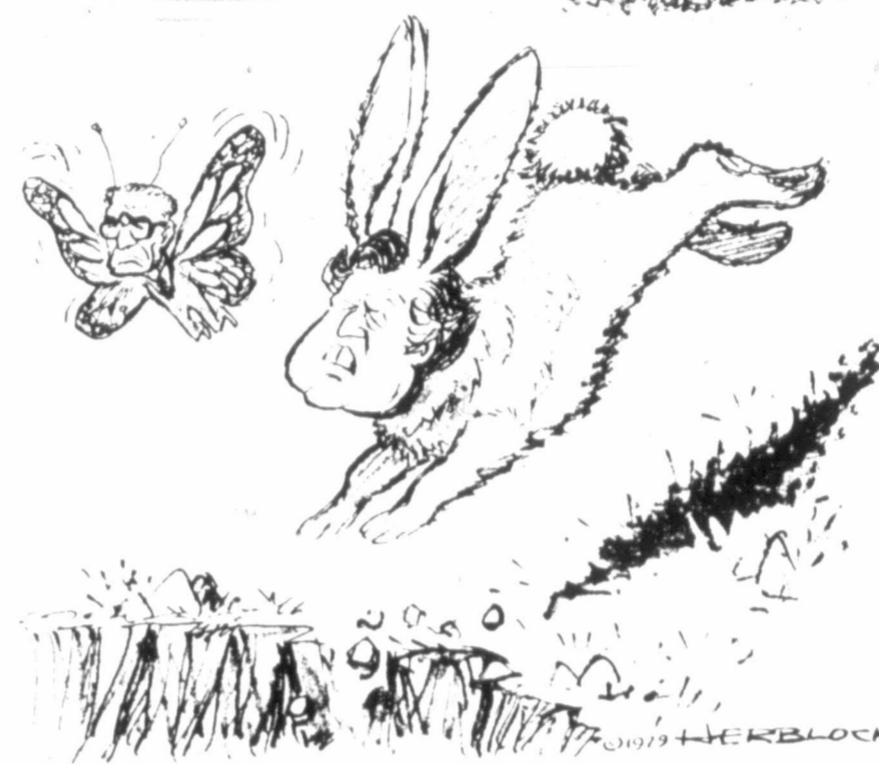
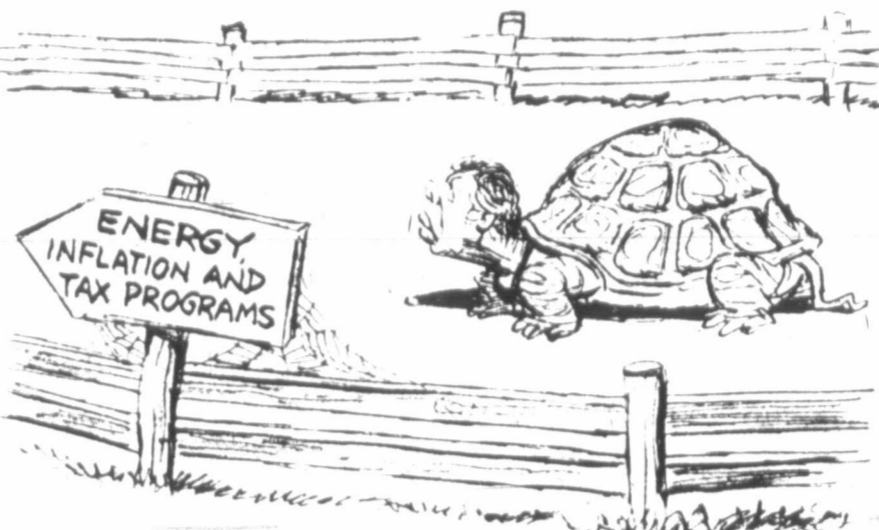

Court Slams Door On Taiwan

IN SIDESTEPPING the Constitutional questions involved in President Carter's breaking of a 25-year-old mutual defense pact with Nationalist China, the Supreme Court has further confused an already murky situation.

The Court, anxious to get on with its Christmas vacation, refused by a 7-2 vote to hear Sen. Barry Goldwater's challenge to the President's abuse of power.

Four of the justices said the case was a "political question" which the Court shouldn't consider, one said the issue "was not ripe for judicial review," one wanted to uphold an appellate court's ruling in favor of Carter and another gave no reason at all.

Justice Byron R. White and Harry A. Blackmun were the only two who even wanted to give the Goldwater group a chance to present arguments to the court.

# China's 'Illegal' Catholic Church To Consecrate New Bishop

PEKING (UPI) — China's independent Catholic church, estranged from the Vatican since 1949, will consecrate a new bishop for the Peking diocese on Friday, a church spokesman announced Sunday.

He is the Rev. Michael Fu Tieshan, pastor of the only Catholic church now open in the Chinese capital.

Fu will be Peking's first bishop since China's Christians underwent 10 years of persecution during the late Chairman Mao Tse-tung's 1966-76 Cultural Revolution.

His predecessor, Bishop Joseph Yao Guangyu, died in 1964, and the post has been vacant since.

Fu's election last July as bishop by the Chinese Patriotic Catholic Association,

as the Chinese church is called, was branded "illegal" by a Vatican press spokesman.

However Pope John Paul II noted in a public speech soon afterward that China's Catholics "have never ceased to be present in our prayer in a special way," and said he hoped for a meeting with them.

Spokesmen for the Chinese church say the stumbling block to reconciliation with Rome is the fact that the Vatican still has diplomatic relations with the nationalist Chinese government on Taiwan.

They believe that state-to-state relations between the Vatican and the Com-

munist government in Peking will have to precede reestablishment of links with the rest of the world's Catholics.

Peking's sole Catholic church is St. Mary of the Immaculate Conception, built in 1904, and operated by the Lazarist order of France before the 1949 communist takeover. Mass is still said in Latin.

Fu estimated recently there about 2 million Catholics in China.

Attendance at the Catholic church has risen rapidly since the Chinese Communist party in April implemented a return to the policy of religious toleration that was in force before the Cultural Revolution.

