I — INTRODUCTION. Here's where you pray that the master of ceremonies goes by the biographical data you've given him. Instruct your friends not to talk to him if he calls.

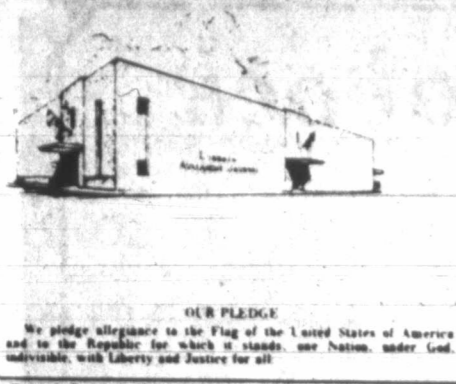

Plans For New State Park Reviewed

AUSTIN — The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has been briefed on the initial development concept plan for the proposed Caprock Canyon State Park to be located in Briscoe County.

Jim Cox, information director for the Parks and Wildlife Department, said \$2.5 million has been allocated for the park project.

The concept plan presented to the commission Wednesday includes maintenance facilities, a headquarters building, an amphitheater, parking areas, nature and hiking trails, picnic sites, a swimming area, a boat ramp, a fishing pier, campsites and other facilities, Cox said.

The purpose of the concept plans is to maximize park facilities with the funding available, Cox said.

Distribution Line To Be Relocated

AUSTIN — The Public Utility Commission has granted Southwestern Public Service Co. an amended certificate of convenience and necessity to permit the relocation of a 12 kilovolt distribution line within Hockley County.

Southwestern is seeking to replace an existing line which is no longer adequate to service the demand for electricity.

The new line will run through an area served by Lyntegar Electric Cooperative and will connect two areas served by Southwestern.

Estimated cost of the project is \$69,548. Southwestern will not be certified to serve any customers within Lyntegar's service area.

Notices Mailed To Land Owners

Tax notices were mailed Monday to the approximately 60,000 persons who own property in Lubbock County.

Monday also was the first day that 1979 ad valorem taxes could be paid. Tax Assessor-Collector Frank Stuart said.

"We have not spotted any problem areas at all," Stuart said of the mail-out, which is being handled entirely on the newly installed county computer system this year. "We're well satisfied

with the way it's looking at this time," he said.

Lubbock County taxes about 90,000 parcels of land.

Property owners who pay their taxes in October will get a 3-percent discount. The discount drops to 2 percent in November and 1 percent in December.

After January, when the face amount of the notice will be due, there is a penalty of 1/2 of one percent per month.

Two Men Charged In Shootings

HONAKER, Va. (AP) — Two men charged in the shotgun killings of three people in their homes are to be arraigned Tuesday in Russell County General District Court.

Donald Wayne Hess, about 24, and Charles Musick, 19, both of Honaker, were each charged with three counts of murder in the killings early Sunday.

Musick was held in lieu of \$50,000 bond, and Hess' bond was \$25,000.

A Russell County deputy said Monday the case was still under investigation. State police Investigator R.M. Owens said preliminary information indicated that Hess may have obtained information linking the three victims to the killing of his brother, James Hess, whose death last January was ruled a suicide.

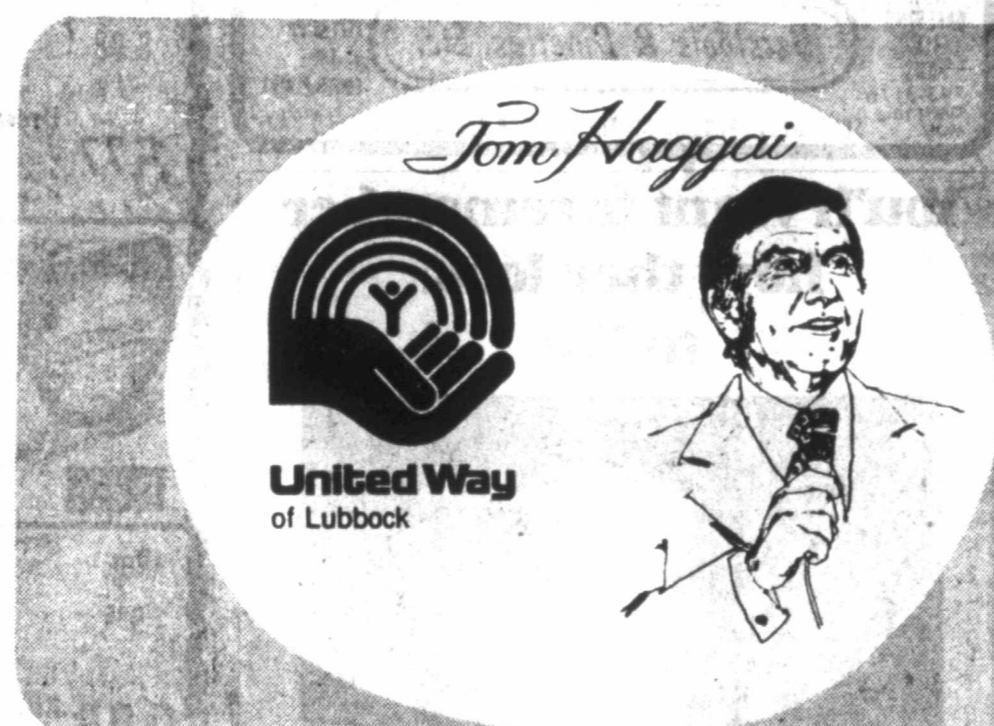

TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH

BY DR. PAUL G. DONOHUE

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am getting very discouraged that my blood pressure after five months of treatment is only down to 170/98 from 200/105. I take medicine for it. I also have Meniere's disease and a stomach ulcer that is not healing and am also on medicine for the ulcer. Can you please give me advice as to what I should do? I do not eat salt or sweets and don't smoke. I am 51 and weigh 120. — Mrs. W.P.

