

## U.S. Hostages 'Abused' In Iran

#### Hung Jury Specter Looms Over Davis Murder-Hire Trial

FORT WORTH (AP) - The specter of a hung jury surfaced Wednesday after six hours of deliberations in the murderfor-hire trial of millionaire industrialist Cullen Davis.

"If they weren't split, we'd have a verdict by now," Dallas defense lawyer Steve Sumner said after the panel of eight men and three women ended the firs' day's deliberations.

The question now is simply whether or not they will resolve the split into an unanimous verdict.

#### 14 Prisoners Stage Break

MOUNDSVILLE, W.Va. (AP) Fourteen inmates, some armed with automatic weapons, broke out of the state penitentiary here Wednesday night and fled in a stolen car after fatally wounding a state trooper, state police said.

State Police Cpl. J.G. Watson said the inmates fled the prison and halted the car of an off-duty state trooper and his wife. The trooper was shot and the couple forced from the car, he said.

The escapees then made a getaway in the car, Watson said.

Trooper Ralph Kesner, 23, died a short time later at Reynold Memorial Hospital, Watson said.

Wason said Kesner apparently just happened to be driving by the maximum security prison at the time of the escape. The prison is in West Virginia's Northern Panhandle, about 50 miles southwest of Pittsburgh.

Roadblocks were set up by state police and local authorities. Pennsylvania. and Ohio police were asked to establish roadblocks near their borders.

Prison officials refused to disclose how the men escaped.

Besides, he added with a grin, "I'm not the one who has to worry about going to prison.

Defense attorney Mike Gibson, who correctly forecast a hung jury at Davis' earlier trial, which was in Houston on a change of venue, repeated that prediction Wednesday

"I don't think we'll ever get a verdict in this case," he said. "That's not exactly our company line but that's what I believe. I said the same thing in Houston."

Deadlocked 8-4 The Houston jury deliberated six days last January and deadlocked 8-4 for conviction

Since prosecutors have indicated they would not try the case a third time, a hung jury could mean a victory for the

The eight-man, three-woman jury, which received the case Tuesday evening, broke off deliberations at 4:45 p.m. Wednesday. They will resume at 9 a.m.

The 12th juror broke her leg several weeks ago and was dismissed.

During their deliberations Wednesday, the jury requested and received the notes of FBI agents and a list of all defense and prosecution witnesses.

Jurors had hardly begun when they asked State District Judge Gordon Gray for a dictionary, wanting to look up a word mentioned in Gray's instructions

Request Denied

The request was denied, and Prosecutor Jack Strickland explained the jury was "bound by the terms in the charge' delivered by Grav.

The jury's task is to determine if Davis is guilty of trying to hire someone to kill his divorce judge. It can acquit, or convict on one of two charges - solicitation of capital murder or conspiracy to commit capital murder. Both carry penalties of five to 99 years or life in prison.

Davis was acquitted in 1977 by a Amarillo jury in the Fort Worth killing of his 12-year-old stepdaughter, Andrea Wilborn She died, along with Stan Farr, the lover at the time of Davis' second wife, Priscilla.

Two Wounded Priscilla and another man were wounded.

The shootings occured at the \$6 million mansion which Davis built after they were married. She had custody of it during divorce proceedings but had to surrender it afterward.

Davis and Priscilla were divorced this past summer after a stormy fiveyear battle.



The call for a demonstration surfaced among local members during the weekend after Ford Motor Co. refused to fire two foremen who paraded around assembly lines in September wearing paper hats resembling Klan hoods. Ford transferred the foremen to other suburban Detroit plants.

terest rates," Reuss said in Washington. The prime is the rate banks charge their most credit-worthy corporate borrowers, with other industrial and commercial borrowers paying even higher

The prime rate does not directly affect interest rates on consumer loans and home mortgages but is closely watched as an indicator of short-term interest rates.

The prime rate has risen rapidly since August, largely due to efforts by the Federal Reserve Board to tighten credit as a way of reducing inflation. But Reuss and some Wall Street analysts noted that the Federal Reserve recently had followed a stable policy.

Funds Rate Falls Reuss noted the federal funds rate, a key rate on loans of reserves between banks, had fallen below 15 percent, after being as high as 17 percent, and that banks could borrow from the Federal

Reserve itself at 12 percent. The congressman asked Chase to please inform the nation whether it has been obtaining money at the Fed's discount window since Oct. 6 at an attractive 12 percent interest rate and how

Chase President Willard C. Butcher said, "Our decision on the prime is not taken lightly, and is never a result of what happens on a given day, or as a rssult of a single aberration in the marketplace. The fact is that the prime rate has significantly lagged (behind) other interest rates for some time and continues to do so. We believe we have exercised appropriate restraint during this period.

Disclosure Not Normal

A bank spokesman said it was not normal practice for individual member banks to disclose the information Reuss

"Specifically, however, we would make two points in answer to the congressman's question: first, we have not borrowed at the discount window since Oct. 6; second, we do not believe this is relevant to a decision to raise or lower the prime rate," the bank said.

Until the round of increases began in mid-August, the record for the prime rate had been 12 percent, set during the 1974 credit crunch. That year the rate was held down by political pressures on' the banks, something that was largely absent until last week, when Reuss put pressure on Citibank not to raise the rate to 151/2 percent last week.

#### Rain Chances Linger Over South Plains

A CHANCE for more, but not necessarily desirable, precipitation continues over the South Plains through tonight.

Other rainfall amounts were Seminole 21; Plains 20; Post 20; Floydada 11: Brownfield 11: and Big Spring 12.

One area cotton farmer said that Wednesday's light showers did more harm than good because they delayed harvest operations.

#### Khomeini Refuses Mediation

WASHINGTON (AP) - American hostages held in the U.S. Embassy in Iran are being "pushed around, abused, intimidated and mishandled," but there is no evidence that any have been seriously injured, a U.S. official said late Wednesday

Word of the mistreatment was given to reporters as President Carter's special mediators found themselves stalled in Turkey with Iranian authorities refusing to negotiate with them.

The official, who asked that he not be identified, said there was no evidence that any of the estimated 60 American hostages held in the U.S. Embassy in

The U.S. government also urged Americans still in Iran to leave as at least two more U.S. citizens were reported seized and placed with hostages held students demanding the United States return the exiled shah for trial.

U.S. officials said the Iranians have brought new weapons into the embassy compound, including machine guns.

But State Department spokesman Hodding Carter said he had no evidence that there had been any shooting.

'We have been unable to confirm with any of our sources that there has been firing." the State Department spokesman said.

The two American negotiators sent to seek the release of the Americans held hostage were stalled in Turkey when Iranian leaders refused to let them into the

Waiting In Istanbul

Ramsey Clark, a former U.S. attorney general, and William Miller, a staff member of the Senate Intelligence Committee, were reported by the State Department to be waiting in Istanbul for further instruction.

State Department spokesman Carter said the two emissaries, carrying a personal message from President Carter to Iranian leaders, would remain in Turkey indefinitely "pending clarification" from the Tehran government

"It is our hope that they will be able to proceed with their mission at the earliest opportunity," spokesman Carter

Told Not Welcome

Clark and Miller flew to Athens, but by the time they arrived, were being told they would not be welcome in Iran. They then flew to Istanbul where the mission stalled.

Even as Clark and Miller began their mission, Khomeini, Iran's religious revolutionary leader, was insisting that no Iranian official had been authorized to negotiate with them.

#### Oil Tankers Loading At Iranian Terminal

NEW YORK (AP) - The State Department and oil companies said Wednesday that tankers were being loaded at Iran's main Persian Gulf oil terminal despite reports the port had been shut down. Wholesale home heating oil prices rose sharply in the United

Reports of a shutdown at the Kharg Island port, possibly due to local labor troubles, also were denied by the oil minister and national oil company of Iran, which supplies up to 5 percent of U.S. oil consumption.

But wholesale spot market prices for home heating oil continued to rise sharply, and there were reports some U.S. companies' tankers may be facing delays in loading.

"Rumors are flying everywhere," said a source at a U.S. oil company. The source, who asked not to be identified, said one of his company's tankers "has been waiting since Saturday" for oil. 'We believe U.S. companies are

State Department spokesman Hodding Carter said in Washington, "It is my understanding that at this point there is no interruption in those shipments from the port.'

Presidential Press Secretary Jody Powell said the White House does not have any information that would suggest Iran had halted oil shipments to the United States or other countries. But Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash.,

said one U.S. tanker was turned away from Iran's major oil port Tuesday in an action that was followed by a general shutdown. "All you can go by are the facts and the facts are they're not moving," said



#### Victim Seemed 'Scared,' Former Dancer Testifies

Yes Sir.

**A-J Correspondent** KERRVILLE -William Drew Young III looked "kind of scared" as he was escorted in a back door of a Lubbock bar by two men, a former burlesque dancer testified Wednesday at the murder trial of Jim Gordon in 216th District Court here.

Gordon, a 43-year-old former night club owner, is accused of the 1977

Christmas Eve slaying of Young, The trial, presided over by 99th District Judge Thomas L. Clinton, was moved from Lubbock to Kerrville on a change of venue.

Pamela Ann Eggers told the court she saw Young, who is also known as 'W.D.," sitting in his car in front of the Salt River Saloon as she returned to work the night of the murder.

Using a diagram of the bar, prosecuting attorney Jim Darnell asked Miss Eggers what she did after she entered the

"I went to the table where Tico Lowrance and Gordon were sitting and told Tico that W.D. was outside," she

Gordon then went to another table where Kenneth Herndon, Kenneth Owen Jaycon and Jan Payne were sitting, Miss Eggers said. Herndon and Jaycon, she said, left the bar through a back door after speaking with Gordon.

A few minutes later they returned, escorting Young between them. She could see a gun in Herndon's hand as they brought the man in front of Gordon, Miss Eggers said.

"I turned around when I heard someone get hit," she said. "Then I heard someone say, 'Let's take this back to the

The four men, Payne and Lowrance went to an office in back of the bar, Miss Eggers said. Shortly afterwards, she heard a sound like "a backfire or

She said she and the man went to Lubbock Motor Lodge that night because she knew Ross.

But when the man went in alone, she said, he returned to the car without a room key, saying the nightly rates were too expensive. After a short drive down the block, Miss Felder told the jury, they decided to go back to the motel and let Miss Felder go into the office and rent a room.

Immediately after she entered the motel office, she testified, her date followed her, carrying a pistol, and ordered Ross to remove his pants. Ross earlier had told the court he kept both his personal cash and the motel's receipts in his right front pants pocket.

