## "Sesame Street" is 10 years old

season on Nov: 26, diriectors of Children's Television

viewers aged 2 to 5 watching "Sesame Street" in 7.5 million households. The figure had increased to 9.3
million last year - even as the nation's pre-school population declined. Recent research showed 88

later this year.

formula, and special programs are being developed for the mentally retarded, disabled and deaf.

curriculum has broadened to include such concepts
as health, cultural diversity, bilingual skills as health, cultural diversity, bilingual skills and,

The program made familiar faces out of Jim
Henson's Muppets - Bert and Ernie, Oscar the Grouch and the aforementioned Big Bird and Cookie

Hikers sign of 20th century at 6th-century monastery
ST. CATHERINE'S MONASTERY, Israeli-Occupied Sinai (AP) - Back in
1865 the Greek Orthodox monks of St. Catherine's Monastery lost a priceless manuscript of the Bible to a German scholar who "borrowed" it for research at home.
Since then the monks have tightened their security considerably, and
scholars are about as welcome as the throngs of scruffy hikers who troop past the 6th century desert monastery on their way to climb Mount Sinai.
The hikers, however, are a sign of the arrival of the 20th century at an
outpost of religious devotion that had existed for 1,400 years in splendid outpost of religious devotion that hat
isolation the foot of Mount Sinai.

"If a good man comes and respects the area, we are his servants," said

tery had only one or two visitors a week. Now an estimated 100,000 people a year visit the area, which Israel has
held since the 1967 Arab-Irraeli war but which Egypt will take back next Thursay, Nov. 15. To facielitate torurist travel. Isprael carved a 5 -mile
Troad from the Red Sea Coast, opened a military airport 12 miles away to road from the Red Sea Coast, opened a military airport 12 miles

"Many of the visitors are just tourists," Archbishop Damianos said.

some danger of being overwhelemd by a flood of visitors. However ace cording to Israelis in the area, the monastery has prospered as never

does boast new buildings, including a hostel to accommodate tourists out-
side the main walled compound, in addition to new wells and two diesel generators to supply electricity.
But the main attraction of the monastery is its ancient character. The
Byzantine emperor, Justinian the Great, ordered the high-walled fortress built in the tht century to protect pilgrims who had braved a journey to
the granite mountains of the Sinai wilderness.
Over the centuries, monks created a fabulous trove of gold-painted icons,
and devoted scribes copied so many tracts and pages of scripture that
some manuscripts were forgotten and discarded.
