Rowan said they were booked by St. Paul police on charges of conspiracy to commit kidnapping, conspiracy to commit assault and possession of a pistol without a permit.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The chairman of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission estimated Friday it will take as long as five years to clean up the crippled Three Mile Island nuclear power

Anything beyond that "would be unconscionable," NRC chairman Joseph Hendrie told a Senate environmental subcommittee investigating plans for the cleanup of the plant near Harrisburg, Pa., where a major nuclear accident occurred eight

Deportation sought

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - Israeli authorities on Friday took steps toward deporting the militant mayor of Nablus from the occupied West Bank of the Jordan River and Palestinians vowed widespread protests if the act is carried out.

The national news agency said Israel decided to expel Mayor Basaam Shakaa because of reported statements he made earlier this week allegedly condoning the actions of Palestinian terrorists who killed 34 Israelis last year.

Rate hike OK'd

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Ma Bell will get \$1.15 per month more from her one-party residential customers in Texas, thanks to the Public Utility Commission.

Pay telephone users will drop in a quarter instead of 20 cents. Business customers will pay \$3.45 per month more for basic

The commission voted 2-1 Friday, with Garrett Morris dissenting, for a rate increase package raising Southwestern Bell Telephone's yearly income by \$138.7 million.

Contractor indicted

WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal grand jury on Friday indicted the nation's largest defense contractor, McDonnell-Douglas Corp., and four of its top officials on charges they made \$7 million in illegal payments to officials and businessmen in five foreign countries.

The charges marked the first time in a major case of alleged corporate bribery that the government has indicted corporate officials. Generally in the past, the charges have been brought in criminal informations, which do not require a grand jury, and have been settled throught plea agreements.

'No new hope' seen for hostages

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter held an emotional meeting Friday with families of Americans held hostage in Iran, and a short time later the State Department said it had "no new hope" that the captives will be freed any time soon.

A broadcast later by Tehran radio saying ambassadors of four countries would be permitted into the U.S. embassy was welcomed here, however. A department official, asking not to

be identified, said it could be "welcome news."

The broadcast, in the name of the students holding the hostages, said they would "never stain their hands by harming their prisoners." It said ambassadors from Algeria, France, Syria and Sweden would be allowed inside "to tell all the nations of the world, and especially the American nation" about the conditions there.

The broadcast did not say when the

visit would be held, and department officials said they did not know.

Carter was driven from the White House to the State Department at mid-day. He met for about 45 minutes with the wives and children of some of the estimated 60 hostages held by armed Iranians in the U.S. Embassy

A White House spokesman said the president had offered the families reassurance. But shortly after the meeting State Department spokesman Hodding Carter told reporters there appeared to be no quick end to the crisis in sight.

"I am not able to offer you some new hope about a speedy release,' spokesman Carter said. He added, "I have no projection now to offer you on when this will end."

However, Zehdi Labib Terzi, the Palestine Liberation Organization's observer at the United Nations, said PLO leader Yasser Arafat "has personally been in touch with the authorities in Iran and we should expect some news in the morning Tehran

Meanwhile, a State Department official, giving the first official details of Sunday's seizure of the embassy in Tehran, said Marine guards had held off an Iranian mob for two hours before being overrun.

Frustration is primary reaction

Reactions to the situation in Iran range from anger through frustration to a few expressions of support for the actions being taken by the U.S.

Those are the results Friday of a random telephone poll of Mid-

Jack Roth, P.O. Box 8421 in Midland, decided to take his anger at the handling of the situation - 60 Americans being held hostage in the U.S. embassy in Tehran, Iran - a step further by starting a petition drive to

protest the "show of nothing but pure weakness" by the Carter administra-

"We've got to make our voices heard," he said. "It's time this government knows the people are tired of these kinds of things happening."

Roth, who contended "diplomacy doesn't work with people who are at best ignorant," said the U.S. should break off all diplomatic ties with Iran and deport all Iranian citizens in the

"I feel too many other countries have us over a barrel, and it's making a mockery of the United States world-wide," Roth said.

"One of the things that made this country grow and be solid was the ability to take care of our own. Right now people all over the world are laughing at us," he added.

Roth's anger - and his solution was echoed by Bruce Hubbard, 3115 W. Michigan Ave. "We need to set an example that we

can't be pushed around any further,"

Hubbard said. 'We must do anything possible to get those people out, but after that there's got to be something done," he contended.

Giving in to the demands that the deposed Shah of Iran — in a U.S. hospital for cancer treatments - be returned to the country in exchange for the hostages cannot be done, he contended, even "if we have to make the sacrifice of those people.

Once the situation is cooled, however, he said, "that's the time to confiscate the fortune they have invested over here and send their people

"Then tell them we don't need their

While he said he feels the president "is doing everything he can" in the situation, "I feel they should have done something to protect the embassy or get those people out when they saw this coming," Hubbard noted.

"It's time the United States stood up and said, 'Look, we're taking care of ourselves for a change.

'We've been trying to take care of too many people too long," Hubbard said. "I feel like we need to keep our money at home and quit sending these people arms. One day they're just going to be fighting us with them."

Bobby R. Rogers, 3704 W. Louisiana Ave., noted he felt the U.S. should cut off all foreign aid to Iran and any countries supporting the Iranian cause. He added that using "military force" to rescue the 60 American hostages in the country could still be

Three to make ready: Much work involved in plot preparation

There's not much prairie left to surround the intersection of North

Midkiff Road and FM 868. Girders for Midland Park Mall rise out of the dust on the southwest corner of the intersection. Mall roads are beginning to form, outlined by concrete curbs and gutters, and a billboard proclaims "over 80 stores" available for rent.

Across Midkiff Road, south of FM 868, huge diesel machines roar as they prepare the recently-bared earth of the Magnatex development to receive cement and steel.

North of the Magnatex site, across FM 868, another billboard promises "a 40-acre commercial development" where grass and brush now bend to

A group of shops and businesses line FM 868 and Midkiff Road on the northwest corner of the intersection, leftovers from the days when they were the major development in the area. Some date back to the days before the land was annexed to Midland.

Even the roads reflect the growth of Midland and the area. Midkiff Road is now blocked between Wadley Avenue to the south and FM 868 to the north while improvements are made to handle an

anticipated increase in traffic. FM 868 comprises the north leg of the future North Loop - planned years in advance to handle a growing Midland. It will one day be the site of more construction if future plans hold true.

But before any wall is raised or street paved, the prairie must yield to the engineer's pencil and the tractor's blade. High places must be lowered and low places must be raised according

to detailed specifications.

Bob Price, vice president of Price Construction of Big Spring, the company contracted to do the landscape work for the Magnatex development, explained the process of preparing prairie land for development. A project the size of the Magnatex development might take from four to

six months of site preparation before any building construction can be started, said Price. First, an engineer or architect lays out the grades and elevations and establishes drainage, explained Price. He sets out the stakes that tell

the contractor where earth needs to be moved.

"Clearing and grubbing" is the first stage after the stakes have been set, said Price. Mesquite, brush, rock — the open field — is cleared by 15 or more pieces of machinery and about 18 people (in the case of the Magnatex development), said Price.

Value of the equipment alone used in such an undertaking runs into the millions of dollars, Price said.

"Excavation" is the next step in preparing the land. It is a process of "taking a site to a specific elevation," Price explained,

front-end loaders, scrapers and other "earth-movers."

"... moving dirt from where it (the site) is high to where it is low." The ground is moved to conform to man's specifications. Areas -designated as roads or sites for buildings - are molded by road graders,

"Building the pad" is the next and final step before actual construction

Compacting the dirt to a uniform density provides a solid base for a road or building, said Price.

The ground is first made as uniformly wet as possible, he explained. It is then rolled with a compactor or vibrator roller, Price said.

Keeping the soil wet - during the excavation stage to slow dust and to aid compacting while building the pad - presents something of a prob-

Panel recommends approval of SALT pact

WASHINGTON (AP) - A sharply divided Senate Foreign Relations Committee recommended approval Friday of a treaty with the Soviet Union limiting strategic weapons and sent the pact to an uncertain fate on

the Senate floor The Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty, the product of seven years of negotiations under three administrations, was brought to a committee vote after four months of intense examination and debate. Approval was

on a 9-6 vote. In final argument, Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, the committee's chairman, said defeating SALT II would "move us closer to the edge of the nuclear abyss."

He said Senate Democratic Leader

Robert C. Byrd plans to bring the

treaty to the Senate floor "when prospects for ratification are bright.

