Quitauque Places Well In Scholastic Meet

Complete results of the events of the interscholastic meet held last Friday and Saturday at Silvertown came in too late to publish in full but following is a list of contestants who won first places and will represent the county at the district meet:

Powell won first place in high hurdles, broad jump, 440-yd. dash and second in the high jump.

Hall, first in mile run.

Starkey, first in discus, shot put and third in javelin.

Dorsey placed first in 220-yd dash.

Rhoderick tied for first with a Silvertown boy in pole vaulting.

The local boys had the advantage in first places, taking seven and tying for another, but the Owls had the advantage in the number of men, and man power is what it took to win the meet.

Powell was outstanding for the Panthers with three first places and one second to score a total of 18 points.

In the literary events Quitauque won first in the following:

Essay writing, Rosalind Coker.

Junior girls' declamation, Mildred Coker and second, Naomi Matthews.

Senior girls' declamation, Dorothy Dee Sachse, tied for second, Jane Scott.

Extemporaneous speech, Orval Graham.

W L Graham in junior boys' declamation and Charlie Burgess in senior boys' declamation, placed second in their events.

Grade school essay writing, Rudell James.

Grade school girls' declamation, Isabele Holloman.

Grade school boys declamation, Billy Jo Sachse placed third.

Quitauque placed first in picture memory contestants being Doris and Geraldine Simmons, Wilma Lee Stevens, Rayburn Burgess and Robert Hamilton.

In both grade and high school spelling divisions Quitauque placed first contestants entering: grade school, Isabele Holloman and Willa Dean Owens, and high school, Emily Margaret Gardiner and Marion Wilson.

Due to inclement weather the tennis matches have not been held but are scheduled for some time this week.

FEDERAL ENGINEERS APPROVE DAM SITE IN SWISHER COUNTY

Federal engineers who have been surveying several proposed sites in Swisher county during the past three weeks, for the \$300,000 dam which will provide a recreational lake for Swisher, Hale, Floyd and Briscoe counties, have approved the site on North Tule Creek, five miles northeast of Tulia including the Brooks section of 640 acres.

In the upper part of the section and farther up-stream there are springs of living water which will keep the lake water fresh and wholesome. The dam is to be built near the south border of the section.

Because of the winding nature of the stream bed the shore line of the lake will be much more than a mile long on each side of the stream bed.

Federal appraisers have set the price of the land at \$17.00 per acre, which will be paid by the Federal Government under the "purchase of sub-marginal lands" act.

It is understood that local officials have secured an option on the land and fear no obstacle in securing the proposed site.

Funds are not yet available for building the dam, but it is believed that such funds will be available shortly after July 1, the beginning of the new year.—Tulia Herald.

Local Men Confer With Army Engineers

E B Tunnell and E G Rice returned Friday night from Little Rock, Ark., where they went as a committee from the Upper Red River Flood Control board for a conference with federal army engineers in regard to construction of a dam on that stream in Hall or Briscoe counties.

These gentlemen report a very successful trip, having received the assurance of the engineers that a public hearing on the project will be held in the very near future to be held at Childress.

Funds have been set aside for examination and preliminary survey of the project, the committee was informed. Additional funds will not be available until after the beginning of the next fiscal year, June 1.

Messrs. Tunnell and Rice stated that they received a very cordial reception from the engineers, being seated at the chief's desk for an informal and thorough discussion in round table fashion.

Engineer's Show At Lubbock April 8-9

Lubbock—Visitors to the 10th annual Engineers Show to be held at Texas Tech in Lubbock, April 8 and 9, will be able to see the scientific phenomena made possible by engineering. This show will be conducted at the same time as the interscholastic League Meet, and officials are expecting one of the largest attendances ever had.

Special invitations have been mailed to every high school in West Texas, telling of the elaborate display in the Engineering Building on the Tech Campus. In each of the nine departments of the show a definite mode of display is to be carried out. In addition to the exhibits, a large number of new processes and demonstrations have been prepared this year, according to Henry Meredith, general manager of the show.

