Chilly, Clear Weather To Continue

The chilly but clear weather that entered the South Plains early Sunday should continue its reign over most of the area today, even though today's temperatures should be slightly colder than those reported Sunday.

The high today is expected to be near 50, a drop of about five degrees from Sunday's high of 55 degrees.

Winds should be southerly at five to 10 mph today, shifting to northerly at 10 to 15 mph as some cooler air passes through the area, followed by a slight warming trend.

There is a chance for light snow across most of the Panhandle and Eastern New Mexico late today as the weather system moves in from the north. The Oklahoma Panhandle and areas to the north and west will be under a winter

storm watch during the afternoon and evening hours as the system is expected to unleash its last bits of moisture after covering the Rockies with snow.

Snow and snow flurries were reported across most of the northern plains states Sunday and rain fell across most of the deep south, with Valdosta, Ga., reporting two inches of rain in a six-hour period.

An upper air disturbance will track across the northern sections of the southwest from west to east during the day today, resulting in the predicted snow and flurries across the more north-

ern sections. Arkansas and portions of Texas and Oklahoma should receive scattered rain showers.

Nuremberg Trial Participants Vow To Tend To 'Unfinished Business'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nearly 200 participants in the Nazi war crimes trials at Nuremberg, Germany, held a reunion here this weekend that evoked memories of the Holocaust of World War II and prompted pledges to tend to "unfinished business."

The gathering marked the 30th anniversary of the conclusion of the historic trials in which some of the leading figures of Nazi Germany were held accountable for racial persecution of the Jews.

"Today, 30 years later, the history is not finished," said Telford Taylor, the chief prosecutor at Nuremberg. The trials "have cast a long shadow."

He noted that West Germany has extended the statute of limitations on war crimes and that the United States is stepping up its campaign to deport Nazis.

cooperation in providing documents and witnesses that could help deportation efforts.

But the weekend was as much a look back for the reunion's participants, many of whom had not seen each other for 30 years.

Drexel A. Sprecher, a prosecutor at Nuremberg who is now retired and living in Chevy Chase, Md., was the principal organizer of the reunion. The idea was hatched over lunch about five months ago by Sprecher and two Nuremberg colleagues, Charles Horsky and Walter J. Rockler.

Horsky is a lawyer here and Rockler is currently on leave from his law firm to head the Justice Department's renewed effort to find and deport Nazis in this country.

Sprecher called the roll at a reunion dinner Saturday night, asking for court

interpreters, translators, researchers, administrators, secretaries and lawyers to stand in turn.

"Who have I missed?" Sprecher asked.

"The defendants," came a reply from the audience that caused ripples of laughter.

Taylor, a law professor at Columbia University, said the lessons of Nuremberg have assumed a significance that few could have imagined at the time.

For example, he said that Americans who refused to go to war in Vietnam cited Nuremberg to make the assertion that there is a duty of conscience not to follow unjust orders.

Defenders of the Vietnam policy said the lesson of Nuremberg was to fight aggression, Taylor continued. And, he added, even the North Vietnamese invoked Nuremberg when they threatened to hold trials for captured Americans.

Dear Joyce: Is there any federal aid available to a student for law school?
—S.S., Cleveland, Ohio

Here's a simple but potentially golden tip for the millions of students who are short of money for college: the new edition of what unquestionably is the nation's best token-priced financial aid reference is off the press.

"Need A Lift?" is a compact guide of scholarships and loans published each year by The American Legion as an educational service to young people. Federal and state financial aid programs are included along with a large number of private sector donors.

The organization subsidizes the guide which is why you can obtain a copy for the bargain price of \$1. Order "Need A Lift?" from The American Legion, Box 1055, Indianapolis, Ind. 46206. Expect to wait up to six weeks for delivery because the guide is mailed the most economical way.

Turning to the question of federal funds for law school, Uncle Sam's loan and work-study programs can be used for legal studies but grant money is restricted to disadvantaged minority students and it flows through the Council on Legal Education Education Opportunities, Suite 940, 818 18th St. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006.

The Truman Scholarships — among the best around and worth up to \$20,000 — can be used for law school but the catch is you must apply during your sophomore year of college and not wait until you already have a bachelor's degree.

Designed to prepare talented college men and women for careers in government, the Truman Scholarships pay up to \$5,000 per year for four years and the stipends begin in the junior year of college. Details are available free from the Harry S. Truman Scholarship Foundation, 712 Jackson Place N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006.

Women over 30 who are not yet lawyers but who have worked as legal secretaries, paralegals, court reporters and the like may be interested in the new Joanie Caucus Fellowship Program; it awards between \$1,000 and \$4,000 annually to female law students. Further information is available from the Office of Admissions, 220 Boalt Hall, University of California, Berkeley, Calif. 94720.

Scholarship hunting for legal studies is not unlike tracking aid for any kind of higher education: talk with admissions officers at law schools and search financial aid catalogs at large libraries.

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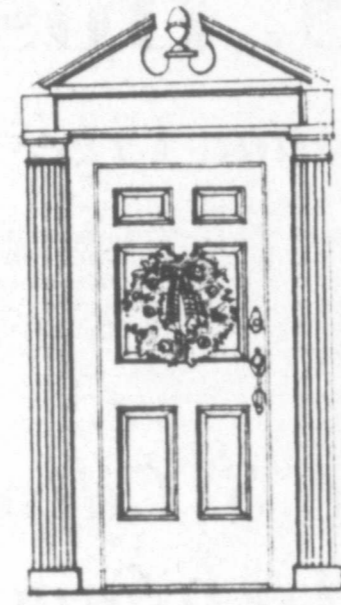

PLO Working To Change Image

Yasser Arafat Out To 'Win Friends'

While Yasser Arafat prepares a new generation of potential martyrs in the guerrilla war against Israel, his Palestine Liberation Organization is going all out to polish its image and win support in the West.

The ultimate aim of this policy may be to seek a political alternative to the incessant bloodletting.

Arafat's offer to intercede for American hostages held by Iranian revolutionaries in the U.S. Embassy in Tehran is one more step in his bridge-building campaign to win friends and debtors among Israel's traditional supporters.

In recent months, the PLO has forged links in Western Europe and gained some public relations mileage in the United States, stronghold of Israel's international support.

Recent history has demonstrated, however, that such bridges can collapse overnight in the wake of a Palestinian terrorist strike. Alternating his roles between guerrilla leader and international mediator has been the hallmark of Arafat's mercurial leadership and the key to his own survival within the diverse Palestinian movement.

A pattern is evident: When Arafat foresees clear rewards on the political front, he dons his statesman's cap, as he is doing now. When political moves appear doomed, he adopts the terror-war option, often because the more militant of those around him are pressuring him.

The 49-year-old PLO chief often complained after the Lebanese civil war, which diverted and depleted his forces for nearly two years, that the 1975-76 moratorium on cross-border raids against Israel gained nothing for his movement in the interna-

tional arena.

When the PLO saw no gain for it in Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's peace initiative with Israel, Arafat threw in the diplomatic towel, assumed a lead in the Arab hard-line opposition and unleashed a bloody raid against the Israelis on the Tel Aviv-Haifa highway in early 1978.

He chose then to risk his flimsy Western bridges because they took him nowhere, his associates said at the time. Israel's subsequent invasion of Lebanon, which caused fewer Palestinian losses than many expected, bolstered Arafat's stock in the Arab community and inspired new confidence among his 12,000-man guerrilla forces.

But Israel's stepped-up punishment raids against guerrilla strongholds this year have taken their toll, and Arafat has again turned to the political stage.

He broke the ice with Austria's chancellor, Bruno Kreisky, this summer and later got an unexpectedly warm welcome in Spain. Late last month, the Italian government bestowed its "political recognition" on the PLO and high Belgian officials met with an Arafat emissary in what the PLO interpreted as de-facto recognition.

In the United States, the resignation of U.N. Ambassador Andrew Young following his unauthorized contacts with the PLO touched off a demand among many of Young's fellow blacks for U.S. recognition of the organization, which regards itself as a liberation movement. Arafat warmly greeted a delegation of black American

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Stassen Hopes To Break Long Losing Streak

WASHINGTON (AP) — Harold Stassen hasn't been elected to public office since 1942, but that hasn't stopped him from running for president and running again, and again and again and again and again.

He says if he were to sit out 1980, he would have no impact on public policy. And if he were to be nominated by the Republicans and win the presidency, he would have more impact than anyone else.

So, he says, he has chosen a middle course. He will run and make speeches, and be interviewed and be heard and have some impact.

Most candidates love to talk about campaign strategy. Stassen loves to talk about issues but becomes evasive when he talks about his campaign.

"I'm not an optimist," he says. "I'm a realist."

There appears to be an element of "Let's Pretend" in the exercise.

At age 31, Stassen was the "boy governor" of Minnesota — the youngest governor in history, and twice re-elected. In his third term, he resigned to serve as a naval officer in World War II.

In 1944, his keynote speech impressed the GOP convention. Minnesotans offered his name for president.

In 1948, he sought the nomination, but lost to Thomas E. Dewey.

In 1952, he ran again. But in the convention battle between Dwight D. Eisenhower and Robert A. Taft, he threw his delegates to Eisenhower. He served in Eisenhower's cabinet as foreign operations director.

In 1956, he offered himself as a candidate for vice president in a futile attempt to dump Eisenhower's first-term partner, Richard Nixon.

In 1958 and 1962, he ran for governor of Pennsylvania. In 1959, he ran for mayor of Philadelphia.

In 1964, 1968 and 1976, he ran for president again.

He is 72 — and jokes that he makes Ronald Reagan look young — but he is still big, 6 feet 3 inches tall, with a strong handshake.

A lightly greyed toupee hides his baldness. He practices international law, with offices in Philadelphia, Minneapolis and Washington.

He says that he doesn't tire of running, that his wife doesn't mind and that his son and daughter — both Ph.D.'s, both teachers — have never asked him to sit one out.

What sort of Republican is he? "Progressive. Out in front. Pioneering. Pushing out for answers."

He says oil-importing nations should negotiate a price reduction with the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries by persuading OPEC that the disruptions of ever-rising oil prices endanger everyone.

He would negotiate with Russia to get Soviet troops out of Cuba, holding trade concessions as bait.

At home, he would have both sides on the abortion issue consult, study and debate until they agreed on a constitutional amendment.

He would fight inflation with a balanced budget by cutting every agency's spending until the deficit vanished — even if that meant cutting cancer research. Nothing would be sacred.

Stassen says he learned the power of negotiation years ago.

"I was in the middle of negotiating the Red Army out of Austria after the war. Fellows said, 'Oh, they'll never pull the Red Army out of Austria.' We just kept at it. One day they agreed."

Every time he runs, Stassen hears the same question.

Do people laugh at him? "Never as much as they did when I first ran for governor."

Gas Line Leaks Contribute To Morton's Problems

(Continued From Page One)
 now, that thing's killing us."
 Morton is almost literally bleeding to death, actually, as audits indicate that those 1979 figures are almost twice as bad as the preceding year, and those weren't exactly uplifting. During the five-year period encompassing fiscal years 1974 through 1978, the gas system leaked 418,893,000 cubic feet of natural gas, causing losses of city revenue of \$236,776, according to city audits performed during that time.
 The audits showed that:
 — in fiscal year 1974, the pipeline leaked 83,204,000 cubic feet of natural gas, costing the city \$18,471.