There is a mistaken notion that the successful treatment of blood pressure always means bringing it down to 120/80 or to some other nice-looking figure one sees in tables. That just is not so.

It can be dangerous to try to lower a person's pressure to normal levels. You have a case complicated by other medical conditions — Meniere's (an ear dis-

ease) and gastric ulcer. Perhaps the blood pressure you have now (170/98) is as low as can be safely obtained for you at the present time. The things you are doing — as eliminating salt and cigaret smoking and watching your weight — are as important in treating blood pressure as the medicines you are taking.

Sometimes medicine has to settle for the possible, which often enough is quite short of the "ideal."

Dear Dr. Donohue: Some time ago my wife was diagnosed as having trichomonas vaginal infection and that I could have been a carrier of the organism for this infection. My question is: How and where could I have picked up this organism, and if I picked it up from her where could she have picked it up? — L.A.

You could have "picked it up" from your wife and she need not have picked it up from anyone. It can occur in women who are not sexually active at all. This answer may save other marriages from the shoals of suspicion. The booklet, "Vaginitis: The Hidden Ailment," will answer some of your other questions (deleted). Dear Dr. Donohue: I have read of the dangers of bee stings for persons especially sensitive, and you discussed it recently. Is the bee venom that's injected in desensitization effective? What kind of a doctor would be best to see about this? How expensive is it? — B.L.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Are identical twins always of the same sex, either boys or girls? — B.C.

Yes, because identical twins develop from a single fertilized egg.

Super, Tina! We don't realize the value of these keepsakes until they are accidentally destroyed. — Heloise

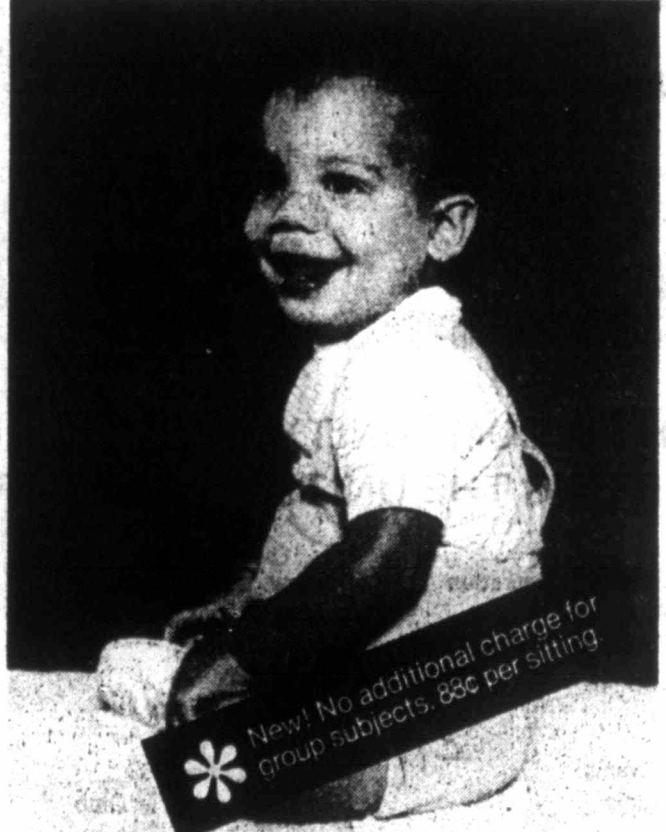

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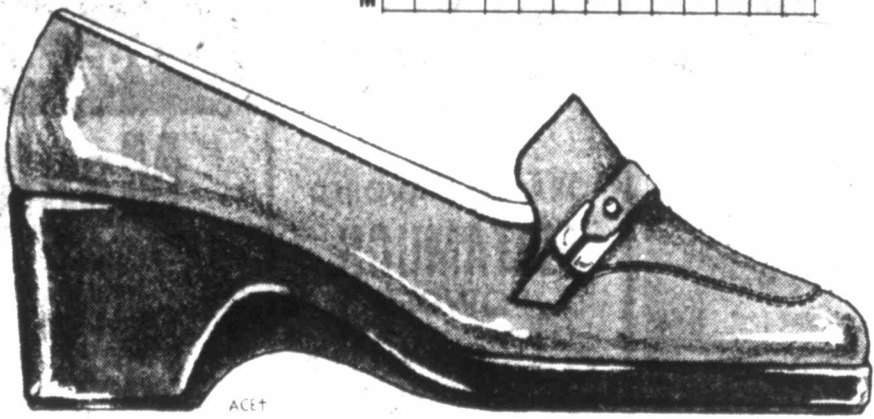

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial issues was off 7.93 to 870.65 at 2 p.m.

