with the gasoline ration plan to start May 15.

On delivery service, the ODT issued a general order forbidding special deliveries and "call backs" and placed a limit on the number and mileage of local delivery ser-vices. More than one delivery a day to a person is forbidden, and special deliveries can be made only to hospitals and the armed services and where they are necessary to the public health life and safety. The order is ef-fective May 15. And it applies May 15.

Installation of telephones was brought under strict control by a WPB order. It provides that new service may be denied except to persons or organizations engaged in direct war work, or in occupations essential to the public welfare. Others can't expect service unless it can be provided without disrupting essential service. The order was necessary to conserve large, quantities of critical materials and is expected to result in an annual saving of \$5,000 tons of lead, \$4,000 tons of copper, \$5,000 tons of iron and steel, and large amounts of other materials needed in the War Program.