— in fiscal year 1975, the pipeline leaked 63,807,000 cubic feet of natural gas, costing the city \$15,250.
 — in fiscal year 1976, the pipeline leaked 130,268,000 cubic feet of natural gas, costing the city \$80,246. That loss was 41 percent of all the gas piped through the system.
 — in fiscal year 1977, the pipeline leaked 84,345,000 cubic feet, of natural gas, costing the city \$60,475.
 — in fiscal year 1978, the pipeline leaked 57,272,000 cubic feet of natural gas, costing the city \$62,334.
 Those figures, added to the 1979 losses, show that through fiscal years 1974-1979, the Morton natural gas pipeline

system leaked 527,119,300 cubic feet of natural gas, costing the city \$360,713.
 And the situation got worse. Morton's natural gas crisis finally came to a head in May, when Carroll Shelton, a certified public accountant who has handled the city's audits since 1968, noticed that "two-thirds of all the gas in the system leaked away."
 "I told them (city council) we'd be bankrupt in three or four months," he said. "And we are."
 Former city manager Wiley Hodge, who stepped down during an emergency city council meeting Oct. 29 and is now facing the awesome responsibility of handling the runaway network, explained that the system is constructed of ancient "invasion pipe," which was designed to carry oil to U.S. military forces during wartime, and "certainly not something designed to last 40 years."
 "There were always plans to replace it with top quality pipe," he said. "But when gas was only 15 cents a thousand (cubic feet), the losses were considered no big deal. Now that we're paying so much more, the figures have become immense."
 "This was never a concern to past councils because gas was so cheap," Hodge said. "This thing came up 10 years ago and the council just didn't do anything."
 The city council did make a move toward replacing the system in 1977, when Hodge first came to work for the city. At that time, the council secured a \$250,000 Community Development Block Grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, from which \$180,000 was earmarked for replacement of the leaky network. All the materials have been purchased, said Hodge, but only \$20,000 of the grant remains, and only about 11,000 feet of the 52,000 feet of pipe have been laid.
 "We felt like we could put the pipe in for about \$1 a foot then, so we bought all the materials," Hancock explained. "Then we found out it wasn't quite that easy — that we had to work around all the water and sewer pipes that were already there, and that it would cost us \$3 to \$5 a foot to get it in the ground."
 "Meanwhile," he said, "those leaks were just a-blowin' and a-goin'."
 Hodge explained the city lost some other gas revenue this summer because the abundance of rainfall allowed many farmers with natural gas-fueled irrigation systems to farm dryland all year long. "That probably cost us a good \$80,000," he said.
 "In the winter we can make a profit even with our great leaks, but in the

summer sales go way down while our overhead stays the same," he explained.
 "The irrigation sales in an average dry summer are about equal to what Morton residents will buy in an average winter, so that usually gets us through the summer. But this summer was so wet no body used any gas. We had some wells we didn't even crank up."
 Morton also operates its own water system, which doesn't leak. "We hope to make enough on gas each year to pay the city employees and keep a little ahead. We have a bond on the water system that costs us about \$2,600 a month, so it takes all we bring in," Hancock said. "That gas system is supposed to be our bread and butter here."
 The city council's action leading to the declaration of emergency "Are simply amazing," said one city employee. "They should have seen it coming and done something about it."
 Minutes from city council meetings throughout 1979 indicate that as early as January 18, city employee Shelby Chaney recommended the city purchase a gas leak detector and start fixing the leaks. Hazel Hancock told him we were working on the situation and would continue."

Morton policemen), it has lended some support. 17 of 27 city employees were laid off to save money, the search for a city manager is on and the bond election still is being considered.
Difficult Problems Remain
 In the meantime, there remain some very real and difficult problems for the town, including a frustrating Catch-22 with the gas system. "What would be best if we could put a bunch of people out there and just get all the new system in the ground as fast as possible," said Hodge. "But since we don't have the money to pay them, we can only have a minimum of people out there working on it. And the fewer people we have working on the lines, the longer it will take to fix them and the more lost gas there is the more its going to cost us."
 "We've begun to collect our tax rolls and by Jan. 31, we should have about \$77,000 from there," said Shelton. "We've laid off the police department and several more employees and the city will now operate as conservatively as possible and provide the minimum amount of services. And once we get square with the bank, we think we can borrow about \$25,000 to keep us going."
 "We've made some good progress with the leak detector, and we hope to cut the losses from the gas lines to a liveable amount in the next 90 days and

hope we have a mild winter," said Hodge. "Actually, we have a crew of five working on the gas lines, and it's been very efficient. We like it like that."
Manager's Job Open
 "We'll interview three men for the city manager's job this Monday night (tonight)," said Hancock. "If we don't get a city manager soon, we'll very likely go to a consultant and get him to explain all our options to us and exactly what each of them entails. Then we can reach some decision on our own."
 "Currently, we feel like we're looking at three choices," he continued. "We can vote a tax raise and borrow from the bank; we can issue bonds on the city; or we can have a bond election. I really don't know what we'll do for sure right now."
 "We do feel like the worst part is over with, though, and now we just have to concentrate on picking up the pieces and going from here," he said. "Now everyone will know exactly what the situation is, and we hope they'll continue to give us their support."
 "You know, when things are going good, almost anybody can run the show," Hancock philosophized. "But when things start going bad, it takes some pretty special people to keep the show running. And that's what we need right now."

White House Defends Policies

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter won't officially become a candidate for re-election until next month, but top administration aides already sound eager to tangle with his principal Democratic challenger, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy.
 The Massachusetts senator had barely finished making his first speech as a declared presidential contender last week when a White House official remarked anonymously:
 "The president intends to run on his record. It is our impression that Senator Kennedy intends to run away from his."
 Kennedy also drew criticism during the first week of his campaign from offi-

cials willing to speak for the record, including one member of Carter's Cabinet, his press secretary and his top inflation fighter.
 The Massachusetts senator launched his campaign on Wednesday, preceding Carter's expected Dec. 4 announcement by nearly a month.

Hiss Observes 75th Birthday

CLEVELAND (AP) — Alger Hiss, who has been trying to prove to the world for 30 years that he was never a Communist agent, was 75 years old Sunday.

Hiss was denounced in 1949 as a spy, denied it, stood trial for perjury, was convicted and sent to jail. That chain of events helped opened the door for a full-blown Red scare in the United States.

Hiss came to Cleveland last week to visit his goddaughter, Ann Wyatt-Brown of suburban Cleveland Heights. During his visit, the usually low-key Hiss consented to speak to a class at Case Western Reserve University.

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Runoff Candidate Has Come Long Way

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — When young W. Otis Higgs Jr. quit his teaching job to go to law school 15 years ago, some people warned him he was making a major mistake.

"I had people say 'Man, you are crazy,'" Higgs, now 42, recalled as he talked about his race for the Memphis mayor's post, which climaxes in a runoff election Thursday.

"In those days, a black man who had a teaching job was said to be doing about as well as he could expect. But I have never allowed the way people think to dictate the course of my life," Higgs said.

Higgs' enrollment in law school was not the last time the grandson of a door-to-door produce peddler did something that amazed or shocked people.

Now Higgs figures he is in a good position to both shock and amaze a lot of people who do not think a black man can be elected mayor of Tennessee's largest city.

For the second time in four years, the onetime busboy, factory worker, teacher, lawyer and judge will meet incumbent Mayor Wyeth Chandler in a runoff contest.

Blacks are mayors of three other major Southern cities: Richard Arrington, elected in Birmingham, Ala., last week; Ernest Morial, halfway through his first term in New Orleans; and Maynard Jackson, mayor of Atlanta since 1973.

At first glance, it would seem that the numbers are against Higgs. In recent years, Memphis elections have been split along racial lines, and black voters here are outnumbered 145,832 to 196,132, according to the Shelby County Election Commission.

But there have been some changes since 1975 when Higgs lost to Chandler by almost 30,000 votes in the first runoff.

Population Boom Feared By Small-Town Mayor

DELTA, Utah (AP) — The mayor of Delta, Utah — pop. 2,100 — says he cannot recall that the desert village ever had a murder or bank robbery in all its 60 years of existence.

But he fears that will change if two enormous construction projects — the nation's largest coal-fired power plant and the MX mobile missile system — go ahead as planned.

Mayor Leland Roper predicts a 10-fold population explosion within a decade.

Sometime next month, Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus is expected to approve construction of the \$4.5 billion In-

termountain Power Project 10 miles north of here. That alone will triple Delta's population within eight years.

But Roper says that is nothing compared to the explosive growth that would occur if President Carter deployed the \$3 billion MX system in Utah and Nevada.

Exact figures are not yet available, but Roper estimates the area population would boom to 20,000 within 10 years if both projects were built. Over the past 10 years, the city has grown a humble 6 percent.

"I don't know how we can stand them both," said Roper, who has lived

here all his 56 years and — like many residents — raises alfalfa. He is paid \$300 a year as mayor.

As well as the fear of crime, residents worry about their religious traditions. Delta is about 90 percent Mormon, and "our predominant religion will become the minority," Roper predicts.

The Air Force estimates 25,000 workers would be needed during peak MX construction from 1985 to 1987. That figure would drop to 10,000 upon completion of the project in 1989.

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Consideration Of Budget May Be Over

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators could cast the last vote this week in the lengthy legislative consideration of the federal fiscal 1980 budget or they may continue the congressional confrontation a little longer.

Here is the status of major legislation:

Fiscal 1980 Budget

*The Senate is set to decide whether to settle the long-running argument with the House over terms of the budget for fiscal 1980, the year that opened Oct. 1.

Since Jan. 22, when President Carter presented his initial recommendations for the spending and taxing year, the lawmakers have been examining and voting on budget proposals. Carter's latest revision calls for a \$33.2 billion deficit.

Last week, by 65-27, the Senate approved a proposed compromise \$547.6 billion spending package containing a \$29.8 billion budget deficit and setting defense outlays at \$129.9 billion.

The House later agreed to that basic plan, 205-190, but deleted a related requirement that the lawmakers make \$3.6 billion in social program savings. The measure went back to the Senate which now must decide whether to go along with the House or continue the dispute.

Arms Treaty

*Senate approval of SALT II, the proposed new strategic arms limitation treaty between the United States and the Soviet Union, is being recommended by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

In a key foreign policy victory for Carter, the panel voted 9-6 last week in favor of the pact which now faces lengthy debate and an uncertain fate in the full Senate. Supporters must round up a two-thirds majority vote to win approval of the treaty.

Chrysler Aid

*The House Banking Committee is ready to take up a subcommittee-endorsed recommendation by the Carter administration calling for the federal government to guarantee up to \$1.5 billion in loans to the financially troubled Chrysler Corp.

Such a guarantee would be less costly for the nation than dealing with the impact of a Chrysler bankruptcy, Treasury Secretary G. William Miller told Congress last week.

Welfare Revision

*The House, by a 222-184 vote, passed a version of Carter's welfare-revision plan and sent it to the Senate. The president said the legislation to restructure key programs for aiding the poor would be "a crucial step forward in the nation's 10-year effort to provide vitally needed reform of the welfare system."

The bill includes a federally ordered minimum payment floor for roughly 11 million persons now drawing welfare under the program of aid to families with dependent children.

Gasoline Rationing

*Congressional compromise standby gasoline-rationing legislation was signed into law last week by Carter who said he would produce a program "that will be acceptable, adequate and fair."

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World War II Hero Remembered As 'Real Man'

NEW ULM, Minn. (AP) — When Gen. Douglas MacArthur presented World War II's third Medal of Honor, he praised 1st Lt. Willibald Bianchi "for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty."

In St. Paul and Washington, politicians lauded a Minnesota widow's loving son who fought ferociously on Bataan's bloody battlefields.

Italian-language newspapers in the United States hailed the farm boy whose last name sounded Italian. Bianchi's forebears actually came from France and Germany.

On this Veterans Day, there are some hometown folks here, very few, who still remember Willibald Bianchi.

"In the 1940s, everyone in Minnesota knew about him," recalled Magdaline Marti, one of Bianchi's four sisters and his closest kin still living in New Ulm.

An uncle, Alois Eibner, 84, said Bianchi "brought honor to his town" with the bravery he displayed in the Philippines.

It was ironic that Bianchi came from New Ulm, a town whose loyalty and patriotism were challenged in two world wars because most townspeople were of German ancestry.

"The city is proud to be the home of Lt. Bianchi," the New Ulm Journal editorialized. "New Ulm glories in the honor which has come to one of her sons. We hope, among other things, this will help to answer the question: 'How does New Ulm stand on this war?'"

On Feb. 3, 1942, when a rifle platoon was ordered to wipe

out two Japanese machine gun nests, Bianchi volunteered to lead.

Early in the advance, he was shot in the hand and could no longer grasp his rifle. He moved forward, firing with his pistol. He found one gunners nest and silenced it with hand grenades. As he did, two machine gun bullets ripped muscles in his chest.

Bianchi fought on. He climbed atop a disabled American tank and turned its anti-aircraft gun on the enemy. Several

bullets hit him. A grenade blast knocked him off the tank, but by then Bianchi had so weakened the other nest that infantrymen easily captured it.

He was back in action, promoted to captain, just one

month later.

Those who knew him best were not surprised by Bianchi's pluck.

"He was strong and courageous," said his uncle Alois. "When he made up his mind to do something, he followed through!"

"He was proud to be in service," recalled his sister Magdaline.

"When he was in school and guys were bothering his sisters, he would wade in and wipe out the whole gang," said another sister, Josephine McGraw of Wayzata.

"He was a real man, but sensitive and loving," said a third sister, Mary Torpey of Crosslake. She said that Willibald, as a boy, went into the woods each spring to pick wild flowers for his mother.

Bianchi dropped out of high school after his father died in a hunting accident. The only son, he helped out on the family dairy and turkey farm and hunted pheasants, rabbits and deer. He became an expert marksman.

He finished high school at an extension program in St. Paul then enrolled in the animal husbandry program at South Dakota State University, working his way through college as a janitor. He was on the poultry judging team, went out for boxing and played football.

He wore his ROTC uniform a lot, even when he went home on weekends, partly because he could not afford much clo-

thing but also because he liked soldering. Hewas known as Bill, but his closest friends jokingly nicknamed him "Medals" because he was so proud of his ROTC decorations. He was a cadet major.

He graduated in 1939 and was commissioned a second lieutenant in 1940. Less than two years later, he was sent to the Philippines.

When Bataan fell on April 9, 1942, barely two months after his heroism, Bianchi was taken captive. He survived the infamous death march, and other prisoners told how he moved up and down the line, spurring those crazed by hunger and thirst and sharing their burdens.

