## State In Good

Financial Condition Says Gov. Allred AUSTIN, May 26 .-The State ad
valorem tax rate has been reduced from 77 cents to 62 cents and the
State will have a cash balance of more than three million dollars in the Confederate Pension fund, at the
end of the current fiscal year, Gov. end of the current fiscal year, Gov,
James V. Allred told the Texas Bankers Convention last week. "This cash balance of three mil-
lion dollars" the Governor said, "will be maintained even after the increa-
se of the scholastic per capita apportionment from $\$ 17.50$ for the cur Board of Education
The $\$ 18.50$ per capita apportion-
ment is the largest ever made by the ment is the largest ever made by the
State of TTexas. It will effect the
destiny of about 1 . 558,00 scholas-

During the Allred administration about three million dollars will have
been paid for the Centennial. Every available free school fund has been
paid and appropriations for rural aid have been increased by two million dollars per year.
Since September of last year $\$ 2$,-
$731,000.00$ has been set aside for sinking fund and interest on the
State's bonded indebtedness. The State owes at this time $\$ 13,537,750$ on the twenty million dollar relief
bonds voted in 1933. Taxpayers have been saved apppillion dollars by the slash in the State ad walorem rate from 77 c to 62 c , the