Declining issues led those advancing on the New York Stock Exchange by a 3-1 margin.

The price of gold broke through the \$400-an-ounce barrier and closed at about \$413 an ounce in Zurich and London today, while the dollar was mixed.

The chairman of Chase Manhattan Bank, Donald C. Platten, said that the prime lending rate has "not quite yet reached the peak."

The prime — charged by banks on loans to their best corporate customers — now stands at 13 1/2 percent and has been rising steadily in recent weeks as the Federal Reserve tightens credit in an attempt to stem inflation.

New System Makes Listening Easy

NEW YORK (AP) - Now the hard-of-hearing can hear the sound of music on Broadway clearly, perhaps for the first time. A new sound system based on invisible infrared light lets theatergoers at the new musical 'Peter Pan' hear as well in the back row as if they were up front, without wires or plugs.

For people with a severe hearing loss, there's a special headphone that sends the signal directly into their hearing aides. But why infrared light? Two reasons. First, there's no static interference, as you might get with radio waves. Second, infrared light bounces around enough so that the reception is clear even if the listener sits low in the seat or behind a row of big people.

Sign Issue Question Still Remains

Although the U.S. Supreme Court refused Monday to hear an appeal of a decision upholding Lubbock's four-year-old sign regulations, one issue in the case remains unresolved, lawyers for both sides agree.

The court refused to hear a Lubbock Poster Company appeal of a Jan. 17 ruling by the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals which upheld the city's right to establish a "reasonable" amortization period during which sign owners could recoup their original investments.

However, 1978 amendments to the U.S. Highway Beautification Act muddied the legal waters and made it possible that sign companies may have to be compensated for signs on certain federal highways, but not on most city streets, Assistant City Attorney Jim Brewster said.

Court decisions almost unanimously have upheld the principle of amortization, Brewster said, but the billboard industry was successful in getting Congress to change the rules.

The 1978 amendments to the highway act say sign companies must be compensated for the removal of signs on federal interstate and primary highways, Brewster said.

But the burden to pay the sign owners falls on the state, not local governments, he said.

Although Brewster says the signs not regulated under the Highway Beautification Act "clearly are subject to amortization," he added, "I have a feeling those on federal primary and interstate highways can't be amortized."

That issue may have to be settled in a "better case" in the future, he said.

Lubbock Poster attorney Don Hunt agreed, and speculated the Supreme

Court may have felt "this was not the case" in which to rule on the highway act amendments.

Hunt said he believes someone will be compelled to pay for the signs which must be removed by Jan. 1, 1982, or the state of Texas may lose 10 percent of its federal highway funds.

"We still believe some compensation must be paid for those signs on interstate highways and primary highways," he said.

However, Brewster said the billboards on the more than 40 miles of primary or interstate highways in Lubbock "are a pretty small portion of the total."

Excluded from that category would be most of the city's major thoroughfares such as 50th Street, 34th Street, Avenue Q, Indiana Avenue, Slide Road and Quaker Avenue.

The major city streets which would fall under the designation, Brewster said, are Interstate 27 (not yet built), Loop 289 and Avenue A.

Lubbock Poster has estimated it owns 285 billboards in the city, 217 of which cannot be brought into compliance with city sign regulations. Those signs have a total fair market value of \$710,000, the sign company has estimated, and would cost \$132,000 to remove.

City Planning Director Jim Bertram said he was "very encouraged" by the court's decision because it would discourage further challenges of the regulations, enacted in July 1975.

Bertram said the "reasonableness and legality of the ordinance had been in doubt, but has been upheld across the board."

The regulations "have done a great deal toward improving the image of Lubbock," Bertram said, adding that he has "before and after" slides to prove it. Because the city's regulations were

the first of their kind to be upheld in Texas, there has been much interest from other cities in adopting a similar ordinance.

Bertram and Brewster also have received requests for information about the ordinance from cities in Kansas, Illinois, Florida, from both the state of California and Los Angeles, and from Little Rock, Ark.

Lubbock Poster filed suit against the city shortly after the new sign regulations were enacted, challenging the city's right to require existing signs to be brought into compliance with the law by Jan. 1, 1982, or be removed with no compensation.

Attorneys for Lubbock Poster argued the regulations deprived the company of due process, denied freedom of speech to commercial advertisers and amounted to seizure of company property without just compensation.

After the regulations were upheld by the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals, the Texas Supreme Court refused to alter the opinion.

Lubbock Poster could file a motion for rehearing with the U.S. Supreme Court, but Hunt said the company does not plan to do so.

Treasurer Elected To Post

Lubbock County Treasurer Connie Nicholson has been elected president of the Texas County Treasurers Association.

She begins her term this week after being elected unanimously at the annual conference of the organization last week in Dallas.

As president of the association, which includes the treasurers of all 254 Texas counties, Mrs. Nicholson will go to College Station in November to plan the annual state seminar for county treasurers.

The seminar is held each spring. Mrs. Nicholson had been on the association board of directors for two years but had not held statewide office. She is only the second county treasurer from the Panhandle-South Plains to head the organization — the now-retired Ava Johnson of Dickens County was chosen in 1969 — in its 31-year history.