The number of worshippers also has

multiplied at Peking's lone Protestant church. The government this year agreed to publication of the Christian Bible in China for the first time since 1948.

## Study Says DDT Killed Songbirds

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP) — Tens of thousands of songbirds perished as a result of a 1974 DDT spraying that failed to curb tussock moths in Eastern Washington and Oregon, says a study by a group of students at The Evergreen State College.

"The population of the pest moth declined at nearly the same rate in untreated areas as it did in those that were treated," said Dr. Steven G. Herman, the Evergreen professor who directed the study during and after the spray program.

That meant the increase and decline of the moth in forests in northeast Washington and northern Oregon was a natural cycle, Herman said, and would have happened without the spending of nearly \$3 million on DDT.

Forest Service scientists and other officials questioned Herman's statements when the study began, one critic saying that Herman's assessments were based on "a few dead birds."

Herman's study lays out exact counts of dead birds found in areas examined and then multiplies the number of deaths by the entire acreage sprayed to reflect total number of bird deaths for the entire project.

The study was recently published by the Wildlife Society, a journal of professional wildlife managers.

The Forest Service said the spraying on the Colville Indian Reservation and adjacent areas in Washington, and around Wallula, Ore., prevented a loss of \$23.9 million in trees that otherwise would have been killed by the rapacious moth.

Herman said, "We found evidence of widespread and significant mortality among the songbirds. Thousands and perhaps hundreds of thousands of songbirds died."

"Songbirds — we found 21 species affected — have an important ecological role in the forest," he said. "They eat insects and in certain circumstances are capable of preventing outbreaks (of insects)."

Before it was published, the paper was reviewed for scientific accuracy by Drs. Donald Dahlsten, a forest entomologist at the University of California, and Joseph Hickey, wildlife ecologist at the University of Wisconsin.

The DDT sprayed on 426,000 acres in the pest area killed many tussock moths, Herman said. But they would have died anyhow, as they did on the control areas that were not sprayed, he said.

The use of DDT is restricted in the United States.

## Aides' Bodies Returned To Beirut

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — As an honor guard stood at attention, the bodies of two Palestine Liberation Organization officials gunned down in Cyprus were returned Sunday to Beirut, where a top PLO official blamed Israel for the assassinations.

In Tel Aviv, an Israeli newspaper claimed one of the slain PLO men, Ibrahim Abdul Aziz Raghif, had been in Cyprus to organize terror attacks on Israeli and Egyptian targets.

Raghif and Samir Toukan, the No. 2 man at the PLO office in Nicosia, were shot dead Saturday night by a lone gunman as they got out of a car at Tokan's home in the Cypriot capital. Raghif was visiting Nicosia.

Walid Wazir, the military commander of Yasser Arafat's PLO, met the Cyprus Airways plane that brought the bodies from Cyprus and repeated the PLO claim that Israeli agents murdered the men. Cypriot authorities have withheld comment while investigating the slayings.

The plane also carried Toukan's wife and George Pelagias, director-general of the Cypriot Foreign Ministry, representing President Spyros Kyprianou. Pelagias accompanied the bodies in what a PLO spokesman called a "gesture of friendship."

Palestinian Liberation Army police armed with Kalashnikov assault rifles flanked the flag-draped coffins as they were lowered from the jet and moved to trucks. A PLO spokesman said the men would be buried here.

Israel has made no official comment on the shooting, but the conservative daily Maariv said Sunday that Raghif, known by the code name Abu Safwat, was on Cyprus to plan terror raids. It gave no source for the report.

# Chrysler Layoffs Making Hopes For Christmas Dim

KOKOMO, Ind. (UPI) — What once was a blue-collar boom town has become the pits for some of the nation's highest-paid hourly workers — Chrysler employees.

The United Auto Workers' fund that supplements unemployment benefits to give laid-off workers 90 percent of their regular wages has been sapped dry by the incessant and seemingly interminable layoffs.

"I already told my kids there ain't going to be any Christmas," said Suzi Grant, one of the hundreds of idled Chrysler workers in the city. Many have been out of work since August.

Chrysler — with a transmission plant and a die-casting plant in Kokomo — normally employs 40 percent of the city's industrial labor force, second only to Delco-Remy, which also has been hurt by slow car sales.

A typical Kokomo household with two working spouses is used to drawing wages of more than \$560 weekly. Now, around 600 Chrysler households are drawing food stamps, welfare officials said. Many draw unemployment compensation or township relief. The luckiest have low-paying jobs — with salaries far below their Chrysler wages.

Rick Walker gets relief benefits and in return must do work assigned by the township trustee who, under Indiana law, has the Dickensian role, "overseer of the poor."

He said he doesn't mind raking leaves and doing such chores for older citizens but "\$99 a week for four people just doesn't go very far."

Seeking other work if futile, he said, because, "if they know you're laid off from Chrysler, it's like 'file 13' with your application."

Walker said his wife tried to help out by finding a better-paying job but ended up getting fired from the job she had because her employers learned she was job hunting.

Because the layoffs are imposed on the basis of seniority, many of the unemployed are women.

"They didn't hire women until seven years ago. There are probably only three or four left at the plant," said laid-off worker Mary Hooker, who has eight children, including a stepson — four of them at home.

Both Mrs. Hooker and her husband, Ernest, have been laid off from their jobs at Chrysler.

"My family lost \$300 a week," she said.

# Iranians Primed For Ultimate Sacrifice

*"Blood and self-sacrifice have been with them for centuries"*

NEW YORK (UPI) — Iran's admirals solemnly put on the shrouds of martyrdom when President Carter ordered U.S. Naval ships in the Indian Ocean to steam toward the Persian state.

Street fighters who helped in toppling the shah in the revolution last winter held up their palms, smeared with the blood of their victims, for cameramen to photograph their victory.

Demonstrators outside the besieged U.S. Embassy where 50 Americans are held hostage in Tehran were seen on television news wearing shrouds bearing Persian writing that said they were ready to die.

