The coronation ceremonies Monday evening marked the close of one of the closest races for Basketball Queen ever staged in the local high school. Lela Mae Persons, Freshman candidate for the honor, was only a few votes behind the Senior representative when the voting closed Monday afternoon.

Net proceeds of \$42.50 was realized by the Pantherettes from the contest and program, Coach Wanda King announced Tuesday. The money will be used to buy sweaters for the members of the 1936 Pantherette team.

Identity of the Basketball Queen was not revealed until the final chords of the stately processional brought the coronation ceremony to a climax Monday evening.

Following a fast game between Pantherettes and Exes, an interesting floor show, with Mary Lucy Montgomery as Master of Ceremonies, was presented. A comedy skit, with Henry Gardner, Jr., as straight man and Edward Grundy as the black-faced comedian, opened the program. Tap dance numbers by three popular entertainers, Rena and Lela Mae Persons and Johny Womack, were followed by readings by Dorothy Dee Sachse and Edna Young.

There is sufficient moisture in the ground to hold wheat in good shape for another 30 days. By that time we hope we will have some rain—but if we don't our wheat should be able to hold up a long time because we planted seed from wheat that never saw any rain at all last year.

Rodeo Is Featured At Plainview Dairy Show This Year

PLAINVIEW, March 3.—A real Western rodeo with more than \$500 in prizes, two days of rabbit and greyhound races and an outstanding horse show are some of the entertainment features planned for the 9th annual Panhandle-Plains Dairy Show and Rodeo to be held in Plainview April 6, 7, 8 and 9.

Beginning Monday afternoon, April 6, at 3 o'clock, and again on Wednesday afternoon, April 8, a rodeo will be held just north of the dairy barn. Cash prizes include such events as bronc riding, calf roping, ribbon roping, bulldogging and steer riding. Some of the Southwest's best known stars are expected to enter these contests. Many of the contestants at the Ft. Worth rodeo are expected to be seen in action in Plainview.

Tuesday, April 7, and Thursday, April 9, there will be greyhound and rabbit races and a horse show. The rabbit races, while a comparatively new sport in this section, have already proven popular, while the horse show is expected to attract horse lovers from throughout the Southwest.

A show arena is now under construction at Plainview and will be ready to take care of the thousands of visitors that are expected. More than 300 dairy cattle are expected in the dairy show to compete for approximately \$2,000 in cash premiums.

