





 Proper balance for every crop. Different plants require different percentages of the fertilizing elements. With liquid fertilizer it is possible to blend the nutrients in any desired ratio.

2. Acidification. All plants do better in a soil that is slightly acid. Liquid fertilizer has an acid base which counteracts alkali in soils and will acidify the canal water, giving the grower both the advantages of acidification and fertilization at the same time—at one cost.

3. Immediate availability. Plants take nutrients only after they are in solution in the water. Nutrients in liquid fertilizer are in solution when they enter the ground and because the water is acidified they remain in solution and go directly to the plants. Experiment Stations give this as the greatest advantage of this form of fertilizer.

4. Flexibility. With liquid the fertilizing program can be changed to meet the needs of the crop as the needs are indicated by the development of the

5. Complete coverage of entire root zone. There are no deposits of fertilizer to burn the roots or starve them until they are sought out by the feeder roots. Liquid fertilizer feeds every root that gets wet equally.

6. No wastage. As liquid nutrients are immediately available it is not necessary to apply them before planting the crop. So, if the crop is lost in the early stages, there is no fertilizer loss by leeching, weed growth, or passing into the sub-soil.

Economic distribution. Unlike other kinds of commercial fertilizer, Liquid Fertilizer requires no labor or machinery for its application. Merely place the barrel at the headwater, insert the regulator and adjust the rate of flow to the desired quantity.







UNCLE SAM'S PART OF

The Federal tax rate on local telephone service is 15%. The tax rate on long distance service, where the charge is 25c or over, is 25%. Other forms of telephone service are subject to Federal taxes at rates ranging from 8% to 25%.

This tax is imposed by the U.S. Government directly on the user of the telephone. The telephone company, at its own expense, serves as a

Long distance calls and certain other services, being taxed at 25%, are taxed higher than the 20% rate for luxuries such as furs, jewelry, and perfumes.

This form of tax, that is an excise tax on telephone service, has traditionally been resorted to only in national emergencies. Your telephone company believes this form of tax should not be a part of the peace time tax structure. Representatives of the telephone industry have urged and will continue to urge before the proper Congressional committees that these excise taxes now be eliminated; and many users and representatives of users of telephone service are likewise urging that they be repealed by the tax legislation now before the Congress.



to two important subjects, public roads and the U.S. Air Force.

The House approved a new three year public roads program to succeed the program which is now being completed. Under the new law a total of \$1 1-2 billion dollars will be expended by the Federal government over a three year period. The money will be spent in cooperation with the states for various phases of public road construction, including farm-to-market roads.

The bill approved by the House for the Air Force provides funds for a total of 2900 modern military aircraft. An additional 1500 planes are provided for the Navy. The number of additional planes for the Air Force is far in excess of the number originally requested by the President. This increase was provided in view of the unsettled world conditions and refusal of Russia to cooperate in our efforts to promote peace. I spoke in favor of the program for the expansion and modernization of the Air Force and served as a Member of the Committee which wrote the legislation ind presented it to t'e

The passage of this legislation for an expanded and improved Atr Force is one of the most significant and important steps taken by Congress since V-J Day. Undoubtedly the American people favor such a program. We had some difficulty in the House in securing passage of an important amendment but on final passage of the bill the House was almost unanimous, passing the measure with only three dissenting votes.