Iranians have been moved to this seeming willingness to commit violence and self-sacrifice because their religious leader, the Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, has managed to tap their frustration with modern life under the shah and funnel it into the only tradition they had left — their religion, according to Prof. Peter Chelkowski of New York University.

They have been moved to the streets because "he has been able to translate their Shiite rituals of atonement into political action," said the expert on Iran and its ritual religious theater in a weekend interview.

The Iranians are simply acting out in real life what they have seen depicted in their theatrically bloody folk passion plays known as "Ta'zieh" since the 10th century, said Chelkowski. He spent three years studying the dramas in Iran and has written a book about it.

**Italian Government Proposes Sentences**  
ROME (AP) — The Italian government, faced with spreading urban terrorism, has proposed stiff new measures in its anti-terrorist war, including mandatory life sentences for the killers of judges and policemen.

The government also shifted a top national police anti-terrorism expert to northern Italy in a bid to combat escalating extremist attacks there.

The plays, which are similar to Christianity's Stations of the Cross depicting the death of Christ, show the "heroic martyrdom" of Hussein, the grandson of the prophet Mohammed, who was cut to pieces by his religious and political opponents in 680.

His death about 60 years after the death of Mohammed is the heart of the Iranian brand of Islam, known as Shi'a. The Shiites believe in succession through blood-relationship to Mohammed while the Sunnis, who represent the majority of the Arab Muslim world, believe in succession by election.

"The plays are filled with blood and self-sacrifice," said Chelkowski. "You have to understand, there's no division of time and space in the Persian mind during the plays. They are filled with a profound guilt feeling for not having helped Hussein."

The Shiites believe martyrdom can win Hussein's intercession for them at the final day of judgment.

"Khomeini has managed to take this syndrome of sacrifice and guilt, this hatred of villains and translate it to the shah and his supporters," Chelkowski said. "The whole ritual is reenacted in a political framework."

When President Carter offers any threat to Khomeini, he plays into his hands, Chelkowski said, helping Khomeini unify his people against a common enemy.

"Our nation looks forward to the opportunity of self-sacrifice and martyrdom," he said Khomeini wrote in a letter to the pope.

"He himself would be happy to die to take on martyrdom," Chelkowski said.

The Iranian people turned to Khomeini, who returned to Iran after 15 years of exile last winter, because "the shah tried to industrialize too fast," Chelkowski said.

"The shah took a family and group-oriented society that had survived 25 centuries and completely disrupted it," he said.

Tehran went from a half-million population after World War II to five million today, one-seventh of the population crammed into the capital.

"Planning was poor, urbanization was hell. There were too many cars, no space to move. No time for the traditional ties."

"They were like a sponge full of water. They couldn't absorb any more," he said.

# Scientology Church Protested

CLEARWATER, Fla. (AP) — A former mayor of this Gulf Coast resort city got a standing ovation from about 2,500 residents who gathered at a rally aimed at running the Church of Scientology out of town.

Former Mayor Gabriel Cazares, who began a campaign against the church when it bought a downtown hotel four years ago to serve as its headquarters, was then targeted in a smear campaign, documents indicate.

"I want to see that this city is finally and permanently released of this four-year reign of terror," Cazares told the gathering at Russell Stadium on Saturday.

The documents, seized from the church and recently released by federal officials, described the church's plans to gain control of the city's government and the news media in the area.

The current mayor, Charles LeCher, who on Friday announced that the Scientology leaders had made partial payments on back taxes, said the church is not a true church but "a secret society."

"They've been getting a free ride," he said. "I'm going to keep working to get them out of Clearwater."

# Ex-Governor Chides ERA Supporters

DETROIT (AP) — George Romney says the equal rights movement has attracted "moral pervers" who want to undermine the very family the Mormon Church is striving to enrich.

The 72-year-old former Michigan governor and retired president of American Motors Corp. is a prominent member of the church, which opposes the Equal Rights Amendment on grounds it could lead to destruction of the family.

He said in an interview in the Detroit News Sunday from his home in Bloomfield Hills that the Equal Rights Amendment is "basically the product" of many individuals who have made a concerted attack on the family and morality.

"At an international women's year meeting," said Romney, "lesbians and the homosexuals and the moral pervers (cited) this amendment as a means of eliminating any basis of moral criticism."

The ERA might be less offensive, Romney said, if it was not intended to support "perverted and improper sexual conduct" and not intended to eliminate "needed protection against the abuse of women."

Romney said he supported his church's decision to excommunicate feminist Sonia Johnson earlier this month.

Church officials said that Mrs. Johnson's staunch backing of the ERA was not the reason for her excommunication. Rather, they said, the action was taken because of Mrs. Johnson's attack on the Mormon Church and its leadership while she campaigned for the ERA.

Thirty-five states have ratified the ERA. It must be approved by three more states by June 30, 1982, to become part of the Constitution.

# NOW Head Says Carter Could Have Won Ratification For ERA

WASHINGTON (AP) — The president of the National Organization for Women says President Carter probably could have won ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment if he had spent a fraction of his efforts on that issue as he is devoting to his re-election.

In an interview, Eleanor Smeal, leader of the world's largest feminist organization, said Carter spent thousands of dollars and used hundreds of workers to win a straw vote in Florida in October.

A fraction of that much presidential concern could have gained the two votes needed to prevent the ERA's defeat in the Florida Legislature, she said.

No state has approved the proposed constitutional amendment, which would outlaw discrimination based on sex, since Carter took office. Approval by three more states is needed for ratification by the necessary 38 states.

The ERA lost by only two votes in North Carolina and Illinois as well as in Florida, Miss Smeal said, and a stronger effort by Carter in those three states probably would

have reversed the outcomes.

She left little doubt that she believed her 110,000-member organization would endorse Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., for president.

"You have to make that conclusion if you want to," she told a reporter. "I'm going to give the group some options before their president says something that locks them in."

Last weekend, the organization's 27-member executive board voted not to endorse Carter. NOW's political action committees in some state chapters already have endorsed Kennedy.

