroused considerable opposition.

But consider the facts. King Hassan has been a longtime friend and ally of the United States. Almost alone among the Arab states, Morocco has taken a conciliatory approach toward Israel and the efforts to promote a

Middle East peace. Most recently, King Hassan dispatched troops to Zaire to help defeat two Cubansponsored invasions of that mineral-rich country.

For the last two years, Moroccan forces have also been struggling to keep that portion of the Western Sahara ceded to it by Spain out of the hands of the Polisario guerrillas. The guerrillas receive political support and arms from Algeria, Libya and the Soviet Union, three states with a vested interest in denying the Western Sahara's rich phosphate and uranium deposits to the West.

Curiously, the United States has hewn to a fastidious neutrality on the question of Morocco's claims to the Western Sahara. But now that the Polisario guerrillas have extended the fighting into Morocco itself, King Hassan has asked permission to purchase reinforcements for his air force.

It's a modest request from a friend with any number of claims on American loyalty and support. Denying this request, as Congress has the power to do, would only chill a valuable partnership and aid a guerrilla movement whose success is plainly contrary to American interests.

#### Rigged verdict by judge charged

By JACK ANDERSON

WASHINGTON — For several weeks we have been investigating the strange conduct of Federal Judge Robert R. Merhige Jr. in the criminal fraud trial of socialite Smith Bagley. We can confirm the misgivings of the two prosecutors who wrote a damning nine-page complaint to the Justice Department.

Bagley was acquitted of criminal fraud charges last August after Judge Merhige gave dubious instructions to the jury — instructions that the prosecutors claimed did not bear "the remotest resemblance to the law."

"(An) anti-government bias was manifested by Judge Merhige in virtually every phase of the trial," the letter alleges. "This bias was most clearly reflected in the court's intemperate comments and outrageous jury instructions."

This unprecedented attack upon a powerful judge was signed by U.S. Attorney H.M. Michaux Jr. and Assistant U.S. Attorney Patricia W. Lemley of Greensboro, N.C.

Our own investigation has uncovered a pattern of circumstances that gives off a strong whiff of lime. The story can best be told by starting at the beginning:

Smith Bagley is the 44-year-old heir to the R.J. Reynolds tobacco fortune. Tall, dark, and gangling, he came to Washington in 1975, bought a \$500,000 home in fashionable Georgetown and began throwing lavish parties.

He and his wife Vicki have close ties to Jimmy Carter whom they introduced to Washington society in 1976. They raised funds for the Carter campaign, and after his election, the new president-elect slipped off to Bagley's Musgrove Plantation on St. Simon's Island for a vacation.

The judge who was later to preside over Bagley's trial, it now turns out, was a close friend of the family. Our

associate Clark Mollenhoff learned, for example, that Judge Merhige was "like a brother" to Bagley's first cousin, the late Lt. Gov. Sargeant Reynolds of North Carolina. In fact, Reynolds helped to persuade the late President Lyndon Johnson to appoint

Merhige to the federal bench in 1967.
When Reynolds died four years later, Bagley was in charge of the burial arrangements and Judge Merhige was a pallbearer. In his will, Reynolds named his wife and his friend the judge to be executors of his estate.

Bagley's financial operations, meanwhile, got him into hot water with the law. His attorneys made the motions that shifted the trial from North Carolina to Virginia where Judge Merhige could preside.

The chief judge, Eugene Gordon, asked Merhige if there was any reason he should not conduct the Bagley trial. "No reason," responded Merhige without mentioning his close relations with Bagley's family.

Later Merhige asked the prosecutors whether they had "any objections" to his assuming jurisdiction over the case. They didn't object, but learned later of Merhige's close personal and political ties to the Reynolds family.

Next, Bagley's lawyers tried to waive the right to a jury. If it had not been for the prosecutors' strenuous objections, the case would have been tried before Judge Merhige without a jury.