Miss Felder said Ross told the man he couldn't take off his trousers because of his boots, and she said she offered to help him remove his clothing because "I was scared, too. I didn't know what (the gunman) was going to do either.'

After the robbery, Miss Felder said, the man took her back the Fifth Street apartment where she was then living and told her not to tell anyone of the robbery "if you know what's good for

She added that she did not know where the man lived and has not seen him since the night of the incident.

The day after the robbery, Miss Felder and the man with whom she is living. James Henry Wilson, were arrested by Lubbock police as the couple was driving in the 600-block of Avenue Q. A .22caliber pistol was found in Miss Felder's

But the defendant said Wilson, also charged with aggravated robbery in connection with the incident, was not the man who held the gun on Ross.






IT'S OFFICIAL now. The U.S. presidentimust be nearly if not wholly incomprehensible to the rest of the politically civilized world, is under way.

It's official because Sen. Edward Kennedy finally disclosed one of history's worst receding. kept political secrets by following up his announcement of his intention to announce his candidacy for the Democratic nomination by announcing his candidacy officially.

AN EDITORIAL: **Better D-FW Service Hailed** 

THE GOOD NEWS is that Texas International plans to inaugurate two daily flights each way between Lubbock and the Dallas-Fort Worth airport and that Braniff has no intention of further reductions in service

The bad news is that TIA is dropping its direct service between Lubbock and Austin, but there's reason to hope that Continental Airlines and/or Southwest Airlines will pick

up that service. As Lubbock Chamber of Commerce Executive Vice President John A. Logan said, the city's first priority right now is to get imservice to D/FW and beyond. TIA's new schedule beginning Nov. 15 will help accomplish that.

WITH THE ENTRY of Southwest Airlines into the Lubbock market a couple of years ago, both the frequency and the cost of flying to Dallas were greatly improved.

However, because Southwest lands at Dallas' Love Field and there are no commercial flights from that airport to the eastern U.S., it soon became more difficult for Lubbock travelers to make good connecting

flights. Braniff cut back to four flights each way daily and Continental abandoned the route entirely. Texas International's flights from Lubbock to D/FW at 3:19 p.m. and 10:19 p.m. daily will fit nicely into gaps left in that

Flights leaving Dallas/Fort Worth for Lubbock at 8:40 a.m. and at 4:10 p.m., especially the latter, also will be welcome service additions. Both flights will continue on to Amarillo and Denver.

Texas International will abandon two daily non-stop flights each way between Lubbock and Austin. While that is not good news, the D/FW service is more important.

THIS WOULD BE especially true if Southwest were to add low-cost direct flights between Lubbock and the capital city, perhaps at hours better suited to the need than TIA's flights have been.

Continental also has authority for Lubbock-Austin service and its implementation would be a step toward improved throughservice from Austin to Lubbock westward.

Meanwhile, reassurances by Braniff that the Lubbock market is secure and that it is "pleased with the traffic volume" here are

Unlike Shreveport and Little Rock, where Braniff is pulling out in favor of more lucrative long-haul routes which it is adding, Lubbock fits neatly into Braniff's traffic pattern.

#### **Speculators Are Bullish** On Radioactive Garbage

WASHINGTON-If you talk to most governors (California's Jerry Brown is the exception) they're all for nuclear energy.

But there is one problem-no governor wants to accept the nuclear waste that is produced by the energy. Everyone thinks it should be buried

in another state. Since we only have 50 states, our options as to

where to dump the stuff are limited. Nuclear waste is not your everyday garbage. Its life is anywhere from 10,000 to 50,000 years.

While it doesn't give off any smell, it radiates like mad and there doesn't seem to be any canister which will hold it more than a couple of dec-

WHAT'S THE answer? A broker friend thinks he has it.

"We must make nuclear waste a precious commodity like gold or silver and have people start speculating in it. The government could hold an auction on the waste, and then the commodity people would begin dealing in futures.

"A pound might start off at \$100, and then the speculators would take it from there. In a good market I could see it going up to \$500, with delivery in six months."

'Wouldn't the traders be afraid of taking delivery on the nuclear waste they bought?"

"Commodity speculators never know what they're dealing in," he said. "To them it's all

"DO YOU think they have ever seen a soybean or a pork belly? All they're trying to do is make a killing and if they can't make it in silver, they'll make it in garbage

"But eventually someone is going to be stuck with the nuclear waste.

"You don't understand the people who play the commodity game. They never believe they're going to be the last guy in line.

'They always hope to unload the commodity before delivery time. If someone gets stuck, it's his tough luck. He'll have to bury it in his own back yard."

"His wife won't like that," I said. 'Commodity speculators don't think about their wives. If they did, they'd never be in the

"LOOK, I'VE got this thing all worked out. Once you put nuclear waste on the market everyone is going to believe it must be valuable or people wouldn't be speculating in it.

"If nuclear waste goes up and the dollar goes down, you'll have people all over the world trying to buy in. The Arabs will figure there must be something to the waste or we wouldn't be selling

it at auction. 'The gnomes of Switzerland will recommend it to their clients, and pretty soon all the big banks will start stockpiling the waste in their safes.

"If we get everyone buying it, we could wind up with a shortage.

"IT'S A good plan," I agreed, "particularly if the OPEC countries start demanding to be paid for their oil in nuclear sludge. How do we get it off the ground?"

"The first thing we have to do is persuade the President to go on television and say the country is running out of nuclear waste and unless we all conserve, there will be none left 100,000 years


'That's all the speculators will need to dump their holdings in wheat and start gambling in radioactive garbage."

## Straddling Defense



His father, who is high on my list of heroes, placed (not quite well enough) the bomb (not quite enough bomb) that almost killed Hitler. He was executed that evening, July 20, 1944.

WASHINGTON-On the inflation front. Jimmy Carter in one way reminds me of Richard Nixon. During most of his first term, Nixon pretended there was no such thing as the high cost of living. For most of his first two years in office, Carter

did likewise. He now admits that inflation is a problem, but he can't make up his mind what to do about it. Faced with a growing decline in the polls, Nix-

on finally imposed wage-price controls in 1971 and they worked He carried 49 states the next year, losing only

Massachusetts and the District of Columbia to George McGovern. His second term assured, he then removed controls and prices skyrocketed.

BUT AT least Nixon had acted boldly, if temporarily. There the resemblance comes to a halt. Carter simply cannot even do something politically expedient. Having acknowledged there is inflation, he cannot force himself to act.

Carter trotted out his chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers, Charles Schultze, and had him say that "the underlying" inflation rate is only 8 to 9 percent, when everybody knows it's 13 percent.

Mike Blumenthal, who was sacked during Carter's Cabinet purge, is not mean or vindictive. But he put his finger on what's wrong with Jimmy Carter in a speech to the business-oriented Washington Forum

Carter, said Blumenthal, has never had clear, simple, single economic philosophy" designed to fight inflation.

HE SAID Carter and his advisers are committed to fighting inflation, but on the other hand the Carter liberals "believe that high interest rates are bad, that fighting inflation hurts poor people...it's tighten the belt, but don't cut out any important programs; cut down on government regulations, but don't offend any special interest groups.

In short, Jimmy Carter is still trying to be all things to all the voting blocs. His program is to fight inflation, but not too hard.

The only assault on the high cost of living has been mounted by the Federal Reserve Board, with its tight money and high interest rate policy. Carter went along for a couple of weeks but now he's going around saying interest rates are too

IT IS ludicrous. Paul Volcker, Chairman of the Fed, has warned that "the standard of living of the American people has to decline." All that warning made was horse sense.

But Carter piped up: "I don't agree." Where has this foolish man been, anyway? Well, for one thing Carter apparently has not

been where he could hear people grumbling about high prices. He apparently is unaware that a majority of Americans have told all the polls they favor controls.

No wonder Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., has ordered Carter to stop blocking traffic by announcing that Congress on its own will impose controls next year.

He paused, dramatically, then answered, lugubriously, "I don't know." Recently this has become the central argument for ratification. A few weeks ago, Stauffenberg became fed up with what he considers an argument that is peril-

has in mind when it issues dire warnings about possible NATO disintegration? The German government answered: "There is no reason whatsoever to link the loyalty of members of NATO, and especially the Federal Repub-

DURING A subsequent visit to Washington, Stauffenberg bluntly charged that the Carter administration's argument undermines U.S. leadership by portraying that leadership as fragile-so

ment about which many serious people, of many persuasions, have the gravest doubts. "It is difficult to comment on this," he says. "It is grotesque." NATO is said to be so weak that it must have SALT II to save its mere existence: and SALT II is so weak that it can't be defended

fragile as to depend on ratification of an agree-

Stauffenberg is not the only person who finds some of the current advocacy of SALT II off-put-

Responding to the threat implicit in the idea that, without ratification, NATO will not proceed with theater force modernization. Sen. Sam. Nunn, D-Ga., says:

"THIS REMINDS me of a Marx brothers movie where Chico, whose life is being threatened by armed thugs, points the gun at his own head and shouts, 'If you come any closer, I'll pull the trig-

"To accept this threat as a serious argument for SALT II ratification, one would have to conclude that our allies are not dedicated to their own defense. If this is the case, the future of the alliance is not bright, whether SALT II is ratified or rejected."

The administration's fundamental and irremediable problem has deepened during the close. protracted scrutiny of SALT II: It is trying to sell a product for which virtually no senator feels real enthusiasm.

So the administration is trying to make much of the fact that there has been a steady stream of statements by European politicians who assert that rejection of SALT II would be a devastating blow to U.S. leadership.

THIS STREAM might be more impressive were it not so obviously generated and coordinated by Washington.

The administration and Senate Majority Leader Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., have at last completed their dance. The senator waltzed earnestly around the SALT

II agreements, squinting quizzically at them, and then, to the surprise of absolutely no one, said gravely that he likes them just as they are.

The impression that Byrd has wrestled with, and pinned, all reasonable doubt about SALT II is important to the administration because of the decline of Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho.

As chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, Church was expected to be the leading advocate when SALT II reached the senate floor. But after his role in the administration's Cuban fiasco, he is damaged goods.

STAUFFENBERG SCOFFS at the idea that Europe would be rattled by Senate rejection of

If, say, on Dec. 20 the Senate were to refuse ratification, Stauffenberg believes that on Dec. 21 'there would be a lot of headlines, then a nervous gathering in Bonn.

