### Suzanne in the buff

CHICAGO (AP) — Suzanne Somers says it didn't happen, but Playboy Magazine has published, in its upcoming February issue, 10 pages of nude photos of the television star taken nine years ago. "Before she became TV's sexiest star, Suzanne posed for these provocative photos ... aren't you glad we keep such beautiful records?" said a photograph caption. The magazine said the photos show the actress nude at a secluded Mexican waterfall "as if she'd been posing in the buff all her life."

The article says that in a recent appearance on the Tonight Show, Miss Somers told Johnny Carson that she and a Playboy photographer had done some swimsuit fashion shots in Mexico a few years back but that the bathing suit had stayed on the whole time.

### Escape fails

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — A convicted murderer launched a homemade hang glider from a Virginia State Penitentiary roof Friday in a dramatic try for freedom that fell just short of success.

Department of Corrections officials said the glider hit the top of the prison wall and became entangled in wire along the catwalk atop the wall.

Vincent Rawlings, 21, suffered a broken pelvis and several other broken bones, officials said. He was in stable condition at Medical College of Virginia Hospital.

### Panamanians riot

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — National guardsmen fired shotgun shells and tear gas at rock-throwing university students Friday, and a National Guard major promised "more drastic measures" if the students continue demonstrating against the deposed Shah of Iran.

The shah has been staying on Contadora Island, 35 miles southeast of here, at the invitation of the Panamanian President Aristides Royo.

Student leader Hector Andara said 15 students suffered buckshot wounds during the fourth day of protests Friday, but none of the injuries appeared serious. There was no official report on the number of casualties.

A National Guard major, who refused to identify himself, told reporters: "If there is more obstruction of traffic and burning of vehicles, we'll be forced to take more drastic measures than we did today."

### Afghanis host Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union now has moved a total of 1,500 combat-equipped airborne troops into Afghanistan during a military buildup that began several weeks ago, the State Department said Friday.

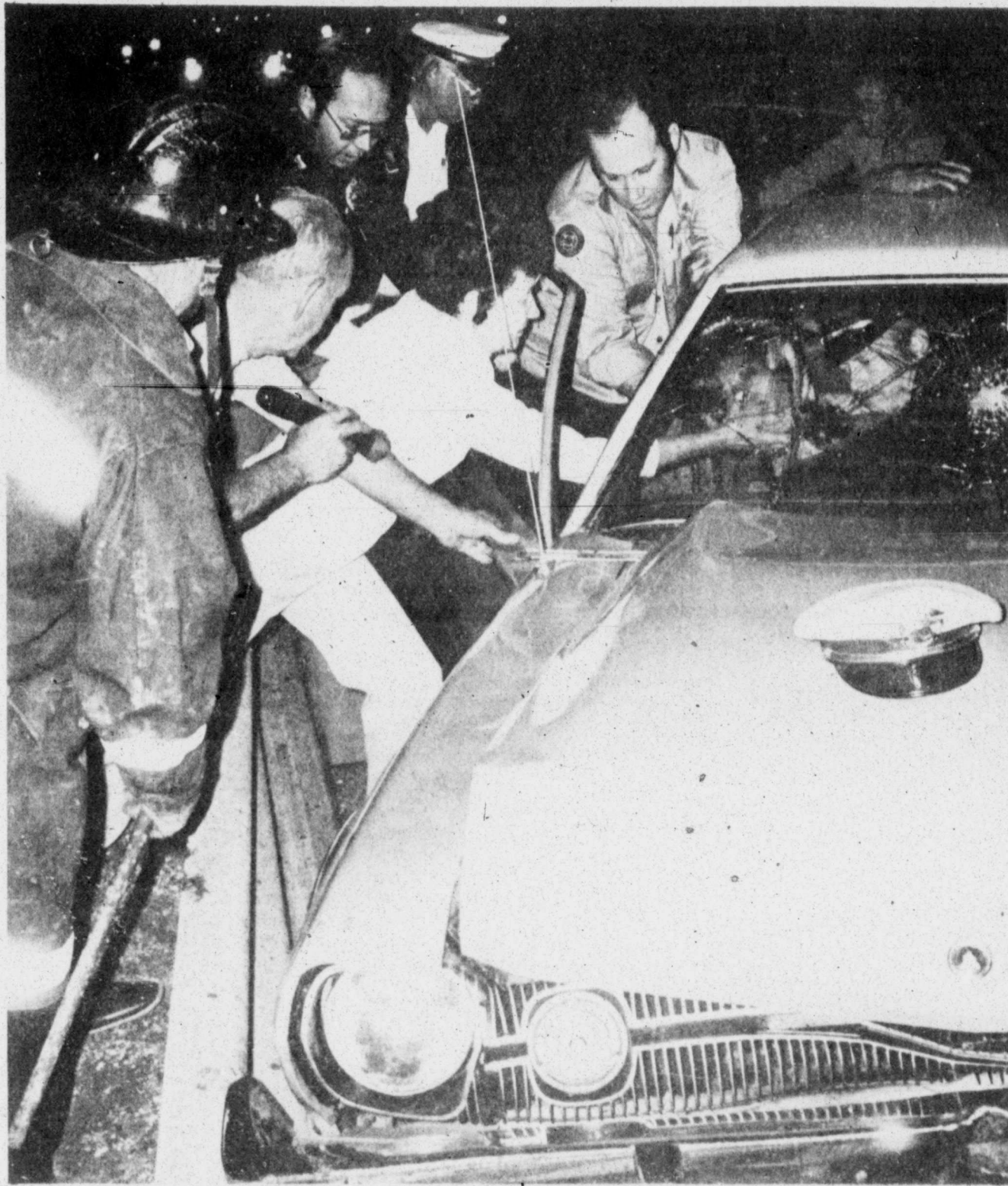

## 'Dump it in New Mexico'

### Clements says no nuke waste in Texas

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Bill Clements said Friday federal officials looking for nuclear waste dump sites should forget about Texas and look to the New Mexico desert where the atomic age began 34 years ago.

The governor's comments were prompted by a report that Todd Shipyard in Galveston is among 50 sites being considered by U.S. Department

of Energy officials for nuclear waste dump yards.

One report said the Todd yard is among the top five choices.

"Whether it's a short list or a long list, I'm opposed to it," Clements said at his regular weekly news conference.

"I was very much surprised to read about it. In the meantime we are

going to explore how we can stop it," he said.

The governor said Alamogordo, N.M., is a natural selection for a nuclear dumping ground. The world's first atomic bomb was exploded in 1945 near the New Mexico city.

"I have supported the use of Alamogordo and the test facilities there for five years," said Clements, who added his support of the New Mexico site goes back to his days as deputy director of defense.

"That site should be used. It is contaminated. It is federal land. Why go elsewhere? It's just that simple," he said.

The Todd shipyard is already under the scrutiny of state officials concerned with nuclear wastes now being stored there. Clements opposes the use of any Texas land for dumping of nuclear wastes generated outside the state.

Federal officials have confirmed they are looking for dump sites that would be opened in 1984.

Clements also told reporters he thinks the Superport proposed for the Texas coast is in trouble.

"I would not say it is dead. The more proper term is that it is sick," he said.

Clements said "time is literally running out" on getting the necessary oil company commitments to participate in the massive port proposed for off Freeport.

"Right now they have about 700,000 barrels a day tentatively committed, but there's not a single signed contract in hand," he said.

## Will Chrysler workers give up \$462.5 million?

DETROIT (AP) — A Chrysler engineering worker greeted her office neighbor Friday with a thumbs-up sign — a symbol of the company's hopes now that Congress has passed legislation to guarantee \$1.5 billion in loans to the automaker.

Whether most Chrysler workers would give a thumbs-up to the \$462.5 million in sacrifices required of them was the next hurdle for the faltering No. 3 automaker, now scheduled for the biggest government bail-out of a private company.

Under the three-year contract reached in October, members of the United Auto Workers union already gave up \$203 million of that amount.

UAW President Douglas A. Fraser endorsed the bill before President Carter in fact if not in words at a news conference, saying he believed "it will allow Chrysler Corporation to survive and prosper but more important, it will save the jobs of the tens of thousands of people."

He confessed a "degree of bitterness" because a threatened Senate filibuster forced a larger sacrifice than had been agreed to.

The UAW represents almost all of Chrysler's 113,000 unionized workers in the United States. Nearly 33,000 of them are on layoff, and Chrysler, which expects to lose \$1 billion this year, says it will run out of cash in mid-January without help.

Union protocol keeps presidents from acting outside of channels, and Fraser must await a Jan. 2 meeting of the committee that negotiated the October contract.

## 'He just left it sitting there, and I wanted to drive....'

"He just left it sitting there, and I wanted to drive the bus," Jerry Allen Wilkerson said Friday afternoon in an interview with The Midland Reporter-Telegram.

Wilkerson is currently in Midland City Jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond, charged with false imprisonment and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle in connection with the Thursday night hijacking of a Greyhound bus — and 35 passengers.

"I didn't think I'd get caught. I didn't think they'd report the bus missing," he admitted.