When the prosecutors learned of the judge's ties to Bagley's family they decided it was too late to challenge him. A challenge at that stage would have been an affront to the judge and might have jeopardized the case.

There was another curious development. The two prosecutors found themselves badly outgunned by Bagley's battery of high-powered attorneys and advisers. Complained the two lonely prosecutors in their letter

WASHINGTON — Far from White House anger over young Joe Kennedy's blast at the Carter presidency during the John F. Kennedy Library dedication, Jimmy Carter and his top political advisers were actually thankful.

"Joe made it easier for us" a key

"Joe made it easier for us," a key presidential political aide told us. "The overkill in that blunderbuss attack was clearly out of place in what everybody wanted to keep as a non-political tribute to John Kennedy. Joe created on-the-spot sympathy for the president." That sympathy made Carter's speech look all the better when it came right after Joe's.

Carter's speech was perhaps the best he has made as president. It was written by chief White House speech writer Rick Hertzberg after several meetings of the inner staff at which Carter laid down two rules of what he wished to say: that he had had a feeling for President Kennedy that approached hero worship; and that Kennedy's own emphasis on the inevitability of "change" should be used to make Carter's point that political challenges faced by Kennedy had completely changed in the intervening 20 years, making Carter's presidency much tougher to handle than Kennedy's.

#### CONNALLY SNARES FINDLEY

One unexpected offshoot of John B. Connally's highly controversial Middle East speech calling for Israel to withdraw from the West Bank and linking an Arab-Israeli settlement to U.S. Mideast oil policy was the conversion of Rep. Paul Findley from

anti- to pro-Connally.

Findley personally intervened with Gerald Ford at the 1976 Republican presidential convention to argue against Connally as a possible Ford running mate. The Illinois Republican was regarded as one of Connally's chief congressional enemies.

But after Connally's Mideast speech — which was attacked by pro-Israei politicians and praised by pro-Arab interests — Findley wrote him a letter calling the speech one of the best ever made on the Mideast.

Findley is the foremost congressional advocate of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) and has long argued that the U.S. should negotiate the West Bank question directly with the PLO (ruled out by the Ford administration's pledge to Israel not to talk with the PLO until it recognizes Israel's sovereignty).

#### CARTER MAY LOSE SULLIVAN

Federal railway Administrator Jack Sullivan, who won widespread praise running Jimmy Carter's 1976 campaign in Pennsylvania, may not be on board this time.

Although Pennsylvania politicians had expected Sullivan to manage Carter's uphill fight against Sen. Edward M. Kennedy in their state, he has privately suggested he may pursue his own political interest this time. Specifically, Sullivan is thinking of joining the stampede of Democratic candidates trying to replace Republican Sen. Richard Schweiker, who is not seeking re-election.

Whether or not Sullivan actually runs for the Senate, he may pass up a major role in the presidential campaign anyway. An Annapolis classmate of Carter's, he has not enjoyed good relations with the men around the president.

#### VAKY'S VACANCY

The real reason for Assistant Secretary of State Viron Vaky's resignation as top Latin American policy-maker is the constant, probing and powerful intervention into his diplomatic business by the State Department's human rights bureau, headed by Assistant Secretary Pat Derian.

Derian's zealous human rights bureaucrats, working under the toplevel Christopher Committee, virtually controlled what Vaky and his policy-makers could say about Latin nations that have been charged by Derian with human rights abuses.

The Christopher Committee is headed by Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher, but Derian and her top aide, Mark Schneider, run it. It got so bad for Vaky that almost every statement he made about such alleged violators of human rights as Brazil, Chile and Uruguay had to be cleared by Derian before he could make it. Unable to assert broader American policy interests in the inflammable Latin American cockpit, Vaky chose resignation.

#### FINESSING ILLINOIS Although the White House has re

ferred to Illinos as a state that President Carter must win to be renominated, campaign manager Tim Kraft is quietly passing the word that he may skip the preferential primary there next March 18.

