21,090 head. He figured the 1937 crop in the same area at 22,200, while he estimates the total crop of 1938 at 10 percent above last yearor in figures-24,222. These figures are not supposed to be completely accurate. only approximate; but they vill not be far from right.

Cows culled from the various erds in Mr Stroup's four-county set up and moved to feed pens and markets each year, for the past few years, is approximately 4,000 head. About 3,500 stocker calves are ship ped yearly from this county, using the past four years as a base.

So far this year Briscoe county lone has shipped about 7000 head of feeder calves and 3000 head of culled cows.

Feeder stuff is shipped to several states, including Illinois, Kansas, Iowa, Missouri, Mississippi, Kentucky, California, Colorado and Nebraska. Marketable cattle, whether fed out

or taken from the range, is shipped | to Fort Worth or Kansas City. About 70 per cent of the cattle shipped this year has gone to market, or destination, by 'truck.

"We Fill Any Doctor's Prescription" Recent sales made by Taylor, Kitchens, Miller, Russell, Hawkins, Stroup, Walter Graham comprised several hundred head of mixed steers and heifers which went to northern feed lots in Colorado, Nebraska, Kansas and Iowa. The sale price of these animals was very satisfactory, according to Mr Stroup, ranging from 7 to 8 cents.