Wilkerson said he was headed for Los Angeles when police stopped him.

"I would have driven all the way to Los Angeles — that was our destination."

According to Wilkerson, his short sojourn as bus driver was something he had given a lot of thought to during his ride to Midland Thursday night, and the bus driver's temporary absence presented the opportunity to carry out his plans.

At approximately 10:30 p.m. Thursday, Greyhound bus driver James Davidson stopped in Midland en route to Los Angeles. He left his bus run-

ning while he went into the depot. When Davidson stepped off the bus, Wilkerson allegedly moved into the driver's seat and drove off. Davidson called police and reported that someone had stolen his bus and was driving west on Front Street toward Odessa.

"The bus operated just fine. I enjoyed it as short as it lasted," Wilkerson said.

"The first time I drove that far (to Los Angeles), I drove a 30-foot trailer and it didn't drive nearly as good as the bus."

## U.S. will ask for sanctions against Iran

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter, accusing Iran of "arrogant defiance," announced Friday that the United States will ask the United Nations to impose worldwide economic sanctions against the Iranian government to try to force release of the 50 American hostages held in Tehran.

Carter said the Iranian government "must realize it cannot flaunt with impunity" international law and a decision by the International Court of Justice that the hostages be freed. "Concrete action must be taken," Carter said.

For that reason, the president told the nation in a televised statement, the United States is asking for an early meeting of the U.N. Security Council "to impose international economic sanctions upon Iran."

As he left the podium, he told reporters he did not know whether the Security Council would approve sanctions.

The Soviet Union, with its veto, could block the U.S. move. Other U.S. officials said there was no word yet from Moscow as to whether the Kremlin would support the United States.

"Iran still stands in arrogant defiance of the world community," Carter said.

He accused the regime of revolutionary leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini of blackmail "to which the United States will never yield."

The hostages were seized by militant Moslems at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran on Nov. 4. The militants have demanded that the United States return deposed Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi for trial.

Carter said the Americans were being held "under inhuman circumstances" by "kidnappers, terrorists."

He did not say specifically what sanctions the United States was trying to have the Security Council impose on Iran. But other sources, asking not to be identified, said there would be no request for a total trade embargo.

Instead, the sources said, the United States would try to organize a boycott of certain exports to Iran. Already, the Carter administration has weakened the Iranian economy by refusing to buy oil from Iran and freezing \$8 billion to \$9 billion in Iranian assets in American banks here and abroad.

Earlier in the day, the U.S. Export-Import Bank declared in default loans used to finance U.S. exports to Iran.

Carter concluded his brief statement with a quotation from a Christmas verse by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow.

## Council approval 'will be difficult'

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — U.S. Ambassador Donald F. McHenry began consultations Friday with Security Council members on President Carter's call for U.N. economic sanctions against Iran, but said it is "going to be difficult" to get council approval.

He told reporters the U.S. request "has to be considered very seriously in the light of what the alternatives are."

McHenry did not elaborate, but Washington officials have talked privately of the possibility of some kind of economic blockade of Iran, where militants are holding 50 American hostages in the U.S. Embassy.

The ambassador said he expected the 15-member council to convene after Christmas to consider the U.S. appeal for sanctions. The Soviet Union, as one of the council's five permanent members, has the power to veto any council action.

In Moscow, U.S. Ambassador Thomas J. Watson Jr. met with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko on Friday and diplomatic sources said the meeting focused on Iran. No details were available.

The council, by unanimous vote, has twice called on Iran's revolutionary government to free the hostages, with the last appeal made Dec. 4.

McHenry said he had discussed Carter's request with Chinese Ambassador Chen Chu, the council president for December, and would confer with other council members.

U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim, who watched Carter's televised announcement of the U.S. move for sanctions, said, "I do not know how the Security Council will react. This is a great challenge for the council."

"The wrong shall fail, the right prevail, with peace on earth, good will to men," the president intoned.

The Iranian Foreign Ministry withheld comment early Saturday on President Carter's appeal for U.N. economic sanctions against Iran, but one of the militant students holding 50 Americans captive in the U.S. Embassy said, "It won't make us free the hostages."

The student, who answered the telephone at the embassy, added: "As the imam (Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini) has said, we are not afraid of economic sanctions or of military intervention."

A Foreign Ministry spokesman said the ruling Revolutionary Council would have to consider Carter's announcement.

Khomeini, the Moslem holy man who rules Iran, obviously had anticipated Carter's action. A few hours before the president made his announcement in Washington, Khomeini told a group of revolutionary guards Iran would defy any sanctions.

Speaking at his headquarters in Qom, the ayatollah said if America succeeded in getting the U.N. Security Council to order economic sanctions, Iran would ask other nations to ignore the order. He was quoted by the government radio as saying, "We will ask other countries to meet our economic requirements."

The broadcast reported Khomeini said a number of nations, which he did not name, were swinging to Iran's side in the crisis over the hostages.

"Other governments are not America's subordinates," Khomeini told the guards.

He also was quoted as saying, "We are not afraid of American military action and you people don't think America could conquer."

The United States is a major supplier of foodstuffs to Iran and Khomeini's government has attempted to overcome some of its dependence on those supplies by buying food from other countries in recent months.

Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, saying he wants Iran's 50 American hostages to have a "Christmas in peace," ordered Friday that the occupied U.S. Embassy be opened to holiday visits by Christian clergymen. He said black clerics would be given priority to visit the hostages.

Khomeini, in his announcement, indicated the Christmas visitors would be Americans or other foreigners and said black clergymen would be given top consideration.

It will be the first time in weeks that hostages have been seen by outsiders.

"There was one lady who objected. She made a comment about it, but I don't remember what it was. I don't guess she thought I could drive the bus. The rest of them just sat there and let me drive. I guess they didn't object."

Although he intended to drive to Los Angeles, Wilkerson, who listed home addresses in Dallas and Los Angeles, said he would have stopped to let the passengers off at their destinations "if they wanted to get off, but then the bus was bound for Los Angeles."

"If the bus driver leaves the bus that way and if they (other passengers) want to they should be able to take the bus, too," Wilkerson said.

Wilkerson's drive ended a few blocks from the Midland Greyhound depot when police surrounded the bus at the intersection of Williams Street and Wall Avenue.

"I stopped the bus because they parked a police car in front of it. I didn't want to hit the police car or endanger the passengers' lives, so I stopped. Then I opened the door and the police apprehended me," Wilkerson said.

"I didn't realize how much trouble I'd get into for taking the bus. I really don't know what's coming next," he said.

"You know, I'm not in the habit of taking buses or nothing," he added.

## POLITICAL BRIEFS

### Bush officially in first primary

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — George Bush on Friday became the fourth Republican to enter the New Hampshire primary, the nation's first state primary.

Bush's son, Neil, submitted the \$500 filing fee and 1,200 signatures of state residents.

The other candidates who have formally entered the Feb. 26 GOP primary are former California Gov. Ronald Reagan, former Texas Gov. John Connally and Illinois Rep. John Anderson.

### Teddy raps Carter on energy

BEDFORD, N.H. (AP) — Accusing President Carter of breaking his promise to the American public, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy said Friday the basis of the administration's energy policy "has become a pursuit of higher prices."

The White House responded immediately by saying Kennedy was playing "fast and loose with the truth."

Kennedy's latest statement sharpened an attack he began Thursday during a two-day campaign trip through New Hampshire. The response from the Carter administration came quickly, as it had Thursday when Kennedy charged that Treasury Secretary G. William Miller had asked the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries to raise prices.

On Friday, Kennedy said the president's decision to lift federal controls on oil prices, coupled with recent statements by Miller "invited OPEC to gouge the American public once more with higher prices."

In Washington, White House press secretary Jody Powell told reporters that Kennedy was failing to distinguish between predicting an event and approving it. And he added with a smile:

"For example, I predict that Sen. Kennedy will continue to play fast and loose with the truth in this campaign, but I in no way condone that sort of behavior."

### Rules set for Iowa debates

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Republicans will sit at tables but Democrats will stand behind lecterns when the presidential candidates meet for separate nationally televised debates in Des Moines next month.

James Gannon, executive editor of the sponsoring Des Moines Register and Tribune newspapers, says that's one of the few differences in rules for the debates.

Gannon announced rules for the debates on Thursday. He said the GOP debate Jan. 5 will last two hours, while the Democratic candidates' debate Jan. 7 will last 90 minutes.

Each GOP candidate will give a three-minute summation at the end of his debate, while the Democrats will take only two minutes for their closing remarks.

Republicans scheduled to participate are Rep. Anderson, Sen. Howard Baker of Tennessee, Bush, Connally, Rep. Philip Crane of Illinois and Sen. Robert Dole of Kansas. Reagan has refused to take part.

President Carter, California Gov. Jerry Brown and Sen. Kennedy of Massachusetts will take part in the Democratic debate.

Gannon said the number of Republican candidates has forced that debate to be somewhat different than the Democratic one.

He said the GOP candidates will be seated at two tables, three to each table, positioned so the candidates can face each other as well as the audience.