At the end of the march, more than 2,000 prisoners died the first two weeks. Some who lived told how Bianchi battled with Japanese guards to get food for starving Americans.

But a hero's fame dims with time.

In 1955, a new residential street in New Ulm was named Bianchi Drive and there was talk about placing a statue of Bianchi, or maybe a plaque, along the street. It never happened.

Flo Wilfahrt, a Bianchi Drive resident since the street opened, suspects no more than four of the 25 or so families along the street know who Bianchi was.

Bianchi never saw Bianchi Drive. He never got back to New Ulm.

Bolivians Predict Fall Of New Regime

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — Col. Albert Natusch needed only six armored cars to take over the government Nov. 1 in a quiet, bloodless coup. Despite civilian

opposition, he has remained in power 11 days — thanks mainly to the clannishness of Bolivia's army. Most officers in the 25,000-man army

did not even know the coup was coming, well-informed sources say. The officers grumbled, but by sunset that day all garrison commanders had pledged Natusch their support.

Bolivians who know him question Natusch's leadership qualifications. They say he is erratic, poor at planning and has a meager understanding of Bolivia's massive economic problems.

Almost everyone in Bolivia predicts he will not remain in power much longer. He has failed to secure the support of

the country's congressmen and labor leaders. The man he deposed, President Walter Guevara, has emerged twice from hiding to publicly urge Natusch's overthrow.

The coup was one of about 200 in Bolivia's 154-year history as a republic. That Natusch has lasted for almost two weeks, observers say, is the result of the military's reluctance to act against one of its own, a reluctance rooted in a civilian uprising in 1952.

Bolivia's 1951 presidential election was won by the candidate of the Nationalist Revolutionary Movement, a populist group. Then President Mamerto Urri-ligandia refused to recognize the election, however, and turned power over to a military junta.

Riots broke out in April 1952, and Bolivia's weak military was defeated by groups of armed civilian. Humiliated army leaders were forced to close the military college, accept NRM officials as officers, merge the army with the militia, and join the NRM. The army gained revenge on Nov. 4, 1964, when it overthrew President Victor Paz Estenssoro.

Army officers have stuck together ever since, fearful of a new attempt by civilians to destroy the military.

The unwritten rule is that whoever comes to power in a coup is supported by his comrades, at least until the top officers gather later and decide at a single meeting whether the coup-maker should stay or go.

The system makes it inviting for just about any colonel with a half-dozen armored cars to make a dash for the palace and hope for prolonged support from his colleagues.

In 1970, there were three coups within 24 hours.

Natusch, however, probably has less support than any president in the past 27 years, and appears to be hanging on by sheer force and repression, military sources say.

His problems are mounting, the sources say, and they predict he will not last much longer. The sources note:

• Natusch broke the unwritten rule by arresting officers before they could organize a meeting, and army support is wearing thin. Armored units guarding the presidential palace and patrolling the streets of the capital pulled back to their bases Wednesday despite Natusch's plea for them to stay in La Paz.

• Congress voted Saturday not to recognize Natusch as president and called on the armed forces to unite with lawmakers to restore constitutional rule. Most politicians and top union leaders have refused to take part in a proposed three-man junta with Natusch.

Burning Ship Pouring Oil Into Gulf

GALVESTON (AP) — Oil pouring from a burning tanker in the Gulf of Mexico formed a ribbon 17 miles long Sunday, but winds blew it away from the Texas shoreline.

"It's being blown out into the Gulf and it's breaking up out there," said Coast Guard Chief Petty Officer Richard Griggs. "We're placing additional equipment to try to salvage some of it, and it looks like it might work."

Authorities decided over the weekend to let the fire on the tanker Burnah Agate burn itself out.

This oil has a low flash point, and foam has been useless to put it out," said Paul Preus, a supervisor of salvage operations for the tanker's owner, Burnah Oil Co. of London, England. "So we are using the technique called 'off-loading by burning.'"

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Guyana Still Struggling To Recover From Horror Of Jonestown

EDITOR'S NOTE: A year ago Sunday, the Rev. Jim Jones stood on a stage in a jungle pavilion and urged more than 900 of his Peoples Temple followers, many of them screaming and crying, to drink a bunch of Fla-Vor-Aid and cyanide. Minutes before, U.S. Rep. Leo Ryan and four others had been shot dead on a nearby airstrip. For days, the slowly unfolding tragedy transfixed a horrified world. AP Writer Lew Wheaton returned to what was the bustling agricultural commune of Jonestown and wrote about what he saw and what happened there.

JONESTOWN, Guyana (AP) — A year of searing weather and creeping vegetation has scoured away the signs of grisly horror, but the Peoples Temple deaths that shocked the world left an indelible mark on Guyana's people, politics and reputation.

Alleged government ties with cults have become a political issue as Guyana struggles with its worst economic and political crisis since gaining independence from Britain in 1966.

But 150 miles northwest of the capital and it crisis, this colony carved from the jungle sleeps serenely beneath the tropical sun.

The police officers and soldiers who guard Jonestown and the farm workers who maintain it doze through the mid-day heat. "We're just supposed to keep the grass down in the center," said one.

But grass grows through the rotting wooden walkway connecting parts of the

compound; sections have collapsed into drainage trenches underneath.

Local officials complain it is hard to muster enough individuals from the superstitious local people to maintain the compound.

"People around here still call it Ghost Town," said Reichard Cruickshank, agricultural supervisor. "They don't say they're going up to Jonestown for the day, they're going to Ghost Town."

Cruickshank said he had only 46

workers to maintain the Jonestown compound, harvest crops of plantains and cassava and tend the hundreds of pigs and chickens left by nearly 1,000 cultists.

Dozens of pigs root in the mud or sleep in pens. Cruickshank said the 94 pigs that were left after the tragedy had multiplied to about 170. Disabled trucks and farm machines, some badly rusted,

The main compound buildings now house some of the farm workers and soldiers. One of the larger ones now bears

the sign "Jonestown Police Station" and is home to police Cpl. Abdoel Inshan, who heads the security detachment.

Last year, reporters with Rep. Leo Ryan, D-Calif., on his fact-finding mission to Jonestown had seen scores of male cultists sleeping on bunk beds in that building, Ryan, three newsmen and a defecting cult member were killed at a nearby airstrip shortly before the mass poisoning began here.

The small cabins were long ago stripped of valuables. Inshan said about

Two survivors said later in Chicago that an additional \$600,000 may still be found.

Rumors and stories about buried wealth circulate occasionally in Georgetown. One local journalist said many people believe a group of Temple loyalists who remain in the sect's Georgetown headquarters are waiting for a chance to look for the rumored treasure.

Generally, however, there is little talk in Georgetown about Jonestown or the Peoples Temple.

The government of Prime Minister Forbes Burnham seems unsure what to do with the jungle site.

Chances of reactivating Jonestown as an agricultural center seem remote due to the superstition surrounding the place, officials say.

Nothing has been done with suggestions that it be turned into a penal colony or maintained "as a curiosity, something like a museum or tourist attraction for its historical value," as recommended by Health, Housing and Labor Minister Hamilton Green.

Opposition political leaders still demand an impartial investigation of the events at Jonestown and alleged ties between cult members and government officials. Burnham named Chief Justice Alfred Crane to head a commission of inquiry, but the commission has yet to

Dissenters Arrested At 'Democracy Wall'

PEKING (AP) — In a stern warning to dissenters, uniformed police marched to "Democracy Wall" Sunday and halted the sale of transcripts of a young dissident's trial. Four persons were arrested.

Police did not say what charges were filed against the four, but sources among the dissidents said they were accused of publishing a court document without permission. The dissidents maintain the transcript was made from a tape-recorded account of what had been billed as a public trial.

"We don't know what we'll do now," one dissident said. "We were totally unprepared because the transcript already is on the wall. Authorities said this was a public trial and this was an objective account of a public trial."

Posters put up on Democracy Wall are a key device for Peking's dissidents. Sources said police arrested Long Chungqing, 19, a writer for a moderate literary magazine who was among those hawking the transcript. Two unidentified persons who bought copies of it and a man who objected when police tried to tear down a week-old poster on the wall also were arrested, the sources said.

The 15-page, home-printed transcript was being sold by members of The April Fifth Forum. It was titled: "The Trial of Wei Jingsheng. What Happened on the Morning of Oct. 16. A Tape Recording."

Wei, 29, editor of the dissident magazine "Explorations," was arrested March 29. He was convicted, after a six-hour proceeding to which only ticket-holders and the government-controlled press were admitted, of giving military secrets on this year's China-Vietnam war to a foreigner and for ridiculing the Chinese socialist system and calling for democracy.

On Oct. 16, Wei was sentenced to 15 years in prison. His appeal was denied last Tuesday by the Peking Supreme Court.

More than 300 persons lined up Sunday to buy the transcript, which Western observers say appears accurate.

Some 50 uniformed police marched to the wall. Brief scuffling ensued as bystanders lunged for copies of the transcript and tried to snatch them from police, who were supported by an estimated 200 officers waiting in buses and

some 100 plainclothes police already in the crowd, sources said.

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INVESTORS' GUIDE

Q. Many years ago, I invested in a mutual fund. I paid income taxes on this fund every year. I thought this would keep me in the clear with the Internal Revenue Service, if I ever cash in my fund. I was told recently by a friend that, in no way, am I free of the IRS. He says I will have to pay taxes again, when I cash in.

What is this all about and why?
A. You may not have to pay more taxes when you "cash in" — redeem — your mutual fund shares. For your sake, let's hope you won't be hit with more taxes. I'm not wishing bad things on you — just hopes that your investment has been a success.

When you redeem, the difference between your cost and the amount you receive will be either a profit or a loss — a long-term capital gain or a long-term capital loss. If you redeem at a loss, you'll have no tax to pay — because you'll have no profit.

Each year that fund has sent you a "Form 1099" — listing the dividends and capital gains distributions you received during the year. You reported and paid income taxes on those dividends and distributions. But those past tax payments don't effect what tax — if any — will be due when you redeem.

If you took those dividends and distributions by check, your cost is the price you originally invested in the fund. If you reinvested those dividends and distributions to buy more fund shares — as most mutual fund shareholders do — your cost is your original investment, plus all those distributions.

Let's say you invested \$2,000 in that fund and, over the years, reinvested \$1,000 of dividends and capital gains distributions. That makes your cost \$3,000. If you redeem all your shares and receive more than \$3,000, you have a profit — subject to tax as a long-term capital gain.

If you redeem all your shares at less than \$3,000, you have a loss. No tax but a far less happy state of financial affairs.

Q. My broker charges me commissions when I buy stocks in the over-the-counter market. I read in your column

that, on over-the-counter stocks, the commission is included in the price of the stock and no separate commission is charged by the broker.

To whom should I complain?
A. No one. Your memory is a bit faulty. This column has explained that when you buy an over-the-counter stock — one not traded on a stock exchange — the broker can charge you either a commission or a mark-up. When you sell an O-T-C stock, the broker can charge you either a commission or a mark-down.

You can't be charged both a commission and either a mark-up or mark-down.

In the O-T-C market, when a brokerage house acts as an agent, it buys or sells stocks for customers at the best possible price and charges commissions.

When a brokerage house acts as a principal in the O-T-C market, it buys stocks at one price and sells them at a higher price, the difference being the mark-up or mark-down.

Q. I am 75 and have a regular savings account at 5 1/4 percent interest, as well as a time deposit account at 6 1/4 percent maturing in five months. My children say I should buy U.S. Treasury Bills with this money when the time deposit matures.

I would not feel comfortable with those "T bills," even though they pay higher interest. I would rather have at least one savings account, on which I could draw in case of emergency, and put the rest of my money into a two-and-a-half-year time account. Am I thinking right?

A. You're right about having some of your money in a savings account for emergency purposes. I'd say that a couple of thousand dollars should be your emergency reserve.

But your children are very right and giving you good advice about what to do with most of your money. U.S. Treasury bills come in maturities of 13, 26 or 52 weeks and now pay much higher interest than you can get in two-and-a-half-year time accounts.

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Kissinger Offended By Iran

FORT WORTH (AP) — Former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger said Saturday the United States should not give in to demands to return Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi to Iran, but said he did not want to offer any proposals for ending the takeover of the U.S. Embassy in Tehran.

"If we once accept this position we will never be able to do what is right," said Kissinger, who was in Fort Worth to attend a fundraiser for Sen. John Tower, R-Texas.

"I believe that in a situation that is this sensitive outsiders should not offer tactical advice. There is only one man who can handle this crisis and that is the president of the United States," said Kissinger. "While Americans are hostage in Iran I don't want to offer any remedies other than support of the president."

Iranian students have been holding some 60 Americans hostage in the embassy, demanding the return of the shah, who is hospitalized in New York with cancer.

"I must say I have been offended all week long seeing Iranian diplomats of a country that does not respect the diplomatic status of Americans appearing on

American television and walking around in the street inciting demonstrations. And I have been offended by the performance of the Iranian students," said Kissinger.

