
Centennial Trip Starts Tomorrow at Noon

Four coaches will carry the Briscoe County Delegation to the Texas Centennial Exposition at Dallas this week. Monday evening, 105 Quitaque people had purchased tickets and 65 Silverton people. This includes the Senior Class of the local High School, who are sponsors of the trip. A few "late comers" are expected to swell the total to nearly 200.

The train will leave Quitaque at 12:05 p. m. Friday, arriving in Dallas at about nine o'clock that evening. Those who make the trip will have their choice on the return trip, leaving Dallas either Sunday morning and arriving home at 6:18, or Centennial To leaving Dallas Sunday evening, arriving in Childress at 4:30 Monday morning. Those who return on the late train must make arrangements for transportation from Childress to points.

Receipts may be exchanged for tickets at any time at the Fort' Worth and Denver depot. Those holding Dallas it would exercise it's option receipts will save a last minute rush if they get them exchanged before train time. Tickets for the trip may still be purchased at the depot.

Five of the Six Amendments Carry In Texas

American veople gave their whole hearted endorsement to the New Deal in the National election Tuesday, by giving President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Vice President John N. Garner a lan'slide vote of confidence. On the basis) of an incomplete vote Wednesday, the Democrats had 523 electorial votes to 8 for the Republican candidates.

Only two states, Maine and Vermont. gave the Landon and Knox ticket a small majority. Texas went for the Democrat ticket about 7 to 1.

In the Quitaque box, Roosevelt and Garner received 240 votes, while Landon and Knox were polling only 19. Complete county returns were not available Wedne day evening.

According to incomplete returns, five of the proposed constitutional amendments were adopted . 





ADMIRAL GEORGE DEWEY

T was not until ne was Dewey that Admiral George Dewey was not until he was sixty as the fame of the men to whom as the fame of the men to whom they are dedicated. Dewey's first fighting service was in the Civil War under that distinguished seaman, Admiral Farragut. After the Civil War, he gave achieved the stature of a national hero. But a lifetime of devoted service to our country in peace and war had prepared him for the moment when he became the

outstanding figure of his day. Up until his great victory over the Spanish fleet in the Battle of Manila, won without loss of a single American life, Dewey's career was a progressive though unspectacular advance in rank.