The progress of the show may be evidenced by the fact that where 1,000 visitors viewed the show the first year, more than 7,000 people jammed the halls of the building last year. Names of all visitors will be etched on small squares of glass with flouric acid and given away as souvenirs, it was announced.

AGRICULTURAL BRIEFS

BY THE BRISCOE COUNTY AGENT

Just a few more days like the past two or three will cause the most of us to "shuck out" of those "long handles" and too it will be goodbye to the green bugs. This hot weather we're having is just too much for red flannels and green bugs.

Some damage is being reported from the ravages of the green bugs, but to date no one has complained of any material damage being done by the red flannels. Guess the boys all figure on being out of those before the acres diverted from cotton under hide slip. The flannels can be controlled very easily, but the green bugs are hard to do anything with. The U. S. D. A. recommends that all volunteer small grains be destroyed between harvest and fall sowing. Clean cultivation is about the only way to control the green bugs. Let's all try that this summer and fall so we don't have the "greenbugs" next year about this time.

Poor Farmers

City folks look at farmers and wonder just what makes them look so drawn and worried. The city man thinks it caused by hard work, but that's right where he's dead wrong. The honest work a farmer puts out doesn't make him look like he does. Honest work makes him strong, brown and healthy. What makes a farmer look like he's badly stayed with is simple. He's worried—worried about the answers to 4 questions. He wants to know the answers to the following 4 questions:

1. When will my "plow up" check get here?
2. How much cotton can I plant in 1938?
3. How long will the Federal Bank wait? And—
4. How much money can I borrow to make this year's crop on?

Now if I were smart enough to answer these four questions I believe Briscoe County would hire me as a Technical Advisor and not as a wet nurse for farmers. If I were going to guess at the above 4 questions I'd start in like this: No. 1, "Plow Up" checks for Briscoe County will reach here "some time" after May 1. No. 2 The amount of cotton you can plant in 1938 will depend upon the amount of land you have in cultivation, the cotton history of your farm and the amount of cotton acres available to the county. The farm bill provides:

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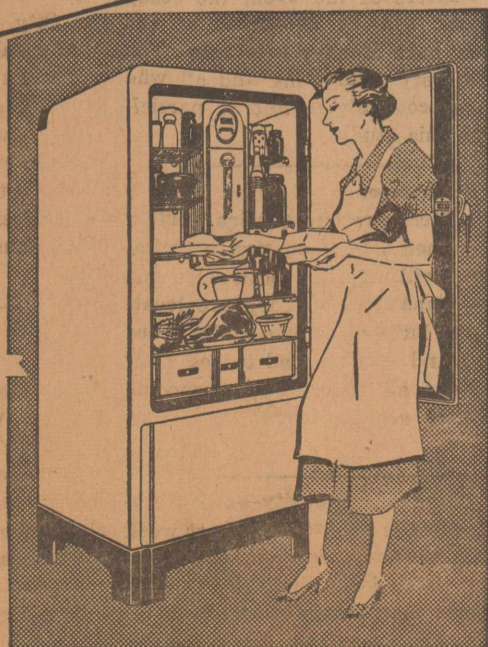

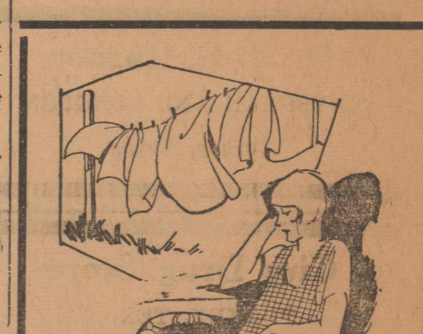

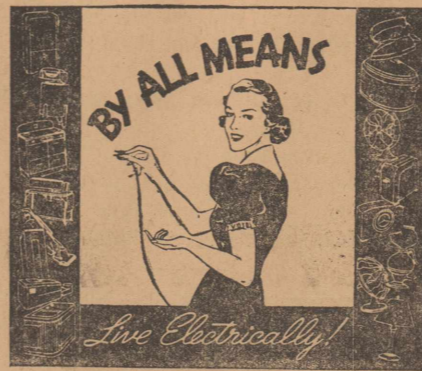