This would constitute a finesse by the Carter campaign aimed at neutralizing Sen. Edward M. Kennedy's advantage in the city of Chicago, which accounts for half the state's Democratic primary voters. Carter would not lose any convention delegates by not running in the Illinois preferential primary — strictly a "beauty contest" unrelated to delegate selection.

Assuming that the Chicago Democratic organizatin will run uncommitted delegates as usual — who will be unopposed — the Carter vs. Kennedy battle would then be limited to contests for delegates downstate. Since Carter strategists feel the president has an edge over Kennedy in the downstate counties, they could then claim a victory of sorts in Illinois.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) - Two international organizations have recommended a worldwide code for marketing infant foods, according to spokesmen for Infant Formula Action Coalition, which has helped lead the fight against the formulas.

The World Health Organization and the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund made the recommendation last month at a WHO-UNICEF meeting on infant and young child feeding in Geneva, Switzerland, the group

INFACT, a Minneapolis-based group which has been a major force in the fight by consumer groups against aggressive promotion of infant formula in Third World countries, had two delegates at the Geneva meeting.

The consumer groups contend infant formula is promoted in Third World countries without telling people how to properly use the product, resulting in malnutrition among infants.

Delegates Douglas Johnson and Shirley Powell of INFACT said those attending the WHO-UNICEF meeting also urged:

-An immediate end to all sales promotion of infant foods, including promotional advertising to the public:

-Termination of advertising and promotional distribution of samples in health care facili-

-An end to activity by employees of infant food companies in health care facilities.

Formation of an international organization opposing the aggressive promotion of infant food The International Baby Foods Action Committee - also was announced at the meeting, the group said.

# Penal system not working for Christopher Nalley

KAUFMAN, Texas (AP) — Christopher Nalley celebrated his 18th birthday earlier this year in the Kaufman County jail. He has spent the last 21/8 years of his life in an institution of some kind, waiting someone to define his fate within the confines of lawsthat so far have provided no an-

Nalley was first admitted to Terrell State Hospital in 1977 after he was found unfit to stand trial for sexually abusing a 6-year-old girl. While in the hospital, he became a suspect in the sexual mutilation and strangulation death of a 7-year-old Dallas girl.

On Nov. 4, 1978, fellow Terrell inmate Gary Van Adams was sexually. abused and brutally choked to death with a chain. His body was discovered under the bed in Nalley's room.

A short time later, the husky older boy was apprehended on a roadway west of Terrell. He was transferred the next day to the Rusk Hospital for criminally insane adults in Cherokee

INDICTED FOR murder in January, Nalley was diagnosed by a Rusk psychiatrist as mentally fit to stand trial. He was transferred to the Kaufman County jail in February.

A mistrial was declared May 18 when a Kaufman County jury could not decide whether he was competent to stand trial.

Nalley has been in jail since then, waiting for another competency hearing set for Nov. 12.

The law doesn't fit Nalley," said Kaufman County District Attorney Glen Ashworth. "He's an exception and a special case. Damn it, I don't know about that boy. We've never really struck upon a solution to the Nalley case.

"Chris should never be released to the public," he continued. "My main concern always has been the institutionalization of Nalley. Right now, the only solution is the Texas Department

Adams was a frail boy, five feet tall and only 80 pounds. He was sent to Terrell after he repeatedly ran away from home and refused to attend school but has never been diagnosed as violent His death turned an emotional spot-



# Motorcycle club party ends with three dead, six wounded

prises, a Detroit motorcycle club, spent their own money revamping the old auto repair shop. They opened their new clubhouse with a party that ended with a bloody confrontation and three people dead.

in dummy and led the king of spades to West's ace. West looked fearfully at the dummy and timidly returned Declarer won, drew trumps

and gave up two hearts. That was 620 points for South and a question for East.