### Linda to aid Brown's drive

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Gov Brown Jr. is turning to his girlfriend Linda Ronstadt and other top entertainers to help bolster his financially starved campaign for president.

The 41-year-old Democrat, who is a distant third behind President Carter and Sen. Kennedy in the polls, has been having trouble raising funds for his campaign.

But rock concerts headlined by Miss Ronstadt on Friday night in San Diego and Saturday in Las Vegas are expected to pump up to \$300,000 into the war chest.

The rock groups Chicago and the Eagles and folk-rock singer J.D. Souther also will perform at the concerts for Brown. Actress Jane Fonda and singer Helen Reddy are helping in the fund-raising push by joining Brown on a \$150-a-head celebrity train ride from Los Angeles to the San Diego concert.

## Inflation called top problem

NEW YORK (AP) — By better than a 4-1 margin, high school seniors polled nationally said their confidence in government decreased in the last year, the Encyclopaedia Britannica said Friday.

The poll conducted by the Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corp. also found 51.3 percent of those interviewed called inflation the nation's biggest problem, with oil shortages second at 42.8 percent.

J.A. Shellenberger, a spokesman for the company, said about 1,100 students in about two-thirds the states participated in the survey.

The poll also found that the students, by nearly a 2-1 margin, favored passage of the SALT arms limitation agreement with the Soviet Union.

They also overwhelmingly favored Sen. Edward M. Kennedy for president among possible Democrats and Ronald Reagan, more narrowly, among Republicans.

Most said they did not plan to volunteer for military service and considered their high school years to have been happy.

## Holiday traffic toll may be 550

The National Safety Council estimated Friday that 450 to 550 persons may be killed in traffic accidents during the four-day Christmas holiday period.

The traffic fatality count runs from 6 p.m. Friday to midnight Tuesday. On a non-holiday, four-day December weekend, traffic deaths average about 510, the council said.

There were 454 traffic fatalities in last year's three-day Christmas period. The last time there was a four-day span, 397 were killed in 1975. The highest death toll of any Christmas season was 720 during three days in 1965.

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## TMI safety programs 'deficient'

MIDDELTOWN, Pa. (AP) — A Nuclear Regulatory Commission panel said Friday it found "substantial deficiencies" in worker safety programs at Three Mile Island nuclear plant. But it added that the programs are steadily improving.

The panel said the crippled plant's owners, Metropolitan Edison Co. and General Public Utilities Corp., have demonstrated a strong commitment to improve the programs.

The panel was formed in September by Harold Denton, NRC's director of nuclear reactor regulation, after federal and state officials expressed concern about worker safety and environmental protection at the Brookhaven National Laboratory in New York.

The panel focused on what radiation safety programs would be available when Met Ed begins the cleanup inside the containment building and reactor in 1981. Current cleanup work related to the accident — in which radiation was leaked into the atmosphere — is outside the containment building and may continue with present safety programs, the panel said.

The panel said it found there had been a lack of management direction on radiation safety; inadequate training; inadequate coordination of consultants working on the cleanup; and mistakes in calculating radiation doses.

The panel recommended Met Ed not start any major cleanup work until an upgraded radiation safety program is implemented.

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


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# Youth horse club gives awards

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

## CRMWD income near projections of budget

**BIG SPRING** — Income for the Colorado River Municipal Water District for the first 11 months of this year has approached the \$7 million mark, near budget projections.

Operating expenses of \$2,267,436 likewise are only slightly over estimates for the period, water district officials said. One of the chief reasons for the increase is \$30,000 more for energy than was required for the same period in 1978.

Income for the 11 months stood at \$6,973,144. Projection for all of 1979 is \$7,760,052. Revenues for November were \$520,331.

During the month of November, CRMWD pumped 700 acre-feet of water from Lake J.B. Thomas, leaving 17,650 acre-feet, and 1,970 acre-feet from Lake Spence, leaving 106,300 acre-feet in reserve.

## Unemployment rate in Midland up slightly

A slight increase in the available work force coupled with inflation, tight money, job completions and lay off of temporary workers forced the unemployment level up slightly in Midland during November.

Midland's civilian labor force rose to 46,120 in November for a 5.5 percent gain over October. Unemployment edged up to 1,400, or 3 percent of the labor force, as some of the early holiday season preparations were completed.

Total employment remained steady at 45,020 jobs, according to the Midland labor market review prepared by the Texas Employment Commission.

The forecast for February shows advancements in most employment areas although construction work should slacken some because of winter weather and the financial pinch.

The 3 percent unemployment figure this November is lower than the 3.9 percent experienced in November 1978 when there were 1,750 people looking for work in the Midland area, but above the 2.5 percent level reached in October when only 1,150 people were listed as unemployed.

TEC forecasters predict the local unemployment figure will increase to 5.2 percent by February.

The current 3-percent rate compares favorably with the nation's rate of 8.6 percent and the state level of 4.3 percent. The increase in unemployment predicted by February is blamed on the uncertainties of inflation, tight construction money and higher energy prices which may keep managers from extending the financial picture, according to the TEC.

Locally, the demand for skilled workers still outstrips supply. Some of the hard-to-fill openings include positions for geologists, manager trainees, registered nurses, licensed vocational nurses, cashier-checkers, all types of clerical workers, secretaries, stenographers, delivery and warehouse workers, insurance sales agents, general sales associates, sales representatives, bartender, all kinds of restaurant personnel and cooks, commercial cleaner and nurse aide.

Also, aircraft, auto, diesel, truck, heavy equipment and forklift mechanics, auto service station attendant, electronic assembler, construction laborer, building maintenance repairer, all kinds of machinists, refrigeration mechanic, roustabout, heavy truck driver and combination welder.

## 'Rough cookies' escape from state penitentiary

HUNTSVILLE (AP) — Three women described as "pretty rough little cookies" who broke out of the state penitentiary were tracked by bloodhounds as far as Interstate 45 Friday. Prison officials believe they fled from there in a car.

"We have reason to believe they either had somebody assist them by having a vehicle close by, or they hitchhiked a ride on I-45," said prison spokesman Rick Hartley. "As far as which direction they went, that's still up in the air."

The women, all convicted robbers from Harris County (Houston), were described as dangerous, although Hartley said they were not believed armed when they broke out of the prison's Gorce Unit sometime between 11 p.m. Thursday and 2 a.m. Friday.

## Peter Max sued for \$1 million

NEW YORK (AP) — Artist Peter Max was sued for more than \$1 million damages Friday for allegedly copying and capitalizing on an exclusive photograph of rock music star Mick Jagger.

The suit was brought by a New York photographer of entertainment and arts celebrities.

She claimed Max infringed on her exclusive rights to the photograph by incorporating it in paintings.

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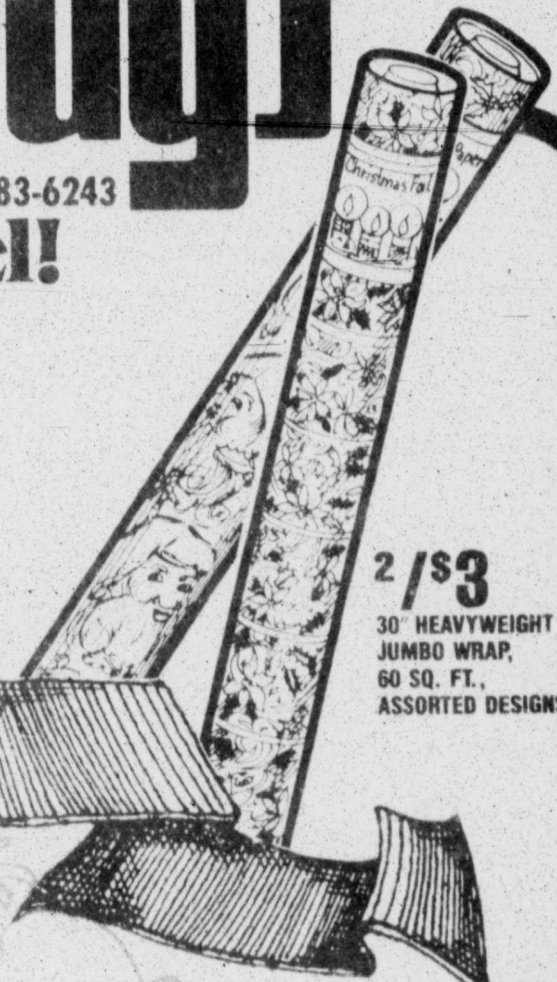
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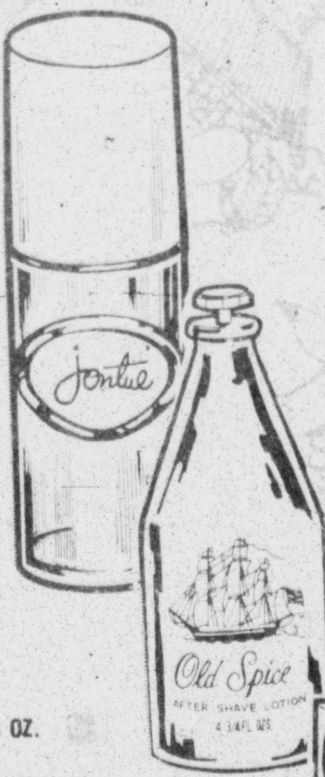

# Texas faces Huskies without 'Jam' and 'Lam'

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — The 11th-ranked Texas Longhorns defend their Sun Bowl championship Saturday without two of the top weapons in their arsenal, yet are rated six-point favorites over the Washington Huskies.

