grant parole, pardon, commuation, etc., of sentences upon

said, "The proposed Board of Par-
dons and Paroles would be comis said, The proposed board of Par-
dons and Paroles would be compris
ed of three members, one of whom ed of three members, one of whom
would beappointed by the Governor one by the Chief Justice of the Sup
reme Court and one by the Chie Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. They will serve for six years,
one member's term expiring every one member's term expiring every
two years.

Board." The Governor is given the powe to grant one thirty day reprieve in a