Once the incident is over, Kissinger said, the United States should develop a policy to keep it from happening again.

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Hints From Heloise

HI, AGAIN!
I've had several letters from readers who want to know how to clean velvet upholstery.

Since this type of furniture usually is an expensive investment, no one wants to experiment with just any cleaning product or suggestion that comes their way.

And there are problems: This kind of upholstery varies in style, texture, padding, and even quality. So a method that works for one velvet piece may not work for another.

But I received a nice letter from a

reader, Jessie Bachman, who says that her velvet chair was in such bad shape she was desperate enough to try anything — even to getting rid of the chair.

After searching for months in local stores for a cleaning fluid formulated for crushed velvet, and finding none, she decided to use liquid laundry detergent.

Using a sponge and a pail of cold water, she washed the chair, rinsed it, and left it to dry overnight.

She was elated with the results and claims her chair looks brand new.

If you want to try this method, let me caution you to use as little water as

possible. Don't sop on the water. Instead, squeeze the sponge out each time.

If you have the same problem but the idea of using detergent on velvet sets you to cringing, try sprinkling a little dry shampoo (the kind you use on hair in between washings) on the soiled spot. Let it set awhile, then vacuum.

You might want to test a spot first to see if your particular velvet upholstery will stand up to it.

Hope this little hint will help brighten up your day, 'cause you sure brighten up mine. Four yourself a cup of coffee and enjoy. — Hugs, Heloise

Q.1—As South, vulnerable, you hold:
 ♠A764 ♥J107 ♦6 ♣A9852
 The bidding has proceeded:
 West North East South
 1 ♦ 1 ♥ Pass ?
 What do you bid now?

A.—Partner has made a vulnerable overcall, and you have a fine hand and good trump support for him. You should offer him every inducement to go on to game, so the only sensible call is a jump raise to three hearts. (A jump to game is a little rich for our tastes.) Any other bid earns a demerit.

Q.2—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:
 ♠J7 ♥5 ♦KJ1093 ♣KQ982
 The bidding has proceeded:
 North East South West
 3 NT Pass 4 ♦ Pass ?
 What do you bid now?

A.—There is no question about playing a slam—indeed, your main concern should be about reaching a grand slam if partner has the right cards. The most descriptive bid you can make is a jump to six clubs. This shows your two-suiter and denies holding an ace (you would have cue-bid it if you had one). In addition, one of your suits must have a hole in it, for with solid suits, you would simply have asked for aces. Partner should bid the grand slam with all four aces and the queen of diamonds.

Q.3—Both vulnerable, as South you hold:
 ♠8 ♥97653 ♦72 ♣K10652
 The bidding has proceeded:
 West North East South
 1 ♦ Dble. 1 ♠ ?
 What action do you take?

A.—Considering only point count, there would be no justification for entering the auction now. However, that would show a poor grasp of the potential of your hand. You have excellent distribution, and the auction suggests that partner's values are principally in hearts and clubs. Therefore, bid two hearts. If partner raises, we would even be willing to take a shot at game.

Q.4—Both vulnerable, as South you hold:
 ♠AJ984 ♥762 ♦AK3 ♣84
 The bidding has proceeded:
 South West North East
 1 ♣ Pass 1 NT Pass ?

What action do you take?
A.—Don't rebid two spades to show a five-card suit—over a one no trump response, a rebid of your original suit almost always shows a six-card suit. You have a balanced minimum opening bid, and there is no reason to suppose that one's trump isn't your best contract.

Q.5—East-West vulnerable, as South you hold:

A.—Unless partner has a dead minimum for his free raise of your minor suit response, you should have played for game. The diamond suit should be a source of tricks, since, on the auction, it sounds as if partner is short in hearts and has five diamonds. Show your heart stoppers and invite game by bidding two no trump. It's not particularly important that you do not have stoppers in either black suit; partner should have them.

Q.6—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:

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To Your Good Health

By PAUL DONOHUE, M.D.
 Dear Dr. Donohue: Please, doctor, can you give me any information on myasthenia? I am having an awful lot of trouble trying to eat. — F.W.N.

To understand myasthenia (MY-as-THEEN-ee-uh) it is necessary to understand how muscles work. Think in terms of electricity.

Electricity is sent from a power plant along wires to final destination — like a lightbulb in your home. Electrical impulses from the central nervous system similarly go out through nerves to the muscles of your body.

When the lightbulb gets the electricity it turns on. When the muscle gets a nerve impulse it contracts. This is how we perform tasks, from scratching an ear to digging a garden patch. Each act requires many, many such impulses.

No wire is long enough to lead from the power plant directly to your house lightbulb. That would be impractical and expensive. Nor does a single nerve lead directly from the central nervous system to a specific muscle. There are chains of nerves.

When an electrical impulse reaches an end of one nerve that ending discharges a chemical (acetylcholine). That causes the next nerve in the chain to fire and boost along the impulse.

The defect in myasthenia lies in a deficiency of this chemical (acetylcholine).

The result is that by the time the impulse reaches the target muscle, contraction can't occur.

Swallowing muscles may be involved causing trouble eating.

Many medicines are available today for myasthenia. They help increase the amount of acetylcholine and hence the strength of muscle action. Removal of the thymus gland is sometimes considered.

HEARTLINE: I wrote you earlier and asked you if I would be better off moneywise to retire from the railroad on the regular age retirement or on a disability retirement. You answered that chances are the age retirement would give me a larger pension amount. Can you explain why there is a difference in monthly benefits under the two retirements? — F.S.

An employee's average monthly compensation is generally based on his or her highest taxable earnings excluding five years of lowest earnings and, in some cases, other years of low earnings. The number of years of compensation used for computing the average is generally determined by the number of elapsed years between 1956 and the year of eligibility for the annuity compensation.

For an age retirement, the year of eligibility is the year age 62 is attained and for a disability annuity it is the year the disability began. However, there is an advantage, not available to other annuitants, for employees who retire on a 60-30 annuity because they are deemed to be age 65 at retirement and thus the cut-off for determining the elapsed period is three years earlier. (The 60-30 plan means the worker is 60 years or older and has 30 or more years of service in the railroad industry.)

Doctor Sure Body That Of Oswald

SEATTLE (AP) — The doctor who performed the autopsy on Lee Harvey Oswald says he is certain the body was that of Oswald, the man accused of assassinating President John F. Kennedy.

"There is overwhelming circumstantial evidence that it was Oswald," said Dr. Earl Rose, chief medical examiner in Dallas in 1963 when Jack Ruby shot Oswald.

But Rose said he would not object to exhumation of the body to verify the identity. "It's the American way, to explore every possibility," he said.

British lawyer-author Michael Eddowes has filed suit in Fort Worth asking that Oswald's remains be exhumed to recheck the identity.

Eddowes recently wrote a book in which he claims the Soviet secret police substituted a look-alike for Oswald when he was in the Soviet Union before Kennedy's assassination in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963. The writer was granted permission to see Oswald's medical, dental and X-ray records.

Rose, in Seattle on Saturday for a meeting of the National Association of Medical Examiners, said Oswald's wife and mother identified the body.

The grief of the two was such that my heart went out to her (the widow, Marina Oswald) in tremendous pity. She was a stranger in a strange land.

Rose said, "I received the body after surgery had been done in an attempt to save Oswald. I was to check the cause of death and also any possibility of police brutality — which, by the way, I did not find."

There was some talk that Oswald could have been saved. I certainly don't think there was any chance. The bullet had severed two major vessels, the aorta and the vena cava, and the liver and spleen were damaged.

"In my opinion, he could not have been saved. He had bled heavily, mostly internally. I recovered the missile and turned it over to police."

Rose said he measured Oswald, took fingerprints and X-rays and full-length photographs of the corpse.

There is some controversy about the height Rose reported and the fact he did not find a scar from a mastoidectomy — removal of a projection of a bone behind the ear — that others claim Oswald had.

"I could have overlooked the scar, possibly it was under the hair line... As to the height, which I understand is disputed by about one inch, I could have been mistaken. How do you arch the foot when measuring a body?"

INDIAN LAWSUIT

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A federal judge has heard final arguments in the Ute Indian Tribe's suit claiming jurisdiction over 3 million acres — three times the amount of land it now owns in eastern Utah. U.S. District Judge Bruce S. Jenkins gave no indication Friday when he would rule in the suit, which involves claims to the original Ute reservation as set out last century. Assistant Utah Attorney General Richard Dwsnup argued that pieces of the reservation had been nibbled away since then and contended the tribe has jurisdiction only over the 1 million acres of trust lands it currently owns. Tribal attorney Stephen Boyden said a reservation cannot be diminished except by act of Congress and that Congress had not done so.

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Book Extolls Advantages Of Bikes, Mopeds

WASHINGTON (AP) — Governments trying to lure people out of their automobiles ought to consider promoting bicycles and mopeds as energy-conserving yet convenient alternatives, according to a book released Sunday.

This is a major conclusion of "Running on Empty: The Future of the Automobile in an Oil-Short World."

The book, written by Worldwatch Institute researchers Lester R. Brown, Christopher Flavin and Colin Norman, says that bicycles and mopeds are well suited for urban and suburban areas where short commuting and shopping trips represent the main transport needs.

It claims that in the United States as a whole, 80 percent of automobile trips are shorter than 10 miles, "quite a reasonable trip by bicycle or moped."

The authors point out that the bicycle offers the advantage of an often-neglected renewable energy resource — the calories contained in food.

"The bicycle is in fact the most energy-efficient means of transport ever known, more than tripling the efficiency of walking," the book says.

For those who lack the stamina to pedal long distances, the moped is a feasible alternative. Mopeds, according to the study, are capable of traveling 30 miles per hour and average 135 miles

per gallon.

The trend toward bicycle-riding has accelerated markedly in recent years, the authors claim. In the United States over the past decade, they say, 103 million bicycles were sold compared with 102 million cars. In West Germany, bikes have outsold cars by a wider margin. There were only 50,000 mopeds in the United States before 1975 but that figure is expected to rise to a million by early next year.

To discourage use of the automobile, the book says governments everywhere are raising gasoline prices. The \$3-a-gallon mark has been exceeded in Bulgaria (\$4.25), East Germany (\$3.38), Greece (\$3.24), Singapore (\$3.35) and Turkey

(\$3.05). Czechoslovakia, France, India, Japan, South Africa and Yugoslavia are rapidly approaching the \$3 mark, the study says.

It predicts gas prices in the United States probably will reach the \$3-per-gallon mark within the lifetime of the current generation of new cars.

Consumers must seek alternatives to the automobile because they will not find ready salvation in the development of other fuels. None of the leading contenders — alcohol, liquid fuels from coal, and oil shale from tar sands — will be cheap, the book says.

It claims that all face severe economic, environmental and social obstacles that will limit their large scale use.

Iranians Arrested At Vatican

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Italian police Sunday took into custody 70 Iranian students who tried to demonstrate in St. Peter's Square before Pope John Paul II against the United States and deposed Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi.

Police said they halted the group 30 minutes before the pope appeared in his studio window to address a crowd of 10,000 gathered in St. Peter's square during his Sunday noon blessing.

Police said the group carried por-

traits of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini and a number of placards written in Italian and Arabic. One of the placards read: "We want Americans in Iran to make a second Vietnam."

Police said they seized a number of leaflets in which a so-called Association of Iranian Students in Italy appealed to the Polish-born pope "in the name of God" to help for the extradition from the United States of the deposed Shah.

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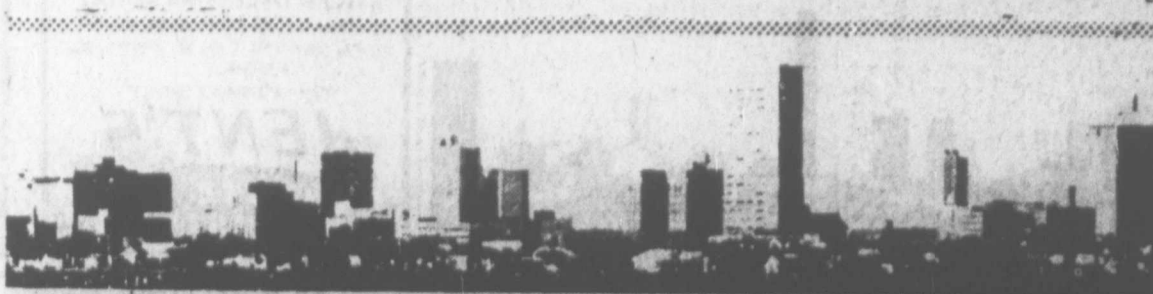

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
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Communists Buried Peacefully

Avenging Of Murders Called For

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — Chanting revolutionary slogans, banner-waving sympathizers helped bury four slain communist activists Sunday after marching 1 1/2 miles through the streets flanked by police and combat-equipped National Guardsmen.

An estimated 500 marchers braved an all-day rain to join a peaceful procession that included the caskets, covered in red sheets, of five Communist Workers Party members killed during a shootout at a "Death to the Klan" rally last weekend.