The Longhorns, who compiled the third best defense in the country in a 9-2 season which included a 6-2 Southwest Conference record, will go into Saturday's 12:30 a.m. CST kickoff without the services of runningback A.J. "Jam" Jones and Johnny "Lam" Jones, both sidelined with injuries.

Sophomore Jam Jones of Youngstown, Ohio, scored 10 touchdowns for the Longhorns but suffered separated shoulder two weeks before the end of the season.

Lam Jones, a senior wide receiver from Lampasas, Texas, who earned a gold medal in 1976 Olympics as a member of America's sprint relay team, has knee problems and will forgo the final game of his collegiate career.

This being the case, Texas must depend on its defense to stop the 13-ranked Huskies who have shown renewed offensive fervor under junior quarterback Tom Flick.

Washington finished with a 9-2 record overall and runnerup to Southern California in the Pac-10 Conference.

It marks only the third time in 45 Sun Bowls that a Pac-10 member has played in this classic.

Both Oregon and Stanford have won games here, and its the first time Washington has played outside the Rose Bowl.

A capacity crowd of 33,122 was expected to view the nationally-televised meeting between the two teams who have only met twice previously with Texas taking both games.

Sophomore quarterback Donnie Little, who missed the final two games of the season for the Longhorns because of a foot injury, was expected to start for the Longhorns with freshman Rick Melvor of Fort Stockton waiting in the wings with his rifle passing arm.

Flick said of the Longhorns, who have only allowed an average 184 yards per game, "It's exciting for us to play a school with such a great defense and a great football tradition. This is our biggest game of the year."

The Longhorns will also be missing freshman running back Rodney Tate, who suffered a shoulder injury in a final 13-7 loss to the Texas Aggies.

The starting backfield for the Longhorns will consist of unspectacular Leroy King and sophomore Brad Beck. Freshman Herkie Wills was slotted to start for flanker Lam Jones, who held eight school records and was most spectacular in the next to last game of the season when he shagged eight passes for over 100 yards against Baylor.

Texas bounced back from a disappointing regular season last year to throttle Maryland 42-0 in the Sun Bowl.

Washington will be without its stars as top rusher Joe Steele will be sidelined. But the huskies can play defense too, led by defense tackle Doug Martin.

# Indiana Hoosiers salvage 38-37 upset over Cougars

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Brigham Young's Brent Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal attempt with seven seconds remaining, allowing Indiana to salvage a 38-37 upset victory over previously unbeaten and ninth-ranked Brigham Young Friday night in the Holiday Bowl.

With 6:33 remaining, Indiana had taken its one point lead when sophomore Tim Wilbur raced 62 yards with a punt return for a touchdown and Kevin Kellong kicked the extra point.

BYU ROARED downfield in the final minutes behind the passing of All-American quarterback Marc Wilson, who marched his team from its own 21 to the Indiana 10. But Johnson, who had earlier converted field goals of 46, 29 and 28 yards, shanked the ball far left and short of the uprights.

On Wilbur's game deciding punt return, he scooped up the ball and found daylight after the punt had hit the ground and bounced off teammate Kevin Kenley.

That score came after BYU, trailing 31-24, tallied 13 straight points to go ahead 37-31 early in the fourth quarter.

The victory, Indiana's first ever in bowl competition, gave the Hoosiers an 8-4 record this season. BYU, a 7 1/2-point favorite, dropped its second straight Holiday Bowl decision and finished 11-4 for the year.

WILSON, WHO broke 11 NCAA offensive records during his career at BYU, completed 28 of 43 passes for 380 yards.

Junior quarterback Tim Clifford passed for one touchdown and ran for two others to spark underdog Indiana to a 21-17 halftime lead over unbeaten Brigham Young.

BYU, behind All-American quarterback Wilson, marched 76 yards of its first possession for a 7-0 lead on a 1-yard run by fullback Eric Lane.

Wilson, who set an NCAA record this year with 3,720 yards passing, was 4-for-4 during the drive, with completions of 6, 3, 15 and 20 yards.

But Indiana struck back, scoring twice in five minutes for a 14-7 lead late in the first period. The Hoosiers, rated eight-point underdogs, drove 80 yards on their first possession, tying it 7-7 on a 38-yard touchdown pass from Clifford to tight end Bob Stephenson.

WILSON'S FIRST pass after the ensuing kickoff was intercepted by Indiana sophomore free safety Steve Mitchell at midfield and returned to the BYU 37.

Eleven plays later, Indiana went ahead 14-7 when Clifford ran 1 yard around left end.

Trailing for one of the few times this season, BYU, on its next possession, answered with a six-play, 59-yard drive. Wilson raced around right end from three yards out to tie it at 14.

The Cougars regained the lead midway through the second quarter when Brent Johnson's 46-yard field goal hit the crossbar and bounced over.

WITH TIME running out in the half, Clifford directed an 87-yard, 14-play drive, capped when he burst over from the one to put the Hoosiers ahead 21-17.

# WAC may delay NLV entry

SAN DIEGO (AP) — The University of Nevada-Las Vegas' entry into the Western Athletic Conference, originally scheduled for next July, will be delayed up to one year, it was announced Friday prior to the Holiday Bowl.

Ellenberger and his chief recruiter, Manny Goldstein, were suspended by Davis Nov. 30 in the wake of an FBI investigation into possible mail fraud and bribery involving the alleged doctoring of transcripts for a junior college transfer on the Lobo basketball squad.

# Van claims state title in Class AA

MESQUITE, Texas (AP) — Tailback Danny Brockway, exhibiting near-perfect ball handling on a rain-drenched field, rushed for three touchdowns as Van claimed the Class AA Schoolboy football championship Friday night with a 25-0 shutout over offensively-stemmed McGregor.

Van finished the season at 14-0-1, while the runner-up Bulldogs had to settle for 11-4 mark.

The Vandals handled the ball only twice in the first half, but put together a pair of time-consuming touchdown drives for a 13-0 lead at intermission.

Brockway carried the ball 10 times over the wet artificial turf before scoring from four yards out with 2:58 left in the first quarter.

After taking over on its own 28, McGregor drove the ball as far as the Van 18. But a costly clipping penalty pushed the ball back to the 41 where the drive where McGregor's only effective rally died.

Van then took over following a punt at its own 7 and Brockway, who rushed for 121 yards on 36 carries, and teammate Wallace Moore put on a two-man show for the Vandals second score.

Brockway got Van some initial breathing space with a 28-yard run after the 177-pound senior made another first down on a six-yard run to the 48.

Brockway, refreshed by a sideline rest during Moore's gaunts, then

hammered out the rest of the yards to paydirt on five consecutive carries.

His one-yard scoring run gave Van a 13-0 lead.

Although both teams endured the sloppy field in the first half without a turnover, two early third period fumbles put the game out of reach for McGregor.

Bulldog running back Dennis Dixon lost the ball on his own 29 on the second play from scrimmage after halftime. Brockway scored on a 3-yard draw play eight plays later to take a 19-0 lead.

# Chicago outlives fast post-mortems

CHICAGO (AP) — It was Oct. 21 and the Chicago Bears had just suffered a 30-27 loss to Minnesota. "That dropped their record to 3-5 and post-mortems on their National Football League playoff hopes were rife. Then they began winning. Still, injuries had shattered the nucleus of their offensive attack — quarterback Vince Evans, fullback Roland Harper, and wide receivers James Scott and Golden Richards. But the substitutes played like time-tested starters and the Bears kept winning — seven of their last eight games. On Sunday, with no new injuries, they tackle the Philadelphia Eagles in the National Conference wild-card playoff game. "We'll be emotional, I'm sure, at Philadelphia. That won't be new for us," said Chicago Coach Neill Armstrong. "We've played with a lot of enthusiasm for most of the season." But defensive tackle Alan Page, veteran of 15 playoff games with Minnesota and facing his first with Chicago, said the Bears' strengths go far beyond their emotion. "This team is much more fundamental and consistent and can play from week to week without riding the emotional ups and downs," he said. "What we have to do now is do what we've been doing all year and that's go out, play very hard and win." The Bears' approach has evolved from a conservative, one-dimensional, running offense early in the season to a wide open, ground-gulping attack in last Sunday's 42-6 trouncing of St. Louis. The Bears needed almost all of

that margin to reach the playoffs. Their game plan against the Eagles likely will be somewhere in between — a judicious blend of passing and running with a surprise or two. Mike Phipps, the veteran who stepped in after Evans was sidelined, has brought stability to the Bears' revolving-door quarterback system. He completed 52.5 percent of his passes and will be at the helm against the Eagles. "I think they (the Eagles) are very sound defensively. They play the three-man line. They do not blitz much. You'll see an occasional safety blitz," said Armstrong. "They don't stunt that much so when a team does that I think they just have the philosophy to play a sound defense. I think they strive not to make the big mistakes on offense or defense." The Bears were remarkably steady the last half of the season, keeping penalties, fumbles and interceptions down while capitalizing on their opponents' errors. Walter Payton, who ran for 1,610 yards to lead the NFC in rushing for the fourth straight season, said the fact Chicago must play one more playoff game than division winners may help. "That extra week's rest should be an advantage to get everything together. But sometimes it can work against your timing," he said. "In our case, maybe it's to our advantage. We got everything going last week and to keep it going we need to play every week."

