Some Still Have Canning Sugar Coming

Persons who did not receive 10 pounds of sugar per capita, may get an additional amount, the ration board announced Monday.

For example, if you received only seven pounds per person for canning, you may get an additional three pounds. This includes the amount for canning and preserving. However, you are asked to not apply for the additional amount unless you are positive it can be used for canning, as a report will have to be made to the ration board on how the sugar was used, not later than November 1. Nine pounds of sugar is sufficient for 36 quarts of canned fruit, the board said.

For those who have made application for war ration books lost or destroyed, new books will be issued now if applicant will call at the local office.

Navy Wants 165 Recruits From Plains District

Enough men to equal the crew of a submarine now building will be enlisted from the Lubbock Navy recruiting district each month during August and September, J. E. Calloway, recruiter in charge of this district, announced today. The district includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Keel, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry and Yoakum counties.

Sponsoring the campaign to enlist at least 165 men from this district each month will be American Legion posts and civic organizations in each county. Committees have been organized and supplied with Navy recruiting literature. Individual members will be designated "Volunteer Navy Recruiters."

A monthly quota of volunteer enlistments for naval service has been assigned each county, based on population. Exact figures on complements of naval vessels are secret, Calloway said, but certain figures may be used for recruiting purposes. In the Houston Navy recruiting district, comprising the southern half of Texas, a recent slogan was "Wanted, 1,000 Volunteers for Replacement of the Cruiser Houston."

Navy county with a population of 61,318, is asked to furnish six volunteers each of the two months. The recruiting slogan for this county is "Bailey County Will Enlist Six Men for the Navy This Month."

Navy enlistment ages are from 17 to 50 years. Unskilled men have opportunity to attend Navy trade schools. Qualified skilled men may be enlisted as petty officers with monthly pay ranging from \$78 to \$126. It is necessary that application for enlistment be made before induction into the Army.

Rites Are Held For Victim Of Heart Attack

Otto (Jack) Mayfield, 34-year-old government auditor, died suddenly of a heart attack shortly after 10 o'clock Friday morning while eating breakfast at the Muleshoe Coffee Shop.

Mayfield whose home is at Fort Worth, was a frequent visitor to Muleshoe. He was a cousin by marriage of Mrs. E. C. (Lefty) McWilliams, and was talking to Mr. McWilliams when the heart attack occurred. The McWilliams are owners of the coffee shop.

Mayfield had been bothered by heart trouble the past few years, but appeared to be feeling well when he came to the coffee shop for breakfast. He had arrived in Muleshoe late Thursday afternoon, spending the night here. He was enroute to Fort Worth from Santa Fe, N. M., where he had been on business.

While talking to McWilliams, Mayfield suddenly slumped over in the booth in which they sat. He was carried to a bed in the living quarters at the rear of the coffee shop and a physician was called. Mayfield was dead when the physician arrived.

He is survived by his wife and mother, both of Fort Worth. His father's death occurred three weeks ago.

The body was shipped Saturday to Fort Worth, where funeral services were held at 4 p. m. Monday. Burial was in the Greenwood cemetery.

Mr. and Mrs. McWilliams drove Mr. Mayfield's car to Fort Worth, but were unable to stay for the funeral services.

Violators Of Auto Tax Law Are Warned

Reports reaching the office of Collector of Internal Revenue indicate that most persons subject to the \$5.00 automobile tax due July 1, 1942, have already purchased the required stamp, but that in some sections many automobile owners have failed to purchase this stamp. Beginning Aug. 1, 1942, a concerted drive by deputy collectors in every section got underway, and all persons subject to the tax, using their cars without the stamp affixed, will be vigorously prosecuted. Such tax evaders will be subject to a \$25.00 fine and thirty days imprisonment in addition to payment of the tax. This automobile use tax is a war measure, and all patriotic people should respond without delay.

The most important thing to remember is that the \$5.00 automobile tax stamp cannot be purchased from Post Offices after July 31, 1942, and purchases will have to be made from the Collector of Internal Revenue, and late purchasers will be required to establish the fact under oath that they have not used their cars prior to the purchase date of the stamp, in order to avoid penalty.