Senate Republican Leader Howard H. Baker, a GOP presidential contender, voted against the treaty and said later the margin by which it was passed indicates the Senate "probably will insist on amendments" and in their absence "will defeat it."

In a statement issued by the White House, President Carter said he was "deeply gratified" by the vote.

The statement said Carter hopes "that all senators will explore the SALT II treaty and related issues with the same intensity as the members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. We believe after such study senators will reach the conclusion that SALT II is in the best interests of the United States and will vote

to ratify the treaty."

To win ratification, the treaty needs 67 votes on the Senate floor, twothirds of the 100 senators.

With the climactic vote past, the committee must now produce a final report to accompany the treaty, complete with minority and individual views. That process likely means SALT II will not reach the Senate calendar until after Thanksgiving.

Two Democratic senators who took differing positions on the treaty -John Glenn of Ohio and Edward Zorinsky of Nebraska - did so for reasons that may lead them to switch sides when SALT II is brought to a

final Senate vote. Glenn, who voted against the pact, said he has no problems with the treaty's terms but cannot vote for it

until he is convinced the United States can make sure the Soviets don't


Glenn said he hopes understandings that he successfully offered in committee will "hold the administration's feet to the fire" and compel it to make certain the Soviets don't exploit trea-

"I think the Foreign Relations Committee has made the treaty better, and I can vote for it if and when we get the technical capability to monitor Sovet compliance," Glenn

Zorinsky voted for the treaty in committee even though he said it is not fair or equal and should be radi-

cally changed. The committee's SALT II hearings opened last July 9.

National Guard called to monitor funeral march

North Carolina's adjutant general began activating a National Guard battalion Friday for duty during for a scheduled weekend funeral march for five persons killed in an anti-Ku Klux

Maj. Gen. William Ingram, the state adjutant general and Guard commander, said about 500 members of the 2nd Battalion of the 120th Infantry were being called for duty here Sunday

The unit's headquarters is in Hickory, and most of the 14 men charged in connection with the deaths are from that area. Ingram said the troops will be commanded by Col. Ken Neibold, who is the superintendent of Greensboro's public-school system.

Ingram said the troops, who will join a 175-member police force and about 250 state highway patrolmen, will not be armed but ammunition will be carried by team leaders and could be handed out if needed.

"We will stay as long as needed by Greensboro. We hope it is a peaceful march with no difficulties. We will be there for support," Ingram said.

Midland man in two mishaps

A Midland man was in county jail Friday night after being involved in two accidents in a 15-minute period. The first accident was reported

about 7: 30 p.m. on U.S. Interstate 20, according to DPS reports. The man reportedly left the scene of

that incident, and was involved in a collision with a parked car on I-20 about 15 minutes later.

No one was seriously injured in either accident. The man was treated and released at the Midland Memorial Hospital emergency room before being taken to the jail, said hospital personnel.

Greensboro police said they still do not know the 2.5-mile route planned by the march organizers from downtown Greensboro to the Maplewood Cemetery, where four of the victims are to be buried.

Nelson Johnson, a member of the sponsoring Communist Workers Party, also has refused to disclose the route to reporters.

City Manager Tom Osborne said. however, that his office will insist that the march follow a route drawn up by city officials.

"The route will be the easiest for us to provide protection for both the marchers and the citizens." Osborne said. "We will have all other routes blocked off, cordoned. We are trying to make it impossible for any outsid-

ers to break into the procession." Police Chief W.E. Swing has said he expects 2,000 to 2,250 persons to take part in the march. Several left-wing groups and civil rights organizations around the nation have said they will send members to Greensboro to join

the march. Police Capt. James Hilliard reiterated that all efforts will be made to block armed individuals from being

in the area of the march. "People that appear for the funeral

will be arrested if they have guns," he

George Dick, a Greensboro funeral director, said his mortuary will deliver three of the victims' bodies to the march starting point early Sunday afternoon. He said the funeral home would provide mechanical devices that will allow the marchers to roll

the caskets with them. Cecil Moses, assistant special agent in charge of the FBI in North Carolina, said that his office has more than 30 agents working in Greensboro and would be present in a supporting role Sunday to be sure no federal laws are

Miller favors cut in petroleum use

WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary G. William Miller said Friday that Americans could rapidly offset an oil cutoff by Iran if they reduced their use of gasoline and petroleum products.

"If we had a shortfall by not pur-chasing the equivalent of 700,000 barrels of Iranian oil, if it came to that, I believe the American public would react very quickly to cut their own usage by that amount and, therefore, offset that action," Miller said.

He continued: "I believe that would be a very powerful thing to do. It would be a good message to send."

The Treasury secretary added that he thought Americans could, for example, use 15 percent less gasoline without changing their standard of living, by just adjusting the way they

Miller made the comments during one of the first interviews he has granted since taking over the nation's top economic post in July.

It came as U.S. officials continued their efforts to free 60 American hostages held in the U.S. Embassy in Tehran by Iranian students who want deposed Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlevi returned to his homeland.

NRC assesses 'harsh' fine for facility

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Nuclear Regulatory Commission on Friday imposed a \$450,000 fine against the owner of the Palisades atomic plant in Michigan. The penalty was the harshest ever assessed by the NRC, larger even than the fine on operators of Three Mile Island.

The fine was levied after NRC charged that Consumers Power Co. ran its Palisades plant for an estimated 18 months with two reactor safety valves locked in an open position.

"This is a very serious safety violation and indicates a breakdown in the plant system," Victor Stello, director of the NRC's inspection and enforcement office, told reporters. "If there had been a loss of coolant accident, the containment building could have been open to the atmosphere through these open valves.

Consumers Power has 20 days to challenge the fine, which is nearly triple the \$155,000 penalty the NRC recently levied against Metropolitan Edison Co., operator of the Three Mile Island plant in Pennsylvania. Three Mile Island was the site of the

nation's worst commercial nuclear accident last March. The incident drew allegations that the NRC had failed to adequately enforce its own rules.

The Palisades plant, located near South Haven, Mich., has been a chronic headache for Consumers Power for years, being shutdown many times due to equipment fail-

said she thought Carter "hasn't done very well" in dealing with the situation, and added, "we probably ought to ship those (Iranians) over here back.

Douglas F. Lowe, Cottonflat Road, however, felt the U.S. negotiators were doing "about all that can be done right now," and said he favored the course being taken by the Carter administration.

Mrs. Lowe expressed the sentiments of many when she added she "just hope(s) for the safety of those over there, but I don't know the answer" to getting them out.

And it followed by less than 24 hours reports from the National Iranian Oil Co. and its clients that Iran is continuing to export oil but will cut back shipments by 5 percent in the fourth quarter this year.

There had been worry that Iran might eliminate its 700,000 barrelsper-day sales to the United States in an effort to secure return of the deposed shah, who is being treated for gallstones and cancer in New York

Miller said the Carter administration was not considering trade sanctions or the withdrawal of visas from Iranians currently in the United States as ways of retaliating against an Iranian oil cutoff. "We have no reason to be looking at such responses," he said.

Meanwhile, however, President Carter's chief inflation fighter, Alfred Kahn, told a House subcommittee hearing that the administration was looking into the possibility of asking Congress to impose an additional tax on gasoline to spur conservation. The new tax would be in the range of 25 cents to 50 cents per gallon, Kahn

Asked about the current record-

high interest rates, Miller said he did not expect expect "a precipitous, downward movement in interest rates in the near future." Some analysts believe interst rates may go still higher in the wake of the Oct. 6 action by the Federal Reserve to tighten

Major banks have raised their prime rate, the interest charged their most creditworthy business customers, to 15.5 percent in recent days.

Rep. Henry Reuss, D.-Wis., chairman of the House Banking Committee, called on the banks Friday to "cease their danse macabre of everrising interest rates" or risk worsening a recession in coming months.

Miller also made these points in his wide-ranging interview with reporters from The Associated Press and other news services:

-Inflation should drop below 10 percent by spring, which is considerably more optimistic than predictions from inflation fighter Kahn. "I would have expected by early next year" that inflation will drop under doubledigit levels," Miller said. He added, however, that "we all have to hedge" on predictions because economists cannot anticipate shocks such as fur-

ther rapid oil price increases or an Iranian oil cutoff.

Mrs. Carter pledges mobilization of Americans for refugee relief

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) - Rosalynn Carter on Friday toured camps housing thousands of starving, disease-riden Cambodians and homeless refugees from Laos and flew to a rural palace to meet Thailand's royal family.

The wife of President Carter pledged to mobilize America's resources to aid the refugees, and presented Queen Sirikit, head of the Thai Red Cross, with a check for \$100,000 from funds already raised.