"Then there would be Christmas, and then you would have a hard time remembering what the trouble was supposed to be."

We shall see. The administration still has neither the votes to pass SALT II, nor a plan for get-

DALLAS-The unthinkable has finally happened: A computer terminal has taken up residence on my desk and is nudging me, fumbling and bumbling, into the electronic age.

Which, I guess, makes it official. If I can operate one of these temperamental contraptions, anybody can. Although, at the moment, there's some question about who is really in charge. Oh, what the heck: let's tell it like it is. In a

ontest of wills, I lose every time. I still can't figure out the difference between the "command" mode and the "interactive" mode, and every time I get mixed up my "Silent 700" (that's its name) slides into its memory bank

BUT IT'S a cute little thing. Looks a lot like a typewriter with ears. And what I do is "input" my final draft into this "electronic data terminal," where it vanishes into some kind of invisible storage bin.

Then I make a long-distance call to another computer at United Feature headquarters, which burps out a signal to stick the phone into Silent 700's ears. That done, if I remember to push all the right

electronic powers. What I really need is some genius who can translate the operator's manual into layman's talk for me. (Only an astronaut could follow those instructions.)

ONCE I GET the hang of its space-age doubletalk, I will (they tell me) be able to cross out words, flip paragraphs up and down, and correct mistakes with the flick of a key. My problem is I'm still trying to figure out which key.

It's a bit unsettling to have to admit that you're one of the last ones on your block to stick a toe in microcomputer waters. Because, like it or not, home computers are

taking over our lives. Have a few for instances You can, just by picking up the phone and

pushing the right buttons, pay your bills without ever opening your checkbook. Push another few keys and you get the day's Just say the word (electronically, of course) and

your handy-dandy home computer will control your furnace, air-conditioning and lighting systems to save both energy and money. YOU CAN buy a car with a built-in computer

that tells you how many miles you're getting on your \$1-a-gallon gas and how much farther you can drive on what's left in the tank. When it's time to fill 'er up, no fooling, the

computer nags you every few seconds with a loud And they're working on one that will tell-you

when to change the oil, replace the brake pads or take the car in for a new transmission. Wouldn't surprise me a bit if, one of these days, they come up with a chip that will squawk out a warning when the mechanic tries to make repairs



#### Woman Becomes Fifth Victim Of Tainted Food

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) - A 76-yearold woman has become the fifth patient to die after eating tainted food at Marlboro State Psychiatric Hospital, state officals said Wednesday

The latest victim. Dorothy Wittnebert of Edison, died Tuesday, spokeswoman Ann Burns said. Four other people died last week after lukewarm chicken was left standing on Oct. 28 before it was given to patients.

All of the sprawling hospital's 800 patients were served the noon meal of chicken and gravy. Festering bacteria sickened 131 patients, most of them frail or elderly.

Miss Wittnebert died in Monmouth Medical Center in Long Branch where she was transferred Oct. 31 while suffering from severe diarrhea.

An autopsy showed Miss Wittnebert died of "natural causes" with dehydration, low blood pressure and diarrhea contributing. Miss Burns said.

She said the patient also was suffering from jaundice and uremia, a condition where body wastes usually eliminated in urine enter the bloodstream

Miss Wittnebert's diarrhea was stopped after she was transferred to the

independent hospital, Ms. Burns said. Medical detectives told a joint legislative committee last Monday that bacteria in the chicken multiplied to dangerous levels when it was stored at improper temperatures between cooking

The epidemiologists said they could not pinpoint the faulty storage.

10TH MARINE DIES

In northwest Missouri, voters in Worth County turned down a tax increase of \$5 on each \$1,000 of assessed property value. Officials said they'd be forced to close the courthouse when the money runs'out later this month.

In Oklahoma, however, voters rejected a proposal to give taxpayers a federal income tax deduction on state tax re-turns. Supporters blamed the measure's failure on confusion among voters about whether it would save them money or cost them more.

Ohio voters turned down by nearly 3to-1 a proposal to require consumers to pay a 10-cent deposit on beverage containers and outlaw cans with detachable snap tops

But in Maine, voters trounced by a 5to-1 margin an effort to repeal the state's 22-month-old bottle bill, which requires deposits as a means of curbing

Voters facing a housing shortage in San Francisco rejected by nearly 3-to-2 a stiff rent control proposal, but 52 percent of Baltimore voters approved a rent control plan. The Baltimore measure faces a court challenge filed by a city property owner.

Voters in affluent Westchester County, N.Y., turned down a possible county takeover of Consolidated Edison - a private utility company that charges the highest rates in the nation. County officers blamed the 54 percent vote against the measure on a \$1.3 million media





#### Indiana Community Votes On Voting MARENGO, Ind. (AP) - It had been for more than 20 years."

40 years since folks in this tiny, barren community elected local officials, but they turned out en masse this time nearly 90 percent of the registered vot-

They walked down from the hills to the town hall by Brandywine Creek on Tuesday to enter their votes in makeshift polls with torn sheets tacked up for

They even waited on street corners. "Just checking out the polls, just curious," said one resident.

The issue was not lower taxes or paved streets or even candidates. The issue was the right to vote. Since the last election in 1937 or 1938 - no one remembers for sure when it was the jobs of town treasurer and town

on to willing friends of the incumbents. Indiana law doesn't require elections to be held on a regular basis, said John N. Shanks, executive director of the State Election Board.

"If there are no candidates, if no one files, the incumbents hold over. If there is only one slate of candidates, then they're considered elected," he explained. "What you find in Marengo is fairly typical. There are some situations where the same family has held office

Marengo, a poor town of about 800 residents, was for many years less concerned with elections than survival. But when two strong floods ripped through the town's heart this summer and a newspaper called "Hard Times" emerged, along with a new political party, people began to care.

"The same people may win, but we still need to vote," said A. E. Crecelius, 71, before the votes were tallied.

The same people did win. A group of incumbents calling themselves the Citizens Party collected more than 60 percent of the votes.

But Tuesday was a red-letter day in Marengo, regardless of election out-

It was the finale to the first piece of campaigning the town has known in years. Pliers were distributed and ads in local papers urged people to the polls and warned against vote-buying.

"This is quite a bit of effort for just a little town election, isn't it," said Carl Wible, an opposing town board candi-date from an organization calling itself the People's Party.

Wible said a lot of dirt would be uncovered if he were elected.

Cleveland Mayor Dennis J. Kucinich, accused by his party of being a spoiler for the past two years, spoiled the Democrats' otherwise perfect record for holding onto major city mayoralities.

The maverick Democrat lost in Tuesday's balloting, while the Democrats kept hold of all the other city halls they controlled. Their mayoral candidates won in more than one-fourth of the nation's big cities as scores of elections were held across the nation.

In San Francisco, Mayor Dianne Feinstein got 42 percent of the vote despite a very long cadidate lit, but still faces a Dec. 11 runoff against Quentin Kopp, the city's most conservative su-

Mrs. Feinstein - appointed to her post after the assassination of Mayor George Moscone - noted the large number of voters who went for other candidates and pitched for their help in the runoff.

#### Tax Cut Figure **Takes Petition** To Washington

WASHINGTON (AP) - Howard Jarvis, the tart-tongued crusader for tax cuts, dumped petitions bearing 350,000 names on Capitol Hill Wednesday demanding approval for his tax reduction and balanced budget bill.

"Congress is like a turtle with arthritis," the retired California businessman scoffed as he stood in front of dozens of gray mail sacks stuffed with petitions.

"I don't think they have a right to stall" on the bill, he said.

"I think those congressmen who do stall are going to find out what their stall costs when they run for re-elec-

"Tax, tax, tax - spend, spend, spend is the credo they live by," said the man who made Proposition 13 famous.

A spokesman said the American Tax Reduction Movement, which Jarvis heads, spent \$200,000 collecting the names on the petitions.

Delivering them was largely an event staged for reporters, who listened as Jarvis read a statement while standing in front of the mailsacks. Reps. Bob Dornan, R-Calif., and Jack Kemp, R-N.Y., stopped by to shake hands and be photographed with Jarvis.

In a symbolic touch, the petitions were piled outside the office of Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., chairman of the taxwriting House Ways and Means Commit-

Jarvis did not meet with Ullman to discuss the issue personally. He said he had not asked for such a meeting.

He denounced the committee chairman and other members of the panel as being "unresponsive to the needs of the people throughout this country as they begin yet another attack against the pocketbooks of the average American."

The measure Jarvis is backing has been introduced in Congress, but no hearings have been held and none is ex-

The proposal would cut personal income taxes by 25 percent, reduce federal spending by 20 percent and balance the federal budget over the next four years. In addition, it would adjust the tax rates to discount inflation and cut the capital

WASHINGTON (AP) - President obstacles to delivery of food and medical supplies to Cambodia and its countrymen who have fled into Thailand.

The president said the warring factions in Cambodia - forces loyal to the deposed Pol Pot regime and the government in Phnom Penh backed by Vietnam - were placing "unwarranted obstacles" in the way of food deliveries.

'We have no political motives. We have one single commitment, and that is to stop the suffering and the starvation among these unfortunate people," Carter said in a ceremony on the White House South Lawn before his wife departed for Bangkok just after dawn.

"It's important that we maintain our commitment and our concern to all the starving people there, regardless of their political affiliation, regardless of the circumstances under which they suffer," the president said.

Mrs. Carter said: "This is a tragic situation and our whole country is concerned and I want to go also to see what every American can do to help.

Mrs. Carter was accompanied by Surgeon General Julius B. Richmond; Jean oung, wife of former U.N. ambassador Andrew Young; Richard Holbrooke, assistant secretary of state for East Asian and Pacific affairs, and former Sen. Harold Hughes, D-lowa, who runs a religious center here.

Mrs. Carter's party was expected to arrive in the Thai capital at 9 p.m. local time Thursday and return to Washington Saturday night.

In addition to visiting the refugee camps, Mrs. Carter is expected to confer with Prime Minister Kriangsak Chamanand and members of his cabinet and with King Phumiphol Aduldet and Queen Sirikit.

Carter said the United States, which has committed \$69 million in food and medicine, is providing a major share of the international relief effort, and "we are ready to do more.

"It's imperative that our nation exert its moral leadership as an example to the entire world of the true feelings of Americans, as we have observed with deep concern and with horror the unprecedented loss of life because of starvation and persecution of the people of Cambodia," Carter said.

The president said his wife would deliver to Kriangsak and the royal family a message of appreciation for "the courage and the generosity of the Thais in receiving literally hundreds of thousands of refugees into a country already somewhat impoverished, already having exhibited great generosity in the past.'