How could you beat the contract if I didn't have the ace of hearts?" East demand-"Suppose you had the ace

#### Neighbors surprised at O'Rourke's arrest

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - His neighbors never knew much about him, but thought he was pleasant

"It's kind of scary," said Kathleen Volack, who lived across the street from Michael O'Rourke, who officials say is a member of the Irish Republican Army listed in 1977 as Ireland's Public Enemy

"You read these things in the paper and you just don't believe you'd ever come into contact with these people," Mrs. Volack said.

O'Rourke, 27, is being held in the Salem County, N.J., jail awaiting a deportation hearing Wednesday on charges of violating U.S. immigration law. Lyle Karn, regional director of the U.S. Immigra-

tion and Naturalization Service, said O'Rourke is charged with failure to establish the date, place and time of his entry into the United States. In Ireland, police said they had linked O'Rourke to

the 1976 bomb assassination of British Ambassador Christopher Ewart-Biggs. He also is wanted for questioning in the 1976-slaying of policeman Michael Clerkin of Portarlington, a town 50 miles, west


In Philadelphia, he lived under the name of Patrick Mannion, said Edgar N. Best, special agent in charge of the Philadelphia FBI office

"We're convinced that he is the right man and that he escaped from a prison in Ireland," Karn said. Fingerprints supplied by Irish authorities matched those of the man in jail, Best said.

"He was rather innocuous," said David Kessler, who occupied an apartment below O'Rourke. "But he didn't make much noise and he was hardly ever

O'Rourke was serving five years for possession of explosive weapons when he escaped from prison in

He had been taken from the top-security Portolaise Prison in Dublin to a court to testify in another case. But O'Rourke had explosives strapped to his body, police said, and blew out a cell wall.

### Year-old 'miracle baby' going home

SAN DIEGO (AP) -At birth, Mignon Faulkner weighed just 17 ounces - little more than a loaf of bread. Now the tiny baby, believed to be the most prematurely born baby to survive, is a year old and going home

for the first time. Friends, relatives and hospital staff members jammed a lounge at Children's Hospital and Health Center here Sunday for a combination goodbye-welcome homebirthday party thrown by

Mignon's parents. Mignon, pronounced Megan, was born more than four months premature last Nov. 7. Doctors estimate she was in her 23rd week of gestation just entering the second half of fetal development. Her birth wasn't announced until January, when doctors felt she had a 50-50 chance of survival.







#### Wanted alive: Engineers

LOS ANGELES (AP) — It used to be you could tell an aerospace engineer by the pink slip peeking out from behind the half-dozen pens in his shirt pocket. Now engineers are so scarce that defense firms are paying bounties to steal them from each other.

A simultaneous jump in defense and airliner business has Texas Instruments running ads in Los Angeles on the virtues of Dallas, Northrop offering \$1,000 in cash for new workers and Boeing hiring overseas for the first time in a decade. The boom-orbust aerospace business is booming

The Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis predicts that aerospace companies will sell \$47 billion worth of missiles, planes and other defense equipment this year, a 20 percent jump over 1978. In addition, several companies are beginning new commercial airliner programs and the result is unprecedented demand for engineers and other skilled workers:

"When we're in sync with Douglas, Rockwell and Hughes, that's what causes the problems," says Dave Crowther, spokesman for Lockheed-California Co. "If it's timed so that when we're hiring, Hughes is laying off, that's beautiful. But if the needs are the same across the board, there's just not enough people to meet the demand.

Lockheed has added 6,000 employees in the past year as it speeds up production of its L1011. Seattle-based Boeing has added 631 engineers to its permanent staff and 553 temporaries - almost a third of the temporary workers from either England or Canada, said Boeing spokesman Pete

Boeing has also "borrowed" engineers from some of its subcontrac-

So far this year, Lockheed has paid out \$45,500 in bounties for 91 new employees, and Northrop said it has paid out several hundred thousand dollars under its "Refer a Friend for

a Career at Northrop" program. But some managers don't like the bounty system.

