Dr. Clarence W. Cranford of Washington D. C. will be the speaker on the Baptist Hour broadcast next Sunday morning, March 10 at 7:30 a. m. CST. He is pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church of Washington, with a membership of nearly 4,000 and with annual contributions of more than \$50,000 to missions.

The subject of the Washington minister, 'Christian Justice in Human Relations,' is the last in the current series of the Baptist Hour on the general theme "Following Christ in the Paths of Peace."

The Baptist Hour is presented in cooperation with the Southern Religious Radio Conference and will be followed by the Presbyterian Hour beginning March 17. The first speaker on the Presbyterian Hour is Dr. William M. Elliott, Jr., of Dallas, on the subject "Letting God Take the Strain."

The Baptist Hour will be heard in another series over this same network beginning with July of this year.

All these programs are broadcast on an independent network of 37 cooperating stations and are carried as public service features.

The programs may be heard in Texas over radio stations KGNC, Amarillo; KPRC, Houston; WFAA, Dallas; and WOAI, San Antonio, at 7:30 a. m. CST. And over KWBU, Corpus Christi, at 5:30 p. m. CST.

VARIETY OF WEATHER—MOSTLY WET

This area received another good rain Monday night, measuring about .85 of an inch. The fall varied according to reports from farmers, some getting an inch or better while others reported about a half.

Pierce White's government gauge west of Quitaque recorded .85, as did Bill Middleton's gauge in town. John Sharp's private gauge at Turkey showed .85 with heavier rain falling at Wolf Flat but Bridlebit farmers reported a half or less. Parts of the Wolf Flat area reported more than an inch—some said two or three inches.

But whatever the measurement, the rain helped considerably, making some land plow better and giving wheat and other pasture crops a nice boost.

Thursday saw a little different variety of weather—first a dusty norther, then a little rain followed by a heavy downpour of snow which continued for several minutes but melted as it fell.