He said the Cambodian tragedy, where almost half the population has died, "is of unbelievable proportions, and it is important that the people of the world and the United States maintain their intense interest and their intense commitment until the tragedy is re-

'This trip we hope will increase both the public and private commitment to alleviate suffering there," he said.

Shortly after Mrs. Carter left Washington, White House officials announced that 11 U.S. Public Health Service personnel, including six physicians, were assigned to Southeast Asia to screen and treat refugees headed for the United

The United States is planning to admit 14,000 Indochinese refugees each

#### **Murder Charges Filed** In Domestic Shooting

will seek the death penalty for a recently divorced man who is charged with killing his ex-wife, her father and a police officer, then holding 100 policemen at bay for 90 minutes, a prosecutor said

In a preliminary hearing before Judge Richard E. Salee of Marion County Municipal Court, Richard D. Moore, 48, was charged with three counts of murder, three counts of attempted murder and three counts of criminal confine-

Chief Deputy Prosecutor John D. Tinder told the court that the death penalty was applicable in this case because of the policeman's death while on duty. Police Lt. James Stroude testified during the brief hearing that the shoot-

ing occurred when Moore went to the home of his former father-in-law, where his ex-wife was living. Their divorce had become final only a few days before. "Domestics are the most dangerous

kinds of cases," said Capt. Tim Foley, head of the Indianapolis police homicide branch. "You know they're the most dangerous. You're taught they're the most dangerous. But you can't live on the knife's edge all the time."

Investigators said Moore went Tuesday night to a modest neighborhood on the city's west side where his ex-wife, Rhonda, 27, had returned to live with Ruth Caldwell, 53. An argument ensued and Moore opened fire, killing his exwife and her father, police said. Mrs. Caldwell, wounded by a shotgun blast, was hospitalized in critical condition.

Patrolman Gerald Griffin, among a group of officers responding to a neighbor's complaint that a man was breaking into the house, also was killed by a shot-

Investigators said Griffin entered a screened carport and was confronted by Moore in a doorway leading to the kitchen. Griffin, who had drawn his service revolver, was overheard to say, "Hey, man, don't do that."

Shortly afterward, police heard a shotgun blast and saw Griffin tumble backward through a rear storm door of Three other police officers were

wounded in the shooting, officials said. They were identified as Lt. Cicero C. Mukes, shot in the face and listed in serious condition, and Patrolmen Amos E. Atwood and Roy E. Potter, both report-

A fourth officer was injured in a crash while traveling to the scene, police

Police barricaded several blocks surrounding the home and evacuated neighbors. No shots were fired after the initi-

"Throw out your gun and come to the door, Richard," police pleaded with Moore over a builhorn. "If you can't walk out the door, crawl to the entr-







#### Powell Says U.S. Anticipating Counter To Cutoff Of Fuel

WASHINGTON (AP) - A cutoff of Iranian oil probably would not trigger gasoline rationing in the United States, presidential press secretary Jody Powell said Wednesday.

But Powell said the administration was undertaking an accelerated review of steps it could take to counter any such shutoff, and said "we are prepared

to initiate an appropriate response."

Among steps being considered, he said, are speeded-up conservation efforts, a boost in U.S. production of oil, efforts to find different sources of imported oil, substitution of coal and natural gas for oil, and a more effective federal system of allocating oil suppliess during a shortage.

Powell's statement came amid conflicting reports about the Iranian oil situ-

Sen. Henry M. Jackson, chairman of the Senate Energy Committee, said the flow of Iranian oil to the United States has been shut off despite claims by Radio Tehran to the contrary.

'All you can go by are the facts and the facts are they're not moving," Jackson told reporters after a closed-door briefing for committee members with Energy Secretary Charles Duncan and CIA officials.

But Powell and others, including Carter's national security adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski, denied earlier reports that Iran had ordered a cutoff of oil shipments. The reports also were denied

by Iranian authorities. 'As far as we know there has been no interruption of any major kind," Brzezinski told reporters Wednesday.

Meanwhile, Energy Department spokesman Jay Vivari said the department was hearing varying reports about Iranian oil but had no direct knowledge

Vivari said three U.S. oil companies, which he would not identify, reported difficulties with tanker loading at Iran's Kharg Island on Tuesday, but he had no company reports abut the exort conditions on Wednesday.

Some of the proposals outlined by Powell would require action by Congress, but others could be taken by the president on his own authority, the press secretary said.

He said an administration task force. headed by John Sawhill of the Department of Energy, began a review of contingency plans in late October, well before the takeover of the U.S. embassy in Tehran.

Powell said these efforts were 'greatly accelerated" when insurgents took over the embassy and took roughly 60 hostages.

Asked whether rationing would be imposed if Iran cut off oil shipments to the United States, Powell said: "I don't believe that, looking at the numbers...that there is any way that you would have a shortfall based on that situation that would...meet the requirements for the imposition of rationing.

He said a bankruptcy by the nation's 10th-largest corporation would:

-Cost the federal government "at east \$2.75 billion in 1980 and 1981 in lost tax revenues, unemployment claims and welfare costs.

-Increase unemployment nationwide by approximately 75,000 persons next year and 100,000 the following year: Detroit, where more than half of Chrysler's workers.reside, would be the hard-

-Result in the loss of at least 250,000 auto and truck sales to foreign producers, worsening the U.S. trade balance by at least \$1 billion.

Miller urged Congress to approve the Carter administration's proposal to guarantee \$1.5 billion in loans to Chrysler, arguing that they 'might prove to be costless" if Chrysler doesn't default and emerges "as a viable concern which no longer needs governmental assistance."

As part of the administration's proposal, the nation's third-largest automaker would be required to raise an additional \$1.5 billion that would not have government backing.

Chrysler, which employs about 113,-000 people nationwide, has lost \$721.5 million so far this year and anticipates the total will exceed \$1 billion by year's

Miller reiterated that the Chrysler aid plan was intended as a "one-time program" and would not set a precedent for government aid to other failingbusi-

He said he had no philosophical objections to a proposed amendment by Rep. Henry Reuss. D-Wis., chairman of the Banking Committee, that would require Chrysler to concentrate on fuelsaving vehicles to qualify for the loan

But he said he would have to review the Reuss proposal before commenting in detail.

Miller said he is opposed to tying loan guarantees to a requirement that the company use part of the money to isguarantee plan that did not ensure employee stock ownership.



#### Flood Blames Failing Health For Resignation

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rep. Daniel Flood, D-Pa., facing a federal retrial on bribery and conspiracy charges, announced Wednesday he will resign from the House of Representives for health reasons, effective next Jan. 31.

An informed source said Flood made his decision after his attorneys and aides advised him that fighting to retain his seat would be an unnecessary strain on his reportedly frail health.

Flood, who turns 76 Nov. 23, is charged with taking more than \$50,000 in cash and stocks in return for using his influence as chairman of a House subcommittee on labor, health, education and welfare.

After his first trial ended in a hung jury Feb. 3, he was admitted to Georgetown University Hospital for exhaustion and dizziness. He was discharged a short time later, but re-admitted for testing







Federal Bureau **Changes Name** 

WASHINGTON (AP) - After 78 years of water and power projects, there is no more federal Bureau of Reclama-

The agency that built the Hoover and Grand Coulee dams has changed its name to the "Water and Power Resources Service.

Interior Secretary Cecil D. Andrus, who approved the change, said it was done because changing conditions have expanded the scope of the agency beyond its original function of reclaiming arid lands in western states.

The service now has responsibility for 138 water and power projects and 333 reservoirs providing some or all of the water used by more than 16 million

"We spoke about the tremendous symbolic power which our actions in this area can have even if they produce fewer provable cases than we would like," said Civiletti in his first public remarks on Nazi war criminals since succeeding Griffin B. Bell as attorney general in Au-

"It is inconceiveable that we shall ever succeed even in locating, let alone deporting, all of the Nazi collaborators currently enjoying refuge in this country.

Earlier this year, Walter J. Rockler, a prosecutor at the Nuremburg war crimes trials, was placed in charge of a reorganized Justice Department office for seeking Nazi war criminals. He has a budget of \$2.3 million and a staff of 19 lawyers, 10 investigators and four histo-

Last month. Rockler announced the department filed papers in Los Angeles seeking to deport Andrija Artukovic, 80, a retired bookkeeper in Surfside, Calif.



"Does Islamic fervor really mean persecuting a sick man, who lies between life and death, and demanding he be hanged?" asked Al Ahram, semi-official newspaper of Moslem Egypt, "Islam is completely innocent of all those

"Incidents in Iran these days are disfiguring the Islamic religion in the eyes of the world," Al Ahram said. The Shah stayed in Egypt briefly after he was forced to flee Iran before Khomeini's revolutionary forces last January. de-

Khomeini knows well, said Sud-Oest of Bordeaux, France, "that Mr. Carter, who has excluded a military intervention, cannot - it would be a shame for the United States and mean the loss of its remaining prestige - deliver the dying Shah.

Editorialists were nearly unanimous in judging that Iran would be the biggest loser in the crisis.

"In their refusal to leave the simple universe of total solutions, personal hatreds and political revenge," Britain's Guardian said, "the Iranians store up fresh disasters for themselves."

In one of the fiercer editorial blasts, Britain's conservative Daily Telegraph labeled Khomeini "just a stupid, vindic-tive - some would say victous - old man as far as administration and government are concerned. The blood lust shown towards the shah and his family - with expressions of delight at the news that he has cancer - seems to show a form of dementia.

"It is totally irresponsible for the 'new God' in Iran to support and encourage criminal actions against protected diplomats and embassy personnel while lashing out against 'the big Satan'," said Norway's conservative-independent Aftenposten.



#### PLO Help In Hostage Crisis Welcomed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Carter administration, which in normal times refuses to deal with the Palestinian Liberation Organization, has welcomed an offer by the PLO to try to assist American hostages being held in the U.S. Embassy in Iran.

There is no indication that the PLO offer was inspired by the United States or resulted from direct U.S. negotiations with Yasser Arafat's group.

The PLO gesture and the seriousness of the hostages' situation put the group whose record of terrorism and stand on Israel have denied it U.S. acceptance. The PLO's image clearly would be brightened if it could help rescue the embassy prisoners.