Seven congresswomen led by Rep. Elizabeth Holtzman, D-N.Y., arrived in Bangkok Friday, also hoping to increase the flow of aid to the refugees and to Cambodia. Diplomatic sources said the group received permission to fly to the Cambodian capital of Phnom Penh, probably on Mon-

At Sa Kaew, a crude, temporary shelter for some 31,000 Cambodians who have fled into Thailando from their war-ravaged homeland, Mrs. Carter saw children weak from malnutrition and adults stricken by malaria, tuberculosis and other dis-

She said the impact on her was "devastating" and added: "It has just been very difficult for me as a wife and a mother and a human being.

Sa Kaew, 100 miles east of Bangkok and 30 miles from the Thai-Cambodian border, was opened 18 days

According to official statistics, 400 persons have died there already, including 15 the day before Mrs. Carter's visit. One, a 24-year-old woman, died shortly after Mrs. Carter knelt at her side.

Mrs. Carter and her party of 40 first toured Sa Kaew, then flew to a camp housing refugees from Laos, and finally to the northeastern area of Sakhon Nakhon to meet King Bhumipol Adulyadej and Queen Sirikit.

She met for 90 minutes with the royal couple and their two daughters at the mountain palace of Phnpan, 300 miles northeast of Bangkok. They reportedly discussed the refugee prob-

Mrs. Carter is to meet Saturday with Prime Minister Kriangsak Chomanan and international aid officials before returning to the United States. She arrived here Thursday.

At Sa Kaew, where conditions have been greatly improved recently by the work of international aid agencies, the government and volunteers, Mrs. Carter toured the hospitzl, kitchen and orphanage.

"It's like nothing I've ever seen it's emotionally overwhelming," she. said of the still-miserable conditions.

In the hospital, she went from bed to bed, stroking foreheads, holding hands of the patients and asking doctors to explain the diseases. The United Nations estimates as

many as 3 million people face starvation in Cambodia, where fighting continues between Vietnamese forces and those still loyal to ousted Premier Pol Pot. Thai officials say several hundred thousand Cambodians are strung out on both sides of the Thai-Cambodian border in desparate need

The Iranians in Washington had planned their demonstration since Monday, but the route was switched at the last minute because of concern over possible trouble. The new route kept the 900 marchers at least a block from the White House, but the lunchhour timing ensured large crowds.

Iranians seized the U.S. embassy in

Tehran on Sunday. They are holding

Three counter-demonstrators were arrested - two for breaking through police lines and one for hurling an egg, one of at least half a dozen thrown at the marchers.

About 30 Iranians who marched through Springfield, Mass., were ickly outnumbered by a crowd of Americans that grew to 1,000. Two Americans rushed the Iranians and were taken into custody by police. The police finally escorted the Ira-

nians to safety - into a store, out a back door and into a bus, which drove off as the crowd threw rocks, bottles and eggs. "We want hostages," some of the Americans yelled. "America -Love it or leave it.'

In Beverly Hills, Calif., scene of riots by Iranians last January at the home of the shah's sister, Iranians defied a police ban against their demonstrations. The Iranians were outnumbered by counter-demonstrators

who shouted, cursed and spit. Police used nightsticks to break up the battling factions at one intersection and sheriff's deputies later arrested about 140 people - most of them Iranian. One of the Iranians had a bloody forehead, apparently the result of a struggle with police who handcuffed him.

A crowd estimated by campus police at 1,500 marched at Iowa State University to protest the Iranian seizure of Americans. "Free our brothers," they chanted.

About 35 members of the Moslem Student Association who paraded at the University of Minnesota, denouncing the shah, were trailed by about 200 Americans who chanted "Go home" and pelted the protesters with snowballs.

Office workers and men in hard hats carrying lunch boxes demonstrated outside the building housing the Iranian consulate in Houston, carrying signs reading: "Free Americans in Tehran," "Release American Hostages" and "Go to hell and take your oil." It was the second straight day of protests in the Texas city.

Other anti-Iranian marches were held, meanwhile, at the University of Central Florida in Orlando, at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia, at the University of Colorado at Boulder, at Bangor Community College in Bangor, Maine, and at Westchester Community College in Valahalla, N.Y.

More than 1,000 students, chanting "Deport...deport...deport," massed at the University of Washington in Seattle; there were a few shoving matches, but no serious problems.

Young says shah's fortune may be key to release efforts


MIAMI (AP) - The billion-dollar fortune of the deposed Shah of Iran could be a bargaining tool in the release of 60 American hostages in Tehran, former United Nations Ambassador Andrew Young said.

Iranian students might release the hostages in return for a fortune they think the shah took when he fled the coutry, Young said in an interview published Friday in the Miami News.

"Estimates are that he made off with \$5 billion or \$6 billion at the time of his escape," he told the newspaper. "I think the issue is not going to be the shah's life but his holdings. I think they're going to want a commitment from us to begin negotiations with the shah about that."

Midland High's beleaguered Bulldogs must think that the Memorial Stadium scoreboard is locked into place. For the second week in a row, the lights flashed the signal of the times, 35-0.

Odessa High ripped the Bulldogs, 35-0, last week and this week it was Abilene Cooper's turn to turn on the lights in likewise fashion. That makes it 70-0 for the opposition in two weeks and it isn't very much fun. About the only positive thing you can say, is that it has become increasingly easy to get out of the parking lot after the game.

The awesome Cougars nailed down at least a share of the District 5-4A title with the victory and a playoff berth by virtue of their 14-3 win over Odessa Permian earlier this year. But there is one thing that is not to be decided. Cooper is the class of the league, and there is not much argument over that

On this particular night, Cooper's quarterback tandem of John Slaughter and Lanny Dycus went a little pass crazy. They combined for 212 yards in the airways and threw it up and down the field so often that the Bulldogs had their tongues hanging out. And when they got close to the goal line, they just gave it to 225-pound fullback Terry Orr, who scored on short bursts for three touchdowns. And every once in a while, they slipped in running back Keith Pantalion for 65 yards. Orr managed 62.





Hazard relief golf rules to change

BY REX WORRELL Hogan Park Golf Pro

Effective Jan. 1, 1980, the Rules of Golf will provide that a player obtaining relief from an obstruction, ground under repair, casual water, a burrowing animal hole or a wrong putting green must drop his ball within one club length of the nearest point, not nearer the hole, providing relief from the condition. Currently, a player is allowed to drop within two club lengths of the nearest point.

This change in the rules was among many recommended by Negotiating Committees representing the United States Golf Association and the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, following the quadrennial USGA-R&A rules conference in North Berwick, Scotland.

The change in rules providing relief from obstructions, ground under repair, etc, came about because it is the concensus that two club-lengths afford too much relief from conditions such as these from which a player gets relief without penalty. Two club lengths relief will continue to be given players obtaining relief under certain options of the unplayable lie and lateral water hazard rules. Under these rules, the player incurs a penalty of one stroke in obtaining relief.

This and other changes in the Rules of Golf will be published in the 1980 edition that will soon be available at area golf shops..

WEST TEXAS OUTDOORS Northern cold helps duck hunters

By JON CHASE

The High Plains Mallard Management unit has been open for duck hunting since October 30. For West Texans, the duck season will be open from now until January 20

The High Plains Mallard Management unit is that area of the state lying west of a line beginning in Del Rio, thence northward following U. S. Hwy. 277 through San Angelo to Abilene, thence along State Hwy. 351 from Abilene to Albany and U. S. Hwy. 283 from Albany to Vernon, thence easterly along U. S. Hwy. 183 to the Oklahoma state line.

For the rest of the state, the duck season runs from November 10 through November 25 and from December 8 through January 20. The Sandhill Crane season for west Texans runs from now until January

West Texans have 21 days more than the rest of the state to do some duck hunting this season.

The cold weather up north has moved a lot of ducks into our area. Reports from last weekend's hunters indicate that most were finding ducks. Pintails and teal were the most abundant species in the area. A few more days of cold weather should move the mallards and widgeon into West Texas.

For those of you who are not already aware, this is again a point system season, with 100 points being the limit, or in excess of 100 points if that 100 points is exceeded by the killing of the last duck.

In other words, you are legal if you have nine 10-point ducks in your possession and kill a 100 point duck on your last shot and then quit shooting. Don't, however, get caught sitting in a duck blind with a shotgun if you have a 100 point duck and one 10-point duck in your hunting bag. Remember that your 100 points can only be exceeded by the killing of your last duck.

