Nor can we, immediately, bring about full compliance with the law among all retailers, nor hones But a beginning has been $m$ do promise that you will see results from it.

How far we can go, and how soon, depends very much on ourselves...but partly also on you.
Public
Public opinion, once aroused, can operate to bring about honest enforcement of existy
ing laws. Restriction of your patronage only to legal, respectable retail outlets can and will operate to raise retailing standards, Public preference for the products of Foun-
dation members* dation members* will bear witness of your ing retailers, and will encourage them to renewed efforts.

This is, therefore, at once a statement of ou objectives and an appeal for your support, without which we must fall short of our high hopes. We urgently invite your full and sympathetic cooperation.