Miss Smeal said the organization also would endorse one of the candidates for the Republican presidential nomination.

She praised Kennedy's commitment to the ERA and said, "we feel that his record on reproductive rights is one of the strongest among the major candidates."

Since Kennedy became a candidate, there has been much speculation about his private life. Even his wife, Joan, who lives separate from him, has commented on the gossip about her husband and other women.

Miss Smeal said candidates should not be judged by their personal relationships but on their positions on issues affecting millions of women.

"Do I know anybody's personal relationships?" she asked. "It is a difficult barometer to judge by. The president of the United States is an institution. What one must be very worried about is what their political stance will be on issues that will impact millions of lives."

"This business that a person must run as an entire family is oppressive to the candidate's wife," she said.

"She must always agree with her spouse, there must be adoration — it is really a denial of equality. The reality is that we are electing a man and what he does on issues that will affect millions of women is what is relevant."

Miss Smeal said NOW's board voted unanimously not to endorse Carter because it did not want its silence interpreted as satisfaction with the "lip service" he had paid the issue of women's rights.

"Maybe if people get a solemn message and a strong one, maybe they'll change," she said. "I don't know what kind of politics it makes to accept the unacceptable. It is not acceptable to lose the ERA."

## Scientists Reorient Voyager 1

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The far-ranging Voyager 1 spacecraft was again transmitting strong signals to Earth on Sunday after scientists finally got it to reorient itself and aim its antenna directly at Earth.

"We have re-established contact with the spacecraft. Now the trick is to find out what happened," said Frank Bristow of the Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

Two-way radio contact with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration spacecraft, due at Saturn next November, was lost Thursday during a

routine course correction maneuver.

Voyager 1, now 660 million miles from Earth, apparently became disoriented during the maneuver, aborted the course correction, and aimed its transmission antenna in the wrong direction, Bristow said.

Two previous attempts to re-align Voyager's antenna failed.

Optical sensors aboard Voyager 1 were programmed to recognize a bright star called Canopus and use it as a landmark when aiming the antenna. There was speculation that it had locked onto the wrong star.

# Marijuana Effects Widespread; Implications Remain Mystery

CHICAGO (UPI) — Ounce for ounce, smoking marijuana gets people 10 times as high as eating it, scientists have discovered. Doctors have found one element in marijuana can relieve epileptic seizures in humans while yet another element in the same plant induces epilepsy.

## Health Dangers Cited As Reason In Banning Foam Insulation

Americans trying to fight inflated housing and energy costs by foam insulating their homes are running into health dangers from the chemical formaldehyde.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts last month banned the use of foam insulation made of urea formaldehyde, often put in by homeowners anxious to give their homes another layer of insulation. The Consumer Products Safety Commission is conducting hearings and studies to see if the insulation should be banned nationwide.

An environmental health professor at the University of Washington has caught the attention of other federal agencies with a claim that particle board, made of wood fragments held together by urea formaldehyde glue, is causing health problems in tightly built houses.

Mobile homes are especially susceptible to the problem, he said.

For both the insulation and wood products, the 1,000 complaints in Safety Commission and Massachusetts files tell of the same health problems. Breathing difficulties, serious eye and skin irritation, headaches and dizziness, nausea and vomiting and severe nose bleeds.

Ten Massachusetts families found the problem so bad they left their homes. Of 100 people whose cases were investigated by the Safety Commission, 40 people had to leave home.

"I consider it a possible source of sudden infant death," said Peter A. Breyse, the Washington professor. "I've got at least two adults in which the doctor described closing of the throats as a result of exposure, requiring emergency treatment. If this can happen to an adult, what happens if it happens to a baby?"

Known primarily for its use in embalming, formaldehyde for years has been a valuable manufacturing chemical. Besides its use in gluing wood together and providing insulation, it also helps put permanent press in clothes, tans leather, disinfects, sterilizes soil and breaks down vegetable proteins for textile fibers.

But after awhile, chemical reactions occur that allow formaldehyde in the insulation and glue to release into the atmosphere, Breyse said. The breakdown is speeded by hot, humid conditions, he said.

Breyse said formaldehyde is everywhere but, until the recent drive occurred to make homes hold heat better, it never had a chance to become too concentrated because air currents would whisk it away.

"We see the same problems in new homes that are built tight like mobile homes," he said. "As you make the homes tighter and tighter, for whatever reasons, the problem becomes greater."

A Safety Commission spokeswoman said urea formaldehyde foam has been installed in about half a million homes since 1976, including houses where people had it installed when skyrocketing heating bills sent them looking for ways to conserve energy. The foam is being put into about 5 percent of all homes being built in America today, she said.

Mobile homes are more susceptible to formaldehyde buildups because federal regulations instituted in 1976 made them much more tightly built than regular houses, said Walter Benning, president of the Manufactured Housing Institute.

As a result, the air in a mobile home changes just 0.3 times an hour compared to five complete changes an hour in a regular single-family dwelling, he said.

## Company Purchases Late Actor's Land

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — The Loel Co. of Phoenix has signed an agreement in principle to purchase 47,000 acres of Arizona land from the estate of actor John Wayne and his partner Louis Johnson for more than \$30 million.

The sale of the Red River Land Co. is believed to be one of the largest farm and ranch sales in Arizona history. It was announced on Saturday by Michael Wayne, son of the famed actor who died June 11.

Loel is engaged in land investment and development with interests in oil and gas.

Lawrence R. Wilson, one of the major shareholders in Loel, said the firm would change its name to Red River Resources Inc. when the purchase is final.

The sale includes the 36,000-acre 26 Bar Ranch near Springerville in north-eastern Arizona and the 11,000-acre Red River Ranch in the Maricopa-Stanfield area 40 miles south of Phoenix.

The Red River Land Co., owned and operated for 20 years by Wayne and Johnson, runs the largest privately owned cattle-feeding operation in the nation, Michael Wayne said. In addition, the company produces pure-bred Hereford cattle, cotton and when on the central Arizona property.

