#### **Prisoners Try To Overpower Sheriffs**

Three prisoners being taken to Huntsville Thursday night, Jan 3, attempted to overpower Sheriff Jake Honea of Silverton and Sheriff Lee Howard of Floydada and two of them were shot in the scuffle. They will recover from their wounds. The prisoners were W. M. Sailing and Ambrose Mendez recently given 5-year prison terms for burglary of the Persons Hardware store at Quitaque, and a negro from Floyd county.

The attack on the officers occurred on a lonely stretch of road north of Centerville about 10 o'clock Thursday night. Sheriff Honea was driving and Sheriff Howard was in the front seat with him. The three prisoners were in the back seat all handcuffed toge-

MAGAZINE STORY FEATURES B. L. CHANDLER METHODS

B. L. Chandler, who lives near Quitaque in Briscoe county, is featured in an article in the Jenuary issue of Capper's Farmer, entitled "Green Feed for 12 Months." and Mrs. E. P. Lewis of Quitaque. By the simple process of staggering alfalfa and wheat, it seems, he has managed to work out a schedule which provides his hogs with green pasture the year around.

In this area of Texas alfalfa remains green eight months in the year, according to the nationally circulated magazine. Mr. Chandler sows wheat which remains green through the other four months which came in the late fall, winter and early spring. He uses twostrand electrified wire for fencing and changes the pasture at regular short intervals. One wire will hold sows. When the time comes for finishing the hogs he uses eight parts of ground sorghum to two parts of cracked wheat as a fattening ration.