The 46-year-old Littlefield native was nominated by the nominating committee of the group and elected by acclamation at the convention at the Adolphus Hotel in Dallas.

WEATHER BALLOON SCARE
HOUSTON (AP) — A 400-foot weather balloon carrying scientific equipment prompted hundreds of telephone calls to police Sunday night. Fred Jennings of the Federal Aviation Administration's approach control tower at Houston Intercontinental said the balloon was launched Saturday by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration at Palestine. He said the balloon had been scheduled to touch down in the San Angelo area Sunday afternoon. Jennings said the balloon, with run rays reflecting after dusk, was quite evident at an altitude of nearly 100,000 feet.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is another in a series of articles dealing with the United Way of Lubbock. The stories reflect actual case histories here.)

In an increasing number, parents, teachers and especially students are getting excited about the "Reading Is Fundamental" program in Lubbock and across the country.

Virginia Lauderdale, principal of Dupre Elementary and Rogene Lewis, librarian at the school, speak with enthusiasm about RIF and the boost it has given their students.

"The children clap when they know RIF day is coming," said Miss Lauderdale.

"Many of the children don't have books at home. The RIF book is their book that they can keep and they really get excited about it," Mrs. Lewis said.

RIF is supported by the United Way of Lubbock and will receive \$5,200 from the United Way's 1980 campaign goal of \$1,803,752.

According to Miss Lauderdale, the program visits Dupre school five times per year and distributes approximately 200 to 300 books.

Mary Lee Franklin, director of the RIF program in Lubbock, said the purpose of the program is to "try to encour-

age the owning of books and the reading. We're not in there to teach them to read, we're there to encourage them to want to read and to own books and to be able to pick them freely without restrictions.

The way the program works is, at least three times a year RIF volunteers take books to schools in the area and distribute them to students. This is usually done by displaying the books in the library and letting the children select their own book, according to Mrs.

Franklin.

Teachers bring in classes one at a time for approximately 30 minutes to give students a chance to examine all the books and make their choice. RIF volunteers and teachers are instructed not to interfere with a child's selection. The reason for this is that the program is designed to interest children in reading by letting them have books they want to read and making reading an enjoyable experience. After a child has chosen the book he wants, he then writes his name in the book and it becomes part of his own personal library. Miss Lauderdale said this idea appears to teach the student a sense of responsibility in ownership of property. She said that during last year's RIF program at Dupre all the students took care of their own book and respected each other's property. Also, she noted, none of the books were lost.

Mrs. Franklin said that originally the RIF program was set up for children who could not afford to buy their own books and were not exposed to books and reading in the home. Now, however, the program is being expanded and funded by several groups because of its value in getting elementary students interested in reading, even though they come from families who could afford

reading materials.

Miss Lauderdale and Mrs. Lewis said they feel the program is a smashing success with Dupre students. Both observed the excitement students had as RIF day approached. They both agreed that the students liked it every time and never seemed to get tired of it. Some, Mrs. Lewis said, even brought their books back to school after reading them and

wanted the teachers to read them aloud to the class.

Currently in the U.S. there are 94,000 RIF programs which distribute 11 million books annually. In Lubbock, 5,100 children have participated in the RIF program receiving more than 24,000 books, Mrs. Franklin said.

RIF is among 34 United Way supported agencies.