The points this year are as follows: 100 point ducks: Canvasbacks. 70 point ducks: Hooded Mergansers, Mottled ducks, Mallard hens, Redheads, Wood ducks and Mexican-like ducks. 10 point ducks: Mergansers (other than hooded) pintails, scaups, shovelers, teal and widgeon. 20 point ducks: all ducks not already mentioned except black-bellied whistling

ous species or sexes. With the exception of mallards and canvasbacks, the 10 point ducks include some of the best eating birds. If I had my choice, I would limit on pintails, gadwalls, teal and mallards. As far as I am concerned, these are the best eating ducks.

As I have said before, all indications are that this will be one of the best duck seasons that we have had in a long time. The mallard and pintail crop is supposed to be exceptionally good and these are two of the most popular ducks

On the fishing front, the fall action has continued to be hot with the larger bass hitting the shallows.



Tide, Trojans risk grid reps

Alabama and Southern California put 17-game streaks on the line in crucial road contests Saturday ... with one slight

Top-ranked Alabama takes the nation's longest winning streak of 17 games into a crucial Southeastern Conference clash under the lights at Louisiana State. Meanwhile, fourth-ranked Southern Cal visits No.15 Washington, with the winner moving into the driver's

seat to represent the Pacific-10 Conference in the Rose Bowl. Southern Cal hasn't been beaten in 17 games, either, but the Trojans made the mistake of getting tied by Stanford last month and that's why they're no longer No.1 in the Associated Press rankings.

ONE OF the major weekends of the college football season is on tap, with four other games pairing members of The AP Top Twenty and bowl scouts looking at all of them. Eighth-ranked Texas visits No.5 Houston for a key Southwest Conference night game while No.17 Baylor travels to No.9 Arkansas for another SWC contest in which the winner will remain alive for the Cotton Bowl.

Meanwhile, No.14 Purdue entertains No.10 Michigan, which hopes to remain tied with Ohio State - the third-ranked Buckeyes host Iowa - atop the Big Ten. Purdue is one game back. Finally, a battle of major Southern independents finds No.19 South Carolina at seventh-ranked Florida State for a night game.

Elsewhere, runner-up Nebraska visits Kansas State, sixth-ranked Oklahoma entertains Kansas, No.11 Brigham Young is at Long Beach State for a night game, No.12 Pitt is at West Virginia, No.13 Notre Dame at Tennessee, Mississippi State at No.16 Auburn, No.18

Clemson at North Carolina and Duke at No.20 Wake Forest. A victory by Alabama over LSU - and the Crimson Tide has taken eight in a row from the Tigers — would make Bear Bryant the first coach in NCAA history to win 100 games in a decade. The Bear stands 99-16-1 during the 1970s.

LSU's Tiger Stad'um will be jumping Saturday night with

more than 76,000 wildcats, plus the school's Bengal Tiger. Alabama, however, has won its last four games there and the Bear & Co. don't figure to be psyched out. In fact, he's more worried about the injury

"About three weeks ago, we were on the verge of being a great team," Bryant says, "but injuries have really created problems. We aren't playing together. We've still got some hurt, but we went back to fundamentals this week in practice to try to get back where

we were earlier." The Bear also is 34-5 against folks who either played or coached under him and LSU's Charlie McClendon is one of them. In fact, Cholly Mac is the last pupil to beat the old master, but that was nine years ago and Bryant has won 24

in a row since then. "Coach Bryant talks about all his boys and assistant coaches who have gone on to head jobs," says Mac, who played for the Bear at Kentucky, "but he owns another record — how many has he put in the unemployment line?"

And Mac is one of them. Although the winningest coach in LSU history, he is only 2-13 against Alabama, and that's one big reason why his 18th season in Tigertown also is his last. "Probably so," he

SOUTHERN CAL also has a rugged road test at Washington -'our ultimate test," Coach John Robinson calls it — and the Trojans are expecting inclement weather as well as a hostile crowd in

'We've had to be a good road team all year," Robinson notes. "The fact we've already had to go on the road five times and won all five should help us. It sure won't be a

strange experience for us." If the Trojans win, they'll clinch their 10th Rose Bowl berth in 14 years. If Washington wins, the Huskies probably will have to either beat of tie Washington State in their regular-season finale.

"We have to go into Seattle anticipating wet weather and do the best we can under the circumstances," Robinson says. "Running on wet Astro-Turf takes some adjustment and you also have to learn to handle a wet football."

Michigan-Purdue is another case of teacher vs. pupil. Purdue's Jim Young, a former assistant under Bo Schembechler at both Michigan and Miami of Ohio, has never beaten his former boss (he's

"Everybody said our season would go down to the final two games," says Schembechler, "and now we have to prove to ourselves and everyone else that we indeed are the best team in the Big Ten. To fo that, we have to win both games - against Purdue, then Ohio State. Purdue would like a share of the title and maybe a trip to a major bowl and they're capable of doing just that."

The Big Ten champ, of course, will be the visiting club in the Rose Bowl. The Orange Bowl gets the Big Eight king and Nebraska and Oklahoma currently share first place, as they usually do at this time of the year ... and sometimes at the end of the season, too. They meet Nov. 24.

Efforts to control fire, oil spill meet 'disaster'

Things went from bad to worse Friday in the battle to put out a raging fire aboard the tanker, Burmah Agate, and control oil spilling from the ship as deteriorating weather forced a halt to both efforts. "We've got big trouble," said Coast

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) -

Guard spokesman Ray Baker. Despite Coast Guard efforts to

guard the entrance to Galveston Bay, a slick of heavy oil sheen five miles long and a quarter-mile wide slipped inside the environmentally sensitive area, Baker said. It was reported running north to

south just below Smith Point, which is on the extreme east side of the bay about 20 miles from where the tanker and the freighter, Mimosa, collided 10 "A Navy skimmer was dispatched

attempt to pick up the oil before it hits land," Baker said. "But the present weather conditions make it very difficult.

He said winds blowing out of the southwest were gusting to about 20 miles per hour, and seas were six to eight feet.

'Firefighting efforts were suspended this afternoon as sea conditions

continued to worsen, and we don't know when they will be able to resume," Baker said. He said another slick of heavy oil

61/2 miles long and 15-20 feet wide had moved ashore just south of Cedar Bayou, about 150 miles down the coast, and a giant patch 61/2 miles long and 81/2 miles wide floated just off San Jose Island.

Baker said officials of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, which is monitoring the oil spill, said it this large slick probably was the mass of oil released by the tanker just after the collision. "Contractors have attempted to

reach the area, but they say it is very isolated and very difficult to reach, Baker said. "They are trying to formulate a plan on how to get equipment in there and how to get the oil that is cleaned up out to disposal More oil was reporting floating up

on Galveston's east and west beaches, where crews have labored since Monday to clean up the gooey mess with shovels and rakes.

Baker said oil now pouring out of the tanker, which carried 390,000 barrels, is moving to the northwest, directly out to sea. Officials have estimated that approximately 20,000 barrels have flowed into the water.

The Coast Guard spokesman said a shrimper picked up part of a body Friday afternoon. Fifteen bodies already had been recovered and another 17 remained missing and presumed dead.

"We don't know if the remains recovered today is part of a body already recovered or part of one still missing," Baker said. "It was turned over to the Galveston County coro-Meanwhile, the owners of the Bur-

mah Agate filed suit in federal court asking \$10 million damages and alleging the Mimosa's negligence caused the collision by "failing to keep a proper lookout and failing to take proper action with its engines.' Filing the suit in Houston were All-

Ship aground near Alaska

SEATTLE (AP) - A Japanese factory-fishing ship, the Ryuyo Maru No.2, ran aground Friday in the Pribilof Islands of Alaska, spewing thousands of gallons of diesel oil, the Environmental Protection Agency

The Coast Guard rescued the ship's 81 crew members, said Don Bliss, an EPA spokesman. He said no injuries were reported. About 40,000 gallons of fuel oil

spilled into the sea and "it looks like 185,000 more gallons are yet to go,' The ship ran aground near Tolstoi

Point on St. Paul Island, he said, rupturing the vessel's fuel tanks. "We don't know what the environmental damage would be," Bliss

One legal barrier to sale of drilling rights removed

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court removed one legal barrier Friday to the sale of offshore oil drilling rights in the Georges Bank fishing grounds off New England. The court, in a one-paragraph order

to which there were no recorded dissents, set aside action taken by Justice William J. Brennan Jr. that had postponed the opening of bids Tues-

Because of federal procedure, new bids will have to be submitted. An Interior Department spokesman said Friday the new bids will not be opened before late December.

It is conceivable that environmentalists and states opposed to the offshore drilling could again seek emergency Supreme Court help to forestall the bid openings. But in light of Friday's action, such help is'unlikely.