# Big Eight to review credits

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Big Eight Conference school registrars have been asked to review transfer credits of student athletes as the result of scandals at four western campuses involving bogus grade transcripts. Charles M. Neinas, conference commissioner, said he had contacted certifying officers at each Big Eight member, suggesting scrutiny of records involving summer makeup work to maintain athletic eligibility, and junior college transfers enrolled the last three years. Neinas said he raised

the precautionary issue with conference registrars because of Oklahoma's football probation by the NCAA in 1973-74 over alteration of two high school transcripts. "Since I was concerned at that time and quite involved in the case," the commissioner said, "things of that nature would not surprise me. Anybody in our business has to be concerned about this." In the past month, six basketball players at New Mexico and eight footballers at Arizona State have lost their eligibility, accused of receiving transfer credits for courses they did not attend.

# Denver thinks Earl is not only worry

DENVER (AP) — Denver vs. Houston: a classic duel between the National Football League's top rushing defense and the league's No. 1 rusher. Right? Well, yes, but that's oversimplifying the matchup, according to Denver linebacker Randy Gradishar. "If we focus in on just one guy, we'll get beat," said Gradishar, ringleader of the Bronco defense which will try to stop Oiler running back Earl Campbell & Co. in the AFC wild-card playoff game Sunday at the Astrodome. "Our ability to defense Earl will be a big factor, but it's not our total game plan," said Gradishar. "(Quarterback Dan) Pastorini is having a big year throwing to (wide receiver) Ken Burroughs. (Tight end) Mike Barber is a good weapon for them. And

the Oilers have some other backs who can hurt you, too. "When you start to concentrate on one player, it hurts you more than it helps." Gradishar and the rest of the Broncos expect Houston to make liberal use of play-action passes. "They'll give the ball to Campbell three or four times in a row, and then they'll fake to him and pass," said Denver Coach Red Miller. The effect is to momentarily freeze Denver's aggressive, active linebackers, delaying their ability to drop back into pass coverage. "With Campbell in the backfield, you have to respect him," Gradishar said. "And Pastorini has shown good touch on his passes. He used to get impatient and throw the bomb all the

time, but now he hits medium-range passes and dump-off passes to his backs equally as well. I think Earl's presence back there has eased Pastorini's mind, made him more relaxed." Gradishar, the NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 1978, was troubled by an assortment of injuries earlier this season. Only in the past month has he felt he played up to his potential. In Monday night's 17-7 loss to San Diego, he led the Broncos with 10 tackles and four assists. While Denver's defense has been solid all year against the run, the Broncos have been more vulnerable through the air. Some have attributed that weakness to the lack of a pass rush. The Broncos have only 19 sacks this season — last in the league.

Houston Coach Bum Phillips attaches little importance to that statistic. "Denver would rather go for the interception, dropping eight men into pass coverage," said Phillips. "They don't emphasize sacks. A lot of teams who have more sacks will be home, watching the Broncos on television this Sunday." Denver's offense became more pass-oriented this season, with Craig Morton having a hot hand during a mid-season stretch that saw the Broncos win six of seven games. "The best thing about Denver's offense is Craig Morton," said Phillips. "That guy knows how to call a football game." But Morton has been troubled by interceptions in recent games, throwing 10 in his last four outings.

# Eagles are intense as playoff nears

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The city shoveled the snow from the Veterans Stadium carpet so coach Dick Vermeil could get his team ready for Sunday's first round National Football League playoff game against the Chicago Bears. With the snowbanks on the sidelines as a backdrop, gloves on their hands, and a burning inside to prove they really are one of pro football's best, the Eagles are driving through intensive three-hour practices. Both Vermeil and his team believe this is a much better squad mentally and physically than the one last year which lost to Atlanta, 14-13, in the first round of the playoffs. Defensive back Bobby Howard says the 1979 Eagles won't go to pieces as last year's team did in the final quarter after building a 13-0 lead. Howard says the Eagles now are ready and able to face adversity. Howard recalled how the pressure built in Atlanta and how he and his teammates could feel that pressure. "It boggles the mind," said Howard who has intercepted three passes in the Eagles' 11-5 season. "But it's much easier the second time around." Vermeil tries to hide it, but he exudes confidence that his team can

handle the Bears before an expected sellout crowd of 71,000 and a national television audience. He insists there is no comparison between this year's Eagles and the 1978 club. The coach ticks off his reasons, declaring the Eagles are sounder in the kicking game, have a better pass defense, the offensive tackles have developed into Pro Bowl selections, the quarterback is more experienced, the tight end is healthy, rookie linebacker Jerry Robinson has developed into a standout, and running back Wilbert Montgomery has matured. Vermeil also points out that beating teams such as Pittsburgh, Dallas and Washington has built a quiet confidence and resolution within his ranks. He says it's a team that believes it can win against anybody in the NFL. Vermeil says further that this game is at home, and those 71,000 screaming partisans are a part of his game plan. This is the Eagles' first playoff home game in 19 years. He notes that last year the Eagles were just thrilled to be in the playoffs. This time they expected to be there and expect to win. The kicking game is in the foot of rookie Tony Franklin, the barefoot booter from Texas.

# Anderson nabs rookie title

NEW YORK (AP) — Otis Anderson, who demolished the National Football League rushing record set a year ago by Earl Campbell, was named the NFL's Offensive Rookie of the Year Friday by The Associated Press.

It was literally a runaway for the 6-foot-2, 210-pounder from the University of Miami. Anderson amassed all but three of the 84 votes cast by a nationwide panel of sports writers and sports broadcasters, three in each league city. The three remaining votes went to Phil Simms, quarterback of the New York Giants.

Anderson finished the 1979 season with 1,605 yards rushing, shattering the rookie record of 1,450 yards by Campbell, the rushing champion last year and, with 1,697 yards, this year, too.

Anderson challenged for the NFL rushing title before a twisted knee knocked him out of last Sunday's regular-season finale with just 39 yards gained. In Houston, Campbell gained 134 yards to surpass Anderson, who finished third in the rushing race, five yards behind Chicago's Walter Payton.

Anderson, nicknamed O.J. (his middle name is Jerome), was the first 1,000-yard rusher in the 53-year history of the University of Miami, his 1,266 yards surpassing the school record of 951 set eight years ago by Chuck Foreman, and is Miami's all-time rusher with 3,331 yards.

He was the Cardinals' No. 1 pick in the draft, the eighth player selected overall, but even they couldn't have been prepared for the kind of debut he made. In their opener against Dallas, Anderson plowed through the Cowboys for 193 yards, just one yard short of the record for a first pro game set in 1955 by Baltimore's great Alan Ameche.

"People said before the draft that there was no Earl Campbell or Tony Dorsett out there," Theotis Brown, another St. Louis rookie running back and Anderson's roommate, said.

"What they didn't know was that there was an Otis Anderson."

That 193-yard debut started Anderson on the road to a season that demolished Jim Otis' 1975 club record of 1,076 yards. Along the way, Anderson gained 100 yards or more nine times, breaking the NFL rookie record of seven and tying the Cardinals' career record. It took Otis five years to achieve the same feat for St. Louis. He is the first NFL rookie ever to average 100 yards a game.

"When O.J. runs the ball you can feel the surge of power behind you," St. Louis center Tom Banks said. "He comes blowing through like a runaway truck."

Simms was New York's No. 1 draft choice (seventh overall, just ahead of Anderson) out of obscure Morehead State in Kentucky. He became a starter after the Giants lost their first five games and guided them to six victories in their remaining 11 games, throwing 13 touchdown passes in the process.

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — The Buffalo Bills never may find out how their No. 1 draft pick in 1979 would have done in the National Football League, but they're sure they got a good line-backer in the second round.

The top choice, of course, was Ohio State's Tom Cousineau, whose defection to Montreal of the Canadian Football League cast a pall over the Bills training camp until Jim Haslett filled the vacuum.

For his 124 tackles this year — 75 of them solo — two pass interceptions in a key game against New England and generally battering Buffalo opponents, Haslett, was named Friday as the Associated Press' NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

# Times change for Penn State

The last time Penn State played in a college football bowl game, the national championship was at stake. But times have changed for the Nittany Lions, who go into Saturday's Liberty Bowl against Tulane without a ranking to worry them.