Reflecting the widespread concern over the hostages, Sen. Henry M. Jackson, the Washington Democrat who chairs the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said, "I'd deal with the devil" to secure their safe release

Zbigniew Brzezinski, President Carter's national security assistant, and Hodding Carter, the State Department spokesman, both welcomed the PLO offer to try to "secure the lives" of the Americans.

Talking to a group of reporters in the White House driveway, Brzezinski said anybody who can help will be playing a constructive role. Carter, in much the same vein, said "we welcome help from anybody

The U.S. spokesman said envoys Ramsey Clark and William Miller, sent to mediate with the Iranians but stalled in Turkey by Iran's refusal to admit them, were not planning to meet with PLO officials in Tehran should they get However, Carter added: "I can't predict this won't happen.

In its covenant, the PLO is sworn to the destruction of Israel. It has never budged from that commitment, despite indirect overtures from the Carter ad-Publicly, and through friendly Arab governments, the United States has of-

## Compromise 1980 Budget Wins Senate Approval

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate approved a compromise 1980 budget Wednesday night, accepting a \$700 million cut in its demand for higher defense spending.

By a 65-27 vote, the Senate sent the \$547.6 billion compromise spending package to the House, which is scheduled to consider it today.

The compromise budget calls for a \$29.8 billion deficit, about \$2 billion more than was recorded in fiscal 1979, the budget year that ended Sept. 30.

The Senate had demanded a 3 percent increase above inflation for defense spending in fiscal 1980. However, the increase was cut to 2.5 percent "real" growth in a House-Senate conference

Although a reduction, the defense figure was generally seen as a victory for the Senate inasmuch as the House raised its military outlay figure by \$1.3 billion.

OLD-FASHIONED FUDGE

2 cups sugar

1 cup milk

2 level tbsps. cocoa 1 tbsp. white sugar syrup

Chop first three ingredients in blender using method recommended for blender. If water is used, let vegetables drain well before adding other ingredients. Add 2 cups sugar and mix well. Combine remaining sugar and other ingredients and bring to boil. Add to cabbage mixture while hot. Cool and refrigerate. (This slaw will keep several days in the retrigerator and is crisp and deli-

It is one a friend gave me during World War II. when our husbands were working at North American Aviation between Dallas and Fort Worth. 1 cup sugar

Cream shortening and sugar. Add slightly beaten eggs and add alternately

with liquid, mixed dry ingredients. Last add raisins, oats and nuts. Drop by level teaspoonsfuls on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for about 12 min-

Verla Chaffin, Lubbock, would appreciate having recipes for "Peanut Patty candy and Vinegar Pie. Hope some one can come up with these for Verla!

Angie Collins, Lubbock, requests a recipe for "Mystic Pie." She says she'd like one similar to those served in the dorms at Tech. The recipe usually contains egg whites, corn syrup, sugar and nuts. "All I've come up with is The Ritz Mock-Apple Pie, which is not the same," Angie said

Mrs. H.L. Hughes wrote, asking if anyone knew how to get mustard out of kitchen carpet; and Mrs. D.L. Womack, Lubbock came to the rescue. Mrs. Womack said, "Well. I've found an almost foolproof way! It will also take mustard out of clothing - even white. Go to your drug store and get a bottle of plain glycerine. Pour a small amount on the stain, let it set for a couple of minutes. then gently rub with a sponge dipped in warm water with about 1/4 cup electric dishwashing detergent (1-qt. water) in it. Then, rinse with clear water and sponge up as much water as you can with paper towels and let dry. Hope it works as well for everyone as it does for me.

#### To Your Good Health

By PAUL DONOHUE, M.D.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Please explain fibroid tumors of the uterus, their cause and the possibility of cancer. Can they interfere with pregnancy, or can the situation be corrected so a woman with them can still have a baby? - C.O.

Let's look at the uterus. It's a muscular organ with a very special kind of lining. A fibroid is a benign growth in this muscular organ. The correct term actually is "myoma," which means growth of muscle tissue. Fibroids are tumors in this sense -

that they are new abnormal growths. They are not tumors in the sense most people think of tumors - as cancer. We don't know why myomas (fi-

broids) grow, anymore than we know about why many other kinds of tumors (benign or cancerous) grow. When women get fibroids there is apt to be enlargement of the uterus and

symptoms related to the menstrual peri-

od, such as excessive bleeding at that Any uterus abnormality may interfere with pregnancies. The fibroid problem is more common among older women, so in selected cases the uterus is simply removed (hysterectomy). In some

Dear Dr. Donohue: Would you be so kind to let me know if there is such a thing as calcium in the uterus? My sister was told she had this. - B.C.M.

Calcium can be deposited in many disorders of the uterus, the commonest being fibroid tumors. These are usually harmless. The calcium forms as the tumor degenerates. Uterus calcium deposits are found in about half of women in

Dear Dr. Donohue: Can damp weather cause odorous nostrils? I have postsinus nasal drip, also a lot of yellow phlegm when I blow my nose, mostly in the mornings. Do you have a suggestion as to what would help? I've had this for a couple of months. - Mrs. A B.

Damp weather will not cause foulsmelling nasal drainage. Infection will, especially of the sinuses. You should see your doctor. Read the booklet. "You

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am a 14-yearold girl. I recently have been getting tonsil infection. Pus forms on my right one, then stays there till it dries. This has never happened to mry left one. Will you please tell me why this happens? Are you related to Phil Donohue? - V.K.

Everything that is white and on a tonsil is not necessarily pus. Often, food particles lodge there and look like pus. If it is pus, there are usually other symptoms of infection - fever, enlarged glands in the neck and pain on swallowing. This may not help much, but only a firsthand examination would settle the

No. I'm not related to Phil Donohue (the television personality). I am related to Tom and Mary Ann. though.

Dear Dr. Donohue: My condition is called "proptosis," and it causes me a lot of anxiety. Is there a cure? What is the cause and prognosis? - E.T.

Proptosis (pro-TOE-sis) is a sign of an illness and not an illness itself. It is a bulging forward of the eye, if both eyes are involved a problem with the thyroid gland is suspected. If only one eye is affected. problems in nearby structures are likely at fault. Examples of the latter are sinus glands. Growths are looked

If a local cause if found, treatment of that will end the proptosis. If the thyroid is involved, treatment is more difficult. Even if the thyroid problem is brought under control the eye symptom may

Your best bet is to consult an ophthalmologist if you have not done so. Your doctor can refer you.

De r Dr. Donohue: Most of the time my tonsils are red and swollen - about half the size of a plum. Should I have them removed? I am 43. - J.H.

It depends on the cause of the redness and swelling. If you have repeated infections of the tonsils, then removal would be in order. But painless enlargement itself is not an indication for surgery. Have this chronic enlargement evaluated by a physician. Copyright 1979 Field Enterprises, Inc.





Then, patch cracks, fill holes and sand the wall smooth

The final step before applying paint is to wash the wall with detergent or soap suds to remove any dirt and paste residue. Rinse and let dry thoroughly.

These procedures will help insure a longer-lasting and more attractive paint















#### Report Stresses Need For More Foreign Language Courses

WASHINGTON (AP) — A presidenti-al commission said Wednesday that uage courses. Americans' "scandalous" ignorance of foreign languages and cultures poses 'threats to America's security and economic viability.

It called upon the Carter administra-tion and Congress to spend at least \$178 million to reverse the decline.

One-fourth of the money would be spent on \$20-to-\$40 grants to elementary and secondary schools and colleges for

'Americans' incompetence in foreign languages is acthing short of scandalous, and it is becoming worse," said the report from the President's Commission on Foreign Languages and International

Rep. Paul Simon, D-Ill., a commission member, told a news conference, "We're behind every other country on the face of the earth in encouraging for-

eign languages. You can buy in any lang-uage, but if you want to sell, you must speak your customers' language."

The commission's 156-page report said, "Our lack of foreign language com-petence diminishes our capabilities in di-plomacy, in foreign trade and in citizen comprehension of the world in which we

live and compete." The chairman, former Cornell University President James A. Perkins, sai only twothirds of State Department foreign service officers can speak the languages of the countries with which they

The 25-member commission cited these statistics as evidence of a decline in foreign language study:

\*Only 15 percent of high school students study a foreign language, down from 24 percent in 1965.

Only 8 percent of colleges and universities require a foreign language for admission, down from 34 percent in

An estimated 10,000 English-speaking Japanese business representatives drum up sales in the United States. U.S. firms have only 900 American counterparts in Japan and few speak the langThe commission, which spent \$300,-000 on the year-long study, called for boosting federal subsidies for international exchange programs and training teachers and graduate students. It also proposed creating 60 special language

high schools in metropolitan areas.



In his appeal, Demouchette said the evidence was insufficient to support the death verdict, based on a finding that he probably would commit future violent acts if allowed to live.





WASHINGTON - Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes Oct. 25 through Oct.

HOUSE

MONEY FOR HEAT - The House passed, 290 for and 105 against, a bill appropriating \$1.35 billion to help the poor pay heating bills this winter. Added to \$250 million already appropriated, the money will provide one-shot payments of up to \$400 to poor families. Most of those benefiting will be welfare recipients on the rolls of Aid for Families with Dependent Children and Supplemental Security Income. The bill (HJ Res 430) was sent to the Senate.

Rep. Silvio Conte, R-Mass., a supporter, said it would be "a shameful act for this Congress . . . to allow anyone in this land of such vast wealth face a frigid and perhaps fatal winter.'

Rep. Robert Michel, R-Ill., an opponent, called the distribution system a bureaucratic hodgepodge and said "most of the money will not get into the hands of the recipients until next January and February at the earliest, and a good portion will be siphoned off . . . to individuals regardless of heating needs."

**ENERGY MOBILIZATION BOARD** The House rejected, 56 for and 357 against, an amendment to make the new Energy Mobilization Board part of the Department of Energy rather than a totally independent agency. The board is President Carter's proposed mechanism for speeding federal, state and local actions to ease the energy shortage. It will, for example, cut red tape slowing the construction of refineries and synthetic fuel plants.

The amendment was offered to HR 4985, later passed and sent to conference with the Senate. The bill creates the energy board over objections of those who see it as an infringement on states' rights and the environment. The attempt to locate the board within the Department of Energy was an effort to restrict its powers.

Rep. Tom Corcoran, R-III., a supporter, said that if Congress gives the board independence "we lose control, we lose policy accountability, and we dilute the authority vested in the secretary of energy to be responsible for the policies we give DOE to administer.

Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., an opponent, said the energy board "must have freedom apart from the bureaucratic wrangling, infighting and boondoggling that goes on between the Department of Energy and other governmental



The vote came during debate on a bill lessening regulation of depository institutions (HR 4986), later passed and sent to conference with the

Sen. Richard Stone, D-Fla., a supporter, said: "Florida's total banking assets are \$37.6 billion compared with \$148.3 billion for just these seven bank holding companies. How in the world can the banks in my state or very many other states begin to compete with the awesome power of these giants.?"

Sen. Adlai Stevenson, D-Ill., an opponent, said the measure "contemplates states hiding behind their boundaries, protecting the trust facilities and other industries from competition, all at the expense of not only the people of those states but the national welfare.

CASH FOR ADOPTION The Senate rejected, 13 for and 77 against, an amendment to block proposed federal payments to families that adopt hard-toplace children. The payment would subsidize the child's living expenses. Failure of this amendment left intact language to establish the cash-incentive program. The program is part of HR 3434, a child welfare bill passed and sent to conference with the House.

Seil. James McClure, R-Idaho, the sponsor, said financial incentives should not be "a consideration when the decision is made whether or not to adopt. Prospective parents do not need to be paid by the federal government if they are motivated by the right reason."

Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich., an opponent, said: "Financial stress should not be added to the burdens which (families) have already assumed in adopting a physically, mentally, emotionally or medically handicapped child."



They said they would see each other often now that they are neighbors in this Central California city.

Hood compared meeting his sister to opening a closet and seeing a suit you haven't seen in a long time," knowing that it existed but no knowing here

Mrs. Dolson said she doesn't think she ever will track down the rest of her family, including her mother, who now lives in the Los Angeles area.

'I sense a little insecurity in people who are looking for something else. I'm happy and contented where I am.

Mrs. Dolson, who has two adopted children and one natural child, says she can relate well to her own children because of her experiences in nine foster homes before being adopted at age

I can say from experience that I feel the same about all three of them. The world's idea is that the adopted ones are not really yours, but really they are. They become a part of you," she said. "I didn't feel any different when I brought my naturally born child home from the hospital than when I brought my other two home," she added. "The love is just so deep for each one of

Hood emphasized that his meeting with his sister was just an accident and he has not made it a point to seek out

'I'm 35 years old and they've had close to 30 years to find me," he said.

He has seen about 10 of his siblings in the course of his life but admits he couldn't recognize some of them if they passed him on the street today.

"I'd just like to see it all over with and everybody happy again," he said.

#### Senate Easily Defeats Synthetic Fuel Scale-Down Measure

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate easily defeated an attempt Wednesday to sharply scale down the size of President Carter's proposed \$20 billion synthetic fuels program.

By a vote of 57 to 37, the Senate set aside a \$3 billion synthetic fuels measure urged by critics of the synthetic fuel program, a crucial element of the president's energy plan.

A close vote had been expected and Vice President Walter F. Mondale was on hand in case his vote was needed to break a tie.

More Challenges are expected to the proposal, including attempts to eliminate creation of a five-member inde-

pendent corporation with authority to hand out billions of dollars in loans and loan and price guarantees.

The \$20 billion would be spent over the next four or five years by energy companies willing to invest in commercial development of plants to extract oil and gas from coal, oil shale and tar sands.

#### Institute Says Supplies Of Heating Oil Up Industry officials say that because of

NEW YORK (AP) - Supplies of distillate - heating oil - rose last week as the nation's oil industry exceeded the Carter administration's goal for supply of the fuel, the American Petroleum Institute said Wednesday. Production of distillate and gasoline also was up.

For the week ended Nov. 2, inventories of distillate swelled to 251.9 million barrels, 6.5 million barrels above the previous week's level, and well above the 240 million barrels requested by the government for Nov. 1. Last year at this time, distillate supplies stood at 217.6 million barrels.

Production of the fuel rose in the week to 3.2 million barrels daily from

3.1 million barrels daily a week earlier. Gasoline inventories rose to 221.8 million barrels from 220.2 million barrels a week earlier and were nearly 6 million barrels above the 215.8 million barrels of a year earlier.

Gasoline output increase in the week to 6.7 million barrels a day from 6.5 million barrels daily a week earlier.

Overall refinry utilization increased substantially in the latest week to 83.4 percent of capacity from 81.8 percent the previous week. Last year at this time, refinery utilization was 90.5 per-







That may be true of some money market funds. But the one into which I put my money is run by a major brokerage house, which has Securities Investor Protection Corp. (SIPC) coverage. As you know, SIPC was set up by the federal government to insure customers' accounts at brokers - up to \$100,000 per account, including \$40,000 of cash.

So, the cash in my money market fund is covered by federal insurance. Right?

A. Wrong. But don't fret. There is almost no risk in a money market mutual fund.

SIPC protects customers, when a brokerage firm goes bankrupt. If that happens: SIPC insurance guarantees that each customer gets baok his or her securities and cash left with the brokerage firm - up to the amounts you mentioned. And many brokerage houses have additional private insurance protecting customers above the SIPC limits.

Neither SIPC nor private insurance protects a customer from losses, however, if the values of the securities they have left with brokerage firms decline.

When you put money into a money market mutual fund, you buy shares of the fund. This applies, whether the fund is run by a brokerage house or any other organization. If the value of those shares drops - a most unlikely happening SIPC won't make you whole.

Occasionally, the value of a money market mutual fund share will change, say, from \$10 to \$9.99 or \$10.01. But you won't see any wide price moves.

This is because such funds invest in short-term money market instruments which seldom jump around in price and which are paid off at maturity.

#### Reform Of Governmental Regulations Questioned

WASHINGTON (AP) - The chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission said Wednesday that most congressional proposals for reforming government regulation would do little more than enrich lawyers and lobbyists.

The chairman, Harold W. Williams, said the only approach that holds any hope for meaningful reform is to continually coordinate action by government regulators with national goals.

As the first step toward such a change, Williams told a National Press Club luncheon, Congress should require a systematic review of every major regulatory program. But, again, he added, Congress appears to be choosing the wrong method.

A proposl finding strong support in Congress would require federal regulatory agencies to justify their existence periodically or they would be put out of business. This is called a "sunset" provi-

"I believe that sunset proposals are, and have proven to be, unrealistic," Williams said. "The way to achieve regulatory reform is not to threaten longstanding regulatory programs with extinction in the face of Congress' failure

Unbridled "regulatory reform" has the potential for being as destructive as the over-regulation that many are complaining about today, Williams said.







#### **PLAINS AGRICULTURE**

THE COTTON BOARD ADOPTED A SERIES of recommendations to strengthen the organization's overview of Cotton Inc.'s research and promotion activities and elected new officers at its annual meeting last week in

Don Anderson of Lubbock, retiring chairman, asked the Cotton Board not to nominate him for a second one-year term because of the press of personal

Anderson said the Cotton Board had "spent many hard, tireless hours addressing each and every point and recommendation" raised in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's general audit report released in late August.

The Cotton Board approved with some restrictions a \$21.9 million budget for Cotton Inc. for calendar year 1980.

In approving the budget, sources said, the Cotton Board determined that additional breakdowns are needed of Cotton Inc.'s proposed outlays for agricultural research, sales marketing, and international marketing. Reviews of the budgets for those three areas will be made by Dec. 15, sources said.

Cotton Inc.'s 1979 budget was about \$17.8 million. The increase in the 1980 budget is because of the increased size of the 1979 cotton crop.

ACTIONS TAKEN BY THE COTTON BOARD also included:

- A schedule of meetings each year between members of the board and CI to discuss allocation funds and to review programs and budgets.

The hiring of a certified public accountant firm to review and evaluate whether CI's accounting system meets prescribed accounting standards, and to perform the annual audit of CI.

Utilizing the cotton industry's Communications and Liaison Committee as a board of review to consider suggestions or criticisms regarding the administration of the research and promotion program.

- Implementation of procedures to provide for increased security of collection and refund information. On-site review and evaluation of selected CI projects throughout the

year by representatives of the Cotton Board, USDA, and "other appropriate

Prohibiting CI from referring foreign mills to specific suppliers of U. S.

The Cotton Board had been under heavy pressure from the USDA to take decreive action. At a meeting earlier last week with the USDA and congressional representatives, members of the Cotton Board were told that if they didn't begin to take corrective action, legislative action might be taken. In addition to actions taken by the Cotton Board at its annual meeting, the

board developed what were described as improved reporting and administration procedures for Cotton Inc. Directors of Cotton Inc. had adopted these procedures at an earlier meeting in Dallas.

SUCCEEDING ANDERSON AS CHAIRMAN is Murray R. Williams of Altus. Okla. Williams is a cotton producer and former CI director.

Other new officers are Even Whittington of Greenwood, Miss., vice chairman; Glen Stevens of Fresno, Calif., secretary; and Marshall W. Grant of Garysburg, N. C., treasurer.

Anderson pointed out he had attended 34 meetings and had traveled more than 35,000 miles during the past year in discharging his duties as Cotton

Board chairman. "I just didn't feel that I could put the amount of time into the Cotton Board that is going to be necessary in the days ahead," he said.

The Cotton Board collects and administers per-bale assessments from cotton producers. Its 20 members and alternates are selected by the secretary of agriculture from nominees submitted by certified cotton producer organiza-

The board contracts with CI to carry out research and promotion projects on behalf of cotton producers. CI's board of directors consists of 38 producermembers and 38 producer-alternates.

Both organizations and their functions are authorized under the Cotton Research and Promotion Act of 1966.

Cotton Inc.'s budget comes from assessments - with refunds available on every bale harvested. The assessment rate this year is \$1 per bale plus 0.4 pereent of the bale's value.

#### Water Chemistry Woes **Possible In Counties**

producing areas in Knox and Haskell Counties in north central Texas may have a potential chemistry problem with the underground water source, although no one is certain yet.

sources However, the possibility exists that additional nitrate could be coming from fertilizers used in the production of certain vegetable crops in the area, Hons said.

Excessive amounts of nitrate in water can cause slow suffocation, especially among infants and immature live-

Hons is trying to answer three ques-

- Is there a definite potential of increasing the nitrate concentration of underground water through nitrogen fertilizers'

- If fertilizers are contributing to the nitrate content, can the influx be stopped?

If the influx can be controlled, what will be the effect on yields and production economics?

Anwers to those questions should come two years from now, when Hons will conclude his research.

Meanwhile, the Texas State Department of Health will monitor the nitrate contents of the water consumed in this area. Acceptable health limits are 10 parts per million on nitrate-nitrogen.