"My father had never done anything with estate planning, although he was urged to, so the taxes have created a burden for the estate," Michael Wayne said. He said his father was very proud of the land operation.

Wilson said Johnson will continue to manage the properties and will have complete control over day-to-day operations as he always has had.

Michael Wayne said he will continue his association with the property by continuing "consulting on promotional and public relations matters and be very much a part of the continuing operation."

The Ohio River carries more tonnage than the St. Lawrence Seaway or the Panama Canal, the National Geographic Society says.

They also have found regular use of "pot" alters genetic material in humans, temporarily reduces sperm production in rats, and increases stillbirths and miscarriages among monkeys.

But, the current Journal of the American Medical Association reports, doctors still do not know exactly what is in the weed that is becoming popular among millions of Americans. And finding out how the drug affects humans will take another 20 or 30 years.

Dr. Gabriel Nahas of the Department of Anesthesiology at New York's Columbia University examined the enigma of the so-called "recreational drug" in a review of the status of current marijuana research. So far, he said, the indications are that marijuana can affect the lungs, reproductive systems and brain. The mystery is how.

The findings included the notation that, when marijuana is smoked, 50 percent of its intoxicating agent, called THC, is absorbed into the smokers' bloodstream. When marijuana is eaten, only 5 to 10 percent of the THC gets into the blood.

In scientists' terms: "Smoking results in a bioavailability five to 10 times greater than by ingestion of the drug."

Another key finding is that THC can affect cellular and genetic material — including DNA, the key genetic material in humans. One study showed irregularities in the

sperm of long-term smokers of hashish — in which THC is the intoxicating agent. Experiments with rats showed THC impaired sperm production but that the impairment was reversible when administration of the drug was stopped after 80 days.

Research with rhesus monkeys showed that, when THC was administered to female monkeys before mating, the incidence of spontaneous abortion or stillbirths increased four fold over the control group which did not take THC.

Therapeutic uses of THC include treatment of glaucoma — by reducing eye pressure — and relieving nausea in cancer patients, though the Journal said other drugs are better for that purpose.

And, doctors have found, a non-intoxicating agent of marijuana called CBD is a potent anticonvulsant. Daily doses of 200 to 400 milligrams of CBD successfully relieved epileptic seizures in three out of four patients tested.

However, another team of researchers found THC, in the same proportions, triggers certain forms of epilepsy.

The puzzles and dichotomies are many, said Nahas, and require far-reaching studies.

"Therefore the human pathology of marijuana cannot be written before two or three decades," he said, adding parenthetically: "It took 60 years to establish the pathology of tobacco smoking."

# Woman Considers Request For Excommunication From Church

DENVER (AP) — Leanne M. Boyd said Sunday she is "sitting on" her request for excommunication from the Mormon Church, trying to decide if such a step is necessary to demonstrate her support of the Equal Rights Amendment.

Mrs. Boyd, 27, wrote church officials in Denver and Salt Lake City last week, requesting excommunication for 18 reasons, among them the recent excommunication of Sonia Johnson of Sterling, Va.

Mrs. Johnson was excommunicated because, the church said, she knowingly preached false church doctrine and undermined church leaders by portraying them as women-haters.

Mrs. Johnson has called those reasons "total and pure nonsense" and claims she was excommunicated because of her pro-ERA statements. The Mormon church opposes the ERA and says that its passage could lead to destruction of the family.

Mormon officials were not immediately available for comment on Mrs. Boyd's request. Don Healey, Mrs. Boyd's bishop, said late last week he was "very unhappy to receive that letter" and that church officials would try to meet with her "and change her mind about the ex-

communication." Mrs. Boyd said "several" local church leaders had visited her for more than two hours on Saturday.

"They pointed out that I was baptized in March and it's now December and I'm requesting excommunication," Mrs. Boyd said. "They don't think I've been in (the church) long enough to make a decision like that."

She said the men who visited Saturday were "very kind and very understanding," but added that "they have not changed my mind about the way I feel" toward the ERA.

Mrs. Boyd said she the Mormon representatives had told her that "there was more to Mrs. Johnson's case than just supporting the ERA."

She said her feeling when she asked

for excommunication was that "the ERA was such a basic thing ... and I couldn't see us ever resolving it."

Married and the mother of a 3-year-old daughter, Mrs. Boyd said she still believes most of the church's teachings.

She grew up in a Baptist home.

Mrs. Boyd said she was told by church leaders the "woman has a very special place in the LDS (Latter Day Saints) religion" and said she understood their thinking.

# National Gallery Opens Persian-Iranian Miniatures Exhibition

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Gallery of Art opened Sunday what it said may be the biggest show of Persian-Iranian miniatures, painted more than 400 years ago.

Officials of the government-run gallery said the exhibit has been planned for years and has no connection with the present crisis between the United States and Iran.

Many of the works at the gallery's new East Building were lent by Britain, France and Sweden, and none came from Iran.

The show is called "Wonders of the Age: Masterpieces of Early Safavid Painting, 1501-1576." The paintings were done under the patronage of Shah Tahmasp, himself a talented artist, who at one point turned puritanical and banned all secular painting in his empire.

## Expert Says Religious Scholars Should Be Sent To Talk To Iran

NEW YORK (AP) — Before President Carter applies economic sanctions to Iran, a group of esteemed Islamic scholars should be sent to that country to reason with the Ayatollah Khomeini, an Iranian-American expert said Sunday.

R.K. Ramazani, chairman of the Woodrow Wilson Department of Government and Foreign Affairs at University of Virginia, said the United States should "solicit mediation, before we talk very seriously about sanctions."

"Sanctions are severe measures and might leave longstanding scars," Ramazani said in an interview on NBC's "Meet the Press."

Ramazani said four or five Islamic religious scholars who "could be found anywhere from Mauritania to Malaysia" could go to Khomeini and discuss "common interests and the reputation of Islam."

The scholars should be sent under United Nations auspices, Ramazani said, and should offer a forum where the Iranians can air their grievances against the deposed shah and the United States.