Four men killed at the rally were buried Sunday. The fifth victim will be buried later in South Carolina.

Two widows, Signe Waller and Dale Sampson, were among a 10-member honor guard that led the march from downtown Greensboro to Maplewood Cemetery. Each carried an unloaded rifle and a poster picture of her husband. Five other women and three men, also carrying unloaded weapons, made up the honor guard.

The honor guard and their weapons were checked by members of a 500-man National Guard battalion before the march began. Police armed with shotguns lined each side of the march route, moving along with the procession toward the cemetery.

The march proceeded through the rain-slicked streets without any major incidents, but police arrested several persons, including a few who were armed.

The Communist Workers Party had urged sympathizers from around the country to come to Greensboro, and police had expected anywhere from 2,000 to 5,000 people to line the parade route.

However, police said that only about 100 onlookers were on hand to watch the approximately 500 marchers. They were greatly outnumbered by more than 900 law enforcement officers, including guardsmen, state troopers and local police.

At the cemetery, caskets containing bodies of the four men were placed over their graves. Widows of the four men joined CWP representatives on a soundtruck nearby.

"It makes the cause of communism concrete for the United States people at a time when they really need it," said Phil Thompson, who identified himself as a spokesman for the CWP-USA.

"We want to use the CWP 5 to expose all capitalist politicians, be they Carter or Kennedy. The five CWP martyrs died a glorious death, fighting the bourgeoisie and its agents, the FBI and the KKK," Thompson said.

Guardsmen, state Highway Patrolmen and city police stood by in the cemetery during the service. National Guard helicopters circled overhead.

A dozen guardsmen strode in front of the procession, which was dotted with red flags, down Greensboro's Market Street, accompanied by the chant of "avenge the murder of the CWP 5" from the marchers.

The marchers carried huge banners proclaiming, "The whole world is watching, avenge the CWP 5." Some carried huge red, black and yellow banners saying: "Death to the Klan and the capitalist class."

As the parade moved slowly along, the demonstrators sang revolutionary songs. A group of seven persons, one playing a guitar, led the singing from a yellow truck that accompanied the bodies.

Some arrests were made just before the march began. Officers delivered a group of prisoners to the city jail but declined to say how many were arrested or where the arrests were made. A police spokesman said, however, that the prisoners included sympathizers for the marchers and for the Ku Klux Klan.

"Avenge the murder of the CWP 5," read a poster circulated by the party. It pictured a man in overalls clubbing a Nazi with a rifle butt.

Hours before the funeral, Nelson Johnson, an organizer of the parade, and Greensboro Mayor Jim Melvin agreed to some guidelines for the demonstration.

Marchers agreed to follow a route set by police, and authorities agreed to allow some marchers to carry unloaded rifles as honor guards for the five caskets.

Greensboro, a textile and tobacco town of 160,000 people that was the site of the first lunchcounter sit-ins in the 1960s, had been calm throughout the weekend.

Fourteen white men were arrested in the aftermath of the shooting, which killed four white men and a black woman. Several of the suspects claimed they were either members of the Ku Klux Klan or were Nazis.

Melvin declared a state of emergency on Saturday, giving police the power to search cars and people and prohibiting the sale or display of guns or explosives.

But there were no curfews or restrictions on businesses, and Police Chief William E. Swing said the atmosphere in the city was unlike that which permeated racial conflicts in the 1960s.

"In my view, what's going on between these various extremist groups is political. It's not racial. It's not a situation of black and white," he said.

Iranian Students Storm Beirut

About 100 Iranian students forced their way into the garden of the U.S. Embassy in Beirut Sunday, burned the American flag, but did not storm the building, witnesses reported.

A Saudi Arabian newspaper, meanwhile, quoted what it called well-informed sources as saying, "It is certain the American hostages held in Tehran will be freed within 48 hours." But a spokesman at the Iranian Foreign Ministry said there was no "omen" yet that it will happen.

The Iranians in Beirut scaled the fence surrounding the embassy grounds and shouted their support of Iranian revolutionary leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, witnesses said. They said the U.S. Marine guards took to the roof with their light weapons and walkie-talkies while Lebanese gendarmes stood by, not interfering with the mob.

"Down with America! Death to the Americans! Long live the Iranian revolution! Long live Khomeini!" they shouted in Arabic and Farsi.

The report that the Tehran hostages would be freed soon was made by Al-Jazirah, one of the leading Saudi newspapers. It did not identify its informants further.

It said release of the hostages, held since last Sunday when Iranian students seized the U.S. Embassy, would come as a result of negotiations by the Palestine Liberation Organization.

"The PLO has undertaken a major role in the efforts for the release of the hostages and the cooperation between the PLO and the Iranian government will save the lives of the hostages," the paper added.

PLO envoys are in Tehran attempting to mediate an end to the takeover by Iranians demanding the United States

extradite Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi, now receiving cancer treatment in a New York hospital. U.S. officials have refused to consider extradition.

A spokesman at the Foreign Ministry in Tehran, reached by telephone from New York, was asked about the report that the hostages soon would be freed.

"That is a good wish, and wish it, but there is no omen of that yet," he replied. The spokesman did not give his name.

The Yugoslav news agency Tanjug reported from Tehran that students occupying the U.S. Embassy had discovered new documents about American "spy centers" in the Iranian cities of Bekshtar and Masshad.

Tanjug said the students claimed the documents showed that the Americans spied on the Soviet Union from the two cities, which are close to Iranian-Soviet border.

World Press Criticizes Iran

The world press grimly noted in weekend editorials the growing gap between Iran and other nations over the seizure of the U.S. Embassy in Tehran, where 62 Americans have been held hostage for more than a week.

"Present-day Iran might as well be the moon as far as its relations with the outside world are concerned," said the London Sunday Telegraph. "With the resignation en bloc of Prime Minister (Mehdi) Bazargan and his Cabinet... the one slender link with sanity has been snapped."

Bazargan resigned last week when he was unable to persuade Iran's ruling Revolutionary Council to negotiate release of the hostages from the embassy. Taken over Nov. 4 by Iranian demonstrators.

The official Yugoslav daily newspaper Borba said Iranians are justified in seeking extradition of the exiled Shah of Iran, although they have resorted to the "unpopular and illegal measure" of occupying the embassy.

U.S. officials have refused the Iranian demand to move deposed Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi from a New York hospital and extradite him to Iran to face a revolutionary tribunal. The Shah fled Iran in January and took up residence in Mexico

in June. Last month he entered a New York City hospital where he is being treated for cancer.

Borba said, "It is difficult to accept as normal and friendly with respect to Iran the gesture of the American government to offer hospitality to the deposed shah."

"It is beyond doubt that the Iranians are demanding with every right the extradition of the former shah whose responsibility for the misfortunes of the Iranian people cannot be doubted."

The independent daily Al-Siyassah in Kuwait, Iran's neighbor on the Persian Gulf, said, "certainly Iran will be the loser in the U.S. Embassy affair because of the erosion of world confidence in its government and its ability to protect foreign diplomats on its soil."

"Whatever the Iranians do, they know there is no chance of the United States government's handing over the ailing former shah, even if it leads to a third world war," the paper said.

"Extradition of anyone, even the former shah, from a democratic country — and particularly... the United States — has to pass through various channels of it government," Al-Siyassah said, adding, "There is nothing called public interest in the United States, there is law."

One Youth Killed, Two Wounded; Iranian Held

DENVER (AP) — An Iranian chemistry student was held for questioning Sunday after a 15-year-old youth was shot and killed and two companions were wounded after allegedly harassing the man, police said.

The shooting outside Afshin Shariati's southwest Denver apartment came after two days of demonstrations around Colorado related to Iranian students and the hostage situation in Iran, but police would not speculate whether the shooting was connected with those protests.

The dead youth, identified as Paul Moritzky, died at the scene, officers said. His two companions were identified as Steve Roane, 17, and Michael Lopez, 16, also of Denver.

Shariati, 21, is a student at Loretto Heights College, majoring in chemistry and petroleum engineering, said apartment manager Steve Gerhart, a 25-year-old University of Denver graduate student.

Loretto Heights College is across the street from Shariati's third-floor apartment. Police said no charges had been filed against Shariati.

A neighbor, Kelly Ryan, 21, said she was in bed "when I heard some people running and glass crashing. I heard them running across the top stairs and then down the stairs. Then I heard two shots. I figured somebody had been shot or there had been a party or something."

Jim Costillo, 29, who lives in an adjacent house, said someone began beating on his front door early Sunday.

A young man, later identified as Lopez, stood bleeding on his doorstep, Costillo said. "Help me, man, I've been shot. Let me in," Costillo said the youth told him.

"He said the Arabs had shot him," Costillo said. Costillo called police, who arrived about five minutes later.

Detective Doug Hildebrand said the three youths "and several others" decided on Saturday night that they would "find some Iranians to hassle."

Hildebrand said they looked on mailboxes in the apartment house for an Iranian name then smashed a picture window in Shariati's third-floor apartment, apparently from the outside. Several other Iranian and Arab students live in the same building.

As the youths ran for their car, the detective said, Shariati ran out of his apartment and fired in the direction of the fleeing juveniles with a rifle.

Moritzky led there Lopez was wounded in his left arm and hospitalized. Roane was shot in the lower leg and was treated and released.

Gerhart described Shariati as "very polite. I've never had any trouble with him at all and he's lived here better than a year." Gerhart was not aware that the shooting had taken place until told by reporters outside the three-story tan brick complex.

The dead youth's mother, Annette, said her son was a sophomore at Lincoln High School and had played in a football game Saturday.

"Paul hadn't expressed any concern about this Iranian thing," Mrs. Moritzky said. "He was sort of cause-oriented, I guess."

She said: "He called defensive signals when he was in the (Saturday's) game. And last night he was going to a football party."

"I think he was dragged into this thing," she added.

Klansmen Arrested At Rally

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. (AP) — Riot-helmeted police arrested a Ku Klux Klan leader and another Klansman here Sunday before what was described as an anti-Iranian rally, a police spokesman said.

Huntsville Police Lt. Gordon Kenner said the Imperial Wizard of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, Bill Wilkinson, 35, of Denham Springs, La., was arrested along with Terry J. Tucker, 25, of Cullman, Ala.

Police said Wilkinson was arrested on a misdemeanor charge of interfering

with a police officer in the line of duty. He paid a \$110 fine and was released.

Tucker, police said, was charged with carrying a concealed weapon and threatening a police officer. He paid a \$220 fine on the misdemeanor charges and was also released.

Police said Wilkinson and Tucker were arrested when they stepped out of an automobile near the demonstration area. After their release from jail, police said Wilkinson was allowed to participate in the rally on the steps of the county courthouse.

Gov. Brown Suggests Day Of Walking

WASHINGTON (AP)— California Gov. Edmund Brown Jr. urged Americans Sunday to walk and pray today "to show the strength and unity of the American people behind our American citizens in Iran."

Brown, a candidate for the Democratic nomination for president, also said the United States should be prepared to live without Iranian oil. And he predicted it will be "very difficult" to continue diplomatic relations with Iran after the present hostage situation is resolved.

Answering questions on the NBC television program, "Meet the Press," Brown said the Iranian crisis could be "an opportunity to wake up this nation, to recreate in ourselves a spirit of strength and unity."

Brown refused to criticize President Carter's handling of the Iranian situation or to suggest any alternatives.

Senate Must Decide Savings Issue

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate, taking one more look at the long-overdue 1980 budget, must decide whether to insist on its demand that congressional committees achieve \$3.6 billion in savings.

The savings issue has become the one remaining obstacle to passage of the 1980 budget, which covers the fiscal year that started Oct. 1, a full six weeks ago.

A Senate vote on the budget is expected this week. The House deleted the proposed savings order — known as "reconciliation" — when it approved the \$347.6 billion budget last Thursday.

The Senate had approved the spending package on Wednesday with reconciliation included.

The House vote gives the Senate a choice between accepting removal of reconciliation or shipping the budget back to a House-Senate conference committee for a new round of negotiations.

President Carter's "windfall profits" tax is also ready for Senate floor action this week.

The Senate Finance Committee recommended a tax less than one-half as tough as the president proposed last

spring when he announced the lifting of domestic crude oil price controls.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., who is challenging Carter for the Democratic presidential nomination, is expected to work with other Senate liberals to toughen the tax.

Carter wants a so-called "windfall profits" tax to accompany his program for gradually ending price controls on domestically produced oil. Technically, the tax would be on the extra revenue, not profits, from decontrol. Without the tax, oil companies would keep more of the revenue as profits.

Kennedy has urged Carter to veto the windfall tax and re-impose controls unless Congress approves a tax that reclaims at least half of the revenues resulting from decontrol.

The Senate Finance Committee's version sets a tax rate of 27 percent although oil companies would also have to pay income taxes on their decontrol-related revenues.

In the House, a vote is scheduled Tuesday on establishing Jan. 15, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday, as a national holiday in honor of the

slain civil rights leader.