### Shuttle program 'set back'

WASHINGTON (AP) - America's space shuttle program suffered another setback Sunday when an engine was extensively damaged during a test, the space agency reported

The failure occurred during the first planned full-duration firing of three clustered engines similar to those that will boost the manned shuttle into orbit. Full duration is the time - 510 seconds - it takes to put the shuttle into orbit.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration said the test, at Bay St. Louis, Miss., was scheduled for 510 seconds but was terminated automatically after nine seconds when excessive pressure built up on a seal in an oxygen turbopump in engine'No. 3.

During the shutdown, NASA said engine No. 1 was seriously damaged when a hydrogen line ruptured near the base of an engine nozzle.

There was no indication how great an impact the failure would have on the shuttle program, which already is more than a year behind schedule because of technical and financial The damaged engine was to be re-

turned to its manufacturer, Rocketdyne, at Canoga Park, Calif., for dismantling and study. The shuttle's main engines are the

most advanced power plants ever developed. As a result, they developed many technical problems early in the program. But officials thought most of the major problems had been resolved, and they had conducted a number of full-duration firings of single engines.

The three-engine cluster involved in Sunday's test had been successfully fired in five short-duration tests ranging up to 20 seconds. The Sunday firing was to have been the first of six full-duration tests.

The shuttle originally was to have made its first manned orbital test flight last March, but troubles with the engine, thermal protection system and electronics, plus management problems, have caused one delay after another.

NASA Administrator Robert Frosch told a congressional committee last week there is a 50-50 chance the spaceship will make its first flight by next July and a 90 percent chance by September 1980.

Frosch recently overhauled the program management and is to meet with President Carter soon to ask for several hundred million dollars to put the project back on track.

#### Last Pegasus satellite down

WASHINGTON (AP) - The last of the Pegasus satellites has returned to Earth and, like its predecessors, caused no damage or injury as it sprayed its fiery debris over a wide path.

Pegasus 2 re-entered the atmosphere Saturday. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration reported that tracking data indicated any surviving debris splashed harmlessly into the Atlantic Ocean off the west coast of Africa.

NASA had kept track of the 111/2-ton satellite in its final days because computer projections indicated that as much as 2,300 pounds, mostly in chunks of less than 10 pounds, might survive re-entry heat and reach the Earth.

All three Pegasus satellites were launched in 1965 to record meteoroid hits and the threat they might pose to manned spaceships. Pegasus 3 fell out of orbit over the Pacific Ocean in 1969 and Pegasus 1 dropped down over Africa in 1978. No pieces of either satellite was ever found.

### Free enterprise great until going gets rough

NEW YORK (AP) - Free enterprise, its advocates say, is the defender of democracy, the energizer of productivity, the provider of taxes, the financier of social and cultural betterment. It is simply the best.

That is, until the going gets rough Three current events demonstrate another side to the popular pitch, growing louder every day, against government regulation and involvement in private matters. -The Chrysler Loan Guarantee.

"I am a strong advocate of the free enterprise system," Lee A. Iacocca, Chrysler chairman, told a House subcommittee as he pursued a federal loan guarantee for his deficit-ridden "I am sure you share my conviction

that in the long run the answers to our problems are going to be found not in the halls of Congress, but in the marketplace... However, given the alternatives

facing this corporation, and the workers who depend on Chrysler for employment, we have no choice in good conscience but to seek assistance until we can again be profitable and sustain ourselves.

The administration said last week it would offer \$1.5 billion in loan guarantees to aid Chrysler - its managers and shareholders as well as its workers - if it could privately raise a similar, non-guaranteed sum.

As G. William Miller, Treasury secretary, conceded in effect, nobody else (but the taxpayer) could be expected to invest in a company so destitute.

