| AUSTIN - Proposēd rules on "short term rollover loans" for one- to four-family residences are being circulated to lenders by the Savings and Loan Section of the State Finance Commission. |  |
| Commissioner Alvis Vandygriff notes the proposal woutd provide an additional approach to mortgage lenders, in ad dition to the traditional and the graduated payment and variable rate mortgage programs approved for use in Texas (the latter plans getting approval this summer). <br> Basically, the proposed rules allow for a program similar to the so-called "Canadian rollover plan," with the following major provisions: <br> -Loans would be for an initial period of not less than five years, and would be renewed for periods years. <br> - Payments would be at least quarterly, but not more frequently than monthly. <br> -Loans would be set up to be amortized $\mathrm{g}^{\mathrm{ver}}$ a period of at least 20 years. <br> -Lenders would be required to offer a standard fixed interest rate loan along with the rol- lover plan (similar provisions are in effect on | loan. <br> The proposed rules also provide that a lender may not charge renewing or extending a loan without notifying prior to the date of that action - giving the date on which the entire loan is due and payable, and the rate of interest to be charged, or the highest amount permitted by payments to be made during the term of the new loan. <br> The idea is that that will give the borrower a chance to shop around or a better rate <br> Lenders believe the rollover approach will give them someriodic adjustment in loan rates. <br> Such an approach also can help borrowers, they would be able to find a better rate in instances where rates decline between the time the loan is made and when it is renewed or extended. <br> But lenders also note that the plan isn't likely to help while prime rates |