Speeders Are Warned By Ration Board

Speeders were given a stern warning today by E. W. Johnson, chairman of the Bailey County War Ration and Rationing Board, that speeding tickets issued against them by either state or local police will cause them to forfeit their eligibility for new tires or retreads.

"Abuse of tires by speeding must be stopped," Mr. Johnson emphasized. "We have been advised by Mark McCee, the Texas OPA director, that carbon copies of all speeding tickets issued on the highways by the Texas Highway Patrol will be forwarded to the local board.

"We are asking city police and county officers in Bailey County to extend this same assistance to us in enforcing the vital wartime necessity for conserving rubber."

Mr. Johnson said the local board had been requested by the state OPA office to regard speeding as an abuse of tires and as reason for voiding a person's eligibility for new tires or retreads. After such an offense, the speeder will have to give the local board conclusive proof that he is observing the 40-mile speed limit imposed by the Office of Defense Transportation, before he again can become eligible.

"OPA and ODT inspectors are beginning to take the license number of speeders," Mr. Johnson said. "These numbers will be sent to our board. A lot of city delivery trucks and even big freight line trucks and public buses still are ignoring the 40-mile limit. They may ignore it, but we are not going to. The next time these fellows apply for tires, if we find they've been speeding, they will know that we mean business."

Civic Leaders To Meet, Map Salvage Drive

Civic leaders of 15 South Plains counties are being invited to a meeting of interest to those who are cooperating in the all-out salvage drive now in progress throughout the nation. E. E. Kirkpatrick, chairman of the Texas Salvage Committee, and W. H. Rodgers, chairman of the Lubbock district, have called the meeting for 2 o'clock Wednesday, August 12 at the Hilton Hotel, Lubbock.

Ways and means of getting together all the scrap in this area and how to get it into war production will be the subject of discussion at the meeting.

Letters are being mailed this week by Lewis C. Huff, assistant executive secretary of the Texas Salvage Committee, to salvage chairmen, county judges, mayors, Boy Scout executives, WPA executives, junk dealers and all civic groups in having representatives at this meeting so that the area can coordinate its plans.

Bailey County's Wheat Allotment Set At 6,727 Acres

Aug. 31 Deadline For Applications, Wheat Insurance

Applications for the new three-year all-risk wheat crop insurance which was accepted at the county AAA office, Lonnie Arnold, chairman of the county OPA committee, has announced.

This is the fifth year in which wheat growers have been able to obtain wheat crop insurance from the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

Meanwhile, loss adjustments on the 1942 crop are nearing completion, the chairman said. To date 10 claims, totaling 646 bushels have been approved and sent to the FCIC. Forty-seven contracts insuring the production of 12,786 bushels of wheat in the county were in force on the 1942 crop.

Federal all-risk wheat crop insurance protects the grower against all unavoidable risks, such as hail, drought and insect damage, Arnold explained.

When the grower signs an application for insurance, he signs at the same time a note which is due July 10 of the year in which the crop is harvested. At or prior to maturity this note may be deducted from the cash equivalent, or after maturity it may be deducted from payments due the grower under the AAA program, from proceeds of commodity loans, or from indemnity payments.

Arnold predicted insurance sales in the county would be about the same as last year's sales. Deadline for signing applications for insurance is August 31 or before seeding wheat, whichever is earlier.

Less For Your Money When You Buy 1943 Tags

Less for your money—that's what you'll get in your 1943 auto license tags if you compute their value by their size.

Automobile license tags for 1943 in Texas will be "tags" instead of tags, will be 1-20th the size of this year's tags, but will cost the automobile owner just the same fee he paid this year, according to information from the state highway department at Austin.

The "tag" for next year will use just four square inches of metal, being one inch high and four inches long. It will contain two letters, four numerals, the name of this state, and the numerals "43". The plan is to have the tab inserted in the plate-holder at one corner, to show that the 1943 license has been paid, but leaving the 1942 license tag with its larger numerals in place both front and rear on the car for easier identification by number.