-The Thrifty Thrifts. Thrift institutions, which are mainly savings banks and savings and loan associations, are committed by charter to channeling the funds of mostly small savers into the housing indus-

Because of inflation, and the longterm commitments they must make on home mortgage, many of these institutions are now saddled with loans that are costing them dearly to For example, at a time when the

thrifts must pay more than 10 percent for some of their money, and then have the use of it for only six months at a time, they maintain loans on their

books at 5 percent. Those low-interest mortgages are a burden, especially when lenders can write new mortgages at more than 12 percent. What can they do with those unprofitable loans? Dump them on

the government, of course. Senators Jacob Javits, R-N.Y., and Alan Cranston, D-Calif., seek to have a government agency buy \$4.5 billion of such loans over a three-year period. Billions more are on the books; they could follow

Nobody else but the taxpayer, it seems, could be induced into buying loans of 5 percent to 7.5 percent, when anybody else with money to lend could get at least 12 percent these days, and sometimes a lot more.

### Tower concerned with safety of American citizens in Iran

WASHINGTON - "The safety of Americans in Iran must be the first priority of the United States government in meeting the crises created by the takeover of the U.S. Embassy in Tehran by Iranian 'students'," Senator John Tower, R-Texas, said today.

However, the senator added, "We must also proceed to re-examine the effect of a continuing policy of concilliation towards an irresponsible government.'

'The latest episode in which the members of the American Embassy are held hostage, with the apparent blessing of the Iranian leadership, shows the disdain with which this Administration is held," Tower said.

"Following an entire series of weak foreign policy decisions, it is no wonder that virtually any government feels it can thumb its nose at the United States. We must appear especially vulnerable to a government which is currently supplying a significant portion of our energy requirements," the senator claimed.

"If we are to be subject to this sort of international intimidation, I can think of no better reason to mount whatever effort is required to secure this nation's energy independance.

"The U.S. must move expeditiously to find alternative sources for the amount of petroleum products we obtain from Iran before the inevitable happens" Tower said.





### Sen. Weicker seeks facts on Ixtoc oil spill

WASHINGTON (AP)-A Connecticut senator says he wants to know more about the Ixtoc I oil spill before any leases are approved in the Georges Bank off New England.

Sen. Lowell Weicker, R-Conn., on the Senate floor Thursday called for hearings to evaluate the environmental impact of oil spills in the Gulf of Mexico and elsewhere.

"Georges Bank could be the next potential disaster area if we do not re-think our policy," Weicker

Weicker said he was disturbed to learn that oil still was spewing from the runaway well despite the placement of a "sombrero" to reduce the flow.

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Muayed Kilani is a 16-year-old Palestinian "guerrilla cub" who wants to die for a country he has never seen.

'My father met his martyrdom for the sake of Palestine and, Allah willing, I shall die for the same cause," the lean, wiry schoolboy said during a break in combat training at the Palestine Liberation Organization's Chatilla

With sweat pouring from his face, Kilani spoke with determination of the mission of the "cubs," aged 14 to 19, who will graduate and join one of eight guerrilla groups that make up the PLO. They average four hours of

"We are the sons of the Palestinian revolution, and we want to die revolutionaries," he said. "Our mothers fed us the love of Palestine with the milk of their breasts. The Palestine of our dreams is indeed more sacred to us than the reality of Palestine was to our fathers."

Trainer Abu Khaled roared a command, and the youngsters jumped and cried out in unison, "Revolution until victory!

"A drop of sweat in training saves a drop of blood in combat," Abu Khaled reminded them. "Let your triumphant cry ring in enemy ears like a tocsin of bloodletting and utter death."

Holding Soviet-made Kalashnikov rifles, the boys thrust and zigzagged through their drills in a sprawling compound of tents and tumble-down,

"Some of us cursed our fathers because they failed to fight, but our sons will not curse us," said Kilani, brandishing his rifle and patting its His guerrilla father was killed in southern Lebanon two years ago,

leaving a widow and three boys to "refuel the revolution" against Israel, he said. "My mother has always been proud of my father's martyrdom, and we

never felt like orphans," he said, "The Palestinian revolution is our eternal father.' Kilani, his mother and two brothers have since been living on the dole, a

meagre 300 Lebanese pounds — \$93 — a month, from Yasser Arafat's PLO. Raising a portrait of Arafat and a four-color Palestinian flag, the boys marched under a group of pine trees at the head of a "cub formation." "The white portion (of the flag) symbolizes our intentions, the green

our land, the black our battles and the red our swords," he said. Kilani said "there's nothing illusory about us wanting to die." He said his leaders have taught him, and others, that "every martyr kindles a new torch for the revolution.