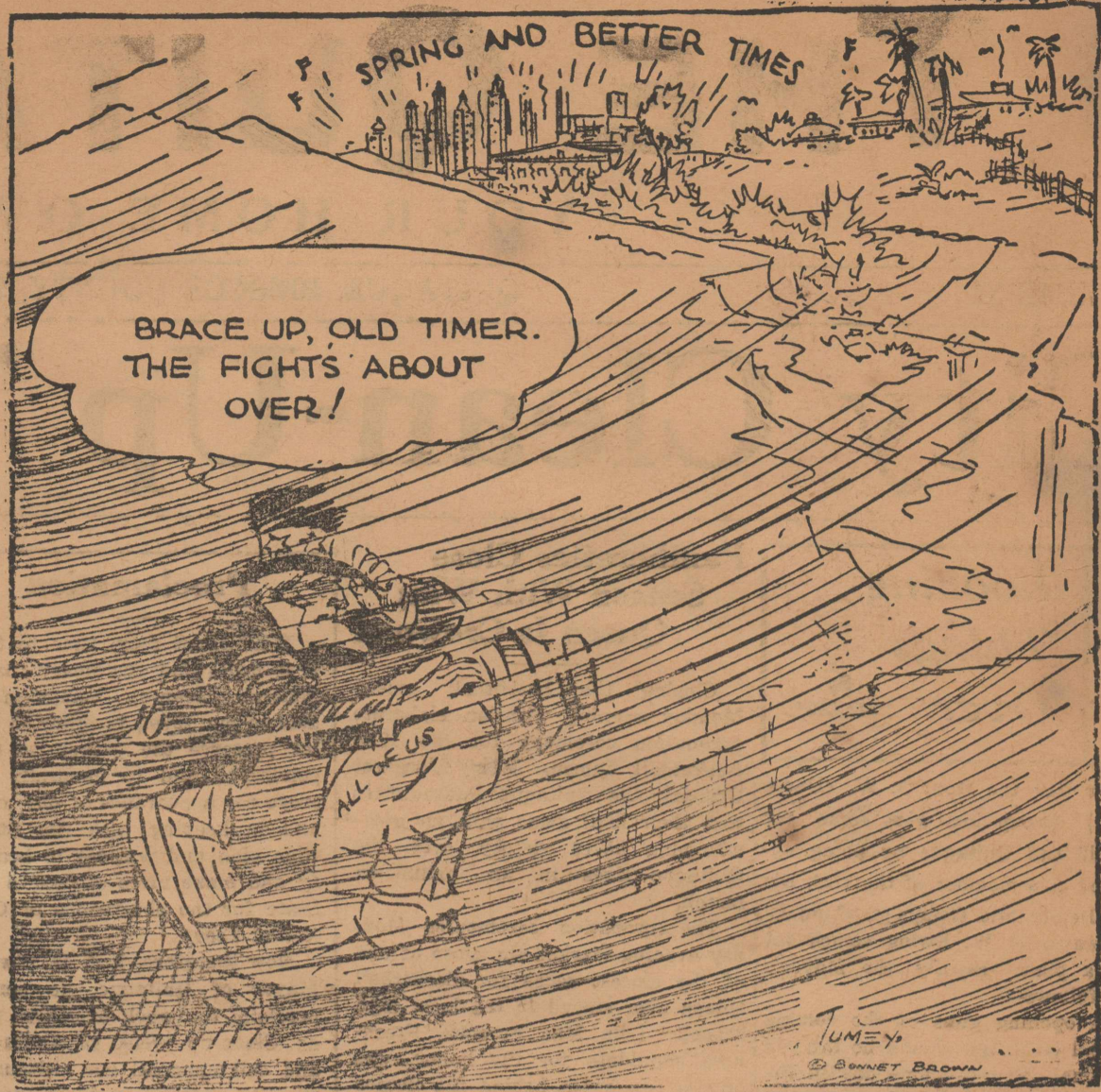

March 9th, 10th, and 11th, as Clean-up Days in Quitaque. The cooperation of every citizen is expected in answer to the call.

Supervisors have been named for every block within the corporate limits of the city to work under the directors in the movement and give their personal attention to the work in their own neighborhood. In this way the entire community has been regimented for the program.

The aims of the drive, as set forth by its backers, are: first, to make Quitaque the cleanest place in Briscoe County; second, to celebrate the Centennial Year; third, to cultivate civic righteousness; and finally, to secure our citizenship against disease by making this a sanitary and clean community.

During the three days of the campaign, every local citizen will be expected to clean up his home grounds and to cooperate with other citizens on his block in clearing vacant lots of all trash, weeds, cans and rubbish of all kinds.

There is to be no written contract nor will there be any rented acres. I'm sure the paper mills and pencil factories hated to hear the news that there wasn't to be any contracts signed—they will lose lots of business on that account and will no doubt attack the constitutionality of the law from that angle—just as the ginners and cotton factors jumped on the AAA when they lost business by the reduction program. Maybe the "Mighty Nine" will let this new bill stand the even if the paper sellers and pencil makers do suffer a little.

Terracing and Contouring
With this pretty weather staying on we are getting lots of terrace and contour lines run. These days are ideal for the job and we're pushing things as fast as possible. Terracing and contouring has long been a proven method of conserving moisture and soil. Many farmers in Briscoe County are trying their first time to do something about the loss of soil and water from their fields. Fortunately for present and future generation our farmers are awakening to this great move before our soils are ruined. A field properly terraced or contoured has three distinct advantages over one that is not terraced or contoured: (1) Moisture can be conserved, (2) Erosion from wind will be held to a minimum and (3) Erosion from water (when it does rain) will be held to a minimum. Either of these three advantages alone would be sufficient reason for doing the job, but when you get them all three in

one deal you get triple pay for the job.

Subsidy Payment
A great many questions are being asked about the proposed payments on the cotton to bring the price to 12 cents.

There will be a payment made to producers up to their Bankhead allotment of the difference between the average price of the 10 spot markets and 12c on the date cotton was sold. The difference is never to exceed 2c per pound. Example: If you sold a bale of cotton on Nov. 25 for 10.85 and the average of 10 spot markets that day was 10.60 you would get the difference in 10.60 and 12c. If you sold a bale of cotton on Dec. 1st for 11c and the average of the 10 spot markets that day was 11.50 you would get the difference in 11.50 and 12c.

The state office has called for the forms applying for this subsidy payment and we feel like we will be getting some pay on them sometime during 1936.

Now that Congress is back in session, farmers should prepare for high winds.
