COMMERCIAL FAILURES DROP IN TEXAS IN JULY

AUSTIN, Aug. 25.—A sharp drop curred in the number of commerial failures in Texas during July in comparison with the corresponding month last year, but there was a ubstantial increase in failures over the preceding month, it was reported by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Liabilities were down sharply from both com-

Inc., show a 54 per cent decline in at eleven o'clock. the number of failures and 30 percent in their liablities compared with July last year; and an increase of 33 per cent in number but a decline of 32.5 per in liabilities compared with the preceding month, the bureau stated. Average liability per failure was 82 per cent below that of July last year and 44 per cent under that

DROUGHT, WHERE IS THY STING?


A local farmer last week, when questioned about the condition of his cotton crop, summed up the agricultural situation to the proverbial

The quota was raised from last year, when six Quitaque High School students received N. Y. A. aid. Funds allotted are to be distributed among schools of the county, though, according to Judge Martin, the county allotment will probably be divided between Silverton and Quita-

Six dollars per month, to be used in the purchase of clothes and school supplies, is allowed each student accepted by the Administration. Qualifications no longer limit the selection of students to families on the relief rolls, though the applicants must be in need of aid and maintain good scholastic averages to qualify.

The entire allotment, providing for six students went to the Quitaque schools last year, since other schools in the county were unable to qualify. A more nearly equal division will be made under the new provisions, however, Martin stated.



HOW THE BANKS AID THE GOVERNMENT

Normal and Emergency Needs Met by Advances of Commercial Banking Credit

NEW BRUNSWICK N. J. - The American commercial banking credit system is an absolute essential in the financial operations of business and government, Harold G. Moulton, Presi dent of the Brookings Institution of Washington, D. C., said here recently in an address before the Graduate School of Banking conducted under the poin auspices of Rutgers University and the American Bankers Association.

If the flexibility and expansibility provided by commercial banking credit were eliminated, Dr. Woulton declared "it is scarcely too much to say that the economic system itself would shortly be destroyed.

"Normally the amount of credit ex tended by commercial banks to the gov ernment is small in amount and for the purpose mainly of financing temporary requirements in anticipation of tax col lections or bond sales. But in periods o' war and acute depression, when the financial requirements of government expand with great rapidity, the expan sion of commercial bank credit is on a tremendous scale. Such is the case at the present time.

How Public Needs Are Financed

"The purchase of government securi ties by individuals and by the commer cial banks provides the government with the means by which its manifold activities are financed The Treasury obtains the funds, with which the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and other government credit agencies finance their operations through the sale of securities, largely to commercial banks. These funds, in .urn, have gone to the assistance of distressed banks and other financial institutions, to aid industrial and agricultural enterprises. to finance new public and private capi tal construction, and to provide relief to the unemployed "

Dr. Moulton declared that it is not true that the world depression was caused by a breakdown of the American banking system "which did not, in fact. occur until the deprossion had been under way for more than three years.'

"Nor is it true that the world mal adjustments existing in 1929 can be ex plained simply by undue extensious of commercial banking credit in the preceding years. These malaujustments in volved world agricultural indu commercial and financial relations."