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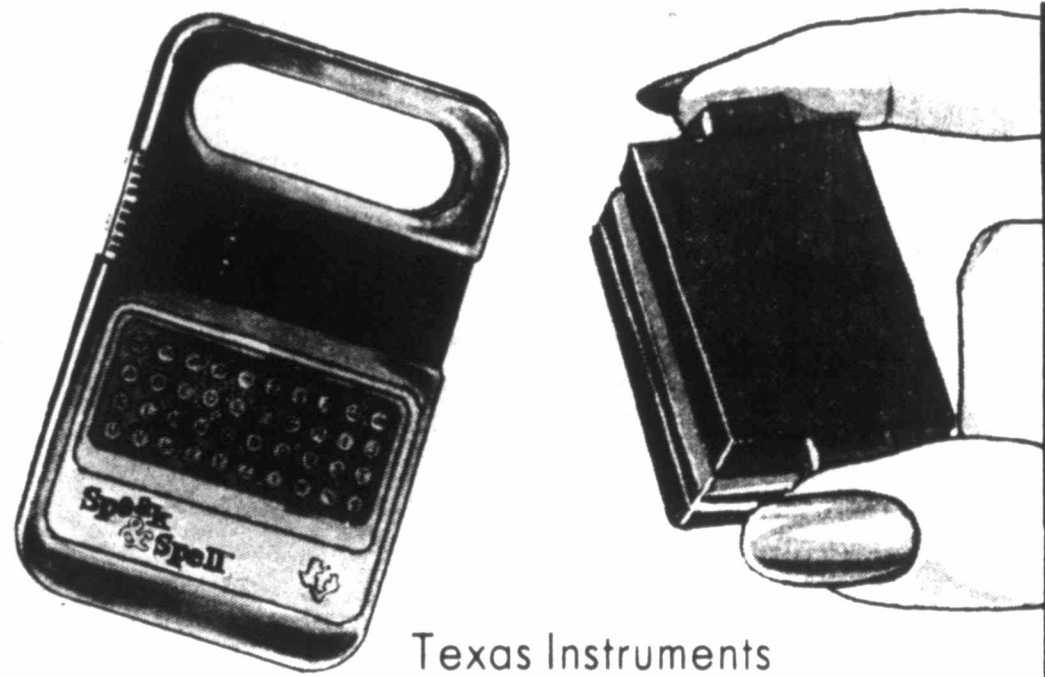
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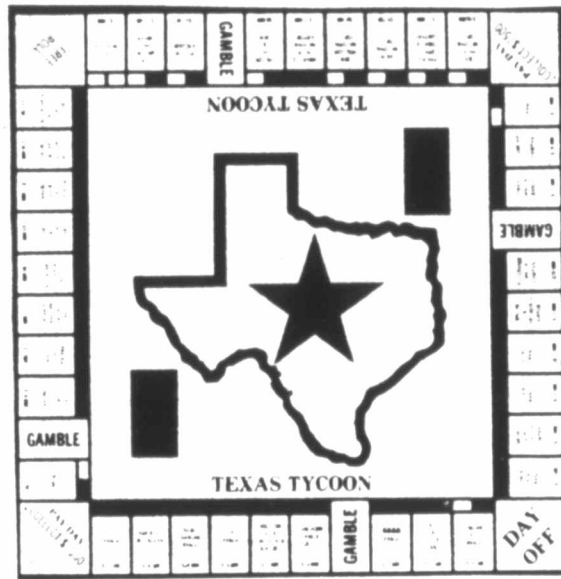
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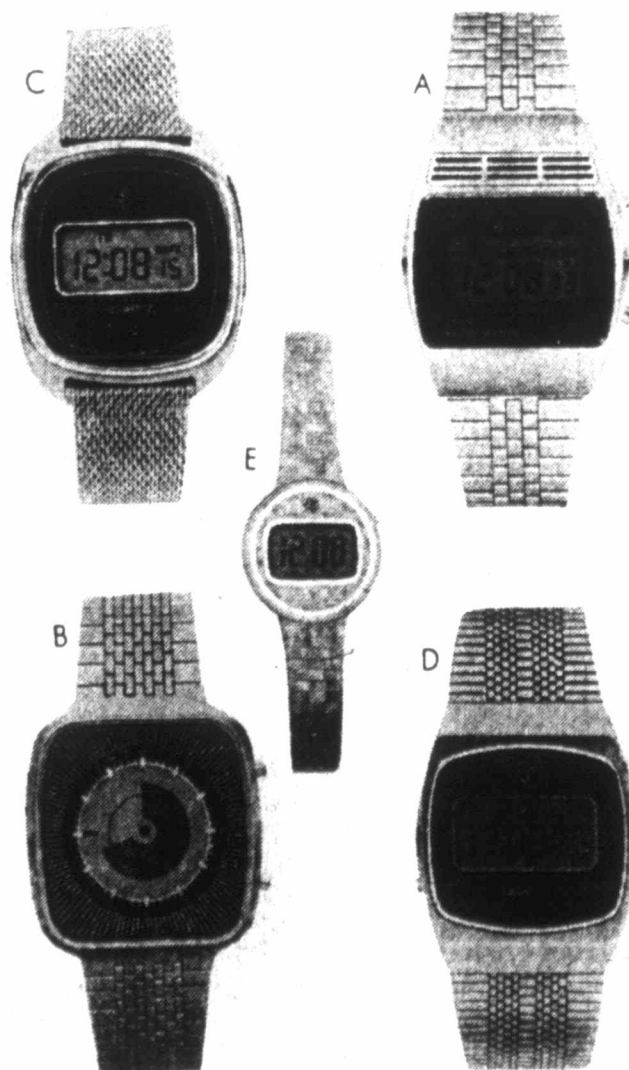
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New-Look Cincy To Greet Pirates

CINCINNATI (AP) — Cincinnati's redesigned and streamlined model of the once awesome Big Red Machine returns to the National League playoffs tonight — a familiar territory for a team that has dominated the league in the last decade.

The 1979 NL West title marked the sixth division crown in the last 10 years for the Reds, who will be trying to reach the World Series for the fifth time. The only playoff the Reds have lost came in 1973, when they were beaten in five games by the New York Mets. Ironically, the hero of that Met triumph was Tom Seaver, who will be the Reds' opening game pitcher in this year's NL playoff. He is expected to face John Candelaria, 14-9 with a 3.22 ERA, beginning at 7:15 p.m.

Seaver rebounded from a 2-5 start and a painful muscle injury in his back to post a 16-6 record and 3.4 earned run average. Behind him, Cincinnati manager John McNamara is expected to start rookie Frank Pastore, who posted some key victories down the stretch and finished at 6-7. That leaves Mike LaCoss, 14-8, and Fred Norman, 11-13, or Bill Bonham, 9-7, when the series switches

to Pittsburgh following the first two games in Cincinnati.

McNamara was half of a major turnover for the Reds. He was hired to replace the popular Sparky Anderson after

ton in late August and capture the crown.