Ramazani said he was optimistic that the hostages would soon be freed, both because of the International Court of Justice's condemnation of the holding of the Americans and because "I think there is a growing conviction in Iran that the United States would not return the shah."

"I think I might be more optimistic this week," he said, adding that if another forum is furnished for the Iranians to make their case against the shah and the United States, he did not expect the hostages to be tried.

Ramazani, who was born in Iran and has been a U.S. citizen for 18 years, cautioned Americans not to "learn the wrong lessons" from the crisis in Iran and not to wash its hands of the Third World. He said the Iranians often exaggerate, and they are "crying out for attention."

He said Iran has had a "longstanding reservoir of good will" toward the United States as a great democracy, and "I consider this an aberration."

"Even when they are criticizing the shah, they are criticizing him by our standards, while Mr. (Henry) Kissinger is

## Fire Fighters Union Votes On Strike

CHICAGO (AP) — Firefighters voted for the third and final day Sunday on whether to authorize the calling of a strike, and the head of their union predicted his members would give him that option.

Frank Muscare, president of the Chicago Fire Fighters Union, said that about 3,000 of the 3,905 firefighters eligible to vote would do so by Sunday evening. A two-thirds majority is needed for the strike authorization.

Muscare said he would announce the results of voting Sunday night.

He described many union members as "angry and determined" because they say Mayor Jane Byrne has not lived up to her campaign promise that they would get a contract with the city.

"Most of them aren't even bothering to go into the voting booths," Muscare said. "They're just marking their ballots right there at the table where they get 'em — they don't care who sees how they vote."

Muscare said he has been trying for months to get Mrs. Byrne to sit down and start negotiating. But the mayor has said the city cannot begin negotiations until specific guidelines for collective bargaining have been established. She also said she wanted to receive "technical" advice from the City Council.

Mrs. Byrne has said red tape kept her from fulfilling her promise and she has assured firefighters she would sign a contract in 1980.

Last year, Muscare also sought a strike authorization from union members, but failed by 533 votes to get the two-thirds margin needed.

If the union members vote to authorize a strike, Muscare said no action would be taken until Dec. 27, when the union's executive board is scheduled to meet.

**FIRE EXTINGUISHED**  
**ABU DHABI, United Arab Emirates (AP)** — A devastating fire was finally extinguished aboard the Liberian-flag oil tanker Energy Determination, rocked by an explosion in the Hormuz Strait on Thursday, the Gulf News Agency reported Sunday. The explosion tore a large hole into the hull near the stern water line of the empty tanker.

The exhibition is built around paintings and manuscript ornaments ordered by the shah to illustrate the "Book of Kings," the Persian national epic written by the poet Ferdousi 500 years before.

It shows a highly colored world, often fantastic and sometimes realistic, with golden skies, marching camels, polo games, a peacock blue battlefield and silver streams now tarnished to black. Tiny "earth spirits," sometimes invisible without a magnifying glass, hide among rocks that look more like flames.

Among the pictures are Sultan-Muhammad's "The Court of Gayumars," which the gallery says is the supreme example of Persian painting. Another is Mirza-Ali's "Hawking Party," done in the shah's later years when, after recovering from a severe illness, he decided he liked painting after all.

The National Gallery gave the show little advance publicity. The usual preview for art critics was dropped. Two uniformed guards were stationed in each room on the opening day.

In an unrelated difficulty, director J. Carter Brown said he is awaiting word from the Treasury Department about a group of modern paintings lent by the Tehran Museum of Contemporary Art, which now wants the works back. Brown was working with the Iranian embassy to arrange their return when President Carter issued an order Nov. 14 blocking all property of the Iranian government.

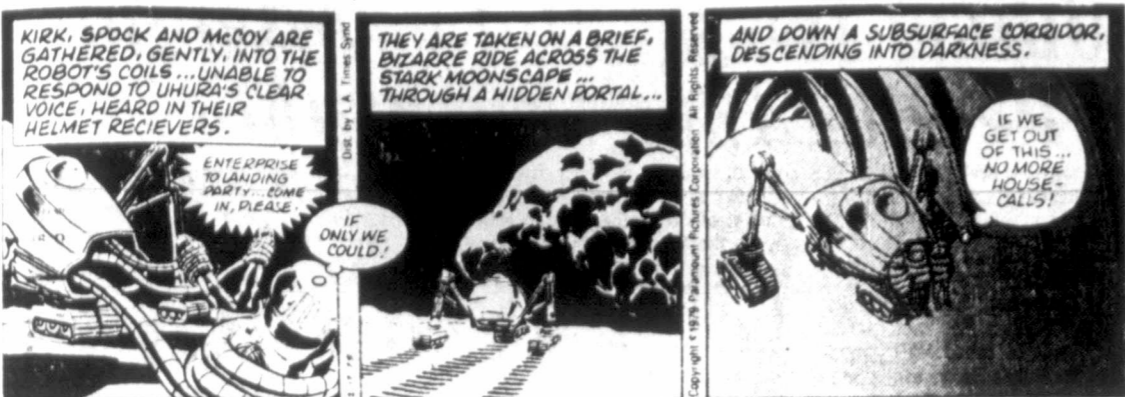

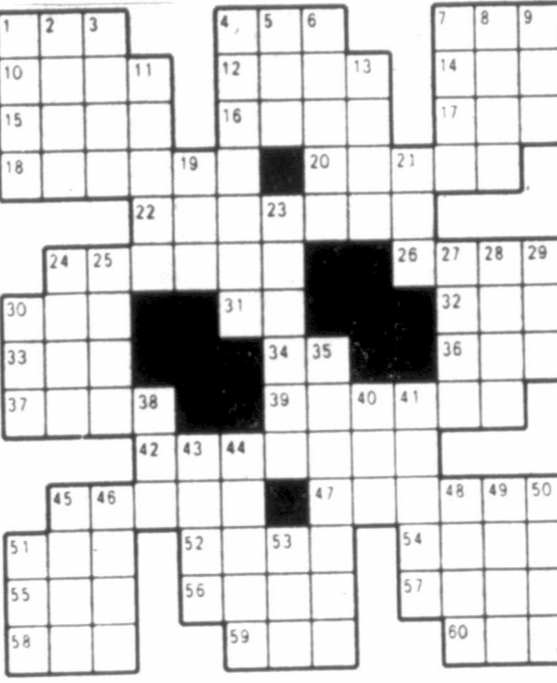

## Problems Create Boom Town

ARANYAPRATHET, Thailand (UPI) — War, famine and pestilence in neighboring Cambodia have brought prosperity to the sleepy towns and villages on the Thai side of the border.