The King birthday proposal has the support of the House Democratic leadership.

Meanwhile, the delay in approving a budget is unprecedented in the five-year history of the congressional budget process, which was designed to force Congress to set priorities within an overall spending ceiling.

Under the budget act, Congress is supposed to approve a spending package by Sept. 15 in anticipation of the start of the fiscal year, Oct. 1.

Although Congress has in the past missed the Sept. 15 deadline, this is the first year that a budget has not been in place at the start of a new fiscal year.

Reconciliation would force seven committees in each house to make a total of \$3.6 billion in cuts in domestic programs.

Although the order would not specify which programs would be cut, it is generally believed the savings would require passage of hospital cost containment, reductions in the child nutrition program, Social Security benefit cuts, and changes in several other programs.

Tech's Offense Puzzling

REX DOCKERY SHOOK HIS HEAD. The inability of the Texas Tech offense to cross the goal line this season is obviously just as much a puzzle to him as it has been to followers of the Red and Black in 1979.

"Unfortunately, it's just one of those things," Tech's second-year head coach conceded. "It's the first time something like this has happened to many of us (members of the Tech coaching staff). It's just something that we are going to have to work through."

Saturday's 3-3 tie with Texas Christian was the latest in a line of offensive disappointments for Dockery and the Red Raiders. For some strange reason Tech's offense breaks out in a rash every time it nears the end zone. The Red Raiders seem allergic to the end zone. They move the football consistently from their own 20 to their opponents' 20. But once inside scoring territory, anything is likely to happen and has.

Statistics usually tell the story of a football game. And Tech's offensive statistics inside the enemy 30 yard line this year pretty much tell the story of why the Red Raiders are 3-4-2.

In nine football games the Red Raiders have managed only 11 touchdowns. That figure is way below the 24 touchdowns Tech chalked up during the first nine games of the 1978 season.

THERE HAVE BEEN THREE occasions this season when the Raiders haven't enough put a six pointer on the scoreboard. Bill Adams' right foot is the only thing separating losses to Arkansas and Texas and the tie with TCU from being shutouts. Thank goodness for Adams.

In 1978, Tech failed to score touchdowns against only two opponents during the course of 11 games. Adams booted three field goals during each loss to Southern California and Texas A&M, but those games occurred early in the season. The Red Raiders didn't have a lot of trouble scoring after the fourth contest of 1978 — the Texas A&M tilt.

Tech's touchdown drought has been especially frustrating when you consider the Red Raiders have the most productive and consistent skill player in the Southwest Conference in senior fullback James Hadnot.

Hadnot leads the conference in rushing with 1,131 yards and ranks among the top five rushers in the nation, but he has yet to carry the football into the end zone for six points. The closest Hadnot has come to scoring was against TCU Saturday. On third-and-goal from the one yard mark, Hadnot tried the middle of the Horned Frog defense and was stopped after a gain of six, maybe eight inches.

BREAKING STATISTICS DOWN even farther, you'll find Tech has been inside opponents' 30 yard lines 25 times this season — which doesn't count the 11 times the Red Raiders did score touchdowns. Fifteen times the Raiders have had to settle for field goals. On the 10 other instances, Tech has either fumbled, been penalized, been pushed back or just plain failed to touch paydirt.

Seven times the Red Raiders have had the ball inside their opponents' 10 yard marker. The results? Six field goals and the bad pitch which resulted in TCU being able to retain possession of the football Saturday.

And the missed opportunities of the offense hide the improved play of the Texas Tech defense this year.

Red Raider defenders gave up 198 points in the first nine games of 1978. After nine outings this campaign, Tech's defense has only allowed 133 points — approximately 14.2 points per game. Baylor had been the only team to score more than 21 points against that stingy defense. Texas scored only 14. Arizona scored only 14. And TCU scored only three. And the final result of those three games have been one loss and two ties.

The defense hasn't given up near the yardage it did a year ago, either. It hasn't turned the ball over quite as many times as it did in 1978, but it certainly has provided the offensive unit ample opportunity to score touchdowns.

YES, OFFENSIVELY SPEAKING, it's been a frustrating year for Texas Tech. It's hard to win football games when you're averaging only 13.4 points a game. But the Red Raiders have had their chances to score more points. Dockery will be the first to tell you that.

Unfortunately, it is a situation that is more frustrating for him than it could ever be for fans. And Dockery is constantly looking for the answer to crack that force field that keeps his offense from the end zone.



Oilers Surge Past Raiders

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston quarterback Dan Pastorini dusted off an old weapon Sunday, hitting Ken Burrough on touchdown bombs of 55 and 35 yards to silence the boo-birds and lead the Oilers to a 31-17 victory over Oakland.

Pastorini, with one of the lowest quarterback ratings in the American Football Conference, showed flashes of the form he used last season to lead the Oilers within one game of the Super Bowl.

"I'm healthier now than I've ever been," said Pastorini, who started the season with a shoulder injury suffered in training camp. "We came out throwing today to loosen them up. If we had run as much as we did last week, they'd have been keying on us."

Before the arrival of Campbell, the Pastorini-to-Burrough bomb was Houston's primary offensive weapon and it

served the Oilers well Sunday.

"There just aren't many cornerbacks that can stay with Burrough," Pastorini said.

Pastorini passed only 13 times, but he completed eight and spiced the Oilers with key completions and still did not desert the Oilers' No. 1 weapon — Earl Campbell.

Campbell scored on a 1-yard run in the first quarter and became the first AFC runner to gain more than 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons.

Campbell now has 1,039 yards on 245 carries this season.

Houston Coach Bum Phillips said, "We didn't plan on throwing that much, but the situations just presented themselves."

Oakland quarterback Ken Stabler out-passed Pastorini, but was not boastful. "I'm throwing as good now as I ever have, but that doesn't mean anything unless you win," he said.

The victory kept the Oilers in the running for a playoff spot in the American Football Conference Central Division with an 8-3 record. Oakland, losing for the fifth time in six road games this year, dropped to a 6-5 record.

Pastorini, boomed much of the season for his ineffective passing, hit Burrough on a 55-yard pass-run play in the second quarter to give Houston a 14-7 lead.

Houston took a 7-0 on a 1-yard first quarter run by Campbell.

Oakland's Ken Stabler rallied the Raiders on a 23-yard touchdown pass to Raymond Chester for a 7-7 deadlock and then tied it again in the second quarter on a 3-yard touchdown pass to his other tight end, Dave Casper.

Houston took the lead for good in the third quarter when Oiler safety Mike Reinfield intercepted his 10th pass of the season and returned it 33 yards to the Oakland 18. Four plays later, Tim

Wilson somersaulted into the end zone on a 7-yard run.

Pastorini set up his second touchdown pass with a 36-yard pass to Mike Renfro. Pastorini then threaded a perfect pass between two Oakland defenders and Burrough ran in standing on the 35-yard play.

Tom Fritsch, who keyed Houston's Monday night victory over Miami with three field goals, booted a 51-yarder with 3:43 left in the game. It was Fritsch's 16th field goal in 18 tries this season.

Campbell had 107 yards on 32 carries.

TCU Tie Deflates Tech Coaches

Saturday's 3-3 homecoming tie with Texas Christian didn't do much to lift the sagging spirits of Texas Tech's coaching staff. It was a disappointing setback of sorts. And has been the case so many times this season, it was a matter of the Red Raider offense not taking advantage of several scoring opportunities that would have made the difference in the contest.

"We could have walked in for a touchdown on the fourth-and-goal play if we would have made the pitch," Tech head coach Rex Dockery said after reviewing films of the game Sunday. "But we didn't make the pitch. It was just one of those unfortunate things."

The Red Raiders, on top 3-0, elected to go for six instead of a field goal on a fourth-and-goal from the TCU two-foot line early in the fourth quarter.

Dockery chose to go with the veer-option to the left. A fake handoff to fullback James Hadnot attracted most of the Horned Frog defenders, but freshman quarterback Jim Hart was just slightly off on his pitch to tailback Mark Olbert and a fumble resulted. When Hart finally pounced on the loose football, TCU had turned back the Red and Black and regained possession at the Tech 15-yard line.

The Horned Frogs went on to march 81 yards on their final offensive possession of the contest, and Greg Porter kicked a 28-yard field goal to allow the Frogs to tie the heavily-favored Raiders.

"We had our opportunities to score," Dockery added. "We just didn't take advantage of them. We played an excellent game defensively, but we couldn't score when we had the chance."

Hart, who started the game in place of the injured Ron Reeves, turned in a decent performance. He rushed for 67

yards and completed eight of 14 passes for 96 yards.

The first-year player from Irving High School will start for Tech when the Red Raiders tangle with Southern Methodist Saturday in Dallas.

"Jim did some things well," Dockery remarked. "I thought he ran well and he threw pretty well. He is still our number one quarterback. We do hope to bring

Mark James along more this week in practice."

As has been the case all season long, the Tech defense kept the team in the game.

The Frogs finished with only 220 net yards. The Red Raiders had allowed only 25 yards in the second half before TCU drove the 81 yards for the tying field goal.

Landry's Golf Game May Benefit Septien

IRVING (AP) — Tom Landry is a pretty fair golfer.

In his day, he could get it down pretty close to par. Because of back problems, he's a low 80s and high 70s shooter now when he can play.

The coach of the Dallas Cowboys is putting the theory of a golf swing to use for hot-and-cold placekicker Rafael Septien.

"The swing of a sidewinder placekicker is a lot like that of a golfer," says Landry. "A lot of it is tempo."

Landry had to speak to Septien about his "tempo" several weeks ago after some missed extra points and field goals.

It was Septien's last-second field goal that defeated the New York Giants last

Sunday.

And it could be Septien who produces in the clutch again tonight should the Dallas-Philadelphia nationally-televized game wind down to such heights.

Landry said Septien "has improved as a kicker with his technique."

He continued "Septien had been taking a hook stance with his left foot too far in front of the right foot. He was pulling away from the ball too soon. It's a lot like golf. Now, he stands more upright and keeps his head still when he hits the ball."

The oddsmakers figure no field goal is going to decide the game. Dallas is a 10-point favorite in the National Conference Eastern Division clash.

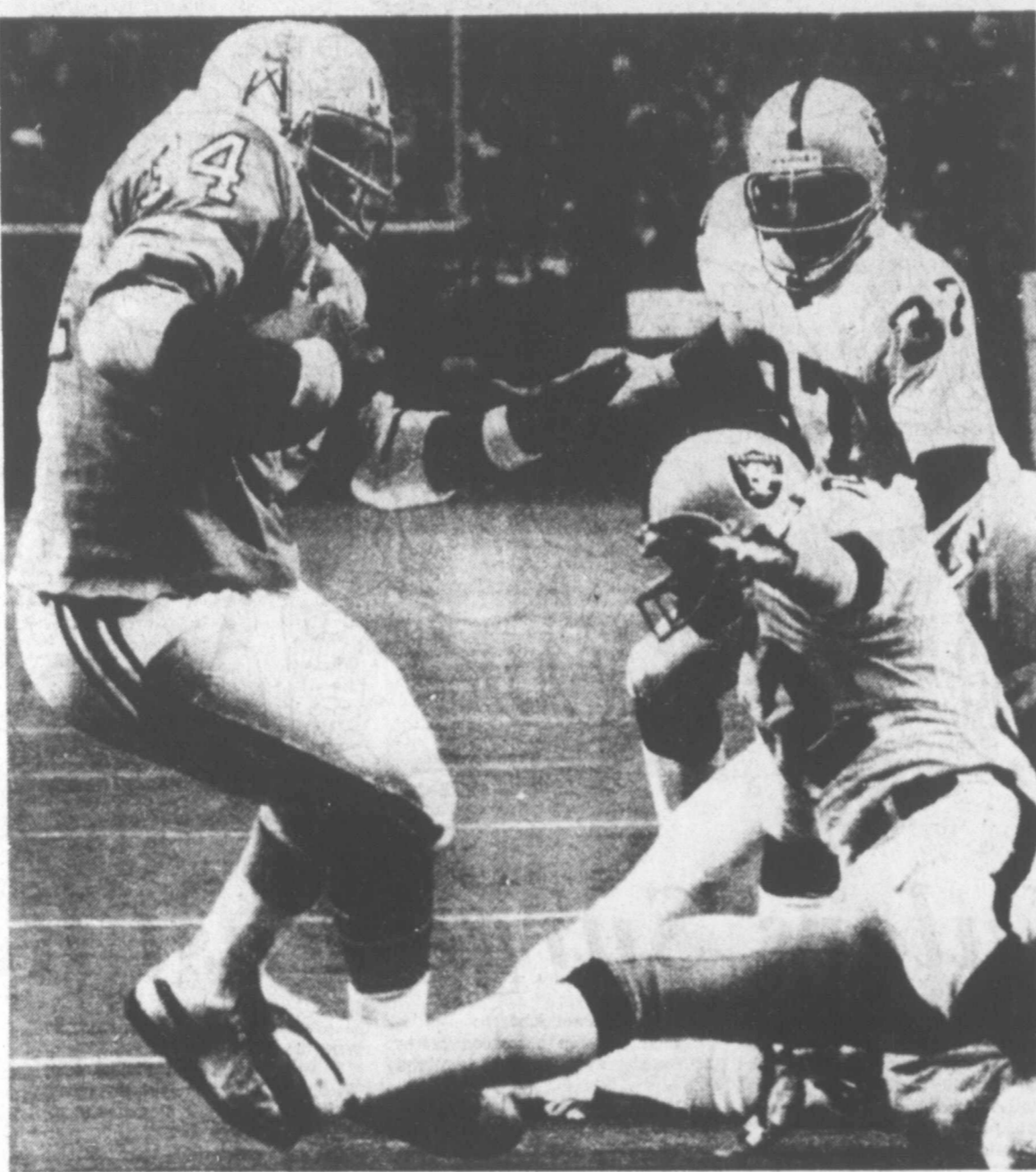

The situation in District 3-AAAA really isn't that difficult at all, hoss. So don't whip out those TI calculators.