In addition, a formal challenge to the government's proposed sales still is before the 1st U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Boston. The appeals court, however, refused to postpone the bid openings while it considers the appeal a postponement Brennan granted.

The state of Massachusetts and a coalition of environmentalists and fishermen called the Conservation Law Foundation have been successful thus far in frustrating oil company efforts to buy the drilling leases.

Oil company representatives and Interior Department officials who had gathered for the scheduled opening of bids Tuesday endured a futile wait in Providence, R.I., while the hurry-up legal fight bounced from the Boston appeals court to Brennan and Chief Justice Warren E. Burger.

Burger refused to interfere after Brennan had referred the matter to the full court for its the closed conference conducted each Friday.

Even if new bids are opened by January, it is possible the 1st Circuit court will rule on the formal appeal before drilling ever begins.

The federal government would have 45 days to decide whether to accept a bid, and then successful bidders would have to spend 61/2 to 8 months to acquire permits and conduct surveys of underwater tracts before starting to drill.

Kahn debates higher gasoline tax

WASHINGTON (AP) - Slapping a 25- or 50-cent per gallon tax on gasoline might force U.S. conservation and fight the effects of huge foreign crude oil price increases, President Carter's inflation adviser said Fri-

"I'm insisting we look at it" within the administration, Alfred Kahn told a House Interstate and Foreign Commerce subcommittee. But he added that he is not yet recommending such a proposal.

It would be very useful if the United States "could tell Iran to keep its oil," he said. "We're never going to do it unless we do something dramatic like

The "notion of a high gasoline tax" as a conservation measure was mentioned by Carter as long ago as April 1977, Kahn said. He himself has mentioned the possibility a number of times in the past year.

Earlier in Friday's hearing on oil prices, Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich... told Kahn that oil companies have used the tight heating-oil market over the past nine months to gouge consumers. And another congressman added, "The energy industry is mock? ing your inflation program.

Kahn replied that his Council on Wage and Price Stability is checking new oil profit-margin figures but that soaring gasoline and heating-oil prices are largely due to foreign ac-tions. He said America should fight back through conservation.

He said a return to full federal price controls on oil, now being phased out by the administration, would be the wrong approach in an increasingly

energy-poor world, comparing such an effort to "pushing water uphill."

Rep. Albert Gore Jr., D-Tenn., made the comment about mocking and also suggested Kahn's agency was powerless, its leader merely "in charge of blushing" for an administration unwilling or unable to fight inflated energy prices.

Dingell said the council's voluntary price guidelines "appear to be totally ineffective in restraining price increases in the oil industry." He cited recent big increases in oil company profits and said "there appears to be price gouging."

Dingell furnished no specifics, and

Kahn said it would be several weeks before his agency completes analysis of new cost and price information it required from 27 oil companies late last month.

Of the first checks given the first 10, he said, "we found three that raised questions in our minds, that seemed out of compliance" with the guidelines. But those checks were not conclusive, he said, and talks with the companies continue. He did not name them.

The federal price guidelines -

which Kahn emphasized are voluntary - call for simple limits on increases. But they are based on complex comparisons among companies' costs, prices and profits. And the companies supply the figures.

Dingell said the big companies "have no trouble finessing" such guidelines, sometimes by disguising figures in other parts of corporations that own hotels, stores and other investments besides oil firms.

Kahn said he feels his agency has had some effect in encouraging companies to keep prices from going even higher. But he acknowledged that his 230-worker agency, charged with monitoring wages and prices for all of American industry, cannot not keep very close tabs on energy.

Congress OKs fuel research bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress voted final approval Friday for a bill to spend \$19 billion for development of a domestic synthetic fuels industry and \$1.35 billion in emergency assistance to help poor people heat their bomes this winter.

The measure also provides \$1 billion for solar energy and conservation programs and about \$10 billion for the current fiscal year for Interior Department operations.

The Senate sent the measure to the White House on a voice vote a few hours after the House voted 271-46 to adopt the \$30.3 billion compromise appropriations bill. The legislation provides funding for

a major portion of Carter's energy program, and was the second major victory the administration has had on energy legislation in as many days.

The Senate voted its approval of a

\$34 billion energy measure Thursday night authorizing the synthetic fuels effort, as well as programs to produce gasohol and increase conservation ef-

Under the compromise money bill. special \$19 billion Energy Security Reserve would be established in the Treasury, with the money set aside for the major synthetic fuels program Carter and the Congress favor. Only \$2.2 billion could be spent this year.

A second fund, a \$1 billion Solar and Conservation Reserve, would hold the money for development of solar energy and conservation programs.

The \$1.35 billion for emergency fuel assistance would be in addition to \$250 million both houses already have approved this year.

current recipients of Supplemental Security Income, the government's welfare program for the low-income handicapped, blind and elderly. The maximum any recipient could receive would be \$250.

Any state not wanting to operate such a program could have its share of the money mailed directly to recipients of the government's largest welfare program, Aid to Families with Dependent Children.

Employees of American churches are unionizing

American churches face a spreading movement of their employees to organize for collective bargaining, and a leading church labor expert says the churches must uphold the process to maintain their credibili-

Churches long have preached the right of union organization, he says, and it's now essential for them to affirm that principle in their own practices.

Any attempts to circumvent it would undermine church efforts in behalf of justice "at all levels of society," adds Msgr. George G. Higgins of Washington, D.C., long-time Roman Catholic specialist in labor re-

Quoting a 1971 declaration of Catholicism's international Synod of Bishops, he says that for the church effectively to defend justice it first must be applied "within the church herself."

Yet for many reasons, including the personal commitment of most church employees to serving Christianity, often at comparatively low pay, they've remained largely without group representation or contractual stipulations on terms of work.

THIS STILL IS GEN-ERALLY the case, making religious institutions one of the last major bastions of non-unionized workers.

Yet the major religious bodies, Protestant, Eastern Orthodox, Roman Catholic and Jewish, historically have strongly supported rights of workers to band together to seek better working con-

That impulse has emerged lately in the churches' own domains, particularly among employes at church schools, hospitals and universities, and including clerical workers of the Protestant and Eastern Or thodox cooperative body, the National Council of

Msgr. Higgins, secretary for special concerns of the U.S. Catholic Conference, issued a Labor Day statement to clarify the church's stand on the Citing official church

recognize the right of their employees to organize, if they so desire

HE SAID WHEN UNIONISM arose in this country 50 years ago, American industry mistakenly sought to crush it. He added that church institutions, for ethical as well as practical reaons, should "avoid making the same mistake now that their own workers are belatedly beginning to exercise their right to organize.""

He said public confusion over the matter had resulted from a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision holding that the National labor Relations Board has no jurisdiction over church-related

The decision was based on the constitutional separation of state and church and "did not question nor negate the right" of church workers to organize, he said.

He suggested establishment of an independent agency to substitute for the NLRB in oversee-

church-related institu- ing union elections tions must unequivocally among church workers and processing unfair labor practice charges.

> In the wake of the court decision, he said some public commentators implied the church was hypocritical about labor rights and not ready to honor them "in practice as well as theo-

SOME COMMENTA-TORS charged church leaders in general are opposed to unionization of church employes, Higgins noted. He said most such claims are overly generalized without sufficient evidence, but whether fully accurate or not, they reflect a growing sense of uneasiness in Catholicism' about the matter.

He said Catholic teachers are forming unions, sometimes with approval of school administrators and sometimes against their opposition, but in either case, it's up to the teachers involved. He added that "any attempt on the part of ad-

ministrators to second guess their teachers on this matter is doomed to

Modest young cartoonist keeping feet on ground

EL TORO, Calif. - The license plate says it all. "Drabble" adorns Kevin Fagan's brand new Datsun 280ZX, a shiny testament to his new-found

The "Drabble" plates also label Fagan as the creator of the comic strip of the same name.

A cartoonist whose work is read and chuckled over in 150 newspapers throughout the country, Fagan is much like the character he draws, his associates say. He is shy, unassuming, fresh-faced — the boy next door.

The 23-year-old college student is as embarrassed by the plates, which were a gift, as he is proud of his

growing reputation. The strip has brought in more money than the former drug store clerk has ever had - although he

would not say exactly how much - and Fagan will soon purchase his own home. But he indicates his sudden good fortune has caused him to make a conscious effort to keep both of

his feet on the ground. "I've lived at home all these months (since the strip began) because I felt it would help me keep

things in perspective," the short, dark-haired Saddleback College graduate said. He lives in nearby Lake Forest with his mother, Billie, just down the street from two of his brothers.