The keys were Ray Knight, who replaced Rose at third base and enjoyed a brilliant season, batting over .300 most of the year; shortstop Dave Concepcion, mentioned as a possible MVP candidate, and utilityman Dave Collins, who responded with some important hits when injuries put him into the Reds' lineup.

Regulars like outfielder George Foster, .302, 30 homers, 98 runs batted in; catcher Johnny Bench, .276, 22, 80, and first baseman Dan Driessen, .250, 18, 75, had their usual productive seasons. But the bonus was Collins, who hit .318 and helped the Reds overcome the loss of Ken Griffey, injured and sidelined since midseason.

The last time the Pirates were in the playoffs, in 1975, the Reds completed a three-game sweep. There are some new faces around this time, but one old face can be counted on to provide the leadership and inspiration — Willie Stargell.

Stargell, 38, also can be counted on at the plate. He batted .281 — 32 of his 119 hits were homers — and knocked in 81 runs.

The Pirates, known as the "Lumber Company," have always had the heavy artillery, but until recently they didn't

Rex Dockery's disappointment with Saturday's 27-17 Southwest Conference loss to Baylor was obvious at Monday's weekly news conference.

"I'm very disappointed," Texas Tech's head football coach declared. "I felt we showed signs of doing things well early in the game, but our game plan against Baylor wasn't what we expected it to be. Our team is greatly disappointed — just as the fans are."

Dockery called a second-quarter blocked punt that resulted in a Baylor touchdown the turning point in the setback to the Bears.

The Red Raiders began installing their game plans for Saturday's home contest with the Texas A&M Aggies Monday. Several minor position changes were announced by Dockery.

Senior Joe Walstad, who has started at center for Tech in all four games this season, will be working at the strong guard position with junior George Smitherman this week.

Sophomore Denny Harris will be working at center with the Red Raider first-team offense and freshman David Joeckel, who Dockery said has shown tremendous improvement in the past three weeks, will also be working at center with the varsity.

Dockery said that freshman quarterback Jim Hart, who saw some action Saturday against Baylor, will continue to work with the second-team offense.

"It's important that we continue to bring him (Hart) along," Dockery said. "We have to have him prepared if something should happen to Ron (starting quarterback Ron Reeves)."

The Tech coaching staff also has decided to move highly-sought freshman quarterback prospect Mark James to wide receiver. James suffered a shoulder injury during one of Tech's preseason scrimmages and has not been able to throw the football well since that time.

Dockery feels that James is too good an athlete to not be seeing playing time for Tech.

The Red Raiders hope to have sophomore cornerback Alan Swann ready for action by kickoff time Saturday. Swann reinjured his right knee during the Southern Cal game and has not played since.

Senior strong safety Larry Flowers' sprained ankle is not completely well and it will be Friday before Dockery is certain of his status for Saturday's contest.

Junior outside linebacker Roger Jones apparently will miss the remainder of the season with a knee injury sustained last week during practice.

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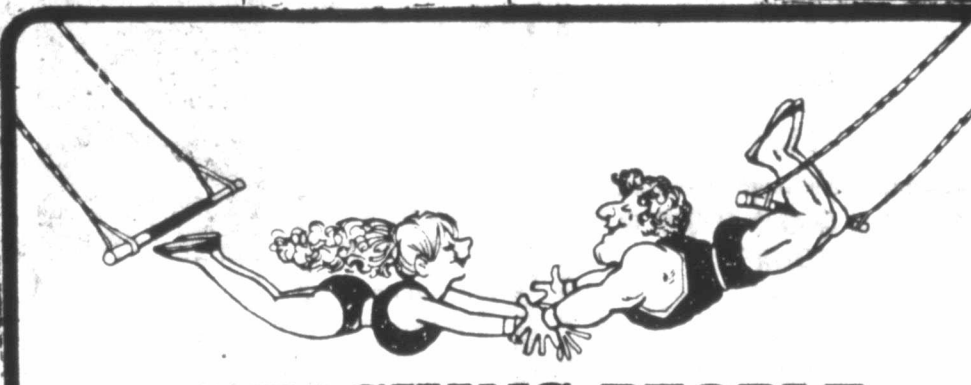