While scores of people die every day of bullet wounds, disease and malnutrition in nearby Cambodia, the cash registers ring in Aranyaprathet, a town of about 12,000 people.

Only about 2 miles from the Thai-Cambodian frontier and 125 miles south-east of Bangkok, Aranyaprathet is the center of activity for those aiding the refugees or reporting on the Cambodian situation.

The huge influx of relief workers, reports, photographers and Thai military personnel has created a boom town atmosphere in Aranyaprathet, where a four-story building qualifies as a skyscraper.

But with the prosperity have come problems usually associated with large urban areas — inflation, overcrowding and traffic jams.

Hotel rooms, even the most humble, are in great demand by aid workers and visiting journalists. Lines form at reception desks daily at checkout time when rooms may be available.

Prices for grubby, rundown cubicles with only minimal bathing facilities run about \$5 a night. That includes the 24-hour din from parties in nearby rooms or in the parking area just outside the door.

The few hostelries with higher class facilities charge what the traffic will bear.

Some families move out of their mod-

est wooden houses on stilts and live with friends or relatives in order to rent them to foreigners, at up to \$650 per month.

Aranyaprathet's few Thai and Vietnamese restaurants are jammed with visitors, hungry after a long day in the nearby refugee camps.

Thai newsmen complain that food and drink prices have soared to levels previously found only in Bangkok.

When trouble flares on the border, the two telephone lines linking Aranyaprathet with Bangkok and the rest of the world are overloaded.

Long lines form at the telephone office. Journalists and others needing rapid service are encouraged to book their calls "express urgent" — At twice the standard rate. It is rumored that telephone operators will put a call through immediately if one is willing to pay four times the standard tariff for "double express urgent" service.

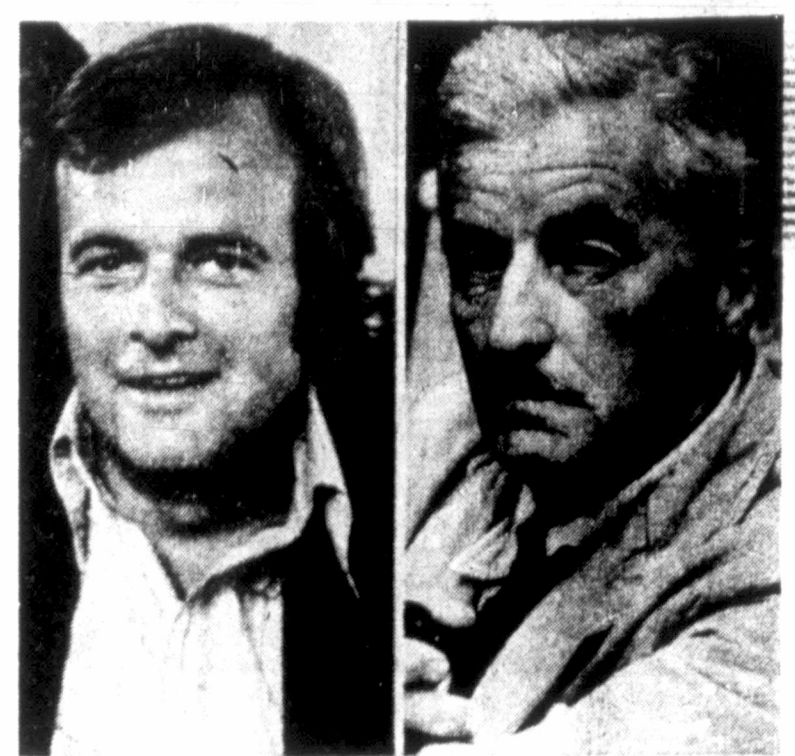
This depends on available telephone lines. Sometimes the Thai military takes them over for its own communications and prospective callers are told only that all lines are out. Other times, the ancient system temporarily expires on its own.

A huge influx of motorized vehicles has brought traffic jams to an area where many people still use bullocks to transport themselves and goods to neighboring villages.

The dusty, narrow streets of Aranyaprathet are packed with bicycles, small motorcycles, jeeps, private cars, motorized trishaws, army trucks and huge Japanese and German passenger buses.

"But if there was any purpose at all in what we did," Squier says, "it was to get people to read Faulkner. I suppose in that sense it was political."

Had the Mississippi Educational Television network indeed sought to "sell" Faulkner, they could hardly have chosen a director with a better track record than Squier's. His political winners in 1979 included gubernatorial candidates John Y. Brown Jr. in Kentucky and William Winter in Mississippi.

The early part of Squier's career was spent making documentary films for the National Educational Television network. PBS predecessor. He was "side-tracked into politics," he says, in 1968, and in the intervening decade built quite a business promoting candidates.

Squier says he maintained through it all an interest in work outside of politics.

"I had intended from the start to do other things," he says, "and it seemed an advantageous time to take on something new. Faulkner was a good place to start, and now I'm thinking of doing others, Herman Melville for example."

At 45, Squier says he felt capable both financially and temperamentally of taking on the Faulkner film. "I no longer feel I have to have something done in 15 minutes," he says. "You get to a certain point in life when you can think in chunks of two years or more."

He says he found the project one of the most challenging of his career.

"What I wanted to do with Faulkner," he says, "was a major look at the man from two or three different angles

at the same time to bring people face to face with a great, if not the greatest, American author.

"I wanted to show the artist at work," Squier says. "Faulkner's life was intertwined with his work, and I felt this would help people understand him. At the same time, I knew I had to keep my fingerprints off of William Faulkner."