Nodding sadly, he admitted that "death to us is a far happier thing than our sad reality.' "True, we have nothing to care about - no home, no past, no identity

and probably no future," he said. "But we still have one supreme hope Kilani and other cubs in his class voiced "deep affection" for Abu

Ammar, code name of Arafat, who also is known as the khitiar, or the old "The khitiar is father to every Palestinian orphan, brother to every

struggling fighter," said Kilani. "Abu Ammar is our hope and savior." The boy reviled all Arab leaders and accused them of "kissing and patting the revolution, while stabbing it in the back."

'Our Arab brothers have enough money to strangle Israel and humiliate the United States," he said. "But look what they do to us.

"They prefer to squander the oil money on gambling tables rather then feed the hungry and homeless Palestinians. They hesitate to close their oil taps and keep injecting money and oil into the veins of the Israeli and American economies."

Kilani believes the Palestinians would do much better if they "switched guerrilla raids from Israel to Arab oil countries and set our home straight before turning to the enemy.

"Our real enemy is not the one facing us, but it is the brother who's trying to thrust a sugar-coated poison pill down our throats," he said.

# Airline fares going up again; Situation expected to get worse

Air fares are on the rise again and would-be travelers have to be more

to use or the nearest CAB office if you have any questions. Higher fuel costs have been blamed for the latest round of price increases

The boosts will not affect all routes or airlines equally. Because of deregulation, there is a wide variety of fares and promotional offerings. One airline may charge more for a particular trip than another. Finding the bargains often means hard work, repeated telephone calls and persis-Here are some things to remember:

-Make plans as far ahead of time as possible. The number of discount seats is usually very limited and the cheaper tickets are often sold out weeks or even months ahead of popular holiday periods.

-Find out what will happen if you switch flights. Is there a cancellation penalty? Is there a deadline after which you no longer qualify for a discount fare? What if you get sick or are forced to cancel by circumstances you can't control? In most cases, you will not be penalized for illness or for something like a death in the family, but it's wise to know what you can

-Is the fare guaranteed? As a general rule, domestic airlines will not charge you extra once you have bought your ticket - even if the fare goes up. This does not always apply to foreign airlines, however. Nor does it apply unless you actually have the ticket; a reservation alone doesn't

-How do you want to pay for your ticket? You get automatic life insurance coverage when you buy your ticket with certain credit cards, including American Express and Diners Club. You also can, in some cases, pay off the bill a little at a time. The drawback to the extended-payment plan is that you pay interest on the outstanding balance. Another disadvantage to charging your tickets is that you won't be able to get an immediate refund if you cancel your plans; you'll have to wait for your account to be credited.

-Be careful with your ticket. "Getting a refund or replacement for a lost ticket is a lot of trouble and there's no guarantee you'll receive either one,' says the CAB. If, for example, someone uses or pashes in your lost ticket while you are waiting for the airline to process your refund application, the carrier may not give you your money back. Even if the application goes through without a hitch, the airline may charge you a handling fee of \$5

# Diplomats pledge food for hungry Cambodians

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Diplomats meet here today to pledge food supplies for millions of starving Cambodians, and hours before the talks began the Phnom Penh government announced it was opening the Mekong River to Western food shipments to its hungry people.