A third brother lives in Northern California. They have helped him keep that perspective, he

"When I began the strip, they gave me a big party. They bought me the license plates as a surprise for my birthday," Fagan said. "But I'm still the youngest brother, and they still treat me the same.' His modesty has earned Fagan the respect of his superiors at United Features Syndicate.

"He's fantastic," a syndicate official said in a telephone interview from New York. "Most people here find him delightful. He just goes on about his job, enjoying it. He doesn't seem to realize that people can spend their whole lives waiting for some-

thing like this to happen to them." Pat McGinnis, publicity associate for the syndicate, said the immediate popularity of the "Drab-

ble" strip was amazing. "Up to 100 newspapers already subscribed to it before it ran," she said. "That's unusual for any brand new strip. He just took the syndicate world

From Fagan's very first inquiry, United Features was interested in his work. But it took almost a year of haggling before "Drabble" was a reality.

The strip was launched by the syndicate last March 5. In Southern California, it is seen in the Los Angeles Times, the Daily Pilot in Orange County beach cities and the Daily Breeze in Torrance, a Los Angeles suburb. "Drabble" actually had his roots in another Fagan

character, Murray, who was published in a strip of the same name in the Sacramento State Univesity campus paper and in the Sacramento Union.

But when Murray - a "rather scroungy, arrogant looking, long-haired type" - was submitted to the syndicate, they had other ideas. "They wanted another type of charcter," said

Fagan. "They wanted a different face, different After some experimentation, Fagan created Drab-

"I was looking for something different that people would look at," he said. Drabble's appearance falls somewhere between the simplicity of Charles Schultz' Peanuts and the complexity of Garry Trudeau's Doonesbury.

The title character of the strip is also a likeable, quiet, college student. But there the similarity between Drabble and Fagan ends.

"A lot of people tell me, 'You're just like your Fagan said. "I wouldn't say I'm character,' Drabble.

In previous strips, Drabble has tried to plug his electric typewriter into a movie theater outlet and has played tennis with a wristband strapped around his head. Some of Drabble's funniest antics are his repea-

tedly unsuccessful attempts to win women. Fagan, who has a girlfriend, predicted that Drabble "probably won't ever" get Wendy, the girl he constantly pursues in the strip. Drabble makes dumb mistakes on college tests

and is often dominated by other male characters who are stronger, more 'macho' and less sensitive.

Although Drabble is college-oriented, drawn from Fagan's own student experiences at Saddleback College, Sacramento State and Cal State Fullerton, the strip seems to appeal to a broad audience,

The strip's success is even more surprising when one realizes that Fagan hasn't received any professional training.

A history major, three units away from a bachelor's degree, he first started "stripping" with "Murray" four years ago.
"People have told me that it's really hard to break

into syndication," Fagan said. "I didn't know that when I started trying. If I had, then I probably wouldn't have tried."

Budget planners split

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is going to increase the size of the Navy in the near future, but Carter administration planners reportedly are split on just how to go about it.

Administration officials said here that the issue is whether to build two new super-sophisticated destroyers a year or one of the ships a year for the time being. Those arguing for fewer destroyers say the Navy could build three frigates for each costly destroyer. The officials asked not to be named.

The destroyers, known as the DDG-47, were described by one official as "the most complex ships the Navy has ever put in the water.'

But civilian officials say there's no point in building two of the destroyers a year until the first one armed with an advanced Aegis weapon system is tested at sea after 1983. "We ought to be sure it works right" before going into expanded DDG-47 construction, one official said of the system, which is designed to destroy attacking missiles and planes.

'We don't want to see the Aegis system get to sea and then find out that we have to put in major modifications with 11 or 12 ships backed up in various stages of production," he said.

Other officials said Thursday they expect the administration to provide a preview of the fiscal 1981 defense budget and a five-year military spending program to the Senate by Dec. 1.

President Carter has promised a preview to reas-sure critics of the SALT II treaty with the Soviet Union that the administration plans to increase

defense spending in the years ahead. The fiscal 1981 defense budget will call for spending \$140 billion to \$145 billion in fiscal 1981, an increase of 3 percent to 5 percent after allowing for inflation, officials say. Fiscal 1981 begins Oct. 1,





WTCC opposes value added tax

ABILENE - Directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce are on record as strongly opposing proposed legislation that would create a value

Basically, VAT would be a tax on value added to a product at each production step on its way to market. As each manufacturer increases the value of a product, the difference between the buying and selling price would be taxed. The retail price paid by the ultimate consumer would include the total of all value added taxes paid along the manufacturing chain. Some exemptions might be allowed such as food.

Ed Coltharp, WTCC executive vice president, reported that chairmen of Congress' two tax-writing committees, Al Ullman of House Ways and Means and Russell Long of Senate Finance, had indicated support for a 10 percent value added tax, predicting that such a tax may come as early as 1980 or 1981.

Judge dismisses murder charges after second jury acquits Davis

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A tearful Texas jury acquitted multimillionaire Cullen Davis of murder conspiracy charges Friday after a long, bitter and brutal

Within an hour of the verdict, a state judge dismissed murder and attempted murder charges pending against Davis since a 1976 shooting spree at his hilltop mansion. The jury deliberated 15½ hours without taking a vote

and it was uanimous for acquittal on the first ballot.

The verdict came during the third day of deliberations after prosecutors and defense lawyers alike all but conceded that the 11-member panel was hopelessly dead-

"We'll never get a verdict in this case," defense lawyer Mike Gibson said on the eve of the decision.

"I'll eat every word and choke on it," a joyful Gibson declared Friday. "I'll just eat the hell out of those

The jury's ruling triggered an emotional outburst in the tiny courtroom as friends, family and lawyers converged on the stunned but smiling defendant

"I hardly know what to say," he grinned. "I'm gratified and I'm speechless.' His honey-blonde wife, Karen, a major witness in the

15-week-long trial, stood at his side, tears cascad-

ing down her cheeks. Davis, 46, denied from the outset he plotted the summertime 1978 murder of his divorce judge and contended

he was framed by his ex-wife, Priscilla. The jury, which lost a member to a broken leg weeks ago, reported about 11:15 a.m. it had reached a verdict.

The three women on the panel were crying as they took their seats in the jury box for the final time. "This will be a great day for Texas justice," said an assistant district attorney seconds before the verdict.

"Not guilty," Judge Gordon Gray announced to a courtroom jammed with newsman and spectators and a dozen or more representatives of the district attorney's

"I'll be goddamned," the assistant prosecutor said. "I don't know what happened," said chief prosecutor Jack Strickland. "A trial of this length, it would be surprising if any one factor did it "If that's the kind of conduct people want to approve in

this county...I don't know. "That doesn't seem reasonable, but neither does this

The verdict was a smashing triumph for a crack defense team headed by renowned Houston attorney Richard "Racehorse" Haynes and Dallas lawyer Phil Burleson.

"Super!" cried Haynes, who contends he'd rather be horsewhipped than sit out a jury's deliberations. Haynes and Burleson, along with Dallas attorneys Steve Sumner and Gibson, successfully defended David on a

An earlier attempt to try Davis on the murder solicitation charge ended with the jury deadlocked 8-4 for con-

"It's been a long ordeal, and I'm relieved that Cullen and his family are out of the agony and anguish of the past 15 weeks," said Haynes.

He said the defense succeeded here because it more clearly defined the issues before the jury and because the jurors "were intelligent enough to see through the prose-

He added, "One thing about a hometown jury, they know the people and have some feeling for the people

for whom they sit in judgment."

Actually, the state built its case around two tape-recorded conversations last year between Davis and his friend-turned-informant, David McCrory. "The tapes are no better than the witness who made them — Mr. McCrory," said Haynes.

"No reasonable person would ever believe David McCrory," added Burleson.

McCrory went to the FBI last year with a bizarre tale. He said Davis had ordered him to arrange the contract murders of divorce Judge Joe Eidson and 14 others on a purported "hit list."

Authorities corroborated McCrory's story in part with the secretly recorded conversations and bolstered their case with \$25,000 which they said was earmarked for a phantom killer.

Davis was embroiled at the time in a multimillion-dollar divorce battle and contended he was framed by Priscilla to enhance her legal position and ultimate settlement. He maintained she was assisted in the conspiracy by

McCrory and Fort Worth karate instructor Pat Burle-The defendant conceded that he discussed mass mur-

der, but said he was only "playing along" with McCrory to expose an extortion scheme. Davis had words concerning McCrory in the moments

after his acquittal: "McCrory can go stew in his own juices as far as I'm concerned. I've always had faith in the jury system and I'm innocent of all charges.