"If, the nitrogen fertilization of specific crops could potentially influence the nitrate concentration of the ground water, hopefully our research will determine effective control measures to prevent future increases in the nitrate content," Hons said.

These measures could include the use of nitrification inhibitors with more effective fertilization practices, he add-

Hons is working with Paul Vendrell, reasearch assistant, and Dr. Billy Kingston, director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) at

Funds from the State Legislature will support Hons' investigations during the next two years.

CHICAGO - Cattle futures closed 80 to 127 points higher with December in front after February bulged 135 Wednesday on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. Sales totaled 24.940 lots. The market was higher except for a brief loss of 20 in April in early trade.


County commissioners originally had planned to leave the third wing unfinished but increasing prisoner volume forced a change.

#### Cranberry Growers Remember Scare

ple talk turkey this time of year, they usually talk trimmings, too. And the trimmings for most traditional Thanksgiving dinners will include cranberries.

But 20 years ago, hardly a cranberry graced any Turkey Day feast in the land. The great cranberry scare was on - the first carcinogen panic by a public not accustomed to government warnings of cancer risks in their food and drink.

The cranberry industry has made more than a full recovery in the last two decades, but the turmoil surrounding the scare all but wrecked one of the most unusual and obscure corners of American agriculture.

The nation's 1,000 or so cranberry

growers still regard Nov. 9, 1959, as a day of infamy.

That was the day Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Arthur Flemming called a news conference to warn that aminotriazole, a now-banned herbicide then used for weed control in some cranberry bogs, caused cancer in laboratory rats. A reporter asked Flemming if he

would eat cranberries on Thanksgiving. "He blithely said no," recalls Univer-

sity of Wisconsin-Madison horticulture Professor Malcolm Dana. "As a result of that adverse publicity, the cranberry market went kaput. No cranberries were sold for the rest of the growing season."

The scare was on.

Officials with the Environmental Protection Agency have contacted New Mexico's environmental improvement agency, asking that they investigate your situation. I will stay in contact with you and, if the problem persists, the EPA can initiate enforcement proceedings against the county for violating your area's environmental code

MESSAGE - I am a professional biologist - a botanist. Part of my work makes it necessary to study the vegetation in National Parks all over the United States. On August 5, 1979, the acting head park ranger for Mount McKinley National Park denied me permission to use a section of the park for collecting samples of tundra for a research project. I just couldn't believe it! It is of grave concern to me that those of us who train young people who will eventually manage our great natural resources are denied access to those areas about which we teach. Can anything be done.? W.K. - Amarillo

SENATOR BENTSEN RESPONDS - According to National Park Service rules on scientific access to park resources, scientists are allowed to study park resources. However, a permit must first be issued by park officials to assure that the research is valid and will not cause damage. I am advised that if you will apply in advance the National Park Service would be pleased to consider any future requests you might make to conduct research in the National Park System.

A Cedar Rapids, Iowa, woman who had heard the news on her kitchen radio carried a pan of cranberries in still-hot water to her neighborhood grocery and demanded a refund. She got it.

Across the nation cranberries were swept from grocery shelves. Many stores refused to restock even after the government lifted its ban.

The government announced that no amount of washing contaminated cranberries would cleanse them of aminotriazole.

Almost much lost in the shuffle was the fact that the herbicide had been used on only a few bogs in Oregon and Washington state. Federal inspectors tested cranberries in six states and found only a handful of contaminated Losses averaged several thousand

dollars per grower, no pittance 20 years ago in the barren scrub land and marshes. In Wisconsin, where a wet-year had produced record crops, just 60,000 of 440,000 barrels of cranberries were sold by Nov. 9. The rest were buried.

With cranberries and cancer linked in the public mind, the scare's hangover endured for years. The price per barrel

was off by 25 percent through 1960. Growers were still dumping cranberries they couldn't sell as late as 1970.

Nine years later, however, cranberry sales had swelled to \$225 million - up from about \$25 million in 1959, according to Joel Pomerantz, a spokesman for Ocean Spray, a cooperative whose 800 grower-members produce 85 percent of

S. cranberries. Ocean Spray officials are now less concerned about any lingering fear of cranberries than they are about an American penchant for eating cranberries with their holiday feasts but not during the rest of the year.

A key factor in the industry's resurgence was probably the 1967 introduction of cranberry "cocktails" and fruit drink mixes which now account for about twothirds of the U.S.-produced berries.

Americans cranberry consumption recently surpassed one pound per person per year. Cranberry production is now estimated at 2.5 million barrels.

Nearly three-fourths of U.S. cranberries come from Wisconsin or from Massachusetts, where the Indians brought a native North American fruit called the cranberry to the Pilgrims' first Thanksgiving dinner at Plymouth 358 years ago.

"And the captain can easily make it look that way, call the sailor a troublemaker and dismiss him. The sailor has very few rights in which to refute the captain." Patout said.

"Contracts in countries that have strong unions, including the United States and most of Europe, protect the sailors fairly well," he said. "Third World countries, on the other hand, of-

fer very little protection. The most insidious are the multinational ships sailing under a flag of convenience, such as Liberia or Panama,'

"Sailors are enticed aboard with promises of higher salaries than they would get at home, and they are told they will be treated well, but they are given no contractual guarantee," Patout

"If the master is responsible, the ship may be good, but if the master is bad the sailor is really in trouble

The problems are compounded by difficulties the seamen face when they pull into U.S. ports, where they are easy prey for thieves, prostitutes and pickpockets.

## Woman Lost In Wyoming Mountains Rescued

DUBOIS, Wyo (AP) - A 23-year-old woman was rescued Wednesday from a rugged ravine in the frigid and snow-covered high country of the Teton National Forest.

A helicopter from Hill Air Force Base in Ogden, Utah, was used in the evening airlift two hours after five mountain climbers reached Diana Tohland of Salt Lake City.

Miss Tohland was "stable, coherent and aware of her surroundings, but she still had numb, feet," said Travis Garnick, part owner of Brooks Lake Lodge, site of the search headquarters.

Taken to a Jackson hospital, she was reported in stable condition, although suffering from exposure and exhaustion. Her father, Ray Tohland, and brother Tom came here from Salt Lake City

for the search. The father called the ravine "a devil's garden.

You can't see for 100 feet in the area where she's at," he said. "It's extremely rugged. It's remarkable she's survived." Snow was 18 to 24 inches deep on the ground and temperatures have dipped into the 20s at night in the area. Two grizzly bears were sighted nearby

She called her sister "self-reliant" and said she apparently had some food with her when she became lost. There was a garbage bag with some apples and candy bars at the camp that she took with her, Linda said. She said her sister could have had as many as eight or nine candy bars and several apples.

The garbage bag apparently was the material she used to fashion some type of shelter, which spotters in the helicopter reported Tuesday Linda was unsure if her sister had matches, but said she was wearing a snowmobile suit, a vest, a coat and hiking boots.

F.A. Dry Seeing Stars

DO YOU EVER FIND yourself running down your favorite football team's schedule and putting a little star beside those matchups commonly referred to as "automatic wins?" You know which games I'm talking about — the so-called breathers.

Breathers are the victories you can count before the games are actually played. Breathers are slightly different than byes, only because an opponent — or 11 guys disguised as a football team — shows up to play. No one shows up for a bye.

I never put those little stars on any of my schedules because I played on a lew breathers in my time. I guess I do it out of respect. But every football league, be it prep, collegiate or professional, has its breathers.

In the NFL, San Francisco and Detroit have replaced Tampa Bay and the New York Giants as easy wins. Colorado and Kansas State are automatic victories in the Big Eight. And in the Southwest Conference? Well, Rice and Texas Christian have been breathers for almost everybody the past five seasons.

But in Fort Worth, where the Horned Frogs have won six games and lost 49 over the past five seasons, a transformation is taking place. The Horned Frogs, once about as dangerous as Cool Whip, are spitting blood and breathing a little fire. Third-year head coach F.A. Dry has the TCU gridders believing in themselves for a change. That old Frog Fever may be contagious.

"MORE THAN ANYTHING ELSE we've started to mature." Dry offered. "And we've had quite a change in attitude. Our players are playing hard and playing to win."

TCU has won only two of eight games played so far in 1979, but the Frogs have been respectable in all eight. TCU dropped a 16-13 decision to Arkansas on a last-second field goal six weeks ago and since that time they have won two (beating Rice and Tulsa) and lost two more close contests (to Baylor and Houston).

Saturday, Frog Fever invades Jones Stadium for a 2 p.m. matchup with Texas Tech. For those of you who have inked in little stars next to TCU on the Tech schedule, be prepared. This game will probably be much closer than you realize.

TCU's eight-man defensive front has given people fits all season long. It's a defensive formation seldom used these days and opponents of Frog Fever have had a difficult time blocking against it.

"We do use a defensive front that is different than what you usually see in this part of the country." Dry said. "That has helped us this year, but basically we've had good play from a number of defensive personnel."

WHAT THE FROGS DO is line up eight defenders on the line of scrimmage and play a little guessing game with the offensive line. The name of the game is guess which four, five, six, or all eight of us are coming. If an offensive blocker misses an assignment or doesn't pick up a blitzing linebacker, chances are that man will make a tackle in someone's backfield.

Among the top defensive players for Dry are senior tackle Wesley Roberts and end Mike Dry, F.A.'s own flesh and blood.

"Mike's playing very good football for us," Dry said of his son, who transferred from Southern Methodist last year and who will never receive a football scholarship at TCU as long as F.A. is coaching there. "He's played the last three weeks with a broken toe. The toe didn't affect his play and it sure didn't affect his appetite, either."

Despite the solid play of his defense and the injuries Tech suffered in last week's loss to Texas. Dry expects the Red Raiders to play a strong game Saturday. He doesn't expect the loss of quarterback Ron Reeves to cripple the Tech offense.

"I think Tech's program is stronger than that," Dry admitted. "We think Jim Hart (Reeves' replacement at quarterback) is a good football player and we know James Hadnot is a great football player. Tech also has a great defense. They haven't given up much all year.

"But the key will be stopping Hadnot. That's going to be quite a chore. Nobody has really stopped him yet. We hope we can just slow him down!"

FOLLOWING SATURDAY'S CONTEST with Tech, the Frogs close out the season with Texas and Texas A&M. Dry claims winning one of the final three outings would make this season a success.

"If we can win one of our last three games, then we could call the year a success," Dry added. 'We have played better than we ever have and we've solidified our program this season. But we have to win one of the last three to give the program impetus."