State has struggled through a 7-4

season that has tumbled Coach Joe Paterno's club out of the nation's Top 20 teams. The Lions can regain some prestige though against No. 15 Tulane at Memphis in one of three bowl games scheduled for Saturday. In the others, No. 11 Texas faces No. 13 Washington in the Sun Bowl at El Paso, while unranked Wake Forest and Louisiana State, meet in the Tangerine Bowl at Orlando.

Still ahead next week are the Blue-Gray all-star game at Montgomery, Ala., and the Fiesta Bowl at Tempe, Ariz., matching No. 10 Pittsburgh and unranked Arizona, both on Christmas Day; the Gator Bowl with No. 14 Michigan against unranked North Carolina at Jacksonville, Dec. 28; and the Hall of Fame Bowl at Birmingham Dec. 29 with No. 16 South Carolina facing unranked Missouri.

On New Year's Eve, the menu lists the Peach Bowl at Atlanta with No. 19 Baylor against No. 18 Clemson; and the Bluebonnet Bowl at Houston with No. 12 Purdue against unranked Tennessee.

The four biggest bowls, of course, are scheduled for New Year's Day. The Rose Bowl at Pasadena has No. 1 Ohio State putting its unbeaten record on the line against No. 3 Southern California, which comes in at 10-0-1. At Dallas, the Cotton Bowl offers No. 7 Nebraska against No. 8 Houston, with both teams carrying 10-1 records. Oklahoma, 10-1 and ranked No. 5, faces 11-0 Florida State, ranked No. 4, in the Orange Bowl at Miami, and defending national champion Alabama, 11-0 and ranked second, goes against No. 6 Arkansas, 10-1, in the Sugar Bowl at New Orleans.

The Sugar Bowl will be a return engagement for the Crimson Tide, who won the national title there last Jan. 1 by defeating Penn State. Alabama was in the same situation then as now — No. 2 in the rankings. But plenty has changed for Penn State, which was No. 1 before that game a year ago.

The Liberty Bowl is the ninth straight post-season date for Penn State and a victory could salvage an otherwise troubled season.

The Nittany Lions face a Tulane team that had its first winning season in six years and is playing in its first bowl since 1973.

# Ashe set for comeback after heart operation

NEW YORK (AP) — Arthur Ashe did not announce his retirement from tennis Friday, but rather another comeback — this one only eight days after undergoing a quadruple bypass heart operation.

"I think you'll see me playing Wimbledon in June," said Ashe, who suffered a heart attack July 31. The 36-year-old tennis star then began a rehabilitation program but suffered renewed chest pains earlier this month.

Tests revealed that Ashe had blockage around four of his arteries, necessitating the three-hour bypass operation. The procedure was performed by a team of surgeons, headed by Dr. John E. Hutchinson, Dec. 13.

Dr. Hutchinson and Ashe, looking wan and suffering from anemia, met the media at St. Luke's Hospital Friday. Ashe revealed two long scars on his legs from the necessary skin grafts and a 10-inch vertical incision from his navel to his clavicle.

"The purpose of the bypass was to get blood around the blocks," said Dr. Hutchinson, referring to several charts of the heart. "I anticipate now

a normal flow of blood to the heart and that it can be stressed to a significant degree."

Dr. Hutchinson said Ashe has his blessing to attempt a tennis comeback. "The proof of the pudding will be his reaction to stress," he said. "It was a good thing he had an athlete's heart. It sustained him through his acute condition."

"I've never performed this operation on an athlete in the speak of his professional career before, just persons over the hill. I think Mr. Ashe's circumstances are quite unusual."

Dr. Hutchinson said he thought Ashe's heart problems were hereditary. Ashe's father has suffered two heart attacks and a bypass operation is being considered for him.

Ashe, who expects to be released from the hospital soon, plans to begin light exercising early in January. "My training plans revolve around very formal stress tests," he said. "I will, in effect, go to the tennis courts hooked up with a monitor. If I'm doing well, I'll keep going. If I'm not going so well, I'll stop. By next summer, we'll know."

# Homeowner nabs player

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — A 19-year-old Penn State football player was charged with burglary Friday after he was captured by a homeowner armed with a large-caliber pistol.

William Rene LeBlanc, who was in Memphis with members of Penn State's Liberty Bowl team, was apprehended shortly after 5 a.m. Friday by William M. Seal, 32. He was held under \$2,500 bond pending a City Court hearing Monday morning.

Seal said he was awakened at his home by footsteps and found a man in his bedroom. He told police he picked up his .357-magnum revolver and ordered the intruder to surrender.

Seal said the burglar advanced toward him, but stopped and surrendered when he fired a single shot into the floor at his feet.

Police said LeBlanc told them he had been at a nearby tavern with

other members of the team when he became separated from his companions.

Gallagher rolls first 800

Brent Gallagher, a 19-year-old Midland College student, put his stamp on a page of Midland history this week by rolling the Tall City's first 800 series, an 805, while competing in the Dellwood Mixed League at Air Park Lanes.

Brent started the evening with a 251 game, finishing with strikes on five of the last six deliveries. Then in the second game, Gallagher started stringing strikes and fans alike. By the tenth frame, Gallagher was still throwing strikes and bowlers started gathering, hoping to see a perfect in action. They were not disappointed as the lanky kegler put the last two deliveries in the pocket and carried 10 both times to bring an ovation from the 120 bowlers on hand.

GALLAGHER WASN'T through, however. He started the third game with seven strikes in a row before leaving a 10-pin to end his string at 19 strikes in a row. He finished with a 254 for the brilliant, 805 series.

Brent was admittedly nervous rolling the 11th ball in the perfect game. "I was so scared I didn't think my legs would move or my arms could swing the ball out into the lane," Gallagher said. "But then I started to move and the ball was moving on the lane and into the pocket, and I had a 300 game. That

was something I have been close to so many times, but could never quite reach."

After the 251 opener and the perfect 300 game, the 800 series was on Brent's mind and he was off to a good start with seven strikes in a row in the third game before trouble hit. In the 10th frame of the final game, Gallagher left a 10-pin and he needed a spare for the 800.

"I WAS fully aware that I had to have that 10-pin for the 800. I had been hoping for a strike in the last frame, so when I went to deliver the ball, I made extra sure that I converted the spare," Gallagher stated.

The week leading up to the 800 series for Gallagher was also the most outstanding week for a bowler in Midland. It began with a 633 series in the Air Park Scratch League, and then the numbers started to roll.

Two nights later in the Tall City Mixed League, Brent opened with a 719 series and followed in the City Mixed League with a 682. The next night Brent opened up in the Teacher's League with a 761 series on games of 277, 245 and 239 to set the new high for a series in the city, breaking Charlie Lacy's 759 total bowled earlier in the season. Brent followed in the Sugar & Spice League with a 706 series after opening with a 269 and closing with a 258 to reach the back-to-back 700 goal he had asked about earlier in the week.

GALLAGHER HAD asked during his hot streak if anyone in Midland had ever rolled back-to-back 700s. That had been a personal goal for Brent. There had never been back-to-back 700s on the same night.

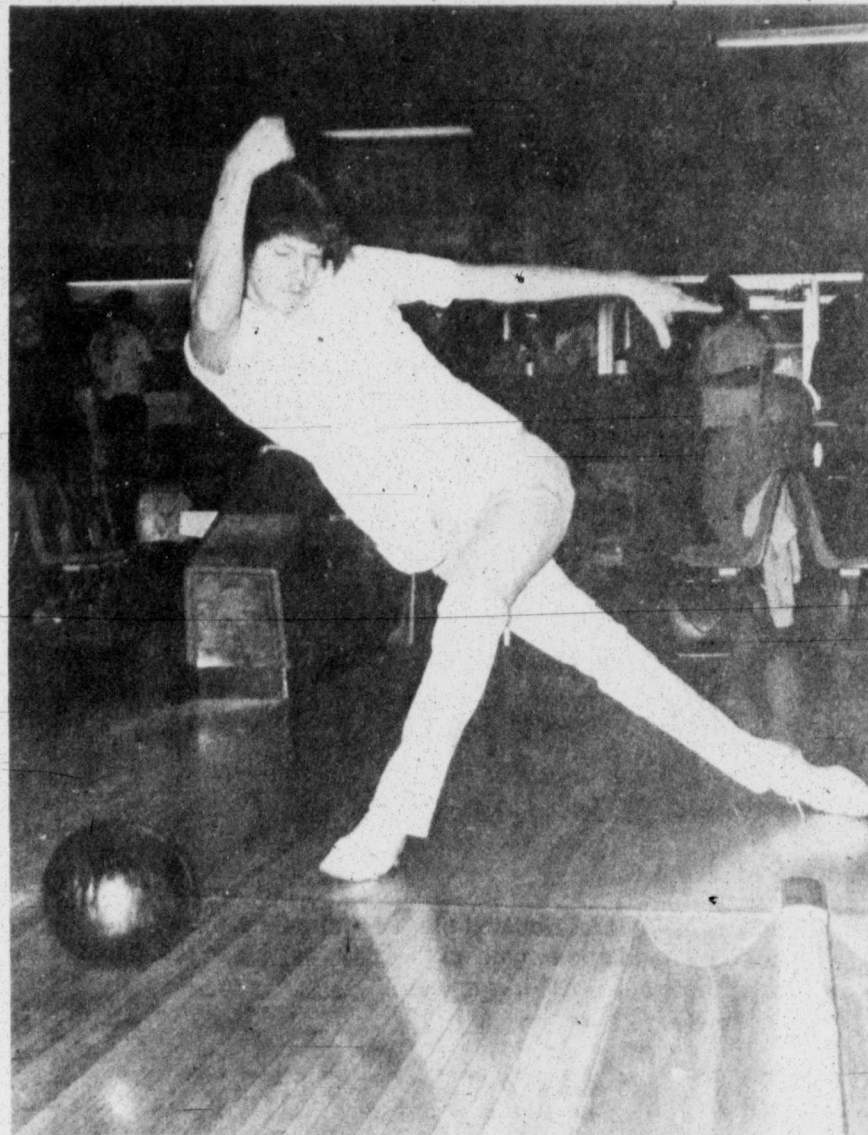
So now Brent has his back-to-back 700s and an 800 series to go along with it, and all in a week's time. That's quite a week by any standard.