Purpose of the tiny tag is to save metal. Production of the tags put out for 1942 cost the state approximately \$142,000. This year the state plans to save approximately one-third of that much money, and 19,000 lbs. of the sheet metal used this year.

Proposed State Amendments

H. J. R. No. 24 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article V of the Constitution of Texas by providing that the Legislature shall have the power by local or general law, in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants to create other courts having exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters; fixing the time for an election therefor; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for a proclamation of such election and the advertisement thereof; and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas as amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 22-a and reading as follows:

"Section 22-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by local or general law (without the necessity of advertising any such local law), in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants according to the then last Federal Census, to create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special

election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, at which time all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution, providing that the Legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

Those voters opposed to such Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution, providing that the Legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the Amendment, the same shall become part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have it published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

H. J. R. No. 1 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49a, requiring all bills passed by the Legislature on and after January 1, 1945, appropriating money for any purpose, to be sent to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for his approval, and fixing the duties of the Comptroller with reference thereto; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by the General Revenue Fund on September 1, 1943, providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State, prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, immediately after Section 49, a section to be known as Section 49a, to read as follows:

"Section 49a. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of Public Accounts in advance of each Regular Session of the Legislature to prepare and submit to the Governor and to the Legislature upon its convening a statement under oath showing fully the financial condition of the State Treasury at the close of the last fiscal period and an estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the then current fiscal year. There shall also be contained in said statement an itemized estimate of the anticipated revenue based on the laws then in effect that will be received by and for the State from all sources showing the fund accounts to be credited during the succeeding biennium and said statement shall contain such other information as may be required by law. Supplemental statements shall be submitted at any Special Session of the Legislature and at such other times as may be necessary to show probable changes."

"From and after January 1, 1945, save in the case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each House, no appropriation in excess of the cash and anticipated revenue of the funds from which such appropriation is to be made shall be valid. From and after January 1, 1945, no bill containing an appropriation shall be considered as passed or be sent to the Governor for consideration until and unless the Comptroller of Public Accounts endorses his certificate thereon showing that the amount appropriated is within the amount estimated to be available in the affected funds. When the Comptroller finds an appropriation bill exceeds the estimated revenue he shall endorse such finding thereon and return to the House in which same originated. Such information shall be immediately made known to both the House of Representatives and the Senate and the necessary steps shall be taken to bring such appropriation to within the revenue, either by providing additional revenue or reducing the appropriation."

"For the purpose of financing the outstanding obligations of the General Revenue Fund of the State and placing its current accounts on a cash basis the Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by said fund on September 1, 1943, provided such bonds shall not draw interest in excess of two (2) per cent per annum and shall mature, within twenty (20) years from date."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas, at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, being November 3, 1942, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to the availability of funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have

printed on their ballots, the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to the availability of funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

S. J. R. No. 28 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under the State or the United States, except as prescribed in the Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas or the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the third day of November, 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

"Against the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

State-Owned Jacks And Stallions Are Now Available

AUSTIN, Tex. — In order to help meet the growing demand for saddle and draft horses and mules, Texas farmers and stockmen who need a stallion or jack should make application immediately to the Jack and Stallion Division of the State Department of Agriculture, Austin.
The department issued that statement today with the announcement that there are now several of the state-owned jacks and stallions available. The stallions include Belgian, percheron and saddle types.
The animals may be leased by stockmen or farmers for \$30 yearly, with the remuneration to be derived from breeding fees. The fee limit is \$10. The animals will be delivered to the leasor free of charge by the department.
Curtailment of supplies of rubber and gasoline is expected to bring about a greater demand for horses and mules, and thereby increase the demand for the services of the state-owned jacks and stallions. It is estimated that the state animals have already increased the wealth of the state by about \$3,000,000, although since its creation in 1934, the Jack and Stallion Division has never cost the people of the state a penny for its upkeep and administration.