His statement proved correct as Tarrant County dropped all other pending criminal charges. They con-cerned the death of Stan Farr and the woundings of Priscilla and Gus Gavrel Jr. during the mansion shooting spree. Davis was acquitted in the killing of Andrea Wilborn, Priscilla's 12-year-old daughter who died in the

A lesser charge in this case of possessing a prohibited weapon — a pistol with a silencer — also was dropped. Davis turned his attention to more pleasant things.

"I've got to go make some money so I can pay my attorneys," he smiled. "It looks like we're going to have to start making plans," he said, putting an arm around his wife. "We're going to go skiing. I'm going to have to go back to work -

'Crime' added to list of Carter's problems

CHARLESTON, S.C. (AP) - Sen. Edward M. Kennedy on Friday added crime to the list of national problems on which he accuses President Carter of "abdication of presidential leadership.

In a speech prepared for delivery to a Young Democrats meeting, Kennedy cited rising crime rates and said, "During the past three years, the White House has not issued a single major statement on crime and criminal justice.

On the southern leg of the inaugural swing of his presidential campaign, the Massachusetts Democrat kept up a drumbeat of criticism of the Democratic president on a variety of issues, including inflation, health care, energy and crime. He began his day in Nashville,

Tenn., where he received the endorsement of Mayor Richard Fulton. Kennedy then flew to Miami where

last month his supporters were defeated in non-binding Democratic caucuses by a massive show of White House political muscle.

"What is a caucus, anyway?" Kennedy asked a senior citizens group that filled a small auditorium in Miami Beach. "I don't even know how to spell caucus. But I know how to spell primary."

Kennedy was referring to the March 11 primary that will determine the makeup of Florida's delegation to the 1980 Democratic National Convention next August in New York

Kennedy also criticized Carter before the senior citizens for what he called delay in acting on a comprehensive national health insurance

program. "There are those who believe that a national health plan, however desirable, is inconsistent with today's budgetary politics," he said. "They say they are for a comprehensive pro-

gram - ultimately. "They say the nation needs such a program - later. But for now, they offer the layaway plan - a piecemeal approach which would enact the lowest common denominator now, and defer the tough central issues of

In his crime speech, Kennedy referred to his own proposals as a member of the Senate Judiciary Committee, and now chairman, to rewrite the federal criminal code and reorganize the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration that provides federal grants to local criminal justice sys-"Many of the proposals I mentioned

go back to 1975," the senator said. "Many of them could have been enacted long ago, if only the president had been willing to lead the fight.

"Instead, what we hear is silence, an apparent unwillingness to tackle the difficult, complex subject of crime in a responsible way.

He added that "a constructive, effective policy on law enforcement should have been forthcoming long ago from the White House, and I call on the president to move now to fill the vacuum he has left for so long."

Kennedy was deep in Jimmy Carter country Friday, but drew a large, enthusiastic crowd, mostly elderly people, in Miami Beach. It was one of the few occasions when the candidate moved along barriers set up to restrain the crowd, shaking hands, pressing the flesh in traditional campaign style.

Because of security concerns related to the assassinations of his brothers, John and Robert, Kennedy at most stops spends only a moment or two greeting the crowds and then moves quickly inside buildings.

The candidate's last stop in Nashville was at the Country Music Hall of Fame, a setting where Carter clearly would have felt more at home.

"I can't pretend I know country music," Kennedy told an audience at Vanderbilt University Thursday

But he walked through the building receiving a guided tour and admiring the pictures of such country music greats as Chet Atkins, Roy Clark, Merle Travis, Jimmie Rodgers and Minnie Pearl, as well as Elvis Presley's solid gold Cadillac.

Byrne addresses party committee

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - Chicago Mayor Jane Byrne denounced President Carter as an ineffective leader who can't win re-election in 1980 during a Kennedy campaign speech Friday to a Democratic National Committee rapidly dividing over a Kennedy-Carter clash.

The committee heard campaign speeches on behalf of President Carter and his two intra-party challengers, Sen. Edward Kennedy and California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr., after the 1980 Democratic campaign heated up this week.

"Jimmy Carter can't win in 1980 if we choose him as our party's standard bearer," Mrs. Byrne told the DNC from a podium flanked by large photos of Carter and Vice President Mondale.

'We need a new face to face the 80s with new initiatives. We need a new dynamism. We cannot march into the 80s flying the tired and tattered banners of the 70s. Senator Kennedy can win. "I must withhold my support from Jimmy Carter

with a touch of sadness, a touch of deep regret and with a sense of disenchantment," she said. "Despite the president's most frantic efforts, he has sunk deeper and deeper in the polls. "Instead of cool confidence, leadership and assur-

ance, which the American people desperately need and want, we are presented with the spectacle of a man groping, haltingly, for solutions," she added. Robert Strauss, a special Middle East ambassador

who has been chosen as Carter campaign chairman, countered that it was "debilitating" for Mrs. Byrne and other Kennedy supporters to challenge an incumbent Democratic president's ability to lead the nation.

"The mayor spoke well, but she didn't say one positive thing about her candidate," said Strauss. 'We're not voting for an image.' Strauss said the Carter administration had com-

piled a solid record on which the president could run - and win "This president is the one who found peace be-

tween Egypt and Israel. You tell me Jimmy Carter isn't a leader?" said Strauss. DNC member Irene Tovar of California, speaking on behalf of Brown, did not attack directly Carter,

being "flaky. "It has been said that my candidate is flaky. He has appointed more than 1,000 women to jobs from chief justice to cabinet positions. Is this flaky? If that constitutes flakiness, I support it," she said, adding that Brown had also appointed more than 300

but defended her own candidate against charges of

Hispanics to top jobs. Ms. Tovar also maintained that Brown's record of Pattern Dept. 181 accomplishments on the important issues of inflation and energy was the most solid of the three Democratic candidates.

About 200 of the 363 DNC members attended the two-day meeting that ended Friday. More than half of those in attendance gave Strauss a standing ovation after he defended Carter.

But numerous DNC members sported Kennedy buttons throughout the two-day meeting.

Democratic National Chairman John White, a Carter supporter, said he figured the off-year meeting would be a tranquil, routine one until Kennedy and Brown officially announced their candidacies this week

He then said Democrats were in the "extremely dangerous" position of becoming hopelessly split and losing in 1980 if the Kennedy-Carter contest turns nasty. Two hours after he vowed in a Thursday news

conference to keep the party together, the first signs of Kennedy-Carter discord appeared among the top Democrats White was sharply challenged during an executive

committee meeting by Joe Crangle of New York over the chairman's public endorsements of Carter.

### Secretary Goldschmidt cites administration transport plans

WASHINGTON (AP) ficient improvements." Transportation Secretary Neil Goldschmidt says the Carter administration has placed a high priority on improving rail and highway access to the nation's ports because of a projected 70 percent increase in exports over the next 25

Technology advances have increased the ports' cargo-handling capacity, he said, but the transportation links on land have not kept pace.

Goldschmidt said Thursday he is directing that all regional transportation planning programs consider the movement of goods as well as people, particularly in port communities. He spoke at the Washington Press Club.

"Typically, regional planning looks only at the movement of people," he said. "Our concern for the economy requires that we enlarge our vision to include the movement of goods, so that we can eliminate bottlenecks, assure future capacity and identify opportunities for ef-

He also said the departments of Transportation and Commerce are studing port cities' rail and highway facili-

Goldschmidt cited

Boston; Baltimore; Los Angeles; and Long Beach, Calif., as examples of ports with ground access problems. He said such problems are not widespread among the nation's 170 ports but could in the future lead to serious delays in load-

The secretary also said his department soon will take action aimed at preserving deteriorating federal highways.

'Our interstate system is this country's largest capital investment, worth more than one trillion dollars, and we are allowing it to fall apart," he said. "Right now we have an \$18 billion outstanding maintenance

Early next year, he said, he will bring together state and local transportation officials and highway users to develop 'a national dialogue on the preservation of our highways.'

Goldschmidt also said he hopes to quickly resolve disputes involving 15 proposed freeway segments in urban areas.

'Their cost to construct is in excess of \$10 billion; their cost to leave unresolved is incalculable," he stated. "Our position is clear: Build those which are needed, reduce the scale or scrap those which are not.

"Regulations to be published by Dec. 1 will make clear the alternatives available to those communities which may not wish to build a freeway, but which nevertheless wish to invest in improved transportation,'

hearts, led a trump to the ace and lost a club to East. Back came the jack of spades, and South's game contract got

"Unlucky," everybody thought, and they went on to the next hand without noticing that South should have hauled his game in.