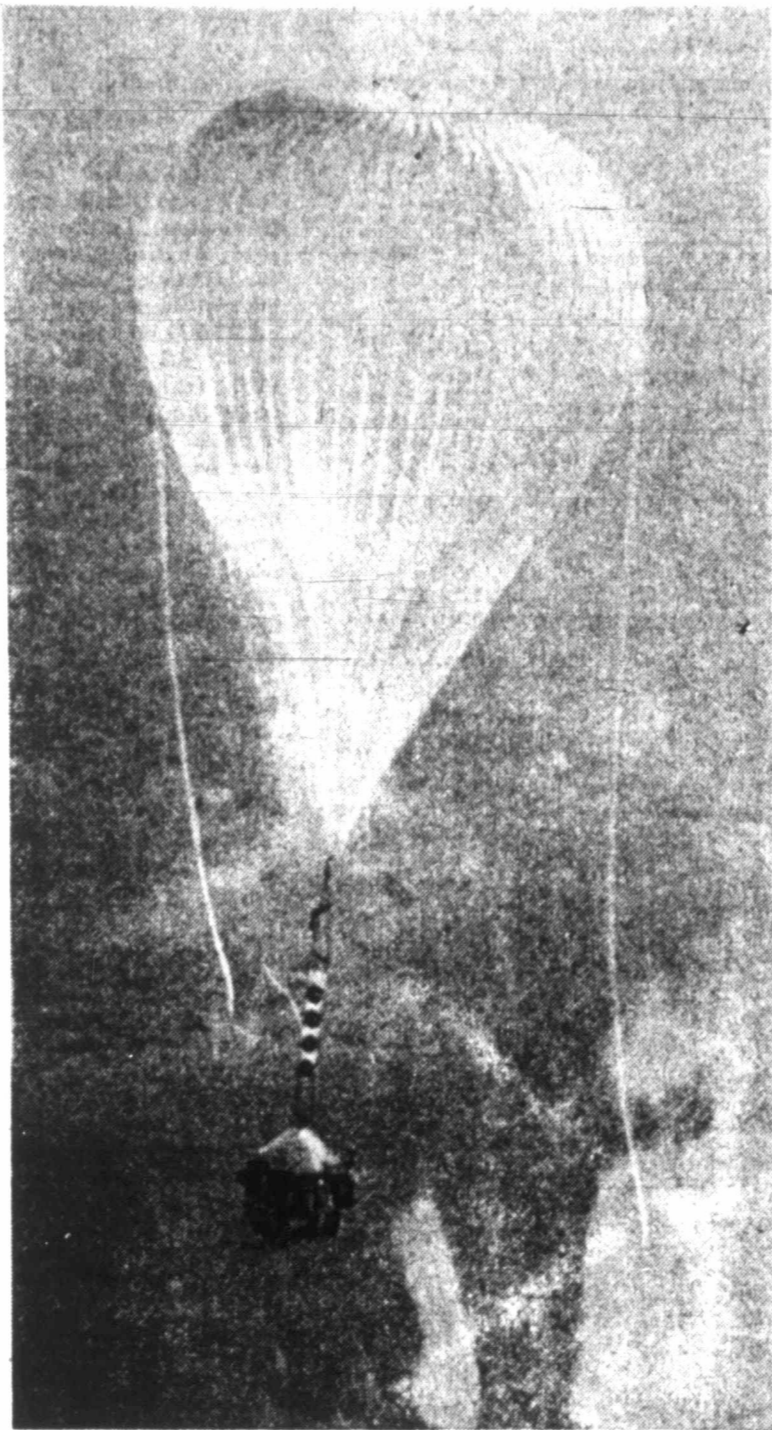

Two Dogs Kill Boy; No Charges Expected

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (UPI) — County authorities have tentatively decided criminal charges are unwarranted against the owners of two German shepherd dogs that allegedly attacked and killed a 4-year-old boy.

"We have impounded the animals," said local Det. Sgt. Don Patterson. "Blood was found on their fur; we've pretty much established that the boy was killed by dogs and that these are the dogs."

Laramie County Attorney Thomas Carroll said the dogs undoubtedly would be destroyed, but his office was not planning to file any charges against their owners, Melody and Steven Daigneault.

"Up to this point there is nothing to indicate any state crime has been committed," Carroll said. "There might be a violation of a city ordinance. When the investigation is complete we'll make a final decision."

Patterson said the body of Aaron Green was found at about 9 a.m. Sunday after an elderly couple reported seeing a badly injured boy in an alley in the central part of town. Detectives initially thought it was a homicide.

"We weren't sure at first exactly what happened," Patterson said. "All we had was a badly mauled little boy. The only piece of clothing on him was

his shirt. His pants, socks, shoes and other clothes were all over.

"A closer examination of the boy showed injuries very consistent with dog bites. There was even a place where you could make out a set of teeth. We established that the boy had been in the alley and the dogs had been loose earlier in the day."

Patterson said an autopsy Sunday established the Green boy had been attacked by dogs and the immediate cause of death was a punctured neck artery.

He said other reports received by police indicated one of the two German shepherds, quartered in a yard adjacent

to where the boy's body was found, was "particularly aggressive." That dog, he said, had apparently been restrained and had broken loose because there was a length of chain attached to his neck.

"I've never been involved in anything like this," Patterson said. "This is the only such incident in my seven years on the department."

He said if Carroll decides against filing charges, city attorneys will determine whether the couple should be accused of harboring a vicious animal.

Carroll said he had no idea how long the investigation would continue.

O'Hair Calls For Cancellation Of Pope's Mass

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair urged a federal judge Monday to stop Pope John Paul II from celebrating mass on the Mall in Washington next Sunday, arguing it would violate the separation of church and state.

"I welcome him to the United States, but not to say a mass on public land," said Mrs. O'Hair who won a landmark 1963 Supreme Court ruling barring bible reading

in public schools. She appeared before U.S. District Judge Oliver Gasch during a 90-minute court hearing.

The judge consented to a motion by government lawyers to dismiss one of her two suits — naming the pope as defendant — on grounds he is the head of a foreign state and out of the jurisdiction of U.S. Courts.

But Gasch did not rule immediately on her complaint challenging Interior Department regulations that permit religious activity on national park lands.

"This is not an easy case, and I won't promise when the decision will be made," Gasch said.