The United States and 31 other nations are studying a report issued by the U.N. Children's Fund and the International Committee of the Red Cross asking for \$111 million to supply 165,000 tons of food over a six-month period

The report said 2.5 million Cambodians in "extreme need" include 700,-000 children and sick people. It said 80 to 90 percent of the children were severely undernourished, that malaria, dysentery, and respiratory diseases were epidemic, and that only about 50 doctors were available to

care for some 4 million persons. It said about 300 tons of food, medicines, surgical supplies, shelter materials and other things had been airlifted to Cambodia since the end of July in one flight daily from Bangkok.

'An immediate need is seen for large-scale transport," the report said. It did not mention the fact the Vietnamese-backed Cambodian government of President Heng Samrin turned down a U.S. proposal for delivery of relief goods by truck convoys from Thailand. The Phnom Penh government rejected the American proposal because some of the food would have gone to areas controlled by the Khmer Rouge government of Premier Pol Pot which the Vietnamese invasion last winter drove into western Cambodia.

In a statement broadcast today by the Vietnam News Agency, the Heng Samrin government said "the People's Republic of Cambodia is from now on ready to receive whatever quantity of humanitarian aid" and

'without political conditions." Although fighting continues in western Cambodia between the Vietnamese and the Khmer Rouge, the statement added: "From Phnom Penh in the center of Cambodia we are capable of carrying this aid to whatever region of the country including the regions bordering on

The Phnom Penh government had been restricting incoming food supplies from non-communist sources to the daily flight and deliveries by ship to the country's only deepwater port at Kompong Som, which reportedly could unload only four ships at a time.

The Cambodian statement again rejected the U.S. proposal for truck convoys. It accused the United States of "excessively dramatizing the food shortage in Cambodia" and with China of using Thai territory for eliveries of aid to the Pol Pot side.

The statement repeated an earlier Cambodian report that the Soviet Union. Vietnam and their allies have sent 200,000 tons of relief supplies to Cambodia. It also said Cambodian farmers will be harvesting 1.4 million acres of rice - about 23 percent of the country's pre-war average - in the next two months along with 400,000 acres of dry crops.

you count a victory, we learned that last year against Philadelphia," said New York defensive tackle Gary Jeter, referring to the "fumble" that cost the Giants a game and former head coach John McVay his job.

JETER WAS right, but it certainly looked as if the Giants would notch their fifth consecutive National Football League victory and move back into playoff contention after dropping their first five games this season. It also looked as if they would defeat the Cowboys for the first time in 10 meetings.

Dallas, which had not scored a touchdown in more than nine quarters, earlier had to settle for Rafael Septien field goals

when they could now crack the New York defense. The Giants even stopped the Cow boys on a tremendous first half goal line stand after Dallas haid a first down at the 2-yard line !.



The economy, in fact, is looking downright robust.

"It's the case of the missing recession. It's out there somewhere, but nobody can find it," says Charles L. Schultze, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers.



### DR. NEIL SOLOMON Drugs, alcohol not go-togethers

Dear Dr. Solomon: My boyfriend has agreed to enter a methadone program. He did not have a bad habit, but he needed help. He also drinks quite a bit but says he can handle that by himself. My parents think he should kick both habits at the same time. Do you think it is a good idea for him to work on the drug problem now and worry about the drinking later? Ms. B.K.

Dear Ms. K.: Superficially, there may appear to be some logic to your boyfriend's desire to confront one problem at a time. It falls apart, though, in the face of evidence that the combination of alcohol and methadone may cause problems.

Dr. Mary Jeanne Kreck of Rockefeller University says that experiments with rabbits show that the blood level and distribution of methadone are altered by alcohol. And Dr. Albert J. Siemens of the Research Institute on Alcoholism in Buffalo makes the same observations about a detrimental interaction between alcohol and marijuana. For example, he notes that rats given both THC, the active component of marijuana, and alcohol slept for longer periods than those given only alcohol, and he attributes this to some interaction in the

central nervous system. The bottom line is that as long asyour boyfriend continues his drinking, he will not only continue to have an alcohol abuse problem, but a drug problem as well.







