

If a business man or a farmer hires a worker he likes to feel that the new hand is capable of the job. He real-izes that no worth-while enterprise can be well conducted unless it is competently manned.

any rate, is indicated by recently pub-lished figures which reveal that of the many thousand persons added to the Federal payroll since 1933, fewer than one out of 100 were appointed under the Civil Service or "merit" system. It wasn't always that way. Here's how figures present the picture of the past twenty years:

During the Wilson Administration 67.2 per cent of employes in the Ex-ecutive Department of the Federal govecutive Department of the Federal gov-ernment were under the merit system. By the Coolidge Administration the proportion had risen to 74.8 per cent and four years later to 80.8 per cent. Then came the switt inflation of the public payroll during the past three years, and with it a retreat from Civil Source rules Service rules.

Today less than 58 per cent of jo holders in the Executive Departm of our Federal government remain der the merit system, and in some stances new appointees replace ex-enced workers who won their p under Civil Service methods.

Probably these figures explain so many groups and individual realize what inflated payrolls of workers and earners of Americ protesting against the spoils sys the appointment of Federal job-h

They explain why those taxpa demand a return to the merit sy under which a man is appointed cause he demonstrates that he can the work rather than because he show that he knows the right ponticians.

Public Office still remains a Public Trust. The citizens who pay his salary have a right to demand that their trustee, no matter what his office, demonstrate his ability to fill the job. Under the merit system they have that assurance. Under the spoils system they lack it.

Which method would the successful merchant or farmer follow if he wanted his affairs efficiently con-ducted? The answer is obvious. Taxpayers should demand the same evidence of competence in the men and women appointed to government jobs. Remember, no matter who benefits by putting them on the public payroll, we, the people, foot the bill.







Terracing


Now is the time to have that idle crop land and cut over wheat land terraced. The road machines are doing quite a bit of work for the farmers now at a very nominal cost. It will be remembered that terracing properly done counts on the new farm program as a soil building practice and draws 40 cents per 100 feet of terrace built- not to exceed \$200 per acre for the amount terraced,

When Do We Measure? Measuring and compliance on the new farm program will not begin until after September 1. There are no contracts to sign, but there will be a certificate of performance to sign when the committeeman measures your land. A ll farm land and all leave out land will be measuredand maybe the pasture and waste lands too. Be prepared.