Remember those little stars. Some folks aren't using them as much as they used to when they reach the TCU date on the schedule. And someday soon, F.A. Dry and his Frogs hope TCU fans can again mark a couple breathers on

# Tech Faces Young Frogs

Texas Christian University head football coach F.A. Dry will be the first person to admit that he has a very young offensive football team. And he's not trying to make excuses. Dry just wants folks to know how mature his youngsters

Two seniors will start offensively for the Horned Frogs Saturday when Texas Tech and TCU tee up the football at 2 p.m. inside Jones Stadium. The remainder of the starting offensive unit will consist of underclassmen, mainly freshmen and sophomores.

"I've been pleasantly surprised with the performance of some of our younger players," Dry stated. "We have started to mature and the offense, despite having so many young players, has played hard and is starting to play well." Dry's most pleasant surprise in 1979 has been the play of sophomore quarterback Kevin Haney. Haney, 6.2 and 210 pounds, is an exciting runner. He leads the Horned Frogs in rushing yardage per game with 56.7. Haney has gained 387 yards in seven contests and scored four touchdowns.

If Haney isn't moving the TCU offense, Dry can call on another sophomore signal-caller, Steve Stamp, The 6-1, 190-pound Stamp is the better passing quarterback of the two and has more experience than Haney. Stamp has hit 44 of 101 pass attempts for 568 yards and one touchdown.

The two seniors in the TCU offensive attack are fullback Jimmy Allen and running back Craig Richardson. Allen, a 5 11, 205-pound power runner, leads the team in rushing yardage with 433 in eight games. Richardson, 5-8, 180, has

gained 295 yards in eight contests.

The Frogs start showing their age in the receiving corps. A pair of freshmen and a junior make up the targets Haney and Stamp throw to.



"There is absolutely no truth to the Kison report." Reich said by phone from Beverly Hills, Calif. "There have been some discussions but Kison has not yet even focused in on where he'd like

Reich confirmed that he had held some discussion with the Yankees about Kison but called them "preliminary."

The attorney's talks with New York owner George Steinbrenner regarding Watson, however, have resulted in an agreement which will be announced Thursday.

"It was clear when the Yankees drafted Watson first that he was their preference," Reich said.

Watson had expressed a preference to either remain with the Boston Red Sox or move to the Yankees, Reich said. 'There was no discussion with other teams," the attorney continued, "We didn't want to take advantage of anyone

else when he wasn't really interested. current free agents. We didn't feel it would be fair.'

Reich would not comment on reports that the Yankees had lured Watson with a \$2 million deal covering four years.

Watson becomes the second free agent the Yankees have signed away from the Red Sox, their arch-rivals in the American League East Division. Last year, New York signed pitcher Luis Tiant, who had left the Red Sox.

May's reported signing means a return to the Yankees. He played for New York for two seasons before being dealt to Baltimore in a 10-player trade June 15, 1976. The Orioles then traded him to Montreal in a deal which delivered reliever Don Stanhouse, another of the

May has been primarily a starting pitcher throughout his major league career but the Yankees project him as a left-handed reliever, balancing right-handers Rich Gossage and Ron Davis in the

"I have mixed emotions," Watson told the Boston Herald-American. "Apparently, the Yankees wanted my services very badly

He wanted to sign with Boston, but the Red Sox postponed negotiations and Watson's agent, Reich, apparently then advised the first baseman to test his market value in last Friday's free agent re-entry draft. Speculation is that veteran Carl Yas-

trzemski and catcher Carlton Fisk, whose career behind the plate may be over because of elbow problems, may split first base duty.

The loss of Watson also may eliminate the prospect of trading third baseman Butch Hobson for a pitcher. Losing put a big dent in Hobson — along with Watson — would corps.

The 26-year-old right-hander earned 10 of the 24 firstplace ballots to become the second NL reliever and the third in baseball history to win the prize. Mike Marshall won it for the Los Angeles Dodgers in 1974 and Sparky Lyle of the New York Yankees took the American League honor

Sutter also received six second-place votes and four third-place votes for a total of 72 points, with five points awarded for first-place mention, three points for second and one for third.

'In the National League, where there's no designated hitters, a bullpen can figure into about 130 games a year." he said. "I think that may be one reason relievers are a little more recognizable.

Niekro finished second with 66 points. Strikeout champion J.R. Richard of the Houston Astros was third with 41 points; followed by Tom Seaver of the Cincinnati Reds 20: Pittsburgh Pirates reliever Kent Tekulve, 14, and Phil Niekro of the Atlanta Braves, who was sixth with three

Sutter credited the arrival on May 23 of former New York Yankee Dick Tidrow with "taking a lot of the workload off my arm. Because Dick was able to work as much as he did. I was able to keep my strength through the sea-

He appeared in 62 games for the Cubs, who ended the season in fifth place in the NL East Division after fading from contention late in August.

Sutter compiled a 6-6 record and a 2.23 earned run average in 101 innings, striking out 110 batters and walking just 32 in becoming the second member of the Cubs to win the Cy Young. Ferguson Jenkins won it for Chicago in 1971.

Sutter said his major disappointment during the last year was "not being in the playoffs. It's great to get individual awards, but baseball is still a team sport and I want to play on a World Series team."

Sutter began experimenting with the split-fingered fastball under the tutelage of Fred Martin, the Cubs' long-time minor league pitching instructor who died last summer

Freddie taught me the pitch back in 1973," he said. "I was splitting my fingers on the ball to throw my change-up back then, and he had me start throwing it harder and har-

It wasn't until two years later, however, that Sutter managed to get control of the almost unhittable pitch.

"In the old days we might go over to, say, Alabama and throw a few interreptions and come back and throw some touchdown passes," said Yeoman. We were wilder in those days. But you don't have to live over there. You could come home and forget it."

The fifth-ranked Cougars will play the eighth-ranked Texas Longhorns before a capacity crowd in the Astrodome on Saturday in a game neither team likely will ever forget.

Houston goes into the game with an 8-0 season record and 5-0 in the SWC. Texas still has hopes of a conference title and Cotton Bowl bid with a 6-1 overall record and 3-1 SWC standard.

"You live with it longer when you lose to someone in the SWC," Yeoman said. "It's just a whole lot more important playing Baylor than Virginia Tech.

The Cougars still can produce eye-popping statistics operating from the Houston veer offense developed by Yeoman, but they do so more conserva-

"We've probably become more conservative in our end of the field," Yeoman said. "We'll call a little surer play like not throwing on the cross and going to the out cuts, something of that nature.

'We'll still throw for the big one but we'll do it under safer conditions.' Yeoman's conservatism also could be blamed in part for the Cougars' strong second half performances. UH seems to rely on its rugged defense in the first half while the offense figures out what the opposition is doing.

"It's not a case of holding back, we're just more restrained in the first half," Yeoman said. "We still have the same old goodies. We won't have anything new for the second half but by then maybe the opposition won't react as quickly to them.

A total of 55,155 tickets have been sold, which would make it the largest crowd ever to see a football game in the Astrodome.

Meanwhile, in Austin, sophomore Brad Beck and junior linebacker Mark Martignoni won battlefield promotions for the Houston game and little-used John Tobolka may replace tackle Terry Tausch, who has a hurt knee.

Tobolka has yet to earn a letter. Coach Fred Akers told the Longhorn Club on Wednesday that "as a result of the Texas Tech game" Beck will replace senior LeRoy King and Martignoni

Tausch has been Texas' most consistent offensive lineman this year, while

Offensive guard Joe Shearin and halfback A.J. "Jam" Jones also were hurt in the Tech game but should be ready to play, said Akers.

The victory, said Akers, "was a costly one, but we're training new faces to take up the slack. I promise you this - whoever makes the trip and goes on the football field will give it everything he's got.'

Southern Methodist football Coach Ron Meyer is getting grumbles from some of his freshmen who were prized schoolboy recruits a year ago. Meyer has had separate meetings this week with running backs Craig

James and Charles Wagoner. James, an All-Stater from Houston Stratford, was unhappy because he will not be in the starting lineup Saturday when SMU plays Wichita State.

Wagoner wasn't pleased because he was moved to fullback. 'Transferring is the last thing I want to do but there is a chance," said James, who was heavily courted by Alabama before deciding to attend SMU.

## Canadian Film Board Honore By Motion Picture Academy

has received more than 1,60 awards over the years," remarked James de B. Domville, chairman of the National Film Board of Canada. "But of course, this tribute is the most important, since Hollywood is the capital of the film workd. And the Oscar is the Oscar.

He spoke of last week's tribute by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences to the Film Board's 40th anni-Canadian-born Lorne Greene presided over the ceremonies, which included presentations by the Academy and the Motion Picture Producers Association of America

Six of the Film Board's achievements were screened; it has racked up 40 Oscar nominations in four decades, with three wins in the past two years.

Its shorts, cartoons and features carthe message of Canada throughout the world; a long feature, "Heat Wave, even appeared as a mini-series on U.S. network television in 1973.


Jim Domville, an urbane veteran of films who became Government Film Commissioner last January, was reflective as the 40th celebration approached the end. It began with an open house at the Board headquarters in Montreal May 2 ("we were prepared for 5,000 and 18,000 people came"), continued with tributes in London and Paris and nationwide activities in Canada.

Amid the encomiums, the National Film Board has been suffering a budgetary crunch, Domville reported

"We were also afflicted with Proposi-tion 13-itis," he said. "The Canadian government went on a crusade to cut millions from the budget, and of course cultural activities are always an easy tar-

The Film Board faced a double jeopardy. Not only was our own budget cut; government departments, for which

and such programs always go first. As a result, we are operating on an annual budget of \$40 million against \$46 million last year. Inflation would make that \$50 million, so we've had a 20 percent reduc-

'If such a pich continues, I am afraid we might lose our creative oomph. I hope the budget crunch will be rectified by this time next year.'

The Board receives three-quarters of its support from the government, generating the rest with income from films, as

well as still photography and books.
"Even though funding comes from official sources, the Board has always maintained an arm's length approach toward the government," Domville observed. "This is something Europeans find hard to understand. But we have a long tradition in our country, whether it is the Film Board, the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation or the Canada (Arts)

we provided films, also suffered cuts, Council. We have always been free to

criticize the government."

That has been true since the Board's founding in 1939 by the noted British documentarian John Grierson, a mil tant socialist.

Domville was asked how he felt about the Canadian boom in feature film making, stimulated by tax breaks for investors. He has a closeup view, since he also sits on the board that approve those films.