"William Faulkner: A Life on Paper" examines Faulkner's life and work, using interviews with people who knew him, as well as dramatizations based on his writings. Forty-one people were interviewed, including Faulkner's daughter, Jill Faulkner Summers.

"I felt we had an opportunity with Faulkner we didn't have with many other writers of his stature," Squier says, "primarily because many of the people who knew him well were still alive. Faulkner died in 1962."

The interview with the late writer's daughter was the first she had ever granted.

## Man Scatters 'Offices' Throughout Chicago To Conduct Public Relations

CHICAGO (AP) — You can be walking along with Merton Silbar and he'll point to a restaurant and say: "That's a tremendous place."

He isn't talking about the food. He means they have a good pay telephone booth.

Silbar, who operates a public relations firm in suburban Glenview, conducts most of his business from phone booths and has favorites located all over the Chicago area.

"I always have rolls of quarters, dimes and nickels and spend about \$3,000 for 7,000 calls a year," said Silbar. "I've been a payphoniae for seven years. I'm more relaxed and more innovative."

"It's just a waste of time staying in the office and dictating to my secretary when I can do the same thing from some suburb," he said. "One of my major accounts demands that I call him six times a day. Another demands that I stay in touch with 65 businesses."

Silbar, 45, may be in a dozen different phone booths a day, sometimes using two or three phones at once.

"You can spend half an hour a day in the office just waiting for people to get off the phone. But on pay phones you can be waiting for somebody on one phone, doing work with your office on another, and you don't have to hang up on anyone," said Silbar. "The secret is knowing where there are three or more phones together."

The Radisson Chicago Hotel is a good place — five in a row. You can use the phones to the right and left of you. Tollway oases are good because they

have banks of four phones. The Ground Round has only one phone. But you can scoop up some of their free peanuts and can carry your beer in there."

Silbar said an all-time favorite booth used to be in the Ambassador East. "It was luxurious, cushioned and big. I could run an office in there. But they did away with it in a modernization program."

Silbar said phone booths have changed his lifestyle.

"I can watch my son play tennis and conduct business at the same time from a pay phone overlooking the courts," he said. "The time I save doing business out of phone booths and not running in and out of the office amounts to about three hours a day. That's three hours more I can spend with my family."

Silbar carries a book with the numbers of dozens of outside pay phones.

"Sometimes when I'm walking down the street with a couple of friends, I'll fall back and make a phone call. When my friends walk by a booth up ahead, the phone will ring. They'll answer and say, 'Is that you, Mert?' Just like Fibber McGee used to do on his old radio show."

"The biggest change I've noticed are in the operators," said Silbar. "They've become a lot more polite. Some of them used to be rude. Now they say, 'Have a nice day,' or 'Merry Christmas.'"

"I left some important papers in a phone booth once and couldn't remember which one," Silbar said. "I called 10 different places I had been. Finally, I called a bowling alley way out in Evergreen Park. I asked the manager if he would mind looking in the phone booth

for the papers. He found them and wanted to know how I knew they were there."

### Anti-Ayatollah Lighting Plan Urged By Metzians

PARIS (AP) — The municipal government in the eastern French city of Metz will be lighting up fewer Christmas trees this year "as an anti-Ayatollah Khomeini act," says its mayor, Jean Marie Rausch.

Rausch told reporters the seizure of the U.S. Embassy in Iran "has made me openly pro-nuclear." He said he would support construction of a nuclear power station in the Metz area because its output would equal "6.5 million tons of fuel that Khomeini could never control."

"I prefer a slight dose of radiation to Ayatollah Khomeini," he said.

The number of city-financed Christmas trees this season will be 36 — half the usual number.

## Segregation Alleged At Texas A&M

NEW YORK (AP) — A report that presents extensive evidence of racial segregation in higher education in Texas is now in the hands of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the New York Times reported Sunday.

The Times reported that it had obtained a portion of the report, which indicates that at most of the 38 state-supported colleges and universities and 47 community colleges in Texas, the student bodies are either overwhelmingly white or overwhelmingly black.

Texas A&M was the most heavily white school in the system, according to the report. It has 21,766 students, but only 65 are black, and 50 of the blacks are athletes, the report said.

Faculty is better paid at white schools than at black schools, according to the report, and white schools are better financed. It also said the boards of most schools are almost all white, except for those schools that are predominately black or Hispanic.

According to the Times, the report cited identical programs at black and white schools that are close enough to be merged.

Hispanic students also are grouped at certain campuses, the report said.

The Times said Texas officials claim that they do not discriminate in admissions, but that whites and blacks go to different schools because of longstanding preferences. They told the Times that efforts are being made to upgrade facilities and equalize expenditures.

According to the Times, a spokesman for HEW Secretary Patricia Harris said the report is being examined by the HEW staff and Mrs. Harris has not yet seen it.

## Sex Rates Low, Survey Says

NEW YORK (UPI) — A survey of 20,000 American women reveals that most of them are not happy with their sex lives, but rate such fulfillment far below home and family, McCall's magazine reported Sunday.

"In an era of rampant divorce, many wives seem clearly prepared to do almost anything to preserve marriages," McCall's commented on the survey.

Home and family come first. Their emotional lives mean more than their sexual lives.

Eighty-two per cent of the respondents were married, 8 per cent single, 5 per cent living with a man, 4 per cent separated or divorced and 1 percent widowed.

Thirty-two per cent admitted they had been unfaithful, but many said their infidelities eventually helped strengthen their marriages and made them "appreciate their partners more," McCall's said.

In response of the question, "What is most important to you now?" 61 per cent

said, "my home."

Only 23 per cent listed "satisfying sex" as the most important.

**Iranian Student's Name Causes Teasing, Problems**

ATLANTA (AP) — The last few weeks have not been easy for some Iranians living in the United States, especially one student whose name is Ayatollah.

Mohammad Taghi Ayatollah-Ghafari, a 27-year-old Atlanta University student from Tehran, says he has been teased about his family name, which includes the now-familiar title of Iran's religious leader, the Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini.