If Amarillo High wants to win the conference title Friday night it must, repeating must, whip Pampa. And if Pampa expects to lay claim to the crown it must, repeating must, defeat Amarillo High.

Both teams enter the key clash with perfect 3-0 records. However, Amarillo is 8-1 for the year, while Pampa is 6-3.

"Oh," exclaimed AHS head coach Larry Dippel. "It's going to be a tough one, all right. I just wish I knew who was going to win it. I guess the media folks might think we're the favorite because of our records. But when you compare scores, we're pretty equal."

So let's compare: against Plainview, Amarillo won 7-6, while Pampa lost 25-23. Both teams shut out Hereford, Amarillo 14-0, Pampa 22-0.

And in district play, the Sandies have scored 82 points and allowed only six (against Palo Duro), while the Pampa offense has scored 85 points, but given up 20.

Yes, indeed, the two match up pretty well.

Except for one thing — playoff experience. Amarillo represented the district in post-season play last year. Even the oldest annual doesn't show Pampa in the playoffs.

Things started off pretty rocky for the Sandies, a team that finished 77 with a 5-6 record. On the opening Friday night, AHS was dealt a 15-14 loss to Odessa High. But, oh how things have changed since Sept. 7.

"What really turned the season around for us was the big win over Permian in Odessa," commented Dippel. "I think that really gave us a lot of confidence, knowing that we could be a good team on the road."

Since that 8-0 win over the Panthers, AHS has reeled off seven straight wins to set up the key match-up with the Harvesters.

Asked what was the key to the Sandies' success, Dippel commented: "Besides good coaching."

"Yeah, besides good coaching."

"We've really got a team," noted Dippel. "We played as a great football player. What we've got is a bunch of good high school players. And that makes up a good high school team."

The AHS offense is led by fullback Mary Mathiasmeier, the team's leading rusher with just over 900 yards, and half-

Estacado coach Louis Kelley has been in plenty of biggies before and knows all the right things to say. The upcoming Estacado-Canyon battle hardly provided a challenge.

"This is it," said Kelley. "There are no more tomorrows if we lose this ball game."

"If we can't get ready to play this game, well, we don't deserve to win anyhow," he added.

And with that warning, Kelley assured that his Matadors would be ready to play this Friday night when they meet the Canyon Eagles at Lowrey Field for the District 1-AAA title.

Canyon coach Dean Wright was even more blunt with his words — all the information that could be garnered from Wright was the steady buzz, buzz, buzz of the busy signal.

After repeated attempts to call the coach, an operator was called in to help. Apparently, she said, the receiver at that number has been taken off the hook.

Obviously the Canyon coach doesn't

want anyone disturbing him during this time of total concentration. And the Matadors give him plenty to worry about.

The Mats have scored 223 points in nine contests while holding the opposition to 36. Defensively the Mats lead the South Plains — allowing only 122.1 yards per contest.

But the Eagles are no slouches either. With Canyon's 35-0 humiliation of Dumas last Friday, the Eagles have run their win streak to five in a row and are 4-0 in District 1-AAA play.

So the game Friday is for all the marbles.

"I'm real impressed with Canyon's offense," said Kelley. "They run a (University) of Houston type veer and execute the option real well. They're lots better offensively than they were a year ago."

"They've come on like gangbusters in their last four ball games — last week they just pushed Dumas up and down the field."

Canyon opened the season with a 35-7 loss to the Monterey Plainsmen but,

says Kelley, the Eagles have come a long way since then.

"We haven't faced a real option team yet this year," said Kelley. "So we're worried about that. Levelland ran the option against us some in the first half (Friday night) and they made us look pretty bad."

"It's going to be hard to stop them offensively," he added. "So we're going to have to score some points — because they'll score their share."

The two teams also met in the last regular-season game a year ago with the district title at stake — but Kelley says the situation is just the opposite this year.

"Last year it'd been picked to win district," he said, "and we went up to their place with an eight game winning streak."

The Mats haven't won eight in a row this year, but they have reeled off five straight wins since falling to Monterey 7-0 in pre-district action.

Cornerback Preston Davis returned a Canyon pass 41-yards for a touchdown last year to spark a 16-8 Estacado victory

in that contest.

Kelley said that the Mats will simply have to assign an offensive target to everyone on defense in order to stop the option.

"High school teams generally have a hard time reading the option," he said, "so we'll have to assign people to the pitch man, the quarterback or the dive man."

"Hopefully if one of them gets blocked out — we'll have someone else there to make the tackle."

And the winner of the Canyon-Estacado contest will in all likelihood meet Odessa Ector.

Ector is alone in first place in district 2-AAA with a 3-0 loop record. But the Eagles have still got to get by Monahans next week. Monahans is 2-1 in district play but a victory over Ector would still boost them into the bi-district contest.

Andrews spoiled Monahans' perfect district record with a 14-7 victory last Friday.

In District 3-AAA, San Angelo Lake View is 3-0 and already has the district championship sewed up. Even if Lake

View should fall to Lamesa next week — an extremely unlikely event — they'll still advance to bi-district action against the winner in District 4-AAA.

But none of that concerns Kelley. He's just worried about those Canyon Eagles. And he had one more cliché up his sleeve.

"It'll be a heck of a ball game," warned the Estacado boss.

Amherst Performs For Johnson's Benefit

With Lazbuddie already holding the playoff berth from District 2-B South Zone, you'd think Amherst didn't have much to play for against winless Whiteface in the last game of the season.

Wrong.

The Bulldogs had their sights on a 2,000-yard season for their fine running back Ronald Johnson. That might seem out of reach to some, since Johnson was about 350 yards short.

But in a game like that, anything is possible. Johnson carried only 18 times, but gained 369 yards to end up with 2,020 yards on the season.

For those of you with an historical inclination, only three other runners from this area have gained more yardage in a single season.

The first one was Denver City's Bert Gravit, now head coach at Levelland. In 1960, he gained 2,443 for the Mustangs. Then there's Jimmy Brown, who gained

2,053 for Hart in 1972. And then there's Jayton's Mark Fincher, who broke 2,000 yards not once or twice, but three times in his career. The prolific Jaybird had his best season in 1973 with a 2,531 year. In 1974 he gained 2,260 and in 1975 he had 2,201.

That 2,020 Johnson gained pushed him to 4,092 in four years (he gained 1,365 in his junior season).

Only three players have done better than that. Most recent was Tahoka's Clifford Bailey, who gained 4,485 yards. Tullia's Raymond Williams got 4,745 from 1973 to 1975 and, of course, Fincher wound up with 7,260 from 72-75.

Johnson also scored 34 points on touchdown runs of 81, three of 45 and a 25. He kicked four extra points. That gives him 127 points on the year.

But Friday night's performance alone is enough to give him the Avalanche-Journal's South Plains Offensive Player of the Week award.

The top defensive player was Littlefield's Dale Demel. The linebacker made 17 tackles and picked off three passes. He intercepted another two that were called back by penalties. Offensively, Demel caught seven passes for 98 yards.

Springlake-Earth linebacker Steve Monreal also had a big game. He was in

on 17 tackles, 12 of them unassisted. He also scored a touchdown on an 84-yard kickoff return and another on a 19-yard run. Still another score, on a return of a blocked punt, was disallowed by the refs.

Forsan's D.F. Stanley made 15 tackles and scored also.

Abernathy's Sylvester Dunn rambled for 218 yards and a pair of touchdowns on 18 carries while his teammate, quarterback Tony Heath, completed six pass-

Opens SWC Race**

So, there is to be some more excitement in the Southwest Conference football race after all, but whatever comes next will be hard pressed to match the doings in the Astrodome last Saturday night.

The Houston-Texas showdown turned out to be not only the Southwest Conference, but one of the most entertaining evenings in the history of the league.

It was, perhaps, the atmosphere that did it. The buildup had been so great in Houston that the electricity was there before the teams even came onto the field for warmups.

When the teams did appear, the noise generated by the standing-room only crowd echoed around the huge building and made thinking, much less hearing, almost impossible. And for an extra touch of drama, Houston officials ordered the lights lowered and had a spotlight focus on each of the Cougars as they were introduced.

Finally, when it came time to play the game, it turned out to be first rate — at least in the thrills and chills category. Big plays were there for both teams — long pass completions, blocked punts, nifty punt returns, a 46-yard touchdown run and critical interceptions. Most of all there were the interceptions — two spectacular leaps by Texas, Derrick Hatchett and another by teammate Ricky Churchman in the second half that turned the game in the Longhorns' favor.

And when eighth-ranked Texas had finally prevailed over the previously-unbeaten and No. 4 Cougars, 21-13, the SWC had a championship race again.

"There is some excitement left in it now," said Houston coach Bill Yeoman, whose team would have all but wrapped up at least a conference co-title and a trip to the Cotton Bowl with a win. "We didn't get this one. You get some and you don't get some I hope we have enough class to get out from under this defeat. If I'm not mistaken we're still tied for first place."

Houston is, indeed, still in a virtual first-place tie — along with Texas and Arkansas, all with one conference loss.

And the happenings in Houston over the weekend, combined with a remarkable comeback by Arkan-

sas, leaves the Razorbacks in the best position of all to make it to the Cotton Bowl.

If all three teams win their remaining games, and thus finish as co-champions, Arkansas would go to the Cotton Bowl because, of the three teams, they have been away from the Jan. 1 classic the longest.

Arkansas trailed by 17 points early in the second half, only to storm back for a 29-20 victory over the Baylor Bears, whose hopes for a conference crown were dashed in Fayetteville.

Quarterback Kevin Scanlon started the rally with a 32-yard touchdown throw to Bobby Duckworth and ended it with a 60-yard scoring pass to Robert Farrell.

In Lubbock, meanwhile, TCU's Greg Porter kicked a field goal of 28 yards with 21 seconds left in the game to bring the Horned Frogs a 3-3 tie with Texas Tech.

Although TCU has only a modest 2-6 record, the Frogs are still assured their best record in six years and they have played all the contenders tough this season.

SMU finished out the conference intersectional schedule with a 34-0 pounding of Wichita State, breaking the Mustangs' five-game losing streak.

Arkansas, now that it has the favorable position in the league race, will face the toughest test of all next Saturday, traveling of Texas A&M. Rice will be at Baylor. SMU will host Texas Tech and Texas will be at home against TCU.

Texas will be the overwhelming favorite against TCU, but as Longhorns' coach Fred Akers said after Saturday night's win over Houston, you just can't ever tell.

"This is such a tough, screwy conference, you don't ever know what's going to happen," said Akers.

"All I know is that every team had better take care of business every week or it will get beat."

"We've got new life. But we've also got three more games and I know we have to be ready for all of them."

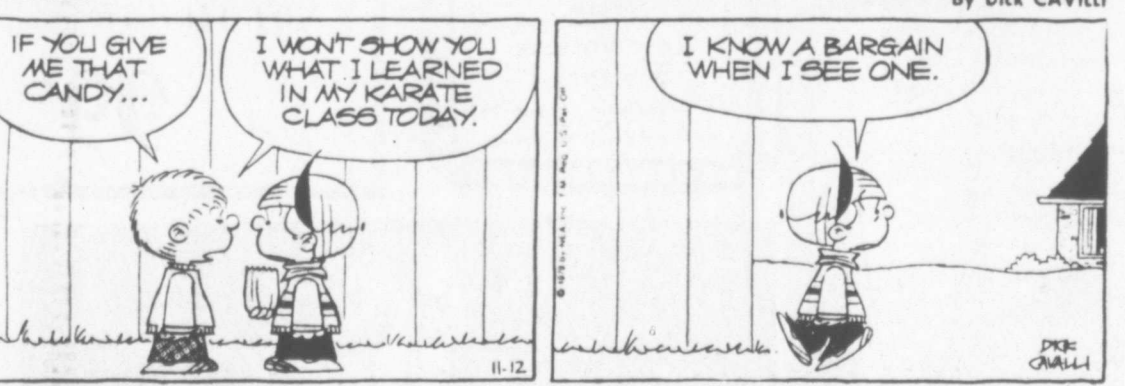

CBS Newsman Joins Network

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — When Daniel Schorr heard that Ted Turner wanted him for his Cable News Network, scheduled for a spring debut, he says he was a bit repulsed.