Gallagher, who averaged 196 a year ago, would also like to average 200 for an entire season, and he is well on the way to that mark too with the year closing out. He has a 207 in the Air Park Scratch League and a 200-plus average in the other leagues that he is bowling in.

BRENT WOULD also like to bowl on the Pro Tour some day, and he has already competed in several PBA Regionals. He recently averaged 212 in the Quaker State Open Qualifying Tournament, but failed to make the cut.

Fellow Midlander and teammate Rick Daughtrey also competed at the quaker State and averaged 223, but did not make the finals either.

Gallagher is now preparing himself by bowling as much as possible, asking as many questions as he can think of and trying to get his mental game in shape. He was thinking right this past week.

Two WBL teams fold

NEW YORK (AP) — The Women's Professional Basketball League, midway through its second season, announced Friday that the Washington Metros and Philadelphia Fox franchises have suspended operations due to insufficient funds.

League Director of Communications Burt Schultz confirmed that the two teams, which had been operated by the league since Dec. 1, had folded as of 1 p.m. EST. "We felt it would be best for all concerned to consolidate to 12 teams," said Schultz.

The Fox, which drew a total of less than 1,000 fans to its first three home games at the Philadelphia Civic Center, had financial trouble from the start of the season.

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Price never knew real 'Lam' Jones

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Less than four years after Johnny "Lam" Jones came to the University of Texas as an Olympic gold medal winner, the graceful sprinter and football star is prematurely leaving as a mystery man to his coaches.

Cleburne Price, UT track coach, said Friday he had been told Jones plans to drop out of school and will not run track this spring for the Longhorns.

Jones also will pass up the Olympic trials, apparently to seek a pro football career, Price said. "I've only had him one year in four years that he's been here, so it doesn't surprise me that much," Price said.

The coach said he heard of Jones' decision from several persons who had talked with the Lampasas native.

The Austin American-Statesman reported Friday that Assistant Athletic Director Bill Ellington was told by Jones last month of the decision to quit after the current semester.

Jones also dropped out of school last spring but returned for his senior season in football.

Jones is in El Paso for Saturday's Sun Bowl game with Washington. The record-setting wide receiver probably will be on the sidelines due to a knee infection.

"Everybody expected him to walk on water, to never lose a race," Ellington told the newspaper. "He just burned out. He's tired."

Jones did just about everything except walk on water during his freshman track season. He capped it with a record 29 points at the Southwest Conference meet. He won the 100 and 220-yard dashes, took fourth in the long jump and anchored the Longhorns' winning 400-yard and mile relay teams.

He has the 10 fastest 100-meter dashes and five of the top six 200-meter times in UT history.

Jones also holds 10 football records. He has averaged 11.3 yards every time he has touched the ball.

Price said he never felt he knew Jones — "I just couldn't put it together. I think Johnny just did not like the kind of individual pressure that the gold medal brought."

"I like Johnny, but I know him less than any athlete I've ever worked with. Johnny is one of the nicest, most sincere, most sensitive persons I've ever met or the biggest con artist, but I don't know which and I'm not sure I'll ever know," Price said. "I don't think Johnny Jones knows Johnny Jones."

The coach called it a "sin" that Jones' fluid stride will never again be seen in a Longhorn track uniform.

"He's burned a lot of bridges, but maybe they aren't important bridges," said Price.

"Earl Campbell loves Texas, and it was good to him. Johnny Jones is great, and so is UT. It was a good marriage, but I don't think he held-up his end."

Handicapped man triumphs upon easels

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Half his life ago, Eric Mohn was a baseball-playing teen-ager whose dreams were shattered in a car crash that paralyzed him.

Now, at 34, he is a prize-winning artist, painting with a brush held tightly in his teeth, and his watercolors, are commanding big prices at shows where not everybody knows he's handicapped.

"I never thought I'd have the patience," the Rockville, Md., man told a reporter at the first annual International Art Show for Artists with Physical Disabilities, sponsored by Moss Rehabilitation Hospital.

MOHN HAS BEEN in a wheelchair since the 1963 accident.

"But though it was frustrating, and the first year I threw everything away that I did, I learned to take my time. It shows that any talent a person has is in his head," he said.

Proof of that, Mohn said, is his signature on checks, now written with pen in teeth: "It is exactly the way I wrote it as a teen-ager 16 years ago. Can you believe it?"

Mohn said he holds the paint brush with his back teeth, because it's sturdier there, "but I go through brushes very quickly. I chew them up."

MARVIN LUNDY, chairman of Moss's social action committee, brought together the works of 35 artists with physical disabilities from the United States, France, Canada, West Germany, Japan, Sweden and Spain for a month-long exhibit ending Jan. 7.

There are oils, acrylics, watercolors, ink drawings and graphics.

"Their art is professional and all the more wonderful because they do it under greater difficulties," Lundy said. "I think this kind of exhibition will inspire other handicapped people to come out of the closet and display their talent. The handicapped can definitely compete."

Bonnie Gellman, 41, also wheelchair-bound and chairman of the city Office for the Handicapped, says it is important that there is no emphasis on disability.

"The art is allowed to stand on its own merits," she said. "There's nothing that says it was painted by an artist with his teeth, or with his feet. That's putting the emphasis on the right place — on the art, not the disabled."

MOHN HAS SOLD about 200 paintings since he turned to art in 1977, after selling a transportation service for the handicapped that he organized shortly after his crippling accident.

"I just do watercolors," he said. "I don't use oils because I can't handle the tubes. With water colors the stuff can sit around and I can come back to it without needing somebody to help me." Neita Kimmel, 36, Catawissa, Pa., was born with cerebral palsy and, like Mohn, paints with a brush in her teeth.

"It doesn't matter if we are disabled, we can produce," she said.

Among the foreign artists exhibited were Hiroko Kimura of Japan, who has cerebral palsy and paints with her left foot. Her delicate motifs of flowers and Japanese mythical topics have won many prizes.

Mykola Bidniak of Ontario, Canada, lost his hands in a 1945 explosion and five years later won a four-year scholarship to the Ontario College of Art.

BIDNIAK PAINTS with a brush in his mouth, as do these other internationally-exhibited artists — Manfred Kijcek of Alberta, Canada, paralyzed by polio in 1960; Elof Lundberg, Tyero, Sweden, born a paraplegic; Irene Schrickler, West Germany, a polio victim who recently won one of France's highest art awards, and Cristobal Toledo of Spain, a muscular dystrophy victim.

"We don't believe that a physical handicap stops the progress of living and doing," said Dr. Bernard Albert, assistant director at Moss. "This extraordinary exhibit showcases the creativity and resourcefulness of handicapped people."

"By allowing the public to peek behind their easels, and to witness their ingenuity on the canvas, the artist is contributing to the change in social attitude many have held about the handicapped, feeling that they cannot make it on their own."

"The exhibit should inspire imagination of other people and institutions in generating greater social understanding of those who have physical disabilities."

"THE COMMUNITY for too long has held stereotyped views which often are a handicap to the handicapped."

Jack Bookbinder — a painter, a former chairman of the art department of the Philadelphia Public Schools and one of the three judges — said he was surprised by the excellence of the works.