Commission Challenge Expected

AUSTIN (UPI) — Rep. Buddy Temple, D-Diboll, who tried unsuccessfully to unseat Speaker Bill Clayton, will announce today he will campaign for the Democratic nomination to the Texas Railroad Commission in 1980.

Temple has scheduled a news conference for 10 a.m. at the Capitol to make his formal announcement.

He is expected to challenge Railroad Commissioner John Poerner, who defeated Jerry Sadler in a 1978 contest for the right to serve out the unexpired term of former Commissioner Jim C. Langdon.

Temple began laying groundwork for a campaign against Clayton for speaker in 1977, and claimed in 1978 to have been within six votes of the 76 needed to win the election.

But he said Clayton beat him to the draw in claiming the 76 votes necessary for election as speaker, and Temple's campaign fizzled. He was not nominated when the House convened to choose its presiding officer this year.

Temple, the son of Temple Industries head Arthur Temple Jr., said last year he had spent \$72,000 in his unsuccessful race against Clayton, and chided Clayton's efforts during the 1978 special legislative session on tax relief.

Temple is the second challenger to indicate plans for a race for the Railroad Commission.

Davis Case Figures Seen Prior To Arrest

FORT WORTH (AP) — A used car salesman testified Monday he saw three figures in the Cullen Davis case a short time before the defendant's August 1978 arrest.

"Look there at the movie star, Priscilla Davis," the mutton-

chopped witness, James Stephens, 43, recalled telling a companion at the time.

Stephens identified the other two persons on the Holiday Inn parking lot as karate instructor Pat Burleson and Davis' friend-turned-informant, David McCrory.

The defense maintains the defendant's ex-wife Priscilla framed Davis to

enhance her divorce settlement and that Burleson and McCrory were co-conspirators in the scheme.

The meeting, Stephens said, occurred on the Thursday or Friday prior to Davis' Sunday, Aug. 20, arrest.

Investigators seized the millionaire industrialist within minutes of a tape-recorded encounter with McCrory.

DPS Vacates Post Following Squabble

JOURDANTON (AP) — The Department of Public Safety vacated its six-man command post in Atascosa County Monday rather than give into county demands to transfer two officers credited with a crackdown on drunken driving. The crackdown led to the arrest of two politicians' sons.

The troopers suspended routine patrols and said they would answer only emergency calls in the county.

The county commissioners, citing "harassment," had threatened to evict the state police from the county-owned command post unless the DPS transferred patrolmen Earl Conaway, 32, and Albert Rodriguez, 26, by Monday. The DPS refused to go along with the county's demands and allowed the six troopers to vacate the post.

Conaway, 32, who is black, and Rodriguez, 26, a Mexican-American, were credited by their superiors with a crackdown on drunken drivers that has cut the county's traffic death rate in half this year.

That effort also resulted in drunken driving charges against a son of Commissioner Smith Tausch, who sponsored the Sept. 19 eviction resolution, and a son of Pleasanton Mayor Travis Hall.

The two troopers and Department of Public Safety officials said they believe the order was prompted by arrests involving prominent citizens. The six troopers also contend the situation has been aggravated by racism in the rural south Texas county.

Tausch and County Judge O.B. Gates have denied the order was spurred by the two arrests, or by racism.

They said the two troopers "harassed and abused" residents, but refused to give specific examples. Gates told one reporter last week that he has collected numerous statements to support the allegations.

No formal complaints have been submitted, however, against the officers, public safety officials said.

Capt. Randol Gilmore, the DPS district commander, said Conaway, Rodriguez and the other four troopers would operate from their homes and patrol adjoining counties.

The troopers removed their equip-

ment over the weekend from the command post and by Monday morning had taken down all traces of the DPS, including the black and white "Texas Highway Patrol" sign. The building, known as the "Log Cabin," is a replica of Atascosa County's first courthouse in 1856 and has been the troopers' headquarters for more than a dozen years.

"We feel like if they don't want part of us down there, they don't want any of us. But it would be a disservice to the people of the county to pull out completely," said Gilmore.

"This is not a way of getting back at them," he said. "But if they're going to discriminate against two of our officers down there, then in all fairness, we must also pull the others out."

Atascosa County Sheriff Tommy Williams and Sheriff Bennie Sanders in neighboring Frio County have said they will refuse any prisoners Conaway and Rodriguez bring to their jails.

Gilmore said the two officers will take their prisoners 40 miles away to San Antonio or 37 miles away to Floresville. He noted that according to state law, Williams must accept the troopers' prisoners if the jailing is formally ordered by a justice of the peace.

Williams refused to say whether his deputies will begin routine traffic patrols to pick up the law enforcement slack.

Two major highways, U.S. 281 and Texas 16, run through the county, which has a population of about 20,000.

Rodriguez and Conaway were assigned to the county last spring. They often voluntarily work extra hours and are each averaging about 14 drunken driving arrests a month, far above the average, said Gilmore.

Gates told the San Antonio Express he spent two days collecting statements from residents who claim they have been harassed by the two officers.

Gates displayed one statement from a man who claimed he and three other men were arrested at gunpoint by Conaway. But a top DPS official, who requested anonymity, said that complaint has already been investigated and shown to be false.

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