"I thought it was a frivolous thing and I didn't want to lend my name and reputation to it," Schorr says. But the former CBS Newsman, a figure in a major First Amendment battle with Congress, winner of three Emmy Awards for reporting and an acclaimed newspaper journalist as well, didn't close the door. And now he sees the millionaire businessman from Atlanta as a man of vision.

Schorr says he thinks Turner may eventually force an overhaul of the three networks' news operations.

"He called me," Schorr said in a conversation during a recent trip here. "I'm wondering to this day why. Here you have this young, brash, athletic, somewhat explosive guy from the South, and I'm an older, very Northern, sort of more intellectual person. I would have thought we'd be poles apart."

Schorr's business manager kept the door open because of the money, which Schorr says "was good from the start, we've never had to negotiate that." Schorr says his reservations concerned "ethics and professionalism."

"Finally, Turner was on his way to a cable television convention in Las Vegas, that was on a Thursday night, and he said he was holding a press conference there Monday to announce the formation of Cable News Network," Schorr recalls. "He said he wanted me to come meet him, and he said, 'If you accept, I'd like you to be at the press conference with me.'"

Schorr went to the news conference. "He made it clear to me he was a kind of born-again news junkie, which I was loathe to believe, having watched his Atlanta station (WTBS, beamed by satellite to all 50 states). He offered to put assurances in writing that I would not be required to do anything inconsistent with my professional ethics and standards. Finally, I said, 'OK.'"

"He has a vision, an enormously adventurous vision," Schorr says. "This will be a network of news only. Twenty-four hours. Cable companies who buy it will allocate one channel for it."

"We'll have fairly hard news in the morning, consumer-oriented stuff, backgrounders, throughout the day in 20-minute segments, with the headlines, so to speak, every 20 minutes. We'll switch live to Congress, the White House, if something is

going on. "The beauty of this is, we won't have to go to anyone and say, 'Can we bump "I Love Lucy"?' because this is a fully news network."

Schorr will be senior correspondent in the 22-person Washington bureau, anchoring reports from there and the two-hour evening wrap-up, planned at 7 p.m. CST.

"I'll be the David Brinkley to his John Chancellor in Atlanta," he says. And who will that John Chancellor be? "Some star, I guess. He wants somebody even more recognizable than myself to start this thing off."

Japan Ready For 'Small Car War'

TOKYO (AP) — Japanese auto companies are emphasizing in their new models the strengths that helped make Japan the second-largest car-making country in the world — lightweight vehicles with engines designed to be cleaner and give better gas mileage.

The cars are being shown at the Tokyo International Motor Show, which closes this weekend. Thirteen Japanese and 26 foreign manufacturers are exhibiting 900 vehicles as well as motorcycles.

Despite hour-long traffic jams to and from the fairground, just one mile from the downtown Ginza shopping area, thousands turned out for the fair.

Japanese automakers said they are gearing up for an anticipated "small-car war" with American manufacturers to meet the demand for lighter, roomier and more fuel-efficient small vehicles in the next decade.

Japan's Nissan Motor Co., maker of Datsun cars, said in a report "Looking Beyond the 1980s" that major emphasis must now be placed on vehicle weight reduction, front-wheel drive and electronic engine control technology.

"With keener competition in the small-car field in store for the 1980s, an automaker's chances of winning this international race mainly hinge on its capability for technical development and in-

novation in the fuel efficiency area," the report said.

Japanese cars have always weighed less than their American competitors, a fact amply demonstrated by cars exhibited at the show. But while the rise in value of the yen last year raised prices of Japanese autos in America to levels above those of many U.S. cars, they still enjoy a big price advantage here.

Most Japanese-made cars at the show carry price tags ranging from \$3,380 to \$6,355. American cars, however, are offered at four to five times the price of Japanese vehicles.

"We're not directly competing with

the Japanese on all lines," said Ford Motor Co. spokesman Michael Savod. "We offer a different kind of product."

Riding in comfort in a Lincoln Continental or Thunderbird in Japan costs the equivalent of \$34,000, he said.

Ford's cheapest model, the Fiesta, carried a price tag of \$6,355.

General Motors, which hopes to sell 10,000 cars in Japan this year, had one of the most expensive vehicles on display — the Cadillac Seville at \$35,000.

Nixon Searching For Office Space

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Richard M. Nixon is reviewing several possible locations in mid-town Manhattan for his government-paid-for office, which he plans to move from California to New York early next year, officials say.

Although details are not available, the cost of the office could range from \$100,000 to \$280,000 a year, based on Nixon's request for space and what sources say the bids are asking in price-per-square-foot.

The cost for moving the office furniture would be an additional \$7,000 to \$8,000, government sources say.

Nixon notified the General Services Administration on Oct. 12 that he would need office space in New York City when he moves into a \$750,000 Manhattan townhouse he purchased last month.

The GSA, the government's landlord and supply agency, advertised for the space in The New York Times' classifieds, requesting 4,000 to 8,000 square feet of "first-class air-conditioned office space in Mid-Manhattan."

GSA officials said several offers were received and forwarded to Nixon, who is expected to decide which one he wants — if any — within about one month.

However, the officials refused to say how much the bids were for or where the prospective office sites are located. They said information on unawarded bids was confidential.

Sources, who asked not to be identified, said the bids ranged from about \$25 to \$35 per square foot.

Aides to Nixon were unavailable for comment about the new office or its cost. Nixon is expected to move to New York in February.

The Former Presidents Act of 1958

requires the government to provide office space for ex-presidents along with money for pensions, staff, travel and office supplies.

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Young Star Not Taken By Films

NEW YORK (AP) — "Making movies was a new experience, but I wouldn't want to make it a career," said Kelly Reno, the 13-year-old star of "The Black Stallion," the film based on Walter Farley's classic story of a boy and his horse. "Besides, who'll take care of the ranch," the young actor said, referring to his home near Pueblo, Colo., where he learned to ride before he could walk. "I've been ridin' for as long as I can remember."

In the movie, young Reno does most of his own riding and nearly all of the stunts, including the falls and jumps. He gives a lot of the credit to the black stallion, Cass Ole.

"He's really neat," he said. "He really knows what's going on and when that camera is rollin'. Once he hears it rollin' his ears perk up and he's just as lively as anything. A real good horse."

The film is about a young boy shipwrecked on a deserted island with a beautiful black stallion. By helping each other survive, the boy and horse develop a lasting relationship. After their rescue, they meet an ex-horse trainer, played by Mickey Rooney, who arranges a race between the stallion and two of the fastest thoroughbreds of the day.

One of the most frightening scenes in the film involves a cobra that slithers up to Reno while he's asleep on the beach. When he wakes up, he's staring the snake in the eye.

"They had plexiglass between me and the snake," the actor explained. "But every time the snake would zip around the corner, I'd zip up on the hill. That snake wasn't even defanged," he exclaimed. "He was milked but that don't help. Gives you maybe two or three weeks in the hospital."

Unlike the well-trained horse, the cobras were not always so cooperative. "Sometimes the snake charmers had to beat the snake on the back to make him mad so the hood would come out," Reno recalled.

"Even with the plexiglass I was scared," he admitted. "I don't like snakes and neither do my brothers. We'll be walking down a field and my big brother Bruce will see a snake and jump about 10 feet. Don't want no part of snakes."

Actor Glad About Change To Comedy

Star Says Shift From Heavy Stereotype Proved Difficult

NEW YORK (AP) — "I've had enough of playing neurotic heavy parts," proclaimed Malcolm McDowell, star of "Time After Time," a comedy-thriller in which he plays H.G. Wells and chases Jack the Ripper through time from 19th-century England to 1979 San Francisco.

This is a very different role for me," said McDowell, best known for "A Clockwork Orange," in which he played a sadistic hoodlum. "One would expect me to be Jack the Ripper," said the 36-year-old British actor. "It was difficult to play such a light character, full of charm and whimsy."

McDowell said pacing of the script of "Time After Time" didn't allow much room for research or character development. "There were certain things required of the character to move the story along. We call it 'shoe leather,'" he said. "It just tells the story, and anything else you can get in is a plus."

McDowell said he did listen to a recording of Wells' voice, which he described as whining with an East London accent. "I didn't think it would do

well in the hinterlands of the United States, which is where films are made or broken."

Unlike the famous author he portrays, McDowell said he has no interest in traveling ahead in time. "I'd like to go back perhaps, to see myself with Cleopatra," the actor said with a grin. "I was hypnotized once and actually taken forward in time," he said. "I looked in a mirror and was shocked. I saw myself as an old man with grey hair. I looked like an old prune. It got me straight back into the gym," he said, giving his girlfriend and co-star in "Time After Time," Mary Steenburgen, a reassuring hug.

In 1971, McDowell made a film with director Stanley Kubrick that changed his life. "I'm much more objective now about 'A Clockwork Orange,'" said McDowell, "but at the time I resented it. It might have been the role of a lifetime, but it was a double-edged sword."

McDowell said he spent a year creating the character of Alex, experimenting with new techniques and running the

full range of emotions "from A-to-Z." But after he saw a print of the film, he said he was upset.

"Kubrick had cut it so I couldn't see much of my character," McDowell recalled. "It was like having your legs chopped off. I felt abandoned like a newborn baby in a telephone booth."

Then the film opened in New York, and to McDowell's astonishment, his phone in London rang all night. But with the acclaim came problems. McDowell said he wasn't prepared to deal with.

"The part was so strong, people began seeing me as the hoodlum I portrayed," he said. "I really resented that. Then it affected my career because I refused to do anything that even smacked of violence."

"That's why it's very pleasant to play H.G. Wells. I feel like I've said the last rights for Alex the Dru."

Before doing "Time After Time," McDowell made "Caligula," which has yet to be released. "It's been plagued with disasters," he said. "Everybody seems to be suing everybody else."

Interest Increases May Crimp Casino Hotels

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — October's sharp increases in interest rates will put a crimp in Atlantic City's casino hotel boom by squeezing out marginal developers, financial experts say.

But the experts also say that "stronger, higher-quality" developers have little to fear from tighter credit conditions.

"I don't think the situation will materially affect the number of casinos in Atlantic City, but it might hurt a number of entrepreneurs coming in right now," said Theodore Anderson, analyst for Argus Research Corp., of New York.

It might delay some projects, but it's not going to hurt the major companies," Anderson said. "Companies like Hilton and Holiday Inns have the money to do anything they want. They breeze

right through a credit crunch."

"Those companies that are not strong in nature are going to have a difficult time, if not an impossible time," said William Schetlick, vice president of the First National State Bank of New Jersey. Schetlick's bank is helping to finance several casino hotel projects on the Boardwalk.

Two casino hotels, Resorts International and Caesars Boardwalk Regency, are now operating. Eleven others are under construction, including projects by Bally Manufacturing, Playboy International and Elsinore Corp., Ramada Inns, Holiday Inns, Del E. Webb and Golden Nugget.

Casino developers are reluctant to talk about their financial arrangements.

Some developers, like Ramada Inns, have financing in place before major construction begins. Others have started construction without permanent financing. Still other projects may never be built because they were dreams in the first place, experts say.

William Downey, executive director of the Atlantic City Casino Hotel Association, said he has "no indication from the membership that financing is an immediate problem."

Conference On Earth Sheltered Housing Scheduled For Repeat

A conference on Earth Sheltered Housing for the Southwest, sponsored by the Center for Energy Research and the department of civil engineering at Texas Tech University, will be held Friday in the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

Dr. Ernst W. Kiesling, chairman of the department of civil engineering, said that the first conference on the subject last August indicated a need to repeat the meeting.

"Earth sheltered housing conserves energy, resists damage during storms and can be esthetically pleasing," Kiesling said.

He estimated that about 20 percent of U.S. energy consumption is the housing, most of it for heating and cooling. By using earth sheltered concepts and cost-effective solar systems, energy consumption can be greatly reduced.

"Beyond energy conservation, earth sheltered homes are resistant to fire, storms and weather damage," he said. "They are easier and less costly to maintain than conventional homes. They are quiet and secure and they are efficient in terms of land use. They might even be cleaner, requiring dusting less often than the conventional home."

The earth sheltering concepts to be discussed appear traditional from the street. In a properly designed earth sheltered house, he said, there is a feeling within of openness, with a great deal of daylight.

Kiesling said that interiors are basically traditional, and the freedom allowed architects is equal to that of conventional buildings.

There are some disadvantages, Kiesling said, and those who are planning to build new homes should be advised of both advantages and disadvantages. The initial cost may be higher, for instance, but the savings might also be greater. The conference will deal with both advantages and disadvantages and cite local examples.

"This seminar will allow participants to hear professional architects and engineers and ask questions before making costly and important decisions," he said.

Models, renderings and photographs of successful projects will be displayed.

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
