Deadline for Auto GOLIAD MARTYR Tags and Drivers' License April 1st

Sheriff N. R. (Jake) Honea, in a statement Monday afternoon, urged all automobile owners and drivers in the county to have their cars registered and secure driver's licenses this week in order to avoid the last minute rush. The deadline is Apr l 1st. All tags must be on cars by that date, and all persons driving cars in the county must have secur-

ed driver's l'censes by that time. Only one third of the automobiles in the county have been registered for 1936 license tags, according to Honea. Out of an estimated 1000 cars, only three hundred and thirty three had been registered at the County office Monday afternoon.



example of our Washington . . . will guide us through the doubts and diffi-culties that beset us; they-will guide our children and our children's chil-dren in the paths of prosperity and peace.

That tribute to the enduring influence of George Washington was ex-pressed by one of our earlier statesmen during a period as critical to America as our own. It remains a true estimate today.

What counsels can we recall as, throughout the nation, we honor his beck. memory?

The Father of His Country was more eloquent in deeds than in phrases. He lived his own precept: "Actions, not words, are the true criterion." But history has, nevertheless, recorded num-erous expressions of his wisdom and foresight. Many of them hold a peculiar significance in a period marked by aspaults on the very Constitution which he incorporated his hopes for the future of our Nation.

Here are some of George Washington's comments on the great Charter of Liberties so intimately identified with his life and his spirit:

"That precious depository of American happiness, the Constitution of the United States."

"The Constitution which at any time exists till changed by an explicit and authentic act of the whole people is sacredly obligatory to all."

"If in the opinion of the people the distribution or modification of the distribution or modification of the Constitutional powers be in any par-ticular wrong, let it be corrected by an amendment in the way which the Constitution designates. But let there be no change by usurpation; for though this in one instance may be the instrument of good, it is the cus-tomary weapon by which free govern-ments are destroyed."

"Experience is the surest standard by by which to test the existing Consti-tution of a country."



"Put none but Americans on guard tonight."
