Mrs Sue Burton Died Friday Morning

The Grim Reaper after hovering for more than a month, over the patient spirit of one of the town's best-loved characters, claimed his own in the early hours last Friday morning, and took the ready and willing soul of Mother Burton to be united with loved ones who have gone before. She died peacefully at this good Christmas home. Her daughters and several of her good friends were present when she breathed her last at the home of Mrs J W Hadaway with whom she had lived for the past year. She would have been 89 years old April.

Mr. Burton was born April 10, 1850 near Jewett, Texas, in Pinola county. When she was a small child the family moved to Personville in Freestone county, where she grew to womanhood, uniting in marriage in 1876 with Amos Persons. To this union one son was born. Mr. Persons died only a few years after their marriage, and in 1876 she was married to Ezekiel Burton. To this union five children were born, two of whom died in childhood. The surviving son, Amos Persons, Jr., of Quitaque died in 1934.

Mrs. Burton came to Quitaque to be near her children 21 years ago. About nine years ago she fell and suffered a broken hip, and since then has been confined to her bed and wheel chair. The love and devotion which her Christian character and understanding heart inspired was attested by the steady pilgrimage of friends and relatives to her side, never a day passing without a visit from devoted friends.

She is survived by three daughters, Mrs C B Lewis and Mrs J A Johnson of Quitaque and Mrs E D Barnes of Corona Cal.; fourteen grandchildren and 18 great grandchildren.

Funeral services were spoken Friday afternoon at the home of Mrs Lewis, C Eldridge, pastor of the Baptist church, having charge of services. Interment was in the cemetery under direction of the Austin Funeral Home. Pall bearers: S D Bogan, E G Rice, Her McBride, O R Stark, E C Bar and Jimmy Partin.

TITLE GAME DREW A RECORD CROWD

Dallas, Dec 27—Athletic Director P C Cobb of the Dallas high schools today announced a record-breaking gate of \$22,600 for the Corpus Christi-Lubbock schoolboy championship grid game played here yesterday.

Inclement weather probably prevented several thousand additional fans from attending, Cobb said.

The previous high for a championship game was approximately \$21,000 for the 1934 game played here between Corpus Christi and Amarillo, Cobb said. Paid admissions yesterday totaled better than 19,000 with some 21,500 in the stands.

Five percent of the gross will be deducted for the interscholastic league, necessary expenses paid, and the two schools will split the remainder on a 50-50 basis, Cobb said.

B. L. Chandler To Try Irrigation On His Farm

B L Chandler has sunk a well on his farm east of town for irrigation purposes and expected to have his pump set and ready to start up today (Thursday).

The hole, 16 inches in diameter, was drilled to a depth of 100 feet however the first water was encountered at about 22 feet and the next more abundant strata at about 70 feet, the water rising to within 20 feet of the top of hole. Casing was set to a depth of about 80 feet.

Mr Chandler thinks he has sufficient water for quite an extensive acreage but this is yet to be determined when the well is put under pump test.

Should the well prove satisfactory with sufficient water for irrigation it will open a way for intensive farming in this fertile Quitaque valley.

Irrigation in the valley heretofore has been deemed inadvisable due to the belief that the water supply, if suitable, would be inadequate. Mr Chandler may be starting something that will prove of inestimable value to this area. Results of the test will be watched with keen interest.

Walker Youth Loses Eye By Firecracker

Woody Walker, 10-year old son of Mr and Mrs L D Walker, is in the Plainview sanitarium receiving treatment for injuries to his left eye received when a firecracker exploded in a bottle close to the boy's face.

Finding it impossible to extricate all the fine slivers of glass, the eyeball was removed Tuesday morning. The youth is reported doing nicely but will have to remain in the hospital several days yet.

The youth placed a lighted firecracker in a bottle and when it did not explode he picked up the bottle. The firecracker went off and flying glass struck the boy in the eye.

The place is one of the major posts which O'Daniel will fill as he begins his two-year administration. The salary is \$6,000 annually.




Beauchamp, who practices law with a son, Tom L. Beauchamp, Jr., is a former assistant attorney general and a former county judge of Lamar county.




