

# Home Rule—An American Tradition

Dominant among American concepts in government stands the principle of

It is perhaps the oldest of our traditions. It is a healthy outgrowth of that insistence on self-government which found expression in the Revolutionary War. Regarded by the founders and developers of America as essential to their liberty, it has persisted through a century and a half of na-

That explains why a growing number of citizens watch with grave misgiving many of the innovations in government being urged on the American people today. Among these they see:

Efforts to force on citizens, with all the authority of enacted law, the dictates of appointed Bureau chiefs. Efforts to curb the powers of the Su-

preme Court whenever it upholds the rights reserved by our Constitution to the people and the states. Efforts to centre in Washington powers and authority which, since the be-

ginning of our nation, have belonged to the states and smaller communities. These attempts are already under way. Others will undoubtedly follow. But, in whatever alluring forms they may be presented, all mean funda-mentally the same thing—limiting the people's power in government, by taking from their local communities the right to run their own affairs.

In other words, the weakening of Home Rale.

The real significance of such proposals lies, therefore, not in what they promise, but in what they threaten to take away from the people in the way of rights and privileges and power. As a wise President once said:

"No method of procedure has ever been devised by which liberty could be divorced from local self-government."

The everyday affairs of his everyday New England world are reflected in little masterpieces that have become a part of our national tradition, like "The Village Blacksmith" and "The Children's Hour." Children's Hour."

OF all Americans whose written words have been deeply he found economic independence engraved on our national mind in writing he gave up teaching and heart, none has so strong a to devote himself only to poetry. and neart, none has so strong a hold on popular affection as Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. The work of the great poet was diffused with a gentleness that heightens its beauty.

He was in a profound sense American. It was the folk story of his, native land that inspired him most elequently in improvements.



accident. If a driver's license is cancelled, it automatically becomes illegal for him to drive a car until a new license is issued-which means for a period of not less than six months.

Persons driving an automobile should be equipped with a license at all times. The penalties provided for driving without a license are severe.

The new law, while it does not restrict the right of any person physically and mentally sound to drive an automobile, does provide means for control of traffic violations in this state. It is expected to eliminate hit-and-run driving, as well as nany other serious violations of the
