NOTICE

Your 1945 TAXES are now due and must be paid before the first day of February, 1946, to avoid penalty. Both men and women are required to pay their poll tax. Unpaid poll taxes are a lien upon any real or personal property you may own, or come in possession of.

Those who were 60 years of age or more on January 1, 1945, are not required to have an exemption to vote: those who have moved into the county since January 1, 1945 are required to have an exemption; those who have become 21 years of age since Jan. 1, 1945, or will become 21 before election are required to secure an exemption certificate during January, 1946, before they may vote in any of the elections during the year; no charge is made for these exemptions.

In 1946 automobile license fees cannot be paid before February 1, 1946, but must be paid between February 1st and April 1st, 1946.