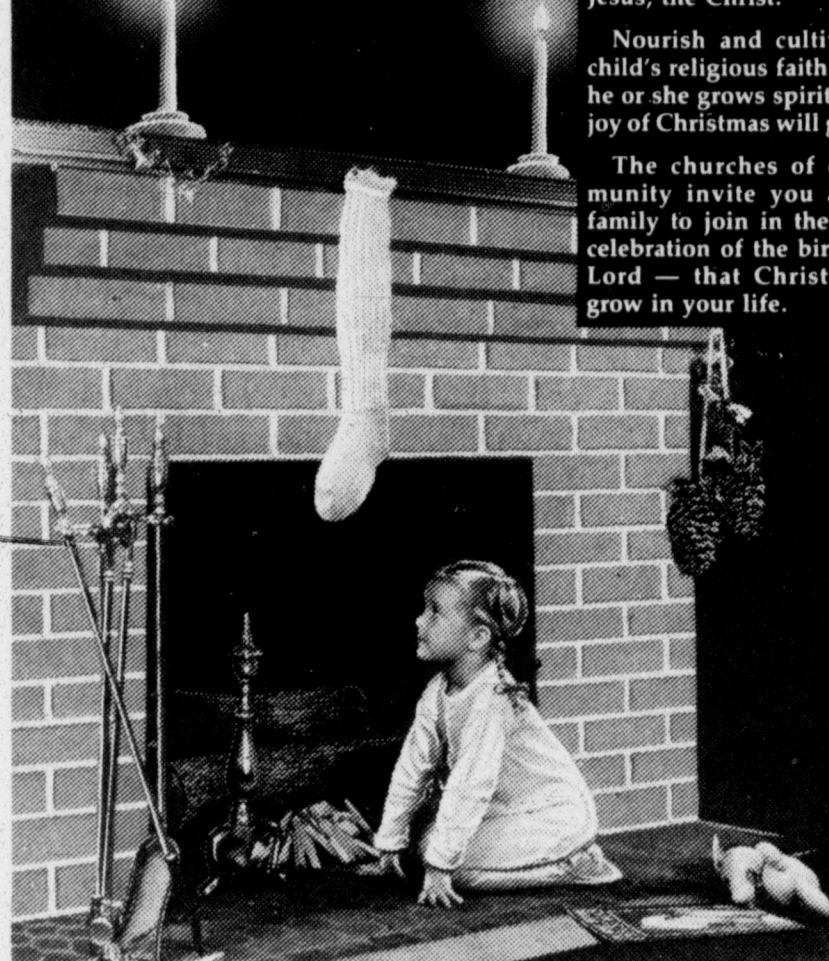

The church's annual Christmas Eve service of communion will begin at 6:30 p.m. Monday. A special highlight of the service will be the lighting of the Christ candle.

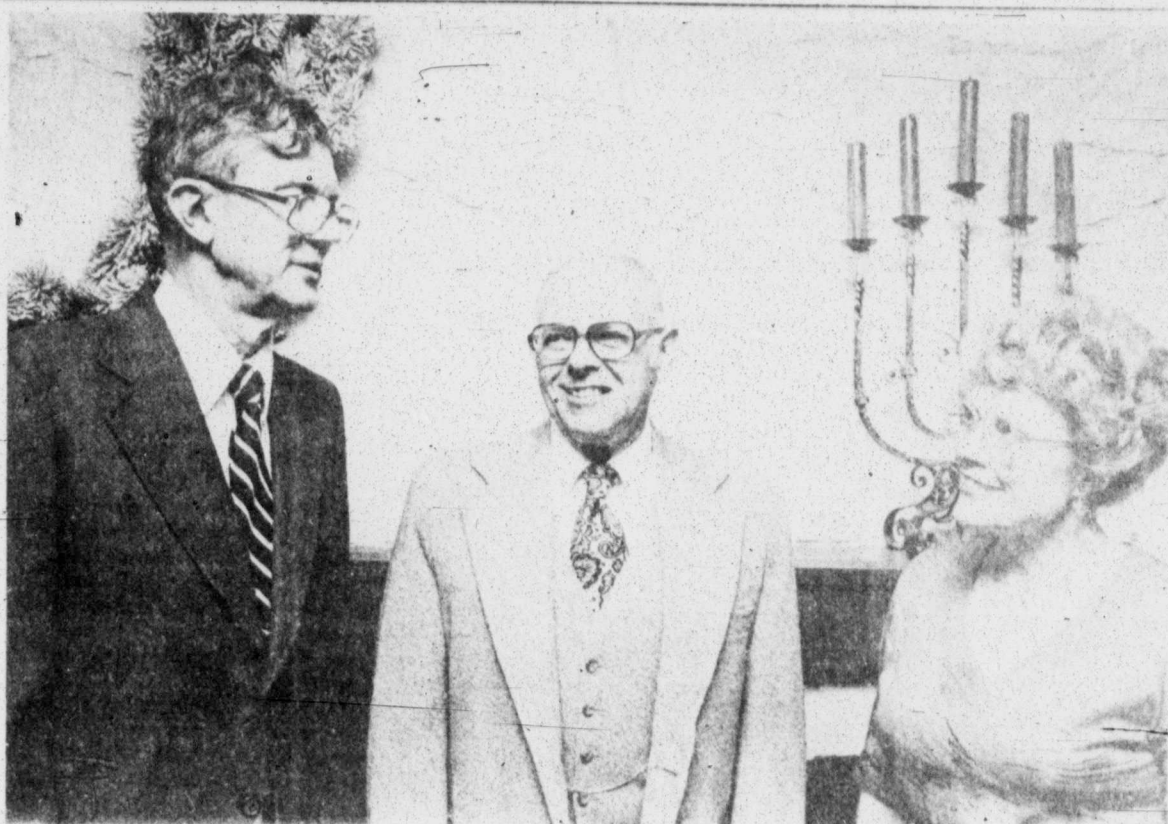
## Midland Lutheran Church schedules two identical Christmas services

### Criswell to present higher-level program

BIG SPRING — Criswell Institute for Biblical Studies, a part of the ministry of First Baptist Church in Dallas, is planning a college-level educational program in Big Spring in early 1980.

According to the Rev. Phillip McClendon, pastor of Hillcrest Baptist Church of Big Spring, the program will be offered if there is sufficient interest in this region to support it. Persons interested in enrolling in the institute, or in learning more about the course offerings, are invited to contact McClendon at 263-7127.

According to McClendon, the Criswell Institute offers three- and four-year programs for bachelor's degrees, and it recently developed a master's degree program.

He said that if enough interest is shown to get some classes started in Big Spring, the program would allow enrollees to get basic courses from Howard College while receiving Biblical training from the Criswell Center.

McClendon is looking for enough interest to make it financially feasible to bring the instruction to Big Spring. In the beginning, he said, it would involve flying professors from Dallas to conduct classes. Ultimately, he said, he would hope the school here would be large enough to have its own professors.

McClendon said the local program would begin with just a few course offerings in January. An introductory course to the scriptures will probably be offered. In addition, if there is sufficient interest, introductory courses to the Old Testament and New Testament also would be offered.

### PBS to show 'The Joy of Bach'

When "The Joy of Bach" is presented over PBS-TV, Channel 13, at 7 p.m. Sunday, members of Midland's various Lutheran churches will have a special interest in the program.

Johann Sebastian Bach, the 18th Century composer featured in the film, is one of the most famous Lutherans in history.

PBS's one-hour celebration of Bach's life and music was produced under sponsorship of Lutheran congregations throughout the U.S., through an agency known as Lutheran Film Associates. (An earlier LFA production, "Martin Luther," received numerous honors, including two Academy Award nominations.)

Beyond the predictable sounds of Bach's famous Christmas Oratorio and monumental St. John Passion, the PBS telecast will present such offbeat sights and sounds as famed organist Virgil Fox's "Heavy Organ and Light Show," a Trinidad steel band performing Bach's "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring," a flamenco dancer ornamenting a Bach fugue and even disco dancers twirling to a contemporary setting of an excerpt of a Bach concerto.

The filming of "The Joy of Bach" took place variously in the U.S., Canada, Britain, France and East Germany. The historical vignettes in the film were photographed in authentic German settings reflecting church and court life of the early 18th Century. In Leipzig, for example, Lutheran Film Associates was able to place cameras in the 700-year-old St. Thomas Church, where Bach was music director for more than 25 years.

### Rev. James elected to CLC

DALLAS — The Rev. Kenneth James, pastor of Midland's Crestview Baptist Church, has been elected to the Christian Life Commission of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

James was named to the post during a recent meeting of the BGCT's 192-member Executive Board. The board conducts the business of the 2 million-member BGCT between annual sessions.

The BGCT, the Texas organization of Southern Baptists, owns and operates eight colleges and universities, an academy, eight hospitals and four children's homes. The work is supported by the BGCT's 4,400 churches and missions in the state, which will give more than \$31 million this year through BGCT's Cooperative Program.

In addition to supporting hospitals and schools, the BGCT helps support the work of more than 5,000 Southern Baptist missionaries in the U.S. and in 94 other nations.



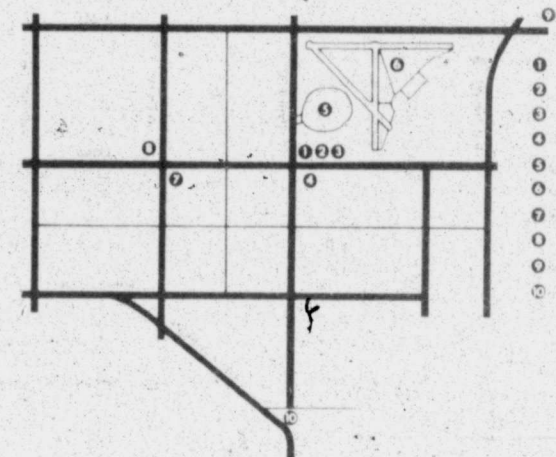