#### SHOULD REFUSE

South should refuse the first trick. He wins the next heart, discarding a club from his hand. Then he can develop the clubs without letting East, the dangerous opponent, gain the lead.

South draws one trump but then takes the ace of clubs, ruffs a club, leads a diamond to the ten and ruffs another club with a top trump. South then leads a diamond to the jack and discards three spades on the three good clubs.

South loses only one heart and one spade. Maybe nobody will notice the fine play at the first trick, but the scorepad will show the difference.

### Publishers respond to textbook critics

By LEE JONES

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) A Houston textbook critic took Will Rogers too seriously in her criticism of a textbook for a typewriting class, a pubisher's representative

Janie Riddle of Houston blasted a beginning typewriting book Thursday because it contained an exercise with the sentence, "Human life and turnips remain cheap and plentiful."

She urged the State Board of Education to reject the book, "Personal Typewriting," pub-lished by South-Western

Publishing Co. The board will adopt texts today for high school classes in typing, health, civics, auto repairs, computer math and civics

Mrs. Riddle said the "human life and turnips" exercise so incensed her husband that he probably would be protesting textbooks next year.

But the publisher's representative defended the sentence.

"It is a quote from Will Rogers. It's meant to be humorous," said Henry Ransom of Cincinnati. Another textbook crit-

ic, Catherine Lemm of Houston, who has four grown children, a 15year-old and an 11-yearold, urged rejection of "Healthful Living for Today," published by Laidlaw.

She said the book delves too deeply into mental health questions for 14-and 15-year-olds. "Adolescence is a time

of life when many young boys and girls are searching for personal identity. It is a period of emotional, mental and physical change and adjustment in many areas.

"Is it wise to spend class time teaching them that feeling worried, frustrated, lonely, guilty or generally upset indicates mental problems? Are they going to associate their problems to mental illness? You can be sure, in their immaturity, many will," she

Laidlaw's representative referred the board to the publisher's written response, which said:

"The book reassures high school students that everyone has problems. Facing and dealing with problems are positive and healthy responses to difficult situations."



### Lynch charges Irish-American minority supporting wholesale Ireland slaughter

WASHINGTON (AP) - Irish Prime Minister Jack Lynch accused some Irish-Americans on Friday of giving political and moral support to the killing in

He said this small, hard-core minority is promoting violence in "an even more sinister fashion" than those who only give money.

"To those few and those whom they support," he went on, "I wish to say: you are the real enemies of Ireland and the Irish people. You are a major obstacle to the achievement of peace and reconciliation; you are putting off the union of the peoples which we seek.

Lynch said the vast majority of people in Ireland reject violence, but that this has not been so clear among people of Irish descent in other countries. But he added that much of the support for violence among the 20 million Irish-Americans has vanished as people became aware of what is happening.

He said the way to unity in Ireland is through a free coming together of both parts of the country under an agreed political settlement.

Doye Fannin, Red Cross field director at Miramar Naval Air Station in San Diego, Calif., met James last year while working in Korea.

She is satisfied he is a U.S. citizen and has begun a campaign to bring him to America.

JIMMY IS an American citizen and is a victim of the complexities of both Korean and American laws, said Fannin. Although he is rejected by the Koreans as a nonperson without any rights in that country, officials of the Korean and American governments refuse to acknowledge his unique position and assist him to enter

he has never seen. Fannin said she has determined without question that James was born in an Army outpost, the son of a U.S. Army lieutenant and a WAC medical corps assistant, on June 13, 1954.

She said the information was obtained from a Korean interpreter, Kim Hyo Tok, attached to an engineering training unit in Won Ju, 140 miles south of Seoul.

SHE HAS affidavits from the interpreter and his wife attesting that James Daniel was born in their home and delivered by Son Ok Ryon, the interpreter's moth-

They say they have the father's identity in full. James Daniel goes by a last name that he has been told was his father's, but it will not be used here because of the delicacy of the situation. The mother was known to them only as Ginny, Fannin said.

The birth was kept secret from Army officials by the father, who was the commanding officer of the training unit, according to the investigation made by Fannin.

She reports Ginny was transferred to the United States when James was ing congressmen and Ro-3 to 4 months old. The salynn Carter, seeking United States several months later. Before his departure he gave the port the child and promised to return within a year. He didn't.

THE FIELD director conducted an exhaustive research of Army records without results. She believes the father's records were destroyed in a fire in the Army Records Section in Indianapolis several years ago. Further checks with the Army Finance Center and other military agencies proved fruitless.

The lieutenant was the Hanha, or head honcho, at the outpost and the Korean trainees and two American sergeants assigned to the field unit kept the secret of the birth, Fannin said.

The midwife died when Jimmy was 5 years old and the boy was raised by the interpreter. and his wife until he was 14. Then the couple yielded to social pressure and turned him out to fend for himself.

His only recourse was slave labor -- that is, he was permitted to work for farmers in rice pad-

dies for a place to sleep and a minimum amount of food, Fannin said.

SHE SAID James Daniel drifted through Korea, half-starved and weak from lack of an adequate diet, working when employment was available and stealing food when it wasn't.

In his late teens, he was found half-naked and mumbling incoherently in a culvert by police in a small village. They thought he was a U.S. Army deserter. He was brought to an Air Force base in Wung Mon Son, where he was hospitalized suffering from pneumonia and malnu-

When he regained his health several weeks later, he was adopted by the GIs, assigned to a job as a cook's assistant and studied English under programs sponsored by the U.S. government. An Army intelligence

officer assisted Jimmy and tried, without success, to gain documentation of his birth

When the base was abandoned, the intelligence officer and Fannin helped support the young man and placed him in an orphanage operated by a roving American missionary who later abandoned Jimmy and several Amerasians (the children of American soldiers and Korean women).

FANNIN and her husband, Robert, a retired Army major, hope they may eventually be allowed to bring Jimmy to their home. They have offered to assume responsibility for him and a guarantee that he would not become a public charge

He is bright and despite his limitated education, can read and write English and has demonstrated both mechanical and musical ability, said Fannin.

She has written to numerous officials, includassistance for James





### Argentina goes for jazz

If an American tourist visits Buenos Aires, Argentina's exciting capital, he'll want to keep his ears as well as his eyes open.

For in that Paris-like, large South American city, with a population of around 9 million, tango is not the only kind of music to be heard in cabarets, nightclubs and theaters.

Some of the well-reputed Argentine musicians delight visitors with the very familiar sounds of jazz. It's an art form that Argentines have been worshipping for decades. And it's a tradition all by itself.

A glance at local newspapers provides invaluable insight into the wheres and whens of jazz in Buenos Aires. Last year, the city featured more than 40 amateur and professional jazz groups regularly performing in about 50 different "spots" during its hectic March through November musical season.

Buenos Aires' commercial and state-owned radio networks broadcast at least half a dozen regular jazz programs, while television stations periodically schedule jazz shows, mostly late at night, with local

There are several very old fan clubs waten keep a long chain of festivals and concerts swinging all over

Cesar Parisi, an auctioneer whose passion for jazz runs back 25 years to his adolescence, currently leads one of these semiprofessional organizations, Club de Jazz.

Founded in the mid-1970s, Club de Jazz features every season a wide spectrum of Argentine jazz artistry, from traditional to avant garde. Its live, concerts are held at some of the most fashionable halls in town. Last year, Parisi says, he presented more than 400 concerts, using 100 performers, in Buenos Aires and in the jazz-booming summer re-sorts of Necochea and Mar del Plata on the Atlantic coast.

This year, Club de Jazz will present a series of concerts to introduce less-known jazzmen from all over the country to the capital's audience.

One competitor is Hot Club Argentino, now on the verge of its 35th anniversary, which has encouraged the development of traditional jazz groups. From their ranks have come many orchestras, like Portena Jazz Band led by cornetist Martin Muller. La Portena, as it is popularly known, has been active playing a repertoire from Fletcher Henderson to Fats Waller for more than a decade, getting standing ovations throughout Latin America and even in a jazz festival in Holland and on Swiss TV.

Another group which has performed outside the

country is the New Orleans Jazz Band, which performed for almost 20 years in its native Mendoza, a Californian-looking city which leans on the slopes of the Andes, 550 miles west of Buenos

A few years ago, the group played before Victor Shapiro, a former mayor of New Orleans, who was amazed at the sounds produced by musicians who had never been in the United States. The band performed in 1977 at the Newport Jazz Festival in New York, receiving critical raves.

Some Argentine jazzmen, like Lalo Schifrin, Leandro "Gato" Barbieri and brothers Eddie and George del Barrio have moved to America.
